## Gas safety inspector Issues meter warning

B.C.'s chief gas safety inspector, Susana Katz, has issued a warning to homeowners who use natural gas.

"Gas meters can be damaged by excessive snow and ice build-up," Katz stated January 14 in Victoria.

Damaged gas meters can result in gas accumulation, which may lead to house fires. Temporary covers can help prevent meter damage. An effective cover can be as simple as a plywood sheet leaning against the house to deflect the falling snow, creating a lean-to roof for the meter.

Homeowners should clearly mark the location of their gas meter before removing any snow from around their homes. Do not bury the meter and avoid ploughing into it with snow removal equipment. When removing snow from rooftops, take care that the meter does not become covered in ice and snow.

If a gas meter is encased in ice, homeowners should call their local gas supplier. Otherwise, the safety measures and precautions should be sufficient for most areas of the province.

## ICBC gives drivers a break

Andrew Petter announced January 15 there will be no ICBC rate increase this year.

Petter claims the insurance rate stability is attributed to the success of the road safety programs and stronger-than expected financial performance at ICBC.

"What we're seeing today are the first financial benefits of our road safety programs. If British Columbians continue to drive more safely, and are able to reduce crashes, injuries and claims costs, we can make sure ICBC rates are affordable well into the future," Petter said.

The ICBC preliminary road safety report for 1997 indicated there were 29 fewer deaths and 1,500 fewer injuries on B.C. highways in 1997 than in 1996. The report

showed speeding has declined significantly since the introduction of photo radar.

"While injury claims declined last year, the overall number of claims increased to a record high of over one million. To keep premiums affordable, we need to reduce that number significantly, and I'm confident British Columbians are up to the challenge," said Petter.

"We will continue to be very tough on dangerous drivers. We'll be strengthening our road safety measures this year, including the full implementation of the 'red light' camera program and the introduction of a graduated licensing system for new drivers," Petter added.

ICBC claims costs for 1997 will

be at least \$100 million less than expected. Vehicle theft has dropped 10 percent and theft-related claims are down five percent.

# Minor Hockey Means More Than Kids

This week is Minor Hockey Week across Canada.

The image conjured by the words 'minor hockey' is a group of youngsters on a patch of ice somewhere in the great outdoors. Canada's national sport has romantic overtones.

Minor hockey is big business carried on the backs of thousands of volunteer adults. The goal is to offer a great sport to youngsters, but the real image of minor hockey should be an image of dedicated grown-ups working extremely hard to create a functioning structure that trains young athletes.

At the top of the pyramid of workers are the paid employees of Canadian Hockey Association. Under this peak organization are the provincial organizations, such as B.C. Amateur Hockey Association, most of whom are volunteers. Some of these volunteers have put 40 years of their lives into minor hockey.

Lower on the pyramid are the regional associations. Princeton belongs with the Okanagan Mainline Amateur Hockey

Association, responsible for an area from Clearwater to south Okanagan, and Revelstoke to Lillooet. Within this association there are 22 minor hockey associations like Princeton's.

Donna Hennenfent is President of Princeton Minor Hockey Association (PMHA). Kirk McConnell is Secretary, Carol Mack is Treasurer, Pam McKenzie is Registrar, Sally Nault is Ice Ambassador, Ed Nault is Head Coach, Head Referee is Peter McDonald.

Shelley Hogg is Equipment Manager, Barry Luchsinger is Risk Manager, and Karen Barry, Carol McDonald and Shelley Hogg are in charge of the concession. Fundraising Co-ordinators are Donna Hennenfent and Angel Costa.

There are eight teams of young players. Each team requires a coach, an assistant coach, a team manager who books the games and referees, a tournament co-ordinator, and a phoning parent, for a total of 48 volunteers.

A discipline board, comprised of Jim Manion, Brad Hope and

Graham Dudfield add to the list of minor hockey volunteers.

The parents of the 120 players are asked to volunteer their time to work in the concession, do time-keeping, transporting children to and from the arena and to other towns. Each team has 10 away games and one away tournament.

Volunteers play music during games and act as announcers.

Each team has a sponsor or sponsors, local businesses who donate to the teams to help offset costs of jerseys and equipment. Sponsor donations do not cover the whole cost. PMHA does fundraising because the association spends \$33,000 in ice time.

Each team has 11 home games, two practices a week, and one tournament, for the excellent development program.

Ice officials are another expense to the association.

Fundraising is done during games. Every hamburger, every cup of coffee from the concession stand raises money to cover the cost of operating a minor hockey program.

The first-ever minor hockey office is under construction at the arena now. The executive is looking for donations of furniture for the office. For the first time, the executive will be able to work together from an office, instead of trying to co-ordinate paper work from their homes.

Other expenses to minor hockey are the fees to the other hockey associations. The local club pays \$5,700 to the B.C.

branch and \$2,700 to the regional branch. Licenses, permits and insurance costs \$3,000, and referees cost approximately \$7,000 each season.

The \$18,000 in registration fees falls far short of what is needed.

Why do these dedicated adults continue to spend half their winter months on minor hockey?

"Children today receive little discipline," says Sally Nault, "Hockey is one of the few sports

that teaches discipline as part of the game. Children who play hockey must learn emotional, mental and physical discipline. Players must respect their opponents and discipline themselves."

The adult volunteers devote their time to supporting a disciplined approach to life. Society benefits from citizens trained early in self-discipline. For minor hockey volunteers, the achievement is worth the effort.

## Museum Society Prepares for big year

This year will mark 40 years since the founding of Princeton and District Pioneer Museum and Archives. At the annual general meeting held January 13, members elected the new executive who will take the reins for 1998.

Rosemary Doughty was elected President, with Don Coyle as Vice-President. Bob Ostrosser retains his position as Treasurer, and Evelyn McCallum remains as Secretary. Four directors were elected: Bob Wicks, Roger Stanley, Lorraine Lance, and Kathleen Clement. Margaret Stoneberg continues as Archivist.

Members made a motion thanking Past President Margaret Stoneberg for all her work during the past year.

Fossil bed preservation headed a list of proposed projects for the coming year. The first step is to consult an expert to discuss an assessment of local fossil beds. The second step would be to obtain a grant for the assessment. Grants are available for this work. Members agreed to proceed with the project.

Display of the fossil collection is another major consideration for the museum. Directors will try to determine what kind of display cabinets would be required.

The major project this year is the fortieth anniversary celebration. No specific information is available at this time.

The society received a request from Enowkin Centre to give aboriginal artifacts pertaining to the

Okanagan Nation to that group. Members discussed the collection of aboriginal artifacts now housed in the museum, and the question arose as to whether these artifacts had any significance to the Okanagan Nation.

Gloria Stout advised members that the collection had been purchased from Sam Langford many years ago and it appeared to be of mixed origin. Stout stated there were coast artifacts and prairie artifacts in the collection.

The matter was tabled pending an evaluation of the existing collection.

What do you do if you are 85 years old and you are spending Christmas in Puerto Vallarta?

If your name is Francis Waldron, you go para-sailing.

Waldron is a new Princeton resident. He moved here last year to share a home with his daughter, Rosemary Whittle, son-in-law Mick Whittle, and grandson Robert.

On a family vacation at

Christmas time, Robert and his grandfather decided on a great adventure for Christmas day.

Robert made the arrangements on Christmas Eve. The entire family and many spectators turned out the following day to see Waldron make his maiden voyage in Mexico's skies.

Para-sailing is a recreational activity similar to water skiing. On the beach, Waldron was strapped into a harness attached to

a parachute. When Waldron and his assistants said he was ready to fly, a motor boat with a line attached to Waldron's harness accelerated rapidly. When the line became taut, Waldron's assistants threw him into the air and he sailed out to sea on parachute. Waldron loved it.

"I had a wonderful view of the town, and the harbour."

He felt fine, despite slightly slipping out of the seat.

"It was comparable to the first time I flew solo in a Moth in 1933," Waldron says.

He found the experience exhilarating, and would recommend para-sailing to any senior citizen.

Coming back to earth was tricky. Waldron was told to listen for a whistle, and when he heard it, he was to pull a cord. If he did not do it right, he would land in the sea

instead of on the beach.

His landing went smoothly. The assistants caught him as everyone on the beach applauded.

"Everyone wanted to shake his hand," says Rosemary Whittle,

"Even young people who confessed they were afraid to try."

"I never thought it was a risk," says Waldron.

Would he do it again?

"Oh, yes."

## First Nations Ask for Counsellor

John Chenowith, representing First Nations students in School District #58, appeared before the Board of School Trustees at a public meeting in Princeton on January 14. Chenowith told trustees the need is greatest at the elementary school level. The Merritt area has 340 aboriginal students from Grade 1 to Grade 8.

Chenowith explained that there had been a counsellor for secondary school students last year. This year the emphasis should be switched to younger students.

"If the needs are addressed at an earlier age, we feel that will prevent problems later," Chenowith told the board.

The counsellor would help with crisis intervention and work with other community agencies.

The trustees approved the request for the position up to June 30, 1999. The counselling program will be evaluated at intervals during the term the position is in effect.

## Skaters face tests

The Princeton Figure Skating Club is halfway through the season and skaters are busy preparing for the activities scheduled over the next few weeks. Next weekend, the Snowball Invitational Skating Competition will be held in Oliver. Eight Princeton skaters will be competing over the course of the weekend. 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# DATELINE TULAMEEN: A VISION

Economic futurologists contend upcoming employment will be in the service-tourist industry comprising primarily small business entrepreneurs. This requires, among other things, "imagination and incentive", a lack of which may be caused by excessive observation of items such as TV, videos, etc., producing an "electronic stagnation syndrome".

This is the most important element overlooked in the Skeena Cellulose bail-out, namely, had the bail-out not occurred, the world would collapse.

Similco of Princeton Mining closed here. It hurt just as much but the community received no bail-out, not even used roller blades for our hard-pressed hospital staff, yet life goes on.

We are now shareholders in a pulp mill we hope will succeed. It is doubtful we can hold our breath that long.

Princeton Mining is listed on the Toronto Stock Exchange. Skeena Cellulose is not listed, so it will be extremely difficult to determine its financial health at any given time.

The government which isn't broke but hasn't any money

invested \$200 million plus on our behalf, no doubt from financial sources. Compare the interest of this loan to the \$2400 per day interest made on the \$15 million won recently on 6/49 by a young couple. Our \$200 million loan will cost us \$32,000 per day interest. Just imagine the Keno tickets we could buy.

One wonders if it would have been better to give each laid off employee a lump sum and let them and the pulp mill do their own thing.

It is said the only money-making government enterprise that you and I own is B.C. Hydro. But when Shirley (my wife) and I went to the mail box to collect our dividends, the mail box was bare. We're told that our B.C. Hydro is financing, in part, the \$400 thousand government TV infomercial on our status. It is a mystery that would challenge Sherlock Holmes why our capable, salaried M.L.A. is not allowed to do this. Maybe downsizing is in the works and the M.L.A.s are to be recalled and replaced by Cabinet, "E" mail, the

fax machine, TV, video, and the ouija board.

Unfortunately, there is no evidence this \$400 thousand infomercial expenditure and its like has produced any jobs or alleviated any distress in our, or any other, community.

Rather, logic seems to say this incessant chipping away at the empty public purse will result in a reduction in public sector jobs and services. One might well ask "Is this moral?"

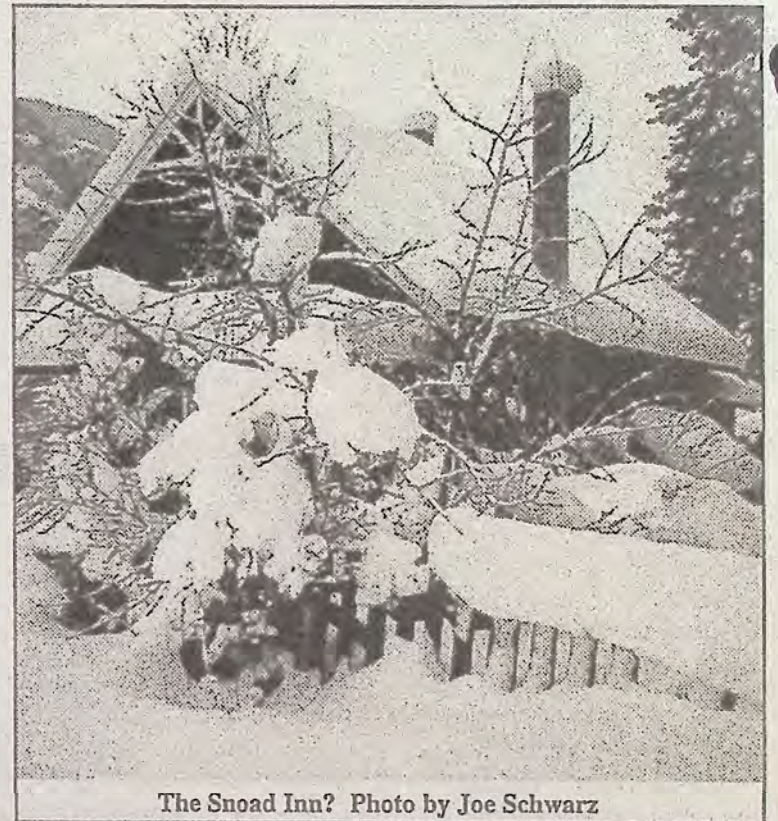
But then, what does one base morality on today?

The obvious, of course, is we have to fend for ourselves, form our own vision, implement a longterm plan in tourism and a possible retirement centre.

In this respect, it is interesting to hear that the very much 'with it' young Governor Gary Lock of our neighbouring Washington State (he's the first Asian-American to hold that office) wishes to implement a program of improving, and bringing on line, streams of salmon stock. This may be an opportunity for

Princeton, together with its Washington sister city, Tonasket, plus other interested organizations, to press for the return of salt water fish and particularly steelhead, to the Similkameen basin and Otter Lake.

As one of our most astute outdoor fish and game residents, Mr. Tom "Wheels" Bihun stated, "It would bring in a whole new exciting industry" which could only enhance much of what we have to build on.

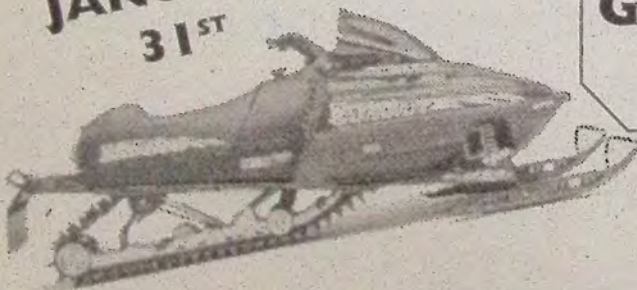

When snowmobilers arrive here, they need services. They need accommodation, meals, and perhaps they may need repairs. We can offer those services.

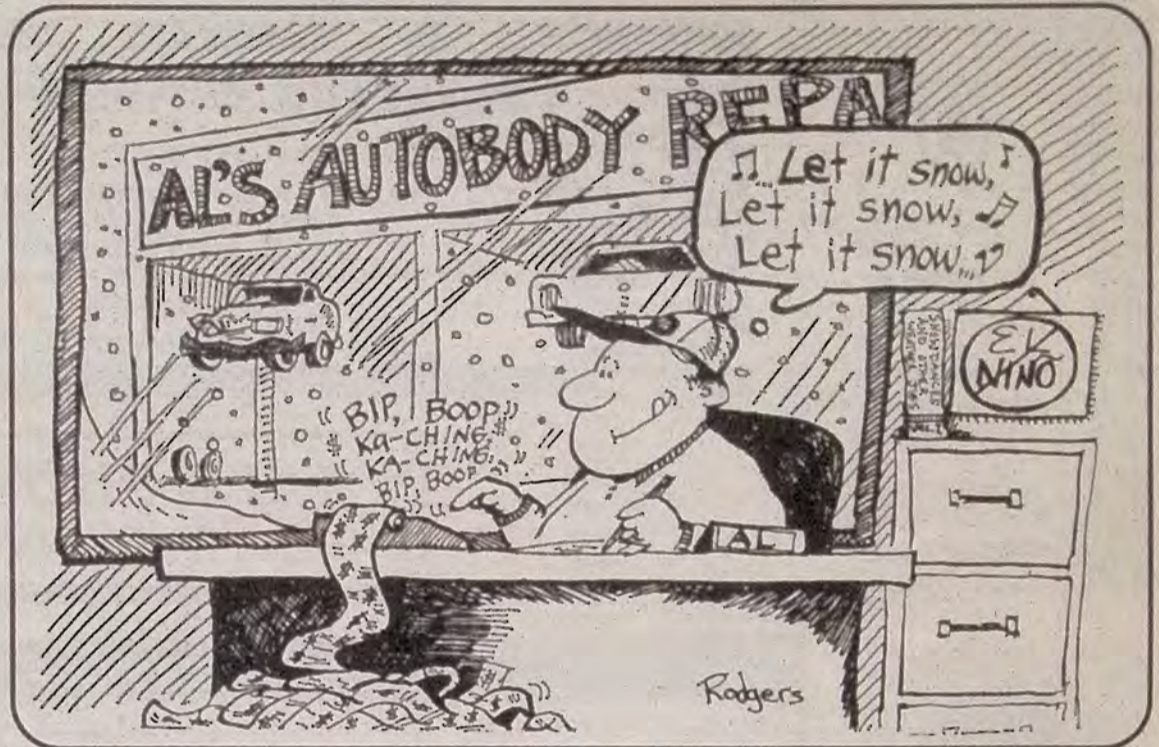

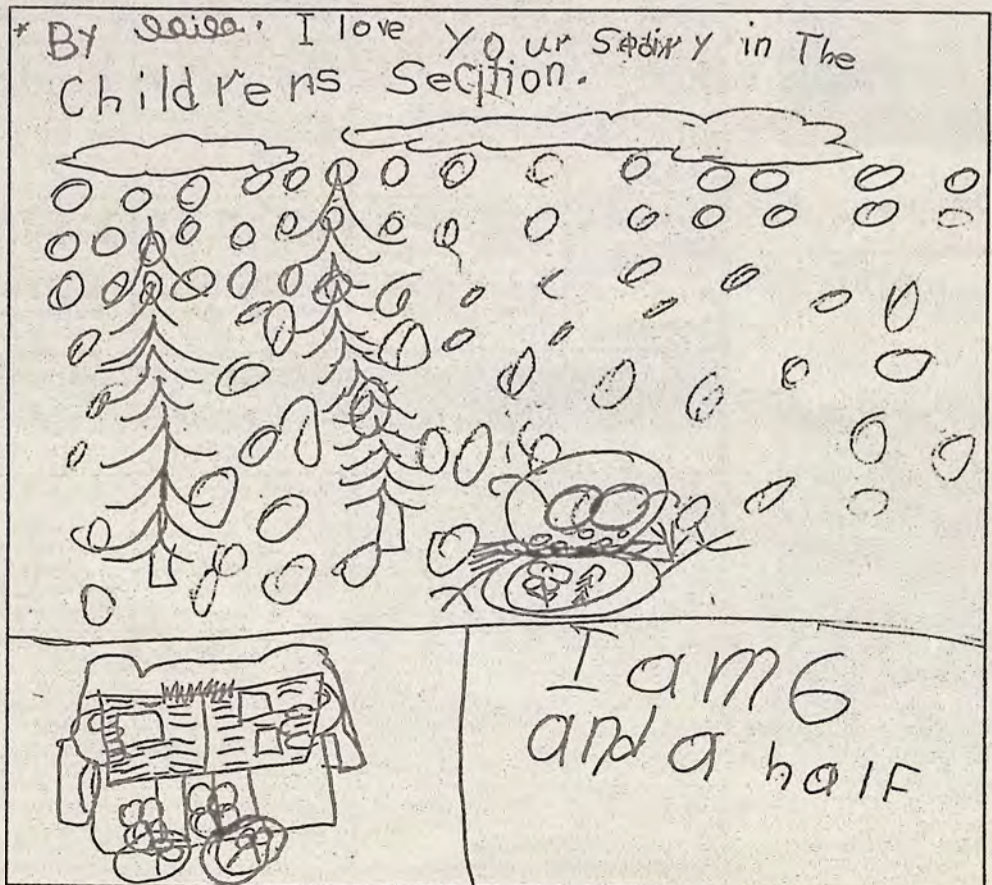
needed to talk to someone quite badly and I am privileged to think that Mary chose me, no matter how far away from Scotland I might be.

Home invasions, rape, murder, assault and kidnapping! Serious violent crimes committed by only the most hardened of criminals, right? Wrong!

## Mushing in a winter wonderland

For centuries, men in the North Countries used dog sledding as a means of survival. Frequently, game would be found several days travel away from their villages, and dog sleds were the most efficient means of transporting several hundred pounds of meat back to their homes.

Most Northern people today do not rely on dog sledding for their livelihood. Dog sledding has, however, become a major winter sport. There are competitions all year long, all over the world, including an annual competition held in Falkland, B.C.

There are 3 classes in dog sled racing - the Sprint, Mid-Distance, and Long Distance race. The sprint class is a short, fast race of under 25 miles, at an average speed of 20 miles per hour. The slower paced Mid-Distance race is usually a distance of between 300 and 500 miles, at an average speed of about 15 miles per hour, depending upon terrain, while the Long Distance races such as the famous "Iditarod" average approximately 1,000 miles. The dog team, numbering from a minimum of 3 dogs to as many as 16 dogs, typically pulls several pounds of weight on a sled, directed by their Musher, usually the owner of the team.

If owning and caring for a virtual pack of dogs is a bit overwhelming, try skijoring, a cross between dog sledding and cross country

skiing. The only equipment required is a harness, towline, skijor belt, and your cross country skis and one good dog that loves to run (some skijorers use up to 4 dogs).

Most competitive dog sledding events include skijoring competitions as well as the traditional racing and weight pulling competitions. The skijoring events range from short runs of about 4 miles to long distance runs covering several days, with over-night check points along the routes.

Although dog sledding and skijoring have been portrayed in some well known works of fiction as activities which promote cruelty to the animals, that is most definitely not the case. It is a sad fact that cruelty and abuse can be found in almost any activity, animal related or not. However, the vast majority of sled dog owners treat their animals with the best of care. They even put booties on the feet of the animals for protection from the snow and cold. They do not beat their animals. Unhappy, abused animals do not work well, either alone or with a team. Most sled dogs appear to be extremely happy animals, who seem to love the work they are asked to do.

Mushing (another name for dog sledding) and skijoring are two winter sports that are rapidly growing in popularity. A perfect place to try skijoring or mushing

is along our own Kettle Valley Railway Rails to Trails route. The snow covered, country terrain is a magical Winter Wonderland. The first mushing lesson: When a Musher wishes to command the team to go, the command is "HIKE" or simply, "GO." The command is NOT "Mush," a misconception promoted by some authors and movie makers.

"I would be highly embarrassed if any of my dogs started running when given a 'MUSH' command," says Paula Pateman, our own local Musher.

Paula has information available about both the sport of dog sledding and skijoring, including how and where to get the necessary equipment, and will help anyone who wishes to get started in the sport. Give her a call at 295-7667.

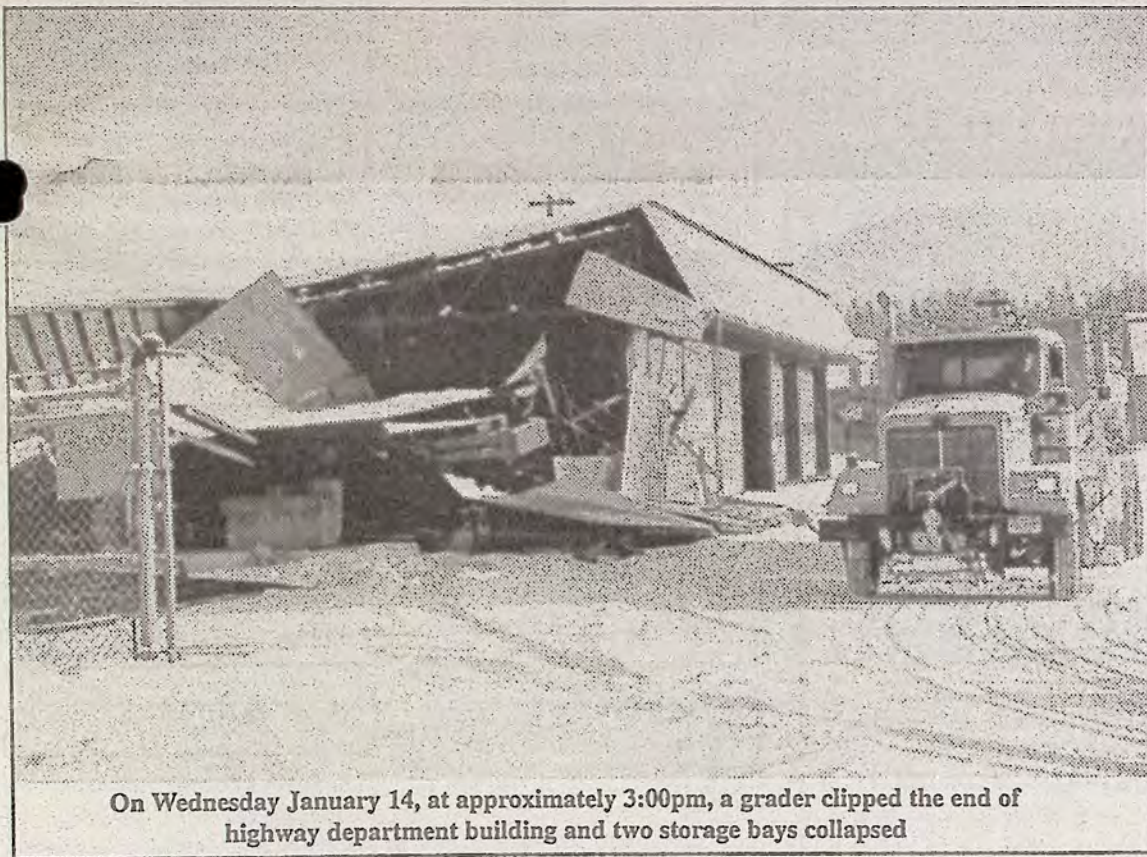

played. Princeton was down by eight at the half and 15 after three quarters. Princeton's coach sent many bench players into the court to give them a fair opportunity to play, and Kelowna pulled away at that point. Kelowna's players were very tall but Princeton played well against them, and out-rebounded them on the game. Clayton Swanson took 12 points, and Tim Gullason and Connor Wicks did some good rebounding.

Princeton put a good overall effort into game three. The bench

played for over half the game and they did an excellent job. Thoran Smart played well off the glass with 13 rebounds. Connor Wicks collected 10 rebounds. Shaun Swanson made 12 points and Dustin Pasco made 16, to lead all scorers. Colin Timms and Dane Lockwood played good games.

Princeton played well overall. They out-rebounded their opponents in all three games. Their defense is much better and will improve as the boys keep down the number of turn-overs.

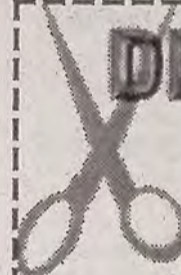
