Search & Rescue Looks for Funding

Search and Rescue groups from Regional District are looking for an assured source of funding from municipalities and Regional District. The groups have submitted a proposal to all of the municipalities and to Regional District requesting that a shared funding formula be developed to sustain the groups.

Search and Rescue groups are volunteers who save lives, but they are not funded by the government. They do receive a fee for service in some situations. For the most part, the group members cover expenses out of their own pockets or donations made by other citizen groups.

Expenses are high, ranging from fuel and insurance for the vehicles to replacement of vehicles and equipment. Locally, many groups have contributed funds to keep Search and Rescue operating.

Highway accidents, and incidents involving people enjoying outdoor recreation, draw on the skills of trained Search and Rescue volunteers, who often risk their own lives in an effort to save the lives of others.

The mission statement of the group reads: "To provide training, education and support to our members and the communities we live in, that will enhance our standard of living while promoting the safe enjoyment of our Region's natural resources."

Training, equipment and readiness cost money. The people who benefit, the community at large, are being asked to cover the costs.

Princeton Search and Rescue is asking for \$5,000 by March 15. Summerland is asking for \$4,000, Oliver requested \$11,700 Keremeos asked for \$10,870, and Penticton has asked for \$12,445.

Man Shoots Cougar to Save Dog

Resident of a home located five kilometers north of Princeton on Highway 5A came out of his front door on the morning of January 22 and saw a cougar trying to kill his dog. The man went into the house, seized his shotgun, and killed the cougar.

The man will not be charged. He reported the kill to Conservation

Officer Al Lay.

Lay says the Wildlife Act allows a member of the public to protect life and property from wildlife, but a person who does kill wildlife must report the kill as soon as possible to the nearest conservation officer. The carcass of the animal remains the property of the Crown.

Al Lay wants people to be aware that cougars and bobcats are close to residential areas at this time of year, following deer.

"They are looking for food, and may take domestic pets," says Lay.

If there is a problem with a cougar or bobcat, Lay would like people to phone him at 295-6343.

Zoning Will Go Public

The public will decide a zoning amendment bylaw for Allison Flats. Proposed Bylaw 706 would change the current zoning for Allison Flats Mini Mart from C1 to C2.

The difference between the two would change the existing zoning for a convenience store to a new zoning allowing other types of stores. A hardware store was the suggestion.

The zoning would affect two lots on Dewdney Street at the corner of Luard Avenue.

Two members of Town Council

were prepared to vote against the bylaw at the January 19 public meeting but Councillor Jim Manion spoke for a positive vote. "I think we should let the people decide what they want," Councillor Manion stated.

The motion against the bylaw was defeated in a split vote.

"Then we will go to a zoning hearing," Mayor Randy McLean told Council.

Residents of Allison Flats will have the opportunity to give their views at the hearing.

Trails Mean Money

The Regional Trails Council met Monday, January 19. Princeton and District Trail Council was represented by Lyle Thomas, who is one of the seven members of the local trails group.

Thomas reports that the regional group is seriously considering the Kettle Valley Railway route for designation as part of the Trans Canada Trail.

Environment, Lands and Parks Minister Cathy McGregor has established a task force to investigate the implications of British Columbia's portion of the Trans Canada Trail.

Trails B.C. is an organization of volunteers responsible for the development of the B.C. portion of the Trans Canada Trail. This group wants "bottom up" participation. In other words, Trails B.C. wants to know what local people want. Trails B.C. wants input from everybody along the route. The province has been divided into regions. Princeton is in the Okanagan Region.

Trails B.C. will assess the region to evaluate route selection and become aware of what is needed on each route.

The Princeton trails group consists of three appointees from the Town of Princeton, three from Area H, and one First Nations representative, who is Philippe Batini. The representatives for the Town are Randy McLean, Jim Manion and Lyle Thomas. The Area H representatives are Linda Allison, Don Moyes, and Peter Jack.

This group is doing a survey of needs and issues to be resolved.

"We want to hear the negative side as well as the positive side," says Thomas, "We need to know the issues."

Thomas says the Trans Canada Trail will be the longest public trail in the world.

"Other countries are watching what we're doing," says Thomas. The official opening of the Trans Canada Trail will be June 21, 2000.

There are potentially good economic spin-offs for communities along the Trans Canada Trail Thomas adds, suggesting campgrounds and other conveniences.

Otter Valley Launches New Year

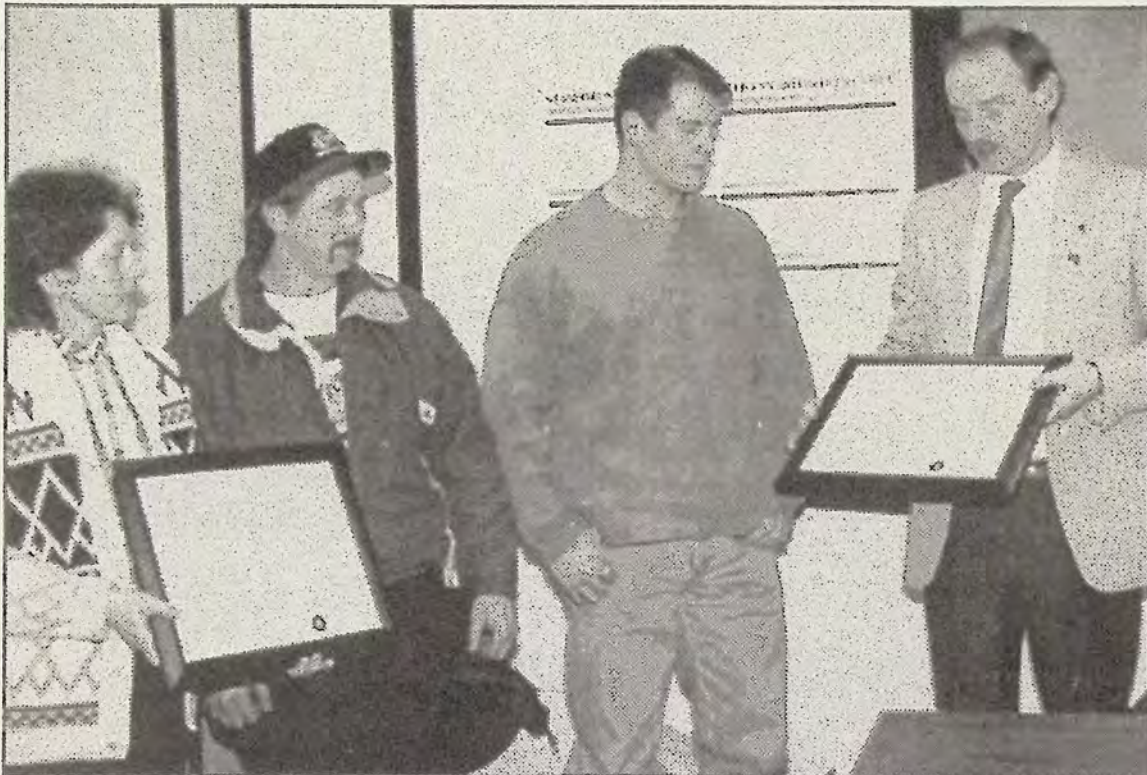
Otter Valley Fish and Game Club began 1998 with an annual general meeting and club dinner on January 17. This was a "first" for holding the event in the club house.

Regional Director Kisses Hero

Jay Noppe received a handshake from Mayor Randy McLean, but Shelby Smith received a kiss from Area H Director Linda Allison, his mother.

Noppe and Smith are heroes, recognized last week with framed Meritorious Certificates from The Most Venerable Order of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem Priory of Canada, whose patron is Queen Elizabeth II. The award is made through the office of the Governor General of Canada.

RCMP Sgt. Tom Payne attended the Princeton Rescue Society meeting on January 20 to give background information outlining why the two local men received the awards.

On July 29, 1997, RCMP and members of the rescue team were called to a single vehicle accident four kilometers east of Princeton on Highway 3. A vehicle was completely submerged in three to four meters of water in the Similkameen River.

One of the occupants of the vehicle had freed himself, but the other remained locked in his seat belt. Noppe and Smith dove repeatedly to free the man from his seat belt and bring him to the surface, risking their lives in an

attempt to save him.

Despite their efforts, and lengthy resuscitation efforts, the man could not be revived.

A vacationing RCMP officer from Nanaimo assisted the two local men. He will be recognized with an award.

The investigating officer at the scene made the recommendation for the awards.

"I'm glad they've been identified and rewarded," Sgt. Payne said.

Mayor Randy McLean told Rescue Society members, "People owe this group a great debt. They have the courage to react in the highest interests of

society. Each of us wonders what we would do if we faced a situation where we had to risk our lives to save another. These people do it as volunteers."

Linda Allison told the group, "I know what you do, and do it without pay. Members risk themselves for others. I want to say how proud I am of you, and how proud I am that one of you is my son."

The two heroes had little to say except "thanks", and the Rescue Society meeting went back to the business of trying to find ways and means to continue doing their work.

Chief Justice Seeks Nominees

Service Society Plan for Future

What will Princeton need from Community Services in 2025? That question is on the planning agenda for the Board of Directors of Princeton and District Community Services Society. As the society enters the 21st century, directors have begun a process to ensure that the needs of the community will be met.

Directors will review the society's constitution and its real estate holdings in an effort to preserve the mission of the society and protect its holdings for the benefit of the community it serves.

The work will take a few weeks. Directors will attempt to secure demographic projections for the next 25 years as part of the planning information. For example, how many of the baby boom generation can be expected to reside in Princeton and district in 2025? The boomers will be in their seventies at that time, and many will require the services now available

to the elderly through programs run by Community Services.

At this time, there is no way of predicting what programs will be funded by government in the future, but society directors want to put a structure in place that will keep society assets under the control of the society so that those in need can be assisted.

Okanagan Nation Seeks Ranching & Rodeo History

The Okanagan Nation, which includes the Similkameen, is engaged in a project for display at the Canadian Museum of Civilization located in Ottawa. Scheduled to open on May 14, the display features ranching and rodeo of the prairies and B.C. plateau country.

John Terbasket was Master of Ceremonies at a community dinner held Thursday, January 22, at the Legion Hall in Keremeos. Sponsored by the Similkameen members of the Okanagan Nation, the dinner was a social event for Valley ranchers and rodeo athletes and a fundraiser for the project.

Terbasket recognized the ranchers of the Similkameen, past and present. He named Qualtiers, Dennis', Allison's, John Cucuwast, Harry Robinson, McGinnis', Skius, and a host of oldtime ranchers and cowboys.

Among those present, he pointed out Bud Sharpe, Stan Thompson, Pat Wright, and head table guests Charlie Montgomery, Kenny McLean, Joey Pierre, and Clarence Snyder.

Hal Williams contributed his grand collection of spurs to a fascinating display of old rodeo photos and saddles. Terbasket pointed out the many roping and broncbusting saddles, and named owners Sharpe, Montgomery, and Manny Squakin.

Terbasket told the gathering that he would like more old photos to add to the growing collection of photos reproduced from snapshots of bygone days. He added that he would like donations of old cowboy boots for the display, which led Princeton's group to seriously consider McLean's boots for immediate giveaway.

Billy Cohen, from Enowkin Centre in Penticton, is project leader. He spoke of the goal of showing 100 to 150 years of success stories of ranching and cowboying in the Okanagan and

Similkameen.

"We hear all these sad stories about residential schools, but there have been hard-working people in this valley for a long time", Cohen said.

"Legends of Our Time" Terbasket expressed some concern that the legend will not be carried forward.

"We're losing our cowboys," he said, "Our young people aren't interested in ranching these days."

Grants Awarded for Grazing Enhancement

The B.C. government will provide an additional \$7 million to support grazing enhancement projects in land-use plans. Agriculture Minister Corky Evans and Forest Minister David Zimhelt made the announcement on January 23.

The grazing enhancement program will add \$1 million per year over seven years from April 1998 to March 31, 2005. Some of these funds will be used for priority projects put on hold this year in the Cariboo, Kamloops and Kootenay regions.

When the Ottawa display is finished, Terbasket hopes that enough memorabilia will have been collected to put in a small museum, with perhaps a local "hall of fame".

Cst. Rae arrested Harvey at that point.

The 55 year old Harvey told Judge H.C. Stansfield that a 17 mile walk to Princeton was his only alternative if he wanted to leave the campground. He had no money at the time, and has a disability.

Judge Stansfield told Harvey, "Police officers have a tough job and the last thing they need is

some guy slapping them in the face."

Judge Stansfield emphasized that society has rules for the protection of everyone, and warned Harvey of the consequences of breaking the rules in the future. Judge Stansfield promised

(1) We can elect toady-free government by adopting the alternate transferable ballot, the alternate voting system. In this way we can always elect governments who represent the support of the majority of the popular vote.

(2) We can own and control our own money system by creating and controlling the volume of our domestic money and not allowing

it to be evaluated by foreigners. All exports and imports should be under the control of the ministry of finance, which would value them and exchange them on a barter basis if necessary.

(3) We should discourage foreign investment in our resources, and satisfy our own needs by employing Canadian citizens with our domestic capital.

As long as international deceit is allowed to set the value of our dollar there isn't any real Canadian money. What we have only rapes our resources and will not make Canadian well-being. It is a miracle we still have as many

resources as those countries who are over-populating our most livable areas and who tell us we must tighten our belts to live by their economic rules.

(4) We should tell the United Nations we will negotiate with other countries as to the creation and drift of poisonous air and to the preservation and use of the ocean's resources. We will also keep our defence forces on our own soil. However, we will not bargain away our sovereignty. What happens domestically in Canada is nobody's business but our own.

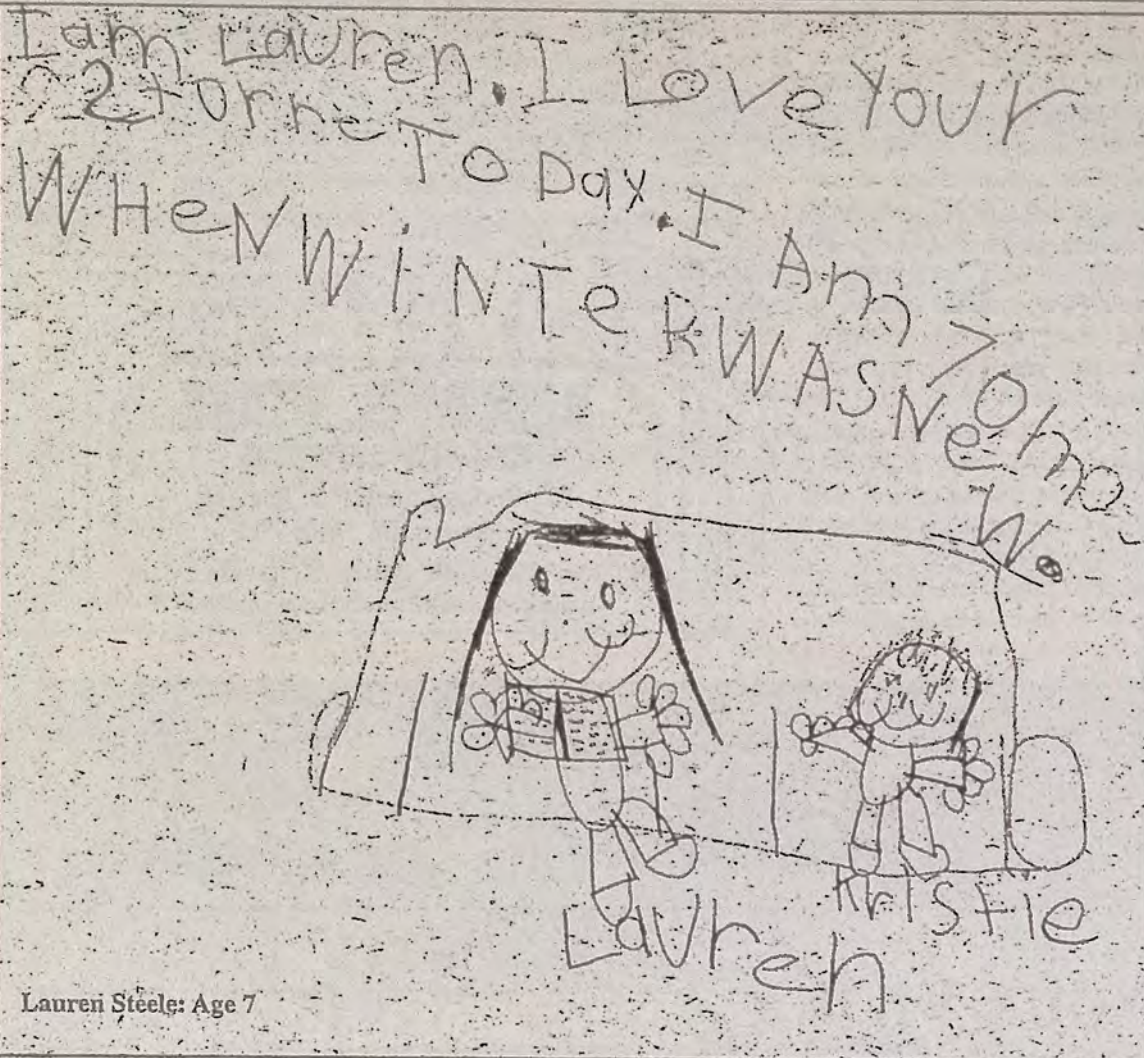

Hunter Makes Big Mistake

Two Surrey residents hunting in the Rock Creek area found themselves in trouble when one of them shot an elk for which neither had a tag.

Steven Partington and Larry Telford were hunting partners. When Partington shot the elk, he believed it was a large buck deer, according to what he told Judge H.C. Stansfield in Provincial Court in Princeton on January 22. Partington had come from Nova Scotia, where there are no elk.

Telford informed Partington immediately that the animal was not a deer. The two had mule deer licenses. They decided to use the meat, and took the animal to a local butcher shop to be processed. The butcher asked to see evidence of a legal kill. When it was not produced, the butcher called the conservation officer.

Charges against Telford were dropped, but Partington was ordered to pay a \$1,200 fine at a rate of \$100 per month.

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Super Bowl continues
to be a hot ticket

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The NFL's big show, the Super Bowl, is much more than just a football game. Super Bowl XXXII takes place Sunday, Jan. 25, at Qualcomm Stadium in Jack Murphy Field in San Diego, but the hype began almost a year ago. Global-TV and its affiliated networks have the Canadian broadcast rights to the game. It also can be seen in many parts of the country on originating U.S. network NBC.

A couple of anniversaries will be celebrated during this year's game. It is the 40th anniversary of Motown Records, and there is a halftime extravaganza planned that features several Motown acts, including Smokey Robinson, the Temptations and Boyz II Men.

It also will be the 10th anniversary of the last time the Super Bowl was played in San Diego. To commemorate the event, NBC analyst Joe Gibbs will be joined by former Washington Redskins quarterback Doug Williams in the opening coin toss at midfield. Gibbs was head coach of the Redskins, whom Williams led to victory in Super Bowl XXII.

According to the league, the Super Bowl means big business to the host city: Estimates range between \$200 million and \$300 million in economic impact - and NBC will earn more than \$1 million for each half-minute of commercial time on this year's telecast. Last year's game was seen in more than 800 million households in 147 countries. In Canada, approximately 1.2 million viewers watched the opening kickoff.

But a Global official says it was the Blues Brothers halftime show - featuring Dan Aykroyd, John Goodman and

ZZ Top - that garnered the biggest audience: More than 1.8 million fans tuned in to the festivities.

The Green Bay Packers are the defending Super Bowl champions. They defeated the New England Patriots, 35-21, last year at the Superdome in New Orleans.

In NHL action this week, the New Jersey Devils travel to the Molson Centre in Montreal Sunday to take on the Canadiens on CBC. The Devils and Canadiens are among the top teams in the league's Eastern Conference.

TSN airs two games this week, as the NHL gears up for its three-week Olympic break beginning Feb. 7: The Edmonton Oilers are in Colorado to play the Avalanche Monday, Jan. 26, and the Canadiens are in Philadelphia to take on the Flyers Thursday, Jan. 29.

CBC's Hockey Night in Canada line-up on Saturday, Jan. 31, features the Phoenix Coyotes at the Toronto Maple Leafs or the Ottawa Senators at Montreal in the first game, followed by the Vancouver Canucks at the Edmonton Oilers.

Every few years someone announces that print is dead.

In the 1980s, personal computers were supposed to create the paperless office. Instead, they allowed people to fill more paper more quickly than ever before.

But there are at least two people who believe in the future of print - and as a result, Hot Type premieres Tuesday, Jan. 27, on CBC Newsworld.

The half-hour program pairs producer Andrew Johnson and host Evan Solomon, who have collaborated for the past four years on Newsworld's FutureWorld.

Hot Type examines every aspect of print culture. While traditional books, newspapers and magazines are the most important components, Hot Type also looks at new forms of print.

"It's kind of a broad mandate," Johnson says. "It's not really a book show. We're looking at writing in whatever form - books, magazines, newspapers, Internet, lyrics, film scripts. In a way, the emphasis is as much on the culture that that writing is about as it is the writing itself."

Solomon is a busy man these days. In addition to his hosting duties on Fu-

tureWorld and Hot Type, he is editor in chief of Shift Magazine, which he co-founded in 1993, and is completing his first novel, Dead Air, due out next fall.

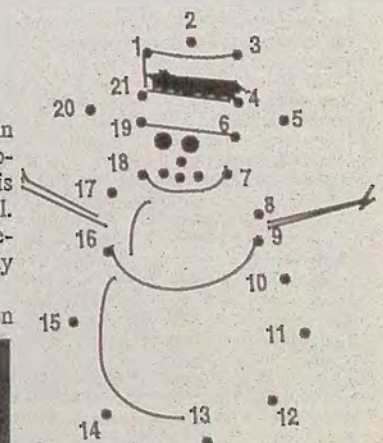
"Juggling that with doing television

is sort of tricky, but with FutureWorld we've managed to use our time efficiently," Johnson says. "With this show we're sort of upping the ante, I would say - I think because it's going to be getting probably a lot more attention from the media."

"The first part (of Hot Type) will be a one-on-one interview, and that's really one of Evan's strengths. He's an intelligent guy; he's got a broad range. He's got a sense of humor as well. He's not afraid to challenge guests."

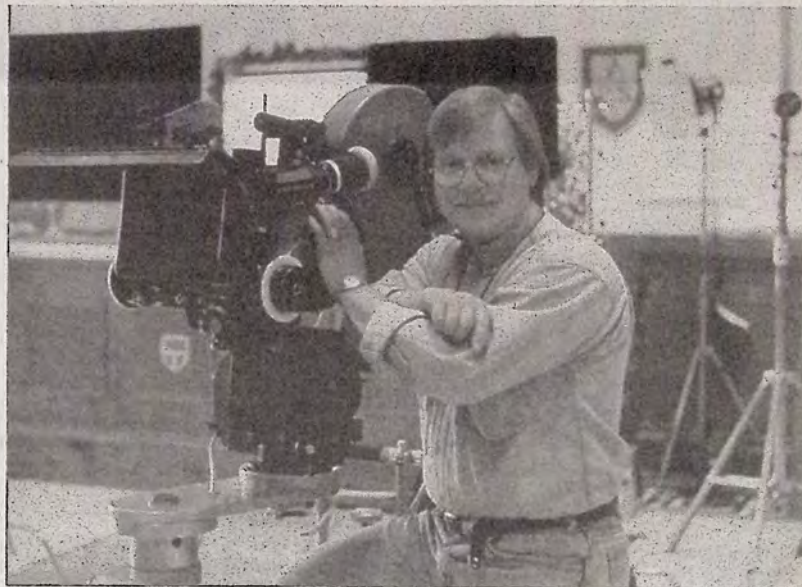

Dad proves father doesn't always know best

What makes a man leave his family? That's a question those left behind often ask for the rest of their lives.

In the documentary *Dad*, airing Wednesday, Jan. 28, on Vision TV, filmmaker Chris Triffo attempts to get his answers directly from the source: his father, Roger.

Roger was far from an ideal father, but he didn't run away for the usual reasons.

In the 1970s, he had a house in the suburbs, a good job and four children. He returned to school to earn a degree, but started using drugs and began a downward spiral.

After moving into a run-down apartment, Roger woke up one morning with an idea on how to improve his living conditions.

"I says to myself, 'Oh, go to jail. I'll hit my mother in the head with a hammer, tell 'em I murdered her and they'll put me in jail,'" he recalls.

Roger's mother, Hilda, survived the attack, and he was found not guilty of attempted murder by reason of insanity.

He spent the next 10 years in an institution, having been diagnosed as a paranoid schizophrenic.

Hilda and Roger have reconciled, but it hasn't been easy for his children.

"We all grew up with questions," Chris explains. "We decided to go over and visit Roger and Hilda."

Unfortunately, Chris doesn't really find many answers. But *Dad* does demonstrate how strong the bonds of family can be. Despite his actions, neither Roger's mother nor his children have walked away from him.

Perhaps the most noticeable difference is the brightness of the different plumages. As a rule, the winter feathers of the different species are rather dull. Offsetting the disappearance of our familiar birds are the northern migrants that have moved south to take their place. Depending on the weather, there may be a few summer birds that overwinter, or the appearance of a rare migrant to our area.

My records show that, over the past 10 years, several species considered "rare" in the Okanagan in winter can be found in fair numbers around Princeton. Spotted Towhees (Rufous-sided Towhee) can be found at feeders, lured out of the heavy cover that they prefer by the need for food. These birds feed heavily on insects during the summer but switch to seeds in the winter. Winter Wrens move into the thick growth along creeks and rivers, away from their normal

habitat of mature forest. They have been known to enter buildings during extreme cold.

Familiar birds like the American Robin remain in small numbers feeding on fruit of the crabapple and mountain ash trees around town. These birds are usually males, and if they survive have the pick of the best nesting territories in the spring before the migrating flocks arrive. Red-wing Blackbirds leave the frozen marshes and form large flocks that frequent feeders as well as the fruit trees. American Goldfinch are being recorded in good number each winter, and this winter are perhaps the most common finch at feeders. Take note of the winter plumage of these birds and watch it change as spring arrives. Pine Siskins have almost disappeared throughout the southern interior this winter, and they may take a few years to increase to their usual numbers. Mixed in with the Goldfinch at feeders may be Common Redpolls, a northern species wintering in our area.

On the ice of the Tulameen and Similkameen Rivers, American Dippers can be observed as they submerge into the icy water in search of small invertebrates and

fish eggs. These birds concentrate along the rivers when the smaller creeks freeze over. Watch the open sections of river for Common Mergansers, the males are one of our most colorful waterfowl.

Several species have a vertical migration. Bohemian Waxwings and Pine Grosbeaks leave their summer range in the sub-alpine zone of the local mountains and move to the valley bottoms. Large flocks of waxwings can be observed feeding on the fruit trees around town. By late February, the fruit is fermented and has an intoxicating effect on the birds that feed on it. Pine Grosbeaks are usually seen in smaller flocks, the drab grey and brown females contrasting vividly with the male's plumage of grey and pink.

When birds concentrate on feeders, their numbers and movement attract predators. Merlins, Sharp-shinned and Cooper's Hawks readily stake out feeders, and pick off any unwary bird. This is nature's way, and any bird taken increases the chance of survival for the hunter.

Another bird to watch for is the Northern Shrike, a songbird with a predatory nature aimed at small birds and mice.

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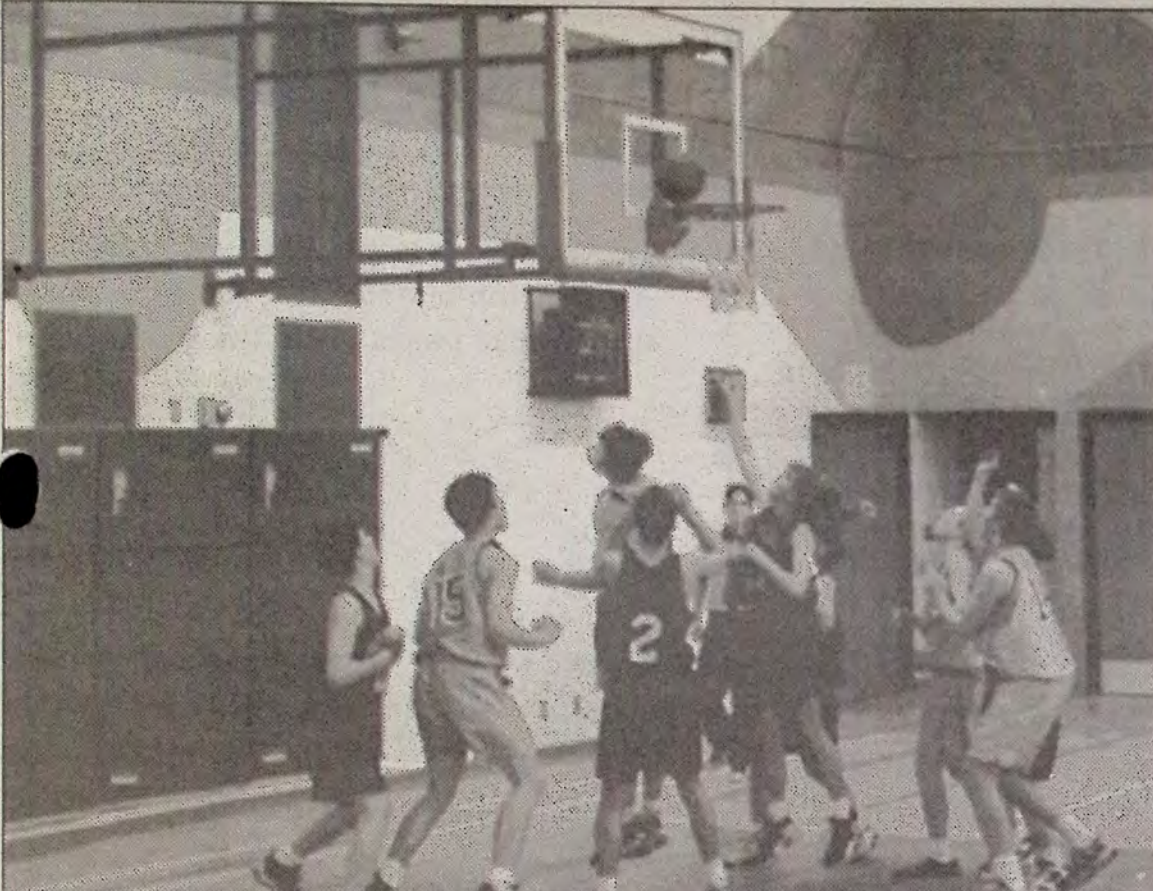
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Princeton Secondary School Junior Boys Basketball team found themselves opposed by a co-ed team during a recent tournament. The other school could not put together an all male team.

Let's Learn About Us First

I rarely criticize our educational system, but I have a real beef with the education I received about our history.

What really burns me is how little I learned about the history of the land in which I live.

One of the reasons for this absence of information about North America is the lack of interest archaeologists showed in North America history. The recent upsurge of activity in archaeological discoveries in North America has revealed an incredibly fascinating history of a continent invaded time and again. The way I see it, my education was geared to keep me ignorant of the history of my own land. At the same time, the European slant to history tended to give me the impression that all things European were somehow more important, and therefore superior, to all things North American.

I have lived in Europe. I know I am not European. I belong to a different culture, shaped by North America, and it is not inferior. Why didn't I learn that in school?

KENNY MCLEAN: A LEGEND OF OUR TIME

Several months ago I was given an assignment by Sherrill Siebert my Editor at Canadian Cowboy to interview and write a piece about Kenny McLean, Canadian and World Champion cowboy who just happen to live in my neck of the woods. I knew that Kenny had made quite an impact on the world of Rodeo for over 15 years but I thought I had better do some research. I called the Western Heritage Centre in Cochrane, Alberta and within an hour my fax machine began to deliver page after page on Kenny McLean's achievements. There is simply not enough room to list them all here but they are summed up in one word: Phenomenal.

Now I was nervous. Being fairly new at this interview game I must admit that when I arrived for my first appointment with Kenny he was not there, he had rushed off to help a neighbour with calving problems, I thankfully retreated home. But when I arrived the second time, Kenny was there, bent over busily shoeing one of his 25 Paint horses.

He had a couple of horseshoe nails poking out of his mouth but that did not stop him from greeting me with a wide and friendly smile. I began to relax, just a bit. Kenny dropped everything and immediately ushered me into his tack room. He quickly cleared me a spot at the table, dusted off my chair and offered me a coffee. Cowboy manners are certainly something to behold and I got the impression that if there had been a mud puddle in my path, Kenny would have thrown his jacket down for me to walk on.

Kenny McLean is an easy guy to get to know. I forgot about trying to control the interview, hardly looked at my list of questions and just sat back and enjoyed myself. A couple of times I found it hard to imagine that this soft spoken man had been such an incredible force in the rodeo world for so many years but one glance at the solid wall of engraved saddles told me otherwise.

He had been born a typical ranch kid. Growing up on the back of a

horse, and like many ranch kids he kicked around a few rodeos in his youth trying his hand at a variety of events. But at the age of 15 Kenny realized the sport of rodeo had just captured his heart. He packed his bags and took on rodeoing full time. That decision changed his life and forever changed the face of Canadian rodeo.

In 1959, his first Pro Rodeo, he captured the first of his five Saddle Bronc Championships. For over 12 years he dominated this event, landing in one of the top three spots year after year. Not content to just be the Saddle Bronc Champ he decided to diversify. He chose Calf Roping, a sport that he had practiced since he was a kid, and Steer Wrestling, something he had never tried. It did not take Kenny long before he was in the top three of these events as well, year after year.

Kenny earned the title of Canadian Champion All Around Cowboy a record 4 times and captured the World Saddle Bronc Title in 1964. In 1974 he was inducted into the B.C. Sports Hall of fame and right on the heels of that honor came the prestigious Order of Canada.

In 1974, under the bright lights and the glitter of the Canadian Rodeo Finals, Kenny McLean rode his last Bronc. When the 8 seconds were up, Kenny walked out of the arena and away from Rodeo for over 10 years. He turned his mind to ranching, working as the cow boss for the Bobtail Ranch in Penticton before moving to Princeton in 1992. Kenny leases facilities along the Five Mile Road at the Exhibition Grounds. It is here that Kenny, wife Paula and daughter Dee raise their Paint horses and teach western riding.

Kenny is an active member of the community, always ready to help out a neighbour or friend in need. He was responsible for bringing in the Senior's Pro Rodeo an event that is enjoyed by many and attracts contestants from all over North America. Through Kenny's kindness a local

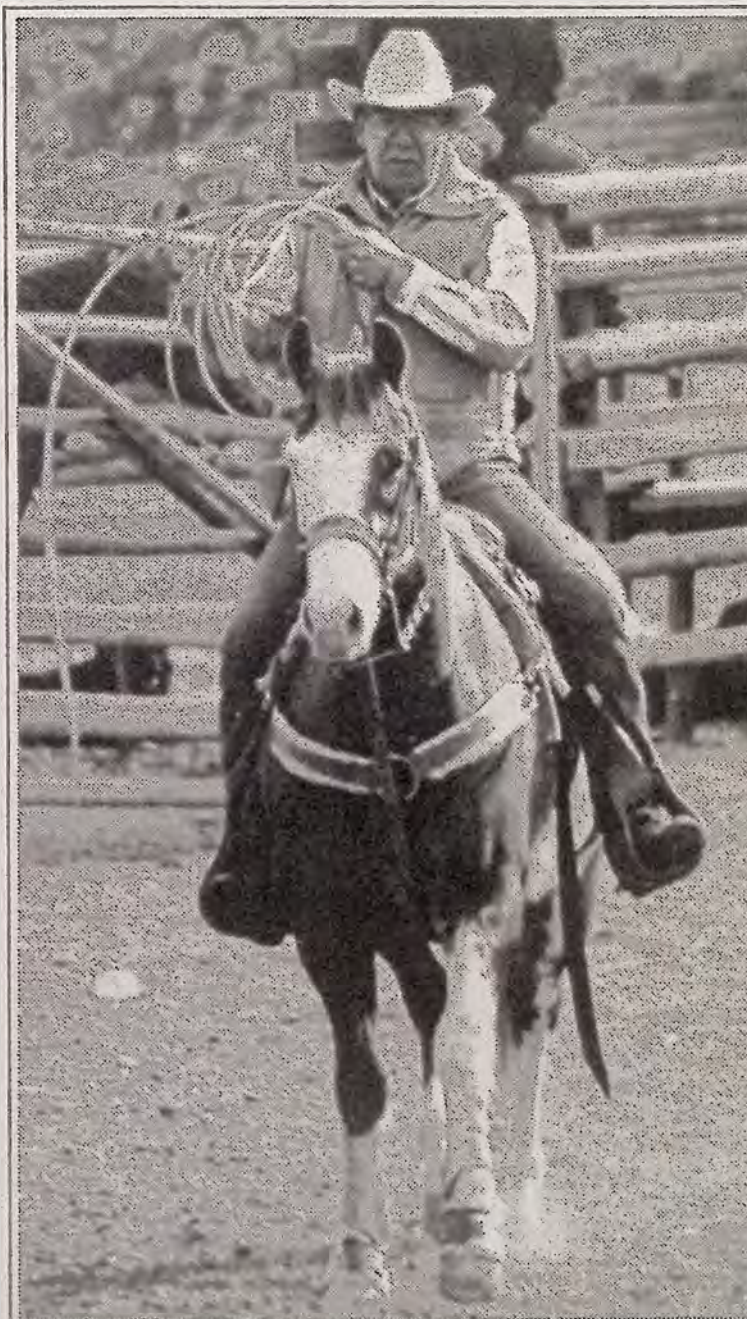
woman injured in a horse riding accident is able to ride weekly at Kenny's indoor arena under his guidance and supervision. He and wife Paula lent their time and encouragement to help increase the local 4-H Horse club. Over 20 youngsters are enrolled and Kenny loves to share his expertise and wisdom.

Kenny has also returned to rodeo, entering an average of 15 rodeos per year along with Paula

and Dee. With Kenny's encouragement there is also quite a contingent of Princeton ropers that travel the summer rodeo circuit.

Kenny McLean spent 15 years establishing himself as a Canadian Rodeo Legend and he literally wrote Canadian Rodeo history. Today, away from the spotlight, Kenny McLean lives a life that he obviously loves, surrounded by kids, horses, cows and good friends.

Kenny and I finally drained the coffee pot that day and he headed back to his horseshoeing and I wandered off home to write my article. At my desk I thought about the man I had just left happily shoeing his horse. For some reason an old phrase popped into my head, "nice guys finish last".

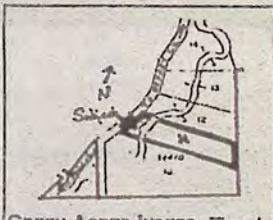
