Norma collected friends the way some people collect treasures. She kept in touch with them through cards, letter, phone calls and visits. Her social life was

Family was another of Norma's great joys. She loved her sisters, her nieces and nephews, and their children. All were important elements of her life. When she married Joe Hilton, she drew his family into her circle.

Needs social worker

Health workers are doing social work, cutting into their formal jobs.

Jan Costa and Lynn Smith, new members of the Community Health Advisory Committee, brought the problem to the January 26 meeting.

Costa and Smith asked the committee to consider hiring a real social worker to deal with people who need transfers to other facilities or needs that are not being met by any other health agency.

Costa, a physiotherapist at Princeton General Hospital, and

Smith, a longterm care assessor with the Public Health branch, find themselves doing social work because there is nobody else available.

"It takes up your time but you can't leave people in the lurch," Costa told the committee.

The problem does not arise when people in care have families, but when the person in care is elderly, with no family, then somebody must assist.

The committee will look into funding for a social worker.

Rotarians reach out to ice storm victims in eastern Canada

Princeton's Rotarians have set aside \$500 of their own funds to help Canadians whose homes were damaged in the ice storm. The storm is being called the worst of the century, and the major need of homeowners is cash for repairs. Homes were damaged by falling trees and frozen plumbing.

Rotarians are asking Princeton residents to contribute a few dollars each to Princeton Ice Storm Relief Fund. Princeton Crisis Assistance, RCMP, Valley First Credit Union and CIBC are involved in the project. The credit union and the bank will accept donations.

People who are unable to go to the bank or credit union may call 295-3751 to have a person pick it up. An RCMP officer or an identifiable Rotary Club member will call before picking up your donation.

Princeton Crisis Assistance will process donations and will mail or deliver a tax benefit receipt upon request.

Princeton Rotarians have notified other Rotary Clubs in their district

to encourage them to begin a similar campaign in their own communities.

Local Rotarians are searching for a small town in eastern Ontario or Quebec as a targetted community toward which Princeton can direct donations. Club members felt that they would like to assist other small-town people. The target community has not yet been identified, but as soon as information is available, it will be published.

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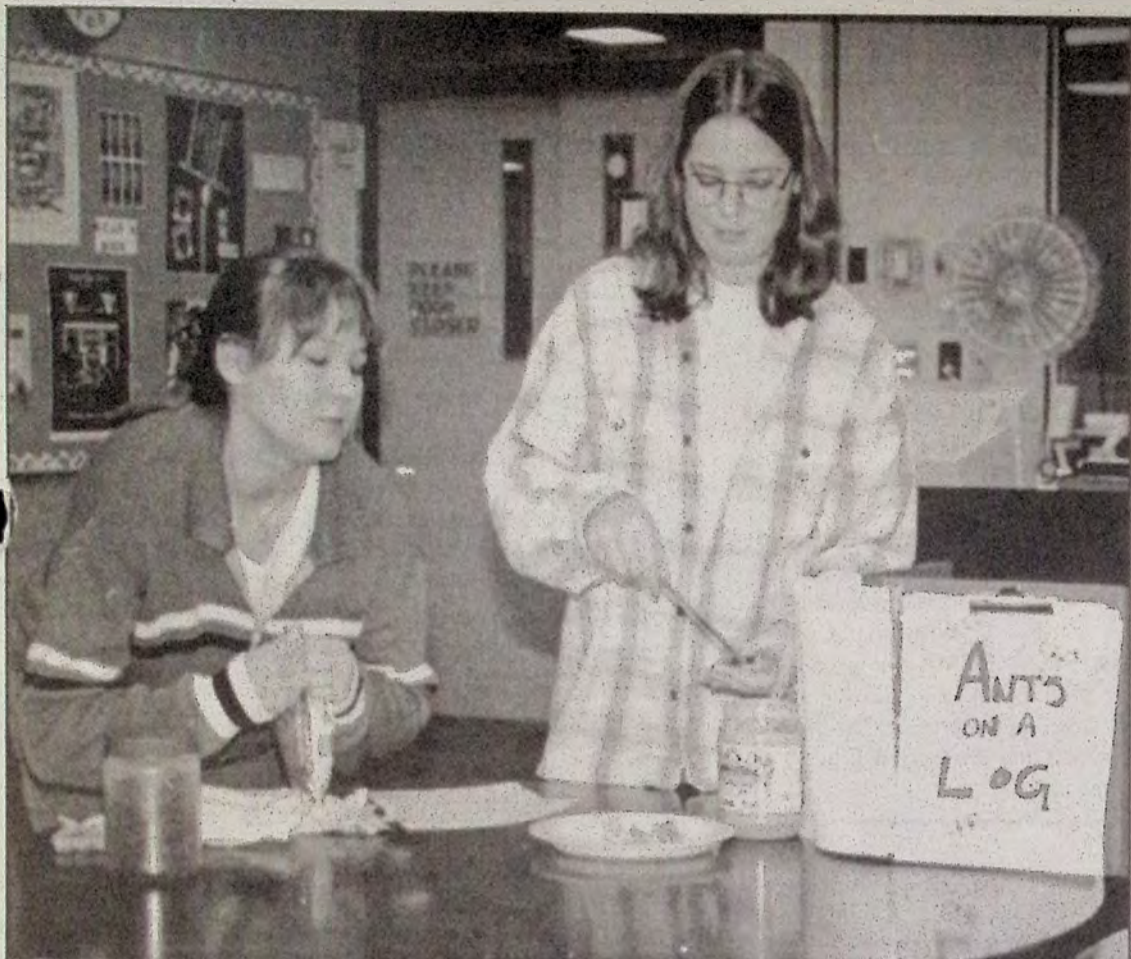

At a recent BC Housing conference, it was obvious Princeton takes front and centre in seniors' housing development. Our sheltered housing project has sparked a great deal of interest in and around the province. To date, we have had requests of "how to" from Lumby, Vernon, Slocan Valley, Victoria, Oliver and Midway. The Village of Midway has set aside property for a seniors' development as they have had an influx of elderly looking to smaller communities for the type of housing we offer here in Princeton. I have been invited to visit Midway and make a presentation on supported housing in March.

As a delegate at the BC Nonprofit Housing Conference in November, I spent much of my time networking and providing information to other delegates. I all returned to our communities and societies with renewed energy knowledge and skills. For us there was pride in what this small community was able to develop. Since the conference we have had many calls for information. At a later date I am considering volunteering my time to work with other societies and communities who are lost in the maze of red tape. My advice to all has been and will be "passion, perseverance, patience and partnership". We certainly continue to praise the generosity and financial support of this community and the Rebekah Housing Society.

The BC Nonprofit Housing

Association has a diverse membership. For example, small "community living" organizations seek to integrate people with special challenges into mainstream society, to large municipal non-profit housing with a range of housing in their portfolios. In between are the hundreds of small and medium size societies managing anywhere for 11 - 500 units of family, seniors and special needs people.

is a critical part of non-profit organizational plans. Fundraising is a challenging task and can be quite daunting if not approached with enthusiasm and consistency.

Here in Princeton we have our own "homegrown solutions" to develop long range plans. We are presently looking to the 2032 and beyond to make sure the generation following will have access to affordable low cost housing to those who will be aging in place.

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Local community needs more care beds

The Community Health Advisory Committee identified the need for more care beds for the elderly as one of the top priority needs for the Princeton area. Despite the construction of Vermilion Court, there are 15 people on the waiting list for Ridgewood Lodge, and two people in Ridgewood Lodge are waiting for a bed in the extended care wing at Princeton General Hospital.

Councillor George Armstrong told the committee that the Ministry of Health has appealed to private enterprise to construct facilities for the elderly, as capital costs cannot be met by the government, but operating costs could be met.

"The Foundation would like to provide money for more beds, but the plans of the past seem to have fallen through," Laurie Currie told the committee.

Dorothy Cobb, Committee Chair, replied that there has been an approval for a feasibility review to see what the need is in Princeton for more longterm care beds. The purpose of the study is to create a practical plan for appropriate care.

"One of the problems we have," said Cobb, is that Ridgewood

Lodge was constructed to meet the needs of people who did not require the higher level of care that is needed now."

Cobb described the situation at Ridgewood Lodge as a much heavier workload than several years ago.

Councillor Kathleen Clement

remarked, "We are becoming a retirement community."

Cobb agreed, pointing out that there are 18 people in Vermilion Court, 21 in Ridgewood, and 10 in extended care. All available facilities are fully utilized.

At this time, the local Health region is 500 beds short for longterm care.

Speaker reviews Peru adventure

Floralie Stewart recounted a hike to Macchu Picchu, the famous Inca ruins of Peru, as she spoke to Princeton Business and Professional Club members at their January 27 meeting.

Stewart told of the customs she had learned about through contact with Peruvians as she and others trekked through the Andes. They camped in tents at night, and chewed coca leaves to help overcome altitude sickness as they crossed the 13,000 foot mountain pass on their way to the ruins.

She displayed photographs of the places and people she saw. The Peruvians were accustomed to

people walking, as Peruvians in the area rarely use motorized transport. They walk and carry everything on their backs. Stewart described a construction project in progress where local people carried all of the construction materials from the train to the construction site, using themselves as beasts of burden.

Many of the Peruvians presented crafts for sale, or demanded payment to have their photographs taken, as a means of earning money. Stewart said she saw many beggars. Peru does not have social welfare programs. People beg as a way of making a living.

Following ancient Incan trails through the Andes is not a common vacation plan, but Stewart said she enjoyed every minute. She displayed some purchases, including an alpaca wool shawl which became the envy of the other women.

Stewart's presentation received a good round of applause.

The remainder of the meeting focused on business, with one special item on the agenda: a committee was appointed to plan the fiftieth anniversary celebration of the club. The anniversary will be in September 1999.

Concert was a hit

The Christian Education Building was filled with music and people on Saturday evening, January 24, for the second performance in this year's concert series. The "Winds of the southern Cross", performers from Australia, began the evening with a lovely rendition of both Canadian and Australian national anthems.

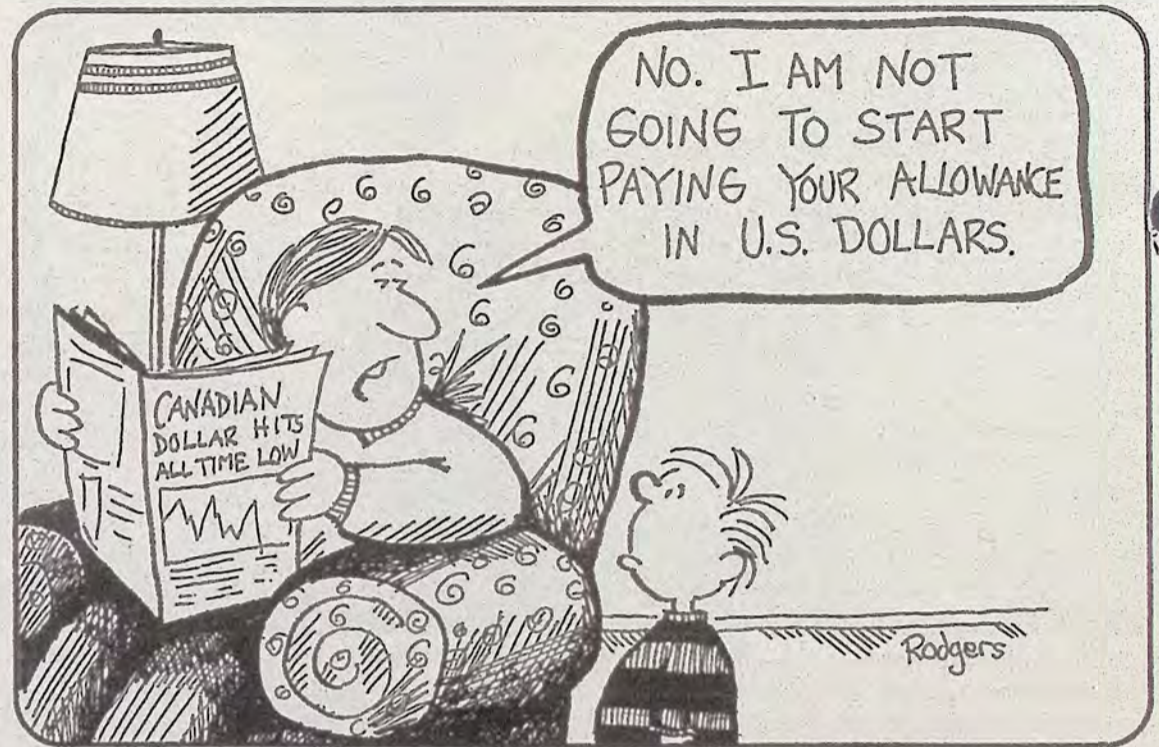

Doctor fears for rural towns

Dear Editor;

I invite your attention to the problem of provision of medical services to northern and isolated communities. This problem is brought to mind by the recent initiative of physicians in Burns Lake, Mackenzie, Ft. St. James, Vanderhoof, and Ft. Nelson to discontinue hospital and on-call services in their respective communities with the exception of coverage for life-threatening emergencies. These communities share medical manpower problems which are much similar to the problems we experience in Princeton:

1. Not enough doctors to do the work. The result is excessive hours of work and long hours on call, leading to physician fatigue.
2. Scant hope of obtaining any help from re-locating physicians or locums because rural practice pays poorly in relation to hours worked. Most of the time on call is spent being available (unpaid). We cannot expect a locum or re-locating physician to work with us if he or she can earn more working an 8-hour day in an urban walk-in clinic.
3. Difficulty in finding physicians who are confident and are capable of handling some of the horrendous problems we must often face on our own. We are only beginning to train rural docs well in Canada - and we are not beginning to replace as many as we lose in a year.

4. Rural physicians are becoming older. Most of us learned on the job. We must expect our ranks to

thin out even further as we get fed up or die off and are not replaced.

5. Difficulty in arranging time off for holiday or for educational objectives - again because there is no replacement available. Our remaining colleagues must further overwork if we are to relax.

6. Serious underfunding of health care. This is not unique to rural areas, but through the incredible folly of regionalization, we find ourselves with the rags and bones that other larger communities have already picked over.

So let us think about solutions. If new physicians are to be encouraged to come to our communities, they must at least expect to earn as well as their urban walk-in colleagues when comparing hours worked. This will take additional money, and the taxpayer must determine whether this is money well spent. The taxpayer is already paying dearly for walk-in services in urban areas where physicians attend all day to problems which rarely need treatment at all. If no funds can be re-directed from this type of thriving urban enterprise, then new money must be found to ensure rural coverage. If we do not recruit new physicians, we can be sure that we will lose the ones we already have - certainly to age, possibly to wear and tear.

Alternative health care workers could be considered. Our own hospital nurses often help considerably after hours to avoid another 3:00 a.m. trip to the hospital by the doc on call. Nurse practition-

ers could do this job as well. Should we expect them to do the same job for less? I wouldn't - certainly not if I had to take all the responsibility. But they would have to call the doctor for serious problems, and the responsibility is again ultimately borne by the physician, and he/she is still on call. Midwives are fortunately already in place, although I doubt that we will see them in rural areas soon. They will be properly paid for their very difficult job - approximately 2-3 times what a physician is paid. Unfortunately, if something goes badly wrong, a physician must be available, so he/she must still be on call. I see no solution here.

We must make do with the rags and bones unless we make our wishes known to our elected representative. Please take time to attend to the manpower problems of northern communities. The physicians there have been forced to take these actions. Most of them have worked under these conditions for many years, and this is, for them, an act of despair and desperation, not a grab for money. The Ministry of Health has the opportunity to do the right thing. Please encourage them, or suggest your own solution. Ms. J. McPhail is the Minister, and her fax number is (250) 387-3696.

We have had a stable medical community in Princeton for many years, and we have been fortunate. This is obviously because we have a unique and attractive

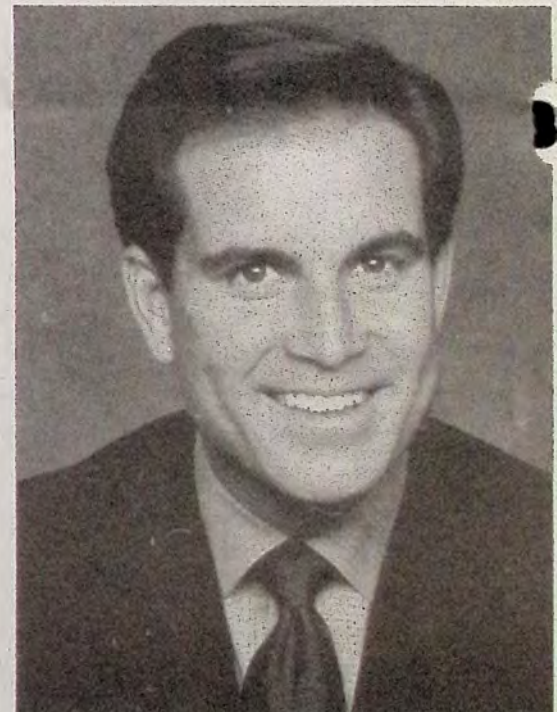

Naturalists quizzed on flora

At their monthly meeting on January 19, local naturalists were challenged to identify samples of local grasses, lichens, mosses, dried blossoms and fossils, and they did not exactly distinguish themselves. Maggie Trehearne led the field by a goodly margin and won first prize. However, the point of the quiz was to prod naturalists into noticing the smaller but quite fascinating forms of life which we generally ignore.

All agreed that the specimens of lichens and grasses had a great beauty which warrants close attention, and resolved to look more closely at the forest floor in the future. Janina Wetselaar and Trish Reid, who arranged the display, encouraged participants to use identification books and magnifying glasses, and to cooperate with each other, so it was a lot of fun. The consensus was that the quiz be repeated yearly. There should be higher score next time round.

On Sunday, January 29, Madelon Schouten led a group of nine on a sixteen kilometer hike along the Kettle Valley Railway grade in the vicinity of Thirsk Lake. The rail bed was flattened by snowmobile traffic and the walking was easy. Tracks of deer, coyotes, and mice were seen but no bodies. Plenty of mountain and black-capped chickadees were sighted, and a Cooper's hawk flew from its roost to upset a small party of red-breasted nuthatches. The group ate lunch around a roaring

fire at Thirsk Lake. The hike was arduous but exhilarating - good at loosening stiff winter muscles.

The next hike planned is for February 7, Saturday, when Trish Reid will lead a walk around Wolfe Lake. This is a level walk, with prospects of seeing pygmy owls, red-tail hawks, and maybe a great horned owl. Meet at the bus station at 10 a.m. and bring a lunch. Advise Trish (295-6002) if you plan to join the hike.

The annual general meeting of the Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists on February 16 will begin with the presentation by Jeff and Sue Turner of their new

film "Birds in Black" which they have prepared for the British Broadcasting Corporation. Their previous films about the Queen Charlotte Ghost Bears and of encounters between bison and wolves in Wood Buffalo National Park were wonderful examples of the art of wildlife photography. Local naturalists are grateful that the Turners, who live in Tulameen, have agreed to give us this preview, and, since the public is invited, the talk and the showing will take place in the Skills Centre on Vermilion Ave. The meeting will take place after the presentation.

Some people need to stay awake

When a person close to you dies, there is not only sorrow and grief to deal with. You have to deal with the business matters associated with that person's life. Often, closing the books on a loved one's life can be a painful reminder of loss. The process may take months, as you sift through estate matters, closing out income tax, dealing with medical insurance, auto insurance, and pension plans. What could be worse than having to do it once? What is worse is to have to keep on doing it, time and again, for the same person.

Imagine a situation in which a loved one has been dead more than a year. One day you pick up your mail, and receive a newsletter from an association to which

the deceased belonged. The irony is this: the association sent condolences when your loved one passed away, but did not change the mailing list!

Renewal notices keep coming for magazines your loved one used to read. You have told these magazines that your loved one died, but they keep sending the notices.

Recently, a person we know received a notice to a deceased loved one to renew driver's license and auto insurance. This may seem routine, but stop and think about it. When a person dies, a death certificate is required to cancel auto insurance and driver's license.

This is a little different from magazines and newsletters. This

is our government. Why don't they change their mailing lists?

This is not the worst story we heard. The worst is the case of a woman who went in, with death certificate, to cancel her loved one's auto insurance, and was told that he would have to appear in person to complete the transaction!

The problem is lack of attention or failure to follow through with what is required. We can make all kinds of excuses for these failures in most cases, but there is a limit to patience.

The other side of the story is a question of what we are paying for. Surely it would not be too difficult to have a person's name deleted from a mailing list?

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Rumblings by Rumpole

So you have been around ranching country long enough to have heard about TEAM ROPING, or you know someone who says he/she is a team roper.....want to know what that means?

Hang in there. It is something to be chewed on.

The rodeo sport of team roping now involves tens of thousands of men and women and young-uns, gathering for the hurry-up and wait of official and unofficial ropings every day of the week, indoors, outdoors, in all kinds of weather. All of this effort is to achieve success (have a "pay day") and win boasting rights in this exacting, frustrating, slow-learning cowboy thing. The pay-window, for 10 cowboys out of some 400 at a typical team roping, can be enough to cover a case of beer and a meal. Sometimes there are grapefruit-size belt buckles to be won!

Cowboys have always done it. On the range, a cowboy would catch a cow, calf, heifer or steer by the horns (or the neck) with his lariat. Cowboy number two would catch that beef by the heels, stretch him out a bit, and then some doctoring, branding, trimming of horns, and the like could be done on an undomesticated 500 to 1200 pound animal. A roper "roped up" made the cowboy's job slightly less dangerous. You can see it done pretty well the same today on any working ranch.

Ranchers, ranch hands, just about anyone connected to a cattle operation, has to do it..... and there will always be bragging rights about the quickest, slickest, neatest roper.

I will not attempt a history of team roping here, just a guiding thought to "what is it?"

Well, with a horse that is "cowy" (doesn't throw you over the rails of the corral at the smell of a cow), some riggin' such as a good head stall (bridle) complete with "ropin' reins", saddle with a good-sized horn, double cinches, a tie down (so your horse doesn't toss back his head and bust your nose), breast collar (so your sad-

dle stays on top of the horse, not on the ground with you in it), a nylon rope custom built for the sport (a bit broken-in, please), and several hundred hours of practice formin' and throwin' a loop, you can START the learning curve to being a team roper.

"But what is it, and would I want to do it?" you ask.

Do you like a lot of time in the saddle (a sore or two), speed of a quarterhorse (none faster!), smellin' of sh__ from helpin' to load the steers in the roping chute, much verbal abuse from them guys that already know how, the guarantee of losing a finger/thumb/skin, the certainty of leavin' your mount at unpredictable occasions?

Well, of course you should want to rope. It's the best few seconds there is.

We are all set. You (the header) are going to nod your head for the release of the steer, catch it at some 30+ miles per hour with your lasso (around both horns, please), dally (wrap your rope around the saddlehorn), turn left real quick, give the other guy on your "team" (the heeler) a good chance to catch that same steer by its two back feet (a good "handle"), face the steer when the heeler has caught..... and you will be striving to do this in 3.9 seconds or so. Took you longer to read this paragraph, I'll bet.

There is another picture.

You (the heeler) are going to chase after the header, being careful to stay clear of his swinging rope, being sure you "haze" (guide) the steer straight, be swinging your rope and building a good loop, turn when the header starts to THINK about turning left, throw your loop just as your horse makes the last step of the left turn, catch BOTH back feet of the steer, dally yourself (avoiding your thumb, finger, or arm inside the dally as a 500 pound animal tightens your rope because your horse dug in to a full stop just about the time the rope left your hand). Real important: avoid the glare of the header because you

only caught one hock (foot) or, egads, missed altogether.

That's the sport of team roping, folks.

A recent ropin' not far from these parts saw 429 teams competing for new Dodge Dually trucks, four horse slant trailers (with living quarters, of course) and \$50,000 in prize money. Cost to enter (we'll not go into laid down expenses such as the horse, the riggin' including four new ropes, your truck and trailer, a good hat, travel costs, etc.) about \$800 per man. Total time at the team roping event: four days. Total time chasing and roping steers: plus or minus three minutes.

But shucks, you make some fine friends and some very fine memories participating in TEAM ROPING.

Another day we can tell you about a greenhorn being introduced to this cowboy sport, the one the rodeo cowboys think of as "tame". Probably is, compared to bulldoggin' or ridin' a bronc or bull.... but that is something else you may have heard about in this cowboy country.

Nice chavin' with yuh. Got a horse to doctor. Maybe while I'm at it, I'll try to learn a few more words of the language of equus. Might help the team ropin'.

SOMETHING SPECIAL CANDLE

SUPPLIES:

- * 5 - Sheets of Honeycomb Beeswax
- * 1 - Sheet of Corrugated Beeswax

- * tea light with wick,
- * glitter & ribbon

INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Using 2 honeycomb sheets cut a 3/4" strip off the long side & roll into a base candle. 2. The strips will form the candle for the tealight cup. Add the remaining 3 sheets of honeycomb. Make sure when rolling bottom is even. 3. Cut the corrugated wax in half (8 3/8). 4. Take one piece of corrugated wax & cut an opening using pattern. 5. Cut your picture, invitation etc. 1/2" larger than the opening cut in your wax. 6. Take the uncut piece of corrugated wax and wrap around the honeycomb candle. Make sure to butt the seam to the honeycomb candle. 7. Position the cut picture onto the cut piece of wax, if necessary warm wax with blow dryer. 8. Glitter your candle and tie a ribbon to the front. 9. Using a strip of wax cut from the honeycomb, wrap around the wick tab. Insert candle into tealight cup. Melt bottom in frying pan to seal and make bottom even.

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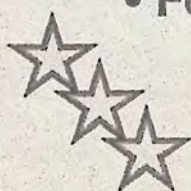

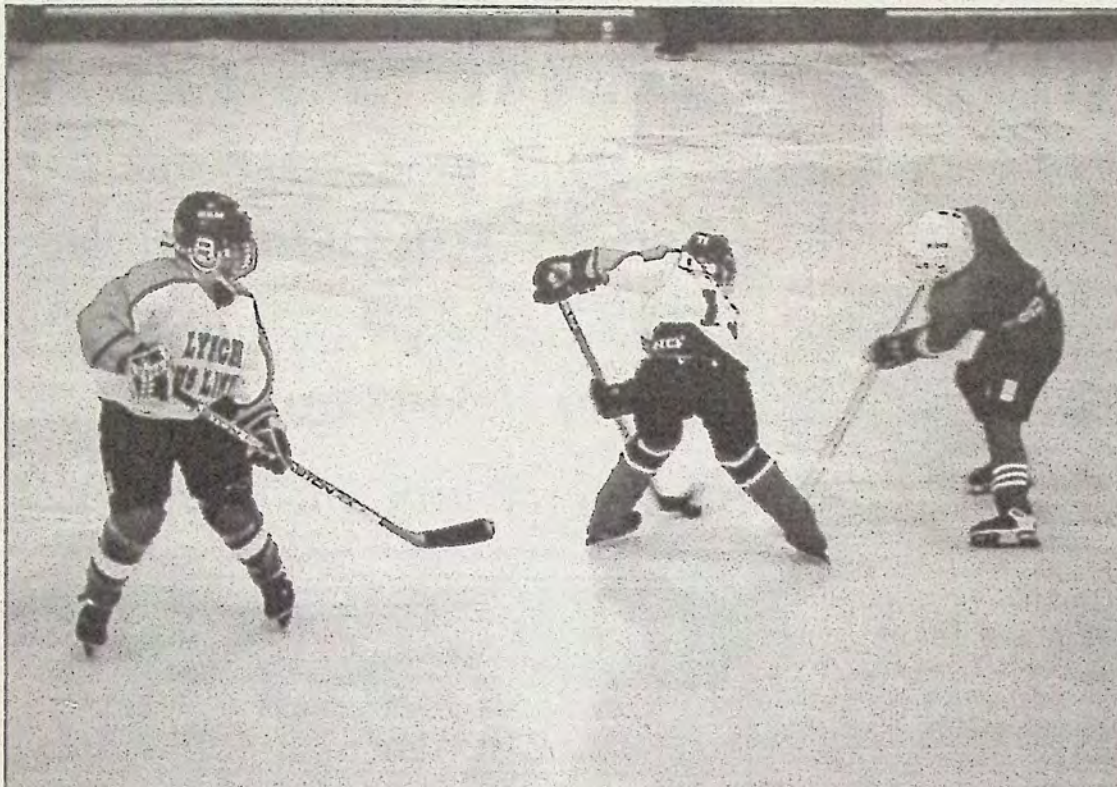
Senior Girls improve overnight

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Poker Run draws big crowd

The Osprey Snowwheelers 4th Annual Poker Run was held Saturday, January 31, under a cloudless sky with temperatures comfortably below the freezing point, making it a perfect day for the event.

Registration, officially scheduled Saturday morning between 8 a.m. and 9 a.m. at 688 Lakesyde Rd, Osprey Lake (Hewitt & Reid Properties), actually began for about 35 local snowmobilers Friday night, with the bulk of registration continuing on Saturday morning until just after 10:00 a.m. before the registration closed with participants numbering 165. Registration cost of \$15 bought lunch and a poker hand, with extra hands available for an additional \$5. The first card was drawn blind from a bucket at registration, which was check point #1. The other four cards were drawn, one each, at the check points along the route. In addition to points where entrants draw

their poker cards, route check points are used as a safety measure. Each Check point is manned by two volunteers who stay at their designated check point until every registered participant is checked off, and if someone misses a check point, event organizers know the area the snowmobiler is in, in order to render aid if necessary.

The 100 km. run followed a circular route beginning eastward across the lake along the CPR Railbed until just west of Thirsk Lake before turning north toward Kathleen Creek, winding around the mountains until reaching Check point #2, below Mt. Kathleen. Check point #3 was found on Trout Main Rd. near Headwaters Lake. Another 33km. brought the snowmobilers to check point #4, Elkhart Lodge, where they enjoyed a lunch of chili and a rest. The final leg of the run was a 30 km. stretch back to the Osprey Lake starting point.

The last groups of Snowwheelers buzzed in to the finish at approximately 4:45 p.m. The four best poker hands won cash prizes and sweatshirts.

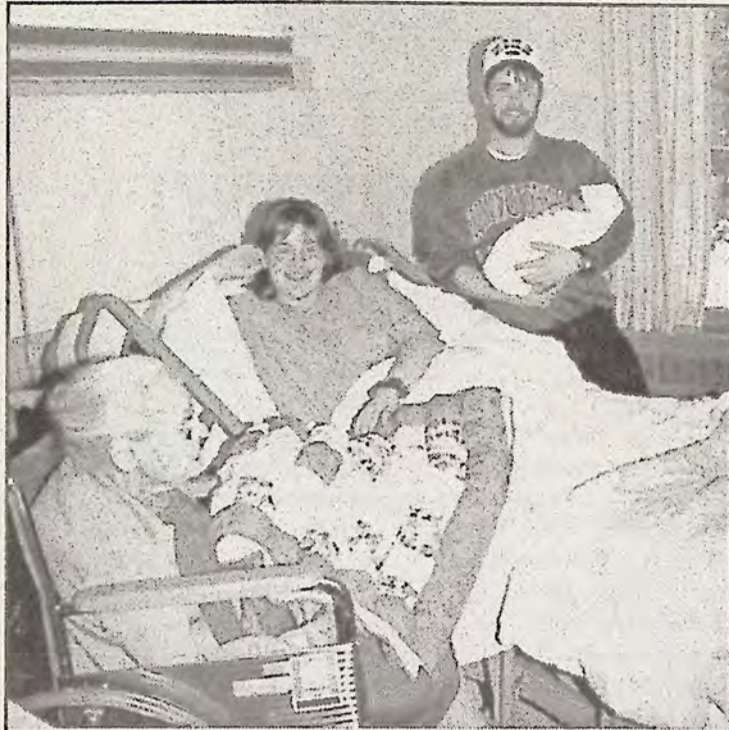

We have an old plaque that Dad gave us when me and the missus finally moved into our own place. It reads:

My camp is yours and yours is mine in all cow country parts.
Treat with respect all womankind, just as you would your sister,
Care for the neighbours' strays you find, and don't call cowboys "Mister".
Shut the pasture gates when passin' through, and taking all in all,
Be just as rough as pleases you, but never mean or small.
Talk straight, shoot straight, never break your word to man nor boss,
Plumb always kill a rattlesnake; don't ride a sore-backed hoss.
It don't take law nor pedigree to live the best you can,
These few is all it takes to be a cowboy and a man.

My boys make fun of that old plaque every once in awhile, but I won't take it down.

My granddaddy and my pa built this country along with a lot of other folks just like them. They had a lot of rules that were an awful lot like that old plaque.

Our family history spans covered wagons to the Mars

explorer, and awhile back I read about some scientists sending a particle of light from one spot to another, just like "Star Trek". All this in one century.

And my wife says if they can put a bunch of men and women in a space station every six months, why can't the men around this house put down the toilet seat?

Birdwatching at Separation Lakes

Separation Lakes are located 7.5 kms. north of Princeton on the Osprey Lake road (Highway 40). The lakes are surrounded by an extensive area of open rangeland. The lakes, and a series of temporary ponds along the road to the east are vital to migrating birds. Many of the waterfowl and shore-bird species that pass through this area each year are found here and nowhere else in the area. The surrounding grasslands and small groves of willow and aspen make this area perhaps the best birding spot Princeton has to offer.

Each spring, well before the ice has melted, the grasslands support a wide variety of songbirds. Western Meadowlarks, American Pipits, and Horned Larks can be found where there are patches of open ground. Say's Phoebe can be observed hawking insects from the willow shrubs to the east of the main lake. Watch the fences and shrubs for Northern Shrikes, a small winter predator common

in this area. During winter months, this area is home to Rough-legged and Red-tailed Hawks as well as Golden Eagles. In late spring and summer watch for Swainson's Hawks.

As spring advances, Merlins (small falcons) can be watched as they prey on the waves of small birds migrating through the open range. With warmer weather, the lakes become ice-free and waterfowl and shorebirds start to arrive. Large flocks of Canada Geese, with the occasional flock of Greater White-fronted Geese, forage on the lakes and grass-covered fields. The open water of the lake supports flocks of American Wigeon, Ruddy Ducks, Mallards, Barrow's Goldeneye, Gadwall, Northern Shoveller, Lesser Scaup, Ring-necked Duck, along with Green-winged, Blue-winged, and Cinnamon Teal. These species may be found in varying numbers throughout the spring and summer months.

Species that visit temporarily are Canvasback, Redhead, Bufflehead, White-winged Scoter, Surf Scoter, Common Goldeneye and Northern Pintail. During spring and fall migration, the lakes host Trumpeter Swan, Tundra Swan and American White Pelican, although the pelicans stay is usually very short.

Along the shoreline and at the southern end of the main lake there is enough mud to attract large numbers of migratory shorebirds. Pectoral, Semipalmated, Western, Least, Baird's and Solitary Sandpipers can be observed at rest and forage before continuing their journeys. Larger cousins of these small shorebirds, Whimbrel and Long-billed Curlew have been recorded at Separation Lakes. In May, 1992, a Black-necked Stilt made a brief visit. This exotic bird probably overshot its nearest nesting range in central Washington State.

In the areas of shallow water,

Red-necked and Wilson's Phalaropes can be watched as they swim in a swirling pattern to stir up food. At the south end of the main lake, although it lacks any emergent vegetation, there is a small colony of nesting Eared Grebes. These birds nest on floating mounds of vegetation pulled from the lake bottom.

In May of 1997, a Great Egret remained at the lake for three days, and at the same time flocks of Black Terns, Common

Nighthawks and Black Swifts could be observed as they fed on emergent insects on and over the water.

The Vermilion Forks Naturalist Club have a sign at the lake explaining the bio-diversity of this special area, and pullouts off the road are being developed. As this is one of the easiest locations to view a wide variety of birds, I recommend it to anyone with even a passing interest.

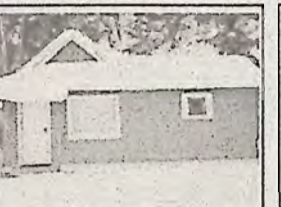

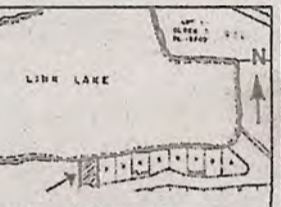
