

Drills strike gold at Aspen Grove

An exploration company drilling near Aspen Grove has found gold. The property, formerly owned by Placer Dome as a potential copper project, has turned into a gold project.

Brian Higgs, President and Chief Executive Officer of Christopher James Gold Corp., told the News Leader that the company will go into a second drill project in May or June. Drillers found gold ore on a claim called Big Kidd. The company has several other claims located in the same area, adjacent to each other, and Higgs says it

may take up to two years to prove up the entire ore body.

This will not be a development project for the company, as it is not in the mine development business, but Higgs feels there is an ore body in the area big enough and rich enough to take to production. In the meantime, his company will continue to map it.

The claims are located just east of Aspen Grove, and west of Kentucky and Alleyne Lakes.

Higgs has a number of concerns about the future of mining in

Value of the drugs seized is estimated at \$18,700 sold at street level. The male and female occupants of the residence will face

charges of possession, production and possession for the purpose of trafficking in restricted substances.

The male occupant of the residence was Travis Oakes, of Calgary, who was wanted on six warrants from Calgary, including being unlawfully at large. He was held in jail in Penticton, where he is scheduled to appear in Provincial Court on March 31.

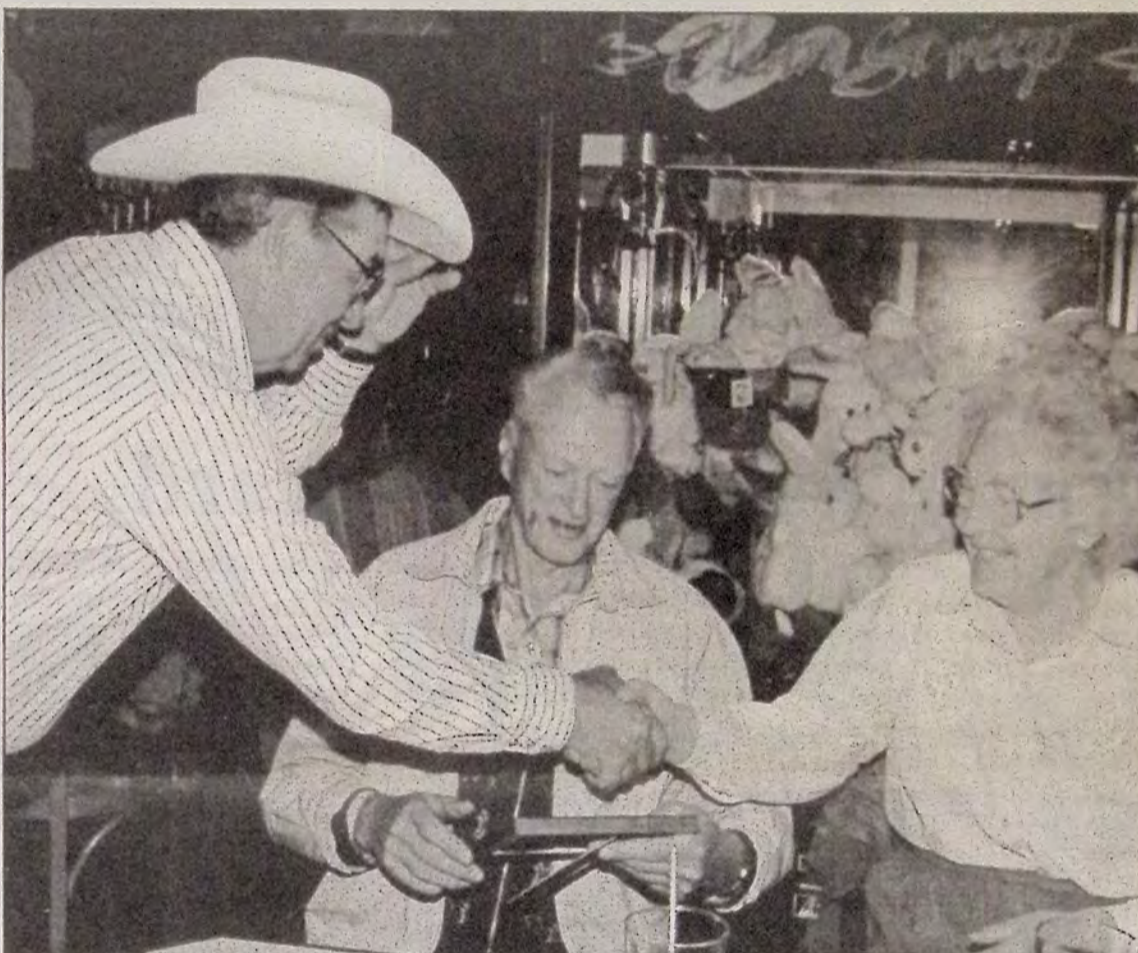
B.C. Lottery says "Sorry"

Family, friends bid farewell at arena

Princeton's arena was the setting for the funeral of a community favourite, Kurt Krenn. The 26 year old man was killed in a car accident on March 20, and the arena was packed with hundreds of people who wished to pay their last respects to Kurt and offer consolation to the family.

Kurt Krenn was an ardent hockey player, one of B.C.'s Best Ever, and the arena was the most appropriate place to say goodbye. His #7 jersey was on display, and will be retired, kept on display at the arena in his memory.

Honourary lead pallbearer was Chad Corsi, who was with Kurt in the accident. Pallbearers were Kurt's dear friends Trevor Ball, Robert Beausoleil, Darryl Clarke, Tyson French, Cory Krenn, Jamie Stewart and Jason Willis. More friends formed an Honour Guard line as the coffin was rolled onto the ice for the memorial service.

The Gentlemen's League will sponsor an annual Kurt Krenn Memorial tournament and the family has requested donations to Princeton Minor Hockey Association in Kurt's memory, as well as to the Hospital Foundation.

Eric Goodfellow was the offi-

cial at the memorial service. The theme of his message to friends and family was to remember Kurt as "not lost, but alive in memory." Goodfellow remarked on the arena as a fitting place for a tribute to Kurt, as "it was a second home to him".

Many of the people at the service were drawn from the logging industry, where Kurt, his brother Richard, and father, Jack, shared the hard work of loggers. Weyerhaeuser Princeton is planting a block of trees at Copper Creek, and is giving the Krenn family a variety of trees to plant in Kurt's memory.

Perhaps the most poignant statement followed a listing of Kurt's many interests, activities, and family ties.

Goodfellow commented that Kurt lived his life with zest and enthusiasm.

"In his brief years, he has lived a long life."

Fair plans move forward

New cupboards will be constructed in one of the Fall Fair buildings, Ray Huey told the Fair Board. President Huey outlined the improvements in storage space needed for items such as prize ribbons, trophies and paperwork. The cupboard will be rodent-proof.

Horse and wagon rides at the fair were discussed. The members would like to see some kind of rides for young and old.

A committee will look into a new policy for vendors and commercial rides.

An extremely low grant, received last year, was sent back to the B.C. Fairs Association with a request for an explanation as to why the grant was so small. It was

less than \$100, compared with the usual grant of over \$1,000. The fair was judged and received a good evaluation. President Huey asked what members would like to do, as no reply had been received to the Fair Board's letter.

One member suggested sending another letter telling B.C. Fairs Association to apply the returned cheque to the \$110 cost of the B.C. Fairs Association membership fee. This action was approved.

The next meeting will be held April 23 at Town Hall.

Peace bond

Blaine Allan Maclean appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on March 19 and agreed to a one year peace bond with a \$500 surety resulting from an incident in his home on January 3. Maclean had become "physical" and RCMP were called to the scene. Maclean was placed under a doctor's care, and maintaining his medication is part of his probationary conditions.

B.C., even though he believes a viable ore body had been discovered. He feels mining is "dead" in the present political climate, despite B.C.'s rich ore resources.

He said the Delgamuuk decision gives companies some concerns, as the question of who to deal with about land matters is so uncertain. He has no problem in dealing with First Nations people, and speaks highly of Chief Gordon Antoine of the Coldwater

Band. However, he would like to see some clarity in the situation so Crown land questions could be settled and companies could go forward with plans.

The company has drilled in other locations further north and east, and has made some interesting discoveries in copper, silver, and zinc, but Higgs says they are not economically viable at this point due to low metals prices.

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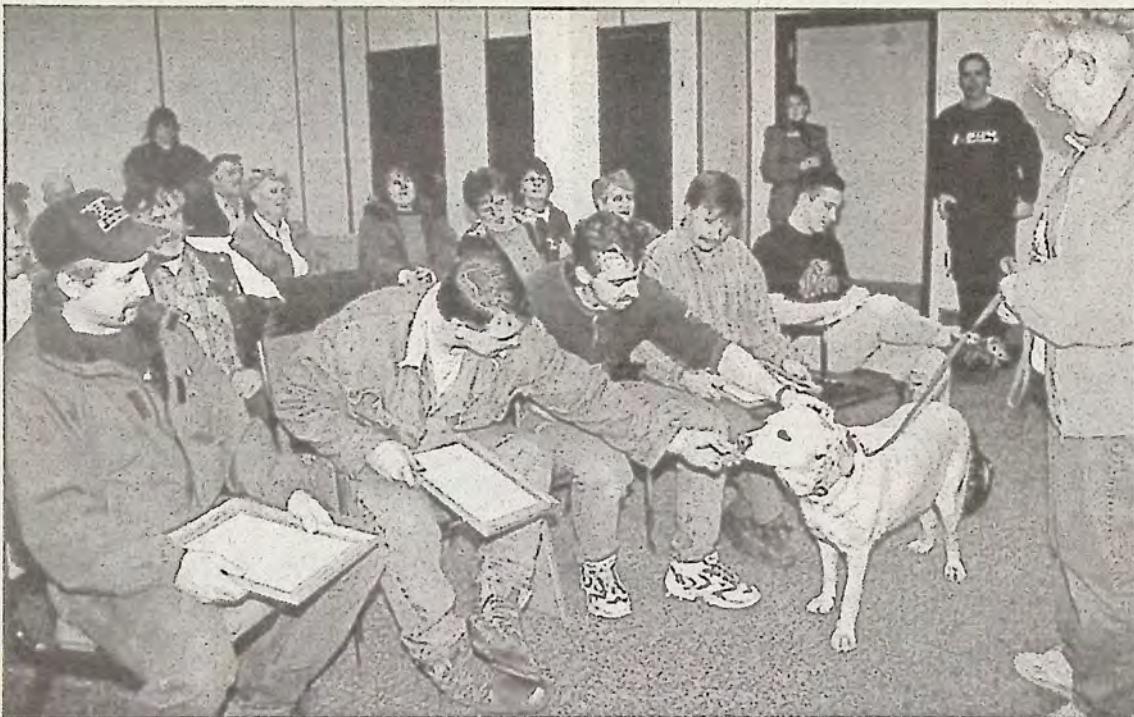

A fatal accident on December 20, 1997, left a dog seriously injured and without a home.

"It would have probably been put down if it wasn't for the rescue crew," said Cst. Gilles Gosselin.

Princeton's rescue team that day was Dave Hanik, Lloyd Allen, Nick Goreas and Shelby Smith. They took the dog from the wreckage, transported it to Merritt to a veterinarian for treatment. The dog, named Piper, is a large tan Labrador retriever. In the accident, the dog sustained a severe cut across the neck, and was bruised everywhere. When the dog was well, a home was found for it.

On March 26, Piper greeted Princeton's rescue crew at the hospital board room, where crew members returned the greeting with equal enthusiasm.

The kitchen area makes work easier and more efficient, with new tile floors and new equipment.

The biggest reason, for Sandy and Gina was, "We wanted to make it more Greek."

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- *1 - 2 - 2/4" clay pot
- *1 - 1/4" pink pom pom (nose)
- *2 - 1" white pom poms (cheeks)
- *2 - primitive hearts (carrots)
- *2 - scalloped hearts (carrot tops)
- *2 - wiggly eyes

White fun foam, rubber bands, raffia, permanent marker, mod podge, jump rings and paint.

INSTRUCTIONS:
Drill a hole for the jump rings in the top of the primitive hearts and each end of the scalloped hearts. Paint: carrot tops - green; carrots - orange; clay pot - white. When dry, seal with mod podge. Glue on white pom pom cheeks, pink pom pom nose & the eyes. Cut the ears from fun foam & paint inner ears pink. When dry, glue the base of the ears and fold. Hold in place with rubber bands. Set aside. With permanent marker draw detail lines on the carrot & top. Attach the carrot & carrot tops together with jump rings. Bundle 4 to 6 long strands of raffia, fold in half & insert through the hole at the dip of the carrot top. Place one carrot hanging 6" & the other 4" below the pot. Tie the strands together. Pull ends of strands through the hole in the clay pot, tie into a bow. Glue ears in the hole of the pot. Glue raffia bow at the base of the ears. Knot ends of two 14" strands of raffia. Glue knot to the pot behind the ears.

It is time for truth

Recent events in Oliver, B.C., in which a so-called "free speech" forum masked the real purpose of white supremacist groups, require that we remind ourselves of basic principles of decent human relations.

Free speech is part of freedom. Freedom does not mean doing as you damned well please, it means taking a responsible role as a citizen. Those who do not handle freedom well are candidates for jail, asylums, or other supervised living arrangements. Those who abuse freedom lose their freedom.

Respect for the freedom of others is not part of the hate group agenda. They want us to respect their freedom to speak but they will not respect our freedom to be who we are.

We commend the people of Oliver for the way they spoke out against the so-called "free speech" group. Hate groups are not welcome in Oliver. Oliver said it freely and clearly.

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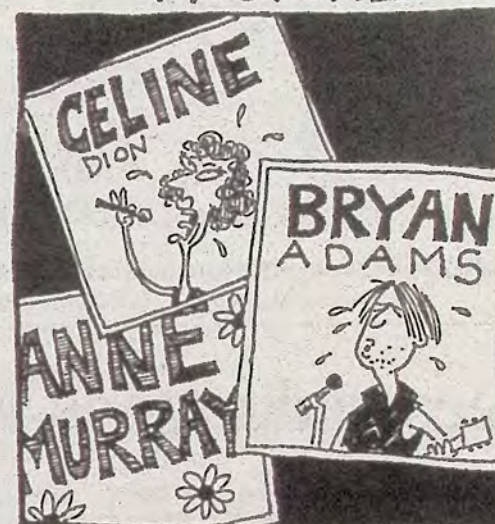

Doctor changes mind about action

Dear Editor;

After very considerable reflection, I have personally decided to continue with normal hospital and emergency coverage for those days that I am on call.

The reasons for my decision are as follows:

- 1) The inherent risk to patients' welfare involved in any restriction of services.
- 2) The lack of commitment and urgency displayed by administration and government in finding a solution to our physician overwork and burnout. I personally have phone Harry Lali's Victoria office on five separate occasions to seek support. Mr. Lali, our local M.L.A. has not found time to return any of my calls.

It is apparent the provincial government is prepared to 'sit out' this physician manpower crisis. This may well result in tragedy!

3) I have found the prospect of taking restrictive actions on April 1 to be extremely stressful. The actuality, I fear, would make my daily life as a caring family physician intolerable.

4) I have spoken to several of the physicians in the north of B.C. who foresee the possibility of leaving their communities! Princeton is my home and I have no intention of leaving. I do need to preserve my physical, mental and spiritual health.

The actions taken by the northern doctors was initiated in good faith and out of desperation. However, many weeks have passed, fortunately without serious incident or fatality. It is not beneficial, I feel, to continue with a dangerous stalemate, par-

ticularly when dealing with an authoritarian government which has no concept of the degree of overwork, tiredness and frustration of rural physicians.

I would like to make it very clear that I respect the views of the other physicians in town who feel these extreme measures are necessary, in the short term, in order to maintain a viable physician service in the future. I initially shared that view, but, for the reasons stated, have come to change my mind.

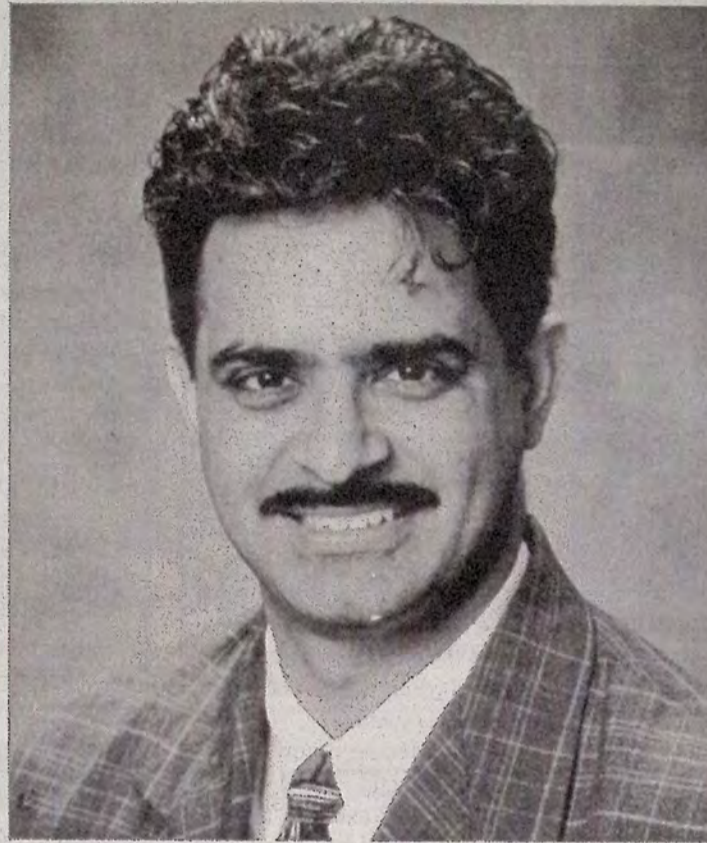
I will continue to do everything I can to support my colleagues by attempting to exert political pressure. I encourage your readers to do the same.

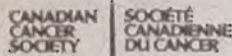

Firing Ranges are safe

Carlos Smith, President of Princeton Rifle and Revolver Club, says that safety at existing firing ranges is not an issue. He is responding to the request by Princeton Fish and Game Club for a firing range on the surface of the tailings dam. The rifle club operates a range at the bottom of the tailings dam, and uses the tailings as a backdrop to the target area. The bullets are embedded harmlessly in the tailings.

The Rifle and Revolver Club has operated the local firing ranges for approximately 30 years. One range is indoors, in the old fire

hall. The other is along Copper Mountain Road. In the many years of operation, there has not been any accidental injury connected with either range.

"We teach safe handling of firearms," Smith says.

Both ranges were recently inspected by an RCMP officer, and both ranges passed inspection as both met all of the standards required by government for shooting ranges. A barricade will be erected at the top of the tailings area to prevent people driving too close to the edge, which will add to the safety.

Travel broadens ones perspective on how others live and gives a chance to learn from them. This is certainly true of the vast violet flowered Coachella desert valley bordered by high snow capped mountains. It is located 100 miles south of LA in the very rich state of California where population surpasses that of Canada. The valley compliments the Similkameen by its contrasts. It is so very different with temperatures in the 80's, that's what made it so interesting to us. There are perhaps 10 small cities like islands in the desert connected by four lane highways with most services underground and home to many snowbirds from around the world. The most famous of these cities is Palm Springs, which has many streets named after movie stars eg Bob Hope Dr., Buddy Rogers Rd., Gene Autry Trail etc. Our city of approximately 42,000 was Indio, its streets named after US Presidents. Most of the neighborhoods in these cities were also like islands with 4'-6' walls around them with security gate and security patrolled. Primarily for security and blowing dust. They could vary in size from that of Tulameen to that of Princeton. Some might be RV oriented and many are time share like ours was or simply private homes or con-

dos or a mix of all. Generally the community has a name and includes several swimming pools, fountains, pools with ducks or birds, a golf course and other amenities. It would be impossible to describe the lush blaze of color of shrubs, flowers etc among palm trees bordered by exquisitely manicured lawns. These are kept up by Hispanic people who number about 52% of the population.

There are 90 golf courses in the valley whose fees range from \$65 per person to \$150. Courses such as P.G.A., Jack Nicklaus are \$250 but are something to see. We had a reputation as an extraordinarily devoted producer and held the title of 14 on a par three hole.

Literally everything was growing: oranges, dates, or heaps of carrots for the polo or competitive miniature horses.

One thing we saw stands out: a polo field. Perfectly flat and groomed, it seemed to go on forever.

If you and your sweetie like to exercise, and cutting grass is your thing, you'd be in paradise forever.

On January 11, under sunny skies, but with bitter cold, Princeton was included in the annual Southern Interior Swan and Eagle Count. Each January over the last four years my wife and I have conducted swan and eagle surveys throughout the local area. From Allison Lake to the north, Otter Lake to the west, and the Similkameen Valley from Stirling Creek to Whipsaw Creek, swans and eagles are recorded.

Over the years, depending on the weather, some of the local lakes have remained partially ice-free and with open water available waterfowl will remain as long as there is food. Over two winters, the north end of Laird Lake sheltered a single Trumpeter Swan, the most common species to winter in the southern Interior.

Until only a few weeks before this year's count, Otter Lake had a good sized flock of these large white waterfowl, however, with the onset of freezing temperatures, the lake had only a few small patches of open water on count day. Laird Lake, although it had a large patch of open water, produced no swans.

The Tulameen Valley had the largest number of Bald Eagles on count day. Six adults and one immature were observed perched along the north side of the valley,

probably to take advantage of whatever warmth the sun could give. These birds may also be concentrated along the Tulameen River to feed on Mountain Whitefish, by contrast the Similkameen Valley had only one adult.

Ranchlands are also a good location for Bald Eagles. Here, these birds are drawn to dead cattle. The areas checked produced three adults and one immature Bald Eagle, and as a bonus, one adult and one immature Golden Eagle. Golden Eagles are year-round residents in our area, and although they will scavenge, they are very adept at catching prey on the open rangeland.

As Bald Eagles are scavengers, no count would be complete without a visit to the town dump. When we first drove into the compound, only the large flock of Common Ravens could be seen. However, by carefully scanning the trees around the dump, we located three adult and two immature Bald Eagles. It is amazing just how well these large birds blend into the snow-capped branches of the trees.

Preliminary figures from the count co-ordinator in Kamloops indicated approximately 400 trumpeter swans, 40 tundra

swans, and well over 100 eagles. There were also large numbers of other raptors (birds of prey) recorded. This was the highest tally of eagles in our area, and the numbers look very encouraging, even if we seldom have swans to add to the total.

Family history group looks at Year 2000 book project for Princeton

Year 2000 is the deadline set for publication of Princeton family history book.

At the March 25 meeting, the group met with John Neufeld of Friesens, a publishing company specializing in family and community history books.

Neufeld showed a kit and a number of books done by Friesens. Most of the books were hard cover, but soft cover books are done, too. The group examined the books, found them to be of good quality, and noted the layout is similar to an encyclopaedia. Family names are given in alphabetical order in family histories, while community histories may include a time line and alphabetical listings of the names of residents.

Friesens assists groups every step of the way, but there is no question that compiling the information is a huge job for the local group.

Neufeld quoted a cost of \$38.88 per book for 1500 copies of a 500 word book, for a total of \$51,986. There are promotional items for sale, as well as advanced sales to earn the money to pay for the books.

The family history project seems ambitious, but the group believes that an area that has been settled as long as our area deserves some kind of record of the families who lived here.

El Nino winter warmer

Winter really did occur this year along Highway 40 and the Three Lakes area, but only just barely.

The first frost of the season was recorded the morning of Friday, September 19. Rainy days followed for the next two weeks, with the odd sunny break. October 6 dawned clear and cold - minus 3 and heavy frost. With clear skies, the first new snow of the season was visible on the Three Brothers Mountains.

Another 2-1/2 weeks of Vancouver-like weather followed, until we awoke to snow falling on October 23, but the inch that fell melted away by early afternoon. The same pattern of mostly rain with the odd sunny day (or at least not rain) followed until November 20 when another 2 inches of snow fell over night but melted when the snow again turned to rain. The snowfall total (SFT) for the year was 5 inches, but no trace remained unmelted.

It was not until the first week of December that the temperatures remained below freezing during the day, after recording lows of minus 10 under clear skies.

December 14 began a week of snowfall that brought the SFT up to 18 inches. Nice weather followed for the next few days until Boxing day brought heavy snow. The remainder of December was a mixed bag of sun, flurries and rain, with above normal temps.

New Years Day began with a low of minus 5, rising to plus 1 with heavy snow all day. A total of 8 inches fell that day, bringing the season SFT to 28 inches.

January continued the pattern of cloud and precipitation with the

odd sunny day thrown in but it was finally cold enough for the precipitation to be in the form of snow. By the 28th, SFT for the year was 55 inches. There were three days of "January Thaw" before the temperature fell to minus 8.

February saw mostly overcast skies, but very little precipitation. Temperatures hovered near freezing during the nights and warmed up to an average of plus 4 during the days.

The first week in March saw snow all week, bringing the SFT for the year to 72 inches, but the temperature was getting warmer, and by March 10, the snow was melting quickly in the beautiful daytime temperatures of plus 10 with sunny skies.

Forecasters had warned of less than normal snowfall this winter, and they were right, but only because the temperatures were so unseasonably warm, the precipitation that would otherwise have been snow was in the form of lots of rain! What kind of Spring does this El Nino year have in store?

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Imperial and Princeton complete due diligence merger

Imperial Metals Corporation (IPM-T) ("Imperial") and Princeton Mining Corporation (PMC-T) ("Princeton") are pleased to announce the signing of an Arrangement Agreement relating to the agreement to merge announced on February 12, 1998. In addition, Princeton has signed an agreement with Madison Development Corporation and Vanac Development Corp. for the purchase of certain real estate assets on closing of the Plan of Arrangement.

Due to the volume of documentation involved, the mailing date for the Information Circular has been delayed from March 18, 1998 to March 26, 1998, with a similar delay in the shareholder and debentureholders' meetings from April 9, 1998, to April 17, 1998. Closing is expected shortly thereafter, but no later than May 15, 1998.

All conditions precedent to mailing contained in the Arrangement Agreement have been satisfied or waived. These include receipt of lockup agreements, due diligence and property title reviews and

receipt of an acceptable Fairness Opinion.

Both Huckleberry and Mount Polley Mines are pursuing concessions on power rates and other government charges as part of the structuring of Economic Plans for both projects through the office of the Job Protection Commission of British Columbia.

The creditors of Huckleberry Mines Ltd., the Japan Group and the Province of British Columbia, have agreed in principal to restructure their loans subject to implementation of the Economic Plan, as follows:

- 1) The first two semi-annual principal payments due to start in June, 1998, and November, 1998, respectively will be deferred to the end of the current loan term.
- 2) The next three semi-annual principal repayments will be reduced by 25 per cent, with the reduced amount being paid after the deferred payments.
- 3) All interest payments on the above loans and all principal and interest payments relating to the US \$10 million loan granted to Huckleberry in October 1997 will

be maintained.

The Japan Group loan restructuring is also subject to final board approvals by the respective member company boards. Both the Japan Group and Province of British Columbia loan restructurings are conditional upon each other's approvals and the completion of the Plan of Arrangement between Princeton and Imperial.

With the combination of loan restructuring and concessions from the government and other stakeholders, it is hoped that both the Huckleberry and Mount Polley mines will be able to continue operations and maintain current employment levels during this period of historical low metal prices.

To be successful, the Plan of

Arrangement requires approval of 66.7 per cent of shareholders voting at the shareholders' meeting and approval of 66.7 per cent of debentureholders voting at the debentureholders' meeting. The board of Directors of Princeton has recommended shareholders and debentureholders vote in favour of the Plan of Arrangement.

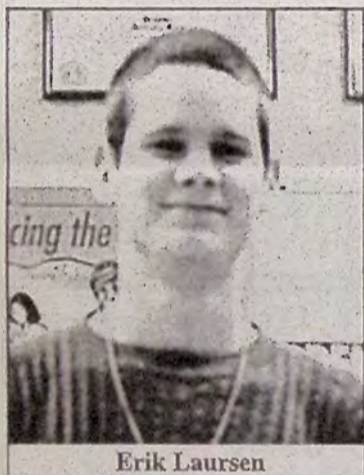

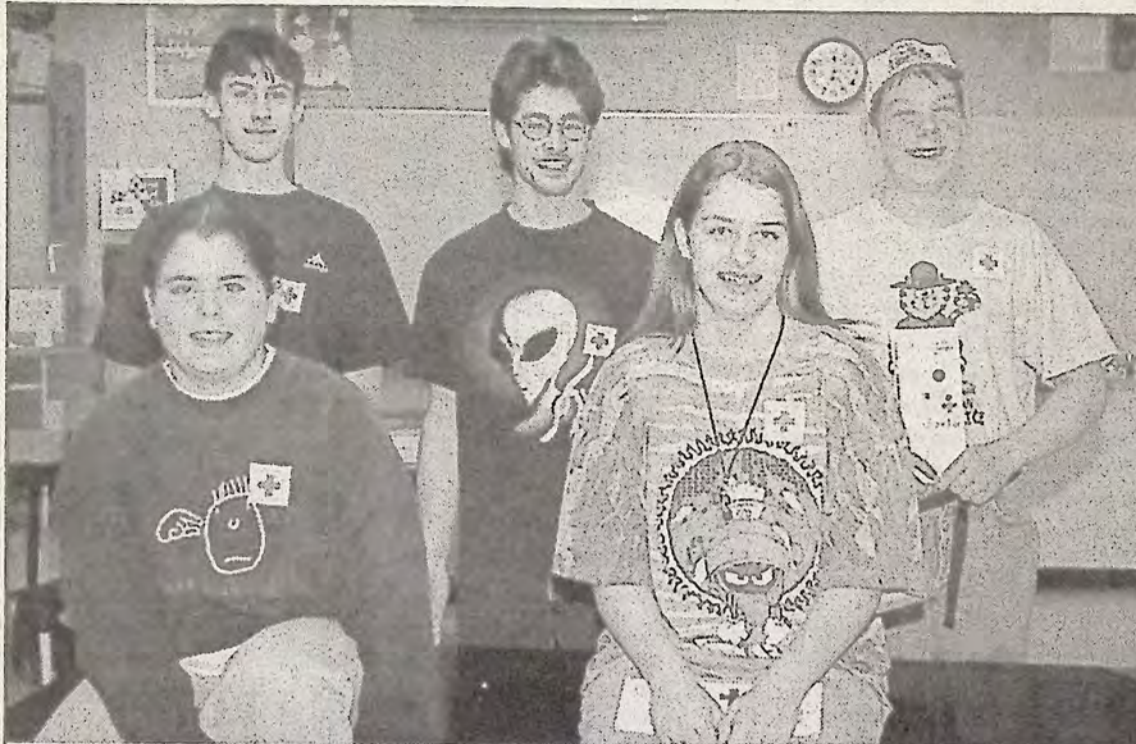

Memories

The last cattle drive from Tulameen

The last cattle drive from Tulameen to Princeton by Tulameen ranchers was the year 1944 when Les Fripp Sr. and Bud Woodford drove a herd from Tulameen to the Canadian Pacific Railway.

I remember my mother having mumps (a child's disease) that year. She was sixty-nine years old at the time. My brother Paddy and his wife Madeleine were here for a visit from the coast. I asked Paddy to take Mom home and take her to a good dentist to have her teeth extracted. This left me at home to manage the ranch. I decided to put maure on the property adjoining the house (to build up the soil) as it was quite gravelly. I was busy doing my thing. I had a sloop (a contraption much like a sled that we hitched the

horses to and dragged whatever behind).

Well, I was busy shovelling the "gold dust" off when I felt someone's eyes on me. I looked up to see Bud Woodford resting his arms on the fence. He laughed when I saw him. We exchanged conversation and he asked if we had any cattle for sale. He said he was buying for Canada Packers and that Fripps were selling some cattle and would take ours at the same time.

I said I would let him know and we left it at that.

I got in touch with Mom and she said, "Go ahead."

I believe this was a Tuesday, and Bud said he would have to have the cattle in Princeton to ship out on Friday. Les Fripp and Harold Flanagan (a rancher up the valley)

and Bud Woodford drove the herd into Princeton, through Bridge Street and Vermilion, making quite a spectacle for the town.

We had a four year old steer with long horns. He was very tame, however, Les said he made quite an impression as they thundered over the brown bridge and on down the street.

I am sure that Les, Harold and Bud felt they had done a good day's work when they had those critters loaded and ready for the stock yard.

Traffic Tips

Bicycles

With the coming of better weather and snow free streets, bicycles are again beginning to appear. Have you and your bicycle become rusty over the winter? When you prepare your bicycle this year, prepare yourself properly too.

A bicycle is subject to the same traffic rules as are automobiles. Riders must obey stop signs, signal turns, ride only on the right side of the roadway and display lights when riding at night. These are just a few examples of good cycling practice each parent should ensure their child knows.

Accidents involving bicycles that cause injury or damage in excess of \$25.00 must be reported to police.

There are also a number of rules that govern passengers and equipment. A bicycle may carry one passenger for each seat, but not more. There must be a red light and a red reflector at the rear of the bicycle to mention two.

The operator of the cycle must wear an approved bicycle helmet. No person while riding a bicycle, skateboard, or roller blades may hang onto a vehicle while the vehicle is in motion. Both the vehicle operator and the person hanging on are subject to fines.

Bicycle riders who break the rules may be issued a ticket just like the driver of a car. A judge may also order a bicycle impoundment for a period of time for violations.

Ordered to Stand trial
