

## Thieves Steal Wire

Princeton Light and Power reports a break and enter into their compound on Old Copper Mountain Road in Princeton sometime during the weekend of April 3 to 6 (Friday to Monday). Entry was gained by smashing down a chain link gate. Several coils of #2 ACSR aluminum wire were stolen. Total value of the wire is about \$2,000. The wire is the type used for conducting high voltages.

## Town Council goes to Dogs

Dogs were a major topic of considerable discussion at the April 6 Council meeting. Councillor Dan Sulentich raised the question of whether or not dogs should be allowed downtown at all. He suggested a bylaw making owners at fault if a dog is downtown, whether or not the owner is with the dog and has it on a leash.

The unseemly and unwanted amount of dog manure on downtown sidewalks prompted the discussion, and consideration of the bylaw. Other methods of removing dogs from downtown were discussed, as were other penalties for dog owners. The question of who would enforce such a bylaw and how it would be enforced remained unanswered.

During the same meeting, Council approved the bid by Keith Frankland for the animal and pest control duties in Princeton.

## Friends Plan Heuser Memorial Project

Ian Elko and Tophy Hanna, with many friends of Aaron Heuser, presented a memorial project to Nicola-Similkameen School Trustees on April 8. The project is the creation of a foundation fund for an annual basketball clinic in Aaron Heuser's memory.

The young men, most of them students or recent graduates of Princeton Secondary School, did not ask for money, but for co-operation from the school district in administering the fund and providing tax exemption receipts for donations.

Danny Coyne explained to the trustees that he had enlisted community support for the project. He had spent three days gathering signatures of those who were in favour of the project, and had collected 960 signatures.

Ken Schwabe told the Board that it would have been great if there had been a basketball clinic for the students at Princeton Secondary in the past, and he felt that Aaron would like to see a project such as a basketball clinic in his memory.

Hamish Reid said, "Aaron showed that through hard work, you get to where you want to be. We hope you can help us create a legacy in Aaron's name."

Board Chair Gordon Comeau told the group that the school district administers bursaries.

"We have staff available for the structure and the process required under the School Act."

Comeau asked the students to consider alternatives if the clinic was not viable.

Secretary Treasurer Bruce Tisdale assured the Board he

would be happy to assist the student group.

The trustees approved the plan in principle. Details will be worked out in the near future.

Gordon Comeau thanked the students for their support of the Heuser family following the loss of their son.

## Imperial Metals Makes Changes

Imperial Metals announced on April 6 the company is considering temporary suspension of mining activity at Mount Polley Mine on July 31, 1998. The gold/copper mine is located 60 km. north-east of Williams Lake, B.C.

The mine is presently working on an economic plan with the Job Protection Commission of the Province of B.C. to better the financial conditions it is operating under through cost reductions and concessions from all stakeholders. It is hoped that this economic plan combined with improving metal prices will allow the mine to continue normal course opera-

tions beyond July 31.

Mount Polley directly employs 167 people and provides indirect employment for an additional 335 people in support of the mine and its employees. Most of these jobs would be affected by the suspension.

The possibility of a temporary suspension at Mount Polley will not affect Imperial's proposed merger with Princeton Mining Corporation. Both companies plan to proceed with the merger which will achieve cost reductions through improved efficiency, better economies of scale and overhead reductions. The new

company will emerge stronger and better able to deal with the challenges of low metal prices and the tougher competitive environment presently facing the mining industry. The shareholders and debentureholders of Princeton will meet to approve the merger on April 17, 1998, as originally planned.

On April 8, Imperial Metals announced that an Environmental Assessment Application has been submitted to the government of British Columbia for the Silvertip high grade precious and base metals property. The EAA document continued on Page 2

## Victoria Spends \$\$ on Youth Jobs

Victoria has set aside \$36 million to create 17,000 new job and training positions for youth in B.C. this year.

**Youth Options B.C.** - ten different options are available for government funding.

**Blade Runners** - 130 jobs are slated for street youth in the construction industry through union support and employer subsidy.

**Crown Youth Employment Initiative** - This option provides both summer and longer term employment in settings such as environmental projects, energy conservation, tourism, research, road safety, etc. 4275 positions available.

**Environment Youth Teams (E-Teams)** - 1,500 positions will be funded in two categories: 1) work crews geared to employing out-of-school young people who have limited work experience and 2) Environment Intern and Eco-Ed which provide career-related work to youth who have completed their education.

**First Job in Science and Technology** - provides 220 jobs in high-tech companies for recent graduates of a post-secondary sci-

ence, technology or engineering program.

**Job Start** - 1,000 jobs wage-shared with employers to help defray the cost of training young people who have little or no work experience.

**Student Summer Works 98** - 5,000 jobs under a wage-sharing option that provides jobs for students age 15 to 24 for the summer only.

**Visions for the Future** - 750 training positions for aboriginal youth in a series of two-day seminars held in ten areas of the province.

**Youth Business and Entrepreneurship Training Program (YouBet!)** - 1,450 training positions in small business planning and operations through a series of intensive workshops in 30 communities in B.C.

**Youth Mentorship** - For youth who have completed YouBET!, 300 positions enabling young people to explore their business ideas under the guidance of mentors.

**YOUTH @ BC** - 80 jobs for youth to train others on how to create web sites and access Internet.

**Youth Works** - 27,000 jobs to provide training and work experience to youth on income assistance through partnerships with private employers. Young people who are actively looking for work are given job search assistance, and training to help them acquire skills and experience they need to go into the workforce.

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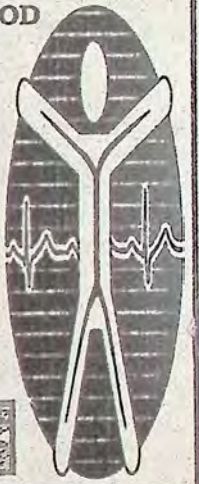

## Cruisers Will Map Trail

Timberline Cruisers Snowmobile Club has approved a project that will map snowmobile trails in the Princeton, Coalmont and Tulameen areas including Lodestone Mountain, Granite Mountain, Whipsaw and Willis Creek area to Crater Mountain.

At a meeting held Tuesday, April 8, Cruisers asked the advice of Noelle Kukula, Recreation Officer with Merritt Forest District. She said she would need very detailed maps of the area they intended to propose, although the general map they presented looked promising and not likely to create problems. She told them the detailed maps are required for a "features inventory", and if designated, these trails would become part of the recreation inventory of Merritt Forest District.

Bernie Venco, from Kamloops Regional headquarters, told the meeting the objective is to keep balance between recreational use,

and other uses. Developments such as snowmobile trails tend to evolve, he explained, and clubs evolve.

Cruisers members had concerns about the areas trails being claimed by some commercial development, then local snowmobilers would have to pay a fee to use trails they had previously used for years. Cruisers want the area multi-use. The club would want the rights to the area for recreational purposes and would

On March 29, members of Princeton Concert Society gathered for an afternoon performance at the Christian Education Building. The Canadian Guitar Trio gave the last concert of the Princeton season.

The sun was shining brightly outside, but all the same, 79 music lovers chose to spend some time indoors enjoying the delights offered by the trio of Harold Micay, Hanh Nguyen and Zack Westfall, who departed from the printed program in several instances. The result was a pleasing blend of familiar favourites such as Vivaldi's concerto in G and Mozart's Eine Kleine Nacht Musik, with music written by a Brazilian composer with whom the group had often played in Vancouver, and the comical "Classical Gas" by Mason Williams.

Especially appealing were two pieces reflecting the period when the Jews were fleeing from Spain, carrying with them music which showed the Sephardic influence combined with the traditional music of Spain. The artists did not

## Live Well Clinic Deals With Cancer

The April 22 wellness clinic at Princeton Pharmasave will deal with breast cancer and prostate cancer, and how to prevent them.

Living well means preventing disease through a healthy lifestyle, and it means watching for the danger signals before a disease becomes too advanced.

Breast cancer is the most common form of cancer among women in Canada. Most breast cancer occurs in women after age 50, and approximately one in nine women will develop breast cancer (although rare, men can get it as well). Three quarters of women will be cured of breast cancer.

Signs of breast cancer include a lump or thickening in the breast, a sunken nipple, a change in shape of the breast, change in texture of breast skin, or any type of discharge from the nipple.

Prevention includes eating a low fat diet with plenty of vegetables, one to three hours of exercise weekly, and keeping weight down. Detection and early treatment of cancer includes breast self-examination, clinical examination and mammograms. The more a woman knows how to live well, and how to detect changes leading to cancer, the better her chances of avoiding or beating breast cancer.

Prostate cancer in men may go undetected for years, which makes early detection vitally important. Knowing the symptoms helps by alerting a man to the potential of prostate cancer. One out of ten men will develop prostate cancer.

Preventing prostate cancer includes being a non-smoker, eating red meat no more than four times a week, and eating plenty of vegetables, especially tomatoes. A man should exercise 30 minutes a day five times a week by swimming, walking, bicycling or running.

Risks include having a family history of prostate cancer. Symptoms of prostate cancer include frequent urination, difficulty starting urine, weak or inter-

rupted flow of urine, blood in the urine, painful ejaculation, chronic pain in the back, hips or upper thighs, and difficulty in getting or holding and erection.

## PRINCETON GENERAL HOSPITAL HAS LIMITED EMERGENCY COVERAGE

### PRINCETON GENERAL HOSPITAL NEWS RELEASE

Princeton General Hospital regrets to inform the residents of Princeton that the majority of physicians in our community have chosen to withdraw their services from the Hospital's Emergency Room except for life-threatening cases (they will be available for obstetrics) between the hours of 6:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. on weekdays and all day on weekends and statutory holidays. It is anticipated that critical cases will be admitted to hospital as usual. In the Hospital's Emergency Department, patients will be treated, observed and admitted if necessary. During normal daytime working hours, the hospital will continue its operation as usual.

After 6:00 p.m., all acutely ill patients and those patients who are judged by hospital nursing staff to require doctor's care will be admitted to hospital. Doctor's will be available to provide medical services as required. Ill infants under six months of age brought to the hospital will be seen by a physician.

Some patients may be transferred to Penticton Regional Hospital, as they would be in the past, for treatment. It is not anticipated that many patients will be transferred to Penticton. The hospital and our doctors will work together to ensure that members of the public are not put at risk, but there will be some inconvenience. The actions by our doctors is expected to have a minimal impact on Princeton General Hospital but the situation will be monitored daily to ensure that area residents continue to receive appropriate health care services.

### Watch Y2Y parks project

You may not have heard of Y2Y, or you may have heard of it briefly a couple of years ago, and thought it died.

Y2Y is far from dead. It is gaining support of all of the environmentalist and protectionist groups in North America. It is a project that could kill what little remains of British Columbia's economy.

The project's official name is Yellowstone to Yukon (Y2Y) and it is a massive project to protect and preserve half of Idaho, Montana, British Columbia and Yukon Territory. The area covered would follow the Rockies from Yellowstone right up through Yukon, in a so-called ecological zone that would include all of the existing parks and all of the land between the parks.

Y2Y is a project much like the International Peace Park project (also known as Cascadia), but it is ten times larger in scope. The project called Y2Y is mind-boggling, but the support of over one hundred environmentalist groups is enough to send the boggled mind into acute alert mode.

The Yellowstone to Yukon project is not about including people in the picture of our future. Wildlife and a playground for the rich urbanites is the goal. One need only look at where Y2Y is promoted to see the audience to whom the project will appeal. Y2Y is a feature in the glossy environmentalist magazines supported by advertisers such as Jeep, Calvin Klein, and other manufacturers of pricey or "status" products that appeal to the affluent urban dwellers.

The urban resident who can afford the wilderness holiday costs like the idea that the wilderness is out there, pristine and waiting to restore the human soul. This romantic vision of the wilderness contributes to the coffers of the environmentalist and protectionist organizations who have turned "saving the planet" into a billion dollar business, and who have done a great deal of damage to land-based industries such as ranching, mining and lumber manufacturing.

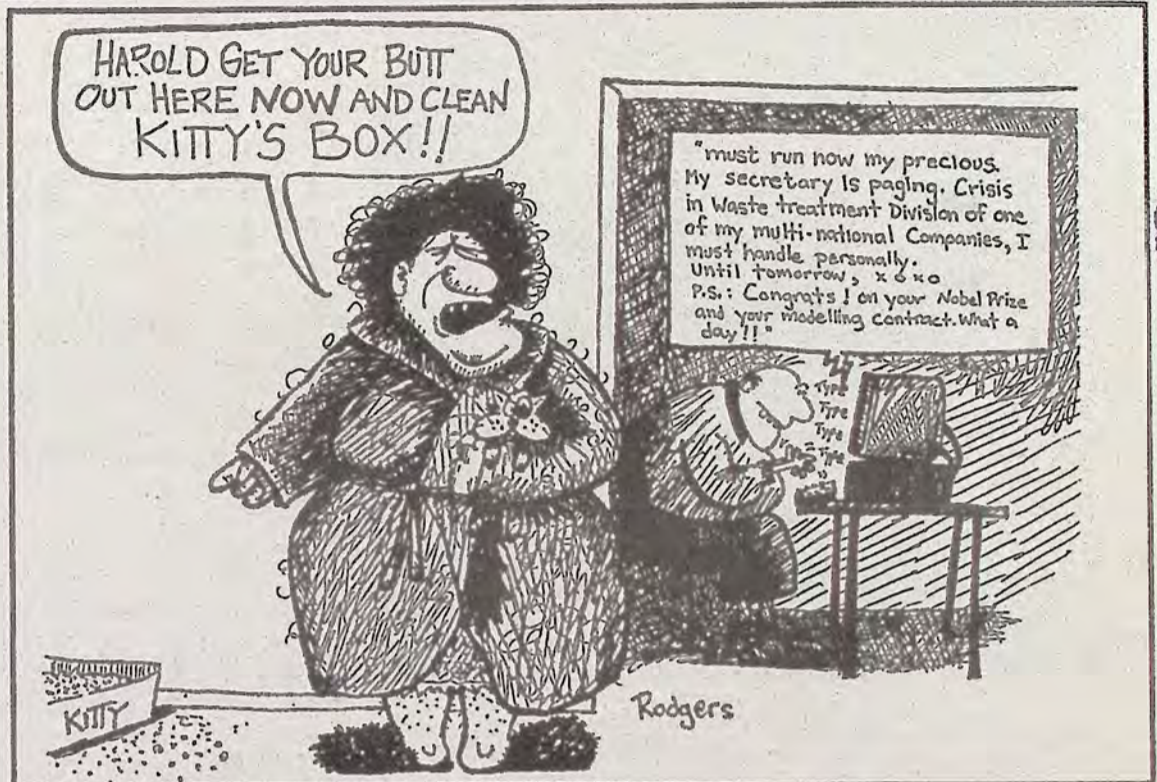

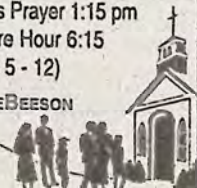

This is the last of three parts on a trip to the Coachella Valley in California, where cities like Indio and Palm Springs are well-known to many residents here.

Real estate varies from very reasonable to very expensive. Cost of living may be a bit cheaper, the variety greater. Remember the Canadian dollar is only worth 60 cents compared to the U.S. dollar.

Liquor can be bought at the local supermarket. A bottle of Bacardi or Black Label costs \$7.99, depending whether there is a "special". I.D. is required for any age. Law and order is a major concern. It is not unusual to have a rent-a-cop at a business complex or supermarket.

The minimum wage is \$5.75 per hour. The majority of employees, regardless of occupation, are Hispanics from Mexico. Many speak no English. They are a hard-working, happy people and very family oriented. There is a very big problem with illegal immigration into the U.S. from Mexico, a poorer country.

This highlights how small the world is. They want a good life, too, and until there is a more equitable distribution of wealth, this will continue.

In the Canadian west, wealthy people can buy their way into

Canada under the guise of "investment".

California's unemployment rate is 5.4 per cent, about half of B.C.'s 10 per cent. This state, like many others, emphasizes a balanced budget, with great emphasis on education and law and order.

Gas for cars in Indio was 25 cents per litre and is prepaid and self-serve. In Oregon, the gas was about the same but they call it "mini-service". There is no self-serve and there is a \$500 fine if you serve yourself: it is outlawed. The minimum wage there is \$6.35 per hour and gives many students and others part-time or full-time employment.

The spiritual life in the area around Indio appears quite active, considering the number of churches, notably the synagogue and several very impressive large Mormon structures. We attended an extremely large church named St. Francis of Assisi, which was overflowing in attendance. The interesting thing was the monks that staffed it were of the same order that several hundred years earlier gave the names to many southwest U.S. cities like Santa (saint) Fe, San Diego, San Francisco, etc. As in many places now, the attendance consisted

mostly of the elderly, and was particularly evident during week-day services.

The area is a haven for retired people and no doubt there is good business for doctors and the friendly neighbourhood undertaker. That's life.

Hospitals advertise their services. Lawyers advertise even on cafe menus. My sister caught a cold in her eye. The doctor's fee was \$66.00. She got some eye drops. That was extra. Had it been a specialist, it would be \$200. Her insurance would reimburse her when she returned home.

There are the very rich and the very poor. Food stamps are the norm. This was very evident one day when on a highway corner was a neatly attired young man in his twenties. He held a sign which read "Homeless with pup. Need job, will work for food". The pup looked like a little round-eared Chihuahua. No doubt, if the man received anything, the dog would eat first. Kind of tugged your heart.

Like a job, a vacation is nice to have, but it is always nice to come home, especially if it's Canada, a priceless place to reside. We are very fortunate.

# Steelheading in the Thompson River

For years, actually since 1969, when I first came to Princeton, I had been hearing the name Nishihara, Harold Nishihara, who some people called "Nish". The names Tunkwa Lake and Spence's Bridge came up in the conversations frequently. Large fish were mentioned - not the 10 to 16 inch local lake fish commonly caught, but five pound to six pound Kamloops rainbows, and 20 pound steelhead!

That made me perk up. I started to see Harold's trout flies in the Golden Hills store and met him there once. He made no-nonsense type flies, as I call them. They were drab and buggy-looking, not "hat hangers" but fish catchers.

Off and on during the years, we said "Hello" to each other. Our meeting the other day at Overwaitea led to an invitation to visit him at his house.

The first thing I saw there was a 29 pound Thompson River steelhead on his livingroom wall. That really perked me up!

Harold also had his custom-made 11 foot steelhead rod and Hardy spinning reel. Both big! Obviously meant for big fish and

long distance casting.

As we talked, my suspicions were confirmed - Harold is a dedicated fisherman. He and his father, Bill, were among the pioneers of steelheading the Thompson, and on the Coquihalla River, in the Othello area. Bill started fishing in 1945 and Harold used to come along to help. After an appropriate apprenticeship, he also caught fish. Not many fished steelhead then. Harold tells me some people thought the fish were salmon and were "harvesting" them with nets and spears. Not many regulations were enforced then.

Harold and Bill used the rod and reel. Using shrimp for bait was deadly and Bill was the innovator of this technique. They put 650 feet of 15# test monofilament line on their reels! It was not uncommon for them to have a steelhead run 200 to 300 feet of line out - not once, but two or three times. These were steelhead, not salmon!

Harold showed me a box of his lures - OKIE drifters and Krokodile spoons. The OKIE is a cork bead painted a bright

orange, chartreuse, or red - fish are not colour blind, you know, and can be fussy. A small bit of brightly coloured yarn dangles from the OKIE. It is tied in a way so bait can be added, roe or shrimp in those days. Fish also have an excellent sense of smell.

The Krokodile, invented in Norway in 1955, is a heavy spoon made in a unique way to give fantastic action when retrieved properly. Harold said a 200 foot cast was often needed, and the "Krok" would do that. Single hooks were best. Bill and Harold early-on discovered they hooked better and allowed fish to be released unharmed.

More fishermen discovered the steelhead of the Thompson. They were huge fish then - a 15 pound average. The male fish, "bucks", were the first to arrive. November 11 was when Harold and his father became serious. They went

every weekend. As they were much sought after as carpenters, their weekdays were occupied building many of Princeton's best-constructed homes. Otherwise, they would have fished weekdays, too, I am sure.

Other locals were interested in steelheading - among them, Stan Mills, Les McKenzie, Art Thomas, Ted Pringle, Fred McRae, C.O. Prest, and Peter Lockhart. They would have good times on these excursions.

Harold tells me they camped along the river at times. You get the early fishing that way. Fees were charged for the privilege when they were on private property. Twenty dollars was a lot of money in those days, and Harold used to give the property owner a \$20 bill to pay the one dollar parking fee. Lacking change, the person would say, "Go ahead, I'll catch you next time."

This went well until one day, Fred McRae met a woman who had the correct change. He came back "hopping".

Harold used to get his gas money for the trips by playing Japanese cards with a fellow in Merritt - Harold made an art out of card playing, too, and seldom lost.

A typical day on the Thompson saw them lined up on the bank about 7:00 a.m. Harold had his favourite spot, "Black Rock". Such locations were highly regarded, you could catch fish there "almost every trip"! The other Princeton steelheaders would line up along the banks on each side of the river, each at a favourite spot. They found out certain methods worked best.

## Seal Out Decay

Do you want to preserve your family's smile for a lifetime? Sealants can help make that possible.

Sealants are a clear or shaded plastic material that are applied to the chewing surfaces of the back teeth to form a protective barrier against the decay causing bacteria plaque. These back teeth may develop with deep grooves that are difficult to keep clean because the bristles of the toothbrush can-

not reach into them, allowing plaque and food to collect and cause decay.

Children receive the greatest benefit from having sealants applied to newly erupted permanent teeth (around age 6). However, baby (primary) molars may also need to be sealed and even adults can benefit from this procedure to chewing surfaces of non-restored back teeth.

# Pikas, Hares and Rabbits

These mammals once suffered from a case of mistaken identity. At one time, they were lumped together with the Rodents. They are now placed in a separate order, Lagomorpha. This is a small order of two families. One contains pikas (peekas) and the other contains hares and rabbits. They share many physical characteristics with the rodents. However, they have a second pair of upper incisors. The second pair of incisors are peg-shaped and snub up against the back of the front incisors.

All lagomorphs produce two kinds of fecal pellets, a soft kind that they eat and a hard pellet that is discarded. These soft pellets are stored in the stomach and mixed with fresh food and subjected to fermentation again. Refection increases digestive efficiency and enables them to recapture lost nutrients, particularly vitamin B12 produced by gut bacteria.

The Similkameen Valley has representatives from the two families, Ochotonidae (pikas) and Leporidae (hares and rabbits). Although belonging to the same order, the two families show many unique differences.

Pika occupy a highly specific habitat. They require rocky talus slopes near to mountain meadows. This habitat gives them shelter and provides them with the vegetation that they need to survive. They are unique among the lagomorphs in being diurnal, and with their habit of harvesting and storing food to sustain them through the winter months. These

stacks of dried vegetation are often the first sign that you are in pika country. Heard long before they are seen, their bleating calls carry for long distances across the rocky slopes. Careful observation of the slopes will reveal a small, 8 inch, hamster shaped animal light brown in colour with small rounded ears. Safe in their rock mazes, from most predators, they are preyed upon by hawks, eagles, bears and weasels, the latter able to follow the pika through the maze of rocks.

In the the Princeton area, the talus slopes of Highway 5A will give good views of pikas low down close to the road.

The Snowshoe Hare, the familiar "bunny" of this area, gets its name from its large hind feet, an adaptation for running in deep snow. Found in areas of moist woods, and at higher areas around Princeton, Hares rarely burrow but prefer to have a small indentation in the ground, called a scrape, usually placed under a brush pile or log. The snowshoe, which can reach a weight of three pounds, and a length of twenty inches, varies its colour as the seasons change, going from a mottled brown in the summer to pure white in winter, except for black tips of the ears. This change helps to conceal the hare from lynx, bobcat and owls, all of which prey on it. Hares produce precocial young, meaning that they are born furred, eyes open, alert and with well-developed muscles. Hares are primarily nocturnal, with peak active periods at dawn and dusk.

Snowshoe hares go through a cycle of high and low population densities that have a direct effect on the predators that prey on them.

The best area to see this species close to Princeton is the old Allenby townsite, a slow evening drive through this area will nearly always turn up a few individuals. Nuttall's Cottontail is a small, 14 inch member of the rabbit family on the provincial "blue" list, meaning that it is threatened. Secretive, there are records from the Keremeos area. Overall colour gray brown with a white underside to its tail. Any sightings for the Similkameen Valley should be reported.

# Registered Investments

Reducing personal income tax is something most of us want to do. But how? One of the best ways that an individual can reduce their current and future tax burden is by putting money into a registered investment vehicle. There are several different investment vehicles, ranging from the Registered Education Savings Plan (RESP) to the Retirement Savings Plan (RSP). Of all these options, the RSP is by far the most utilized tax planning tool.

### Retirement Savings Plans (RSPs)

The RSP is easily the most effective means of reducing income tax for most people. How it works is simple: what you contribute to an RSP is deducted from your taxable income, thereby reducing what you pay in taxes. There are limits, however. You can only contribute a maximum of 18 per cent of your previous year's earned income, up to \$13,500 per year. Contribution limits are based on the previous year's earned income.

### A Double Tax Advantage

Not only is the money that you put into an RSP tax deductible, it is also free to grow on a tax deferred basis while it remains in the plan. You don't pay money on the plan until it is withdrawn. That allows the investment to grow more quickly than it otherwise would.

### RSP Tax Planning Tips

• Make RSP contributions earlier in the year to maximize the tax-deferred growth of your invest-

ment.

• You can "Carry forward" any unused contribution room from one year to another if you are unable to contribute the full amount allowed in a given year.

• Shelter interest-bearing investments, such as coupons and bonds, in your RSP. Hold investments that provide capital gains and dividends in your regular account as they are taxed less than interest.

### Registered Education Savings Plans (RESPs)

Money put into an RESP is not tax deductible. However, the money generated within the plan is tax deferred, like in an RSP. For every beneficiary in the plan, a maximum of \$4,000 per year can be contributed. Beneficiaries can include spouses, children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, brothers, sisters and even the person setting up the plan.

The 1998 federal budget introduced the Canada Education Savings Grant, which provides a 20 per cent annual grant on the first \$2,000 contributed to an RESP for each child under the age of 18. This grant has an annual maximum \$400 per beneficiary.

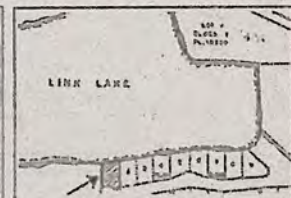

## Whitefish Running in the Similkameen

On Sunday, April 5, eight members of the Vermilion Forks Field Naturalist Club trekked up the road along the western bank of the Similkameen, south of Princeton. There was a misty fall of rain from time to time but the air was warm and the song sparrows were in full throat. On the far shore, the group passed the old Stenvold homestead, the remnants of the old coal-fired power plant, and the foundation of the old Allenby water pumping station.

Along the way, a line baited with helgramites was tossed into the grey water. Helgramites are the larvae of the stonefly. They look like tiny dragons, and abound under rocks at the river's edge. The fisherman snaked out four good-sized Rocky Mountain whitefish, slim grey fish with suck-like mouths. At the lunch stop, a small fire built of cottonwood bark roasted fish placed on a smooth rock laid at the edge of the flames: delicious!

At a pool by the end of the road, the naturalists noted a thick crop of watercress, and a couple of goldeneye males courting a single female. The country beyond the road, along the river, is a strange assortment of small hills and valleys, heavily forested with young fir and pine. It looks intriguing, and worthy of further investigation. A variety of lichens were identified, with exotic names such as freckle pelt, brown-eyed sunshine, and edible horsehair, with lots of the vivid yellow-green wolf lichen.

On the way back, the group was shocked by the sight of three moons which rose up from some heather on the hill. The exhibitionists were not apprehended. Aside from that, it was a very

pleasant hike despite the April weather.

The next hike is scheduled for Monday, April 20, up Baldy and Holmes Mountains. Meet at the us station at 10:00 with a lunch. The public is welcome. Phone Myrna Bosomworth at 295-3374 if you wish to come along.
