

Nobody offered to work on trail deal

The May 6 meeting to form a working committee of local supporters did not reach that objective. After two hours of discussion, the existing steering committee retained the responsibility for the portion of the TransCanada Trail likely to go through our area.

The meeting began with brief talks by Lyle Thomas, of the local trails committee, and Barry Montgomery, a contract employee working on FRBC projects for Princeton and District Chamber of Commerce.

The public saw a video of the TransCanada Trail concept. Following the video presentation, there was a discussion period.

One of the major questions was the liability concern of adjacent landowners who feared impossible liability coverage rates to protect them if a hiker wandered off the trail and was injured on private property. Barry Montgomery explained that this concern had been addressed by legislation announced recently.

Paula Pateman, who operates a commercial dogsled tour on the old railbed, expressed concerns about opportunities for commercial ventures using the trail.

Monty Raine voiced his opinion that the 112 km stretch of trail could not be maintained by local people as it is hard to entice people to work on any projects. He wondered how a small community could possibly look after such a huge distance.

Bert Sharkey expressed dismay about a commercial venture he wanted to undertake but feared his access would be blocked. He feared the trail would be restricted to single use.

Replica gun game ends in jail

Princeton RCMP and Kelowna emergency response team were involved in an incident in Princeton on March 4, 1998, when 37 year old Richard Gray threatened to start shooting.

Gray brandished a replica of an assault rifle in a two hour stand-off when police tried to arrest him.

Gray appeared in Provincial Court on May 7 for sentencing. Crown Counsel emphasized the danger in which Gray had placed himself by using the replica and threatening to shoot.

Defense Counsel noted that there had been only one person going to come to any harm, and that person was Gray. He explained that Gray had consumed six beer when police first contacted him, then took four Valium tablets and consumed four glasses of wine

while waiting for police to come to his home.

Judge G. Sinclair said to Gray, "You're lucky you're still standing here."

Gray had a job waiting for him at the local ski hill. The owner of the ski hill was in court and said he was holding the job for Gray.

Judge Sinclair sentenced Gray to 60 days in jail on weekends, starting May 8, with 18 months probation with recommendations for substance abuse counselling, psychiatric assessment and counselling, and a 10 year firearms prohibition. The replica rifle was forfeited.

Pow-wow this weekend

The annual Cathedral Lakes Pow-wow was in doubt for awhile, but Jay Begaye has taken the role of organizer and the pow-wow is on this weekend.

The first dances start at 7:00 p.m. Friday, followed by grand entry at 1:30 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday. For those camping at the round house on Thursday evening, Little Island Cree will perform hand drum music, songs and round dances. Little Island Cree is the 1996 hand drum champions and well worth hearing and seeing.

Evening dances will go to midnight or 1:00 a.m. Anyone planning to camp at the pow-wow grounds should keep in mind that the drums will be loud until late in the evening.

The Cathedral Lakes Pow-wow is traditional, so there is no tolerance for booze, drugs or weapons. The grounds are patrolled by

police during the pow-wow and violations will be dealt with quickly.

Cathedral Lakes Pow-wow grounds are located west of Keremeos. Turn right at Don and Anna's greenhouses, cross the red bridge, and follow the paved road for approximately 5 km. The roundhouse and campground will be visible from the road.

Rodeo weekend

Keremeos Elks Rodeo starts Saturday with Little Britches at 11 a.m. and regular rodeo at 1 p.m. Saturday night is the time for cowboys to kick up their heels at the annual dance. Sunday features a barbecue, and more rodeo. The annual rodeo parade is on Monday. See ad P.7

Property owner is furious at 'devolution'

Diane Wanner, who lives at 249 Luard Avenue, has a backyard problem she asked the Highways Department to solve two years ago. When she learned that the problem will be the responsibility of the Town of Princeton, and local taxpayers, she became furious.

The Wanner problem is with the Tulameen Road. A concrete retaining wall was constructed several years ago at the end of Luard Avenue to support the embankment when Tulameen

Road was widened. The wall extends to the west end of the Wanner property. From the retaining wall eastward, the roadbed is slumping. Correcting it will cost a great deal.

The slumping is so serious that the Wanners, who would like to improve their back yard, have been told not to move any soil or cut any trees or bushes. Sandbags used at the edge of the roadbed have rotted and fallen, and big chunks of asphalt are sliding down the slope toward the

Wanner home. On the road surface, the slumping at the corner is obvious to drivers. This is the problem the Town of Princeton inherits with the "devolution" of responsibility for that section of road.

"What makes me really mad," says Diane Wanner, "is they want to dump this on a town that's already struggling."

Wanner calls the slumping road "an accident waiting to happen". There is still plenty of space left to continue the retaining wall along the edge of the road. It could be extended to protect the Wanner property and one more property east of Wanner's, where the need ceases for a retaining wall. The highway easement allows for an additional four metre road width.

Diane Wanner is not the type of person who sits back idly and complains. She has visited Town Hall and she has written to Transportation and Highways Minister Harry Lali.

Peter Jack responded by saying the trail is already multi-use, and expressed the opinion that no person should be closed out, including commercial use, but people might be looking at user pay fees.

Chris Pond stated "business is pitiful" in our area and something has to be done to promote tourism "here, now".

Regional Director Linda Allison said she would like people in favour of the trail to come forward. She added that people should not worry about legal and technical aspects of the trail, the government would take care of those matters.

Tulameen residents reacted to the statements by saying they had been working on the trail for five years, and their small group had decked a trestle in one weekend. Trudy Kotzian said she would expect work to be done through government work grants for youth. She said Princeton will have to do something soon.

Spencer Smith, Vice-President of the Chamber of Commerce, commented that 29,000 people had

stopped at the Tourist Information Centre in 1997, and most looked for hiking or biking.

Councillor Jim Manion tried to bring the meeting back to the focus on putting people to work on the project.

"This is a solution to our problems now, not like the industrial park."

Bob Coyne warned of loss "if we let this go, by sitting on our butts."

Peter Jack told the meeting that a great deal of business is coming his way now, even though the trail is not officially designating.

Sharon Anderson, who has done a lot of biking in Europe, assured everyone that Europeans will come, and her experience had indicated that trails are better if managed.

Marilyn Lawrence pointed out the trail in town is a mess, and challenged Council to do something about the dust.

These kinds of comments continued for approximately one hour. Nothing was resolved and no working committee was formed.

Trailer court residents demand home protection

Residents of Burr's Trailer Park, located on Penryn Avenue, attended the May 4 Town Council meeting to ask Council to find a solution to rocks landing on their homes and property.

According to residents along the street which backs onto the hill, people using the "bunny" trail from First Bench to Second Bench are rolling or throwing rocks. Lil Parkinson had \$1,500 damage done by a large rock rolled down the hill. It crashed through her garden shed. Cathie Orser reported \$500 damage done to her home from rocks thrown down the hill.

Property owners say they have been working in their yards and had rocks thrown at them from above.

Residents of the area have seen the people throwing rocks. Some have been children, but many

were young adults.

A chain link fence at the bottom of the slope was one suggested solution. Another suggestion was a chain link fence along the trail itself. Others suggested closing the trail completely.

Council will look at the situation and see what must be done.

Woman jailed electronically

A local woman served seven days in jail under the electronic monitoring program following a guilty plea in Provincial Court in Princeton on April 2. Anne Hayward was sentenced May 7 for driving while prohibited, which carries an automatic jail term. She was ordered to pay a \$300 fine and is prohibited for an additional year.

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Skills Centre honours achievers

May 6 was graduation day for 16 students who took the Customer Service and Sales Program at Princeton Community Skills Centre. Only four of the 16 were still unemployed by graduation day, a sure sign of the success of the program.

Sovereign Training Ltd. contracted the program, developed the curriculum and provided the instruction.

Students learned the art of giving good service and setting service standards of excellence. They looked at the positive view of customers service, and they learned how to handle difficult people. Their training included how to sell, SuperHost, telephone skills, goal setting and action planning, working with others, computer skills, financial management, work values and ethics, decision-making and effective

problem solving.

The major challenge for the class came when they planned an Open House at the Skills Centre to introduce themselves to local employers. They presented themselves and their skills in an extremely competent manner. Their Open House reception revealed good planning skills, and excellent co-operative work skills.

The final objective of any skills training program is employed graduates. Lynn Allin, a training and development specialist from Sovereign Training, rated Princeton's grads as high on the success list.

"Nobody dropped out," Allin said, "Nobody gave up. That says a lot about this group. They are highly motivated and they know how to work hard. They are achievers."

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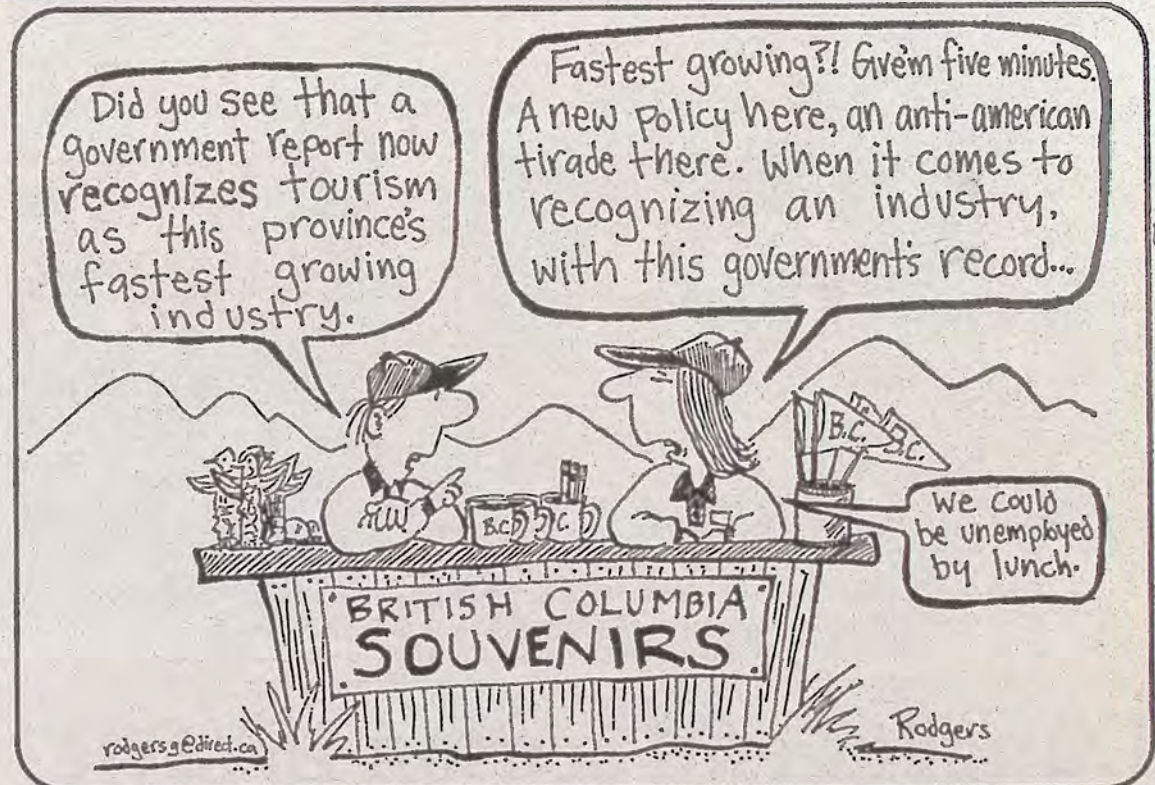

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Council budgets zero increase over 1997

The Town of Princeton 1998 budget has the same total as the 1997 budget. According to Mayor Randy McLean, there will be no increase in taxes for the Town unless the assessment has increased.

Capital expenditures budgetted for 1998 are minimal, except for land acquisition at \$160,000. Storm sewers construction is allocated \$6,000 paving and road construction amounts to \$85,000

The total expenditures planned for this year amount to \$2,965,150. Mill rates (dollars per thousand dollars assessed value) are indicated on the graph below.

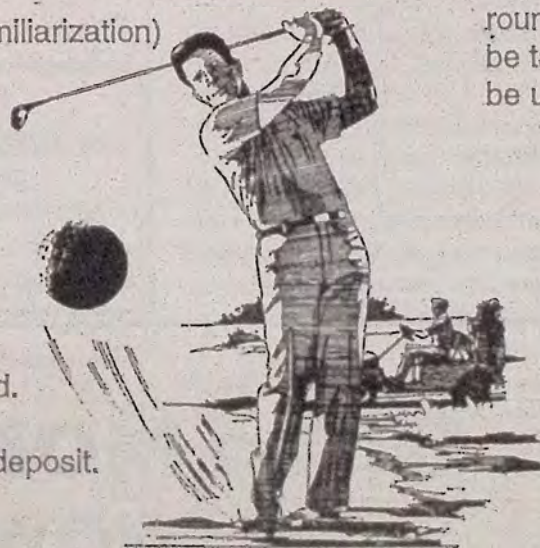

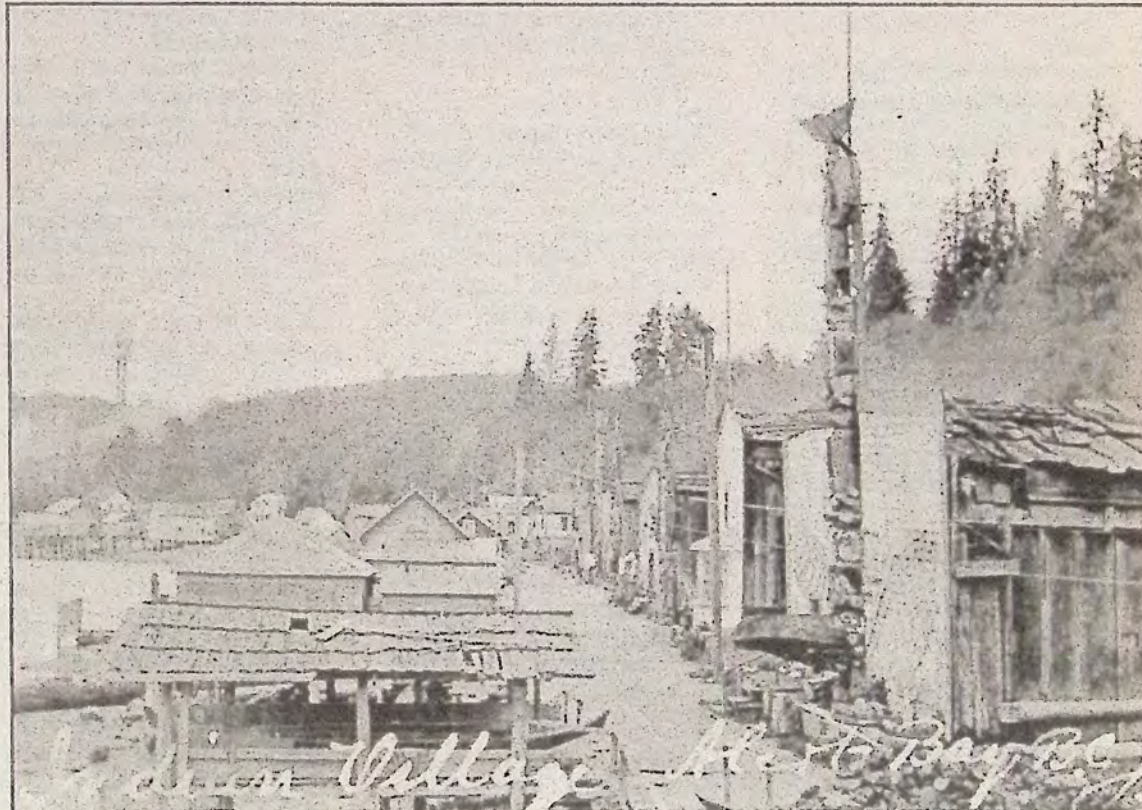

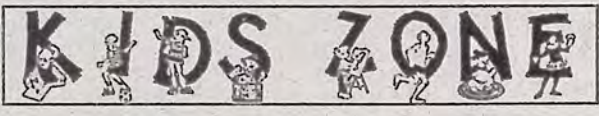

Peter Mitchell, Director of the B.C. Film Commission, was the guest speaker. He talked about the importance of the B.C. Film Commission marketing British

Columbia locations to the major motion picture and television studios and providing excellent location services. 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Local hockey player suffers serious head injury in game

What do Eric Lindros, Paul Karyia and Clay Simmons have in common? They have had head injuries.

Nineteen year old Clay Simmons had his first look at the inside of a CAT Scan machine shortly after being knocked unconscious during a Penticton Panthers hockey game.

On February 20, during a Panthers game against Quesnel, Clay took a hard hit in front of the opposing team's net.

"It was something I never really expected," says Simmons, "He hit me with his stick in my lower right jaw and behind my right ear. It knocked me right out cold. On my way down to the ice, he butt-

ended me, breaking my nose and loosening my teeth. Next thing I knew, I was in the dressing room with a doctor. To date, I don't remember the game at all."

On May 5, at the Lakeside Inn in Penticton, Simmons went before a panel of brain injury experts to help them see first hand the damage that is done if a hockey player with a head injury returns to the game too soon.

Simmons says, "When you can't

go into the lights, watch TV, hop on one foot, do simple subtraction or stop the blinding headaches, you have to really wonder how the brain functions and what signals it sends to tell you it's hurt."

It was over four weeks after the injury before the doctors would allow Simmons to play. Brett Lindros devised a helmet for concussed players as his hockey career was cut short due to multiple concussions.

The brain injury panel is trying to make players realize they cannot force the brain into a speedy recovery. Coaches and players must realize the danger the players face. Instant death is never ruled out.

Simmons was asked if he was scared.

"I was never so scared in my whole life. I didn't know how I'd ever feel good enough to play again, walking around with my

head full of fog and being dizzy."

"I feel great now," Simmons says, "I will really depend on my new helmet and hopefully, ten years from now, some hidden damage won't turn up."

The helmet is a gel-packed Bauer 5000 that Simmons must wear at all times while on the ice.

"I feel I'm one of the lucky ones," Simmons says, "Remember: you have only one head. Take care of it."

Princeton Youth Soccer began last week, although the numbers were down about half from last season. If you are between the ages of 3 to 12, then we have a team for you!

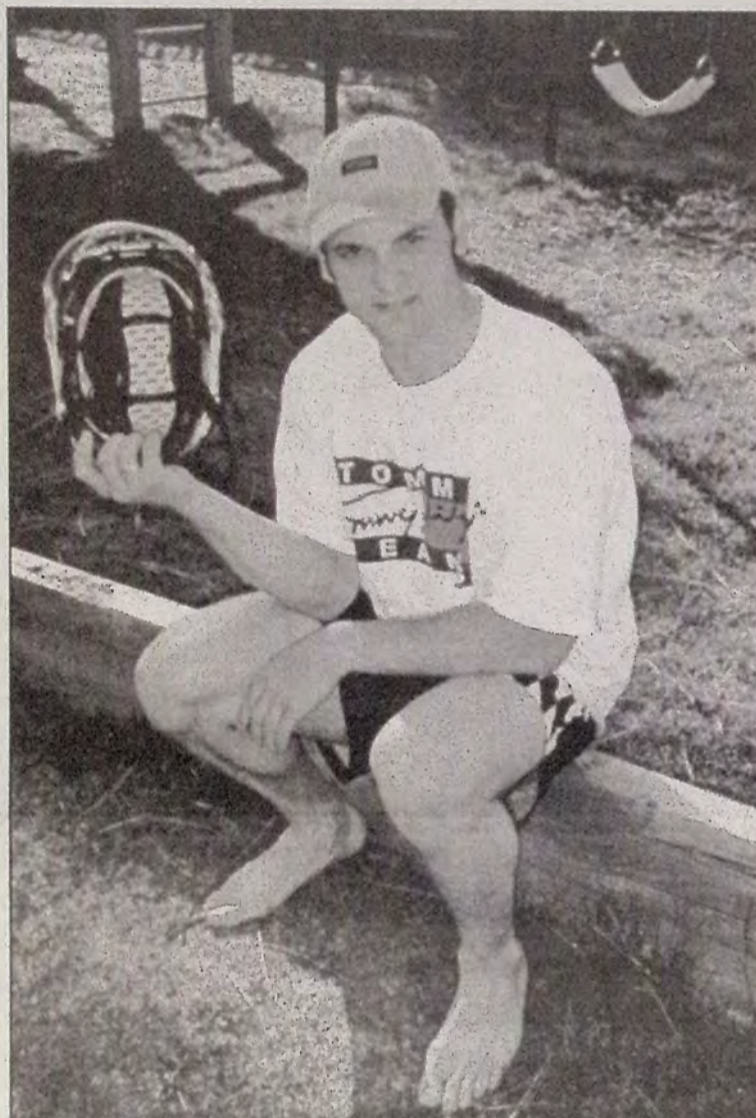

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Travis Tritt makes new beginning

With the 1995 release of his *Greatest Hits — From The Beginning*, Travis Tritt placed an emphatic exclamation mark on the end of an incredible story of musical success. Tritt realized, however, that the collection is more than an end to an era — it is also a new beginning. Fresh starts are hard to come by in the music business, but Travis Tritt has orchestrated just that for the release of his first new studio album in two years, titled *The Restless Kind*.

The Marietta, Georgia native was signed to Warner Bros. Records when an Atlanta promotion man's strong recommendation led executives to see the young singer/songwriter perform. Their investment paid dividends immediately as Tritt's first single,

"Country Club" (which still ranks among his top-selling singles), went Top 10 on the charts in 1989. The album *Country Club* came out in 1990, and songs like "Put Some Drive in Your Country" earned Tritt a reputation as a country singer with one foot

in rock. His next three albums, *It's All About to Change* (1991), *T-R-O-U-B-L-E* (1992) and *Ten Feet Tall and Bulletproof* (1994), brought forth trademark hits like "Here's a quarter (Call Someone Who Cares)", "The Whiskey Ain't Workin'" and "T-R-O-U-B-L-E." Tritt also revealed a tender side to his rowdy exterior with heart-wrenching ballads like "Anymore", "Can I Trust You With My Heart" and "Foolish Pride."

During Fan Fair '96 in Nashville, Warner Bros. Records presented Tritt with a plaque commemorating his "first 14 million in album sales". While many artists would consider that a career unto itself, the phrasing of that statement alludes to the expectations for this new album and for Tritt as an artist.

Tritt is a featured artist for the Merritt Mountain Music Festival on July 16, 17, 18 and 19.

Gold Corp. gains more tonnage at Aspen Grove

Christopher James Gold Corp. has acquired 100 percent interest in the 400 hectare Paycinci claims located at Aspen Grove. The new property is approximately one kilometre directly south of Christopher James Gold's Big Kidd project which the company successfully drilled in November 1997.

The Paycinci's, as outlined in the 1966 B.C. National Mineral Inventory, contain a measured, indicated and inferred reserve of 1.8 million tonnes of one percent copper. These claims include the Cincinnati and Bank of England

crown grants with original work, consisting of open cuts, trenches and a 400 foot tunnel, dating back to 1899.

Christopher James Gold Corp. has three large exploration projects under way in south-central B.C. at this time. The Big Kidd gold-copper porphyry project in Aspen Grove is the company's principal focus with a second drill program being planned with the intention of outlining gold-copper tonnage and initial reserves.

All future samples taken by Christopher James Gold on the Paycinci's will be assayed for their gold values.
