

Thieves hit Princeton Branch of Bank of Commerce

Loader grapples bank, grabs safe

Princeton residents reacted with shock and amusement when they learned that thieves had stolen a 950F Caterpillar grapple loader and smashed through the wall at CIBC to grab the night deposit safe. The sheer audacity of the thieves and the bizarre circumstances brought a laughter response to a serious situation.

Princeton RCMP responded to a complaint at 4:15 a.m. on May 13. Peter Langlois was one of several people who phoned 911 to report criminal activity in downtown Princeton. Langlois works nights, and had left his workplace to go and pick up a snack. He saw the crime in progress. He was shocked and frightened. His first reaction was to find a phone and call police.

The grapple loader had been stolen from TriValley Construction, driven down to Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce, then used to smash through the brick wall and lift the safe through the hole and place it in a burgundy and white (or silver) pick-up truck.

Police believe the truck had been stolen earlier from Bill Vowles, owner of The Hut, a convenience store located on Highway 3 within the town boundaries.

Vowles said he was still in shock from having his truck stolen when police told him it had probably been used in a bank theft. As of Friday afternoon, Vowles had not recovered his truck and police had no idea where it had gone. Vowles estimates the value of the truck at between \$9 and \$10,000.

It is bank policy not to reveal the amount of money lost through theft of the safe, nor the value of the safe itself. The size of the safe is approximately 1.8 metres by 1 m. by 1 m. and is very heavy, more than a tonne in weight.

CIBC branch manager Vern Dobell said the money in the safe would not be a loss to depositors. The bank would cover it in full.

CIBC Princeton remained closed all day on May 14, but was open for business the following day.

Dave Atkinson, who owns the bank building, could not give an estimated cost of damages to the building. The building was insured, and the matter was in the hands of insurance adjusters.

Lali brings welcome gift

Princeton Town Councillors met with Transportation & Highways Minister Harry Lali in Council Chambers Saturday Afternoon.

Lali confirmed a provincial news release stating that Princeton will receive \$150,000 from the Infrastructure Works program to reconstruct and upgrade the damaged portion of Mayne Avenue.

A total of \$31.7 million has been approved for highways province wide. Councillors voiced concern about the Devolution of Tulameen Road, and the deplorable condition of Highway 40 between Princeton and Osprey Lake. Lali said he would take the condition of Highway 40 under advisement.

Mr. Lali was concerned that the proposed Electoral Boundary Restructuring could see Merritt linked with Kamloops and Princeton linked with Penticton, the smaller towns losing their voices to their larger partners in

the riding.

Different implications were discussed around the addition of 6 new seats in Legislature as opposed to no new seats. Lali stated that rural B.C. needs to fight to retain equitable representation. With the addition of six new seats, 2 would go to the interior while 4 seats would go to Vancouver and Surrey.

There is currently a petition located at the 3-Lakes Store, 41km. on Hwy. 40, asking that action be taken regarding the dangerous condition of that road, particularly in view of the fact that the 3-Lakes area is a major tourist destination. RV's, fifth wheels and campers routinely using the road between Princeton and Osprey lake find holes in the road large enough to cause tire blow-outs, or possibly trailers to tip over. Dr. Douglas Reid Profile of a Rural Doctor

Douglas Reid attended the University of St. Andrews Medical School in Scotland from 1963 to 1969. He was active in the University Medical Society, the Students Union, and founded the University Folk Music Club. He was a guitarist and vocalist in a folk group called "The Kelts" and a shooter for the university rifle team, as well as playing rugby for the dental faculty (he says he was a dental student before he saw the light!). He participated in a Royal Naval Medical Cadetship at university and represented the university to the British Medical Students Association.

On graduating in 1969, Dr. Douglas Reid was employed as House Surgeon at Dundee Royal Infirmary before transferring to a house surgeon and house physician post at Royal Naval Hospital in Plymouth, England.

His attachment to the navy led him to a position as Medical Officer with a frigate squadron and duty in the Far East, then fisheries protection in the Arctic.

In 1973, he began training in Ear, Nose and Throat, achieving a diploma in B.N.T. recognized by the College of Physicians and

Foundation Money Goes To Upgrading

Proceeds from the April 25 Foundation fundraiser will help local hospital staff receive upgrading in trauma and cardiac management. At the May 12 meeting, members of the Princeton General Hospital and Ridgewood Lodge Foundation approved \$10,000 for staff education in 1998. The government budget is too tight to allow staff educational courses. Funds from the Foundation will keep Princeton General and Ridgewood staff up to date.

The gala netted \$20,119.27 after the \$3,691.88 expenses were paid. This left the Foundation with \$88,849 in the bank.

Foundation members approved a further \$12,000 expenditure for patient lifts. These will be used to move patients from bed to chair and back again, preventing staff back injuries.

Hospital Administrator Dorothy Cobb had further items on her wish list, but Foundation member Jaymie Atkinson warned against spending too much because the Foundation members had agreed to have a \$60,000 base line.

Atkinson said, "We can't spend it down to zero and have nothing for emergencies."

Others agreed there should be money for emergencies.

The next meeting of the Foundation will be June 9. It will be the final meeting before summer recess.

Dr. Douglas Reid continues to serve the community, and patients at Princeton General Hospital, through general practice and through his specialties.



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PXA looks at land deal

Princeton Exhibition Association has agreed to an offer by the provincial government to add two triangular parcels of land to the existing grounds at Sunflower Downs.

One block is at the west end of the racetrack (where the starting gate usually sits for short races) and the other block is at the east end of the agricultural building, extending along Highway 40 to the road to Rainbow Lake.

In 1993, the PXA had asked for additional land for recreational use, and had requested that the government seriously consider stting aside Swan Lake as a buffer zone and habitat reserve. Town Council supported the request.

The provincial government, after reviewing the request and examining the land, has decided to

make Swan Lake a habitat conservation area, and has offered the other parcels for recreational expansion.

George Elliott, PXA President, says PXA members are pleased with the offer.

"Everyone agreed it was a good plan," Elliott told the News Leader.

The May 12 PXA meeting considered a proposal from a group interested in doing a music festival at Sunflower Downs in August. PXA members discussed rental terms, and will negotiate with the group.


"We are trying to get more groups using the facility," Elliott said, "But they must meet the requirements specified by the Board of Directors."

The Caboose will be moved to a permanent concrete pad this summer. Members agreed upon a location in front of the pump house.

PXA members continue discussions with the Trails group and artisans, who are proposing a trail spur to Sunflower Downs and an artisans village on the grounds.

Allison's young children ferried people across the river in high water in the dugout canoe. In fact they quite often played in it in the small back washes. Most of them couldn't swim and Lieutenant Governor Dewdney, Mrs. Allison's brother-in-law, bawled her out as he thought it was too dangerous for the children to play in. Allison knew enough to perform an autopsy and he found that Judge Hanes had passed on because of a ruptured appendix. In due respect, they made him a coffin. The difficulty was to get him home when there were no roads down the valley, there were only rough horse and cow trails. They finally loaded the coffin in the Allison dugout canoe and Johnny Bromley and Ed Allison took him down the river to Keremeos. At Keremeos, they borrowed a team and wagon and took him over the Fairview

Road - boat, coffin and all to Oliver.

The dugout was used and sunk in a small lake near the town. Years later some divers found the boat, pulled it from the water and exhibited it as an antique. In about 1965 the Oliver Historical club invited my mother to come down and identify it. She said it was the same dugout but it had looked a lot bigger - she was only a little girl when she had ridden in it last.

The dugout is now on display in the Penticton Museum.





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The new Re/Max Balloon will be 10 times the size of the balloon we saw at two of our Fall Fairs and will travel around the world.

Team RE/MAX Attempts Global Balloon Challenge

The RE/MAX balloon logo has become so familiar as a logo but the balloon is real, and this year, it is the biggest balloon the world has ever seen.

Dave Liniger, a pilot and chairman of RE/MAX International, announced May 7 that he and two others will attempt to circumnavigate the globe and break some ballooning records.

In addition to being the first manned balloon flight around the world, Team RE/MAX plans a new ballooning altitude record (130,00 feet). While in flight, the pilots will perform numerous scientific studies (including ozone

measurements and studies of upward lightning), and will communicate in an educational curriculum via Internet accessible through www.remax.com.

Liniger said, "Early this year, we had a team of researchers investigating the idea of my attempting this trip solo. During our research we became aware that the very technology we were looking for had been developed by Bob (Martin) and John (Wallington), but they were in need of additional funding. It seemed logical for us to pool our resources and talents. And, because the RE/MAX organization has almost 90 hot air

balloons, the largest corporate fleet in the world, this mission is a natural for us."

The launch will take place in December from Alice Springs, Australia. The flight is expected to last 16 to 18 days and will return to Alice Springs.

The balloon is filled with 170,000 cubic feet of helium for the launch. The balloon envelope expands to nearly 40 million cubic feet (about 459 feet in diameter) at full cruising altitude. Fully expanded, the balloon envelope could easily contain the entire Houston Astrodome.

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

Stars Shine in Merritt

Fresh from his 1996 triumph "Time Marches On", Atlantic recording artist Tracy Lawrence continues to mine country success with his sixth release, "The Coast is Clear."

"The Coast is Clear" is the latest ornament on a career that has taken this versatile artist to new heights with each successive project. Raised in Foreman, Arkansas, Tracy drew from a rich musical heritage which included such Southern rockers as Lynyrd Skynyrd and ZZ Top as well as country traditionalists George Strait and Merle Haggard.



Spadefoot Concert Almost Bombs

On a lovely Tuesday evening, a group of 13 naturalists climbed Baldy Mountain to drink in the music of Great Basin Spadefoot Toads calling for their mates. But the concert was rather a bust, since only three males were heard to give voice, almost drowned out by their more musical cousins the Western Tree Frogs.

Spadefoots are rather rare in British Columbia, but there is supposed to be a thriving colony on Baldy. They are champion diggers, hence their name, although they are said to spend a lot of time in pocket gopher holes. The guidebook says that their tadpoles will eat almost anything, so extreme care is advised when wandering near their lairs. The adults reach a length of almost three inches, and look very much like an ordinary toad, except for golden eyes and red warts on a grey hide. The guidebook says their call is a 'loud, long, low-pitched quack', rather like that of a bored mallard duck, but to me it sounds like the opening of a very rusty hinge - not musical at all.

But Tuesday was not their night to howl, at least while we were listening. We did find one dead toad, exhausted by croaking - or making love.

Nevertheless, the scenery was spectacular, with a glowing sunset, and a lightning storm hovering over the mountains to the south of Princeton.

Trout Talk

Lines, knots and hooks

No matter how expensive the rod and reel, when it comes right down to it, it is how good your line, knot and hook are. These three things spell the difference between landing or losing your fish.

I mentioned before using lighter test lines to have better results fishing (and catching!). If you are spin casting, a 6# or 8# line is probably as light as you should start with, then gradually, as you gain confidence, work down to a 4# test for lake fishing. No matter what weight line you use, buy premium quality. It is a good idea to put on a fresh line each spring. Monofilament is weakened by the rays of the sun, by exposure to chemicals, and by the general wear and tear of fishing. A few dollars spent each year is good insurance.

The weakest link in the line, knot and hook set is the knot. Whenever you bend or kink the line or fly leader, you weaken it. I have seen figures saying that some knots, such as the half-hitch or the infamous granny knot, will weaken a line from 6# to 3# test.

There are many good knots, such as the Turle, Palomar and Jam Knot. The Jam Knot, also known as the Clinch Knot, is my favourite. It is easily tied, and can be tied in the dark. I've had to do this a few times, as fishing always seems best just at dusk, and this "do it in the dark" feature can be really handy.

A trick you might try when tying knots at dusk is to hold the hook so the eye is silhouetted against the sky, or moon if you are really out late. If you are not familiar with the Jam Knot, you can find

directions on how to tie it on many line boxes, or inside the box, on the directions sheet enclosed. (I would be happy to show you how to tie the Jam Knot.)

There is another knot which you should avoid at all costs. It will weaken your line or fly leader by 50 percent also. It is called the Wind Knot. It ties itself, no assistance needed. It usually shows up in the first two feet (60 cm) of your line or leader. I have lost a lot of fish due to the Wind Knot. Check the last few feet of your line or leader every so often. You can run the leader through your fingertips. It will bump through your fingers. Cut off the line or leader above the Wind Knot. Don't try to untie it. The damage is done!

The last part of this trio is the hook. Keep it sharp. Buy good hooks such as Mustad, Eagle Claw and Gamakatsu. The difference in cost between a cheap hook and a good hook is about 12 cents! When you figure all the time and effort put into a fishing trip, is it really worth it to use a cheap hook? If you tie your own flies, here is a rule of thumb to remember. Use light wire hooks for your dry flies, like the Tom Thumb and Mosquito. They will float better. For wet flies and Nymphs, use heavy wire hooks - often 3XL long work best. These flies, such as the Doc Spratley and Idaho Nymph, are intended to sink.

Hope these ideas and tips will help you on this year's fishing trip. Good fishing.


"If anyone has any ideas for recreational programs, I'd sure like to hear from them," McLean told the News Leader.

and have been selling ducks at \$5.00 per duck to half-quacked Princeton residents who believe in duck races (any races) during Racing Days.



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

and knowledge.

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
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
