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Council refuses road

Town Council will not accept Tulameen Road as a 'devolution' gift from the provincial government. Councillor George Armstrong introduced a motion to write to the Minister of Highways and say the Town of Princeton will not accept responsibility for the six kilometre stretch of Tulameen Road within town boundaries due to the present condition of the road and the probable repairs needed. Council supported the motion unanimously. Armstrong gave liability as his major reason for refusing the road, as it is falling into a backyard and poses a liability problem to the municipality should it cause major damage. Armstrong said the Town of Princeton would agree to do emergency repairs only.

Racer breaks leg in barrels

Paula McLean was seriously injured in Cache Creek on May 31 when her horse lost footing in a barrel race. The ground gave way as McLean rounded the barrel. Her mare went down heavily and McLean's left leg was under the mare's belly. As the mare righted herself, Paula was hung up. Her leg twisted and both bones in her lower leg broke.

Paula was taken by ambulance to hospital, but first she was carried around on a stretcher board by a group of cowboys, as they tried to find a warm dry place for her to wait for the ambulance.

"They were so gentle," McLean says, "When the ambulance guys arrived, I wished it was still the cowboys carrying me."

McLean was examined in the local hospital, then transferred to Kamloops on Sunday evening. She underwent surgery on Monday, June 1, when a steel plate was placed on bone to ensure proper healing.

She returned home last week to enough bouquets for a wedding.

Mayor claims Health care 'burnt fingers'

Mayor Randy McLean claims "everybody has burnt fingers on this", referring to the rural health care issue. He had heard about the matter at Regional District.

"The media has to point out they're doing the best they can," Mayor McLean said of RDOS and Regional Health Board, "The system is under strain."

Mayor McLean recommended, "People have to get together and make the public, and Victoria, aware that health comes first."

He had dire predictions for Princeton.

"Princeton is at the end of the loop. We're going to be the worst off."

He urged people to attend meetings and go to Victoria to rally if necessary.

"I believe that's where the problem starts -- the funding," he said.

Lali brings money for Princeton

Minister of Highways Harry Lali met with Mayor Randy McLean and Councillors Kathy Clement and Dan Sulentic on Saturday afternoon, June 6, to present cheques totalling \$280,073 from the Ministry of Municipal Affairs. The funding represents a Small Community Protection Grant of \$160,000 and an Equalization Grant of \$120,073 for 1998. Despite the economic pressures currently facing the province, these grants have been protected and continued for this year.

Lali was pleased there has been no erosion of funding for small communities.

Trails committee calls public meeting

An important first meeting of the interested groups and individuals who expressed an interest in the Kettle Valley rail bed to Trans Canada Trail will be held this coming Wednesday, June 10, at 7:00 p.m. at the arena mezzanine (upstairs).

This meeting is open to all people who are interested in assisting in the ongoing future development of this project as a recreation corridor.

This meeting will explore and formulate the organization structure that will drive the project forward and serve as the management group who will continue discussions with the Crown for the use of the rail bed as part of the Trans Canada Trail.

Possible formation of a registered Society will be discussed as well as other options.

Lali praised the efforts of local Council and staff.

"Without the efforts of Mayor McLean, Council and staff, who are constantly putting forward the case of Princeton and Mayor McLean, who has met with me in Victoria to discuss the many issues facing the town, it would be difficult to keep the funding going."

Lali went on to explain that there are many pressures on the provincial budget these days and that Mayor McLean and Council work hard to keep Princeton in the picture.

"We work together in Yale-Lillooet to define the issues and keep them in front of the appropriate ministry in Victoria."

Lali, who was in town to attend the 1998 graduation ceremonies at Princeton Secondary School, said that it was his desire to see the system continue to work well for the children of today's grads.

Discussion turned to the electoral boundaries commission, with the clear statements being made by Princeton, Cache Creek and Ashcroft residents opposing the idea of breaking up Interior ridings so as to add MLAs to coastal areas.

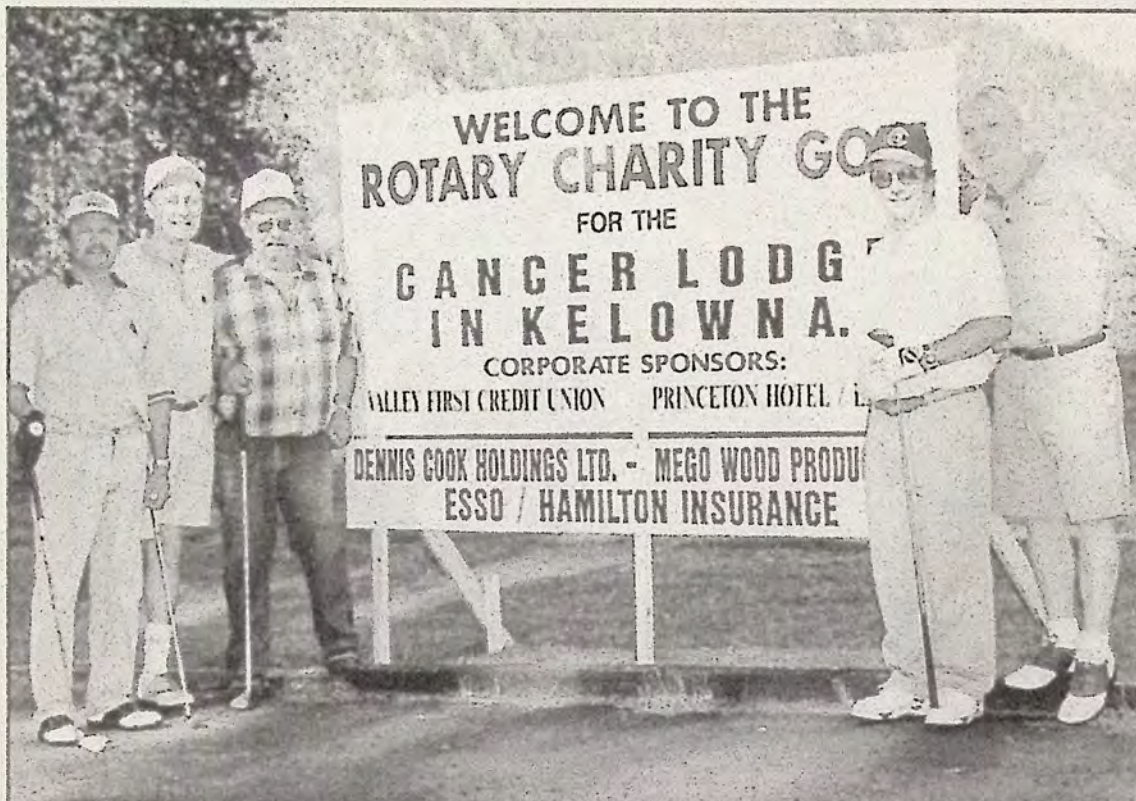
Lali said, "The commission is hearing from people who do not want any MLAs removed from the Interior. They are not opposed to more MLAs for the more populated areas, but they do not want to lose any from the Interior."

Princeton RCMP responded to a single vehicle accident 26 km. south of Aspen Grove on Highway 5A on June 4. The driver of a 1997 Chev Tahoe lost control while rounding a sharp turn. The vehicle was heading toward Princeton.

The vehicle went into Gulliford Lake and was immediately submerged. Numerous attempts by highway workers and Merritt RCMP failed to save the lone driver.

Shelley Lynn Bassett, age 36, of Merritt, was pronounced dead at

the scene.

RCMP continue the investigation, but speed appears to have been a factor in the mishap.

Drunk driver pays

Kevin Scott McKellar, of Penticton, appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on June 4 to plead guilty to a drunk driving charge laid on April 21.

A breath test yielded "extremely high" readings, according to Crown Counsel Vern Frolick.

McKellar was ordered to pay a \$500 fine plus \$50 victim surcharge, and is prohibited from driving anywhere in Canada for six months.

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Mayor opposes lazy summer

Mayor Randy McLean voiced his opposition a motion to have only one Town Council meeting per month in July and August. Mayor McLean noted the item appeared on the agenda of the June 1 Council meeting, but he had not put it there and did not know who had done it.

Dan Sulentic said he did not put it on the agenda, but he did vote in favour of the motion.

Councillor Kathy Clement waffled on it during discussion, saying "other clubs recess during the summer". She asked what past practice had been. Mayor McLean told her Council had always met regularly during the summer months.

Mayor McLean said, "I believe two meetings a month are necessary to run the municipality."

The motion was defeated. Council will meet on the first and third Monday of July and August, as usual.

What do they want?

The Pit, Princeton's centre for youth, may not have a future. It certainly has a past.

The Pit was created because our local youth said they needed some kind of place to gather. The community gave them that place, furniture, appliances, computer, music equipment, games equipment (including a pool table). Now it seems strange that our local young people do not want to go there.

The Pit was the outcome of two years' effort by a number of local people concerned about the use of drugs among youth and drunk underage people.

The Youth Action Force, as the community group called themselves, did a survey to find out what youth wanted. There were plenty of complaints from youth, who claimed the community cared nothing for them, that they were a forgotten group, that everything was for very young or very old people. They said they had no place to go and nothing in town to do. So the community built them a place to go with things to do, and now they are not interested in going there and doing things.

Is this the whole picture? The word around town is that The Pit is a place where the "uncool" kids hang out, so nobody who is "cool" wants to go there. First, maybe we should try to define "cool". This editorial will not attempt to make that definition. Our young people will have to find their own definition of "cool".

Whether our young people use The Pit or stay away, we can now say to them, "The community cared enough about young people to raise the money, do the work, find the building, pay for the heat and lights, donate the furniture and volunteer their time to create a place for you."

We believe the future of The Pit is not a problem for adults to solve. We believe it is a problem for youth to address. We believe it is up to the youth of Princeton to decide whether The Pit is worth having or should be shut down.

PWP: a quarter century of success

Princeton Wood Preservers Ltd., known locally as PWP, is celebrating a quarter century of doing business in Princeton, B.C. Located 18 kilometres east of the town of Princeton, the fully integrated mill was established in 1973 as a manufacturer of round-wood products pressure-treated with wood preservative chemicals. PWP supplies the agricultural and horticultural industries of British Columbia and the Northwestern United States with posts, rails, poles, tree stakes, and landscape materials.

Ideally suited to maximize the utilization of small diameter pine considered as waste wood by many other forest products industries, PWP struggled for years to access sufficient volumes of timber, never knowing from year to year whether it had a wood supply or not.

Purchased by Bill Everitt in 1993, PWP teamed up with the Upper Similkameen Indian Band to acquire a jointly held, 15 year forest license with an annual harvest of 30,000m³ of timber. The alliance formed with the Princeton Weyerhaeuser sawmill for the management of the forest license, and trade/purchase agreements with the mill and the Town of Princeton have put a decidedly community slant to this business enterprise that has grown from 20 employees in 1993 to 28 full-time employees today. PWP is now one of the largest manufacturers of pressure-treated post and rail products in British Columbia.

"PWP is a foundation of the Princeton industrial base," says owner and Managing Director Bill Everitt, "Many local businesses, schools, charitable organizations, youth sport and community groups

depend on our annual sponsorship and patronage. We are proud of our contributions to the social and economic development of the Town of Princeton."

With its timber supply

addressed and its traditional markets secure, PWP is planning to branch out into further manufactured products made possible through the acquisition of specialized processing equipment

expected in the fall of 1998. The new products are expected to add higher value to PWP's existing product lines targeting niche markets in British Columbia, United States and Europe, and resulting

in opportunities for increased employment in 1999.

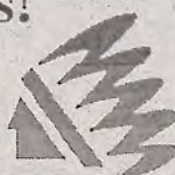

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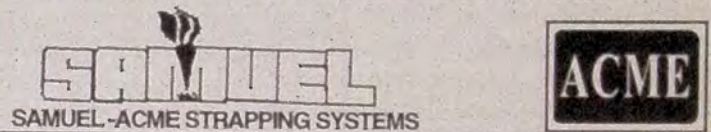

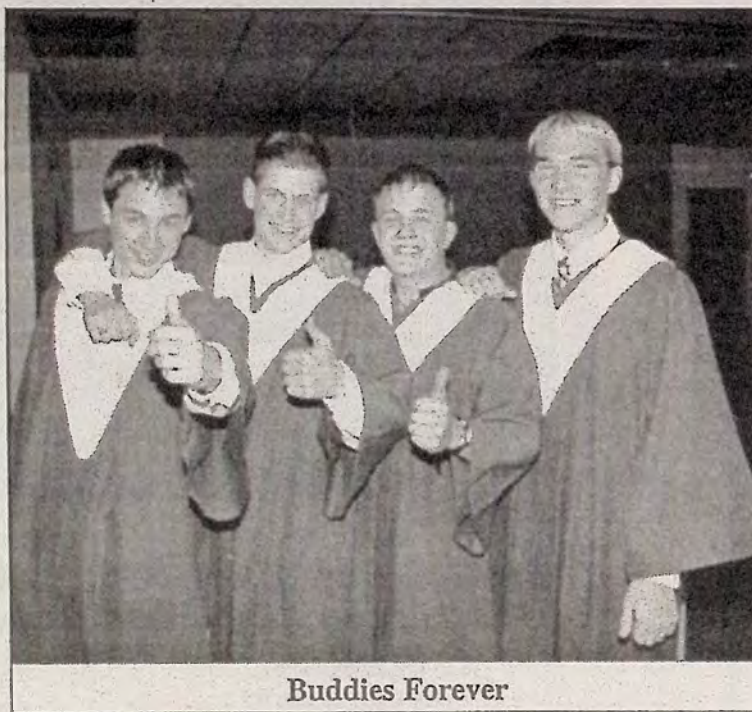
They went on to compare life to a box of crayons, pointing out their diversity, differences, and similarities all combine to create a wonderful work of art.

Start saving now for your children's education

Are you hoping your children will get a higher education someday? Well, get ready for a shock. When you consider everything, the total cost for a diploma/degree can be terrifying. In fact, the 1995-96 student budget prepared by the Canadian Federation of Students allocates \$8,890 for tuition, books, rent and food. Assuming inflation continues at 3% per year, a four-year undergraduate degree in 2015 will cost more than \$67,000!

Moreover, the potential for government cutbacks and tuition costs constantly rising means fewer loans available. Should this trend continue, many students will not be able to afford a post-secondary education. Only the wealthy, those on scholarships and children whose parents

planned ahead will be able to afford the costs of getting a degree.

How will you pay for your kids' education? You have three choices: You can pay before, during or after they are in school. By taking out loans, you will have to repay the loan after - an expensive proposition. If you pay during, you will have to cope with the costs over a few years - not easy when you have normal living expenses to pay. This leaves one sensible option: Begin saving now.

can generally transfer the fund to another eligible full-time student or your RSP (if you have available contribution allowance).

You can contribute up to \$4,000 each year to an RESP with a lifetime limit of \$42,000 for each beneficiary. As of January 1, 1998, the government will give you a grant of 20% (\$400) on the first \$2,000!!!

If you make only a \$95 contribution to an RESP each month and receive an average annual compounding rate of return of 10% for 18 years, you will earn about enough money to cover one child's education (including the government's 20% grant). In addition, it will have cost you only \$20,520 (with a total government grant of \$4,100). So start now and invest regularly - it is a much cheaper way to pay for your kids' education.

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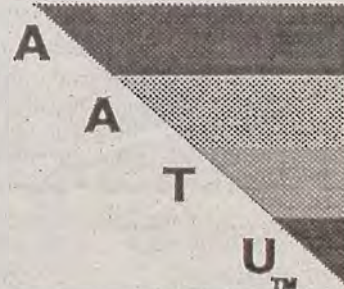

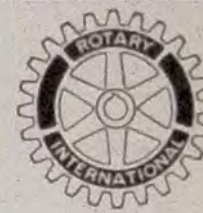

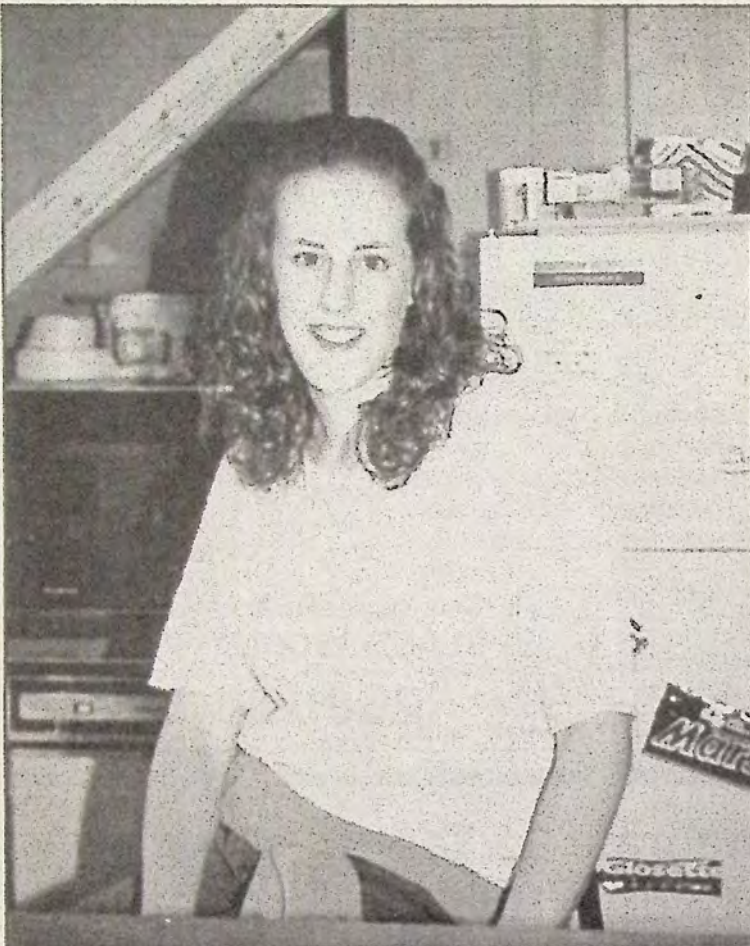

The Pit needs a future

The Pit, a place for Princeton's young people to gether, is open for the summer, but the longterm future of The Pit is in doubt.

Tari Clarke, The Pit Co-ordinator, will organize activities for the summer months, but she has concerns about what will happen when summer is over. The number of young people using The Pit has declined sharply since last year.

There will be a meeting of The Pit Force Committee to help decide The Pit's future. The meeting is at 7:00 p.m., Tuesday, June 9, at the secondary school library. It is open to the public.

Clarke will become involved in fundraising activities, beginning with a yard sale at Princeton

Plaza parking lot on June 20, 10:00 a.m. to ?

Other concerns come from failure of support staff to show up. The Pit cannot be open without an adult in a supportive role.

Clarke wants to attract some support staff, and she wants to find out what activities Princeton's young people would like to see at The Pit. If she has a clear idea of what young people want, she can organize activities around what they want.

Summer recreation programs will utilize The Pit, and there will be Tuesday night movies. Perhaps there will be pool games on other evenings, depending on the interest shown by youth.

Armstrong will quit RHB

Councillor George Armstrong will not seek another appointment to Regional Health Board this fall. He informed Town Council on June 1 that the Minister of Health will appoint new directors to RHB, and Armstrong will not be among them.

A retired teacher, Armstrong has served Princeton, and Town Council, on the Community Health Council until it was dismantled by the Minister of Health. He served on the Board of Directors for Princeton General Hospital until that Board was taken over by the Ministry of Health, then continued to serve as a member of the Community Health Advisory Committee. He has worked for several years as the health advisor to Town Council. Armstrong has been a volunteer on the various boards,

which have consumed a great deal of his time and energy.

Armstrong told Council the community 'will go through a process' to select a replacement for him on the Regional Health Board, but he could not define the process at this point. He suggested that the community would be asked to put a name forward for appointment by the Minister.

Library will close for week

Princeton Public Library will be closed from June 22 to 27 for the installation of a new carpet. The entire stock of books and equipment must be moved for this project, so there will be no service during the week. Books may be returned through the book drop

4-H receives provincial leader training grant

4-H Provincial Council received a provincial government grant totalling \$73,000. Corky Evans, Minister of Agriculture and Food, announced the grant on June 4.

Provincial funding supports skill development programs for 4-H members and volunteers, including leadership training, agriculture awareness and farm safety. Government funding helps 4-H maintain a central office in Kamloops and employ and executive director.

The provincial government has supported 4-H since 1914.

Judge orders peace bond

On June 4, in Provincial Court in Princeton, Trevor William Snihur agreed to a \$500 peace bond with no surety and no deposit, effective for 12 months, with conditions for alcohol abuse counselling and anger management counselling. In addition, a firearms prohibition has been imposed on Snihur for the next five years, except for the purpose of hunting big game in hunting season providing Snihur has a license. Further, he is to have no contact with the complainant. This ruling was made in recognition of Snihur's contribution to the family food supply as a result of his hunting.
