

One day may be last blast for Racing Days

Racing Days will be just one day this year: Sunday, June 28.

George Elliott, President of Princeton Racing Days Association, made the announcement at a meeting held June 18 at Sunflower Downs.

The reason for the single day is the lack of horses available for two days of races, the same reason Racing Days ran only one day last year. There are only 90 horses on the circuit. For a two day event, we would need nearly dou-

ble that number, as a percentage of available horses will always be unfit on any particular day.

The B.C. Horse Racing Commission controls the number of races, and will not allow less than five per day. If Princeton

chose to run five per day, the Department of Agriculture would charge them for eight races anyway. The Racing Commission did not recommend this solution to Princeton, and the Racing Days Association did not feel they had

enough money to run two small days. They need \$32,000 to put on the races, and sponsorships are down this year. Pledges for sponsorships are coming in slowly. In terms of money in the bank, the Racing Days account is less than half of what it should be this close to the deadline.

"Everything is down this year," said Past President Laurie Currie. "Sometimes people don't see what we're trying to do for the community."

More people are needed at the admission gate and in the pari-mutuels. Anyone wishing to put in a couple of hours, please call Carol Ruoss at 295-7891.

Admission at the gate will be \$2, children 12 and under are free. Free child care will be offered in a supervised play and games area.

Chamber tells Town Council about progress

Ernie Willis, President of Princeton and District Chamber of Commerce, appeared before Town Council on June 15 to report on Chamber activities.

"The Trade Show was a great success," Willis said. "People have booked for next year."

The Chamber has hired three students for summer work: Meghan Barrie, Luke Smith and Alan Lawes.

A new project has been assigned to Dave Anderson and Wen Wong. They will study the down-

town commercial sign bylaw and make recommendations for changes to allow perpendicular signs and neon signs.

Chamber is constructing a kiosk near the Chamber building. The sign on Highway 3 between The Hut and the curling rink has been removed, and will be placed in the new kiosk.

Willis congratulated Council on the decision to put a promotional sign between Hope and Chilliwack to direct traffic toward Princeton.

The Northwest Classic bike ride for clean air will arrive July 29. Willis told Council that Chamber is providing some assistance to the group, who will camp here overnight. The Lions Club is planning a breakfast.

Chamber is beginning work on Moonlight Madness, and is putting together information for a community video for trade fairs. This would be an endless loop video, with an estimated cost of \$2,000 per minute to create. Chamber is trying to find a way to fund the project.

Jobs leave town with ambulance

Justin Smith, who has worked with Princeton's ambulance service, attended the June 15 Town Council meeting to call Council's attention to the ambulance situation. He made Council aware that jobs are being lost locally while other communities are doing the work.

Smith explained to Council that calls are being lost to Keremeos, where two vehicles are staffed, compared with just one vehicle for Princeton.

Smith appealed to Council to support having more local people employed with the ambulance service here, pointing out that there are attendants transferred in to do temporary duty.

Smith gave Council a summary of ambulance activity for May, showing Princeton had lost 10 calls due to having only one ambulance crew. The statistics showed that, on 15 days in May, Princeton had only one ambulance available, and seven days on which the second ambulance was

available for only half a day. Smith's statistics showed there are five local attendants and 12 non-local attendants. He pointed out that non-local attendants do not know the geography of the area as well as local people.

Smith pointed out the health hazard of not having two ambulances manned 24 hours a day. If an ambulance must be called from

Keremeos, it is 45 minutes away. If it must go further, to Tulameen, for example, the travel time is greater, and hardly constitutes a suitable response to an emergency.

Councillors expressed concern that there is a problem. They believed they had dealt with it and solved it last year. Council plans to contact the regional supervisor to discuss the matter with him.

Weyerhaeuser Bantams bested Kelowna two games out of three to write their ticket to the finals in Victoria on July 3, 4 and 5.

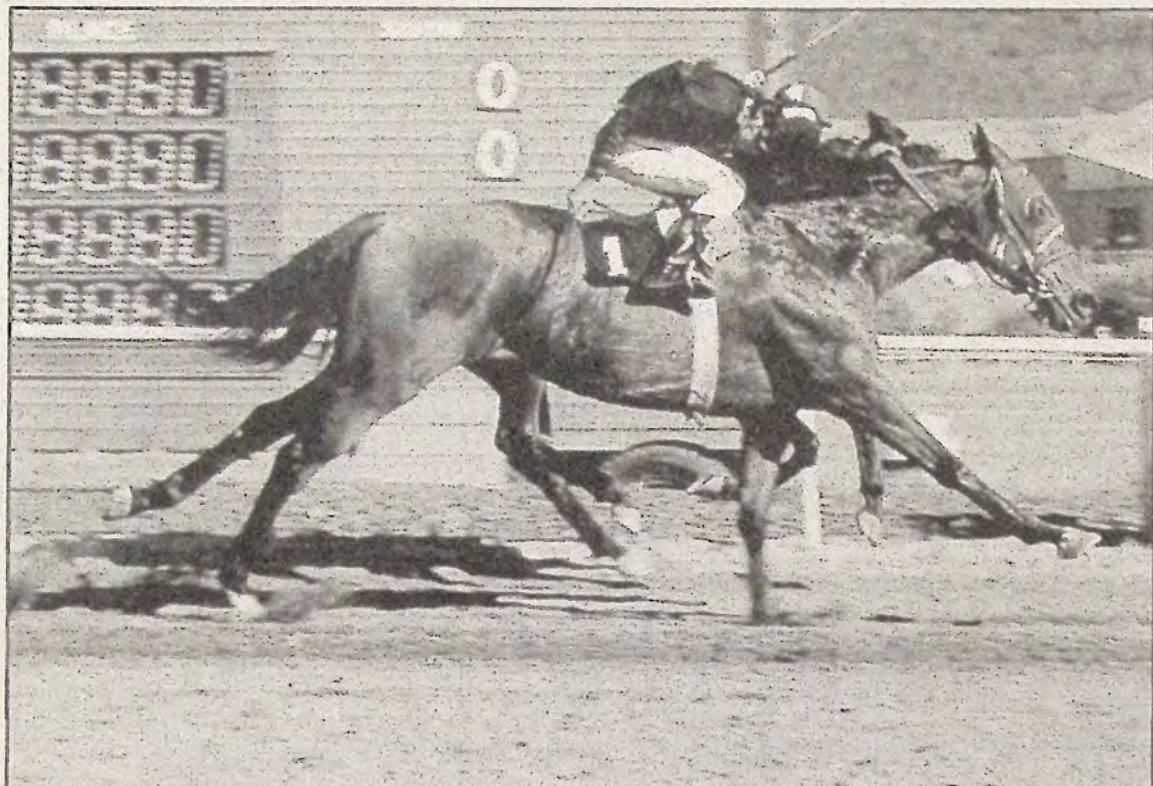

Local horse, High Technology was only triple crown winner

High Technology is the only horse to have won the Racing Days Triple Crown: The Luke Gibson Memorial, Similkameen Cup and Tulameen Cup.

Birch Lake Stables, owned by the Powell family of Princeton, was purchased at Racing Days in 1985 from the Clyde family of Vancouver. Later that day, High Technology broke the track record winning the Luke Gibson Memorial.

The following year, "High technology" was engraved on the Similkameen Cup in another record-breaking race.

In 1987, High Technology broke the track record again to win the Tulameen Cup.

In the history of Princeton Racing Days, High Technology stands out as one of the great race **Canada Day:**

They decided on horse racing, because horses and racing were a tradition here. Princeton had been through a long period of economic downturn. It was a dying community as people left for jobs elsewhere. Racing Days would bring people back here.

The heart and soul of Racing Days is not the races, it is the people who want to have fun and celebrate being part of a great place to live. There have been problems in the past few years with finding enough horses for a weekend of racing. Perhaps Racing Days has run its last horse race, but the main thing to remember is that Racing Days is about promoting our area. We can change to some other kind of event if horse racing is no longer the way to go.

One of the suggestions we heard was "let's race llamas!" Why not? Why not bicycle races, foot races, mule races, or any other kind of races? We have the track, the grandstand and the facilities the public requires. Perhaps what we need is a vision of some new kind of activity, some new way to promote ourselves, and some new way to have fun.

If Racing Days is not possible in the future, the loss will be greater to the community than merely the loss of horse racing. Through the concession stand, sweepstakes tickets, Las Vegas Night and the pancake breakfast, Rotarians, Lions members and other groups have raised money to keep their organizations going through the rest of the year. The majority of money raised by these organizations is spent to benefit local people.

We give credit to all of the people who have, in the past, made Racing Days an outstanding success, one of the most successful community celebrations anywhere. For thirty-four years, Racing Days has been the starring celebration of the year, and could not have been done without all of us.

Liberals complain about B.C. parks

Dear Editor;

Since the Canada Day long weekend is fast approaching, I believe that the many British Columbians who will be venturing out with their families for a traditional camping holiday should know the following.

Since 1992, more than 200 new parks have been added to the provincial park system. B.C. now has 645 parks covering over 10 percent of British Columbia. Despite this dramatic increase in park space, the number of visitors to B.C. parks has declined significantly over the past several years. In 1997 there were 1.4 million fewer visitors to B.C. parks than in 1994.

How could this be? The answer is that the NDP is failing to look after B.C.'s parks.

To add insult to injury, the NDP reduced campsite maintenance and host programs in the last budget. This shortsighted measure will undoubtedly result in higher incidences of vandalism, safety risks for tourists and a substantial decrease in the quality of park visits.

Instead of acknowledging that there is a major problem with park management and development in this province, all the NDP has done is try to cover up the problem by announcing the creation of 1,500 new campsites. As with so many things the NDP does, this response suggests that it fails to see parks as anything more than a public relations exercise. This is unac-

ceptable.

What we need are management plans and government policies that ensure social and economic benefits go to adjacent communities. We also need to ensure that visitors' experience in our parks convinces them to spread the word about "Beautiful B.C.". Until the NDP realizes the seri-

ousness of this problem, visits to B.C. parks will continue the downward trend - to the detriment of communities throughout B.C.

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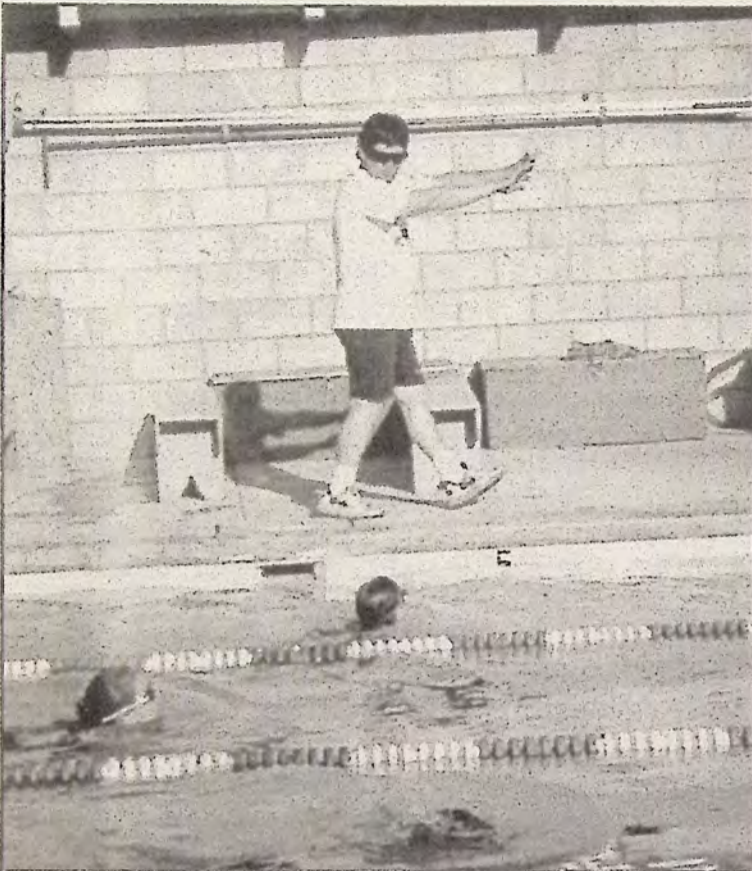

Arena faces costly repair

Princeton and District Arena Board of Management met June 9 and planned expenditures to repair and replace equipment. The condenser could fail at any time. It is old and undersized. An opportunity exists to purchase a used condenser of suitable age and size for \$25,000. The Board decided to buy it.

The arena roof has been leaking due to corrosion problems. The Board believes high humidity inside the area may be the cause, and decided to buy a de-humidifier at a cost of \$2,500. This may protect the roof for another year, and serve until the arena is paid for. There is a paint-on sealant which can be used to help protect the roof.

A new roof would cost around \$100,000 and the Board would have to go to referendum. The Board is considering such a referendum for the 1999 civic elections.

Hart holds Justice Portfolio

OTTAWA - Preston Manning, Leader of the Official Opposition is pleased to announce that Jim Hart, Member of Parliament for Okanagan-Coquihalla, has been appointed Official Opposition Chief Justice Critic, effective immediately.

"If Anne McLellan thought the Opposition turned up the heat in Justice during the past year, just wait until Jim gets his opportunity in the Fall", said Manning. "Jim has held some of the highest profile portfolios since he came to Ottawa in 1993. He will not only represent his constituents well, but will look after the concerns of all Canadians in regard to important justice issues."

Five years ago, Hart first represented the constituents of Okanagan-Similkameen-Merritt. During this time he served as critic for National Defence and Veterans Affairs before taking on the role of Question Period Co-ordinator after his re-election in 1997. Hart has constantly battled with Solicitor General Andy Scott on deficiencies that exist within the parole system and has introduced several motions to the House of Commons that seek to address deficiencies within the justice system.

Hart will now have the opportunity to tackle justice issues on a full-time basis.

"I am looking forward to sinking my teeth into new Young Offenders Act legislation that will likely be table this fall," said Hart. "I will also be working with members of Reform's Justice team toward the elimination of conditional sentencing for serious or violent offenders and I will make crime prevention programs and early detection a priority."

Hart is pleased to be working with the following members of the Official Opposition's Justice team: Chuck Cadman, Surrey North; Jim Gouk, West Kootenay-

Okanagan; Jay Hill, Prince George-Peace River; and Randy White, Langley-Abbotsford. Also under the umbrella of the Justice portfolio is the Solicitor General. Jim Abbot, Kootenay-Columbia will be taking on those duties along with Alan Kerpan, Blackstrap

One of Hart's first moves was to criticize the Justice Minister, on June 17, for not making changes to the criminal code to allow the decriminalization of marijuana for medicinal use.

Hart said, "To process, charge

and convict people for medicinal use of marijuana is a blatant waste of limited resources."



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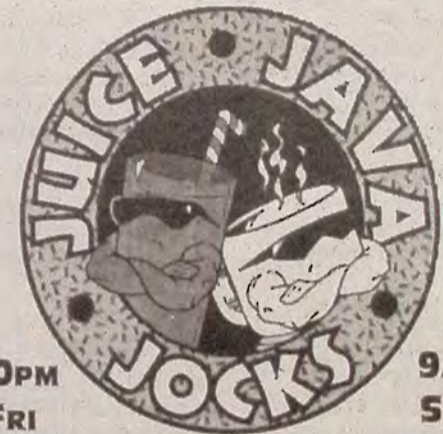
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Crash and burn injures local pair

Marriage and romance

June is the month of brides. It brings to mind the story of 16 year old Terry, who lived high in the mountains of central Europe following World War I.

Terry was leaning by the doorway of the house apprehensively awaiting the arrival of her future husband, selected by their parents. She thought to herself, if she didn't like him she would run away, but as she said years later, the country was in turmoil and destitute: there was no place to run. Bill, her future husband was instructed to marry by his war-wounded father, who felt he would not survive for long and this would place too heavy a burden on Bill's mother and the rest of the family. There was no pension. The arranged marriage took place.

Terry cried during most of the wedding day. Finally, Bill took her aside and said, "Look, I know you had a boyfriend just as I had a girlfriend, but this doesn't look so good and we have to make the best of it."

Two weeks later, Bill's father passed away. As was the custom, Bill was given several acres of land for his wedding gift, not enough to make a living. Terry's dowry consisted of several household items, 10 chickens, one pig with eight piglets, and one cow. They resided with Bill's mother. Shortly thereafter, Bill was suc-

cessful in emigrating to Canada to work on a "homestead" farm. Terry followed later with their little boy. Unfortunately, the boy died near age one year. They had a little girl, but before the child reached her first birthday, she died.

Canada was strange with its customs and language, there was no ESL or welfare, but they were extremely grateful to be in Canada and persevered.

In southern Saskatchewan, Bill learned how to mine coal underground with a pick and shovel and hand-pushed coal car. When the depression arrived, Bill quit the mine, the earning price the miner produced dropped to 25 cents per ton. Later, there was a very bad strike at the mine. Bill decided to ride the boxcars to B.C. where he got a job as a hardrock miner in a gold mine. He worked for two weeks on trial. He qualified, so was eligible for one week's pay. Terry followed later and their family increased.

Finally, after five years, the long awaited day came when they were to get their citizenship papers.

The citizenship authorities would have deported Bill if he had not been able to prove he was not involved in the strike at the Saskatchewan coal mine.

Such were some of the trials Terry and Bill endured but also, with the good times, it brought

them together. If one of them received a hurt, the other would silently suffer more. They were inseparable.

Bill was the head of the family, Terry was the boss. She could never understand why women wanted to be like men when she felt women had their own unique and distinct station in life. Booze, womanizing, maninizing, was not a problem with them. Mutual respect, gentleness, their faith which they practiced quietly and privately, offered them purpose, direction and hope, and, in their later years, consolation.

Terry often mentioned the importance of biting the tongue instead of saying something to Bill. Sometimes, she said, her tongue got a bit sore. No doubt Bill practiced the same wisdom. As time went by, the hard work and conditions took their toll on Bill's health.

Terry, who had spent several decades as a cleaning maid in the student nurse's residence at the New Westminster Royal Columbia Hospital, had lost the vision in one eye. Later, she developed cataracts in the other eye and the operation to restore her sight failed. She became totally blind. Despite their failings, up until their last days, they could always be seen walking arm-in-arm, experiencing their romance in full bloom.

Pub brawl ends in court

On June 18, in Provincial Court in Princeton, two local men entered guilty pleas to charges of causing a disturbance. John Paul Dore and William Arthur Lindley, both age 30, had been involved in what Crown Counsel described as a "brawl" on June 30, 1997, at a local watering hole.

Lindley, Dore and Martin O'Bea were in the pub and O'Bea approached the table at which Lindley, Dore and their wives were sitting. An issue arose between Dore and O'Bea. They went outside to fight.

A pub employee saw the fight developing and yelled at them, but to no effect. Lindley punched O'Bea in the head twice, which, according to the employee, did not seem to bother O'Bea.

At this point, Dore became involved in the attack on O'Bea and was knocked down an embankment, but returned to the fracas.

Several women became involved in the fight. One was injured and another had two front teeth knocked out.

The men involved in the fight turned their attention to what was happening with the women and decided to go back into the pub. Two police officers arrived at the

scene and one tried to prevent the three men from going back into the pub. All three men, and the police officer, fell into the pub through the entry way.

Lindley was pulled out of the melée, but O'Bea and Dore continued to fight, and Lindley turned on the pub owner, grabbing him by the throat and threatening to choke him.

Lindley's lawyer said Lindley was most concerned about his pregnant wife, who was due to have a child any day. He had seen the pub owner yelling at his wife and attacked.

In addition to causing a disturbance, the pub owner paid \$100 in extra employee time to clean up the mess.

Dore was ordered to pay a \$400 fine and \$40 surcharge. Lindley was fined \$700 plus a \$70 surcharge.

Youth judged guilty

While relaxing in the parking lot, the men saw two 'girls' at a patio area at the service station. They said they spoke briefly to the girls and one girl went to a telephone, came back and sat down.

A vehicle drove into the service station parking lot, according to the Hedley men, and five men came out of it. One of the men approached the Hedley men and accused the Hedley men of "hitting on" the girls. The Hedley men denied it, and one of the Hedley men spoke some rude words meaning "get lost".

The youth who had approached

the Hedley men elbowed one of the Hedley men in the face, breaking the man's jaw in two places. This Hedley man was cut on his head and arm, apparently by a beer bottle. He later attended Princeton General Hospital, where a police officer arrived while the man was being treated.

Two local women testified that they had been at the service station that night, and claimed the Hedley men had tried to entice them with marijuana and were saying rude sexual remarks. The women said the youth had arrived on foot, and had his nose bloodied by one of the Hedley men. Then a car arrived with four men in it whom the women did not know. The mystery men leapt out of the car, beat on the Hedley man, and jumped back in the car and drove away.

Judge B.C. Weddell said he did not find the women's stories believable, and found the youth guilty as charged. A pre-sentence report was ordered. The youth will be sentenced in Penticton on August 12, 1998.

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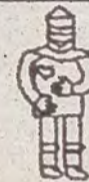
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Early Bird offer ends

A hike below Allenby

What is so rare as a day in June? Then if ever come perfect days.

Well, some days anyway, and the group of ten naturalists who hiked down the slope to the Similkameen River, beyond the old townsite of Allenby, were lucky. The morning was brilliant, and the hike ended just as the inevitable afternoon rain began to descend.

But the rain brings out the flowers - quite a list: the brilliant Scarlet Gilia, with small red trumpets, blue lupines, purple phacelia, yellow oysterplant (so called because the roots of the cultivated variety taste like oysters), and early brown-eyed Susans and purple Asters. These are blooming on the arid slope, crowded with sage brush and its near relative, rabbit brush. Crumple the leaves of both, and the rich smell of sage will remind you of Christmas turkey dressing.

On disturbed ground, there are great clumps of that European invader, Hound's Tongue. Right now, its purple flowers look quite pretty, and if you crumple them, you get the odour of mouldy peanut butter. But its hellish burrs are the bane of cattle, shaggy dogs, and small urchins, all of which pick up masses of them. My guidebook claims that the name arose from a belief that if

you stuffed some leaves of Hound's Tongue into your shoe, strange dogs wouldn't bark at you. Even if it worked, we could still do without this noxious weed.

Last week, naturalists went on a demonstration tour hosted by Nutrifor, to view the progress of the reclamation of tailings ponds through the spreading of biosolids. This is a polite name for the processed sludge from the sewers of the lower mainland, and there were plenty of jokes about its origins. But the effects are dramatic, when one considers the clouds of dust from the Granby tailings pond which high winds used to dump on Princeton.
