

Princeton hosted great Racing Days weekend

A good crowd of approximately 1,400 people attended the races on Sunday, June 28, to complete a Racing Days weekend that turned out great despite the single day of horse races. Racing fans bet a total of \$26,731 on eight races. The Similkameen Cup race was a little thin on horses but was an exciting event. The winning horse was Sagreeno, who came from behind in the back stretch and led the field by a length. Three time Similkameen Cup winner, Ice In Space, placed third after Jimjimjohn.

According to Laurie Currie, who has never missed a Racing Days and ran it for decades, says this weekend's horses were the best quality ever to race here.

Other weekend events went well. The duck race was quite quacked, as John Sandness and Jens Milde tried to control their rowboat, the catch net, and the scoop nets on a river that was running too deep for the race. Spectators thoroughly enjoyed watching their efforts. The two men may not have been successful, but they worked hard at trying to catch every duck.

The Lions pancake breakfast proved to be as popular as ever. People gathered at Rotary Park during the morning, ate pancakes and sausages, and visited old friend and family.

The Umpires Slowpitch Tournament was a success (see page 2) and the Rotary Club's casino night drew many of the ball players to the arena to enjoy the dancing and the games.

Lillian McIntosh explained she had moved to Princeton to be near her son, Larry, and was glad to find a place available for her in Vermilion Court.

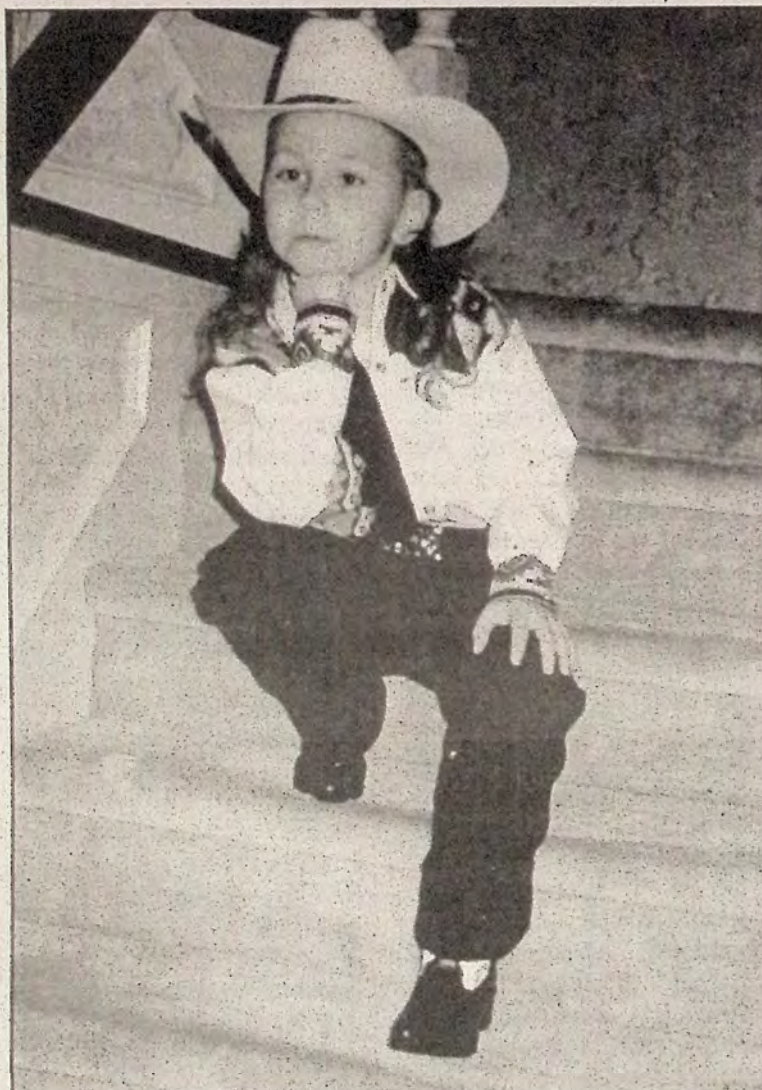
"People are very kind," she said, "I do like it."

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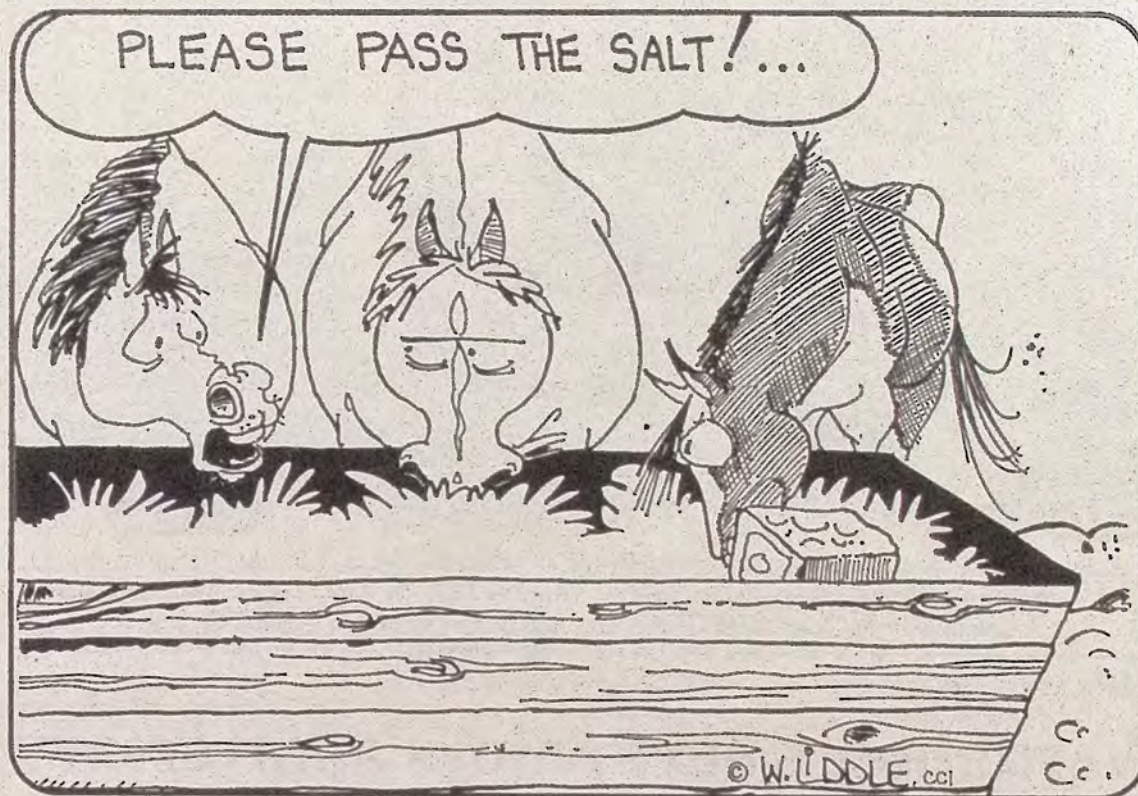

Museum Founder sets record straight

Dear Editor:

The "Happy Birthday to Me" article is full of misinformation. As Founder and longest active member (and longest member) I expect these mistakes corrected. We're a pretty poor society if we can't even get OUR facts correct!

To begin with, the museum was 40 years old on May 24, 1998.

The museum was started by Gloria Stout, Isobel (Howse) Cattermole and Rosemary Pesut. There never was a "committee of townspeople who worked together and found a home for me" (museum).

Tom Stout and friends DID NOT move the log building into town to be the Museum. The Kinsmen Club did. Tom Stout was a member, as was Rollo Cecon, who provided truck and fuel to move the building. Other Kinsmen helped dismantle and reassemble the building. Their pay was two cases of beer! Beer cost \$2.25 a case! Rollo Cecon's donation was the biggest, money-wise, and Rollo doesn't even drink beer.

The Centennial Committee financial help was \$100. Amber Ski Club received \$3,000. History is funny sometimes -- Amber Ski Club no longer exists but our \$100 Museum has blossomed into international recognition!

The Museum Society DID NOT raise hundreds by a 'walkathon'. It was a "Save the Children" fundraiser.

The only private donation was made by John Ewart, who provided the chimney.

The firemen, dedicated volunteers in our community, paid for and roofed the Museum.

The Rotary Club paid for, and erected, the fence.

The Kinsmen moved and reassembled the Museum on site, and did all the necessary things for us, e.g. Kinsman Curtis Huey welded the window grills.

In the summer of 1958, Rosemary Pesut resigned and left town.

Isobel Cattermole resigned soon after and left on a world tour.

As the only remaining member, I turned to the Senior Citizens Association and President Mary Cavino for help in keeping the Museum open. I gave them the donation box collection and the Seniors did a wonderful job of keeping the Princeton Pioneer Museum open. Without their help and dedication, the Museum would NOT have survived.

Dave Brown, as Mayor, supported the Museum Society with a yearly grant of \$1,000 and provided us with free rent, light, heat and janitor, which was very deeply appreciated.

There was also a group of volunteers who, in the spring, gave the old log cabin its yearly cleaning. Diane Thomas and Karen Cooper are the only ones I can recall, but there were oth-

ers and I would appreciate being able to add their names.

The Museum exists today because three women worked to get it started. When the committee shrank to one, the Senior Citizens pitched in and worked hard to help keep it going.

Town Council and Mayor Dave Brown gave continuing support when the new building was built.

Museum members over the years have been progressive and dedicated. Two who deserve recognition for the longevity of service are Evelyn McCallum and Margaret Stoneberg.

It is obvious the people of Princeton are proud of their heritage. They should be!

I am sure this museum is the BEST for the LEAST MONEY in all of Canada.

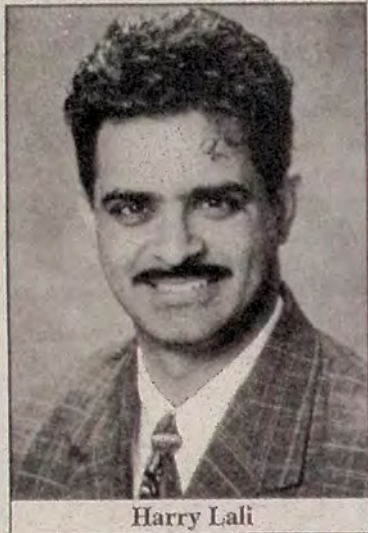
Rural doctors

I am pleased to offer a column which can put some positive light on what has been a protracted and at times bitter dispute between rural physicians and our provincial government. There is little adversity that cannot offer valuable lessons and important outcomes to all, and this dispute is no exception.

The Dobbin Report on rural health care issues has been accepted by our government. It is my hope the recommendations will also be accepted by all concerned. They address issues identified by health care providers and regional health boards in a thoughtful and exciting way. I believe Ms Dobbin has offered the tools with which a new level of partnership in health care provision can be built.

Her report comes as the latest attempt by the provincial government to deal with the issue raised by rural doctors. At least three other offers were made to physicians by the Ministry of Health — all were rejected. The frustration and stress caused by the inability of the parties to achieve a workable solution has been evident in almost every conversation I have had with area residents and health

care practitioners. I have worked within cabinet to communicate those concerns and to pass along the suggestions of people "on the ground" to the office of the minister. Along with input from the other areas of the province those

suggestions have helped shape the report.

If implemented, Dobbin's recommendations will ensure people in BC's rural communities have the quality health care they deserve.

Through an expenditure of \$6.5 million these measures will meet

doctors' objectives and most importantly, patients' needs.

There remain, however, one or two process hurdles to cross before the report will be adopted. They centre around reactions to the report in the community.

Physician relief and on-call coverage will be implemented through the local hospital, ensuring the best outcome for doctors and patients alike. The report focuses on the scope and range of services provided by nurses, and we will now move to build on those recommendations. Most, I am sure, will be pleased to accept the new partnerships the report recommends. Many physicians will rightfully be proud to forge relationships with the community, give nurses more opportunities to help patients, and prove these new partnerships and responsibilities are practical, workable and desirable — for everyone.

It may have been a rough road getting here but I, for one, would like to congratulate all concerned for persevering and bringing us to a solution which is a true winner for health care in rural areas.

We should declare independence

Dear Editor;

The following statements are my opinion of the forces that control Canadian politics and govern our well-being today.

1. Banks were given the power to create most of our money in 1913.
2. The majority of money created since 1913 has come into existence as a debt to the banks upon which they charge interest.
3. There was never enough Canadian money in existence to pay the total interest and principle on our debt.

7. As international money sets the world trading value of the Canadian dollar, Canadian investors haven't enough money to build and control Canadian factories, because international financial monopoly sets the eco-

nomie rules of our financial system.

8. The Conservative and Liberal political parties have favoured foreign ownership ever since Confederation. They allow foreign money to control our larger media and thus try to govern our thinking.

9. Our toady immigration system has over-populated our most livable areas, increased competition among us, and sponsored infla-

tion until we are priced out of our own market and are losing our ability to govern ourselves.

10. The more people bidding for our domestic goods and services, the higher prices will go.

11. We should control the creation, volume and evaluation of our own domestic money and declare our independence of foreign interference.

"As the OUC programmer responsible for liaison with the PDSC in delivery of training in Princeton, I am pleased to say that I look forward to a long and busy relationship with the community and its residents through my connection with the Skills Centre," Miller added.

The next co-operative course will be an Air Brakes course in July.

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Outdoors-Woman workshop was a success

"This is one of the best things I've ever done - it's something every woman should do," an enthusiastic Beth Bosch said of the "Becoming an Outdoors-Woman" (BOW) workshop held during May 29-31 at the Winfield Seals Easter Camp, near Beth's hometown of Kelowna.

Marg Halvorsen, a grandmother from Langley, also said she'd had a good time, most noticeably during the "Building a Campfire" session, "I laughed so much I spat my teeth out and my name tag popped off!"

These were just two of over 80 women who had gathered to learn outdoors skills in a variety of 'hand-on', non-competitive sessions ranging from outdoor cooking, canoeing, firearms safety, .22 calibre rifle marksmanship, fly fishing orienteering, camping skills, taking kids outdoors, survival techniques, backpacking, archery, game care, shotgunning, basic fishing, boat and trailer skills, use of GPS, gun care and wilderness first aid. The women participated in four sessions of their choice taught by highly qualified, dedicated instructors sensitive to individual needs.

In 1991, the first of these innovative programs was held in Wisconsin after it had been identified that women often do not have the same access to learning

outdoor skills as their male counterparts. Since 1991, BOW workshops have become increasingly popular and are now held in 44 states and eight provinces with a total of almost 10,000 participants.

The first B.C. 'Becoming and Outdoors-Woman' was held last year in Winfield and was sponsored by the B.C. Wildlife Federation who continue to play an important part in B.C. workshops. For the second year, outdoors enthusiast Pat Everatt acted as Workshop Co-ordinator, volunteering a considerable number of hours and effort to ensure that women from all walks of life had the opportunity to experience the great outdoors. Apart from obvious skills participants were learning, if she had to name the one best thing that the women would be taking away with them, Pat said it would be increased self-confidence.

The Winfield participants were aged between 19 and nearly 70 and had travelled from throughout B.C., Alberta, Washington and Idaho.

Cheryl Wood, a Keremeos resident, had attended the first B.C. BOW workshop even though her husband had figured "it was a big women's gossip session".

"I had a phobic attitude toward guns," said Cheryl who, when she

returned home, surprised her husband by demonstrating her new firearms skills.

"His attitude was completely different this year, he positively encouraged me to go!"

Kelly Sanders, another Keremeos resident, was attending the workshop for her thirtieth birthday present, a gift from relatives and friends who had clubbed together to send her on this unusual weekend.

"It was the best birthday present I could have," said Kelly, mother of four children age 6, 3 1/2, 2 1/2 years and 10 months.

The practical sessions yielded pleasing results.

Maureen Wayne, from Victoria, caught her very first fish, a one pound trout, which had "hardly hopped out of the water before it was in the frying pan - it was really tasty." She emphasized that although she had reeled in the fish, her group had given much encouragement and enjoyed the catch as much as she had.

Instructor Judy Burns was delighted that her course, which included safe loading and backing-up of trailers, had a success rate of "110 out of 10".

"After only a few hours tuition," Judy said, "every one of those ladies managed to back down a launch dead centre."

Kelowna resident Laura

Mansales said she felt overwhelmed to be told by her .22 rifle instructor that she was a "crack shot". Laura, however, intended to use her new knowledge and continue shooting rifles and fly fishing.

There were no exceptions when it came to agreeing that the food was great, with no preparation or cleaning up an added bonus. The petite and vivacious Josie Braun, who has been the camp's chef for six years, said she always tried to "use what's in season and spend lots of money on fresh fruit and veggies."

Evening entertainment included a knowledge and skills game which left some foundering when it came to identifying beaver teeth and others 'in knots' tying a fishing hook onto a line. An informative talk on bears and cougars was

given by Barb Leslie, a Penticton Conservation Officer. Door prizes and a raffle meant that none went away empty-handed.

Throughout the lawned and wooded grounds were 3-D targets of bear, sheep, cougar, wild boar and turkeys. An outdoor pool and slide were available for those who had excess energy left after the busy schedule. Accommodation was basic but comfortable in dorms or lodges.

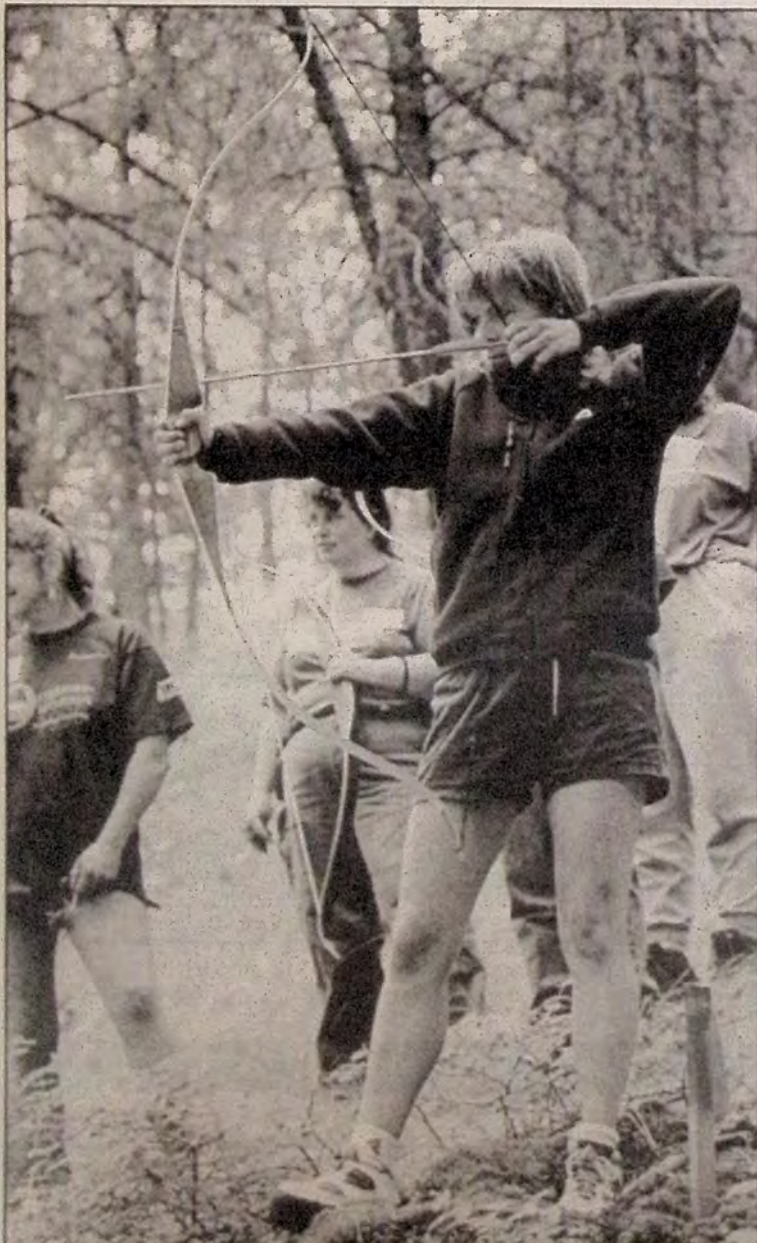
Before heading back home, a satisfied Bonnie Donovan, from Kelowna, summed up the workshop.

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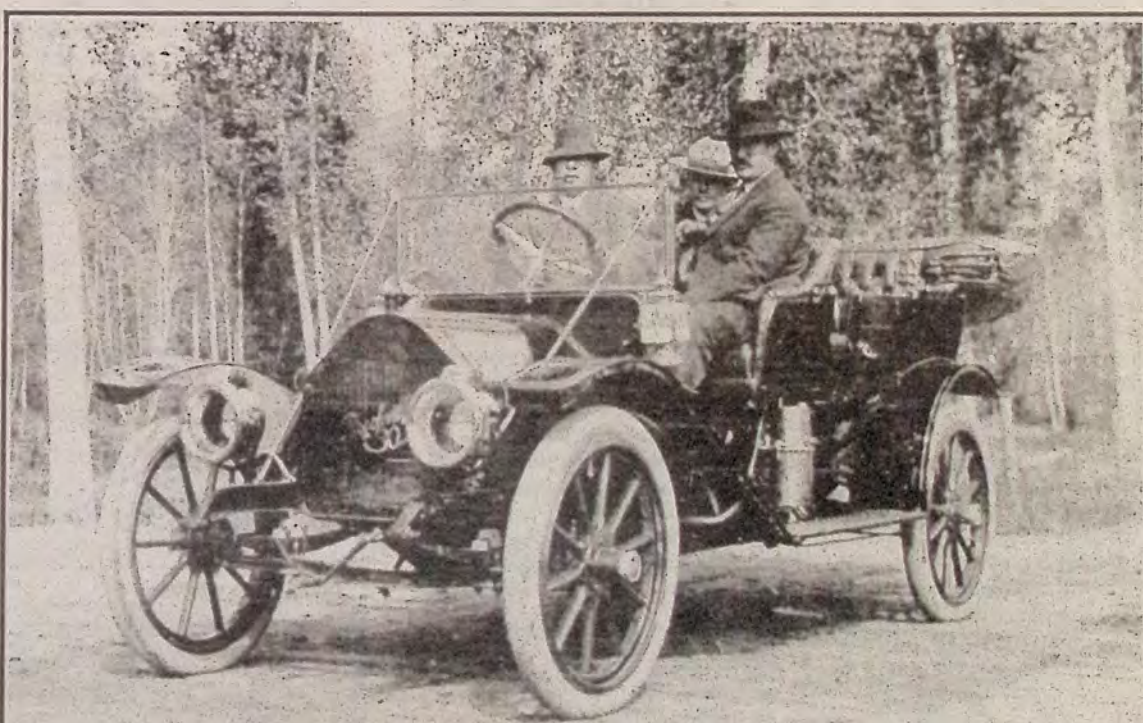

The first car in Princeton, purchased by my father, W.H. Thomas (on the right) in about 1912. It had 30 horsepower and was called a Brockville Everett. Father brought it home from Penticton where he bought it for \$500. In those days the road was not very good and neither were the tires on the car. Along the way the car had so many flats that when Father got to Princeton he swore he would sell the car for \$1.00, but he never did.

My father drove the family car down the old auto road, as it was then called. Half way through the canyon we met Mrs. Jameson on her saddle horse. Horses in those days still panicked at the sight of a car and this one was about to do so when mother got out and held its bridle until we could slowly creep by. (The old auto road was high on a bench above where the old Hedley Rd. now runs, it was part of the original Dewdney Trail).

Cars were quite a novelty at that time and when we took ours to the 1st of July Sports Day, so many people would wait for a ride up the grade to the races that it would test the pulling capacity of the vehicle. Everyone was so excited to have a ride, father would pile them in and away we'd go.

ing how well they can play softball, they will be unofficial goodwill ambassadors for District 9.

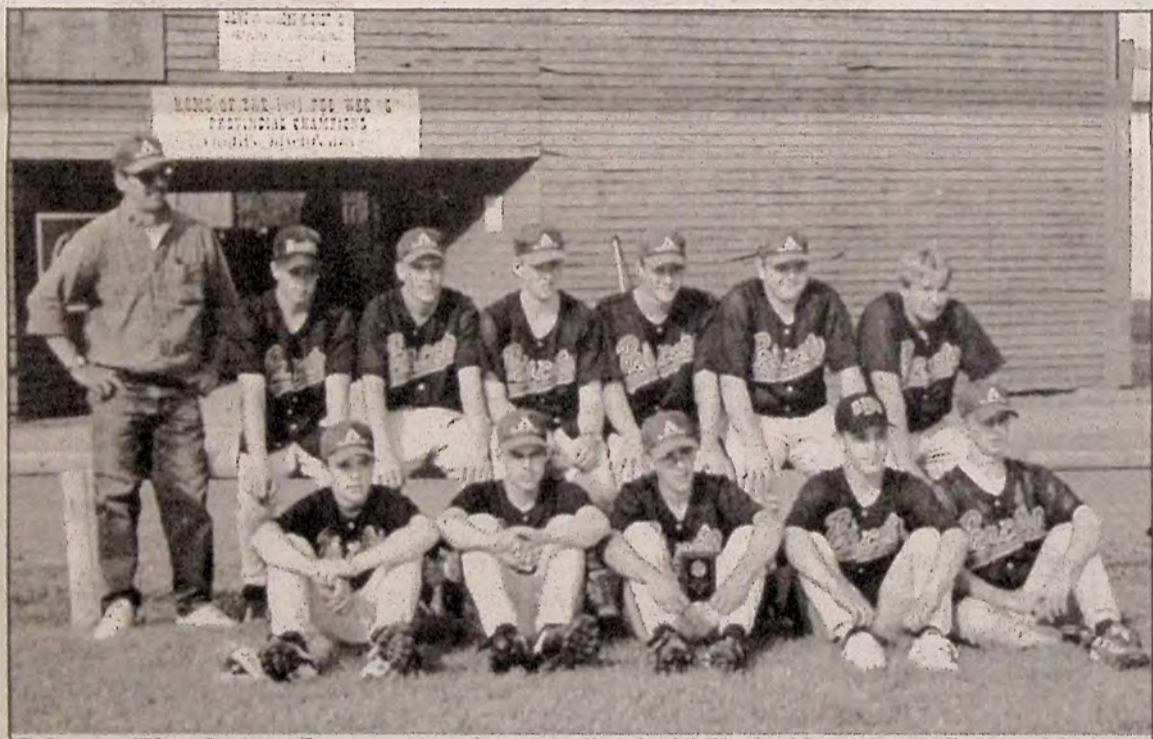

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Trout Talk

What lake was that?

When I came to Princeton in 1969, I looked at a sign along the incline out of town on Highway 3 West which said something about 20 lakes within 30 miles of town. Merritt has a slogan for their visiting fishermen "a lake a day as long as you stay". We are really blessed with an abundance of good fishing waters. It is almost 30 years later for me, and I still haven't visited all of the Princeton area lakes, much less Merritt's.

One thing I found out early on was that many lakes have two names. Because I see so many new faces around town, perhaps it would be helpful to these people to describe some of these dual-named lakes and give a few tips for finding and fishing them.

The Highway 5A lakes (Merritt Highway) are some of my favourites. It doesn't take more than 15 minutes (I'm a slow driver) to get to the first one - McCaffrey.

The lake is named after one of Princeton's early doctors - I'm told he "retreated" to this lake for R & R (rest and relaxation). There, he took on a major project - quite different from his normal routine. On the upper end of the lake you can see the remains of a fish weir. I am told he tried to keep rough fish, such as suckers and squawfish, from waters upstream. He did not succeed; however, he did get the rehabilitation idea for the Highway 5A lakes started. Later on, the Princeton Fish and Game Club did build a concrete fish dam a short distance downstream from McCaffrey Lake. It is still functioning and does the job of keep-

ing rough fish from migrating upstream into McCaffrey. Dr. McCaffrey's old cabin, updated now, can still be seen at the outlet of the lake.

The Fish and Game Club also recently built a public fishing pier on the lake. You will see by the sign that it is dedicated to Allen Gill, a much-loved game warden with many years service to Princeton area residents. I might add, he was greatly respected by any potential poacher, as he was famous for his dedication to fish and wildlife conservation. The Allen Gill Fishing Pier is a good bet for evening fishing. Bring your lawn chair and have some R & R yourself. You may even get one of those beautiful brook trout that inhabit McCaffrey Lake.

Bad choices you make are everybody's business

I have heard a rather alarming trend among some young people in our community who would like to regard people's choices of behaviour as only the business of the individual making choices.

I say the individual choice is everybody's business when it is a bad choice.

The subject of a certain individual doing drugs was referred to as none of anybody's business. It was a matter of individual choice.

First, I would like to say, in all fairness, most young people try not to "judge" others unfairly. However, as every adult knows, there is a time when judgement must be made about behaviour.

If a person chooses to do drugs, that choice may affect the community. Often, drug users become problems to society through abandoning family responsibility or through crime.

When a person must be supported at taxpayer expense, then it is everybody's money and everybody's business. That taxpayer support might include the teenage parent who made a choice to have sexual relations without considering the consequences.

It is easy to say choices are private matters and nobody's business, but when the choice leads to an appearance in court, it is suddenly everybody's business, as court is a public place.

What many people fail to realize is that choices made often involve the entire community, whether the choice is to drink and drive, beat one's spouse, rob a bank, or have a child without the means to



support it. The worse the choice, the more likely it is to become everybody's business.

Young people today may kid themselves about the right to privacy and lack of judgement, even while they use plastic for a purchase that will become everybody's business. All of us are on

computer somewhere and few of us can say the world does not have access to information about our buying habits.

All of us leave an information trail about ourselves these days. A driver's license, a stay at a hospital, attending school, cashing a cheque, contributing to Canada Pension or Employment Insurance or any number of ordinary activities, leave a trail of information. None of these bits of information are really private.

It is the bad choices we make that bring us to the attention of the public at large, because we then become dependent on somebody else judging our behaviour. Somebody may judge whether we deserve to hold a driver's license, or retain our freedom, or collect EI or social assistance benefits. It is at that point we find out how our personal choices become everybody's business.

Board approves abortions

The Okanagan Similkameen Health Region Board held its regular monthly public meeting on June 17 at the Penticton Health Centre.

The Board decided that Okanagan Similkameen Health Region will begin providing therapeutic abortion services at Kelowna General Hospital in January 1999. The service will be modeled on the program and protocol developed by B.C. Women's Hospital in Vancouver. The program includes counseling, education, and other services to women

seeking abortions. This new program to the Region and appropriate additional funding will have to be negotiated with the Ministry of Health in order to provide this service.

Currently, some 500 women from this region receive this procedure elsewhere in the province. The Okanagan Similkameen Health Region is the only one in the province that does not provide this service, which is identified by the Ministry of Health as a core service and one that must be provided in each health region.

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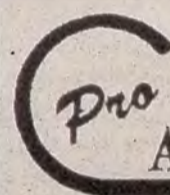
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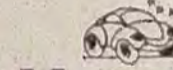
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Registered education savings plan

In a previous column, I discussed the importance of starting to save now for your children's or grandchildren's education. The column touched on the basic features of a Registered Education Savings Plan (RESP), including the 20% grant the government will pay for contributions up to \$2000. This week I will discuss details of the RESP.

What is a Registered Education Savings Plan?

An RESP is a government-approved plan that permits earnings to compound on a tax-deferred basis so parents and grandparents can save for their children/grandchildren's education. You do not gain tax deductions for your contributions like an RSP. However, the earning (capital gains, interest, and dividends) grow tax deferred. You can contribute up to \$4000 a year per beneficiary before he/she turns 21, with a lifetime limit of \$42,000 per beneficiary.

How does the Canadian Education Savings Grant Work?

Of the \$4,000 per beneficiary that can be contributed on a yearly basis, the government will pay a grant of 20% (\$400 maximum) on the first \$2000. A \$1,000 contribution would therefore generate a \$200 grant. If at least \$2000 is not contributed, the subscriber can carry forward the unused amount to the next year. A beneficiary will be eligible for the grant up to and including the year they turn 17. This means that a maximum of \$7,200 (18 X \$400) in grants can be received.

Are there any restrictions in place as to when funds can be used for educational purposes?

Yes. Revenue Canada has established guidelines under which payments can be made to beneficiaries for educational purposes. More specifically, at the time the payments are made, the beneficiary must fulfill all of the following conditions.

The beneficiary must be:

- in full time attendance at the institution;
- enrolled in post-secondary level courses that are at least three consecutive weeks in length;
- spend 10 or more hours per week on courses or work in the program.

Most universities, colleges and other educational institutions qualify as post secondary institutions. Most universities and colleges outside of Canada will also qualify but the courses must be at least 13 weeks in length. There is no comprehensive list of acceptable institutions or programs available.

Are there any restrictions in place as to how the money can be used?

No. Once funds qualify as educational assistance, Revenue Canada does not mandate how

the funds can be spent, although it is generally viewed that funds withdrawn must be reasonable related to expenses incurred while receiving a post secondary education.

What happens if the beneficiary does not enroll in post secondary education?

The contributions can be withdrawn at any time. The government grant must be returned. Any income (capital gains, interest, or dividends) earned on the contributions can be transferred to the subscriber's RSP if allowable contributions exist or transferred to another eligible beneficiary in the plan. Otherwise, income withdrawn will be taxed at the subscriber's marginal tax rate plus an additional 20%.

Snowpatch in the spring

Many people are familiar with the ski runs of Snowpatch in the winter. The cross country trails on China Ridge are equally pleasant in the late spring, when a wealth of wild flowers sprout in the forest and logged areas. Twelve members of the Vermilion Forks Field Naturalist Society, led by John Belz, hiked the trails of the Ridge above the ski hill on Saturday, June 20. The hike was billed as a celebration of the summer solstice.

Now is the time for flowers, with common ones such as blue lupines, yellow arnica, orange tiger lily and bunchberry coming into bloom. Bunchberry is that small four-petalled white flower which blooms everywhere on the forest floor, a small relative of the Pacific dogwood tree of the coast forest. In summer, the blossoms turn into bright orange berries, which the grouse enjoy. There were plenty of less common flowers, such as red-topped sour-weed throughout the logged area, yellow stonecrop on the ridges, lousewort (may cure infestations of lice, if you consume enough of it) and desert parsley, whose pungent leaves do not smell much

like parsley.

But there is no smell more pungent, or more disgusting, than that of dwarf mistletoe. We saw big twisted clumps of yellow needles on lodgepole pine, indicating this parasite was busy inside the tree. You generally notice the smell first, and try vainly to compare it to something. When mature, the plant emerges on fleshy stems and produces sticky seeds, which birds appear to enjoy. Then the ugly clumps die and dry up, and are called witches' broom, often mistaken for squirrels' nests.

By early afternoon, towering thunderheads build high over the Tulameen and stupendous crashes of thunder roared over the group. While no rain fell on us, the mosquitoes clearly expected it, and descended in hordes. That evening, a splendid potluck dinner, assembled by Lynn Granz, was devoured in honour of the solstice.

The next hike, led by Peter Antonick to the Similkameen gold pools, will be on Saturday, July 4. Meet at the bus depot at 9:30 a.m. and phone 295-3640 for details.
