Racing Days Elliott resigns

Racing Days President George Elliott submitted his resignation at a noon hour meeting Monday, July 13, effective immediately. Elliott has been President since January, 1990, when he took over from Laurie Currie.

Elliott told the News Leader the major reason he resigned was lack of time. He is President of the Princeton Exhibition Association, Vice-President of Crisis Assistance Society, has a full-time job and many other activities.

"It's been fun," Elliott said, "I've learned a lot, and I stepped on

Council cold-shoulders appeal to help The Pit survive

Paul Huycke, speaking on behalf of The Pit, Princeton's teen centre, asked Town Council on July 6 for a grant for The Pit.

Huycke explained to Council that he would like Council to pick up \$2.00 per hour of the co-ordinator's wage. He reviewed the efforts young people made last fall to raise \$1,300, but explained that the cost of the phone for one year is \$640, and there are other expenses for upkeep.

"We're broke," Huycke said. He told Council The Pit has 6 - 7 youngsters a night on weekdays, and 11 - 20 on weekends.

Council asked how much the community has contributed this year in donations. Huycke replied there have been no donations since January.

Councillor George Armstrong remarked, "The Town is putting in over fifty per cent of the operating costs of The Pit."

Councillor Jim Manion asked Huycke, "Where are the parents? Where are the children?"

Huycke tried to explain that many of the young people had

unreliable parents.

Councillor Manion asked, "Whose responsibility is it? Is it Council's responsibility to provide a place for kids to go?"

Mayor Randy McLean's view was that Council, and Huycke, are doing "an awful lot" for the youngsters.

Councillor Dan Sulentic told Huycke, "You should have been here before the budget was set. We can't rob Peter to pay Paul."

Council hears plea for seniors

"Historically, this community has always had to fend for itself," Joyce Fraser told Town Council on July 6, "as we always got what was left over from Penticton and Kelowna."

Princeton area residents are being asked to "get off their duffs and complain loud and clear".

Joyce Fraser went to Council to ask for backing and action to appeal the \$25,000 a month cut-back for home support.

Princeton and District Community Services Society Board of Directors attended as part of a delegation. Jo-Ann Gabriel, President, added her

comments at the end of Fraser's presentation.

Fraser told Council "The drastic cutbacks to our clients will be disastrous."

The cutbacks affect a service called "home support", which provides care at home for clients served by Community Services. The new directives for home support do not allow for any cleaning of the home, and an assessor sent into Princeton two weeks ago has spent a half hour with various clients to re-assess care levels, adjusting them to fewer hours.

What is home support?

The home support assessment and services system is complex to anyone not acquainted with the guidelines for service. Service is provided on the basis of care levels. The least support is required by a client assessed as a Personal Care level. This involves no cleaning, but help with bath and shampoo. The level requiring the most support is IC3.

Fraser explained that the acuity level of many clients has risen dramatically in the past year. She gave the example of an 89 year old man who went from Personal Care level to IC3 in one year due to cancer.

Palliative Care has increased. This branch of home support helps terminally ill people remain in their own homes.

Home support used to be available to people discharged early from the hospital, to help them while they completed recuperation. Fraser explained to Council that Community Services can no

Youth survives river ordeal

A 15 year old male youth from Princeton was playing in the Tulameen River on July 9 when his foot became caught in a submerged tree root. The youth was not able to free himself. Friends were not able to free him despite numerous attempts.

The group of young people had been swimming and playing in the river near the old train bridge. One of the youths ran up the hill to a house to call for help while the others continued their efforts to free the boy. His older brother was able to free the foot from the roots and take the youth to shore.

Princeton RCMP and local Provincial Ambulance Service responded to the call. The youth had been under water for several minutes and was taken to Princeton General Hospital for treatment then transferred to Kelowna for more intensive treatment.

RCMP advise parents and young people that swimming in local rivers and lakes requires caution, especially in areas of swift water and around log jams, submerged trees and other river debris.

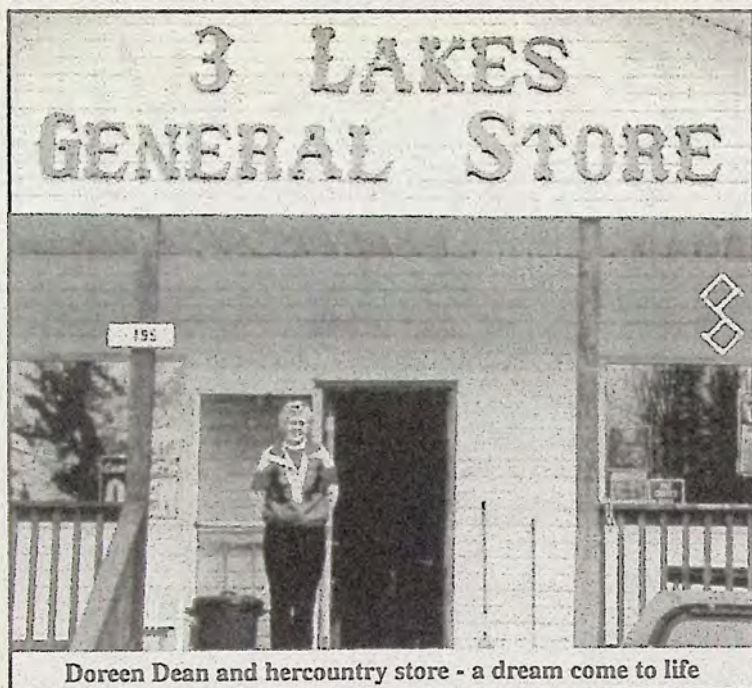
Logs and roots have been removed from the area of the popular swimming hole where the youth became trapped.

Doreen Dean and her country store - a dream come to life

Her dream remains

Doreen Barbara Dean, born in 1926 in Toronto, was a courageous and feisty lady with a wry, sometimes dry, and always witty sense of humour that she developed while growing up the youngest of four children.

In 1941, at the age of 15, Doreen left Toronto to become a radio operator in the Royal Canadian Air Force. She served overseas during World War II, and was a member of the Royal Canadian Legion for over 50 years.

While in the Air Force, Doreen met and later married Merlyn Dean. They lived for a time in Moose Jaw, where their son Dennis Earl was born. Two more children, Ann and Linda, were born once the family had moved to British Columbia. They lived in South Vancouver before moving again to Summerland, where the family grew and enjoyed life.

After a while, the Dean family moved back to Vancouver where, in 1971, tragedy struck when Doreen's beloved husband Merlyn passed away. She was devastated. She was lost. She felt alone and abandoned.

Somehow, Doreen found her way to Osprey Lake where, in a little green cabin, she found a new beginning. She healed a little, and started over again. She began to laugh again and find joy in life once more. She became a Real Estate agent, and began making many friends. She was able to make a living, and set aside a little something for her retirement. But she had another dream.

Doreen had always envisioned herself running a small general store. So in 1990, after retiring from Real Estate sales, at a time in life when most people would begin to sit back and take things a little easier, she bravely took her savings and bought some property upon which to build herself a store, not far from her cabin at Osprey Lake.

This is not the end of the story. There were zoning bylaws, permits, and local opposition that

Doreen had to overcome before she could even dig the foundation for her store. Anyone who has ever had to acquire permits and zoning for a project will know how time consuming and aggravating the process can be.

Doreen persevered, and because of her efforts, the Three Lakes (Osprey, Chain, and Link) area has, for the past several years, enjoyed the convenience of a country store appropriately named "3 Lakes General Store."

It was not long before the store became a focal point in the area where locals would come and have a coffee and chat, or maybe play a game or two of cribbage. Doreen always had an opinion, and whether anyone agreed with her or not, was never afraid to express it. But she had a way of expression that endeared people to her anyway, even if they did disagree with her.

The store had become just what you would envision an old-time country store to be. It had a little of everything, with a lot of heart and soul thrown in for a comfortable, welcoming atmosphere. Doreen had made her dream come to life.

Doreen Dean passed away June 22nd, 1998. Her passing has deeply saddened her many friends and her family. She will be greatly missed, but because she had the courage to attempt a risky venture and fulfill a dream, her legacy, Three Lakes General Store, remains.

longer provide this service due to cutbacks.

Cutbacks increase costs

Calling health authorities "penny wise and pound foolish", Fraser outlined the high cost of cutting back home support hours.

She gave the example of an elderly man who could be at home now, with home support, if Community Services had not had cutbacks in budget. It costs \$518 a day for him to be kept in hospital (\$31,000 to date). \$518 equals 23.5 hours of home support. Fraser said that cost would cover one month of home support service for 23 per cent of Community Service clients.

Fraser pointed out that, without home support, many people will be going to hospital, adding to health costs.

There is a hidden cost - unemployment costs of Community Services employees who will be laid off. Fraser said there would be lay-offs of employees who are sole support of the family, and they could become social assistance recipients.

Fraser said she had phoned other communities in other regions and their home support services have not been cut back the way Princeton's services were cut.

Fraser asked Council to organize a community meeting and to write letters.

Council responds

Mayor Randy McLean told Community Services representatives he would like MLA Harry Lali at the meeting.

George Armstrong told the group, "Community Health Advisory should be the ones taking action."

Gabriel responded by telling Council, "Joyce made the same presentation to the Community Health Advisory."

That presentation was made June 15. Nothing visible came of it, as there has been no response from Regional Health Board. Due to the seriousness of the situation and lack of response, Community Services Board of Directors decided to appeal to Council.

Community Services is circulating a petition letter in hopes that citizens will sign and send the letter to appropriate authorities.

B.C. creates "Serengeti of the North"

A vast wilderness area in British Columbia's northern Rocky Mountains has been billed "the Serengeti of the North". The Muskwa-Kechika special management area is 4.4 million hectares, including 1.17 million hectares of parks and protected areas surrounded by a 3.24 million hectare special management area.

The wilderness management area was born out of the Fort St. John and Fort Nelson resource management planning process, and is the largest land-use decision of its kind in North America.

On June 18, an advisory board was created for Muskwa-Kechika area, and a \$2 million trust fund was established for management, research and planning.

Premier Clark stated, "This is a model that moves resource management and planning into the 21st century."

John Cashore has been appointed to chair the Muskwa-Kechika advisory board. He has served as minister of environment, lands and parks and minister of aboriginal affairs. The majority of the

board are people living in the northeast, many of whom were involved in the land-use planning process.

Wayne Sawchuk, current President of the Chetwynd Environmental Society, said, "By legislating this model of applied conservation biology, the northern planning tables and the province have set a standard for the conservation of wilderness, while allowing sensitive, temporary resource development that will be noted by the world."

First Nations people in the area have given their approval to the management plan, which would include development of recreation, oil and gas, parks and wildlife plans.

The area is one of the largest intact predator-prey systems in North America, set in millions of hectares of wild river valleys, watersheds and mountains. It is also the clean-water source for several major rivers.

PetroCanada and Westcoast Energy have pledged \$50,000 to the trust fund, which will be matched by the province.

Mount Polley Mine will continue normal operations

Vancouver, July 8 - Imperial Metals Corporation announced that the notice of suspension of operations at the Mount Polley Mine, which was to take effect on July 31, will be rescinded.

The decision to continue normal course mining operations at Mount Polley beyond July 31, 1998, follows the adoption by all stakeholders of an Economic Plan sponsored by the Job Protection Commission of British Columbia. The Economic Plan will be in

effect for the next two years and will result in significant cost reductions through a mix of supplier discounts, tax and loan deferrals and temporary wage rollbacks.

The Mount Polley gold/copper mine, located approximately 60 kilometres northeast of Williams Lake, directly employs 167 people, and provides indirect employment for an additional 335 people in support of the mine and its employees.

Government treats rural communities as second rate

Our doctors, our ambulances and our hospital have been through the government mill of cutbacks, unrealistic funding and worker shortages due to budget. Now, our home care support system is under attack.

We have been duped by the "Closer to Home" campaign that foisted Regional Health Boards on us. We were told we would have something better when administration was closer to home. We can see the administration is closer than when it was in Victoria. It is in Penticton now. Is it better? All of us know the answer to that one.

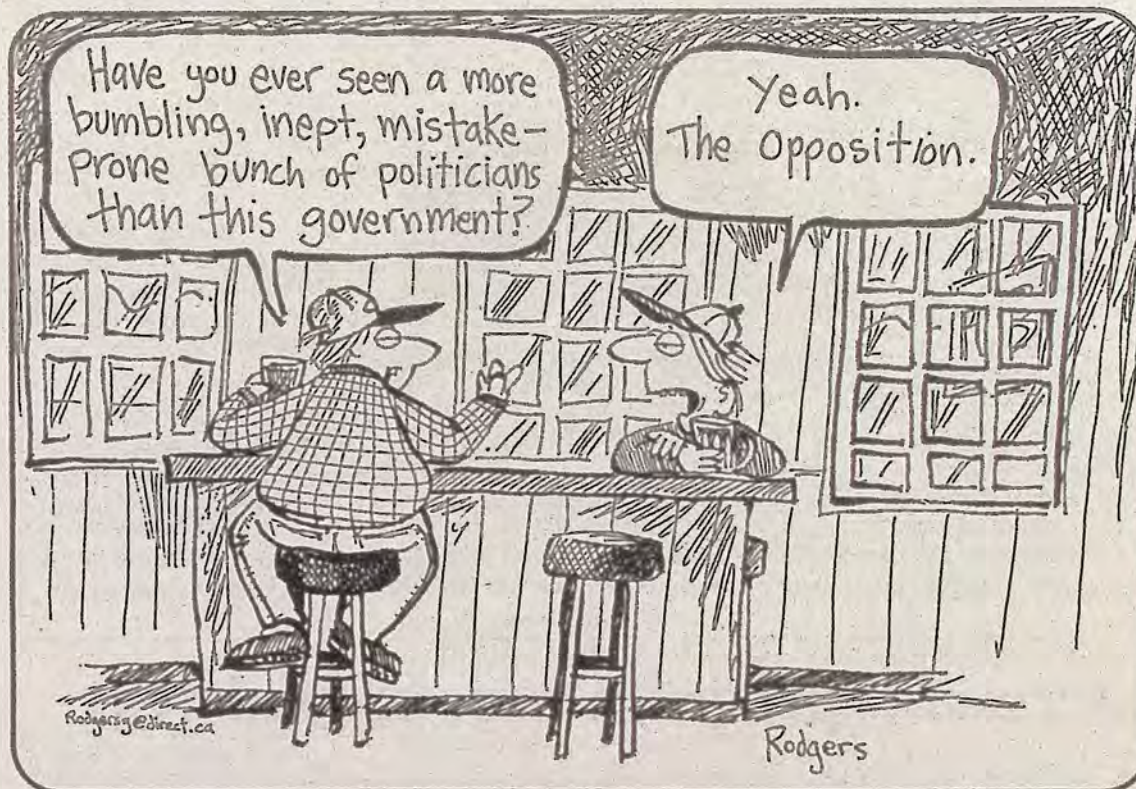
The first thing we lost was our hospital. Our Hospital Board was legislated out of existence. Perhaps it is our illusion, but it seems our Hospital Board was a lot closer to home than the Regional Health Board.

Our ambulance crew seems to rely heavily on workers imported from other centers while local qualified people go looking for work. People living here would be a lot closer to home than somebody from out of town.

Our doctors certainly know what 'closer to home' means. They know it means patients on their doorsteps night and day until they are too tired to work. They know it means not receiving enough pay to attract other doctors to our community. Their problems are much closer to home.

Closer to home should apply first to home care for those who need it. Now, we know that it means doing without care if you live in a rural community, because our community is cut more hours, per capita, than many other places. We have become second-rate citizens.

Do not believe the problem is lack of money. The government just put a bundle in the medical plan pot so more British Columbians would pay less per year to B.C. Medical Services. Do our elderly do without care at home so others can enjoy cheaper medical rates?

School trustees across British Columbia sent a very clear message to the NDP government when they rejected the brokered deal worked out in the Premier's Office earlier this year.

The rejected deal provided no guarantees that the government would fund the agreement beyond the \$25 million during the first year. Neither were there any guarantees that the additional resources would go where schools and communities need

them most.

I hope the Premier and the Minister of Education have learned that they cannot broker a deal that is not funded and that does not include all of the stakeholders. They should immediately send teachers and school boards back to the negotiating table to reach a real settlement that will meet the needs of everyone.

It is time the government let the school boards and teachers work out an agreement that makes sense for everyone - not a deal that puts politics before the needs of children, teachers and the communities.

Oldtimer objects to outlaw name

Dear Editor;

The recent publication by the naturalists of their excursion to Holmes Mountain woke me up!

Not to pass judgement on their naturalist abilities, but to point out the lack of historical knowledge of their trip: we seem to have paid more attention to a train robber than to a family that is truly worthy of recognition.

I speak of the Schisler family, very early pioneers, longtime residents with many descendants who have been, and still are, community-spirited.

Bald Mountain, officially named Miner Mountain, was known as Schisler Hill in my younger days.

Mr. Currie Schisler, his wife, and children Myrtle, Mildred and Fred, came to Princeton in May, 1900, by covered wagon

via Nicola and Tulameen. A fourth child, George, was born in 1905.

They took up land in the valley between Bald Mountain and Holmes Mountain probably in 1903 or 1904 (this date is not yet authenticated). However, this was their home. They raised dairy cattle. They were there when Bill Miner went through. He slept in their barn.

Currie Schisler freighted supplies by four-horse team between Keremeos and Princeton for several years.

The road to their property went up the rockslide from what is now the Coyne property. It was very steep, narrow, and of course, rocky and treacherous.

Mildred Schisler married Jack Huey in 1916, when she was 21 years old. The others married

and lived in Princeton. All contributed to the community. George was probably the most active in the community.

He started working at the coal mine located where the strip mall is now. Then he went to work at the brewery. On his own initiative, he went to Chicago (if my memory serves me right) to a brewmasters' school. George returned to become brewmaster at Princeton Brewing Co. until E.P. Taylor could not stand the competition and bought out the brewery to close it down forever.

Fred was the first caretaker of the "C" class campsite by the river (now Princeton Municipal Campsite). He started by collecting a few shekels from campers. Cont'd on Page 7

Appointees have nothing to lose

During recent months we have heard a great deal about Regional Health Board (RHB) and the decisions the Board makes. We must remember that RHB is not an official arm of government. RHB is a group of government appointees.

Suppose any one of us wanted to become involved in deciding what to do with health money allocated to our region. We could seek appointment to the Board. If the government thought we were good enough, they would appoint us. However, we would not be paid a salary.

In theory, this system should represent us well. We have a local Health Advisory Committee that presents local issues to the Regional Health Board. The Advisory Committee is made up of people from the community who are not paid. At each level, there is a person who is on the Ministry of Health payroll.

The way the whole thing is set up, RHB is a new level of government with the authority to decide where health care dollars will be spent. According to what Joyce Fraser was told by somebody in



the Ministry of Health, RHB has more power than the Ministry to decide how the money will be spent.

Locally, people pussyfoot around

these Advisory and Health Board members, going to them cap in hand for our share of the health care pie. I feel furious about this. Why should we have to appeal to anybody on RHB for money to care for local people? Why are these appointees not fighting for us?

They are merely government appointees. They have nothing to lose. They can afford to fight for us. Those on the government payroll may lose their jobs if they kick up a big fuss, but there is no excuse for appointees to sit on their duffs when our much-needed services are at risk of being cut forever.

I know how I would react if I were on RHB and know what I know about how poorly our region is treated. I would make a big noise and I would make the biggest waves I could on Victoria's shores. If the government did not like it, the government could pull my appointment. So what? Appointees do the work of government for nothing. Why pretend they are anything more than unpaid government workers? They could be paid twice as much and still have nothing to lose.

So why aren't they fighting for us? Why do our elderly people have to bite the bullet while people in other regions do not?

Why aren't all of us angry enough to make a stand and tell RHB to either fight or get off their appointments.

About all Bill Miner contributed to Princeton was what he paid Mrs. Schisler (if he paid her) and I quote from Mrs. Schisler's historical letter: "to sew two one thousand dollar bills in the lining of his coat because he was wary of robbers"

Trout Talk

What lake was that, again?

Most of my information of Laird Lake (McKenzie Lake) comes from conversations I had with Myers Waugh, who lived in our area for many years. As a lad, Myers used to visit the Lake's namesake, a Mr. McKenzie. (This is one of our dual-name lakes. Until a few years ago, the sign on Highway 5A read "McKenzie Lake".)

Laird McKenzie used to raise foxes, and trap on his land. He was, according to Myers, a very interesting character. Stories were written up on the Laird's adventures and appeared in Vancouver newspapers.

One story told how one day a Vancouver reporter found the Laird bringing a reluctant bobcat back to his homestead. After trapping it, the Laird had roped the bobcat, and was moving it slowly homeward. That must have been something to see!

Laird means "lord" in Scottish and McKenzie was lord of his surroundings - the beautiful lake and countryside. His house, also greatly changed, can still be seen as you drive up from Princeton. It is tucked up against the steep hillside, the only house on the right side of the highway as you approach the lake.

Laird Lake is, in my opinion, the most consistent lake in our area. So many of our lakes are on or off - we call them moody! But I find I am rarely "skunked" on Laird - and that is winter or summer. The fish, both brook trout and Kamloops rainbow, are good eating year round. Some of our lakes produce muddy-tasting fish by mid-summer, but not Laird! There are some very nice brook trout in the lake. These are not stocked fish, but spawned in the stream between McCaffery and Laird Lakes.

Another Princeton Fish and Game Association project, dedi-

cated to longtime conservationist Bud DeWolfe, will be found here. On the upper end of the lake is a boat ramp suitable for car-toppers, trailered boats and canoes. It has made getting one's boat afloat much easier than it was before. You can shore fish the lake, too. All summer long, you will see people parked alongside the highway. If you look down the bank, you will see them fishing with worms and bobbers.

They catch fish! Evening fishing is especially good. I cannot emphasize too much my findings over the years: if you want to just fish - fish during the day, but if you really want to catch fish, go in the evening and stay until you either can't see anymore, or you have your limit!

Residents appeal for speed control

Nick Goreas made a presentation to Town Council on July 6 asking for some kind of speed control on Mayne Avenue at the intersection of Granite and Billiter Avenues.

The problem, according to Goreas, was excessive speed in the area of Mayne Avenue near the slide area. He told Council the problem had not existed before the 4-way stop was changed.

Councillor Jim Manion suggested radar surveillance of the intersection and fines for speeding.

"Hit them in the wallet," Manion advised Council.

Mayor Randy McLean told Goreas the police had assured Council that area would be adequately policed.

"We'll carry it from here," Mayor McLean said.

Government cuts Medical Plan premiums to help families

Reduction or elimination of medical premiums effective July 1 will save 100,000 modest-income British Columbians up to \$172 per year, Finance Minister Joy MacPhail said as the program was launched.

"Many B.C. families will benefit from lower Medical Services Plan premiums," MacPhail said. "This change, together with other budget initiatives like the BC Hydro, ICBC and tuition freezes and reduced personal income tax rates, will increase the spending power of British Columbians."

The qualifying incomes for all five levels of Medical Services Plan premium assistance have been raised by \$1,000 so that 10,000 more British Columbians will be able to receive premium assistance this year. Another 90,000 people will have their premiums reduced or eliminated.

Under the new formula, families with an annual income of up to \$12,000 will pay no medical premiums. For up to a \$14,000 income the premium reduction 80 per cent. For up to \$16,000 it is 60 per cent, up to \$18,000 it is 40 per cent, and up to \$20,000 it is 20 per cent. Medical plan premiums are \$36 per month for a single person, \$64 for a family of two and \$72 for a family of three or more.

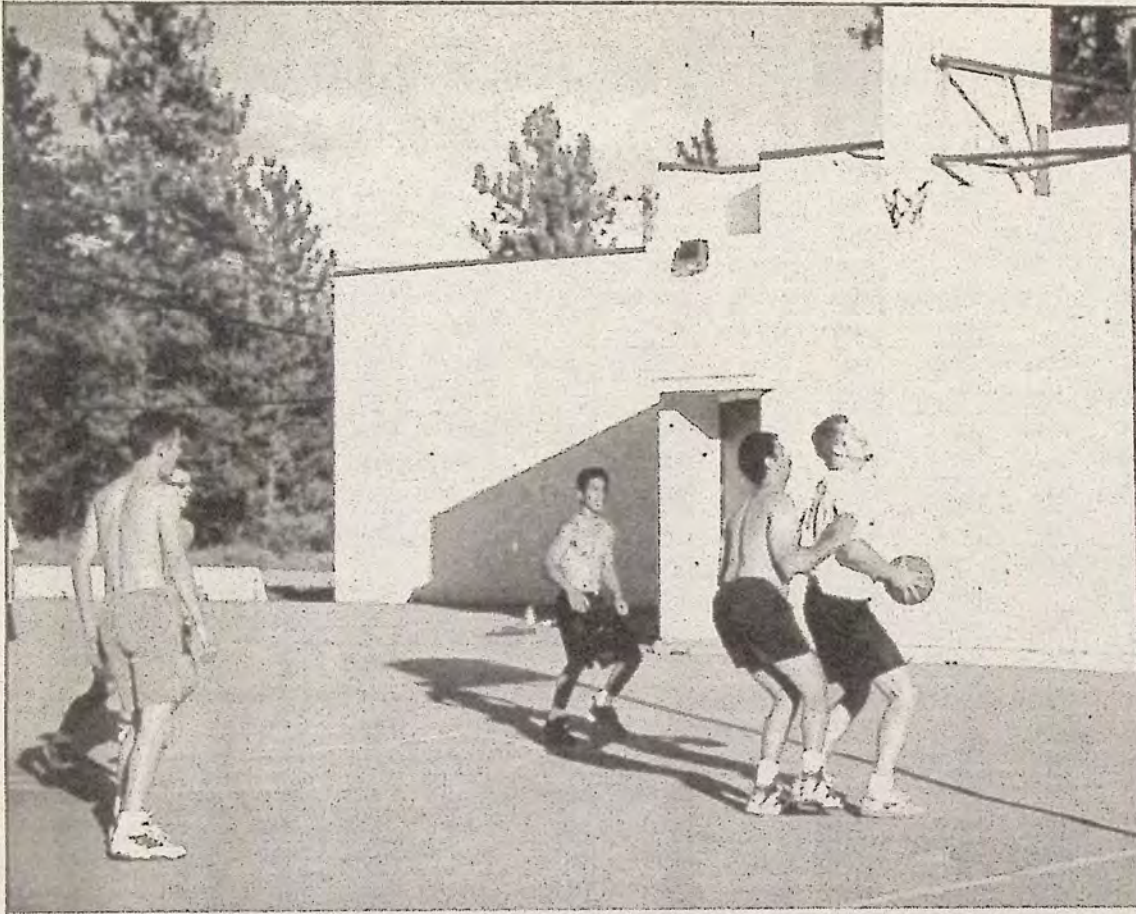

Business Task Force presents First Report

The 16-member task force representing business, labour, and government was established out of Budget '98 to cut red tape and the cost of doing business in B.C.

After consultations with 50 business groups on ways to streamline government activities, the first report was released July 7. More than 200 suggestions were received from government agencies on legislative changes that could be implemented quickly to increase government efficiency and reduce business costs.

The First Report of the Business Task Force summarizes several major initiatives that could be taken to improve the business climate:

- Facilitate "one-stop-shopping" in business dealings with government.
- Increase a "business impact test" to review the cost to business of new government initiatives.
- Implement a sunset clause requiring review of new initiatives after four or five years.

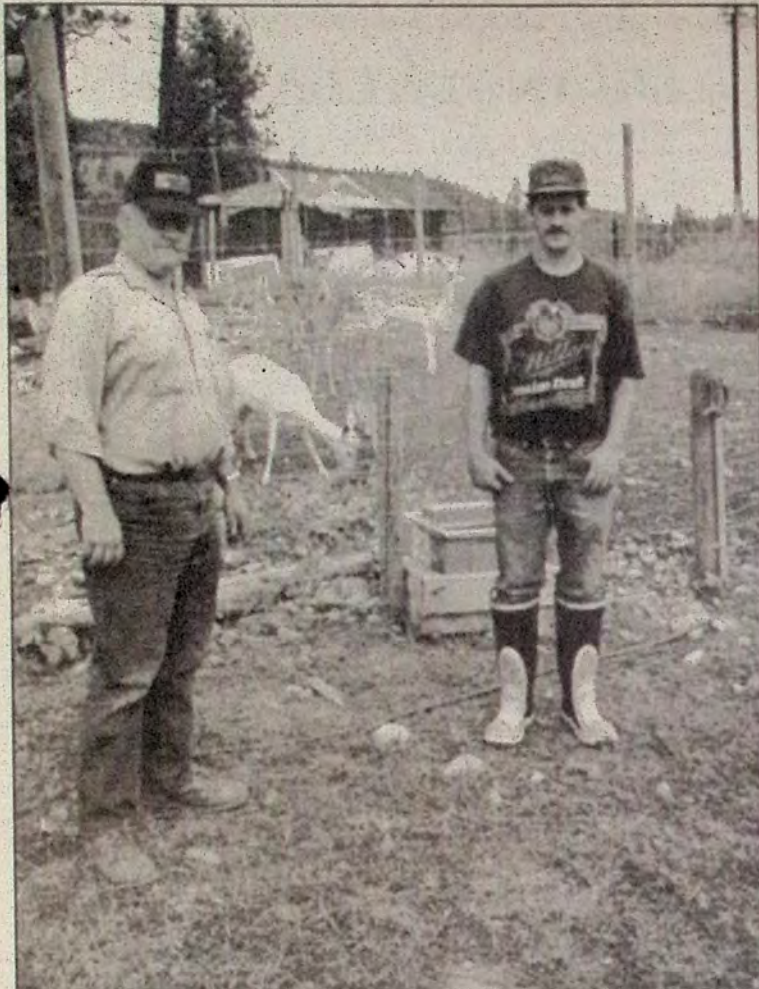

Officer shoots dog

On Friday, July 10, at approximately 8:15 p.m., a member of Princeton RCMP detachment attended at a residence in the Town of Princeton to conduct inquiries into a complaint that he had received earlier that day.

When he walked up the driveway, and around the rear corner of the residence where he was attacked by a dog that was in the back yard. The officer quickly backed up but the dog hit him about waist level and tore the portable police radio from his belt. He was able to push/kick the dog off, then the dog immediately came at him again. The officer, defending himself from harm, drew his service pistol and shot the dog.

A review of the circumstances will be conducted by the RCMP.

Local venison:

It is good for your heart

The Similkameen is well-known for its good beef, but Princeton produces another kind of meat gaining in popularity: venison.

Gary Cleggett started his fallow deer operation in 1991, a year after he purchased his property along Highway 5A. His son, Rod, now lives on the farm with his family.

The fallow deer herd averages 200 animals at any time, but may increase to 250 this fall. They are hardy animals, resistant to climate changes, and have adapted well to this area. They are European fallow deer, averaging 60 to 65 pounds dressed weight (30 kg) for females, more for males. A few are Mesopotamia cross, a larger breed, up to 300 pounds on the hoof on the average.

Fallow deer produce meat that is 23 to 26 per cent protein and one to two per cent fat. This low-fat meat makes venison an excellent source of protein for people on a cholesterol reduced diet. (Beef averages 23 per cent fat). The meat is fine-textured, but due to the lack of fat, must be cooked with a little water to keep it tender.

The Cleggetts are proud of what they feed the deer: nothing but natural foods. The deer free-range, and love to eat grass. Cleggetts do not feed growth stimulants to the deer, as fallow deer react negatively to such products. As a result, the venison is free of anything unnatural.

One of the problems Cleggetts have had is loss of fallow deer to coyotes. This problem was solved by putting three donkeys in with

the deer. The donkeys guard the deer and keep the coyotes off the property.

Cleggetts welcome visitors who want to see the fallow deer. They likewise welcome orders for the venison, although they prefer a week's notice for a whole animal. Iceberg Meats does the butchering, and the venison comes cut, wrapped and frozen to the Cleggetts, who keep it frozen for their customers.

Fallow deer are raised for more than their meat. Every part of the animal is used. There is no waste. The velvet from the bucks' horns is sold to Asians, who make a tea from it. The hides make the highest quality leather for gloves and clothing (including one lady who has a bikini made of it). The manure reduces to powder and becomes high quality fertilizer, which the Cleggetts sell by the bag (and use on their remarkable garden).

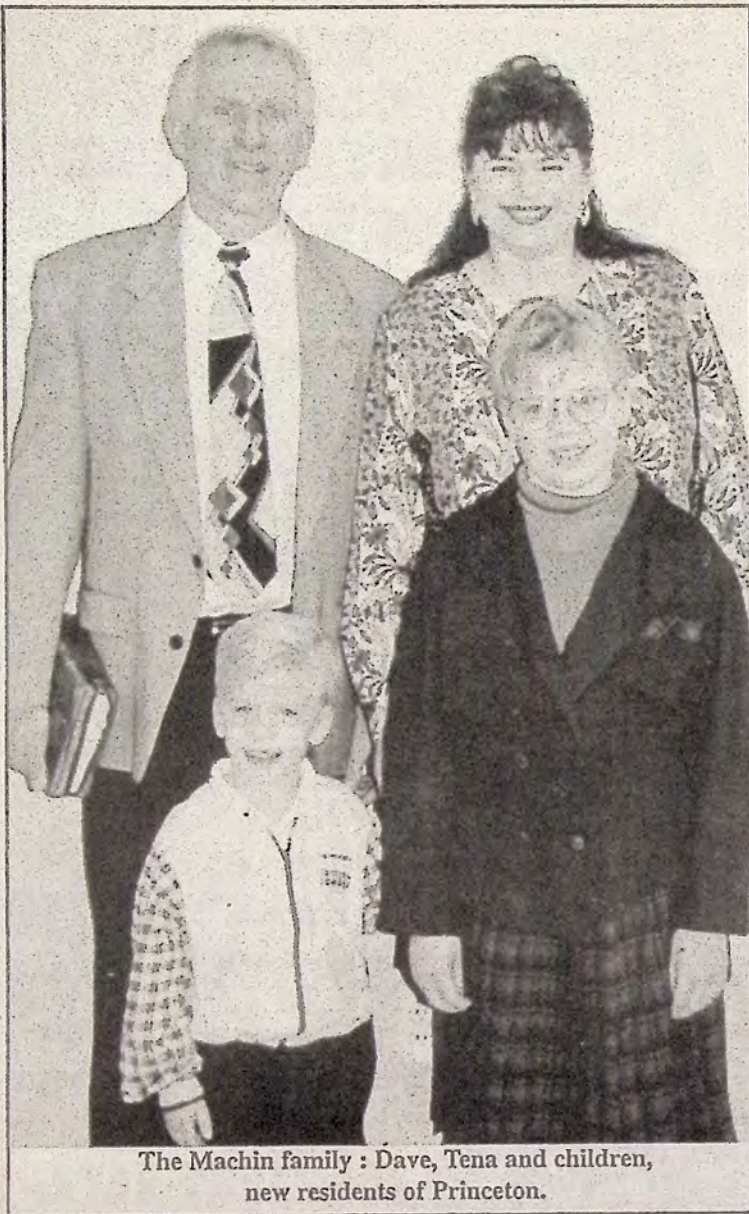

Limited speed motorcycles

Not all motorcycles require a class six driver's license to operate on the highway. A special type of motorcycle known as a limited speed motorcycle may be operated by a driver who has a valid license class one to five. Both types of motorcycle require that the driver wear an approved motorcycle safety helmet. A motorcycle is a limited speed motorcycle only when it fits all of

the following criteria:

- The motor must have a piston displacement of 50cc or less, or a power source producing a maximum of 1.5 kilowatts.
- The power drive system must not require clutching or shifting after the system is engaged.
- The maximum speed attainable on level ground must not be more than 70 km/h, with or without pedals.

• The maximum vehicle weight is 60 kg., without fuel, or if it is electrically powered, without the battery.

• The wheels must have a diameter of 254 mm or more.

If even one of these requirements is not met, it is not a limited speed motorcycle and the drivers must have a class 6 license.
