There is life and heart in Hedley. Many mining towns have come and gone, living and dying with the mines that fed them. We have seen the passing of Blakeburn, Allenby and Copper Mountain. Hedley refused to die.

For many former Hedley residents, the Centennial will be a time to see friends and family in a reunion atmosphere.

Name "The Pit" slated for change

The committee responsible for managing The Pit, Princeton's teen centre, met on July 14 to plan a strategy for future management of the centre.

The group decided to change the name from The Pit to one of the following: The Planet, The

Boonies, The Alternative or Area 120. People between the ages of 9 and 18 are invited to submit a vote in favour of one of those names.

The name receiving the most votes will be announced at a party schedule for July 30 at The Pit (or whatever you want to call it). The deadline for voting is July 30. Votes can be left at the centre or at the News Leader.

Paul Huycke is no longer available to manage the teen centre. The committee is seriously con-

sidering a joint management team of Recreation Commission and Princeton Secondary School student council.

The committee is still working on a book sale for July 31 and the Sight and Sound barbecue on August 1 with the Arts Council.

The committee decided to ask Council once again for financial assistance for the teen centre, and decided to make a presentation at the July 20 public Town Council meeting.

Thief may be a seamstress

A camper who placed a Singer sewing machine just outside the door of a camping trailer has lost it to a thief. The machine was in a purple and black upholstered bag, and belonged to the owner of the trailer parked at Princeton Campground, just east of Princeton near the golf course.

Town receives dike money

The Ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks has awarded \$15,000 to the Town of Princeton from the Flood Protection Assistance Program. The Town had applied for the money early this year for the purpose of diking on the Tulameen River. An additional \$15,000 has been awarded for Tulameen dike rehabilitation.

The Town has had ongoing concerns with riverbed debris build-up at the confluence of the Tulameen and Similkameen Rivers.

The government approved 37 projects in B.C. for a total of \$2.1 million. The province's share is 75 per cent of the total costs of the projects.

Citizen angry over shooting

Alice Zirk states she has complained to the Attorney General about a police officer shooting a dog in her yard on July 6. Her complaint is not that the dog was shot but that her children were in danger when the dog was shot, due to the way in which the shooting was done. Zirk says repeated shots were fired in the presence and near vicinity of her two children, and she feels that the officer did not show due consideration for the safety of her children.

New Beginnings marks first anniversary

"It's been a wonderful year!" says Kim Fraser-Beswick, co-ordinator for New Beginnings, a program to assist former Mini Chef Restaurant workers adapt to retirement.

The program began June 15, 1997, and has continued to serve 14 clients. There are three staff, and two are on duty daily.

A first anniversary party on July 15 celebrated the success of the program.

Carol Shea, District Supervisor on behalf of the Ministry for Children and Families, spoke to those who gathered at the Elks Hall for the afternoon tea. She spoke of the importance of everybody in the community working together.

"It takes every person to make a community," Shea said, and went on to praise Princeton people for their ongoing inclusion of everyone connected with the program.

Mayor Randy McLean attended the celebration, and said Shea had spoken the words he would have said. He added that he had not been at the New Beginnings facility before, and was very impressed with their accommodations.

Judge orders work service

A male Princeton youth appeared in Young Offenders Court in Princeton on July 16 to plead guilty to a theft charge. The youth had been involved in a theft with his brother, but the brother is the subject of a warrant for failing to appear. The youth, who returned what he had taken, wished to clear up the charges.

The youth had no prior convictions. Judge DB Overend ordered the youth to serve an eight month probation, pay restitution, find a job or go to school, write an apology to the people he stole from, and do 40 hours of unpaid community work service.

Commissioner seeks locations and crew

Seven months into his tenure, Okanagan-Similkameen's film commissioner, Mark Flett, can see the pieces of the big picture coming together.

Mark Flett took office as the area's commissioner in December, 1997. While Flett has been touting the area's virtues to film companies in Vancouver and Hollywood, the behind-the-scenes work has hit high gear. One of the most important products of that work has been a film production guide for the Okanagan Similkameen, which provides information prospective productions on government contacts, weather, immigration and tax considerations, as well as a guide to area businesses that film companies may need to use.

"When an area presents an attractive and concise production guide to producers, it tells them that this region has a professional plan in place and is serious about attracting the film business," says Flett. Building the infrastructure necessary to support a film industry is part of Flett's mandate. As part of that work, the commission has started to identify and recruit experienced local crew members.

"We now have more than 80 possible crew members in our database and we're looking for more," says Flett. "If anyone out there has film experience, please contact our office in Kelowna." (1-250-717-0087)

Other projects in progress include a new brochure and video showing the diversity of possible

film locations that the region has to offer. Location scouting is an ongoing project and the commission has roughly 400 location photofiles in their library.

"Locations are the inventory we market to the world and we are always looking for more," says Flett. "We encourage people who have what they feel are unique and interesting locations to contact us."

While contact with the film industry is critical to the success of the commission, equally crucial components in the equation are public awareness of the commission's efforts and public input. That's why the film commission is planning to hold forums throughout the valley to let people know what it is doing.

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Republic Washington

Town makes old rocks pay

What happens to a town when its major industry closes?

Gold supported Republic, Washington, from 1896 to just a few years ago. Most mining towns die quickly or slowly when the mines close, but Republic lives on. They found a new kind of gold buried in 50 million year old rocks. This new gold is called fossils.

Republic is an out-of-the-way little town on the high plateau east of the Okanagan River and west of the Columbia River. Every year, an average of 9,000 people make their way to Republic for one reason: fossils.

People flock to the tiny fossil museum (approximately 15 feet wide by 20 feet long) to see the fossils and to go fossil hunting. Approximately 1,000 school children are bused to Republic each year, some from as far away as Spokane, to see the fossils and the fossil beds.

There is no charge to view the fossil collection, which stars a perfect little rose fossil. The rest of the fossil collection is very much like our own, but much less extensive. Nearly every visitor views the collection, then asks for the "big" experience of finding their own fossils. This is the beginning of the money-making for the museum and the town.

A donation of \$2.00 per person is requested for fossil hunting (children under 12 are free). Then there is a rental fee for fossil hunter's tools, a hammer and cold chisel. On the average, each person stopping at the fossil centre

spends \$5.00. There are brochures, books, postcards, cards and other souvenir items on sale.

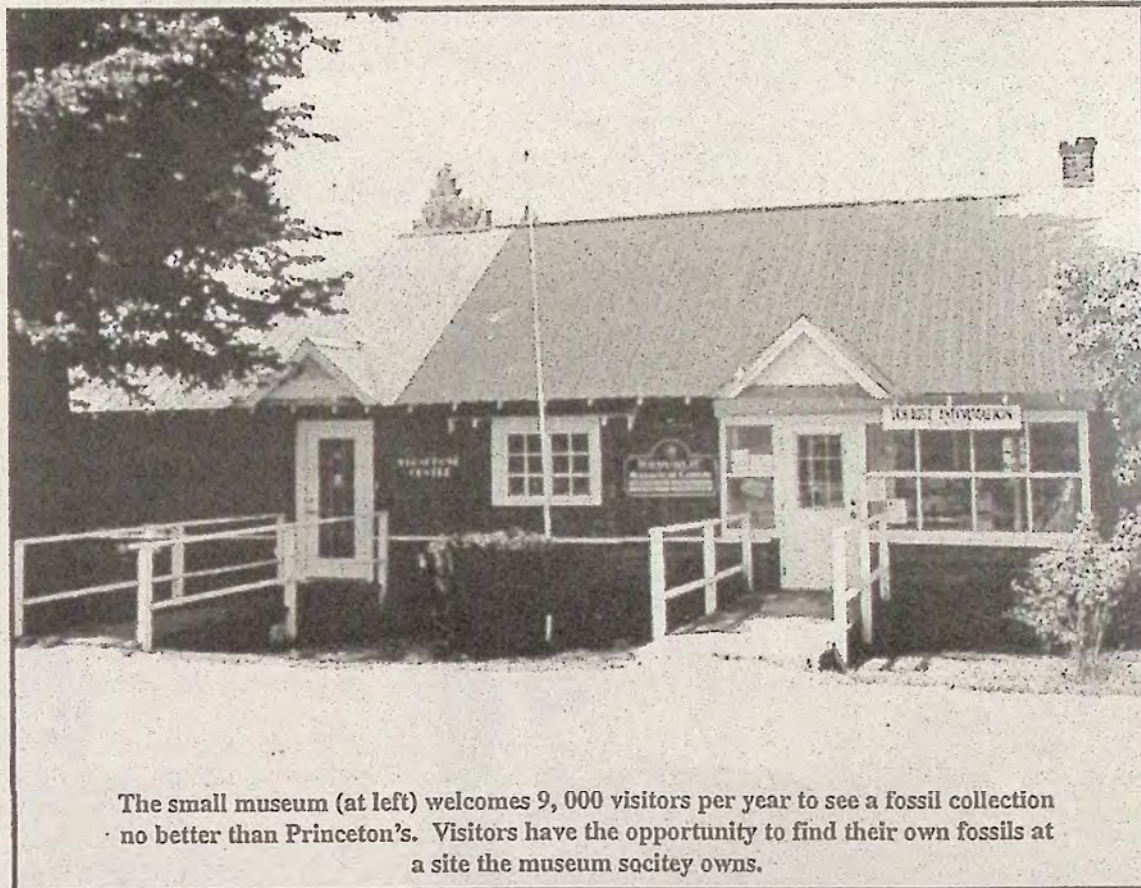
Translating 9,000 visitors at \$5.00 a head works out to \$45,000 a year in museum revenue and a full-time job for one person and part-time for a second person, with enough left over to cover expenses.

The revenue to the town is a spin-off from the fossil hunting. People who spend time fossil-hunting for an hour or two want to have at least a snack and a drink, if not a full meal. A gas station stop is important for many. Some are ready for dinner and a stop at the tavern, and they stay at a motel. The fossils turn to gold in one way or another.

Republic has a little of everything. Shops include a bakery, grocer, hardware store, drugstore (the ceiling should be in a museum!) real estate sales, a small bank, and two clothing stores. There is a chiropractic clinic, hairdresser, optometrist and a teen centre under construction.

The town is smaller than Princeton, but fossil hunters find more to do than dig fossils. They eat, shop and many stay over.

The same professor who worked on fossils in our area is featured in a booklet about Republic. A photo shows Wesley C. Wehr digging fossils in the Republic site. The booklet contains a great deal of information on the fossils, the rock formation, and the age of the rocks.

In this week's News Leader, readers will find stories about two towns where the gold mines played out but the towns refused to die. Hedley, B.C., and Republic, Washington, have a great deal in common. Republic celebrated one hundred years in 1996, Hedley celebrates one hundred years next week. Both are still alive despite the loss of the town's main source of jobs.

In the old days, when the gold or other mineral played out, the town disappeared. Remnants of the former glory may have remained, but the towns became "ghost" towns.

A town is more than the industry that supports it. A town is about memories of times shared, friends, neighbours, family, and ties that bind. A town is about remembered places, favourite pastimes, and perhaps a loved one buried in the local cemetery. A town is about schools, churches, clubs, and achievements.

We commend Hedley on their Centennial. The celebration will bring back the people who carry the memories of a place still dear to their hearts. The festivities will no doubt attract others who simply want to help Hedley celebrate, but the majority will attend for the sake of those treasures of the heart that made Hedley a special place to live, and will keep Hedley alive for years to come, gold or no gold.

The amazing survival of little towns is a modern trend. Many people move to towns where mines have closed because these little towns do not have major industries. Perhaps there is less money to be made, but many people want something money cannot buy, and towns like Hedley are just the place to be.

We are witnessing a revival in the importance of community life. We salute Hedley and the people who refuse to let it die. May Hedley live long and live well!

Is Lali abandoning the elderly?

Dear Editor:

Re your front page story "Home Health care cuts to hit elderly": why those who are helpless?

In telling our local home care people by the Ministry of Health that the responsibility for these cuts is in the hands of the Regional Health Board, why has our elected MLA abrogated his responsibility to the very people who elected him? It appears that our elected people have handed health care over to a bunch of union bureaucrats. Again, I ask why? I would also ask Mr. Lali why tinker with a system that was working, only to see it fail?

No, Mr. Lali, death by the fire-side is not dying with dignity. Home services was, and will be if left as it is, a godsend to those elderly. I personally have saved the government many thousands of dollars by taking on the responsibility to care for my now 90-year-old wife. Out of six years, 1 1/2 years of home care for two hours twice a week, was more than appreciated. Are you, Mr. Lali and the rest of the government, abandoning these people by handing over these responsibilities to people who are not elected nor responsible? And why should they care?

No, Mr. Lali, to this deal! I suggest that you pass a bill to legalize euthanasia so at least these people can die with dignity. Barring this, I would hope that you and the others in government see fit to put a few more dollars into the system so it can

continue to function as has been in the past. Remove the uncertainties from these elderly. Do not force them to uproot and go to a more or less hostile environment at far greater cost. Under the directives we now face, this will very quickly escalate into a hospital care situation (\$600 a day, more or less) will very

quickly add up. To allow our Regional Health Care people to cut costs at the expense of these elderly is criminal. Home health care locally is far better and I think, more economical.

Osprey Lake resident says Lali should drive Hwy. 40

Dear Editor:

At the beginning of May, 1998, a petition was distributed regarding the deplorable condition of Highway 40 (Princeton-Summerland Road) between Princeton and Osprey Lake.

Volunteers collected 312 signatures from residents, recreational property owners, tourists, and local business people who use Highway 40. On June 2, the petition sheets and a letter were mailed out to Honourable Lali, local MLA and Transportation and Highways Minister. Copies were also sent to Ron Domanko, Highways Pentiction, Betty Spalton, President and CEO Argo Road Maintenance Inc, Pentiction, Clint Lee, Argo Road Maintenance Inc., Princeton. As of this date, no reply has been received from any of the above.

Shortly after the petition was distributed, the road crew started repairing some of the more visible and bottomless potholes. As

of July 14, there has been some work done on repairing sections of road on Highway 40. Some repairs appear to have taken a number of tries to complete. The favoured method, a shovel of cold mix thrown into a pothole and then drive the one ton dump over it with the rear dual wheels to pack it in, hasn't held up.

Over the period of the past month and a half, it seems that the group of individuals repairing the said section have wandered out a number of times, when in my opinion they could have started at one end and done it properly and carried it right through. I'm just a taxpayer trying to get his money's worth.

Thank you, Mr. Minister, staff and road crew, we appreciate you looking after our best interests. Drive out one day and let's have coffee to chat about the condition of Highway 40 between Princeton and Osprey Lake.

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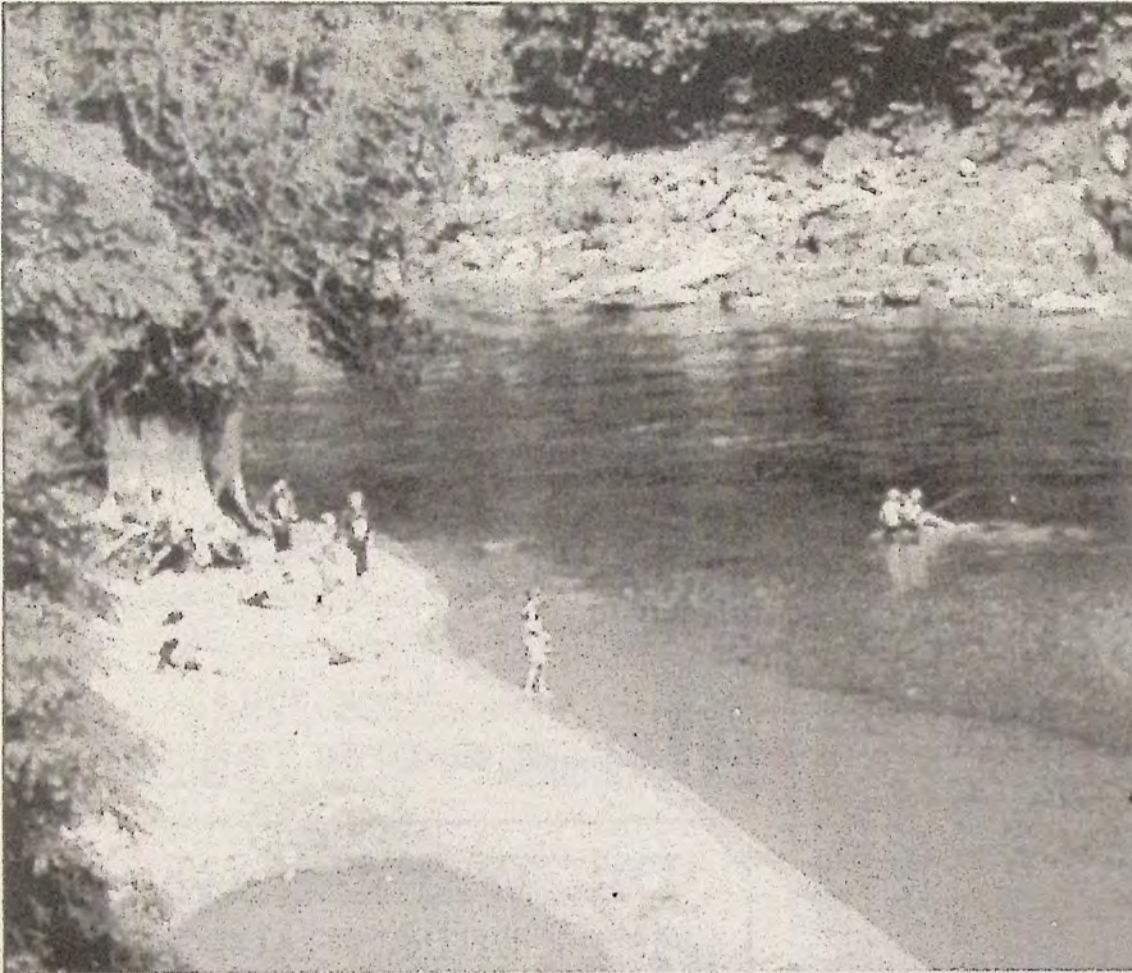

Swimmers face itch hazard

In the last few weeks, we have had many calls at the Health Unit regarding Swimmers' Itch. Unfortunately, this bothersome itchy rash seems to be a part of summer fun in our area.

So, what is Swimmers' Itch anyway?

Swimmers' Itch is caused by small, worm-like parasites called schistosomes found in many lakes and ponds in B.C. They are especially prevalent in warm summer months, when beaches are most heavily used. These parasites spend part of their life in the body of water snails and part of their life living in the blood stream of aquatic mammals, ducks or other water fowl. At a certain point in their life cycle, the schistosome larvae leave their snail host and float around near the surface of the water, where they come into contact with birds, animals or the skin of human swimmers or waders. Once the human leaves the water and starts to dry off, these worm-like larvae start to burrow under the human's skin.

The larvae cannot survive in humans, so they die almost immediately after they burrow into the skin, and it is actually the ALLERGIC REACTION to these little corpses that causes the itchy rash.

Swimmers' itch can range from a mild rash to a very severe, itchy red rash which may become badly infected from too much scratching. The rash ranges from small pinpoint red spots initially to red bumps resembling an insect bite

within an hour or two. The itching feeling often gets worse and may last two to five days, and sometimes as long as two weeks, before slowly fading.

The rash cannot be spread from person to person, and is only dangerous if a secondary infection occurs from too much scratching. Anyone with bites that look infected should see a doctor.

Some things you can do to avoid this "pesty" problem:

- avoid swimming in areas with lots of weeds (snails are more apt to be around plants)
- apply water-proof sun screen before swimming ... sometimes this makes the skin more difficult to penetrate
- ideally, have a shower immedi-

ately after swimming, this will wash the larvae away. The shower should be followed by brisk towel drying.

If you happen to be one of the unlucky people to experience these summer pests, the recommended treatments include:

- avoid scratching
- apply anti-itch lotion (calamine)
- use of antihistamines
- baking soda bath with lukewarm water
- application of cool compresses to the bumps

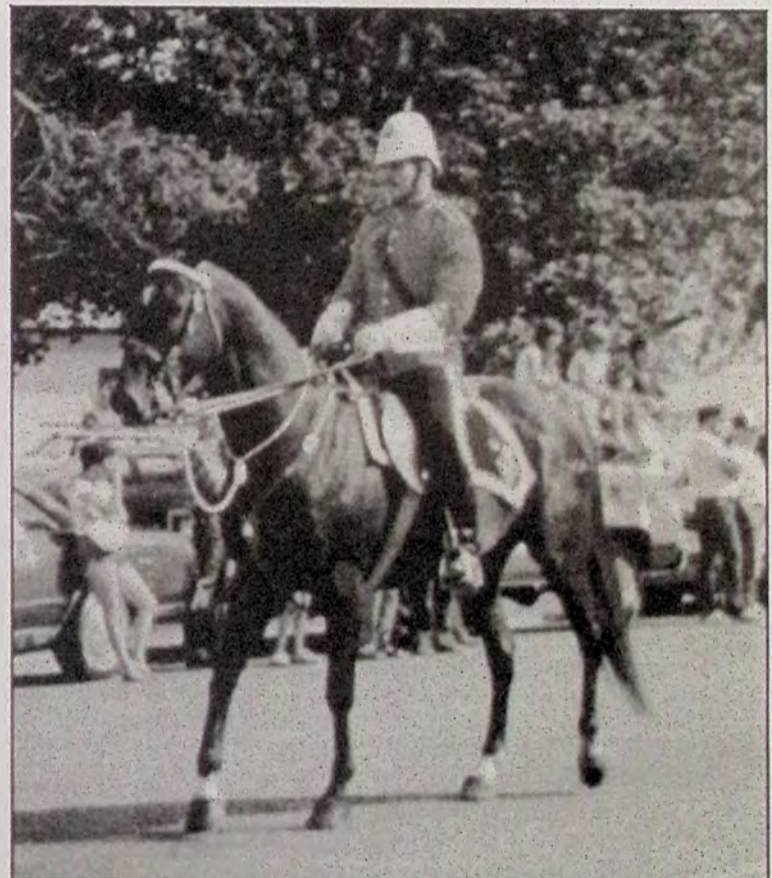

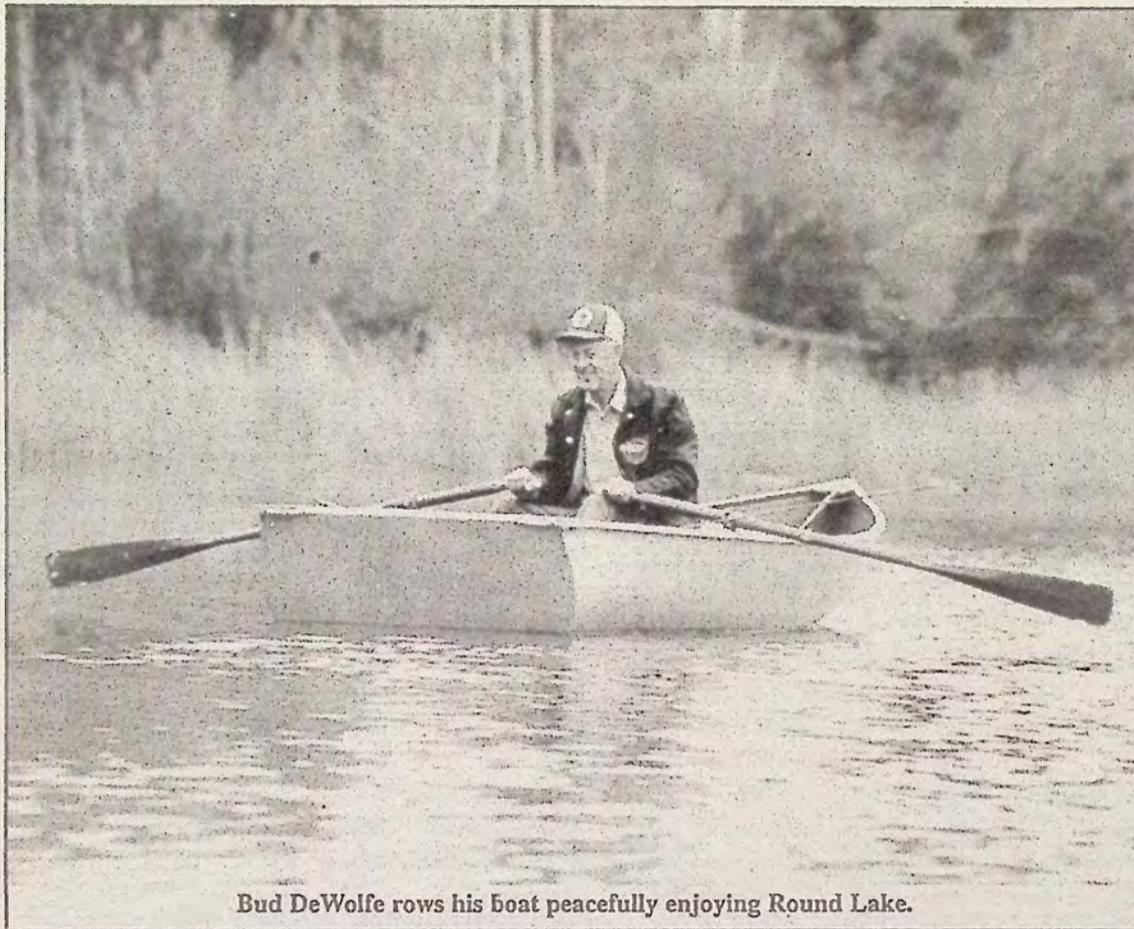

Trout Talk

Borgeson Lake, alias Round Lake

Another of our lakes with dual names! The fourth lake as you travel northeast on Highway 5A is Round Lake. I still call it that, and always will. When the powers that be decided to change its perfectly good and descriptive name (it is ROUND), they chose to select the name of the early homesteader who farmed the land on the north side of the lake. This beautiful farm is still active, but owned by people not related to the Borgesons.

Many people will remember Bud DeWolfe, a long-time resident. He managed our local Overwaitea for years, and he also did a lot of good work for hunters and fishermen of our area. Did you know that many of our lake accesses are his work? Through his guidance, the Princeton Fish and Game Club lobbied the government for public access and campsites on many lakes which otherwise would not be available for us.

Anyway, Round Lake was one of his favourites. He could often be seen on it, rowing his 12-foot aluminum boat slowly along the lake. His fly was the Anderson nymph - a peacock herl and yellow wool creation, which represents a larva of some unknown insect! I say "unknown" because I haven't seen anything in the water which resembles it! However, for Bud, it, or the method he used, was a winner.

I would see him at the Overwaitea check-out counter and he would ask, "How's fishin'?"

I would reply and ask him what his results were last week.

More often than not, he would say "they were hitting on Round on the Anderson", and they would be the bright silver Kamloops

everyone wants.

Bud has passed on now, but is remembered with great affection by all who knew him. A boat ramp on Laird Lake was built and dedicated to his memory and good conservation work.

Another fisherman who loved Round Lake was John Haayer, Sr., the Inland Natural Gas Manager in Princeton for many years. John and I used to go out to Round and fish over the spring holes on the north end of the lake, just off the boat landing. Around 8:30 at night, in July, the big ones would move into these holes. (Those of you who haven't tried these holes are missing a good bet.)

John used an expression I will never forget - "reel screamer" - and then he would make the sound of his Hardy fly reel as the line was pulled off by a big Kamloops Rainbow.

John took the regular Halfback Nymph and modified it. He called it the Three-Quarter-Back. As far as I know, he never tied or used any other fly. He was a good example of a person who had confidence in a fly and successfully stayed with it!

John purchased a building lot on the lake and was in the process of making his dream cabin when a transfer to Merritt and terminal illness cut short his dream. He will be remembered among his

Have you killed your Year 2000 bug?

You are out with friends at a restaurant party to usher in the new millennium, New Years Eve, 1999. Sipping champagne, you watch on the big screen TV as the ball drops in New York Time Square. Five, four, three, two, one: Happy New Year! suddenly the power goes out. Whether you drink or not, your New Year's ingover has just begun. Luckily an emergency generator comes on so you can see your way. You decide to leave, paying the bill with your credit card. The waiter informs you that your credit card has been rejected. You decide to get some money out of the nearby ATM, but the elevator you took to get to the party is stuck on the ground floor and you have to walk down many flights of stairs.

When you get to the bank machine it refuses to dispense any money. You decide to drive home to get some cash, but the parking garage where you put your car on the way to the party now calculates that you owe them more money than you make in an entire year. In frustration you opt to take a cab, but there's none in sight. They are all caught up in a massive traffic jam downtown that has happened because all the traf-

fic light systems failed. Sound Impossible? Perhaps? This problem is known as the year 2000 bug, the Y2K, or in Canada the CAN2K. This is not a virus but a programming glitch or bug that effects all computers. Most computers and electronic equipment today have been programmed to read the date in the "DD/MM/YY" format or six digit format, where the "YY" represents the year. The Year 2000 bug centers around the first day of January 2000, when the date sensitive components of these computers and equipment will begin to read "00". As the year rolls over, computers will fail to recognize the "00" as the year 2000, reading it as 1900 or an invalid entry. The problem will effect all levels of date sensitive computing, including personal computers, networks, electronic equipment, such as bank vaults, elevators, security systems and even VCRs. Does the New Years Eve scenario still sound impossible? In our computer dependent society the year 2000 poses a threat to all of us. There are things we can do now to reduce the risks associated with the problem. Most large businesses and corporations are dealing with the problem, but

small business may not think that this problem will affect them. With a lack of experts in the field it may be very costly to play the wait and see game. Now is the time to act! Computers can be checked to see if they are year 2000 compliant and some programs may need to be updated to ensure a smooth transition to the new millennium. Consider a small business that uses computerized accounting on a computer for invoicing, ordering or record keeping. This entire accounting system could fail as the date turns over to the year 2000. Simple upgrades may fix all the potential problems and cost far less. Also consider all the embedded microchips that exist in almost everything today, from telephones to cars. If your business depends on the successful operation of any of these types of equipment you should be looking closely at the year 2000 bug and possible problems and solutions. Composting is easy

Are you interested in composting? Do you already compost, but are having problems?

There is no better time than now to build your compost or make your existing compost better than ever. Composting is easy, and it helps feed the soil. All you have to do is follow a few steps and you will turn your garbage into gold!

1) There are four basic composting groups: wet - such as vegetable and fruit peels; dry - such as twigs and sawdust; green - such as grass clippings and brow - such as dead leaves.

2) Never put pet feces, meat, chicken, fish, dairy products, or pet food in your compost. They will attract rodents and make your compost smell bad.

3) Your compost should be as wet as a wrung-out sponge. This is the best environment for the organisms that decompose compost materials.

4) If your compost pile is too dry, too much air is circulating through it. Add more wet compost, water it, or make the pile bigger.

5) If your compost is too wet, it will smell like rotten eggs and attract fruit flies. You need to turn, pull apart and re-stack the pile so aeration and drainage occur.

6) For fast composting, your pile must be large enough to hold heat and moisture, but small enough to admit air. The hotter the pile, the

quicker it will compost. 7) Turning your compost, and shredding materials before adding them to your pile, will speed up the decomposition process. 8) Giving your compost less attention will still give you great results, but will take six months to two years to complete the process. 9) A compost pile is either quick and hot, or cool and slow. Both decompose contents into entirely new material. 10) When your compost is finished, a dark loose crumbly material resembling rich soil remains. Your compost is ready to use for growing new plants and beginning the process over again.

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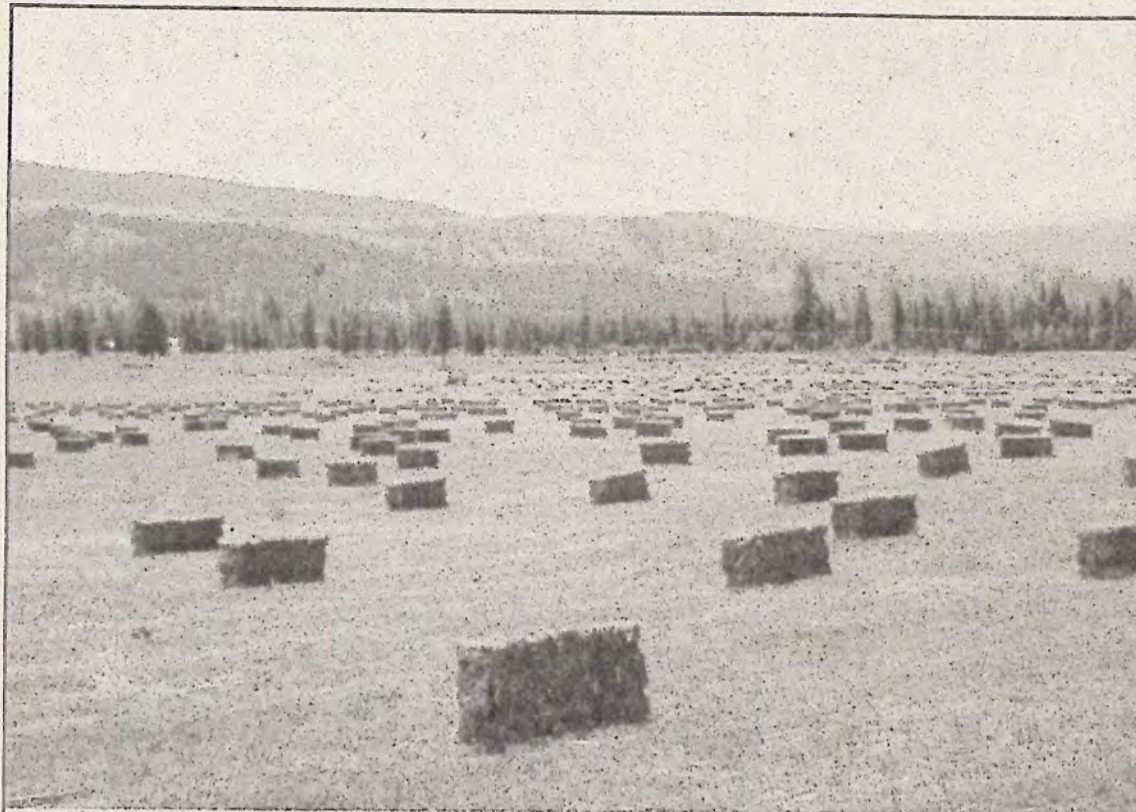


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Despite continual thunder showers, local ranchers are putting up hay. Bales lined up across the fields are a common sight during the summer months in the Similkameen Valley.

Princeton – the provincial pulse?

It could be said the way Princeton goes, so goes the province of B.C., whether it's the election of our MLA or mining, forest industry, hospital and ambulance cutbacks, confrontation with doctors, lack of significant highway upgrading, etcetera, etcetera, etcetera, the list goes on. And now, the attack on the most vulnerable – the elderly and the needy.

The \$25,000 per month cutback on Community Services takes that amount out of our local economy, devastates those who lose their jobs, adds anxiety to those who feel they may be next, tosses into oblivion hours and years of untold planning and work. Most importantly, removing the services to the elderly and needy leaves vulnerable when they need security and stability at a most critical time in their lives.

What does that say about our society?

"Care for your neighbours as you would like them to care for you." It is a given that we have a bankrupt government and the worst is yet to come. We would like to believe the authorities are not callous in their cutbacks, but the record clearly shows their continuation of incredibly misguided and irresponsible policies that blatantly disregard the rightful needs of all our citizens.

Let's review how some of these policies may have been arrived at. Last year, while the legislature was in session, a group of women placed a windup toy on a male MLA's desk causing an uproar.

The toy was a replica of the human male anatomy that identifies as male as a male. Apparently, it did all kinds of hilarious tricks. Nothing was said of the missing fig leaf. Perhaps it was the economy model. Now,

Community Services: A quarter century of service

Princeton and District Community Services Society is celebrating 25 years of serving the people of our area.

Joyce Fraser, Administrator of Community Services, began a Local Initiatives Project in 1973 which has grown into a permanent, much-needed service. The News Leader is proud to have her describe some of the history of this phenomenal society. Community Services has been a leader, a model for other communities to follow.

In Fraser's own words: Princeton and District Community Services Society is a non-profit agency which contracts our services to various ministries, ie: Ministry of Health, Ministry For Children and Families, B.C. Transit and B.C. Housing. This simply means we are service providers and the various ministries contract with us to provide the services and programs they are responsible for, according to their mandates and guidelines.

We will begin by saying Princeton and District Community Services Society has pioneered the development of a continuum of services in Princeton and area since 1973. In the beginning, we only provided Homemaking and Transportation. The two had

been developed as we discovered a tremendous need in the area. Many people were suffering great hardship.

Our brochure boasts that we are the "Biggest Little Agency in the Interior". "We discovered a need, filled it, and just got bigger."

We have worked very hard to fill the gaps in the community, often creating something out of nothing and using whatever means were available at the time. Many thousands of volunteer hours, talents and donations played a large part in the success of Princeton and District Community Services Society and we all enjoy the community pride it brings to each of us.

Loans and mortgages from our local CIBC bank provided the finances to purchase our properties, which in turn provided the site we were developing at the time. We were all dedicated to the dream of providing a continuum of services and programs for our senior and disabled population to "Age in Place" where they are loved and respected for their contribution to this community.

Today I want to tell you about the services and cluster of programs we provide for the Ministry of Health. As health

care continues to move to regionalization and "Closer to Home", our frail and elderly clients with chronic health conditions were emphatic that being at home or home-like environment was their choice.

Beginning in 1973, we developed our home support and Meal on Wheels program.

Home Support: Intake Process All clients are assessed by case managers (assessors) at the Princeton Health Unit. We have nothing to do with the assessment, as personal, confidential and financial information is part of the assessment. The assessment determines the client's need and level of care. If they are eligible, they become a Long Term Care client. Our office receives instructions as to what services the person will receive as well as frequency of service, and if there is a charge or not. Some clients pay a "client contribution" which is based on their financial information. All this is confidential and our agency does not receive this information.

The assessor, in conjunction with our RN supervisor, develops a care plan for each individual. All tasks that the client can receive are specified on a duty sheet which is left in the client's home. A home support worker

is assigned to the client, taking into consideration the client's needs, etc. We try to match home support workers with the client's needs. We must follow all guidelines and standards set down by the Ministry of Health.

If the client has problems which require special procedures, home support workers with these skills are assigned by the RN supervisor. A delegation of task is completed which covers liability for our agency. The types of service offered include personal care (bathing, etc.), medication, surveillance, meal preparation, shopping, vacuuming, palliative, live in (respite for caregivers).

MEALS ON WHEELS
Meals are delivered Monday to Friday at a cost of \$4.00 per meal if the recipient is a client of Community Services. A home

support worker delivers the meals and reports on clients who may have a problem, ie, if the client did not cancel a meal and does not answer the door, we investigate to make sure the client is not sick or unconscious. Over the years, we have discovered clients in various conditions and situations, and lives have been saved.

Through the Ministry of Health we provide a cluster of programs such as Home Support, dietary and volunteer program at Sheltered Housing, adult day centre, respite to caregivers, palliative care and live-in services, which I will elaborate on at a later date.

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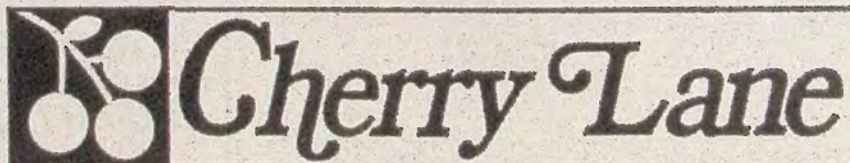
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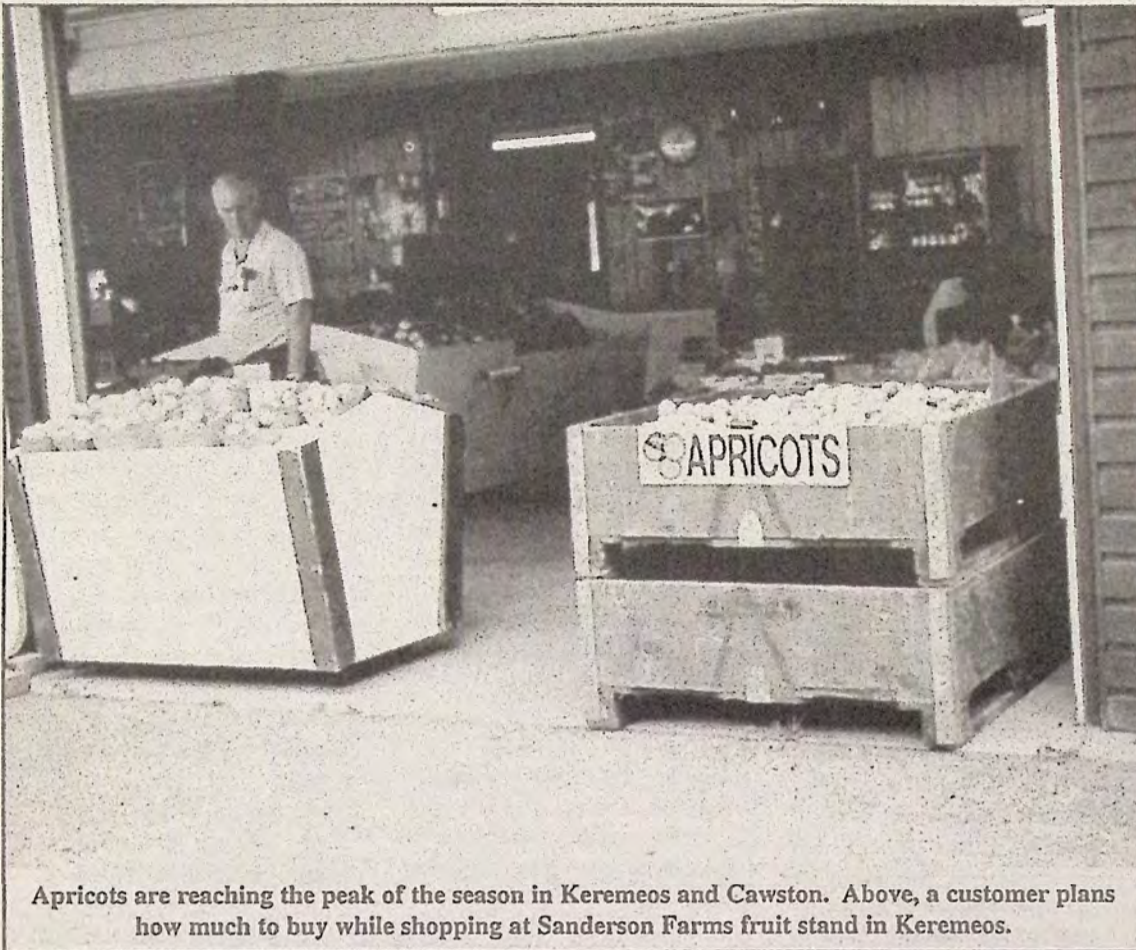

Apricots are health food

Apricots are reaching the peak of the season in the Similkameen Valley. They are not only a delicious flavoured fruit, they are a "health" food.

Apricots have an extremely high level of Vitamin A, the vitamin that protects skin, eyes, respiratory system and digestive system. Vitamin A helps strengthen the immune system by strengthening the mucous membranes, such as those in eyes, ears, throat and nose. This makes Vitamin A a great infection fighter.

What more pleasurable way to take Vitamin A than by eating apricots? Think of apricot jam, preserved apricots, apricot pie, apricot upside down cake, apricot pudding and apricot sauce on pancakes or ice cream.

Apricots are far better for your health than peaches, and far less

expensive. For home canning, apricots are a cinch. Calculate about one pound of apricots per litre jar. Apricots are sweet, so add very little sugar to the canning syrup, one part sugar to four parts water.

To can apricots, rinse them, split in half, remove blemishes, and pack in jar with hot syrup added when jar is full. Place a snap lid on the jar, screw down the jar ring and turn back 1/8 turn. Place in hot water bath with water up to the shoulder of the jar. Boil for 20 minutes. When the water inside the jar is bubbling to the top, the jar will seal.

Cooking does not destroy the Vitamin A value of apricots, so go ahead and preserve as many as you can. They are wonderful for winter.

Programs turned over to friendship centres

The student bursary and elders' transportation programs of the provincial First Citizens' Fund will be administered by the B.C. Association of Aboriginal Friendship Centres. Aboriginal Affairs Minister Dale Lovick said on June 26.

"This transfer of the student bursary and elders' transportation programs reflects government's commitment to enable aboriginal organizations to take a stronger role in delivering programs for aboriginal people," said Lovick.

Last year, 125 student bursaries totalling \$148,000 were awarded to post-secondary aboriginal students. The Ministry of Aboriginal Affairs also provided a total of \$25,000 to 28 organizations to assist with travel costs for elders to attend cultural and educational gatherings.

"The student bursary and elders'

transportation programs are community support initiatives that will complement the role that our organization already plays in supporting aboriginal communities throughout the province," said BCAAFC executive director Paul Lacerte.

The First Citizens' Fund is composed of four programs: the student bursary program, elders' transportation program, friendship centre program and business loan program. The fund was established by the province in 1969. Interest earned on the fund is dedicated to enhancing social, educational and economic development opportunities for people of aboriginal ancestry (status, non-status, Metis and Inuit) who normally reside in B.C.

Expenditures for the First Citizens' Fund for the 1998/99 fiscal year will be \$2.9 million.
