Ortweins tell river ordeal story

“Nobody gave up”

On July 8, 15 year old Chris Ortwein nearly died. He lived because of the dedication of many local people who refused to give up.

The three Ortwein brothers, Shaun (age 17), Glen (age 13) and Chris, along with friend Lewis Clark, went swimming in the Tulameen River near the old trestle. They swam from 1:00 p.m. to around 4:00 p.m. Chris and Lewis were sitting on a log projecting from the bank into the water when the swift current caught Chris and sucked him under.

The roots of the log they were sitting on were slightly downstream. Chris was swept into the tangled roots and his foot became stuck among them.

Lewis dove five feet deep to pull at Chris' foot to free it. He came up and yelled to Shaun, “Chris is stuck.”

Lewis ran for help up a trail leading to the Third Bench residential area. Shaun wrapped his legs around the log to avoid being swept downstream and reached under the water to try to grab Chris' leg. Brad Hallatt, who had been on the river bank, went into the water and tried once to free Chris, but could not. Brad said Chris was stuck too tight. Shaun finally reached Chris' leg on the third try.

Shaun freed Chris, but Chris started to sink deeper into the river. Shaun managed to haul him to the surface, where Brad and Glen helped bring Chris to shore.

They placed Chris on a fairly level area of the river bank and Glen began pumping on Chris' chest and blowing into Chris' mouth. Glen had taken a course in Grade 7 where he learned CPR. Brad, who claimed to know CPR, tried to administer it, but would not blow into Chris' mouth, as there was water coming out of the side of it.

Shaun, who had seen CPR on a television drama called ‘E.R.’ (emergency room), tried to feel a pulse and could not find one.

After about three pumps on Chris' chest, Shaun thought he felt a faint flutter in the artery, so he and Glen kept taking turns pumping Chris' chest and blowing air into Chris.

Chris began wheezing and bringing up water. Glen and Shaun continued CPR.

Lewis returned at that point with a man who was qualified and who brought a mouthpiece. He took over the CPR. He had called for an ambulance.

The Ortwein family do not know who the man was, but they hope he will come forward so they can express their thanks for his help.

Sgt. Tom Payne, Princeton RCMP, arrived next, and radioed the ambulance to direct it to the exact location. Ten minutes had passed when the ambulance crew

Youth wins appeal for funding

“It's the only thing that is purely for youth in Princeton,” Jesse McLean told Town Council on July 20.

He was making a second appeal to Council for funds to carry The Pit, Princeton's teen centre, over the winter months.

He explained to Council, “It's a business and we intend to make it pay for itself.”

He pointed out that a beginning business needs money.

“To get a business going you pump money into it for up to four years.”

Tari Clarke, co-ordinator for the teen centre, showed a chart of fundraising activities and earned or anticipated income from each. They hoped to raise over \$2,000 on their own, through a garage sale, a draw, a car wash, a gala event, a book sale, and participation in the Arts Council event this weekend.

Other young people spoke out in favour of continued support for the centre. Bethany Bedard, Dustin Pasco and Graham Byatt said how valuable the centre is for youth.

Jesse McLean concluded the appeal by saying, “It is hard for these kids to come here and speak, and this shows they care.”

Mayor Randy McLean thanked the delegation and remarked, “The amount of money you've raised is a tribute to your efforts.”

When Council considered the appeal, Councillor Jim Manion stated, “I would like to see more adult participation. I see that the young people have put a lot of thought into this, and they have done a lot of fundraising, and I move to support them for one more year.”

Mayor Randy McLean commented, “If it's their idea, and they are enthusiastic, it's cool.”

Chamber wants new signs

Downtown business people want signs lighted from the inside, including neon signs, for Bridge Street and Vermilion Avenue. Ernie Willis, speaking for Princeton and District Chamber of Commerce, presented Chamber issues to Town Council on July 20.

David Anderson and Wen Wong, who headed the signage committee for Chamber, presented the request for lighted signs along with a petition signed by 75 downtown business owners.

Wong told Council, “All of the business people want more visible signs. Everybody wants some kind of lighting.”

Council was advised that there would be further recommendations to come.

Councillor George Armstrong asked if the lighted signs would adhere to existing size limits, and was assured there was no plan to

arrived. Chris was breathing partially on his own and had a faint pulse, but the ordeal was not over.

The unconscious boy was taken to Princeton General Hospital, where the fight to keep Chris alive continued for another five hours.

"They were trying to stabilize him," says father, Glen Ortwein Sr. "We lost him a few times. They used the paddles (electric shock device) on him and brought him back."

Council agrees to sidewalk selling for the month of August

Town Council considered a request from Princeton Sports to hold a sidewalk sale from July 21 to August 1, 1998.

After consideration, Council voted to allow "any store from now to the end of August can have a sidewalk sale as long as it does not block the sidewalk."

Dr. Doug Reid and Dr. Mick Whittle refused to give up. They and nurses continued until Chris was finally stabilized. The boy had not regained consciousness since he went under the log.

Once stabilized, Chris was taken to Intensive Care Unit in Penticton, where he remained in an unconscious condition for the next two days. He became stronger each day. On July 12, he returned home, having lost a couple of pounds but none the worse for having drowned.

Chris remembers nothing of these events, but he says he is impressed by the fact that "nobody gave up on me."

For Glen and Shaun, nearly losing their brother was a traumatic experience.

"I thought it never could happen to us," says Glen. "One day he was there and the next day he might not have been there."

For Glen, it was a lesson about life and mortality.

Shaun has difficulty pinning down how he feels about what he went through.

"It seemed like it was hopeless, then all of a sudden he pulled through. At times, I thought he wouldn't," Shaun told the News Leader, admitting he is still trying to sort out his feelings.

Glen, Sr., is extremely proud of the boys.

"They did so good!"

He shakes his head and says, "One day things are fine and in one minute it can change your whole life."

There is one thing that impressed all of them: everybody was there for them, giving them aid, showing how much they cared, helping in any way.

"I can't say how much that meant to us," says Glen Sr. "The whole town - they were there for us."

the antique cars travelling in Princeton in June "fit in so well with our decor". He asked if the committee had considered the theme when making the decision.

The myths of financial planning

The above myth is potentially the most intimidating aspect of money management for most people and a frequent barrier. Myth: Investing is risky.

One who avoids risk actually takes on risk as taxes and inflation deteriorate savings. One possible solution is asset allocation (your personalized mix of cash, fixed income and equity investments) and diversification which increase the potential for growth while minimizing risk.

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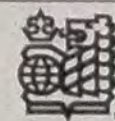
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Merritt Mountain Music Festival: Bigger and crazier than ever before

Whatever the choice of dress or

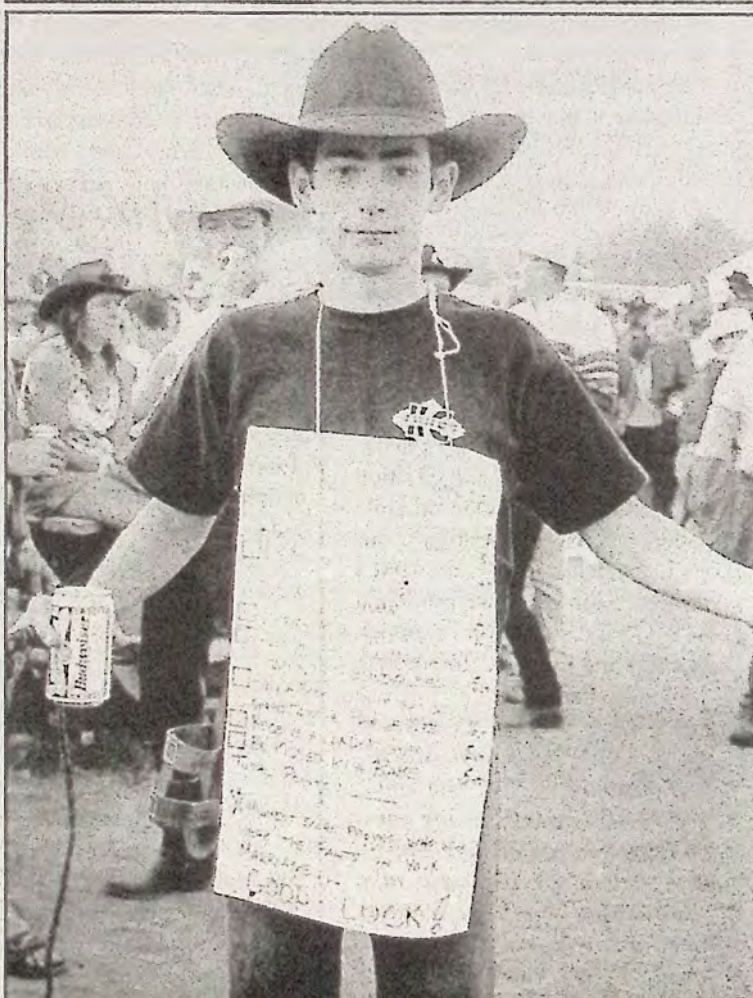
the style of camp, the people of the Festival are all here for the same thing - to listen to good country music and to have fun.

Trout Talk

The big lake: Allison

One of my first memories of driving up Highway 5A was coming around the curve on Allison Lake and seeing the beautiful blue roofs on the resort and cabins on the Merritt end of the lake. People called them "Skye Blue", and so the lake, which also has a beautiful blue hue, was nicknamed "Skye Blue". I would have liked to have seen the lake originally named that!

By the way, the white marl bottom of the lake, caused by the plants extracting calcium carbonate (marl) from the water, causes the reflection of sky light, thus giving it that beautiful blue colour.

The resort and cabins burned down years ago, and the land has been built up with many beautiful homes. There is even a big subdivision on the Merritt end.

There is a public launching site on the far side of the subdivision which some newcomers may not know about. You will find it handy. The campground at the south end has an excellent boat launch. Lots of good access on Allison Lake.

If you want a chance at a big trout - winter or summer - I think Allison Lake is your best bet! And recently, a strain of Rainbows called the Gerrard have been planted in the lake.

Gerrards, originally from the Kootenay Lake area, are famous for their size. Hopefully, these newcomers to Allison Lake will live up to that reputation. The present population of Rainbows does very well at getting big, too.

The rich marl beds and weed growth in Allison Lake produce lots of insects and shrimp. And if you have a large body of water and a rich food supply, you will get good fish growth. Allison Lake produces some "reel screamers". I have personally had a couple on my line, and I can only wonder how big they were. I never landed them!

Like most of our lakes, the best fishing on Allison is in the evening, especially in the summer! Many boating activities keep the fish down deep during the day. It is during the last few hours of daylight that the bigger fish move into the shallows. It used to be a tradition among anglers, like Laurie Currie, Art Olsen and Bill Smith, to name a few, to go down to their docks at dusk and cast for the big ones. Some used fly rods, but many found the Torpedo and Thumb (T&T) deadly!

You haven't heard of the T&T? It is a spinning rod rigged with a plastic torpedo bobber, usually a clear one, and the Tom Thumb. Tie the bobber on the end of your spinning line. From the bobber, tie a four-foot long, six-pound test premium quality leader. On the end of the leader is your size eight

or ten Tom Thumb. I like a white Tom Thumb, but the regular will do well also.

When you don't have the room necessary to fly cast, this spinning method is the way to go. Also, the trout can see the bobber's wake as you retrieve it slowly toward yourself. Don't move it too quickly. About three feet per second is good most of the time. The trout (I think, I've never actually asked one) come up to see the bobber and hit the trailing Thumb. On

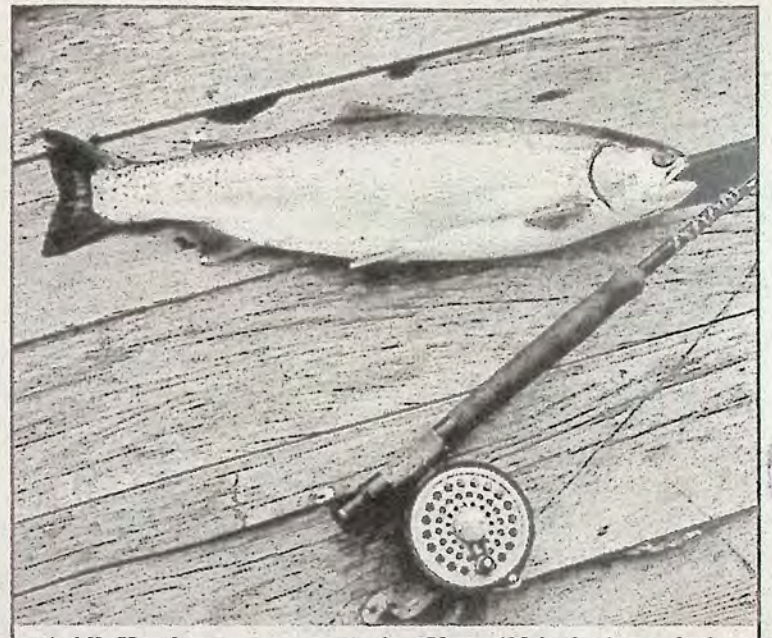
occasion, I have actually had them hit by bobber! Try the T&T. It works!

While I haven't used the T&T yet this year, I have been having success with the Idaho Nymph. Trolled deep on a sinking fly line, I've caught enough small ones for a fish feed. Those Allison Lake trout are sure good eating.

Good fishing this week - hope you are getting a feed now and then, too. (Next week "You Will Catch More Fish")

Leader: What does G.B. stand for?

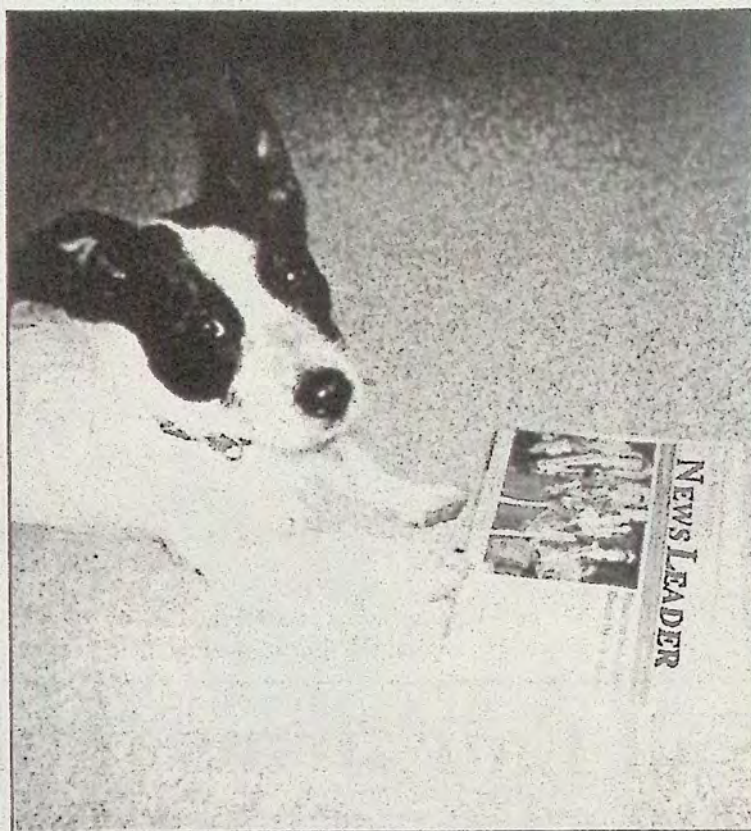
G.B.: Great Breed. I'm a Jack Russell, not to be confused with

After considering the request, Town Council voted to give the Youth Council support for their idea and allow them to use Council chambers for their meetings. No mention was made of creating a portfolio for youth.

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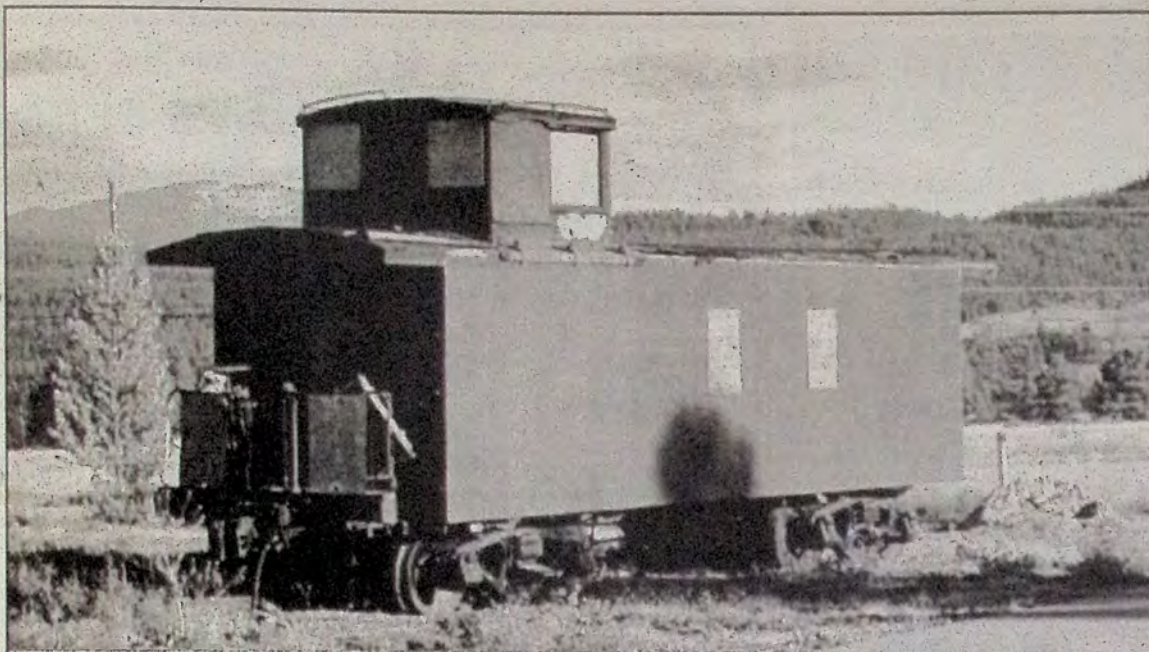
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The Fall Fair Association is concerned about where the Caboose will be located at the time of the fair. They want it moved.

The view from Crater Mountain

Fifteen hikers from the Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists can testify that, especially at this time of year, the view from Crater Mountain is stupendous. It rises steeply above the valleys of the Ashnola and Similkameen, and offers a panoramic view of the precipitous slopes into both rivers, and of the mountains of Cathedral Lakes Park. July is the month when its alpine meadows are rich in myriad flowers.

The name is a bit of a puzzle. The roots of the mountain seem to be firmly rooted in black basalt, but there is no obvious crater at the top, although there is a barren lava bed at the foot of the cliffs on the eastern face.

The tough part in making the ascent begins at the foot of the mountain by the Ashnola River. We piled into three 4 X 4s with high clearance and tackled the steep, winding road, rising from 600 metres above sea level to almost 2,000 over 1.2 kilometres. As the wheels crunched on the edge of the down slope, a glimpse downhill made stomachs churn. To make matters more exciting, the road had recently been deactivated. Deep gouges had been cut across the roadbed on almost every switchback, in order, we are told, to permit melting snow and rain to run off without damaging the road. This is 12 kilometres of very bumpy driving.

Eventually we reached the end of the road, and began a steady upward hike through beautiful open meadows crowded with lupines, the most brilliantly red

Indian paint brush I have ever seen, purple gentians, orange agoseris, sulphur buckwheat, and an awful lot of mountain locoweed. The guide book claims that those who consume this plant suffer from muscle contractions and violent behaviour, so we did not eat any.

The track left the grassy meadows, and rose past rocky crags and red shale covered with white heather, golden fleaband and mountain avens. Just before the peak, we surprised a herd of 15 mountain sheep, including a couple of rams with large curling horns, who disappeared over a dip which later turned out to be the almost sheer east face of Crater.

The light wind blew cool on the summit, a refreshing change after the warm slope. The air was crystal clear, the sky vivid blue, the vista awesome. To the northeast we could see Red Bridge Lake (presumably named after the covered red bridge in Keremeos), northwest, the silver roofs of the Mascot mine, above Hedley, shone in the sun. A glorious day, a splendid climb - many thanks to Peter Antonick and Janina Wetselaar for showing us the way.

The next hike is planned for the August 1 weekend, through the meadows of Thynne Mountain. There is an old forestry lookout on the peak, and easy hikes through alpine meadows. Some may wish to go up on the Saturday the first, and camp until Sunday. Call Madelon Schouten at 295-7078 for details.

RCMP warn of bogus bills

Princeton RCMP have received a number of complaints from local businesses that, on the afternoon of July 23, they received counterfeit \$50 Canadian bills.

The bills were the older style with a picture of the RCMP musical ride on the back. Serial numbers were EHJ5274549 and EHK2875825. There may be other serial numbers.

The people passing these bills have been purchasing small items

worth \$4.00 to \$5.00 and receiving \$45.00 or more in cash. The bogus bills are quite shiny and are not good counterfeits.

Three different males have been described as passing these bills. One has very short hair, dark eyebrows, brown eyes, and may be 18 years old, 5 ft. 10 inches in height. The second male has a cut over his right eye, and has short hair. The third male is older, perhaps 25 years, has medium length brown hair and is clean-shaven.

A suspect vehicle is a two door light blue hatchback 1980's model.
