Coyne dies in Parksville

Forty year old Russell Norman Coyne, formerly of Princeton, died July 25 in hospital in Victoria from injuries resulting from an accident on July 17 on Smithers Road in Parksville.

Parksville RCMP continue to investigate the incident in which Coyne was struck by a van driven by Anthony Dimaddalena of Whiskey Creek, B.C.

The accident resulted from a series of events that occurred when Dimaddalena attended the Smithers Road address to assist a family member who wanted to collect personal items.

An argument broke out between Coyne and Dimaddalena. Police believe Coyne approached the van and struck the van with a baseball bat. Moments later, Coyne was struck by the van.

Coyne was taken to Nanaimo Regional Hospital and was transferred to Victoria General Hospital where he remained until he died.

Visitors see fearless cats

Interior reels from wildfires

B.C. Forest Service was stretched as thin as it could go during the past week, as extreme heat combined with tinder-dry forests and winds whipped fires far beyond control. Military personnel and volunteer civilians were called to assist in Salmon Arm and Lillooet. With 500 fires burning in B.C., the province made world news.

Twenty-two fires began last week in Merritt Forest District. Approximately eight were caused by humans, and most of the human-caused fires were by people having bush parties with big campfires, despite the July 28 campfire ban.

The smoke seen in the Similkameen was from fires burning in Washington state and Boston Bar in the Fraser Canyon.

In the Salmon Arm area, 16 homes (most were mobile homes) burned and 25 outbuildings were destroyed, including hay barns. By Sunday night, winds had shifted and 6,000 to 7,000 were ordered out. In Armstrong, where the glow of the fire lit the northern horizon on Thursday night, Valley Auction trucks worked all

night taking livestock from threatened areas, filling the exhibition grounds and buildings in Armstrong. One farmer took in 100 horses, and did not know who owned what.

At Cherry Creek, near the Afton turnoff on Highway 1, people feared for their homes and a few outbuildings burned. In Fintry, Valley of the Sun, Salmon Arm, Cherry Creek and Silver Creek, residents were evacuated to safety.

The extreme conditions and heavy smoke required closure of

the TransCanada Highway near Salmon Arm and Cherry Creek for hours. A total of 3,430 hectares were on fire near Cherry Creek, and 4,900 hectares in the Silver Creek area. The Fintry fire burned 150 hectares, the Fountain fire at Lillooet burned 630 hectares and the Aberdeen fire near Vernon burned 680 hectares.

On Friday, crews were called to the Elevator Mountain fire, a new fire located between Clearwater and Blue River. RCMP warned that Highway 5 would close if the 475 hectare fire worsened.

Nisga'a deal not right for Upper Similkameen Band

"The Nisga'a agreement would not be a model for us," says Phillippe Batini, USIB manager.

Upper Similkameen Indian Band (USIB) is happy that the Nisga'a are happy with their agreement, but the USIB would not want it for themselves.

In fact, the USIB would not do the same kind of negotiations. They belong to a six nation alliance that includes the

Nklapamux, the Shuswap, Chilcotin and Okanagan nations.

"The agreement is okay for the Nisga'a. They are the only people up there. It wouldn't be suitable for us," says Batini. "We are more interested in sharing."

Batini points out that Premier Glen Clark has agreed this year to setting a parallel process for Interior nations.

Yes, our hospital will remain an acute care facility.

Yes, home support service will be available to all who need it.

There was good news for health care in Princeton area when Regional Health Board Chair Murl Pendharkar faced the public on Thursday, August 6, in the Legion Hall. He was the central figure in the public information session.

Pendharkar sounded defensive as he told area residents, "It's not smaller communities against big communities."

Pendharkar made a firm commitment when he said, "Regional Health Board will always support an acute care facility in Princeton."

This means our hospital will always be a hospital if the Health Board has the final say and Princeton has doctors.

Pendharkar gave some assurance to area residents when he said, "The Minister of Health has recognized the inequity in home care and extended care in this region."

What this means is Victoria knows our region is not receiving adequate funds to meet our needs for home support.

One of the problems that arises comes with people who require home support moving into the Okanagan Similkameen Health Region and adding to the costs. Pendharkar said RHB must find a way to transfer funds.

Dina Slowikowski-Campbell, who has spearheaded a campaign to save rural health care, spoke out during the question period. She pointed to "one cut after another" and said RHB must take some responsibility in making Victoria listen. She asked for comments on home support.

The response was that Princeton

used more hours on an age-adjusted basis, and had a history of higher use before last year's increase.

Lynn Pelly, who does the accounting for Community Services, came back with the comment that the large increase was due to people moving to Princeton.

Mayor Randy McLean informed the Health Board representatives that he had often asked for information "but I don't seem to be getting it."

Former mayor Gloria Stout told the Health Board she did not like them "lumping Princeton in with everybody else."

"We're different in winter, we're separate. We have managed on our own, and now we're lumped in together. We are far from specialists and other services, but distance doesn't count if you're going to lump us all together."

Laurel Jones, a nurse, described how less home support hours puts stress on acute care at Princeton General Hospital.

Dorothy Cobb, administrator at PGH, admitted there is a list of people who are not receiving services.

Gerry Vinthers asked if the Regional Health Board is "the only way we can correct the situation?"

Council members were unable to attend and will be sworn in separately.

Town Council welcomed the new mayor and her councillors, wishing them well.

The present Youth Council was installed on an interim basis only, with an elected Youth Council to follow at a later date.

Finally, Keith Simmonds, Executive Assistant to Harry Lali, MLA for our area, stood to tell the public, "Needed services won't be denied."

He added that the federal government must take some responsibility for the problems in B.C. as they had removed \$750 million from the budget.

Jim Fiske, speaking about the ambulance service, told the gathering that a full-time position opened 18 months ago, but was being filled by casual call-out employees.

Dr. John Bosomworth stated that the problems arose from "bad data, it's been collected badly and used badly. It's about money."

He thanked the community for support for the doctors and said, "It's not over yet."

Raymond Huey, Chair of the Community Health Advisory Committee informed everyone, "We are not sitting on our hands. We have been doing everything we can."

People were encouraged to seek appointment to Regional Health Board and the local Health Advisory to give input to the budget process. Pendharkar said an announcement will be made soon about a new appointment process.

Man jailed for assault

Michael Benjamin, age 30, of Princeton, appeared in Provincial Court on August 6 in custody to answer to charges of assault and breach of recognizance.

Benjamin had a brief relationship with Marilyn Van Gilder which broke up. Subsequent to the end of the relationship, Benjamin entered into a "no contact" recognizance, but she phoned him and he could not stay away. He followed her and threatened to kill her and her son, then showed up at her place. He was taken into custody on July 16 and remained in custody until his court appearance.

One of Benjamin's problems was repeated abuse of alcohol, along with a tendency to be aggressive in a relationship. The 30 year old man had a criminal record dating back to 1989, and Crown Counsel asked for a jail term, probation, and recommendations for rehabilitation.

Defense Counsel requested probation only, noting that both

Benjamin and Van Gilder had been habitually drunk during the time of their relationship, and no medical treatment had been required as a result of the assaults.

Judge G. Sinclair asked Benjamin if he would like to speak before sentencing.

Benjamin said he was grateful for the time spent in custody as it gave him time to think things over and look at the path he had been on.

Preparing animals for the fair

Princeton and District Fall Fair welcomes animal and bird exhibits, whether these are pets or livestock. Animals should be registered early so suitable accommodations are available, especially for small animals such as rabbits.

All animals exhibited at the fair must be in good health, free from parasites (lice, keds etc.), free of open sores and wounds. Unhealthy animals will be removed at the owner's expense.

Judge Sinclair sentenced Benjamin to serve 15 days on each count, for a total of 45 days, followed by an 18 month probation with numerous conditions, including no contact with Marilyn

Van Gilder, abstaining absolutely from alcohol, not entering pubs and bars, substance abuse counselling, and any other kind of counselling or treatment as directed by his probation officer.

All animals will be inspected and any animal that is not healthy will be asked to leave the fair.

Exhibitors must furnish their own bedding and feed, and are responsible for the health and welfare of their animals while at the fair.

This sounds strict, but the B.C. Fairs Association (and fairs throughout North America) must be strict to avoid harm to animals through disease or neglect.

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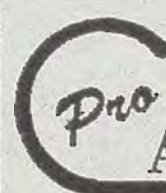

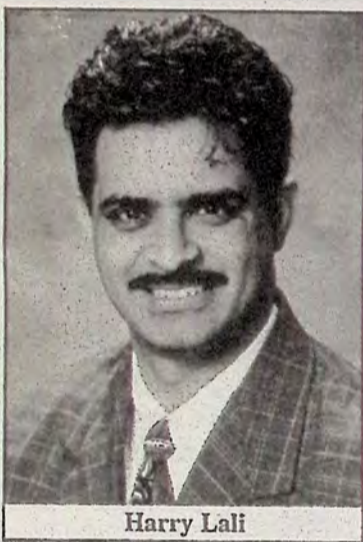

The bill gives environmental stewardship agencies the statutory authority to effectively run new stewardship programs aimed at preventing pollution and reducing waste.

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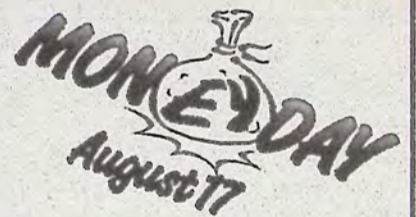

Commitment heals anger

Our hospital will remain a hospital. We have heard that assurance from Murli Pendharkar, Chair of the Regional Health Board.

If we have people in need of home support service, those people will receive that service, even if it goes over budget. We heard that, too.

These are official, public commitments to Princeton, and we should feel pleased to have finally heard them spoken in public, loud and clear, by the Regional Health Board, a body of appointees who have often left us wondering what is going on.

A few other things became clear, too. One thing is that there will be a re-assessment of the needs of our health region. The budget is not written in stone.

Another thing that became clear is that it pays to become angry over what we see as ignoring our needs. We need to speak out and voice our displeasure, or we are not heard.

Princeton is probably earning a reputation for making waves. We have bucked many government trends in favour of looking after what is best for our community. Remember the yellow ribbon campaign in 1994, when we stood up for our right to decide what to do with our forests? We won that round. Remember how we stood against the International Peace Park that would have turned our forest resource into a park? We won that one, too. We did not want our river to be managed by some outside organization, we protested, and we won that one, too.

We demanded to be heard, and we were heard. We demanded some answers, and we were given answers. It is clear that we need to remember how we win when the tables seem to be turned against us. If we earn a reputation for making waves, then perhaps we will be consulted and heard before there is any necessity for making waves.

That would be fair.

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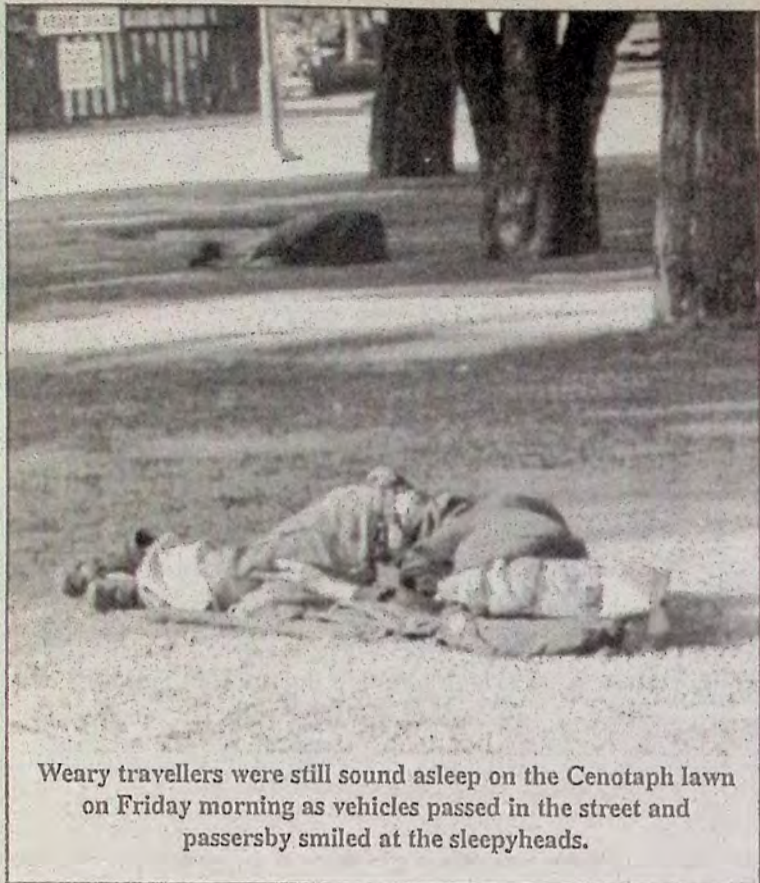

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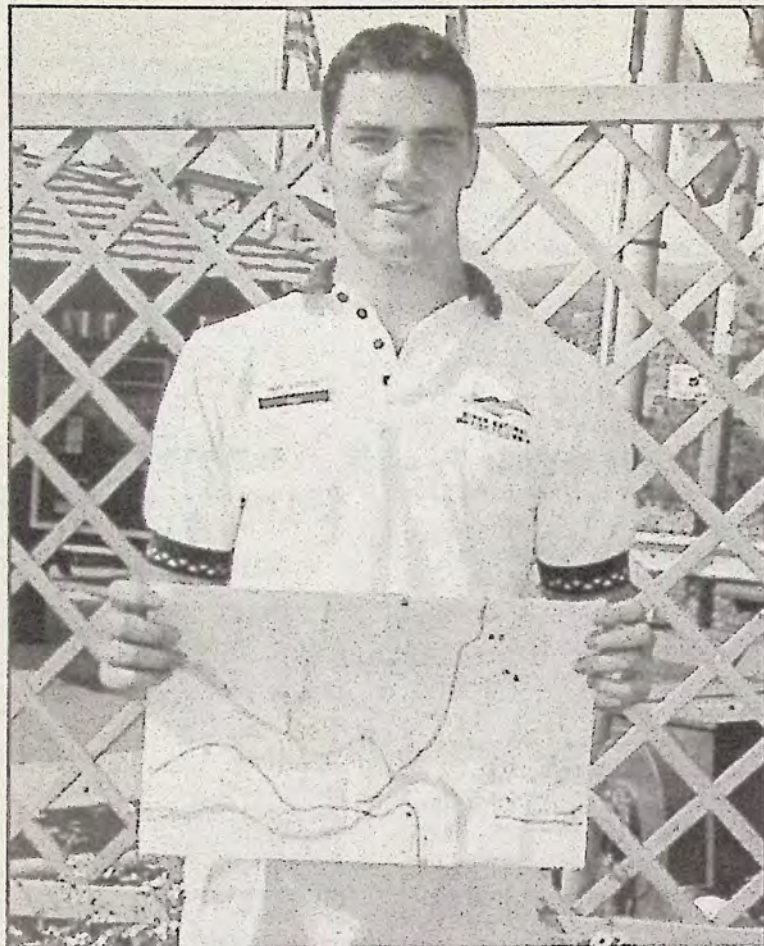

Miners now entitled to BC tax credit for exploration

A new tax credit was approved by the B.C. legislature July 24 to encourage mining exploration in B.C. The bill awaits royal assent.

Amendments to the B.C. Income Tax Act provide a refundable tax credit worth 20 per cent of eligible exploration expenses to corporations and individual prospectors.

The initiative recognizes mining's importance to B.C.'s economy. Mining produced \$4 billion in gross revenues in 1997.

In addition, the new bill streamlines application and approval process for mining exploration, assures appropriate access to lands for responsible mineral exploration, ensures fair compensation for mining firms affected by expropriation for parks, and extends the new mine allowance to the year 2010.

The new tax credit will be available for exploration conducted after August 1, 1998 and before July 31, 2003.

Bill 50 angers Opposition

Critics of Bill 50, debated July 28 and 29 in the B.C. Legislature, say it is anti-freedom. Dubbed Miscellaneous Statutes Amendment No. 3, Bill 50 says nobody can sue the government over diversion of funds from charity gambling, and eliminates the right of the utility commission to conduct an independent review of power projects.

One passage in Bill 50 negates "any decision of a court to the contrary made before or after this section comes into force."

British Columbia passed a law called the Crown Proceeding Act which made provision for persons to sue the provincial government.

B.C. Liberal MLA Geoff Plant told the Legislature, "This time the NDP has taken a major step in depriving us, all of us as citizens, of what I say is a fundamental right: the right to sue our government."

Left turn on red

Yes, you read it correctly, a left turn on a red light! This has to be the most requested column that we received. It may be done, but only in very special circumstances. This provision in section 129(4)(b) of the Motor Vehicle Act may save you a little time.

Unless it is prohibited by a sign, a driver facing a red light that has made a proper stop at the intersection of not more than two highways may make a left turn onto the highway on which the traffic is restricted to only the

Ministry funds new prostate cancer therapy

An innovative therapy for prostate cancer will mean less intensive treatment and fewer side effects for some patients. The new therapy began at Vancouver Cancer Centre two weeks ago.

The treatment, called brachytherapy, is a localized radiation treatment using radioactive seeds which are implanted in and around the cancerous tumour. It is performed on an outpatient basis in an operating room. This therapy is less invasive than conventional radiotherapy and radical prostatectomy where the prostate gland is removed.

The benefit of brachytherapy is that there are fewer side effects or complications — such as impotence and urinary incontinence — than with removal of the prostate

gland or conventional radiotherapy. The Ministry of Health is providing the B.C. Cancer Agency with \$500,000 for the first year of the program.

Tourist total hits new high in July

The Tourist Information Centre in Princeton welcomed 5,662 visitors in July, and was open a total of 310 hours.

The Centre sent out six relocation packages and 55 visitor information packages. In addition, the Centre responded to 147 tourist inquiries by phone.

There were four business inquiries regarding investment in new business.

Most visitors were interested in facilities, swimming and gold panning.

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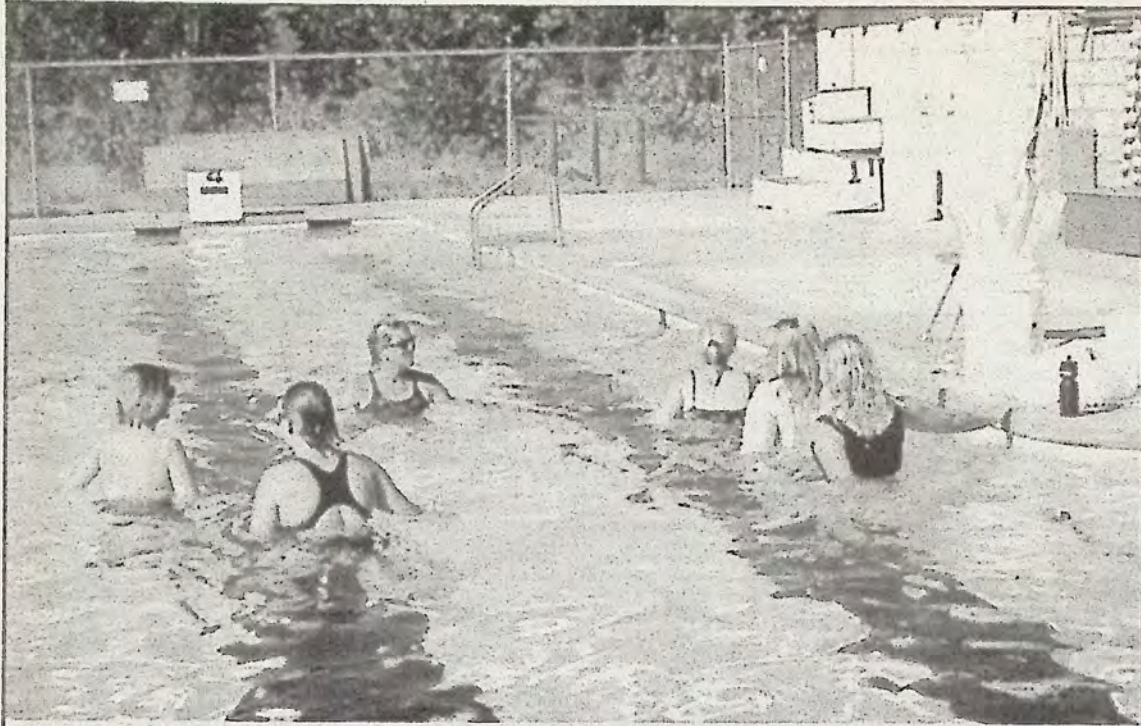

set a 20 mile per hour speed limit. Marconi had proven radio waves could be transmitted across the Atlantic ocean.

Doctors discovered anaphylaxis, abnormal sensitivity to a serum treatment. We now call it allergic reaction. Two doctors discovered something called a hormone.

In the Similkameen, things were happening. More people were arriving, thanks to the gold in Hedley and farming throughout the valley. People were establishing schools when a teacher could be found.

Princeton had a newspaper, The

Similkameen Star, which lasted 49 years.

In Tulameen, at the Tulameen Hotel, Tulameen town lots were auctioned at an average price of \$86 per lot. How much will these lots sell for in another 100 years.

The present townsite of Princeton was laid out, and newspaper records describe Vermilion Avenue as an attractive race course lined with tall trees where aboriginal women ran the "Kloutchman" race.

What will Princeton look like in another 100 years? Will it be here at all?

Preparing for menopause

"Should I take hormones?"

This is a question on the minds of many middle-aged women.

Regardless of one's choice around hormones, there are three things that health professionals recommend in preparation for a healthy menopause: don't smoke, maintain a healthy weight and exercise regularly.

DON'T SMOKE

Smoking can hasten the onset of menopause but the really tragic legacy of years of smoking is that we are now seeing increasing numbers of young women in their 40's and 50's being diagnosed with lung cancer. It is now the leading cause of cancer deaths in women, having surpassed breast cancer.

The Okanagan Similkameen Health Region has recently hired a Regional Tobacco Reduction Co-ordinator to work with the five school districts in the region. This action is hoping to address the fact that one in five teenagers is a smoker.

MAINTAIN A HEALTHY DIET

Nutritious eating with sensible weight management goes a long way to prepare for the best health possible during the senior years. Being significantly overweight can lead to heart disease, hypertension, some forms of cancer and adult onset diabetes. The cost alone of diabetes in Canada is \$5 to \$6 billion annually according to the Canadian Diabetic Association. EXERCISE REGULARLY

Over sixty percent of women are in the active work force. Many are over-stressed as they juggle work with running a household and caring for children. In this scenario there often appears to be no time for physical activity. However, we know that exercise reduces the risks of heart disease, adult-onset diabetes, osteoporosis and depression.

B.C. leads the way

July job total climbs

Employment in British Columbia rose by 4,000 in July, bringing the total number of new jobs in B.C. to 35,000 since January.

Mike Farnsworth, Employment and Investment Minister, made the announcement in Victoria on August 7, adding, "Our economy has created 23 per cent of the total number of new jobs in Canada since January. Clearly, while we have some challenges with respect to economic fallout from the Asian flu and low commodity prices, the number of new jobs

created in British Columbia continues to rise and we are achieving success in one of our key priorities - Jobs for B.C."

B.C.'s unemployment rate declined from 9.3 per cent in January to 9.1 per cent in July.

B.C.'s performance in creating jobs has been dramatically better than that of Alberta," Farnsworth added. "Alberta has created 9,600 new positions since January, which is only one-quarter of the number B.C. has created."

Resident recalls promise

Fred Netherton, a resident of Westridge subdivision, appeared before Town Council on August 4 to remind Council that a promise was made last year and it has not been fulfilled.

Netherton explained that the road in front of his house is still gravel, although it was supposed to have been paved this year. He told Council he has talked to the developer, who has given him no answers about completing the subdivision, and he would like the 20 metre portion of the street in front of his house paved. He wants to pave his driveway and complete development of his lot.

Council discussed the matter, and decided to find a cost on it and report back to Netherton.

Netherton added another complaint regarding a lot next to him that he has spent over \$600 keeping the lot clear of knapweed. He said Highways Department owns it, but he is tired of cleaning it up.

Town Council will write to the Ministry of Transportation and Highways to request maintenance of the site.

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Hart opposes sex offender sentencing

Earlier this month, many residents in one area of my riding began to fear for their safety after a repeat sex offender took up residence in their neighbourhood in Penticton. As the news of this character's arrival spread, I listened, watched and read the comments of justifiably concerned citizens from all areas questioning how this was allowed to happen.

Well, folks, Canadians can thank the federal Liberals for allowing this to happen with the passing of section 810.2 of the Criminal Code in 1996. This is the little-known legal loophole that allows convicted sex offenders to walk away without serving time behind bars; even when they are repeat offenders and even when they have been declared a dangerous offender. It gives a court the power to put conditions on a convicted offender's release if they are convinced that there are grounds to fear the person will commit a serious personal injury offence.

That is what recently happened in this case, with the offender having had 14 conditions imposed by the judge, and choosing Penticton as his new home. One of these conditions was that the repeat sexual offender must stay away from places where children congregate and have no contact with youths under 18 without the consent of the police. As you are aware, much of Penticton's economy depends on the sound of the family car doors slamming in Alberta, Washington and Northern B.C., as thousands of parents bring their kids to the land

of peaches and beaches. Not surprisingly, it's an ideal place for children to congregate.

As this offender's criminal record dates back to 1986, the Crown



was seeking a two to five year sentence for his latest offence of common assault. The judge, however, decided against public safety in favour of rehabilitation; even though this repeat offender had earlier refused to take counselling in prison. I believe he has had ample opportunity to be 'cured' of his deviant inclinations already. Within hours of arriving

in Penticton, the subject was seen cruising Okanagan Lake beach and had rented a room in a nearby motel under a fictitious name, despite having a residence nearby. A local police officer foiled whatever plan he had cooked up and arrested the individual for breaking his conditions. Score one for public safety, as he's temporarily back in jail.

The next time he goes before a judge, and the likelihood of that is almost certain, let us pray the judge will consider the interests of society instead of the interest of the repeat offender. This sex offender's next visit from the Welcome Wagon should be at his permanent residence behind bars, until such time as there is no longer the fear that he will commit a serious personal injury offence.

Road check nabs pot

On June 7, 1998, RCMP were doing a road check on Darcy Mountain Road when they stopped a vehicle driven by Richard Allen Van Skiver. The officer asked Van Skiver for his driver's license and he produced his SIN card. This error led him to a sobriety test. While he was undergoing the test, police noticed an open alcoholic beverage container, which then led to a search of the vehicle. When the vehicle was searched, police

found marijuana.

Van Skiver was charged with possession of marijuana, and appeared in Provincial Court on August 6 to enter a guilty plea. The 35 year old man was ordered to pay a \$100 fine and \$10 surcharge.

B.C. extends barbed hook restriction

Effective August 8, restrictions on barbed hooks have been extended to all Pacific-draining rivers, except those in the Columbia-Kootenay region. Restrictions now apply to the entire Fraser River system and rivers in the Cariboo-Chilcotin, midcoast and Skeena regions.

The restrictions were put in place in addition to those already in place on rivers on Vancouver Island, the Lower Mainland and Thompson Okanagan to help conserve endangered coho stocks and other fish species.

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The road to Thynne Mountain

Thirty years ago, the only building on top of Thynne Mountain was a trim Forest Service lookout cabin, manned by such marvelous characters as Olaf Nebocat of Keremeos, or Ken Harding of Tulameen fame. They were dropped off by helicopter long before the access road was free of snow, and stuck it out until the autumn rains rolled in. They spent their summers picking out lightning strikes and errant campfires. If you journeyed up to see them, bringing fresh-baked goodies, you would be rewarded with fascinating conversation, a cup of coffee, and a splendid view.

Today, the duties of the lookout men are taken over by aircraft, and the lookout cabin is abandoned, though still in fairly good shape. Now, there are half a dozen buildings and a couple of tall gray cones, which look like phallic symbols, all devoted to the service of the telecommunications industry. They are untended and firmly locked against intruders, and there is no one left to offer you a good cup of coffee.

But the mountain remains, and last Sunday, eleven Princeton naturalists explored the alpine meadows at the tip of Thynne mountain. The trip was more a drive than a hike, since the peak is about 80 km from Princeton, over some very bumpy roads. Drivers Betty Rose and Janina Wetselaar crowded us into two big 4x4s and drove north along the Otter Valley from Tulameen, then along the old Kettle Valley rail bed to Brookmere. This is the rough but very scenic route, but since it will soon be part of the Trans Canada Trail system, it may then be closed to motor traffic.

From Brookmere, the Thynne Mountain Road winds up to the south, past the Merritt Snowmobile Club cabin, and on to the summit. We had picked a clear day, and the panorama ranged from Shovelnose Mountain to the north, the peaks of the Hozameen Range to the west (with a stretch of the Coquihalla Highway in view) and

the rolling hills of the Thompson Plateau to the east and south. No glimpse of the snow-capped tip of Mount Baker, which is supposed to be visible to the southwest.

The leader of the pack, Madelon Schouten, was intent on a survey of flora and fauna on the mountain, while the rest of us roamed the alpine meadows. Some had a brisk cold dip in a couple of mountain ponds. Then we hiked downhill for a few kilometres, until the trucks came by and rolled us down the mountain.

The flower display was waning in the heat, but the most conspicuous was Alpine Goldenrod glowing in the heather. There were lots of the fluffy globes of the Western Pasqueflower, mixed with Pink Monkey Flower, Alpine Paintbrush, Lupines and Mountain Arnica. There were

plenty of birds - for example, a horde of Pine Siskins, a Kestrel, and a number of Rufous Hummingbirds. We are told the male Rufous Hummers leave their wives to handle the nestlings as soon as they are hatched, and sojourn to the high mountains to live it up as gay bachelors for the rest of the summer.

We caught sight of a Mantled Ground Squirrel, looking like an oversized chipmunk, and four black bears eating the berries of Red Osier Dogwood. A great day and, to top it off, on the way home we landed in the midst of Tulameen Daze celebrations.

Trout Talk

They grow faster out of the water

The "they" in the headline refers to those lunker trout we caught that got away.

I was telling a fellow fisherman about the first large trout I caught. At 15 years of age, I was really excited about that eight-pound, nine-ounce trout I entered in our steelhead fishing contest. It had been nip-and-tuck as to whether I would land it on my fly rod, but an older fisherman showed up with his landing net and scooped it out of the deep end of the pool for me!

In relating this happy event to my fellow fisherman, I told him how my eight-pound ~~twelve~~ ounce fish had won eighth place in the contest. The other day, I was looking at that fish (I had it mounted and put on a plaque with weight and date on it) and sure enough, there was eight pounds, nine ounces engraved on it.

Have you ever noticed how a person telling how long a trout was

uses his/her hands? The optimist moves the hands farther and father apart, saying, "No, I think it was this long." The pessimist brings his/her hands closer together. Personally, I like the optimistic fisherman.

I have been keeping a fishing diary since 1975. It has been very interesting, looking back upon earlier trips. I recommend it to anyone who enjoys the outdoors. You can re-live those past trips and sometimes notice trends and pick up ideas on what works from year to year. Most of all, it is fun! However, a diary is a written, current account of what happened that day. It is interesting how fish grow in size and number.

My Laird Lake brookie, which was 14 inches long when it popped out of the hole in the ice in 1989, has now become 16 inches long when described to my buddies. The limit caught in McCaffery was actually four

trout. There are not intentional distortions, only the work of an optimistic fisherman's memory. It takes the diary to keep things straight!

When I turned the photo over that had been handed to me by a friend who caught a 38-pound fish, written on the back was "36 pounds". I didn't say anything because, like me, his memory had optimistically added a couple of pounds in the years since he caught that beauty!

I don't think we should be too critical of others!

After all, fish do grow faster out of the water.

Forests grow better now

British Columbia's second growth forests are growing faster than forecast according to the final results of the old-growth site index research project, Forests Minister David Zirnelt said today.

"This study indicates there is cause for optimism for future timber supplies in the province," said Zirnelt. "Second-growth forests are reaching maturity sooner and with a greater volume than previously thought, and this will have a positive impact on the forest industry."

The Old Growth Site Index

(OGSI) research project began in 1994, with more than \$6.4 million from Forest Renewal B.C. A team of Ministry of Forests staff around the province studied the height growth of old-growth forests, and compared the data to measurements of second-growth stands.

"This study proves Forest Renewal B.C.'s investment in second growth forests will pay off in healthier trees and should lead to a more sustained harvest," said Lee Doney, Forest Renewal B.C.'s chief executive officer.
