Police want arsonist

On Tuesday, August 18, at about 3:50 a.m., Princeton Fire Department attended a vehicle fire six kilometres north of Princeton on Highway 40 (Osprey Lake road). The burning vehicle had been parked for several days on the side of the highway near Wayne Lake awaiting removal by the owner. Fortunately, the vehicle was unoccupied at the time of the fire.

The fire was quickly extinguished but the vehicle was completely destroyed. RCMP investigators believe the fire was started intentionally and are treating the event as a deliberate criminal action on the part of the person or persons involved.

Due to the hot, dry conditions experienced in the area over the past two weeks, and the fire's proximity to some very dry grass

and brush, there was the potential for a dangerous situation to have arisen due to someone's criminal act. The Princeton RCMP are asking for the public's assistance in locating the individual or individuals responsible for the car fire. Two casinos approved for Penticton

The provincial government has approved in principle four destination casinos.

- Campbell River Casino proposed by the Campbell River Indian Band in conjunction with Trillium Gaming Inc. The project, to be completed in phases, includes a casino, a 130 room hotel, health club, a 300 seat restaurant and lounge with entertainment amenities, and a convention centre/banquet facility (400 jobs)

- Arrowleaf Resort and Casino on the Penticton First Nations Reserve, proposed by Penticton Indian Band in conjunction with Sodak Gaming Inc. The project, to be developed in three phases, includes a casino, a 144 room hotel, golf course, 240 seat meet-

ing/banquet rooms, pool and spa facilities, and a 150 seat restaurant (400 jobs)

- Lake City Casino at the existing Penticton Lakeside Resort and Convention Centre, proposed by Lake City Casinos Ltd. This project has a casino with 20 gaming tables and 200 slot machines, a ballroom, meeting rooms, show lounge and health spa in a project

including a 55 room expansion of the hotel and a roof-top restaurant and lounge. (400 jobs)

- Star of Fortune Riverboat Casino that will cruise the Fraser River and dock at Westminster Quay, proposed by the Star of Fortune Management Corporation. There will be shore-based facilities including a restaurant and lounge. (210 jobs)

Princeton Council rejects Highways answers

Councillor George Armstrong reacted negatively to a letter from the Ministry of Transportation and Highways regarding the "devolution" of Tulameen Road. (Devolution means turning a section of the highway over to the Town of Princeton to look after.)

The Ministry is determined to turn over the road to the town, but Town Council has continued to resist. Armstrong objected to the statement in the letter saying "a portion of Tulameen Road was recently rebuilt while the remainder of the road does not appear to be in any significantly different condition than other area roads."

The rebuilt section refers to the portion from the wooden bridge to the top of the hill near Riverside School, a portion that collapsed twice following the 1995 flood. The letter did not

address the condition of the road adjacent to the Wanner property, where the road is visibly slumping on a corner west of the wooden bridge.

The letter stated that the Ministry would "conduct traffic counts on the Tulameen Road this summer in order to determine the volume and percentage of traffic passing through the Town."

Councillor Kathleen Clement noted there had been no evidence this summer that there had been a traffic count conducted.

Council moved to write a letter to the Ministry once more that Council does not accept the devolution.

Councillor Armstrong remarked, "I'll go with it and deliver it by hand if necessary."

"I'll go with him," added Councillor Clement.

Judge fines man for selling booze to kids

Peter Langlois appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on August 20 to plead guilty to a charge of supplying liquor to minors. Evidence read to the court described police watching the liquor store parking lot and seeing Langlois go into the liquor store, come out with a white plas-

tic bag, and leave it for three youths. A girl and two boys, ages 16 and 14, retrieved the bag and hurried up to First Bench with it. Police intercepted the youths, who were detained, and the beer found in the bag was seized.

Judge W.A. Blair ordered Langlois to pay a \$500 fine.

No answers from Hart on sudden resignation

Jim Hart, Member of Parliament for Okanagan-Coquihalla, shocked his constituents last week by announcing he had quit the Reform Party. Hart announced his resignation on August 17, but has been unavailable for interviews due to urgent "family business".

Hart will sit as an Independent Member of Parliament for the remainder of the 36th Parliament. Hart's only comment was, "I will continue to work as the Member of Parliament for Okanagan-Coquihalla and I am still committed to taking the concerns of the constituents to Ottawa on issues such as lower taxes, making our streets safe again, and holding the Liberal government accountable, when the 36th Parliament resumes in September."



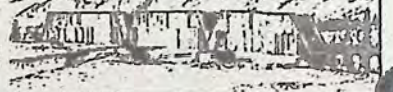

Fair Board receives grant

Ev's sawdust burner

While talking with a group of women one evening, talk shifted to how women managed to do so many things in the past, considering what they had to work with. Ev McCallum brought to light the information that she owns a sawdust burner in working order!

For those of a younger generation, the sawdust burner is a mystery, or perhaps a dimly remembered appliance they saw in their childhood. For older people, the sawdust burner was a source of household heat and a cooking appliance. It reigned supreme as a source of continuous annoyance for housewives.

The sawdust burner had a hopper at the side. The hopper was filled with sawdust which then dropped into the firebox of the stove and created heat. The firebox was gravity fed, and burning was controlled by expanding or decreasing the amount of sawdust allowed through to the firebox.

As we remembered this household horror, none of us could recall anything especially good about it except the vast expanse of surface cooking area. Unlike today's four-burner ranges, the sawdust burner, like the coal and wood range, offered the equivalent of six to eight electric or gas burners for cooking. To add to the benefit of this type of surface, the heat was greater in some areas than in others, allowing the cook to bring something to a boil, then move it to a cooler area to simmer.

The downside of sawdust burners began with the sawdust bin. Nearly every home had one out back, where the local sawdust delivery service would dump a

load into the bin when it was required. Then the householder could carry it into the house and dump it in the hopper. This was great in summer, but in winter, the buckets had to sit in a warm place because the sawdust often froze into big lumps that would block the hopper grate and the fire would go out. Lumps of icy sawdust were the bane of many a housewife as she attempted to cook and keep the house warm.

The sawdust bin had other uses. It was a place to store blocks of ice for use in the icebox (yes, within living memory!). Ice boxes were a non-electric refrigerator.

The sawdust bin was a good place for kids to play if their parents did not catch them, and a great place for cats to do things, if they could make their way into the bin.

The whole process of operating a sawdust burner was hard work, time-consuming, and messy. I know of no housewife who would swap her electric or gas range for a sawdust burner. In terms of household efficiency, the sawdust burner ranks among the least efficient of appliances. However, people "made do" with what they had.

So much for the "good old days"!

When you become reluctant to change, remind yourself of the beauty of autumn.

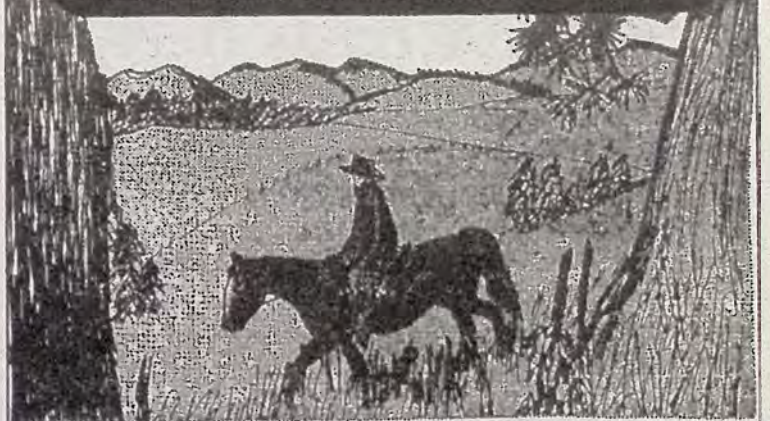

RDOS announced August 21 that a 66 acre site located seven kilometres west of Keremeos has been purchased for the landfill. The site is located just east of Similkameen Adventure Foundation property.

During the Solid Waste Management Planning process, residents of the lower Similkameen Valley area clearly stated their need for a local landfill. RDOS does not expect to relocate to the new site for the next five years.

Recent control initiatives banned stumps and newspaper from the existing landfill, and the site is now manned to prevent dumping by people who do not reside in

Will casinos bring us prosperity or problems?

It's beginning to look a lot like Nevada.

Two Penticton casino developers have received approval in principle from the B.C. government. Penticton will have two major gambling enterprises, one on the reserve and one downtown at the biggest hotel.

These casino plans include health and fun things along with the gambling, just like the Nevada casinos offer. There will be dancing, alcoholic beverages, floor shows, spas, swimming pools, all the fun stuff, just like Nevada.

No doubt having casinos in Penticton will contribute a little to our economy, especially in the winter, when people can come south and enjoy the next best thing to Reno. (We are not likely to see Penticton compete with Las Vegas).

The additional traffic on the way to Penticton may be helpful, but we wonder whether we will see much for ourselves as the broke gamblers make their way back home.

We need to think about what casinos will mean to us when they are built. Perhaps we can lure some of the casino traffic away from Penticton to enjoy more than gambling. We can offer snowmobiling and lake fishing in winter, but what can we offer in summer to lure the gamblers away from the one-armed bandits and the Okanagan beaches?

The other side of the casino coin is the infiltration of unsavoury characters, both at the management end of the casino business and at the street level. The street level involves hangers-on looking for handouts, muggers, and prostitutes. Perhaps the casino on the reserve will be easier to police, but the one at the shore of Okanagan may be quite a different story. How will this affect the neighbouring small communities? Will street crime spill over into our communities? It remains to be seen.

Side Trips

Local side trips include stops at the post office, drug store to pick up prescriptions, or a stop at a store to pick up parcels, etc. These stops are short in duration. The charge for side trips is 50 cents. Passengers coming in from out of town, i.e. Coalmont, Hedley are entitled to one side trip as part of their fare. These 50 cent fares will go into the transportation donation box unless you have several side trip fares and can be marked down as one fare towards one of the passengers taking the side trip.

Penticton trips - passengers are allowed one side trip as part of their basic fare. Other side trips are 50 cents each way. Side trips are at the driver's discretion (availability of time, etc.) Note: More than one side trip 50 cents each way.

It is the driver's responsibility to pick up passengers at their most accessible door and provide transportation as near to their appointment as possible.

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KKK burned crosses in town

Police raided homes of strikers during December, 1932. Belongings were ransacked, families insulted, and messes and damage left to homeowners to clean up and repair.

The newly-formed Princeton Ku Klux Klan burned a flaming cross on a hillside near Princeton with a sign warning "agitators" to move on or suffer the consequences. The same warnings were nailed to the homes of striking miners.

Police ordered mail to strikers opened, and police confiscated what they wished. Police spent time guarding and shepherding "scabs" to the mine site. (Scabs are those who do the work of union members out on strike.)

On December 3, 1932, police attacked the picket line established on Tulameen Road. There were women and children in that

picket line along with the miners. Sworn statements obtained from witnesses spoke of miners beaten to the ground, then beaten some more.

Mary Hewitt, mother of James Hewitt, her 14 year old son, saw her son coming toward her, injured, saying the "cops" had beaten him. Others remembered seeing the boy beaten repeatedly with a club as he lay screaming on the ground.

Miners on China Creek bridge were charged by police on horseback, and beaten. The action along the picket line spread to downtown Princeton, where one witness reported two officers had clubbed Leslie McNaughton over the head and shoulders as McNaughton had been walking on the sidewalk between the Princeton Hotel and the Tulameen Hotel (located across from where Tulameen Motors is today).

Women reported that mounted provincial police officers had chased them through the streets, forcing them to run and hide.

Evans would not back down to police or "businessmen" and was subsequently kidnapped from a home in Tulameen while visiting there. The owner of that home protested to the provincial government, as did many rural residents who thought the police behaviour was unacceptable.

The Princeton Star, the newspaper of the day, said "many of the

townspeople were thoroughly sick of his (Evans) abuse' and commented on the kidnapping as "they invited him to leave and gave him transportation to his home."

The kidnapers were tried in Coalmont before a Justice of the Peace. Evans' evidence was not accepted, as Evans was known to be a man who "did not believe in God or the hereafter". The magistrate was an employee of the coal company.

It was Evans who was arrested and held on \$10,000 bail for being a member of an illegal association, the Communist Party of Canada, which had been declared illegal in Ontario. Arresting Evans was the only way to break the strike, according to some people's thinking. At Evans' trial, the prosecution said that Princeton miners had been "happy" until "agitator Evans" had arrived, and there would have been no trouble if Evans had not caused it.

These were the conditions under which people worked and protested poor working conditions in Princeton during the Depression. What happened would alter people's view of the society in which they lived. In the meantime, Victoria viewed Princeton as a hotbed of radicals (meaning the miners, not the KKK).

NEXT WEEK: the fears, prejudices and ignorance that led to the violence in Princeton.

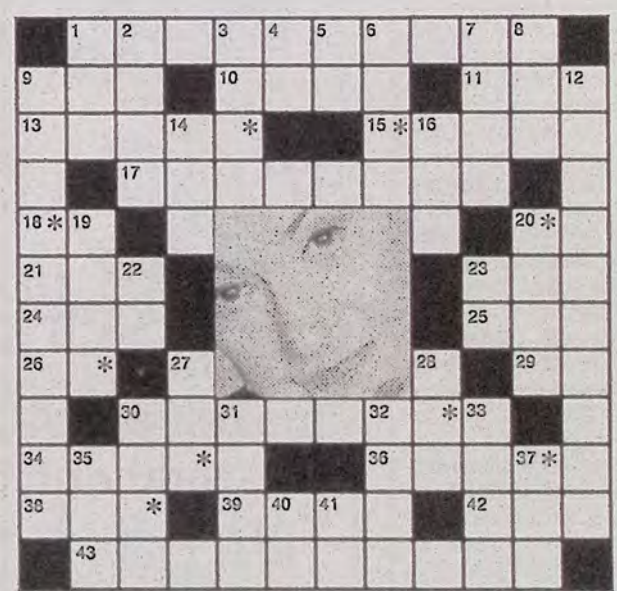

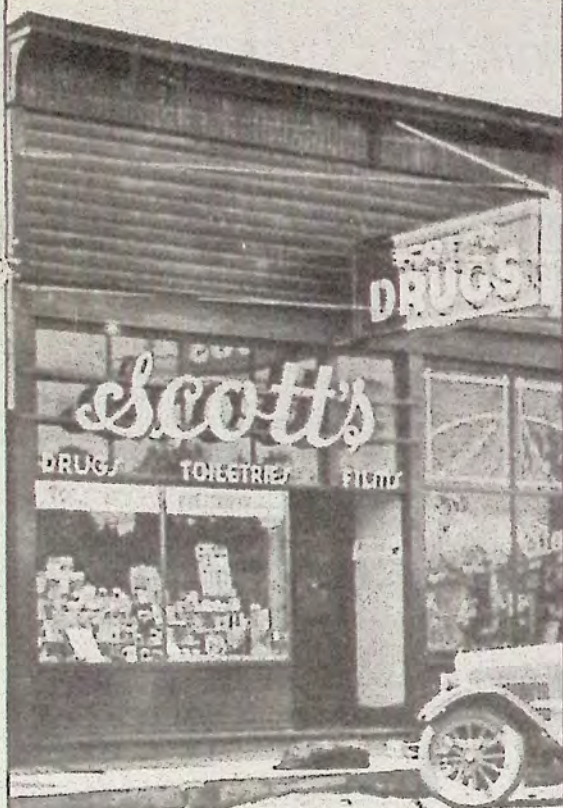

Good customer service begins at Pharmasave's front counter

Pharmasave clerks are trained to use sophisticated computer technology to offer customers some specialized service.

In 1988, for example, front counter service consisted of two cash registers and one Visa terminal. Today, Pharmasave's front counter boasts four computerized cash registers, four Visa terminals and bank transaction terminals.

Every single transaction is recorded, and customers who have approved chequing are registered in the computer. Wen Wong knows how many customers made purchases in any day, and he can track what kind of purchases they made.

In addition, the computers automatically keep track of inventory. If an item is about to run out, the com-

puter system places the item on an order list. This means customers do not go looking for an item and find it is out of stock.

Two full-time and one part-time technicians keep the systems running properly. Their expertise helps customers by ensuring the machines do not break down frequently, and do not delay service.

Good people give good service

With the expansion of Pharmasave over the past 60 years, the store has grown from a staff of two in 1938 to a staff of five in 1962, a staff of nine in 1988, and a staff of 20 in 1998.

In 1988, there were two pharmacists and seven clerks. Today, three pharmacists and 17 clerks serve Pharmasave customers.

"We have an awesome staff," says owner Wen Wong.

Ten years ago, the store was open just two hours on Sunday, in the evening. Today, Pharmasave is open Sunday from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Pharmasave staff members stay a long time. Mary Weissman, Cheryl Ferguson and Lil Dunn can recall the fiftieth anniversary ten years ago, and they were not

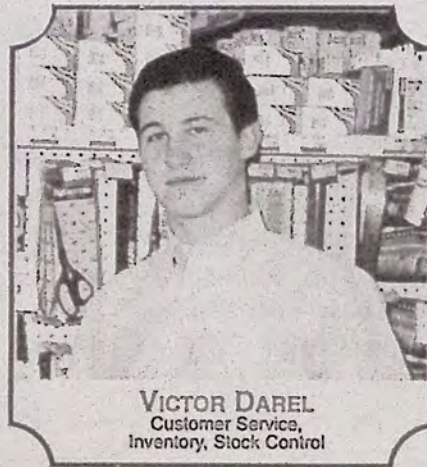

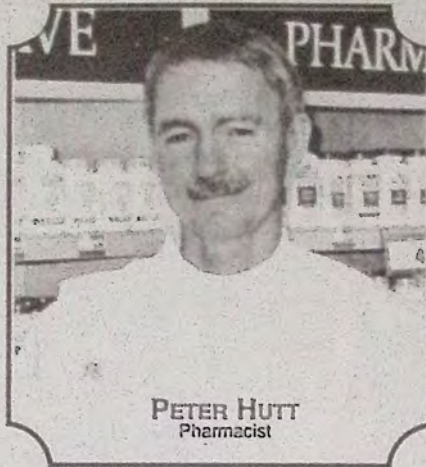

A sixty year history

by Jim Jackson, former owner

August 21st, 1938. This was the day that Reg Scott opened Scott's Pharmacy in the present location of Realty World. The store was 15 ft. wide, and about 35 ft. long. Being still in the "Depression", Reg found it very difficult to get financing, but a few wholesalers gave him extended terms for merchandise, and from there Reg was able to gradually fill the shelves with stock and act as a Pharmacist for the town of Princeton in competition with Ged Lyle who had the Rexall agency at the time. Ged eventually sold out to Don Atkinson, who operated the store there in the present location of the vacant lot between Radio Shack and the 1 Hour Photo.

In 1948 Reg left to move to Hope and bought out Mr. Cook who had the Rexall drugstore in that town. Huey McCue took over management of the Princeton store.

In 1952 Jim Jackson graduated from UBC and started work as a pharmacist with Reg Scott in Hope. Jim, raised in Chilliwack, was preparing to get married and settle in Hope... but Huey McCue wanted to open his own store in Richmond, and so Reg asked Jim to take over the running of the Princeton store. This was in the summer of 1953. On Labor Day, 1953, Jim

moved to Princeton and assumed management of the Princeton store which at that time was located in the present location of Gerry and Simone's meat market located right next to the drugstore.

In 1961, Don Atkinson, who was still operating the Rexall drugstore in the location of the CIBC, moved to the present location of Scott's Pharmasave right at the corner of Bridge and Billiter. The store was 25 ft. wide, and about 75 ft. deep. Don Atkinson then decided to close the operation, and Scott's took over the present location which was composed of the Rexall drugstore, Bloom's Meat Market where the entrance doors are now, and Stan Thompson's Barber Shop, (NOT Stan Thompson, of Model Transfer), where the checkouts are presently located. The Meat Market and the Barber shop closed and it was all incorporated into a 50' X 90' single store.

Ken Mansfield operated an electrical store in the present location of the drugstore's gift and card sections. Ken sold his building to Oslund of Penticton who operated a jewelry store in that location for some years. After Oslund decided to close his operation, Jim bought the building and incorporated it into the pre-

sent operation to make a building 75' X 95'. This store size worked very well, and was very satisfactory until Jim's successor, his son, Scott, together with Wen Wong, a pharmacist who was born and raised in Princeton, bought out Jim's interests in 1996 and took on the Pharmasave franchise. This type of franchise entailed a lot of modernization and structural changes which resulted in the ultramodern Pharmasave store that exists at the present time.

A further development this summer has seen Scott Jackson sell out his interest to Wen Wong, who now is the sole owner of the store that Reg Scott started 60 years ago this month.

It has been a steady progression and growth over those 60 years serving the Similkameen Valley and Princeton in particular. As a former owner, it is with great pleasure I see Wen and his wife, Sharon, both very hard workers, carry on the business to take it into the next millennium. I am sure they will do well, and Princeton will be well served by their drugstore for the next 60 years. (I have threatened to stay alive and watch that they do.)

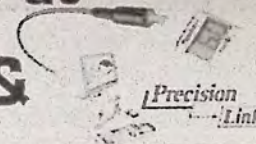

Technology helps serve Pharmasave customers better

In 1979, the old Scott's Pharmacy had the first stand-alone computer for use in recording pharmacy transactions.

Today, Pharmasave Princeton has six computers linked into Pharmanet and nine other computers for cash transactions, inventory control and bookkeeping.

Pharmasave's pharmacy computers record prescription information and the customer receives a printout

telling when and how often to take the medication, how much to take, and possible side effects.

"Our customers love the printouts," says owner Wen Wong, "Patients want more information about their medications."

The pharmacy computers are linked to Pharmanet, a government agency in Victoria. They are also linked to Internet to access information for any health

or medical questions.

These computers will be upgraded to Year 2000 standards and will be continually upgraded. Pharmasave is preparing for the next millennium.

The computers track supplies as well as keeping customer medication records. Orders go directly to Medis, the wholesaler, and the needed medicines arrive the next day.



The cosmetics section at Pharmasave is a major attraction to customers seeking beauty and personal care products. This area was redesigned and redecorated for the grand opening in 1997.

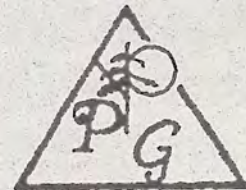

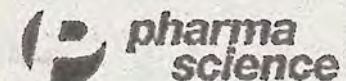

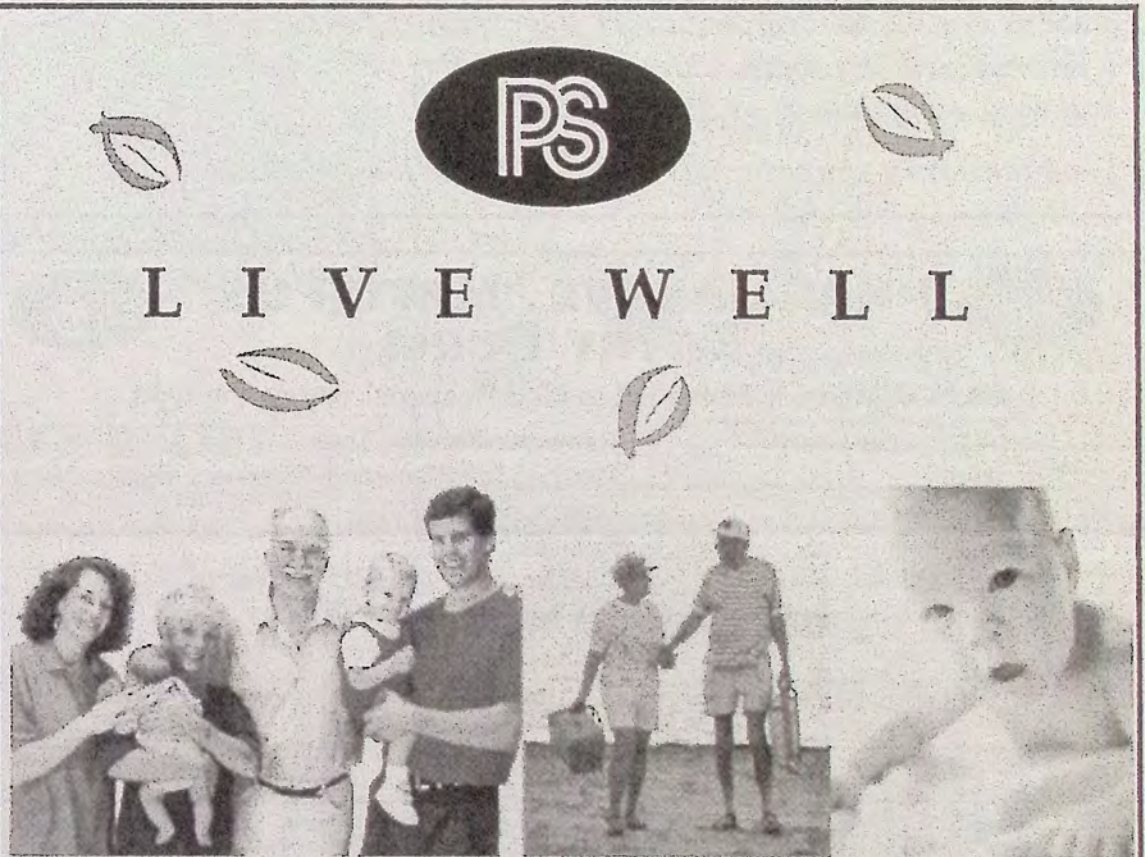

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"I hate Princeton" – a woman's story

Miss Edna Kersh moved to Princeton five years ago, and her life has been "misery" ever since.

She had moved to B.C. from southern Ontario the year before she moved here, but found Kelowna far too expensive for her pension income and capital.

Kersh had been told prices were lower in Princeton, so she sold her mobile home in Kelowna and bought a house in Princeton.

From the start, everything went wrong.

Before moving to Princeton, she had asked the real estate agent what sort of climate Princeton has, as she cannot abide either intense cold or intense heat. She was told Princeton has neither, and little snow.

When Kersh arrived in Princeton, the house was dirty. No attempt had been made to clean it. As she went through the process of cleaning the place and moving in, she discovered one thing after another was wrong with the place. There was a persistent bad smell in the house which made her feel ill, and she developed a persistent cough that no amount of medical treatment would cure.

Kersh had no allergies before moving here, and now she has continual allergy problems. She suspects the house has caused them, especially the livingroom carpet.

"I'm almost paranoid about that carpet," says Kersh, "Every time I vacuum it, I have to replace the vacuum cleaner bag. I clean the carpet and two days later, the stains are back again. It drives me crazy."

More and more construction

faults showed up as time went on. Finally, she found herself a lawyer to take the matter to court. To save money, she did all of the investigative work for the lawyer (not from Princeton) but he did nothing for her, then submitted a bill for \$800 when she asked for her paperwork to be returned to her. She took it to court herself, and did receive a settlement.

"Ordinarily, they don't bark at all," she says.

Kersh put the house up for sale, but it has not sold, despite repeated visitors to view the house.

Last week, she decided to stay, and make improvements. She will

re-mortgage her house in order to get rid of the despised carpet, and she will order new kitchen cupboards to see if she can cut down the smell.

Kersh is a meticulous housekeeper who spends so much time cleaning the house that she has no time for some of her favourite hobbies.

How to preserve peaches

The Similkameen Valley orchards produce some of the finest peaches anywhere, and now that freestone peaches are available, it is time to consider canning peaches or making jam.

Always ask the fruit stand vendor for freestone peaches, and ask for advice on which are best for canning or for jam. Most peaches are good for jam, but not all are great for canning.

Peaches are easy to preserve in a jar. The first step is to blanch them. This means dropping them in boiling hot water, rolling them around for a minute, then taking them out. This blanching process makes the skins slip off faster than old socks.

With the skins off, slit all the way around the peach from top to bottom along the natural indent in the peach. Twist the knife in the cut, and the two halves should separate easily. Remove the "stone". Freestone peaches allow easy

removal of the peach pit, or stone.

Place halves cut side down in a litre (quart) sealer. Fill with a sugar and water syrup made of one cup sugar to three cups water (or more water for less sweet).

Clean the top rim carefully, place a snap lid on it, and tighten down with a jar ring, then loosen 1/4 turn. Place in a canner, fill with water to the shoulder of the jar (most canners accommodate seven jars) and bring to boil.

Boil approximately 20 minutes, or until you can see the bubbles rising to the top inside the jar. Remove carefully from the water and set on a towel to cool. As the jar cools, the lid should snap inward, indicating a vacuum seal that will last for years. When the jar is cool, tighten the ring. Store in a cool, dark place, such as a basement cupboard.

TIP: Do not open a window next to the cooling jars, or turn a fan on them. The jars may crack.

To make jam, purchase liquid or crystal fruit pectin and follow the recipe enclosed in the product.

TIP: You can re-use commercial jars if you heat the lids along with the jars.

Assault brings stiff penalty

Judge W.A. Blair labelled Ian Naylor's behaviour as "totally inappropriate".

Naylor appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on August 20 to plead guilty to a charge of assault causing bodily harm. He attacked Kerwin Morton on December 18, 1997, at the home of a mutual friend in Princeton.

Morton was new in town at the time of the attack, and Naylor accused Morton of "hitting on" Naylor's girlfriend. Naylor's anger continued, and he shot Morton twice with a pellet gun loaded with tinfoil pellets, causing cuts to Morton's face. Later, still making accusations, he knelt and hit Morton.

Morton went to hospital, and the hospital staff called the RCMP. Morton had a fat lip, blood inside his mouth, bruises, and the cuts to his face.

At the time of the incident, Naylor had been drinking.

Crown Counsel noted Naylor had a prior conviction for assault of his girlfriend in June, 1997. He had been on probation when he attacked Morton.

Judge Blair commented that Morton showing interest in Naylor's girlfriend "doesn't require your physical intervention", pointing out that Naylor's girlfriend is quite capable of deciding what to do in such a situation.

Before sentencing Naylor, Judge Blair told him, "You have a serious problem with alcohol you have to address."

Naylor was ordered to pay a \$500 fine plus \$50 victim surcharge, and to serve a one year probation. Conditions of the probation include substance abuse and anger management counselling.

From Blakeburn to Lodestone

If you want clear evidence that the summer is waning, the top of Lodestone Mountain is the place to see it. The summer flowers on the alpine meadows are virtually gone, probably more because of the lengthy drought, than the lateness of the season, and it is cold. But the grandeur remains, and 11 members of the Vermilion Forks Naturalist Society drank in the view from the peak, over 6200 feet (1895) above sea level, on Saturday, August 15. Olivine Mountain to the north was heavily shrouded with rain, as were the peaks of the Cascades to the west. Far off to the south, Princeton basked in the sun.

The ramble really began in Coalmont, and the trip up the mountain took to noon, since we stopped at many of the old mining sites on the way: Granite City, where a host of miners dug up vast quantities of gold and platinum following the discovery by John Chance in 1885, Blakeburn, where the thriving coal mine almost ended in 1930 when a blast killed 45 miners, Louis' Place, where pioneer, Louis Marcotte ruled a community, Angel's Rest, presumably named by some devout miner, and Bear's Den.

This old logging and mining road then joined the ancient Hudson's

Bay Brigade Trail along which fur traders in the 1800s wrestled trains of pack horses bearing furs down from Tulameen, or Campment des Femmes (so called because the traders left their wives, etc. there to await their return), to Hope on the western side of the Cascades. About 18 kilometres from Coalmont, the road turned steep and rough, making us thankful for 4X4 vehicle, driven by skilled drivers like Charlotte Sellers and Janina Wetselaar.

The lake was beautiful but a cold wind blew strongly. We hurried our lunch, celebrated Irene Logan's 35th birthday with a splendid chocolate cake and a libation, then hustled up to the peak. On the way down, we inspected the meadows, and a barn and cabin built by cowhands who have found the area ideal for fattening cattle in the summer. Not much in the way of exotic birds and flowers, but plenty of good camaraderie. The ride down was made in haste when one of the party fell ill and needed medical attention.

The next trip is to Davis Mountain on the first weekend in September. This was another long drive with a solid hike at the end of it. If you wish to go on the trip, call Janina Wetselaar or Peter Antonick at 295-3040.


