## Health Care crunch forces move

Ron Armstrong must leave his home and move in with his brother because neither he nor the Ministry of Health has enough money for his needs. Armstrong needs home support cleaning at least two hours a week, but he has been cut back to one hour. Armstrong pays for the hour.

Armstrong has severe asthma from dust. He cannot do sweeping, dusting nor vacuuming. He cannot use most cleaning compounds because of the chemicals. He does not want to risk asthma attacks as he has heart problems.

For the past five years, Armstrong has received two hours of cleaning service a week. He paid for one hour, and the government paid for the other hour. He was reassessed by an assessor sent out from Penticton by the Regional Health Board. Now, he is entitled to one hour a week for a bath and he pays for that hour.

"I was told to hire somebody privately for the rest of the cleaning, but people want \$12.00 an hour these days, and I can't afford it," says Armstrong.

Ron Armstrong is a World War 2 veteran. At age 71, he is retired and lives on \$1,600 a month and

pays taxes. He has a mortgage on his modest home just outside town, and after he pays taxes, mortgage and utilities, he has \$700 a month for food, medication, his vehicle and sundries.

Armstrong is leaving for Sechelt to try living with his brother for awhile. Armstrong is not sure he can tolerate the dampness at the coast. He moved to Princeton nine years ago due to the pollution in the lower mainland area. The clean dry air in the Similkameen Valley is best for his health.

If the move to the coast is not good for his health, Armstrong has no idea what he will do.

Princeton people lose a valuable person when Armstrong leaves. He has been a mainstay of the Help Line, a volunteer group who phone elderly and disabled persons who live alone. The "friendly" calls are a safety measure. If the person does not answer, somebody will go to the home to make sure the person is well and safe.

Armstrong values the independence he has enjoyed in Princeton. He hates to give it up, but he sees few options except those he can afford.

## Headquarters set up at packing house

The Okanagan Similkameen Growers' Association building has a blank facade which belies all the excitement happening inside. Earlier this month it became "Shegalla" headquarters for the movie-makers. As of September 17, 25-30 co-ordinators were working there, and more are arriving in town every day.

By September 22, filming will have begun and should take six weeks to complete. Publicist Tina Baird said the schedule is "very tight". On day will be spent in the liquor store. Main Street will be

the filming site for a few days. The names and number of local cast will be available next week. On September 15, posters calling for extras were displayed all over town.

"Shegalla" was specifically written for this region and should be released in the spring of 1999. Co-producer Diane Patrick-O'Connor described the film as "contemporary" and "intense". It is the story of an older woman "regaining self-esteem".

the theatrical distribution of the film. Patrick-O'Connor said that finding a distributor is the "number one problem" in Canada. Making movies in the United States is easier because of the studio system which provides financing.

Despite their hectic schedules, the majority of the new arrivals "love it" here in the South Similkameen. The co-producer said everyone is impressed with the beauty of the Similkameen Valley and the warm reception from local people.

# Centre offers services

Local business people went to the Community Skills Centre to learn about what the centre can do for business. Sponsored by Princeton and District Chamber of Commerce, the lunch meeting at the Skills Centre featured Skills Centre staff giving an overview of the programs available for employee training.

Skills Centre Manager Garry Sicker emphasized the importance of having good employees with the right skills, then Geri Logan went into some details about how the Skills Centre can interact with business to train employees.

Logan described Matching Funds which pay 75 per cent of training costs, Job Creation programs covering labour costs, and other services offered to meet employers' specific needs. Logan stated that the Skills Centre had trained 866 people since January 1997, and 308 of these were employees in local businesses.

"We can't think of everything," Logan said, encouraging employers to come to the centre and explain their needs.

Career Counsellor Sue Ashe is available to offer advice to people about advancing in their careers.

"It's a big step to come through our door," Ashe said, "Potential

employees come through the door every day. If you need an employee, let us know your requirements."

Logan explained how rapidly the Skills Centre can respond to a need. Over 90 people were trained in basic fire suppression and Emergency Services during the Lawless Creek fire emergency, and were on the job as soon as the training was done.

Ken Heuser, Skills Centre Board Chair, said, "What we do is ask the community to tell us what they need. We're proud of our facility. We look forward to serv-

ing you in the future."

Barry Montgomery said he and others were pursuing the theme concept begun with downtown revitalization, and hoped to put together a bus trip to Leavenworth, Washington. He hopes to have a marketing expert on the trip.

Montgomery added that there would be an agri-forestry forum in Princeton on October 23-24. It will feature talks on non-lumber products available from the forests, such as plants used for medicine and foods, and items used in wild-crafting.

**Symposium showcased Princeton project**

**Lunch on the tailings?**  
It could not have been done five years ago, but this year, a crowd gathered on the old tailings site south of Princeton for a bag lunch, a hot sunny day, and a look at a fine reclamation project. Princeton was the feature attraction of the 22nd annual Mine Reclamation Symposium held last week in Penticton. Approximately 120 people arrived in three buses to view the reclamation work done mine tailings, then go to a biosolids application demonstration at the Ingerbelle site on Similco property on Tuesday, September 15. John Braman, biosolids project manager for Greater Vancouver Regional District (GVRD) was speaker for the occasion, describing the condition of the tailings when work began on research

plots in 1992. Bob Hamaguchi and Carl Bottaro attended the tour. Both men worked for Similco. While he was in charge of the reclamation project on behalf of the mine, Bottaro, an avid golfer, designed an area to be used as a nine-hole extension to the adjacent Princeton Golf course. Those who came to view the reclamation represented mining and environmental groups from around the world. It was Princeton's and GVRD's "day in the sun". Braman described the processes of conditioning the tailings surface with biosolids for planting. Twenty-five tonnes per hectare of dry biosolids were worked into the surface of the 50 year old tailings dump to provide an organic nutrient base for plant growth and

longevity. The visitors to the site noted the knee-high grasses covering the tailings, and the powdery white tailings dust on the roadways. The contrast was readily apparent, although visitors could only imagine the desolate wasteland, more like a moonscape, that Princeton had lived with for five decades. Below the lunch site, a tractor was busy cutting another crop of hay from the first reclamation site established in 1974. Harold Allison, a local rancher, worked with the Town (who own the tailings) and a deal was arranged to pump water from the sewerage system holding pond onto the first level of the tailings dump to grow hay. Braman described that arrangement to the visitors, and

commended those people who made the first attempt to reclaim the tailings.

Rick Cebriy, Wayne Crimmon, and Lee Swanson attended. They were contractors who undertook the project work, and continue to do mine reclamation work in other locales. Cebriy arranged a demonstration of biosolids application on the overburden dumps at Ingerbelle.

As the tour moved to a different kind of environmental challenge with the overburden dump reclamation project, people could see how the rock piles had been contoured and treated to prevent leaching and yield the highest growth of feed grasses. Braman

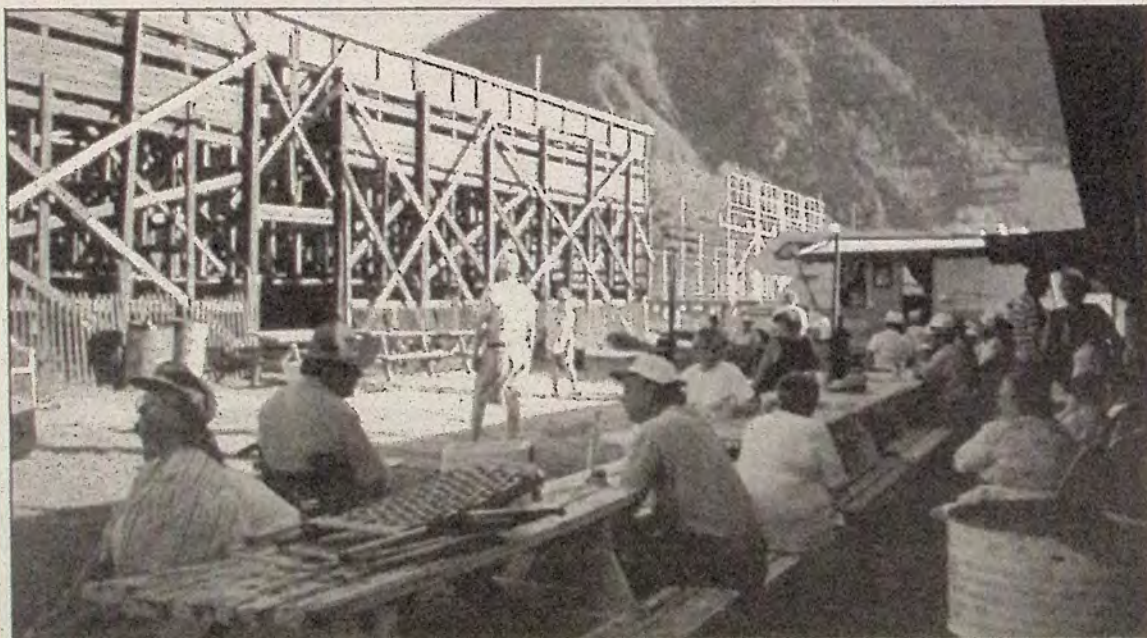
stated that he had seen mountain sheep grazing on the new grass, along with deer. The deer moved onto the site rapidly when the grass began to grow.

Biosolids are a waste product coming from GVRD sewerage treatment plant on Annacis Island. The biosolids were trucked to Princeton and spread on the contoured rock by machines modified to spread the biosolids over extremely rough surfaces. There were many challenges to be overcome during the reclamation projects.

Art O'Bryan, former Reclamation Inspector for our region, expressed his pleasure at the way the Princeton and Similco pro-

jects had been done. He played a role in the ultimate success of the projects, and described some of the environmental hurdles faced in making the project happen at all. In the early stages, there were mountains of paper work, approvals and permits that had to be obtained, and all of it involved a marketing effort both to governmental agencies and to the public. By the end of the day, there was no doubt in anybody's mind that the mine reclamation projects had been a tremendous success.

The tour wound up with a drink and dinner at the historic Princeton Hotel. For local contractors, GVRD and Similco representatives, it was a celebration.

## OUR VIEW

### Results are proof

Over one hundred people toured our tailings site near the golf course and the Similco rock piles where overburden was dumped. Princeton was a "feature" at the Mine Reclamation Symposium which included the tour of Nickel Plate and Princeton.

We owe a great debt of gratitude to Greater Vancouver Regional District for the research done on our tailings site. For at least fifty years, our air was polluted on many days of the year by the dust blowing from the surface of the tailings. Sometimes Princeton looked as if a forest fire was burning, the air was so full of fine grey particles of dust from the tailings. Greater Vancouver Regional District found that they could turn another waste product, biosolids, into a way to reclaim the industrial waste from the old Allenby mill.

The crowd inspecting our tailings could see the various test patches of grass, and the widespread grasses covering the tailings now. Up at Ingerbelle mine site, they could see grass growing on what was once nothing but rock piles. Deer and sheep graze there now, incorporating the new grass into their own ecological system.

We have the proof here in Princeton that mining need not become a permanent environmental hazard. We have proof that mining can be done safely and reclamation can be successful. In another fifty years, it is doubtful that anyone will remember that Princeton once had a huge grey mound of barren ground at the east end of town, nor will they recall the rock dumps that bordered Highway 3 near the mine. They will see only the grassy slopes where animals graze.

It was good to see Princeton, an old mining town, used as an example of successful mine reclamation. We need mines, not just for jobs, but for the valuable minerals and clays they produce. We have proof we can do it right.

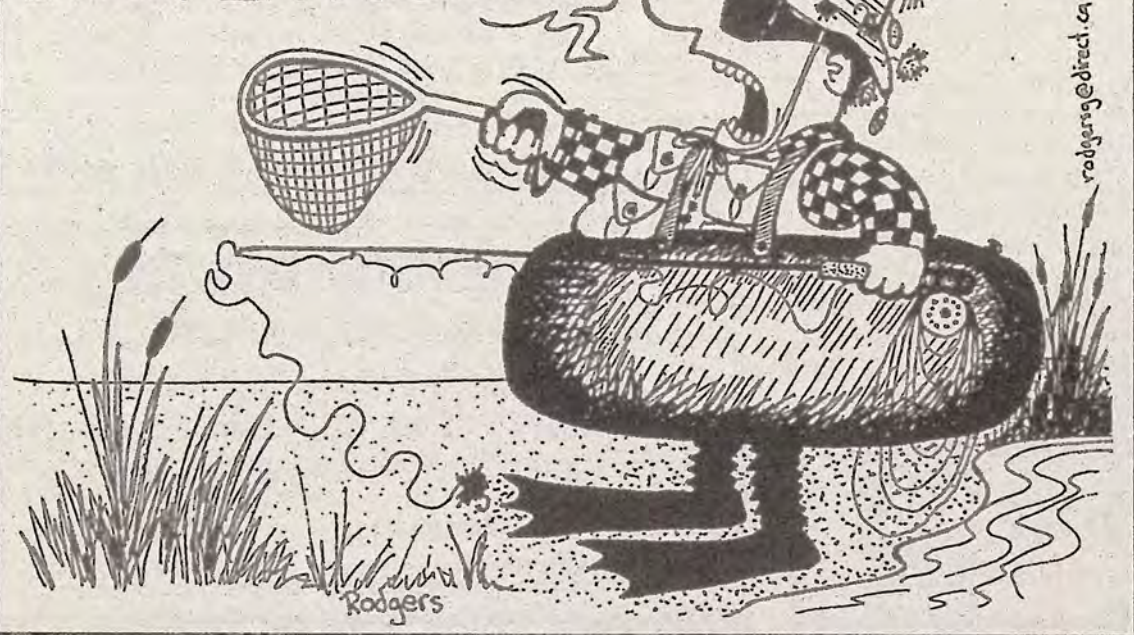

### Trout Talk: Where a young fisherman can catch fish almost every day

Similkameen outdoorsman I was talking with a former student of mine yesterday. He has kids and I have a 27-year-old son, Carl, who is still my kid. We were discussing how youngsters get bored if the fish aren't biting.

They start saying, "When can we go home, Dad?"

They throw rocks in the water, eat up the lunch, and are generally bored if not downright unhappy.

Kids need action! It is hard to give a 100 per cent guarantee fishing success on any lake. However, barring a thunderstorm or other such weather upset, I would venture a 95 per cent guarantee on Jameson Lake.

This lake is located 10.5 km. (6.5 miles) south of Princeton, as the crow flies. It would be a good idea to get a forestry map to show the way by road, as it really twists and turns through the mountains. Plan to spend a day. It is a beautiful lake nestled down in a canyon. It is a bit of a hike from road's end where you must park the vehicle.

There is a self-sustaining population of native trout, or more, if that is possible. It is the only lake I know of where you can cast your fly or bait and have a number of trout come after it. The water is crystal clear. The trout come from all directions. They are not big - six to eight inches long - but are they ever eager!

I did catch a nine-incher one day. We caught lots. Carl and I had a frying pan and we had a feed of fish right on the lakeshore. Are they ever tasty!

Jameson is the only lake in the area that has a catch limit of twelve (12) fish. When we asked local Conservation Officer Al Lay about fishing regulations on Jameson, he said the limit is 12, but six of the 12 must be rainbow and the other six, brook trout (char). So it is still excellent news for those "kids", young and old, who like to keep lots of fish. Most of the other lakes have a maximum of six (and some have other restrictions such as size; catch and release; barbless hooks, etc). But Jameson still has the same rules as in the "good old days".

Access is tricky, but fishing is fast and furious. A kid is not likely to say, "I'm bored," because of no bites.

They might, in an unusual case, say "I'm tired of catching fish."

But when I was a kid, I recall it was usually my Dad who said, "Let's go home"

On my own trips, I didn't go home until it was too dark to see anymore.

Try Jameson and be sure to bring your frying pan, salt and butter. And don't forget the kids!
