When fifty-four older persons took to the streets of Princeton on a blustery autumn morning, people cheered them along the way, smiling, applauding, calling encouragement. The parade wound down Bridge Street on Friday morning, led by Jim English on his horse, Buck, and followed by a banner announcing "International Year of the Older Persons".

"I was really so pleased at the turnout on a day of uncertain weather," said Ray Jarvis, president of Senior Citizens Branch #30, and organizer of the

event. "I liked the way people responded as we passed. I believe it has created some awareness of seniors in our community."

The parade kicked off the year recognizing the input older people can give to their communities. Jarvis plans to "get something going" with a variety of community groups in the new year.

"One of our priorities is a dance with teenagers," says Jarvis with enthusiasm, "That should be a lot of fun."

Plans are in the works now for a Seniors Superstar sports event, a strictly light-hearted event where

"The point is to interact with other people and let them know we like to have fun," Jarvis said at the luncheon at the Seniors Hall after the parade.

The route seemed long, there was a chill wind blowing golden leaves across the streets, but nobody dropped out of the parade and they all said they enjoyed doing it. The parade was a success.

Cawston opposes biosolids

On September 25, Cawston residents submitted a petition to the ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks opposing the use of biosolids in their community. Approximately 150 signed. Members of the naturalist club and the South Okanagan Organic Producers Ass'n (S.O.O.P.A.) sent separate letters to the Penticton office.

Concern began when Roger Mayer and Bill Bush, Regional District Directors, applied for permits to use biosolids to fertilize their land.

Rancher Bud Sharpe said he signed the petition because Bush's property is 200 yards away from his own. Sharpe is worried about flooding that occurs every spring. He said he does not want contaminated water in his horse pasture. Sharpe

believes the use of biosolids could reduce property values.

Ron Townsend, an officer in charge of pollution prevention at the Ministry of Environment office in Penticton said some of the petitioners' concerns "are valid". High ground water in a flood area and property close to the river could pose problems. He plans to do a visual investigation of the sites sometime this month.

Road issue unsolved

The proposed frontage road to provide access to Princeton Plaza and Best Western Motel from Highway 3 continues to be an issue haunting the owners and Princeton's Town Council. The Ministry of Transportation and Highways agreed to the construction of a frontage road provided the access could be properly designed and constructed to accommodate traffic safely on and off the highway.

The ministry has since received a proposal for a third lane to

accommodate multiple accesses.

The ministry response was presented at the September 21 Town Council meeting: "The third land concept would add conflict points and cause confusion for the motorists approaching from the east. Motorists making the free right out of Bridge Street would find themselves in the middle lane with no warning."

The ministry will not approve the third lane, but, according to the letter, is still willing to review frontage road design.

Townsend is not sure when chemical tests will be done. He said that, if a permit is issued, it will not happen for another month.

In the meantime Townsend wants to "check out" Princeton. Although biosolids are commonly used and can be bought easily for vegetable and flower gardens, he is not that familiar with their use. For the past few years the officer's attention has been drawn to other issues.

As a result of the letters and petition, Townsend said the "general consensus" in their office is a public meeting is necessary. According to him, there are four different types of biosolids and people need to be educated.

Bush and Mayer would use "high grade retail" which is carefully screened at the source in Vancouver.

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Herman Edwards, valley flautist, believes beauty is "good medicine"

Herman Edwards is a little-known talent living in relative seclusion on the Chopaka Reserve. He is an accomplished wood carver and flautist. At age 44, he is still struggling against the negative influences Christianity imposed on his childhood. He successfully overcame alcoholism twelve years ago.

Like many aboriginals, he has found it difficult to embrace a spirituality taught through abuse. The damnation of traditional customs by past lawmakers and religion has put Edwards', and other natives', lives in limbo.

A safe retreat into the old ways invites an inner personal conflict. It is desired but etched into painful memories is the idea their practices are sinful. This is what many First Nations people were told as children what what they came to believe.

People in Edwards' generation were often separated from their community. The abrupt imposition of Christian authority led to the dissolution of families. Many were taken to residential schools, others succumbed to alcoholism.

Edwards and his relatives had no guides. Sorting through a confusion or morals and beliefs is a challenge, and trying to find the way back 'home' is often a lonely task.

During an interview on September 30, Herman Edwards shared his thoughts, music, carving and sense of humour.

"We no longer have thoughtful people in our community," he said.

In Edwards' opinion, "Nobody does anything for anybody, nobody visits anyone unless there's a loss, like a death in the family."

He blames the situation on the influence of Christianity, which suppressed potlatches, winter dances, etc. Edwards does not go visiting. People have told him he thinks he is "better than everyone" since he stopped drinking.

Jokingly, Edwards comments, "We're not only suppressed, but oppressed and depressed. We are pressed."

He has "always whittled". Seventeen years ago, Edwards began teaching himself to carve and play flutes. In the beginning, he met an elder mentor in Dallas,

Texas who gave him new ideas.

In 1981, Edwards and his wife were hired by the National School Assembly, an organization based in southern California. They joined other cultural entertainers on a tour of American high schools specifically located in the southern states where racism is prevalent.

Edwards has since composed for documentaries. He was the fifth native recording artist to be taped by Canyon Records in Phoenix, Arizona.

Edwards said that Niko Theodosakis, a director with "Shegalla", has expressed an interest in Edwards' flute music for the movie.

His instruments are usually made with cedar and feature delicate animal heads such as eagles and horses.

"If something looks beautiful and sounds beautiful, it's good medicine."

Edwards has created nearly fifty flutes and has traded most of them away.

Stating he is "not a robot", Edwards approaches his art with "respect and honor". He expects others to do the same. He is willing to share his music but guards himself against exploitation. Edwards makes a point of never volunteering. He plays only when asked.

His music carries a sound that is distinctively North American Indian. The clear, pure rhythm evokes visions of mountains, rivers and clusters of blood-red sumac.

Edwards' daughter, Hovia, has inherited his talent. She has been playing the flute since she was three. Using a variety of flute types, she recorded her first CD of traditional music this summer at age fifteen.

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Estate planning: 'Testamentary Trusts'

During the course of writing your Will, you may decide to leave something for your grandchildren. But you might be concerned that your grandchildren won't be old enough to responsibly manage their inheritance when the time comes. One solution is to create a "testamentary trust".

Established in your Will, a testamentary trust holds an amount of money or property for a specified period of time for certain beneficiaries after your death. Most commonly, trusts are set up for children, grandchildren and spouses. Real estate trusts are also frequently established.

Why Set Up A Trust?

Trusts for children and grandchildren are typically established to ensure that the beneficiaries are mature enough to responsibly manage an inheritance. Other reasons include setting money aside for post-secondary education or protecting a child with marital problems (i.e. to keep it out of a divorce settlement).

Spousal trusts are created to hold all or part of your estate for your spouse during his or her lifetime. After your spouse's death, your assets will be distributed according to your Will -- not your spouses.

There are several reasons why you might consider establishing a spousal trust, including:

- providing support for your spouse, while at the same time ensuring that your estate is passed to your children in the event that your spouse remarries
- reducing provincial probate fees. Since ownership of your estate does not pass to your spouse, its value is not included when calculating the provincial probate fees payable on his or her death
- deferring income tax. Income tax payable on your assets can be deferred until your spouse's death
- income splitting for tax purposes. Separate tax returns can be filed for your spouse and the spousal trust at the appropriate

marginal tax rates, often resulting in a tax reduction.

Another common type of trust is a real estate trust or "cottage trust". These trusts are often set up to allow the succeeding generation of family members to share the use of a seasonal residence, such as a cottage or cabin. However, you should consider carefully the establishment of a real estate trust, as they don't always work well.

Who Manages A trust?

Generally, the executor of your Will is also the trustee of the assets held in trust. In your Will, you should provide details of how the trust will be managed, includ-

ing where the assets should be invested. Provisions can also be made to allow an income to be paid to your beneficiary.

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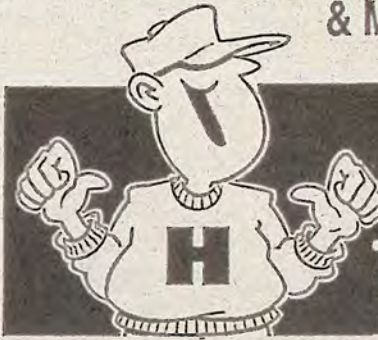
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Karen Beaupré presents Iams cat food to Myrt Small, winner of the September "Your Pet Food" purchase draw at Southern Ridge Trading Company.

Problems mount in local nursing situation

Longterm care nurse Lynn Smith reported on the progress of the diabetes education project when she spoke at the October 2 meeting of the Community Health Advisory Committee.

"It's probably the only bright spot in health around here," she said.

People with diabetes waited 10 weeks in the past, and now wait only seven to see a registered nurse and a dietician. Hours have increased to six per week, cutting waiting time.

Smith went on to criticize the nursing situation in Princeton General Hospital.

"It's not safe to run this hospital the way it's being done," Smith said.

Ray Huey, Committee chair, remarked, "Everybody can present problems. We need solutions."

B.C. funded for new health care ideas

More than \$9.5 million has been granted to the B.C. Ministry of Health from the federal Health Transition Fund to provide an opportunity for B.C. to test new alternatives for better and more cost effective first level health care. In addition, funds will be reallocated from the B.C. Health Ministry for the provision of medical services for new projects.

Applications will be solicited through a formal call for expres-

sions of interest process. Up to 10 proposals will be selected to establish demonstration project sites designed to explore new ways of delivering primary health care through multidisciplinary teams of health professionals.

The individual sites will be funded according to the estimated medical needs of the client population rather than on the volume of services provided.

Regional Director Linda Allison referred to a report presented by the nursing staff, which showed local nurses, whether hospital or community nurses, miss scheduled breaks, mealtimes, stay late, do more paperwork, feel overwhelmed and have signs of burnout.

"We can't study it to death, we need to do something," Allison said.

Nursing Director Norma Meyer gave her report, saying, "Dorothy (Cobb) and I had a horrible summer. In all my years of nursing, I haven't had such a busy summer."

The problems were related to staffing and lack of money. Some initial remarks were made in regard to whether there was a union issue involved.

"If there is an issue, it hasn't been expressed to us," Dorothy Cobb stated.

October has been officially proclaimed Women's History Month in B.C.

Sue Hammell, Minister for Women's Equality, made the proclamation on September 30, saying, "This proclamation makes Women's History Month an official provincial occasion and is a formal way for the government to acknowledge the past and present achievements of women. It is another way to ensure that the contribution of women who have helped build this magnificent province will always be remembered."

Women's History Month was declared six years ago as a national event to recognize the achievements of women as a vital part of Canada's heritage and to develop a better understanding of the diverse roles women play in today's society.

To mark Women's History Month, Hammell released Our HERitage, an annual publication that profiles B.C. women. Featured in this year's edition are noted British Columbia women, including author Joy Kogawa and the founder of the National Film Board's Studio "D", Kathleen Shannon.

Doctors paid plenty, says Minister of Health Priddy

As Minister of Health, I regret the ongoing BC Medical Association campaign to get more money by locking out patients and I am concerned about the impact this action is having on British Columbians.

The BCMA says the 'reduced activity days' campaign is about health care funding. However, this patient 'lockout' is not about increasing funding for medicare, it is about increasing funding for doctors. The BCMA is demanding a 10% increase in doctors' funding, which would cost taxpayers \$150 million.

The government is protecting medicare. This year, the government has increased spending on health services by \$228 million. BC is the only province to increase its health budget for the last seven consecutive years, at the same time as the federal government continues to cut transfer payments.

Even with these facts, the BCMA continues to claim the system is under-funded. Perhaps the BCMA should consult with its counterpart in Alberta. Doctors in Alberta have recently published a newspaper insert

acknowledging BC's nation-leading effort to maintain health care services.

The BCMA's campaign to inflate funding for doctors is counter-productive for government and BC taxpayers, but more to the point, it increases stress on patients and their families. This action also places stress on the medical system by redirecting patients, who should be seen in doctors' offices, to emergency rooms.

Once again, as Minister of Health, I am calling on the BCMA to end this campaign which puts doctors' income ahead of patients' interests. I remain committed to put the health care focus where it should be - on protecting medical services, so that British Columbians can have quality health care they can count on every day of the year.

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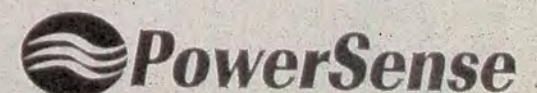

FRBC monitors watershed

OLALLA - First Nations of the Okanagan Similkameen Environmental Protection Society will use Forest Renewal BC funding for water quality monitoring on the Keremeos, Shatford and Shingle Creeks.

"Protecting water quality is an important objective of Forest Renewal BC's watershed restoration program," said Environment, Lands and Parks Minister Cathy McGregor. "This partnership between Forest Renewal BC and the First Nations of the Okanagan Similkameen Environmental Clark complains to Press Council

The provincial government intends to lodge a complaint with the British Columbia Press Council regarding the recent decision by David Black to prohibit the editors of his 54 community newspapers from publicly supporting the Nisga'a treaty.

The government retained Victoria lawyer Joseph Arvay, who wrote to the press council asking that "the Council refrain from taking a position on this issue until it has had the benefit" of the province's submissions.

Arvay's letter cites the press council's code of practice which includes the following: "Newspapers should defend their hard-won right to exercise the widest possible latitude in expressing their opinions, no matter how controversial or unpopular the opinions may be, and to give columnists, editorials, cartoonists and others the same latitude in expressing personal opinions. However, newspapers and journalists shall strive to avoid expressing comment and conjecture as established fac-

Protection Society will permit weekly water quality monitoring of these three creeks."

The \$45,000 project will generate 250 person-days of employment and require the services of a First Nations technician to conduct weekly water quality monitoring.

Stream sedimentation has the potential to pose water quality problems on all three creeks, said FNOSEPS contract administrator Tom Chapman.

These creeks are significant resources," Chapman said. "Shingle Creek is home to the last viable spawning ground for the

kokanee and rainbow trout population in Skaha Lake. Forestry activities on Shatford and Shingle Creek impact the Okanagan River, and similar activities on Keremeos Creek can have downstream impacts on the Similkameen River."

FNOSEPS is a joint initiative of the Penticton, Osoyoos, Lower Similkameen and Upper Similkameen Indians bands. FNOSEPS is working with Gorman Brothers Lumber Ltd., the Ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks, and the Ministry of Forests on the creek water quality monitoring project.

Planning is important in maternity care

 Becoming a parent is an exciting life experience, especially if you are expecting your first child. With the anticipation of your delivery comes a responsibility to plan for a safe, healthy pregnancy and homecoming.

In the South Okanagan, expectant parents will receive support from the Planned Maternity Care Program (PMC) based at local health units. This program was developed to help healthy mothers and newborns return safely to their own home within two days after a vaginal delivery or three days after a Cesarean section.

Public Health Nurses are available to assist mothers in organizing their prenatal education and discharging to their homes. They will invite mothers to attend classes at the Health Unit. Public Health Nurses can be very helpful in assisting mothers to consider important preparations for coming home after baby is born.

- At-home help - Mothers will need another adult in the home to take the responsibility of household chores, cooking and child-care.

- Phone contact - ideally, telephone contact is the safest, most consistent way for mothers to stay in touch with Public Health Nurses and access help if needed.

- Social support - life stresses, such as finances and relationships, should be decreased as much as possible before baby is born.

- language - a translator in the home should be arranged if communication in English is difficult. Women and newborns who are discharged from the hospital within the "early discharge" timeframes will receive increased follow-up from a Public Health Nurse in their first four days at

home. This includes daily phone calls and an early home visit. There is also access to a 24-hour telephone service and a breast-feeding consultant.

The South Okanagan PMC program is one of the many recently developed early maternity discharge programs in B.C. Please contact your local health unit if you want more information or require assistance to prepare for the birth of your baby.

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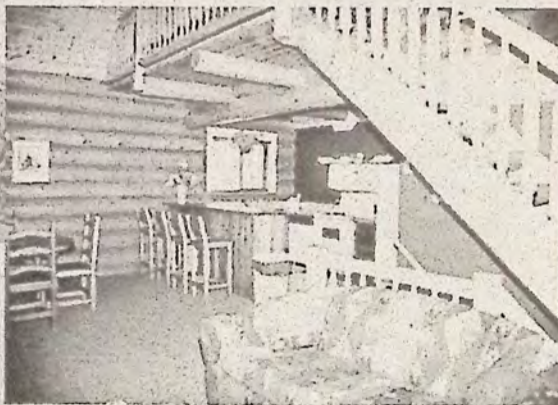

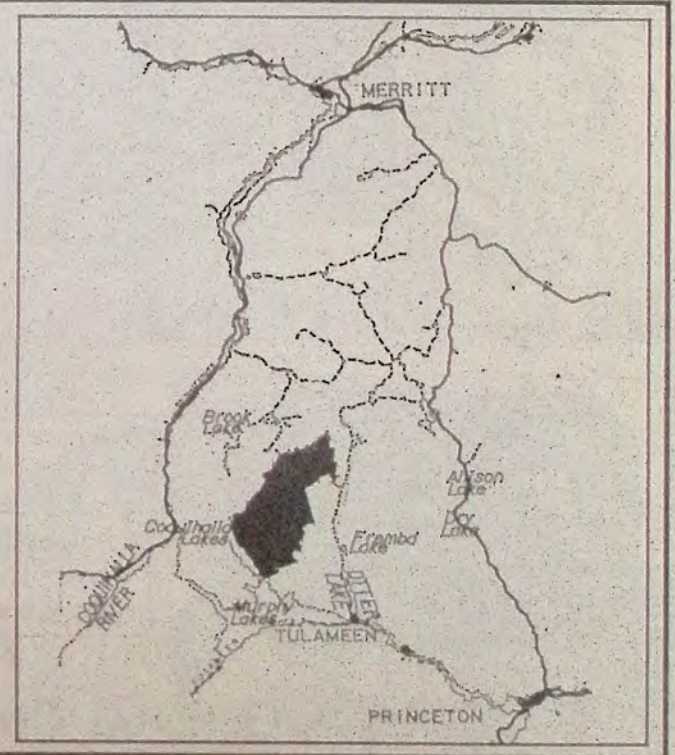

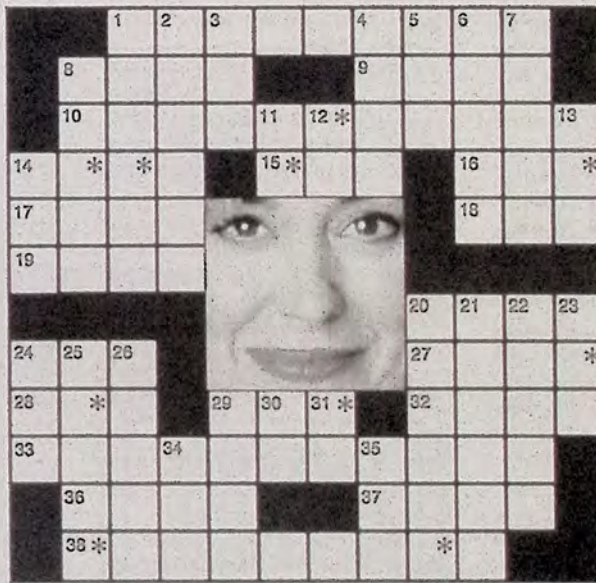

Liberal DNA law missed chance, says Hart

Jim Hart, Member of Parliament for Okanagan-Coquihalla confronted the Liberal government in the House of Commons on September 29 to expose shortcomings in the legislation that could render the DNA bill ineffective. Bill C-3 allows the RCMP to set up and administer a DNA databank of convicted criminals.

Hart called the Liberals "weak-kneed" because the bill does nothing to prevent crime. Hart would like to see the police able, on the arrest of a suspect, to take DNA samples, even though the suspect had not been convicted.

"The idea behind the legislation is great," Hart said, "but restricting the databank to convicted criminals only will render this bill almost useless in preventing crime. I believe that, upon arrest, the police should be able to take a DNA sample, just like they do with fingerprints."

Hart went on to sway, "Taking a DNA sample at the time of arrest is exactly like fingerprinting. It will only provide the police with a series of numbers that can be used for the purposes of matching DNA found at a crime scene. The sample will not be used to tell authorities anything regarding the mental state, health or physical characteristics of the suspect and will not invade the privacy of the individual," said Hart.

Princeton Artist invited as guest at Kelowna show

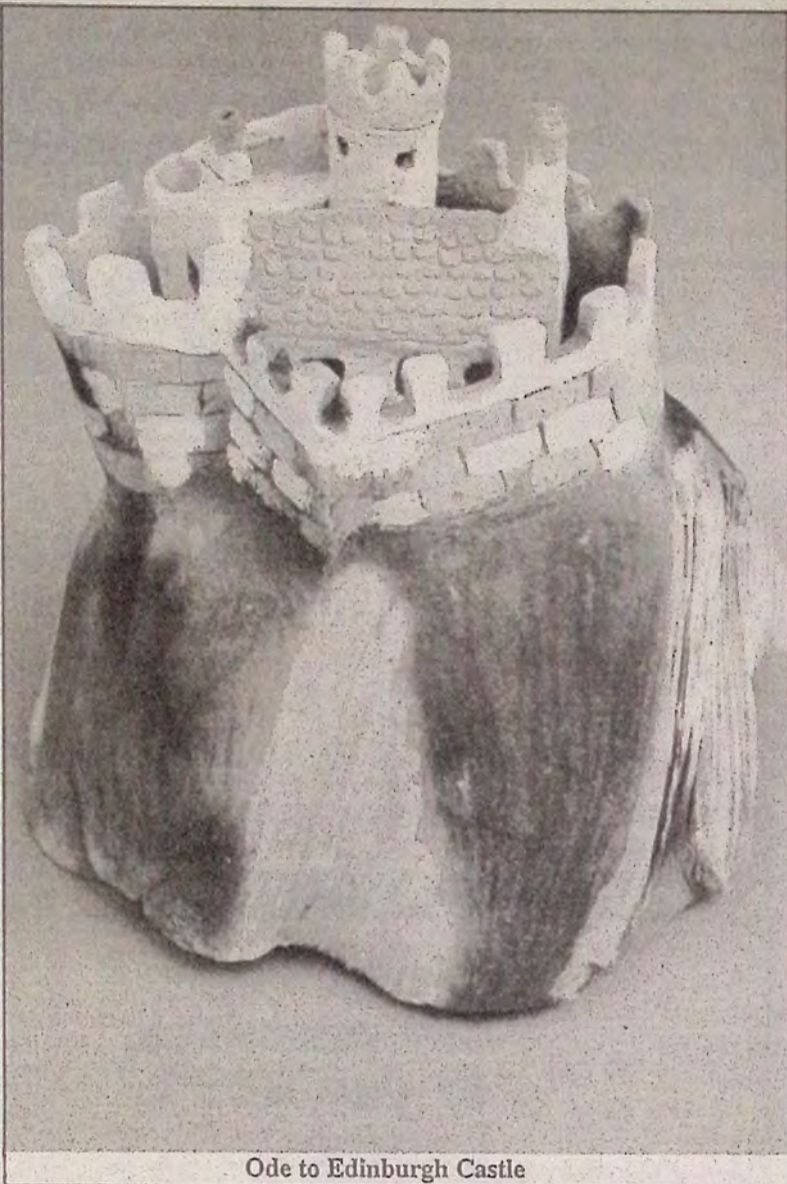
The work of Sue LePoidevin of Princeton will be featured at the ninth annual *A Taste of Clay* pottery show to be held in Kelowna October 16 and 17. The show and sale is presented by Nine Potters of the Okanagan Valley at Okanagan Mission Community Hall. Sue LePoidevin is invited as "guest artist".

LePoidevin's work, shown at right, is "primitive fired sculpture". Her pottery is smoke-fired using a technique originating with the native peoples of the American southwest. She fires greenware in a red brick box filled with sawdust which is set afire. The sawdust burns slowly and the smoke discolours the clay in a pattern LePoidevin chooses. She burnishes some of the clay by rubbing it with a smooth stone.

LePoidevin earned a degree in Arts and Crafts at the University of California, and has worked with clay for over 20 years. She took workshops in the "primitive" techniques and adapted them to her own needs.

She and husband Steve moved around a great deal, then settled in Princeton in 1987 where Sue has made time for artistic work while raising two sons.

The recognition given LePoidevin is evident by the invitation to "guest" at the Kelowna show, as she is not a member of the group putting on the show. The reputation of her work is growing.

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Studying bighorn sheep in the East Kootenay: BCWF work



all possible causes for the documented declines in sheep populations. However, the precise cause of declining sheep populations is not known. The need for a scientifically credible database on bighorns and their habitats in the East Kootenay to help solve this mystery is great.

The East Kootenay Region of the B.C. Wildlife Federation has undertaken a research project, the objective of which is to better understand of the problems and provide measures to restore the bighorn herds of the Trench. Spring to fall habitat preferences are being identified by tracking radio-collared radio sheep, and detailed range evaluations are being conducted to determine if preferred habitats are adequate to support existing or even greater sheep populations. If the preferred habitat is inadequate, a second goal will be to develop a plan for enhancement and protection of the most limiting habitat elements. If preferred habitats are found to be capable of supporting higher numbers a strategy will be recommended that will increase sheep densities.

The project, currently in its second year, will continue for another three years. To date, results indicate that the sheep prefer low shrub and grassland plant commu-

nities within winter ranges. The results are being interpolated to surrounding areas outside the specific study areas and may be useful at some time in the future for sheep range evaluation in other areas of B.C.

Co-operative funding for the project is provided by the Habitat Conservation Trust Fund, East Kootenay Region - B.C. Wildlife Federation, B.C. Ministry of Environment, Columbia Basin Fish and Wildlife Compensation Trust Fund, The Wild Sheep Society of B.C., and the North American Foundation for Wild Sheep.

Premier asks B.C. Chamber for support

Premier Glen Clark spoke to the BC Chamber of Commerce on September 29 and urged members to become more involved in the public debate on the Nisga'a treaty.

"Ten years ago, the chamber's strong and forthright position played a major role in the Bill Vander Zalm government's decision to enter treaty negotiations," said Clark. "I'm asking members today to carry on in this vein, to speak out publicly. Looking down the road toward the next 10 to 20 years, native land claims - and the Nisga'a treaty specifically - are among the most central issues facing us as a province and as a society.

"I'm encouraging individual members of the business community, and the chamber as a whole, to play a significant role as we resolve these issues together.

"In 1988, in a submission to cabinet, the chamber said that failing to settle these claims was 'having an adverse effect on the economic development and social structure of many communities throughout the province. The uncertainty created by aboriginal land claims was and is having a detrimental effect on every element of our society.' Little has

changed, except that today, we are finally moving forward toward certainty and finality," said Clark.

"The Nisga'a agreement will help build investor confidence, which in turn creates jobs and benefits the province's economy. While there are powerful moral and legal arguments impelling us to settle treaties, there is also a compelling business case, and I hope the chamber will work with us to make it a part of the debate. The potential consequences of the Nisga'a final agreement not proceeding are enormous - for example, a 1990 study by Price Waterhouse estimated that at that time more than \$1 billion in potential investment was being held back due to the uncertainty flowing from unresolved land claims," said Clark.

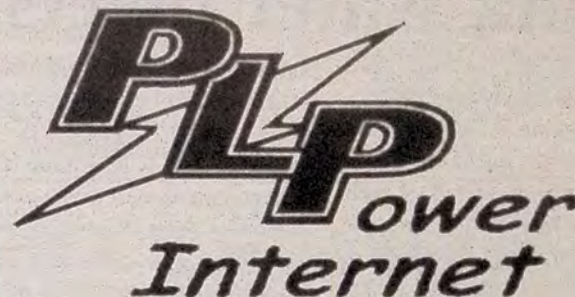

Olalla water meets standards

For the first time in ten years, the 'boil water' order in Olalla will be lifted. In the past, Olalla Creek supplied residents with water that does not meet health standards.

The system is currently being upgraded and acting public works manager from the Regional District Ernie Obst said they are

on schedule and should be finished on October 31.

The project is providing a new reservoir and well to the community. Residents wanted to see the reservoir elevated to higher ground so they would have more pressure by Obst said the cost for extra pipe was not in the budget. Added pressure would strain the

old pipes at lower levels across Main Street.

The federal and provincial governments are sharing the cost of the upgrade with residents. Each household will pay a tax increase of approximately \$140 for the next 20 years. That figure could decrease in five or six years when the debt for the old system is paid off.

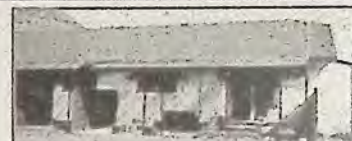

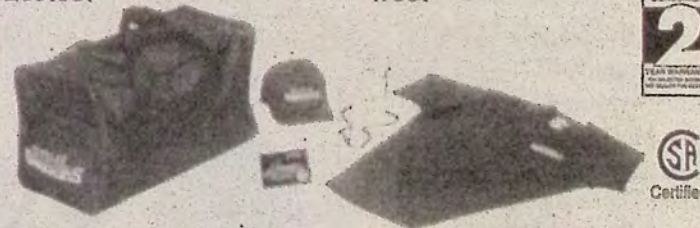

Jackson Mountain rises steeply above the village of Tulameen. The view from the top is splendid in the clear fall air. On a glorious day in September, nine Vermilion Forks Naturalists piled into Walt Smart's 4X4 and drove up a steep, winding road to the forest on the plateau behind the mountain. We stopped at a place called Angel's Rest, a small clearing amid dense second growth, where two crumbled log buildings mark long ago habitation.

Walt, who has lived his life in this area, told us who did the original logging with horses and sleighs 70 years ago, but could not tell us what angel or devil inspired the name. The only remaining signs of logging are a few rotting stumps. The new forest is comprised of tall, prime trees still growing vigorously: Douglas fir, Engelmann spruce (white spruce), lodgepole pine (Jack pine) and alpine fir (Balsam), and is impressive evidence of how a forest regenerates if carefully logged. I thought those tall straight fir would have made splendid masts for sailing

You can meet friends everywhere but you cannot meet enemies anywhere - you have to make them.

logical ecosystems of the two lakes are quite different. You could make such a chart for any two lakes in our region. Now, I'll compare the food supply in the two lakes:

Martin's - Great quantities of wee-loving aquatics, such as freshwater shrimp, dragonfly and damsel nymphs and leeches. (Martin's was once named Leech Lake by locals.)

Dry - with the exception of the weed beds, I have mostly chironomids and mayflies on this lake. I have seen good caddis fly hatches at times.

Now, back to the original question: what fly would you use on which lake?

Martin's: Spring - Black Leech #10, F.W. Shrimp #10, Dragonfly (green grub), Bead-Eye damsel. Summer - Black Leech #8, F.W. shrimp #8, Dragonfly, Bead-Eye Damsel. Fall - Black Leech #6, F.W. Shrimp #8, Dragonfly, Bead-Eye Damsel, back swimmer, water boatman.

Dry: Spring - Doc Spratley (Black)#8, Green Sedge (Red), Mayfly nymph (such as pheasant nymph), Chironomid, Idaho nymph. Summer - Tom Thumb #10-#12, Green Sedge, Chironomid #14-#16, Idaho nymph, Muddler Minnow (after the hatchery truck comes in).

Fall - Tom Thumb #12-#14, Green Sedge, Idaho Nymph, Muddler Minnow (silver), Doc Spratley.

Trout Talk

What fly would

You use in lake?

That is question that cannot be answered without a little thought! Have you seen any one fly that worked all of the time? Since each lake has a different ecosystem (ecology of living things) that is the first thing to consider.

Looking at two local lakes might be an interesting way to start on ecosystems: Martin's Lake and Dry Lake.

Martin's Lake is located about eight km. north on Highway 40. It is what I call a "sump lake". Its water supply drains into it from the surrounding land. There is no visible inlet or outlet.

Dry Lake is located about 19.5 km. northeast on the Merritt Highway. Its name is really appropriate, as its water level drops drastically each spring. Its water supply, to a large extent, comes from a creek which flows into the northeast end of the lake. There is an outlet on the other end.

I have fished both lakes often and will give you a comparison chart of my findings.

Martins: Sump lake, mud bottom (deep), extensive weed beds, has an aerator supply by Princeton Fish and Game Club, winter kills without aerator.

Dry: creek fed (mostly), gravel and sand bottom with layer of fine silt, few weed beds (those found are on each end of the lake), wind and creek waters aerate water, never winter kills (to my knowledge).
