Thief takes telescope

Sometime between October 25 and October 31, 1998, two homes located outside Tulameen, B.C., on the Otter Valley road were entered illegally. Several household items were taken.

Presidents propose plans

The semi-annual Presidents' Breakfast, a venture of Princeton and District Chamber of Commerce, met November 4 to discuss club projects for 1999 and major projects for Year 2000. Thirty-two organization representatives attended to present a brief on what they would be doing in the coming year.

Mayor Randy McLean welcomed everyone to the meeting and stressed the importance of the work the organizations do for Princeton.

"Nearly every major project we did came out of the Presidents' Club and the Chamber of Commerce and their efforts to diversify our local economy," Mayor McLean stated, and added a few words about sawmill shut-downs in other communities and Princeton's vulnerability as a one-industry town.

"We need to get every different dollar that can come to Princeton," he asserted.

Chamber President Ernie Willis talked about projects done during 1998, saying Chamber would be less project-oriented in 1999.

"We need to look at some of the 'soft' things. Projects are important, but we need a positive attitude about our community. If we don't have it, people who come here won't stay. Business people

must remember we have to create a positive attitude. We have to show we love this community and we're proud to live here," Willis told the gathering.

One of the benefits of the meeting is the sharing of ideas, dates and information about projects. Another benefit results from people meeting each other and sharing concerns and opinions across the breakfast table.

Groups represented included Old Age Pensioners, Princeton Slowpitch League, Hospital Auxiliary, Rotary, Lions, Osprey Lake Ratepayers, Vermilion Trails Society, Senior Citizens, Girl Guides, Princeton Writers Group, Vermilion Artists, Arts Council, Princeton Exhibition Association, Fall Fair, Business and Professional Women, China Ridge Cross Country Ski Society, Otter Valley Fish and Game Club, Princeton Recycling Society, Princeton Figure Skating Club, and two church groups: Lutherans and Four Square Living Water.

Some of the proposals were a Junior Triathlon, better signage to encourage people to stop in Princeton, promote a more "cow-boy" look and hold barbecues, advertise clean air and water to retirees across Canada, and ensure that we always have a functioning hospital.

The last point was raised by Monty Raine, who bluntly stated, "If we lost our hospital, there would be an exodus of people away from Princeton. We have to make sure people know that and make them aware they must watch out for any move meant to shut down our hospital."

Raine received a great round of applause.

Bears will starve

You may see starving bear cubs this fall. Conservation Officer Al Lay reports seeing cubs alone in very poor condition. Sow bears have abandoned their young and these young bears are likely to starve.

Lay says these cubs do not know how to den for the winter, and they may be "showing up all over" during the winter.

The current situation with bears originated with what Lay calls "a horrible, horrible conglomeration of problems."

The conglomeration includes a higher than normal bear population, an extremely dry summer with lack of natural feed at higher elevations that drove bears down into the valleys for natural and artificial irrigation produced the greens and fruits the bears needed.

Conflicts between people and bears occurred.

"The situation was stranger than usual," Lay commented, "Sows with cubs were causing problems, a sure sign of food shortage. They usually stay away from humans when they have cubs."

At one time, there were three sets of sows and cubs in downtown Hedley.

"It was very dangerous," Lay said, shaking his head.

The worst month for bear complaints. During 1998, Lay received 145 complaints, and between the public and Lay, 42 bears were destroyed this year.

Lay foresees a large decline in bear population the next couple of years.

Keremeos Council reviews health facility problems

A progress report on the multi-level care facility in Keremeos was presented to Council on November 2 by Walter Despot, Chair of the building committee. Since the last update in August, Despot met with engineers, architects, and representatives of the ministries of Health and Environment.

Despot said it has been a "long, frustrating process", but things are now "moving in the right direction." Currently, building design drawings are finished and a value analysis must be done before actual working designs can begin.

The value analysis is required by the Ministry of Health for all capital projects and presents one of three "stumbling blocks" for the building committee.

The facility is a \$7 million project. Despot said that, for the first time, new regulations demand a value analysis for all projects over five million dollars. The study will cost between \$20-\$30,000 and is now in the hands of an engineering firm.

Despot told Council, "Our backs are against the wall."

The second problem involves the Ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks. The land where the care facility is built must be elevated 52 inches for flood protection. Despot said the committee can only afford 20 inches for the 35,000 square foot property. If the ministry's requirement is met, and ambulance ramp would be impossible. Despot asked Council

to sign a request for relief to reduce the elevation. Roger Mayer, Regional Director, and Village Council endorsed the forms on November 4.

The third obstacle is conflicting engineers' reports concerning increased sewer usage. Associated Engineering, hired by the Village, estimates the development cost at \$273,000. The building committee received an estimate of \$162,000 from UMA Engineers.

Mayor J.C. Stranart said Council had just heard from Associated Engineers and would need time to review the estimates.

Councillor Evans was not impressed with the response.

He said, "There's no explanation as to where they got their rates."

The development cost charges present a dilemma for Mayor and

Council because the extended health care facility will use the Keremeos sewer system at the expense of residents who will pay higher taxes. However, Regional District owns the property and future building. This means tax monies collected from the proposed site are received by Regional District, not Keremeos. Council is reluctant to raise residents' taxes.

More off-site costs must be added into the plan for upgrading Third Street where the facility will be located. The road needs to be widened, curbed and perhaps raised 66 cm.

This issue and others will be discussed by Council over the next two weeks. The subject will be on the November 16 Village Council agenda.

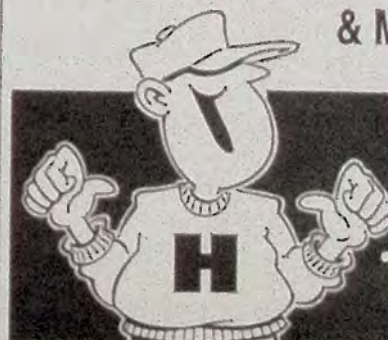

Thieves steal Peace Pole

Cathie Orser is hot under the collar. She put a great deal of effort, and care, into bringing an international peace pole to Princeton. It was planted in front of Town Hall on November 9, 1996. It is gone.

The seven foot white fibreglas pole is shaped like an obelisk, and contains messages for the Year 2000 from Japanese students and Princeton students.

On the pole is the message "May Peace Be in Our Homes and Communities" and, on another side, "May Peace Prevail on Earth". The messages are repeated in French on the other two sides.

Princeton is one of only six communities in B.C. to be given a peace pole. In 1952, a group of Japanese business people decided they did not want to ever see a world war again. The contributed money to put peace poles all around the world. Princeton was fortunate to receive one, thanks to the efforts of Cathie Orser.

Judge orders two fines paid

thefts and break-ins this year, and the need for an end to these crimes.

"We need a strong citizens group to start taking the bull by the horns," Orser commented.

Mayor Randy McLean is upset about the theft. He has been in discussions he hopes will lead to an organized citizen watch group.

Princeton area families

Staunch members of Princeton's Royal Canadian Legion today, Sandra Gould and Les Kinsey are personally aware of the sacrifices made by Canadians and Canadian families throughout the past century. Both are descendants of men and women who did their part in a war fought on Canada's behalf.

Les Kinsey's grandfather fought in the famous "charge of the Light Brigade" in the Boer War that began in South Africa in 1899.

Sandra Gould's family, the Cromartys, have a long history of going off to war, beginning with her grandfather, Samuel Cromarty, who fought in World War I and World War II, and her

mother's parents, the Levells. Grandfather Levell was in the Air Force in World War II and grandmother Elsie Levell riveted aircraft parts for Boeing during the war. (Although she helped build aircraft, Elsie Level would never ride in an airplane.)

Bill Cromarty, Sandra's father, went off to war at age 19. His brother, Roy, joined the armed forces, with their father, on February 2, 1942.

Bill was sent to Britain as part of the #1 Special Forestry Corps. He had been logging since he was 16, and went logging in Britain. These specialized soldiers built Davis rafts that went to France for docks and wharves.

Bill's father had a bad knee from a wound taken in World War I, where he had been a runner (they had no telephones or radios in those days). Sam Cromarty had been gassed, too. He spent his second war in the Home Guard watching Prisoners of War.

The Cromarty family counts their blessings in the men who came home from war: none were lost.

For Bill Cromarty, service did not end with the war. He is a member of Branch #56 of the Royal Canadian Legion. His daughter, Sandra, has served as President and his son, Jim, has served on the executive year after year.

For these people, remembering is a family obligation.

Les Kinsey's family continued

his great grandfather's military tradition into World War I, when Les' grandfather, Bryan Kinsey, was a cavalryman in India from 1914 to 1918. Bryan went to war in 1939, at the beginning of World War II, as a Special Constable to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, serving as a guard on the railway through Rogers Pass.

Les Kinsey's father, Alan, served in World War II with the Canadian Scottish regiment. He was shipped overseas in 1942, and was wounded June 9, 1944, in the Normandy D-Day invasion.

Alan's brother, Glynn, joined the navy in 1941 and served on minesweepers. Alan's second brother, Keith, joined the Lake Superior Regiment of the army

and was 'missing in action' for a time. Alan's third brother, Noel, joined the navy and served as a stoke on a ship on the east coast.

Uncle Bert Jones was taken prisoner by the Germans at Dunkirk. All came home.

Alan's son, Bryan, joined the Canadian Forces in 1970, serving in Egypt and Germany. He retired in 1992.

Les Kinsey is the first Associate Member of Branch #56 to receive his 25 year pin and has served in executive positions for the branch.

As is the case in most Canadian families, the Cromartys and Kinsey's have reasons to remember veterans on November 11.

The Copper Mountain War

The worth of minerals such as copper isn't worth very much these days but that was not the case in 1939 - 1945. World War II was on and copper was an essential metal in armaments. Copper Mountain was considered vital to the war effort. Miners, unless critically ill, were frozen to their jobs.

Our entire school, with the exception of the elementary students, were in the Royal Canadian Army Cadets. All participated in air raid drills. We had a pre-selected place in the woods we were to go. We had a variety of training: first aid, map reading, aircraft identification, how to use a gas mask, and a few other skills. There was some arms training and identification. We were given rifle practice with the Lee Enfield .303 at a specified firing range. I'm sure the rifle was almost heavier than what some of us were.

We had drill practice which also included the girls. Ultimately, we received a light-coloured khaki uniform with a large red maple leaf on the shoulder with R.C.A.C. embroidered in green. Some of the seniors were taught to raise lower and fold the flag at the flag pole in front of our school.

We had a continuous fundraising effort for war bonds. In the school, it was for 25 war stamps. There would always be a goal to achieve in this respect to fill your stamp card. On occasion, to promote the sale of bonds, a speaker which might include a returned service man would address the

community in Copper Mountain Community Hall, very much like the officials did in Tulameen during the forest fire situation.

At times, a military band would come up and we'd march up and down the town streets. It was a lot of fun. It's interesting to not the .303 rifles we used were for sale after the war in the Army and Navy war surplus store for \$14.95 plus the live ammunition. We acquired one for old time's sake.

OUR VIEW Do we remember?

Each year, we make it our duty to attend Remembrance Day services at the Cenotaph, but how many of us actually remember what war is?

Fifty-three years have passed since World War 2 ended. Seventy years have passed since World War 1 ended and Remembrance Day became an annual event. Many years have passed since the Gulf War, and the Viet Nam veterans, once the young rebels, are now capped with grey hair.

We have lived in peace a long time. Two generations of Canadians have been blessed with peacetime conditions. Can they truly remember what life is like in a country gone to war?

Too often, war is written about, or spoken of, as strategies of generals, deployment of troops, or quantities of weapons. Once in awhile, an old movie shows an accurate picture of the battlefield. These days, people rarely speak of the day to day reality of war.

We ought to make a point of teaching our young people that war is like Bosnia, Afghanistan, Rwanda. War is a time and place where the unthinkable and unspeakable can happen at a moment's notice, where savagery and desperation are the hallmarks of daily life, and where death and destruction are everywhere.

Today's world war would not be fought like the old ones. A war today would be worse, and short. These days, we have 'smart' missiles with chemical, biological and nuclear warheads. Nobody would have to sign up and leave home to go to war today. We could just sit at home and let war come to us. Nobody would be defined as a 'soldier' because all of us would be as likely to have to fight and die, regardless of age or gender.

This is what we must remember, lest we forget and war comes again.

British Columbians should take great exception to Joy MacPhail's denial that red tape is one of this province's "rare growth industries." - assess clients, plan interventions, implement planned interventions, and evaluate outcomes related to individuals, families, groups and communities;
- assist, support and advise individuals, families, groups and communities with respect to health and healing and recovery of independence;
- coordinate health care services and resources or participate in multidisciplinary teams in partnership with others;
- teach individuals, families, groups and communities about caring, health, healing, healthy lifestyles and maintenance of a healthy environment;
- collaborate with other health care professionals/providers with regard to client needs;
- advocate for individuals, families, groups and communities

with respect to caring, health and healing;

- exercise discretionary judgment and use continuously evolving knowledge and skills within own level of competence;
- engage in administration, supervision, education, consultation, teaching or research related to any of the foregoing;
- function in accordance with the guidelines and standards for practice from the College of Licensed Practical Nurses.

Depending on the context of practice, and their level of knowledge and skills, LPNs could provide the majority of nursing care and could be prepared to perform all the activities required by the clients including medication administration, tracheostomy care, etc. within their own level of competence.

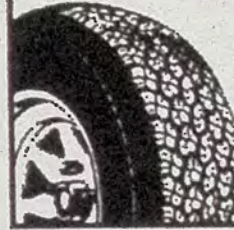

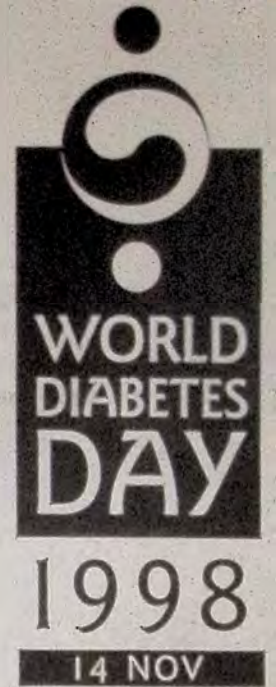

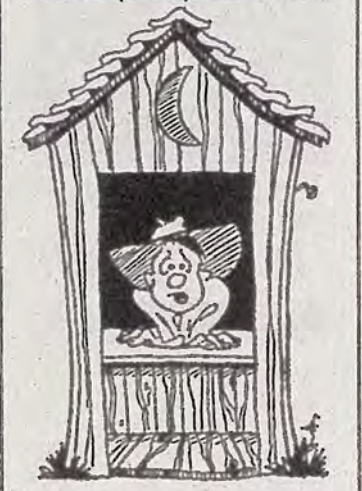

B.C. Mining Association calls for moratorium on land use planning

B.C.'s mining industry has called on the provincial government to place a two year moratorium on all current land use planning in the province and undertake an independent analysis of the economic and social impacts the policy has had on the province.

That was just one of 22 recommendations the mining industry made Sunday to delegates attending the BC Business Summit. The industry says that undertaking all of the recommendations will have a dramatic effect on investment and job creation in mining over the next ten years: 22,000 direct and indirect jobs and \$5.1 billion in direct mine development investment and millions in further government revenues.

Key to achieving these results will be re-invigorating mineral exploration expenditures, taking them from the current record low level of \$40 million a year, back up to \$200 million a year, where they were in the late 1980's.

One of the reasons investors are not spending money to find new mines in B.C. is because they do not trust the government. They worry, for good reason, that if they find a deposit, the government will not let the company turn it into a mine. The industry is afraid that government will either outright make the discovery a park, as they did the Tatshenshini, or they will let the bureaucracy kill it through red tape delays,

inaction, and unrealistic and unnecessary regulatory demands.

RECOMMENDATIONS --

LAND USE PLANNING

- a two year moratorium on all current land use planning processes
- an independent analysis of the economic and social impacts of land use planning
- recognition of resource roads as a provincial asset; stop deactivation
- strong government rejection of the Yellowstone to Yukon concept

NATIVE LAND CLAIMS

- substantive progress must be made on the settlement of native land claims but not at any cost and not before public scrutiny and certainty is achieved
- the cost implications for the province as a whole must be fully assessed. If the Nisga'a agreement is going to be a template, then we need to resolve uncertainties before implementation and/or agreement within an acceptable time frame, before other land claims are resolved.

TAXATION

- elimination of the corporate capital tax
- reduce the top marginal income tax rate equivalent to Alberta: 44%
- remove the PST on mining

machinery and equipment

- cap the municipal mill rate for mines
- eliminate fuel tax for mines

THE PERMITTING PROCESS

- mine approval process shortened to one year, to match other jurisdictions
- reverse onus on timelines - if no decision on a mine development application is made within prescribed timelines, then that particular stage of the application is deemed to have been approved

ELECTRICAL POWER

- electricity rates based on production costs only - no water rentals, no dividend to government, no taxes
- the laws that prevent the Utilities Commission from protecting BC Hydro's customers from excessive rates be repealed
- customers be allowed direct access to markets and to electrical producers
- establish a competitive electricity market

GOVERNMENT REGULATION

- change the mandate and attitude of the Ministry of Environment - it should be to allow development
- contaminated sites legislation should not apply to mines

There will be an information meeting at Princeton Public Health Unit on how to protect yourself from Hepatitis C, a liver disease that is generally fatal over the long term.

Everyone who deals with the public in a health care capacity or on a body contact basis should attend this meeting.

Leslie Gibbenhuck, former Vice-Chair of the Hep C Society, will be guest speaker and will show a video about Hep C. Gibbenhuck has travelled to Ottawa and Washington, D.C. to explain the dangers of Hepatitis C and the fate of those who received tainted blood and contracted the disease.

In addition to having been spread by blood transfusions, the disease is spread through intravenous drug users sharing needles. This group is currently the highest risk group.

According to a reliable source, there are approximately 100 people in the Princeton area who have Hepatitis C, and nearly 3,000 in the Okanagan Valley.

Do you have a short leg?

Ever notice that although your pants don't quite hang evenly and one leg appears shorter than the other; even though they are hemmed the same length? This may be due to you having one leg shorter than the other.

There are 2 causes of a short leg. One is an "anatomically" short leg, and the other cause is a "functionally" short leg.

When someone has an "anatomically" short leg, they actually have a physically measurable difference in length of one or more of the bones that make up the leg. This may be as a result of the bones simply growing at different rates or from an improperly healed fracture - especially if the break occurred during the adolescent years when the bones were still growing.

A "functionally" short leg occurs when the bones of the leg are the same length; however, there are other factors causing one leg to appear short. After an injury to the leg or low back, the musculature will often become very tight. This tightness and shortening of the muscles can pull on joints on one side more than another causing the pelvis to elevate or one hip to flex, resulting in a short leg.

Regardless of the source of the short leg, problems often arise in the back and neck resulting in pain and poor posture. Your chiropractor is trained to recognize these problems and to offer advice on the many treatment options.

Before you sell your rec vehicle, have it checked

All recreational vehicles must be safety inspected before being resold. Safety inspections are important in preventing loss of life, injury and property damage caused by propane gas leaks.

Only a recreational vehicle shop that is bonded and holds an annual permit issued by the Gas Safety Program can perform recreational vehicle inspections.

A proper inspection will include a gas leak test, an examination of

on-board appliances and a check to ensure the vehicle is properly ventilated. Any safety problems identified during the inspection must be rectified prior to resale.

Once the recreational vehicle passes an inspection, owners must obtain and display a valid safety decal. If a repair is made in response to an inspection, the repair shop must provide a record of repairs and the work must be signed off by a licensed fitter.

Otters at Bluey Lake

Bluey Lake lies about four kilometres to the south of Kentucky-Alleyne Provincial Park, near Aspen Grove. Since it seemed like a good prospect for a hike to be written up in the forthcoming Princeton Hiking Guide, six members of the Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists trekked down to it last Saturday. Bluey is at the end of a long string of lakes and ponds lying in a north-south direction, as if a glacier long ago gouged out a series of troughs which are now filled with beautiful turquoise water and, we are told, numerous fish. There is a very rough road running down from Kentucky Lake, suitable only for four-by-fours, but it was pleasant walking through the immature Douglas fir-lodgepole pine forest surrounding the lakes. The Highlight was a sight few in

the group had seen before in the wilderness: a family of Canadian river otters (*Lutra canadensis*) having a wonderful time in a pond close to the lake. There were four, large, sleek and sinuous. They were rolling, ducking, diving around each other in the water, climbing up on logs on the bank and diving back into the water, showing all of the joie de vivre we have come to associate with these marvellous animals.

We watched their fun and games for a quarter of an hour, until they tired of showing off to us, and left.

To cap the scene, a small muskrat (*Ondatra zibethica*), upset by the fuss, came swimming across to our side of the pond, with its rat tail vibrating behind it like a small outboard motor, and the hair raised on the back of its head

like a brush cut on a teenager. While muskrats are rodents, with chisel teeth for chewing water plants, otters are members of the weasel family. In fact, it is one of our biggest weasels, after the sea otter (*Enhydra lutris*) and finally, the notorious wolverine (*Gulo luscus*). Otters eat mainly fish, so there must have been fish in the pond.

This was an unscheduled hike carried out to add to the 35 or so we have already worked out for the hiking guide. The next scheduled hike is up Polecutter Road. This is an easy hike through good country for birds, both migrants and year round resident. Meet at the bus depot on Sunday, November 22, at 9:00 a.m. Call Don Burbidge at 295-6009 if you would like to come.

Trout Talk

From Lester River, near Lake Superior

When I think back on those days on Lester River, I am quite nostalgic. I grew up only eight blocks away from Lester, and so could hop on my trusty Hiawatha one-speed bicycle and get there in just a few minutes.

My creel, a rattan affair with my flies and leaders, and garden hackle (in case they weren't interested in flies) would be slung over the handle bars. My creel always had the fishy smell left over from previous trips. The rod, a beautiful Heddon bamboo fly rod my folks bought me one Christmas, was often tied on the cross bar in front of the seat.

Lester River is a tributary of Lake Superior. It winds its way through rocky terrain and is a beautiful stream. During the Dirty Thirties, Depression years, many beautiful bridges, parks and pathways were built along this and other streams. Chester Creek, for example, is another stream improved by the efforts of the men of the Thirties. (Perhaps we in B.C. could do similar things on our beautiful streams and creeks. There are sure enough unemployed for the work.)

Anyway, back to Lester. Because it is a tributary of such a large lake, any migratory type fish in Superior would come into Lester. As a kid, I was surprised a number of times when I caught 16 and 24 inch long summer steelhead trout in pools that usually only had 8 - 10 inch rainbows or brook trout.

These small rainbows were the offspring of the steelheads, they would stay in the stream until the urge for bigger food and more of it, compelled them to go downstream and back out to the Big Lake. They would hit a Royal

Coachman or Black Gnat fly like you wouldn't believe. They were so fast - you would see a flash of silver and feel a sharp tug. If you were a tiny bit off, they were gone, but if you got the rhythm and struck just right, they would be on and leaping. What fun that was, and for me the thrill still occurs with each trout I catch.

I practiced more catch and release in my late teens, but until then, I would proudly put the trout in my creel. They were cooked in the old cast iron frying pan, and I was proud to be adding some food to our supper table.

In the summer, I would, at every opportunity, be over at the Lester. The Railroad Pool was my favourite spot. It was deep and mysterious. In it were those big summer steelheads. You never knew when one might hit. There were Red Horse suckers, big ones which spawned in the gravelly bottom and stream bed just down from the pool. Those suckers, like the steelhead, lived in the Big Lake. They moved in during the high water months of April and May.

One spring, I practiced a little fish culture. I caught a number of Red Horse with ripe eggs and milt. In my Outdoor Life magazine, I had read how salmon and trout were artificially hatched. I milked the eggs and sperm into the Dixie cup with some river water. Then I took the eggs up to some bass-rearing ponds which the Minnesota Conservation Department had a couple of blocks away. Dumping them into the ponds near their dams, the water was deeper there, I wondered what success I might have. I'm pretty sure the conservation department people wondered what happened also!

The next time I returned to the

ponds, I had actually forgotten about my experiment. They were swarming with tiny suckers, thousands of them. They were everywhere. So the bass had a plentiful supply of minnows to eat. And the big crayfish above the shoreline probably enjoyed a snack or two also.

The Minnesota Conservation Department has done other experiments. Chinooks and Silvers (in B.C. we call them by their older names - Springs and Cohoes) have been planted in Lake Superior. Nowadays anglers fishing the Railroad Pool might hook a 20 pound Spring salmon or a six pound Coho salmon. What fun that would have been for me when I was a teenager.

My biggest catch ever, and it was from the Railroad Pool, was a 160 pound scuba diver. It was definitely a catch and release. A more angry catch I've never made, but that's a story for another column. It has sure been fun going back to the old days. I'll bet you other anglers have many such memories.

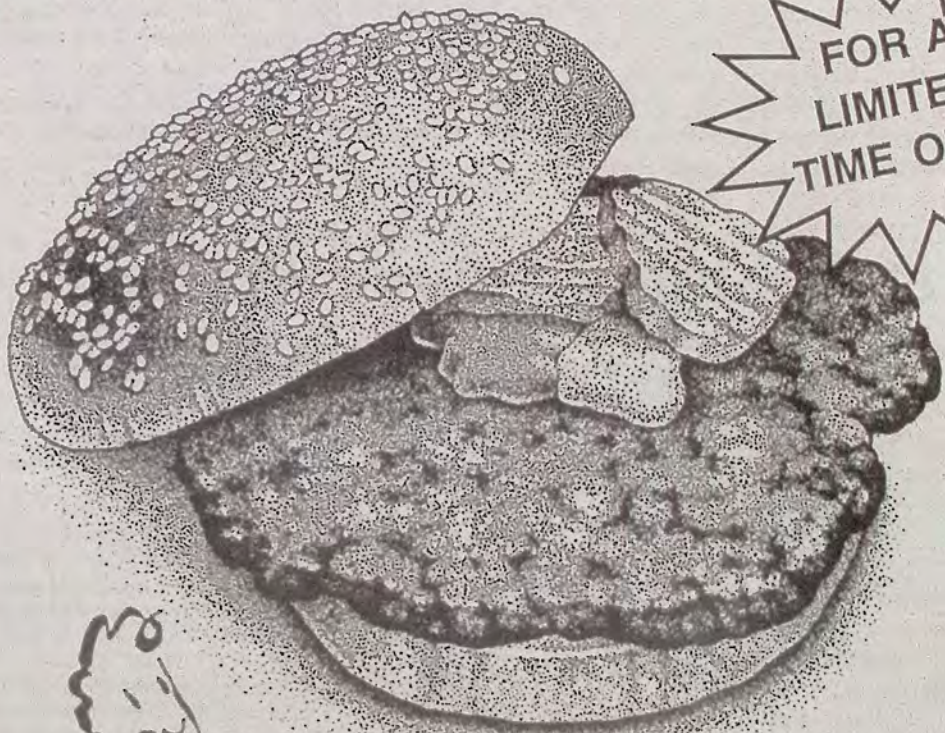

- other matters that will enable the proceeding to efficiently cover and review all aspects of the Application.

Illegal angler to pay fine

Kimbal Verigin did not show up to court in Princeton on November 5, but he went to trial despite his absence.

The *ex parte* trial was rapid, depending exclusively on the testimony of Conservation Officer Al Lay who had ticketed Verigin on August 31, 1998. Lay testified that he had been on patrol that evening and had seen a vehicle parked alongside Highway 3 and the Similkameen River. A man carrying fishing equipment was climbing up from the river to the vehicle. The angler had a rainbow trout in his possession.

Lay said he checked the angler's license, then checked the equipment. The angler had used a barbed hook to catch the trout. No barbed hooks are permitted in the Similkameen River. Verigin was charged with a violation of the Fisheries Act.

Judge Sinclair ordered a \$100 fine be paid by Verigin.

They don't pay, they won't drive

Victoria has announced that, as of November 1, 1998, parents who fail to pay child support in full and on time may find they are unable to renew their drivers' licences.

"This new enforcement tool puts kids first by helping them get the maintenance they are entitled to," said Attorney General Ujjal Dosanjh. "Child support is a debt that must be taken seriously and paid. With this new tool, the ministry's family maintenance enforcement program will be able to get overdue payments to children more quickly."

The family maintenance enforcement program instructs ICBC to refuse to issue or renew a driver's licence if a parent is more than \$3,000 behind in child support payments. ICBC does not have the authority to remove the hold. Parents who have had their drivers licences withheld should contact Family Maintenance Enforcement, not ICBC.

This latest enforcement tactic is part of a package of measures the attorney general announced in April, which include reporting defaulting parents to a credit bureau or having provincially regulated pension benefits garnished. Arrears can be enforced against companies owned or controlled by parents who are avoiding maintenance payments by assets or income in their corporation and are more than \$3,000 in arrears.
