PRINCETON - Sunshine, dry weather brought a good crowd of approximately 250 people to observe Remembrance Day at Cenotaph Park. Participation in the ceremonies was excellent, with more wreaths, sprays and crosses placed this year than most other years.

Scott Aspinall, Patrick LePoidevin and Glen Esdale piped for the march and ceremonies. RCMP, Legion members and Air Cadets formed an honour guard as numerous people came forward to lay a wreath.

Following the outdoor services of remembrance, guests of the Royal Canadian Legion enjoyed a light lunch in the Legion Hall. Padre Bill Kelly was Master of Ceremonies for November 11 activities, both outdoors and in the hall.

Princeton Ambassadors Alison Aspinall, Laine Westran, Amber Swanson and Tina Costa led the audience in a recitation of "In Flanders Field" following the luncheon.

Mayor Randy McLean thanked the Legion and Ladies Auxiliary members for their sponsorship of Remembrance Day ceremonies and fellowship. He praised their efforts to continue teaching the young people of Princeton the meaning of Remembrance Day.

"Young people have received the message as a result of the Legion explaining to young people the

importance of the peace we have today," Mayor McLean stated.

Claudette Hirschfield, representing the Department of Veterans Affairs in the Princeton area, spoke of how she had been inspired by local veterans.

Legion President Maria Walman noted that, of those who fought in World War I, few are left, and of those who fought in World War II "they are leaving us faster than we would like to see". She spoke of the need to continue the work of the Legion, reminding her audience that the veterans had continued to serve their country long after the war was over, and are still serving through the Legion.

"What of the future?" Walman asked, "Does the memory fade with the passing of time?"

She expressed the wish that the "spirit of the Canadian soldier will live on" through Legion projects and commitment to serving the community.

The Ladies Auxiliary to the Legion has established a tradition of handing over a cheque to the Branch each Remembrance Day. This year, Auxiliary President Sharon Beausoleil presented a \$3,000 cheque to the Branch "to help out".

Veterans of World War II, Korean War, Viet Nam, Gulf War and United Nations Peacekeeping Operations were asked to stand and be recognized. The veterans

stood, to applause, but everyone was conscious of the absence of World War I veterans.

bers and local businesses first thing in the spring. Anticipated date of completion is the first weekend in May, when the course officially opens.

In these days of shutdowns and cutbacks, it is hoped the Princeton Golf Course will be headed in the other direction. Currently, a feasibility study is being done which includes laying out the "back nine" (the new nine holes), the costs involved and everything that comes with it. Rob Tambolini of Fore Ward Consulting is doing the study and believes we are ready for a back nine. I believe the golf course has great potential as an eighteen hole course, which would bring many people to Princeton in the sum-

mer months, helping the community as a whole.

The club currently employs 10 to 12 people. The number should increase to 20 - 24 people when the back nine expansion is complete. The expansion would be constructed with the majority of help coming from the townspeople volunteering work and equipment. There is no way the project could be done without volunteer help, as the club does not have the "big dollars" available for such a project. The back nine project will be voted on by golf club members this spring. If approved, the project work will begin right after the meeting, ready for play by late summer, year 2000.

Kid fat leads to diabetes

OHIO - A study done by the U.S. Department of Agriculture indicates there is an alarming increase in Type II (adult onset) diabetes in the United States, and it is directly linked to childhood obesity.

A study of 1,000 Ohio children in Cincinnati showed 16 per cent had Type II diabetes, compared with a study done in 1982, which revealed only four per cent with Type II diabetes. Most children developed the diabetes between age 10 and 14 and researchers found the onset of the disease was directly linked to obesity.

According to the US Department of Agriculture, other studies in other cities have shown the same trend.

Surgeon General David Satcher stated, "Childhood obesity is at epidemic levels in the United States. We have been remiss in shedding light on this problem,

which leads to so many other health problems, particularly when we consider the threats this disease imposes on our children."

Remembrance Day ceremonies in Hedley brought out a good number of townspeople to pay their respects to the memory of men and women members of the armed forces who went from the Hedley area.

Hedley has not forgotten

HEDLEY - In Hedley, the largest crowd anyone could recall came into the street to pay their respects to our protectors on Remembrance Day at the Cenotaph approximately 70 children, women and men met the small parade that included one RCMP officers and lone veteran.

Eric Goodfellow, a lay preacher from Princeton, led everyone through song and prayer. The ceremony was simple and solemn.

When the anthem was sung, people were accompanied by a recording played in a nearby truck. In the cold, damp shadow of Stemwinder Mountain as two minutes of silence were observed for eleven Hedley men who died in World War I and four who died in World War II.

B.C. gains jobs in October

VICTORIA - According to Employment and Investment Minister Mike Farnworth, and Finance Minister Joy MacPhail, the B.C. economy created another 8,000 jobs in October, bringing the total number of new jobs in 1998 to 65,000.

In reflection of the trend, the unemployment rate fell and additional 3 per cent, bringing the rate down to 8 per cent, the lowest since July, 1990.

The Canadian economy as a whole created 57,000 new jobs in October, led by the provinces of Ontario (32,000 new jobs) and Quebec (12,000 new jobs). The province to record the largest drop in jobs was Alberta, at a 10,000 job loss, according to the Victoria news release.

The whole scene seemed to fit the occasion. The mourners' distress was minor compared to the remembered men and women who died far away from the comforts of home.

Andy Davidson is the sole veteran who attended. He was in the Navy and worked as a stoker on a ship in the North Atlantic from 1940 to 1945. Davidson would like the Navy to be remembered. He recently read newspaper sto-

ries that were "only about the Army and Air Force."

"Our war started in 1939. Theirs didn't start until 1943." As a consequence, Davidson noted, "There's not too many of us left."

Davidson said there are "six or seven" still living in Hedley who did attend last year's ceremony.

"Many of them aren't getting around too well," Davidson commented.

Waddell agrees with Feds

VICTORIA- Small Business Minister Ian Waddell noted the federal government caucus report on bank mergers supports the findings of the B.C. task force.

"A nationwide consensus is emerging that the proposed bank mergers should not proceed, and this is very encouraging," Waddell said.

The federal report concluded that mergers are neither necessary nor beneficial and would result in job losses and branch closures.

"We must make sure such dramatic changes in financial services are in the best interest of British Columbians, their small businesses and their communities," Waddell stated.

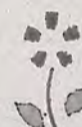

We have received a number of comments from our readers about confusion as to the origin of stories. We apologize for any inconvenience this lack of location label may have caused our readers. We did not realize we needed to move to the format of larger newspapers. However, when the News Leader started, we began with stories from all over the valley, and nobody mentioned any problem with that until after we took over the Keremeos Gazette. Obviously, being a valley paper now requires a change in how we handle the news.

A peculiar rumour in circulation is that our office has moved to Keremeos! Indeed, it has not. We have a reporter in Keremeos area who covers everything from the border to north of Hedley, and we have agents in other communities who sell our newspapers and pick up want ads.

There is nothing new in this. We have always had sales in other communities in the Similkameen Valley, right from the start. We have our paper in one of the malls in Penticton, as well, and we often receive ads from the Okanagan.

This deals with the complaints and questions. On the other side of the ledger, we want to say how good we feel when people from Princeton come in, or Keremeos people phone to tell us how much they enjoy having news from everywhere in the valley. Some of our readers have said how happy they are to have a valley newspaper again, as we did many years ago. They believe "that's the way it should be."

This is a very interesting place to live, this Similkameen Valley. Something interesting is always happening in one community or another.

The News Leader covers all of them.

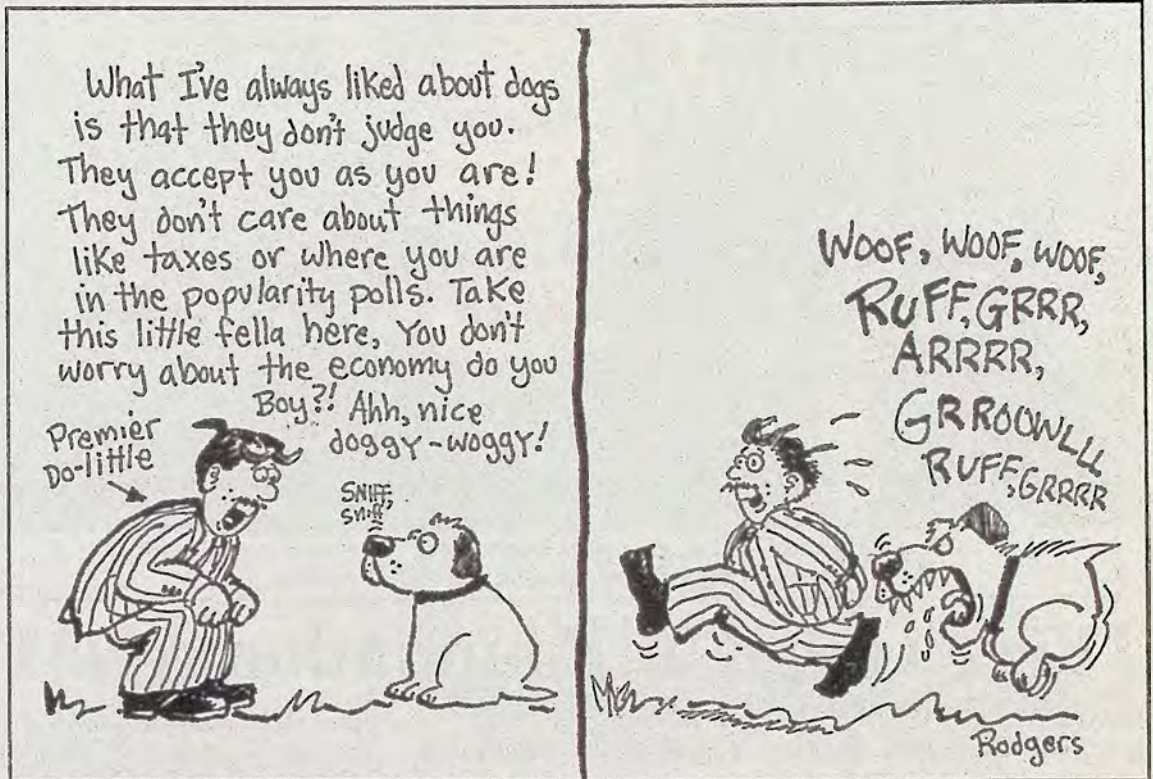

YOUR VIEW Constitution is threatened, says oldtimer

Dear Editor:

Our Constitution is a group of laws governing every Canadian citizen as well as our parliamentary and legislative representatives. It includes the British North America Act and has served us successfully for 131 years. It was designed to govern our law-making processes. To disobey these processes is to disobey our laws. Here is what the Liberal and Conservative governments have done to our laws since 1867.

The Constitution gave the federal government certain jurisdictions and the provincial governments other jurisdictions. These powers cannot be sold or delegated away by either of the two levels of government.

In 1917, Ottawa passed the War Tax Act, by which the central government borrowed the provinces' exclusive constitutional right to levy direct taxation. This invasion of provincial jurisdiction was to meet the financial cost of war and was to end in 24 to 36 months.

This invasion of provincial jurisdiction was actually unconstitutional. But to this day, Ottawa has not surrendered the income tax jurisdiction borrowed 81 years ago!

During the second world war, this invasion of provincial powers escalated, again to meet the cost of war. In 1942, to strengthen the war effort, all provinces agreed to cede their authority over personal and corporate tax-

ation to the federal government (Dominion-Provincial Taxation Agreement Act 1942). The agreement was to last for the duration of the war plus 12 months.

As a result of the agreement, Canadian economic and fiscal policies were fully centralized. In 1943, the Dominion government collected 76 per cent of all government revenues. A simple question soon surfaced to torment the federal members of parliament. How do we extend this power and authority into the peacetime years ahead?

Canada had become a centralized dictatorship state. It could remain so only by a successful amendment to the BNA Act or by repudiating the Taxation Agreement of 1942 and refusing to give up control of income taxes. The full eight of the Department of Finance and the Bank of Canada persuaded the Minister of Finance, J.I. Ilesley, to renege on the agreement.

In the Dominion-Provincial Conference of 1945-46, Mr. Ilesley stated that it was not the intention of the Dominion Government to consider a return to pre-war arrangements and it is not proposed to seek a constitutional amendment. The Dominion government would provide enhanced subsidies in exchange for withdrawal of the provinces from the income tax fields.

The provinces did not agree. The conference failed, but the

Dominion Government pushed through its proposals by budgetary resolutions.

In an emotional address to the conference, Angus Macdonald, Premier of Nova Scotia said, "Provincial autonomy will be gone. Provincial independence will vanish. Provincial dignity will disappear. Provincial governments will become mere annuitants of Ottawa."

Quebec Premier, Maurice Duplessis, said soberly, "In my opinion, if we accepted the proposals of the federal government, confederation cannot endure."

Pursuant to a recent letter regarding the sign bylaw changes in Keremeos, I have discovered the following:

- The sign bylaw amendments on sandwich board signs is NOT a development by the Village.
- The same bylaw in Langley, for instance, is one paragraph, mostly to do with insurance.
- The Keremeos sign bylaw is completely under the control of the local building inspector, period.

The real authors of the sandwich board sign amendments is the B.C. Municipal Insurance Assn., no one else. The Association dictates the

parameters of the bylaw, and it is the duty of the Village to write the bylaw in such a manner as to cover the intent of the Association's recommendations. The Village goes through the motions, complete with justification, regardless of the protestations of local Chamber of Commerce, independent business people, or citizens. To defy the Association is to defy the rate structures covering Municipal Insurance.

The Langley bylaw is just fine, it covers all the requirements including the \$2 MILLION required by the Association. The difference is that it is, as I said, in one paragraph. It is our own Village bureaucracy and politicians who expanded this simple but ridiculous requirement into the annoyance that is upsetting most of the Main Street businesses who like sandwich boards as a form of advertising.

Leaky Condos

Dear Ms. Johnson;

I am writing this letter in response to your article titled "Keremeos Says all Pay for Leaky Condos" which appeared in the Similkameen News Leader on October 27, 1998.

I wanted to clarify a couple of points that were raised in the article.

The builder levies to fund the no-interest loan program will be charged only in the geographic areas where the program is needed. This geographic area is referred to as the coastal climatic zone and includes the Lower Mainland, Vancouver Island, the Gulf and Queen Charlotte Islands and the coast. The Princeton/Keremeos area is outside the coastal climatic zone and will not be subject to the builder levy.

In those areas where the builder levy will apply, it will be charged to the builders, not the municipalities, at the time of building permit application.

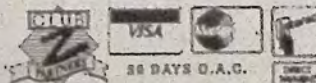

Victorian "schoolmarm" enchants twentieth century children

PRINCETON - Christine Pilgrim is a professional Victorian schoolmarm. She has been the featured teacher at the Grist Mill school house in Keremeos, and she was the official "schoolmarm" at Barkerville for four years. On November 9, she was the star attraction in classrooms at John Allison Elementary School in Princeton.

Pilgrim, as Mrs. MacPherson, rivets the children's attention. True to Victorian principles, she runs an orderly, well-mannered classroom and the children love it! They must sit up straight, put their feet flat on the floor, raise their hands before speaking, and do everything in unison.

The class session begins with renaming the children with names from the Similkameen Valley in 1894. This "new" name seems to delight the children. They enter the "let's pretend it is 1894" with enthusiasm.

Mrs. MacPherson hands out slates and shows the students how to write on them. Later, she hands out straight pens and paper, and bottles of ink are made available. She teaches them penmanship in copper plate script. The children are taught to form an egg shape with thumb and forefinger, into which the pen is fitted.

Good behaviour is rewarded with a turn on wooden stilts, or on tin can stilts, or children are allowed to do a chore for Mrs.

MacPherson, such as picking up the blotters and putting them back. She showed them how to make simple toys, balls from fabric scraps filled with rice, and

button twirlers. When it was time to return to the twentieth century, the class ended with exercises and a prayer for a safe journey home.

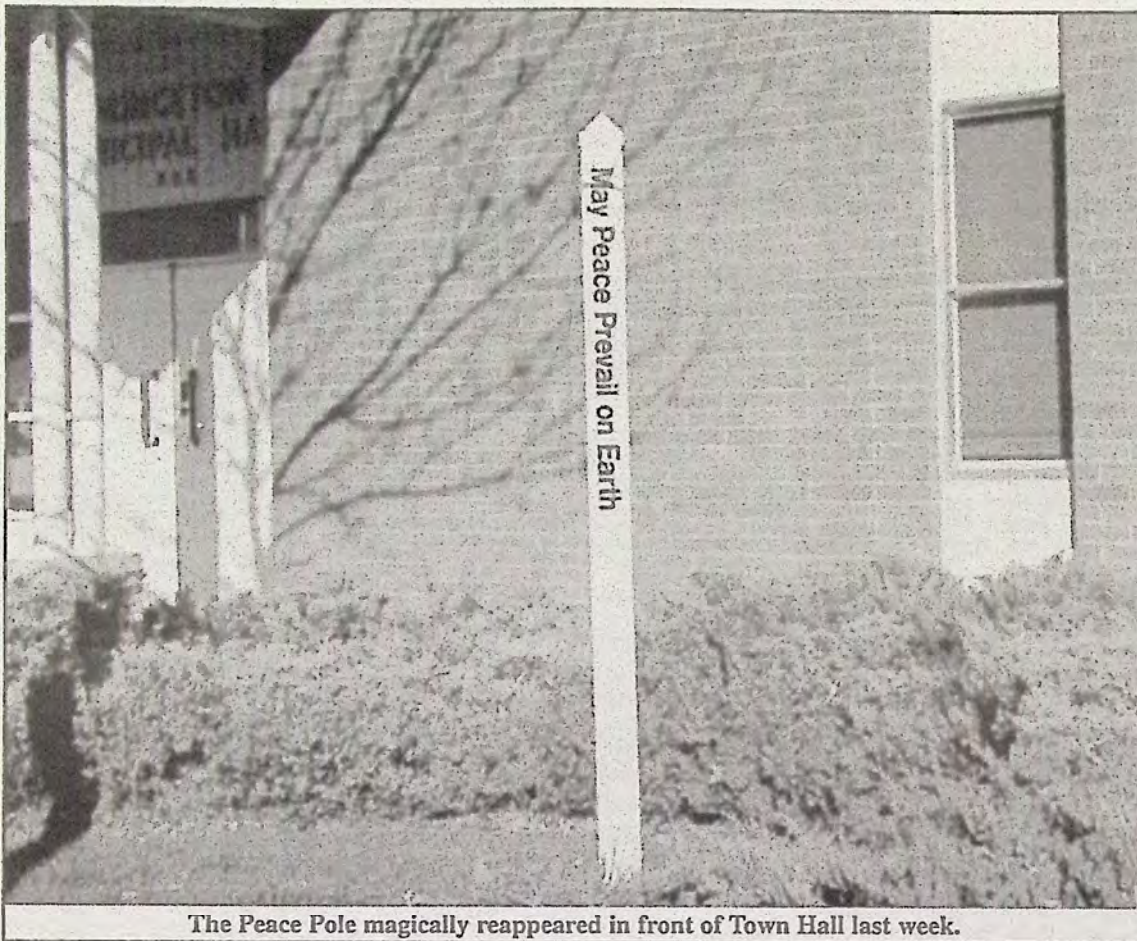

Improving the odds for kids

OKANAGAN SIMILKAMEEN HEALTH REGION - If your child is a teenager, there is a good chance they have already tried a drug that is as addictive as heroin. The drug is nicotine, and it your child is one of the estimated two thirds of teens who have tried smoking, they have experienced its effects. One half of this group will go on to become regular daily smokers who will likely not understand how addictive nicotine is until they try to quit smoking.

A recent B.C. survey on teen smoking found that the most common time for children to try smoking is Grade 7. The first experience usually takes place with a friend. The fear of losing a friend, wanting popular people to like them, feeling more grown up and the feeling that everyone is doing it, were all identified in the survey as reasons teens had started smoking.

November 15-21 is Drug Awareness Week. As a parent, this would be a good time to start improving the odds that your child will be a non-smoker. Here are some ideas on how to do this

from BC Tobacco Facts:

1. Let your child know how you feel about smoking - recent studies show that you will increase the likelihood of your child not smoking by telling them clearly that you don't approve of smoking - even if you are a smoker yourself.
2. Encourage your child to have smoke-free friends - If a child's friends do not smoke, studies show that the odds of that child smoking are greatly reduced.
3. Be a good role model - If you are a non-smoker, explain to your child why you do not smoke. If you are a smoker, talk to your child about the addictive power of cigarettes and how difficult it is to quit, or better yet, do quit! Do not allow smoking in your house.
4. Don't fall into the trap of believing that smoking is safer than other risky behaviours - your child is at real risk of serious short and long term health effects if they smoke. Overall, smoking related illness will kill many times more people than murder, car accidents, suicide and AIDS combined.
5. Don't give up - even if your child has begun experimenting with smoking or is a regular

smoker, it's not too late to intervene. Most people who do smoke want to quit and with ongoing encouragement and support can be successful.

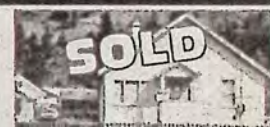

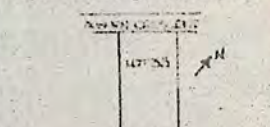

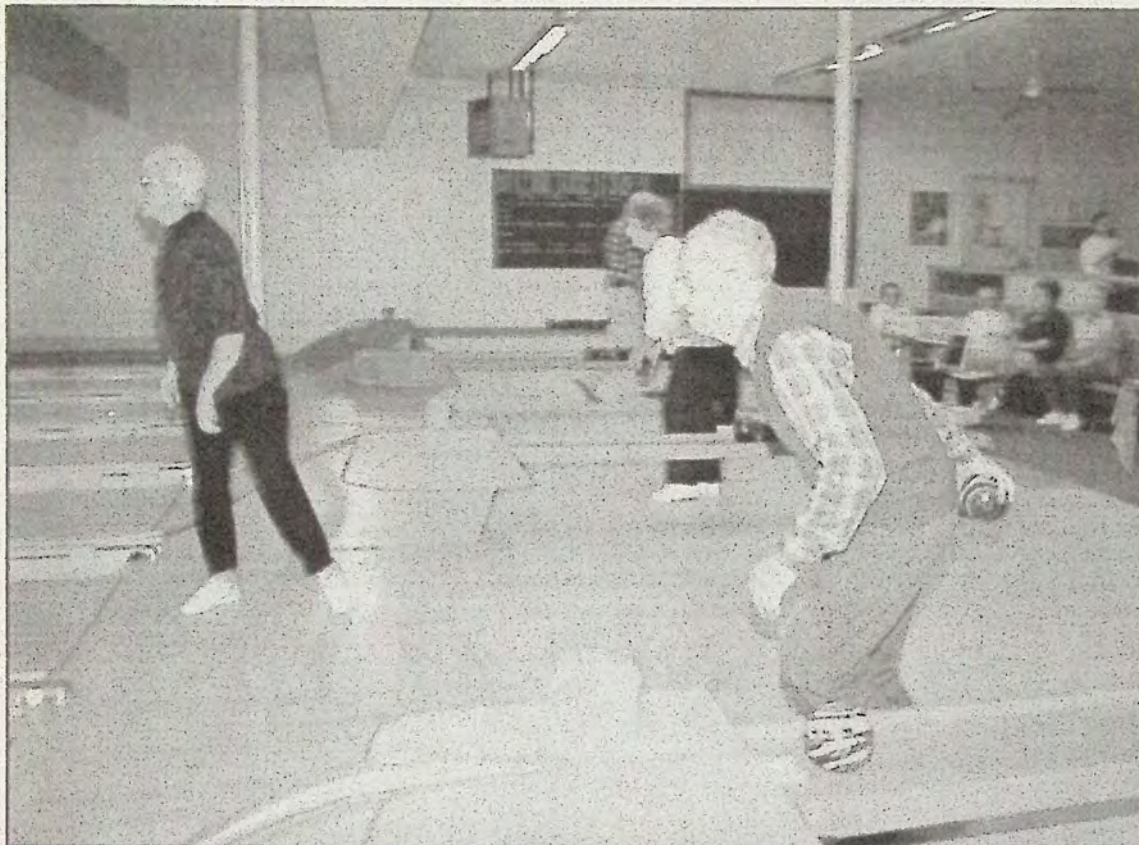

TIME OF USE HOURS

SYSTEM LOADING

The 'TOU' rates are determined both by the Hour of the Day, and the Month of the Year, in which the electric power ("power") is consumed. The parameters are determined by the overall loading on the Transmission lines which are needed to get the power to the Princeton Substation and the Generation available to supply to the System.

ON PEAK HOURS

On peak hours are those when the system is highly loaded. This loading causes high losses in the Transmission System and the effects of the free, deregulated, power market come into play. Customers requiring power during these periods bid up the prices to assure a firm supply of power throughout the on peak hours.

OFF PEAK HOURS

Off peak hours, then, are those when the system has lots of surplus capacity. The losses are low and the market pressures are gone, allowing our power suppliers to bargain for very low prices.

SEASONAL RATES

The System loading also varies with the Seasons of the Year. Therefore, for the same reasons as with the Hour to Hour rates, the Month to Month rates vary as well. The Year is broken into three distinct Seasons = WINTER - SUMMER - SHOULDER - and the hours and days for - On Peak and Off Peak - vary for each Season. The following is the TOU Schedule.
