Village Council disagrees on police check order in business bylaw

KEREMEOS - Council members and Mayor J.C. Stranart are reluctant to speak publicly on criminal record checks for new businesses.

The idea is not new, and was actually adopted by Council in 1995. Now, two Council members and the mayor want it removed from the business licence bylaw. Despite indicating they "have a problem" with the rule, Councillors Evans, Hecoeks and Mayor Stranart provided no explanation at the regular meeting held December 7.

For years, Councillor Mark Gurevitch has resisted the business licence fee. He claims business owners "get nothing for their

Public to review bylaw on ranch

PRINCETON - An amendment to Electoral Area H Rural Land Use Bylaw #1725 is the subject for public review on December 21. The proposed future development plan for Princeton Stock Ranch, now owned by the Willis family of Princeton, and under consideration for purchase by a consor-

tium, depends on adding a new definition of Health and Recreation Ranch to the existing bylaw.

The amendment would include the definition "a recreation retreat facility operated year-round and which contains accommodation at a density not greater than 3.7

bedrooms per hectare (1.5 per acre) and which may contain assembly, retail, entertainment and indoor recreation facilities and is part of a working ranch where guests experience and participate in the daily operation of the ranch, based on seasonal availability."

The amendment created a new designation category to be called ATA (Agri-Tourist Area) to be added to existing designations Resource Area (RA) and Large Holdings (LH).

Permitted uses under the ATA designations would be: agriculture, intensive agriculture, guest ranches, stables, guide camps and animal hospitals, auxiliary dwellings or mobile homes to accommodate farm help, health and recreation ranch associated with an agricultural use, lodges, health spas, resorts, eating and drinking establishments, convenience stores, antique, curio and souvenir shops associated with a health and recreation ranch, community recreation services and open land recreation.

The developers will hold an open house at the arena mezzanine at 5:00 p.m. on December 21, and the public review will commence at 7:00 p.m.

Administrative Officer Eileen Oliver-Bauer endorsed the policy. She defended it, saying the only person to see any documentation would be her.

"It's under lock and key for a year, and then it's destroyed," she said.

When pressed by Gurevitch for an answer, Hecoeks, Evans and Mayor Stranart stalled. They would not say why they disapproved. Councillor Holley made no comment.

Several residents attended the meeting and had to wait patiently for the conversation to resume. Finally, Evans said criminal record checks are an "infringement".

money" and believes it should be re-named a "business tax." Weeks ago, Council gave him the go ahead to look into re-vamping the bylaw. Gurevitch recently completed a list of new recommendations and he wants consent to criminal records checks kept in the bylaw.

According to Gurevitch, he is acting on behalf of constituents. The Councillor spent weeks gathering information from residents and business owners.

Although he personally favours criminal checks, Gurevitch said, "What really matters is what the public wants."

In Council chambers, Gurevitch argued the point, saying it offers protection against fraud. Chief

Murder suspect still free

PRINCETON - Six additional officers from Major Crime Units in Vancouver and Kelowna have joined Sgt. Tom Payne of the Princeton RCMP detachment in the investigation into the murder of Joseph 'Phen' Drushka, the 32 year old man found dead in his home on December 5.

Sgt. Payne says approximately 200 files have been generated since the start of the investigation, and each file must have a follow-up investigation done.

The investigators are trying to learn as much as possible about the activities and whereabouts of Drushka from December 2 to December 5. Anyone who may have seen him or spoken to him during that period of time should contact Princeton RCMP.

Sgt. Payne says people may think that they have insignificant information about the deceased, but it could be very important to police.

An autopsy was performed on December 10, but due to the nature of the investigation, police are not releasing any information regarding the autopsy or cause of death at this time.

Public reaction was one of discomfort and dismay. People who were acquainted with Drushka recall him as a friendly, harmless person who did not ask for trouble from anyone. A few people remarked angrily that 'Phen' was too good a person to have suffered such a crime.

Artist donates prints for food

PRINCETON - Susanne Mills is a local artist who is sponsoring a reward draw to people who drop off food at The Maze on Vermilion Avenue for the Christmas Hamper campaign. "B.C. in recession" says Chamber head

PRINCETON - "The B.C. economy is now officially in recession," said Al McNair, B.C. Chamber of Commerce Chair, speaking to Princeton Chamber members.

"B.C. needs a big bang approach to get our economy moving," McNair said. "Government tinkering -- a tax cut here, a few regulations snipped there, won't get it done."

McNair had information from the B.C. Business Summit, released December 9, the same day as his speaking engagement in Princeton. McNair said experts believe it is the business sector which will create 90 per cent of the new jobs in B.C.

"We're going to be responsible for sustaining the standard of living for the next generation of British Columbians," McNair stated.

He outlined the Chamber agenda -- "to convince the public and our government that the economy is in deep trouble -- and press hard for changes."

Town may increase water rates

PRINCETON - At the December 7 Town Council meeting, Councillor Dan Sulentic announced a possible increase to water rates in 1999.

He reminded other Council members they had been given a survey of water rates in other communities and warned he would be making a recommendation regarding water rates when Council meets on December 21.

The changes include elimination of the corporate capital tax, exemption of the social services tax on machinery and equipment purchases, lowering provincial corporate and personal income tax, and reduction of regulations and red tape.

McNair, who works for Weyerhaeuser, had a great deal to say about the poor condition of the forest industry in B.C. He blamed stumpage rates and regulations for higher costs to the industry. He claimed the B.C. forest industry is being "governed" out of existence.

McNair told local Chamber members, "The forest industry in other provinces has remained profitable. We're the only forest region in North America which is hemorrhaging red ink."

Ultimately, McNair blames government for "over-regulation, taxes, red tape and the soaring costs of doing business."

He summarized the results of the B.C. Business Summit with a quote from one of the summit participants, "This province needs a long-term economic vision."

He told the gathering that B.C. has the "highest marginal income tax rates on the North American continent. We're rapidly headed toward mediocrity. We can't attract the best and brightest, and we can't hold on to the ones we've got."

He stated the provincial debt is up 80 per cent since 1991, and claimed the bond rating agencies peg the provincial deficit as closer to \$1 billion.

He commented that labour cannot remain strong if the businesses that support the unions are "swept out to sea in a tide of red ink."

"It's time government, business and labour worked together to turn our slumping economy around," McNair concluded.

Snow falling on Douglas fir

PRINCETON - Snow seems to be late in coming this year along the Similkameen (shall we blame El Niño or La Niña?) but there is now enough of it to clothe the mountains around Wolfe Lake in the splendour of winter. Twelve naturalists set out on Sunday morning to hike from the Crowsnest highway to Izzutz Lake. There had been a light fall of snow overnight, and it was still falling as we got moving, so few tracks were noted at first. Later, the prints of squirrels, a hungry coyote and their natural prey, the snowshoe hare, all began to appear.

Plenty of winter birds were seen. Golden-crowned kinglets, red-breasted nuthatches and brown creepers chirped from the coniferous trees, and then fell silent when a northern pygmy owl flew to a tree-top overlooking the road, in response to Jerry Herzig's soft hoots. Jerry and the owl conversed for a while in terms unintelligible to the rest of us, until the little birds gathered their courage and prepared to mob it. These tiny owls are distinguished by two black patches on the back of their heads, which resemble eyes - and they are formidable predators, hunting by day. They snipe chickadees and nuthatches from around my feeder, and Jerry has seen them take prey larger than they are, including mourning doves. When the little birds decide to unite and harass their persecutors, the best the owls can do is retreat

into a dense copse and nurse their wrath until they can get their revenge.

Wolfe Lake was almost completely frozen over, but there was enough open water for a small group of common mergansers (fish ducks) who were probably dining on squawfish. There were winter wrens calling in the thickets by the creek and a couple of common snipe darted up, in their zigzag fashion, from the muddy banks. Mallards find this creek a good winter refuge, but a magnificent bald eagle flew over us and increased their tension. Clarke's nutcrackers and Steller's Jays screeched at us as they foraged. After a short hike from Wolfe Lake, we came to Izzutz Lake, a small jewel with a precipitous shoreline and talus slides running down right into the water from the jagged cliffs above. Unlike Wolfe Lake, Izzutz was practically free of ice, and a few mergansers cruised in the distance. An osprey nest on a tall dead cottonwood, stands empty, although last spring it was full of nestlings.

Here we stopped, built a small fire, toasted sandwiches and brewed tea in a billy can, producing that magical flavour of mixed tea and wood smoke, which anyone who camps by an open fire can never forget. The return hike was enlivened by the rattling calls and blue flashes of a belted kingfisher. Near the highway, we noted a song sparrow and two rusty blackbirds who are well out of their normal range. To cap it all, a muskrat swam stolidly past

us, leaving its V-shaped wake to disturb the blackbirds rooting in the mud by the shore.

We wish to express our thanks to the Upper Similkameen Indian Band and the Parson family for kindly giving us permission to pass through their land, and to Trish Reid, who led, with gentle panache, a rather disorganized bunch of hikers. The next hike, along the Kettle Valley rail bed beyond Tulameen, is scheduled for Saturday, January 9, 1999. You can come on foot or on skis, and if you manage to cover the first three kilometres along the way, you can enjoy Irene Logan's famous Outdoor Cookout - hamburgers and wieners for all. If you wish to come, phone Irene at 295-3575 no later than January 7 and meet at the Tulameen Trading Post at 10:30 a.m.

Count birds

PRINCETON - The annual Christmas bird count will be Dec. 20. It was started in 1993. Since then, each year a group of birders braves the weather and cold, counting any wild birds they can spot. They join other volunteers from 50 U.S. states, every Canadian province, and many other countries. The data collected are used to study winter migration and the effects of increasing urbanization.

Firearms Registration

Another tax grab?

Many Canadians are afraid of guns and support firearms registration. But few Canadians are willing to pay the \$1.5 billion that universal firearm regulation will cost taxpayers.

Although Ottawa isn't ready to start yet, the registration program is already at least \$35 million over budget. The Canadian Firearms Center [CFC] have admitted that they've spent \$120 million just getting ready. This is \$35 million more than the \$85 million that registration was originally claimed to cost in 1995. The CFC has also said that it plans to spend \$133.9 million in 1998/99. Moreover, these cost estimates do not include the expenditures of the RCMP, the Solicitor General, nor Customs and Immigration, all of which must accommodate firearm registration by 2003. Nor does the \$120 million figure cover expenses once the registry is up and running. The government recently admitted that registration will cost

around \$50 million annually to operate.

Handguns have been registered in Canada since 1934, and handguns remain the "weapon of choice" for criminals. If Ottawa really wanted to protect us, they would keep violent criminals in jail longer.

The RCMP estimates that under the current system it costs more than \$82 to register each handgun. Using this as a guide, indicates the new registration system may cost Canadian taxpayers around \$1.5 billion. This is over and above what gun owners will pay. Where will the government get the money for this exercise? Additional taxes? From another program -- health care, for example? The RCMP budget?

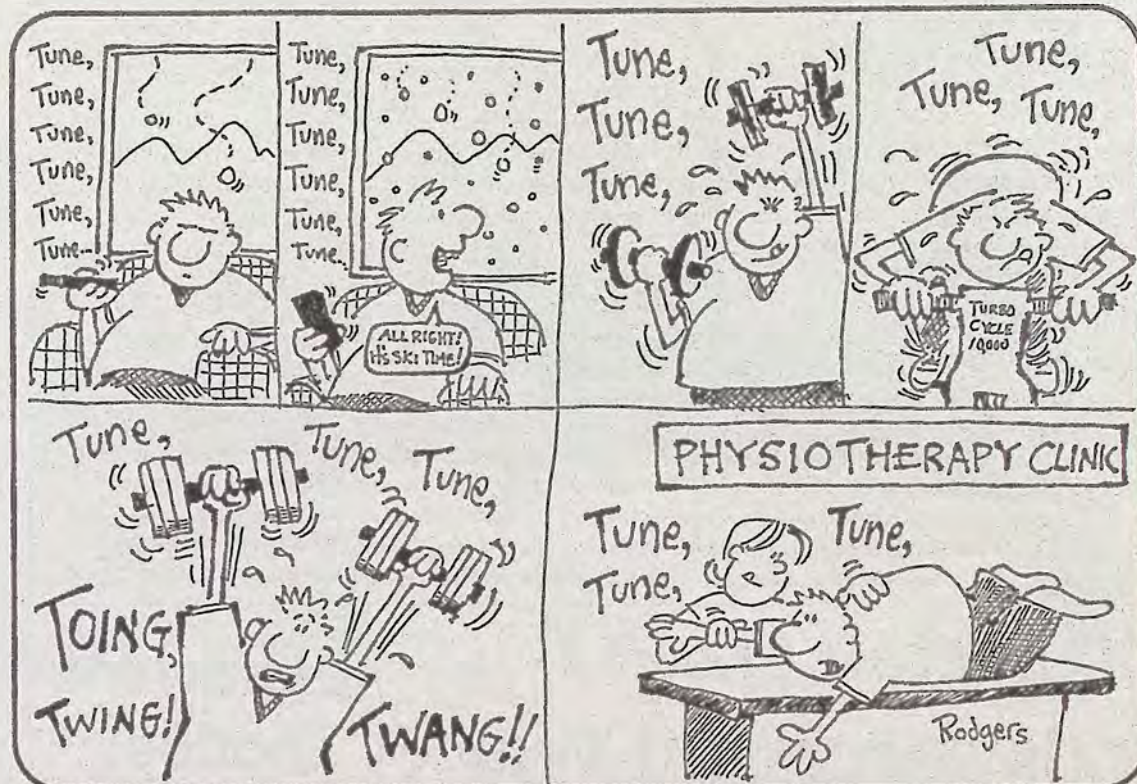
We need broader minds

We were warned years ago about what was going to happen in our world markets and in our own nation. We need to think globally, not locally. We need to expand the boundaries of our minds or see our economy, our politics, and our lifestyles continue to deteriorate. We live in a new world. We are entering the final year of an old century. We must think like people who are leaving the twentieth century behind us. The rules for survival demand new minds.

It is easy to blame the government for the economic situation in which we find ourselves, and there is some justification for complaining about some of our taxes. At the same time, it is not the government's fault that the price of copper and lumber dropped and mines and mills shut down. Is this the smartest use of our talents and resources?

What we have to do is become more conscious of the world, more interested in what the other guy is doing, whether it is down the street, across the border or across the ocean. We need to make time to explore the information available to us from every source, from the electronic highway to television to magazines and newspapers. What we don't know will hurt us.

The country is going to hell, says citizen

Economic difficulties across the province seem to be affecting the 73rd annual Christmas Seal Campaign, and organizers are asking Princeton-area residents to "dig just a little bit deeper" to help the British Columbia Lung Association's largest fundraiser reach its goal.

Weeks before the holiday season peaks, the provincial campaign has made 61.7 per cent of its goal of \$1,515,000, and the Princeton area has raised 72.8 per cent of its \$2,700 goal.

"We're trying for only one per cent more than we raised here last year," said Marilyn Lawrence, local Christmas Seal chairperson.

"Those end-of-November results are worrying," said Lawrence. "The campaign runs through January; but in a typical year, most donations arrive by mid-December."

The B.C. Lung Association receives no direct government funding, and relies on individual donors to fund medical research in B.C., health education stressing prevention and patient independence and air quality initiatives. The colourful Christmas Seals were sent out to residents in their mail early last month.

This money should go to reinstating, to the full, our home care. I believe this is far cheaper than hospital care and also a far more satisfactory way for patients or clients. I don't think they want to stay in a hospital if home care is available.

Our bursary recipient this year was Peter Adams. Next year we will present two bursaries of \$500 each.

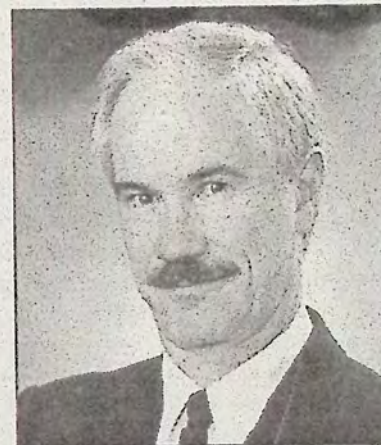
We had four new members join us this year.

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Headaches linked to poor posture

Do you know that next to low back pain, headaches are the second most common reason people visit Chiropractic offices? Also, there are a number different types of headaches, each with their own signs and symptoms.

The type of headache I am interested in for today's article is less known, yet quite commonly experienced by patients. They are called cervicogenic headaches and are named this as they originate from problems in the upper neck such as muscle tension and joint tightness. 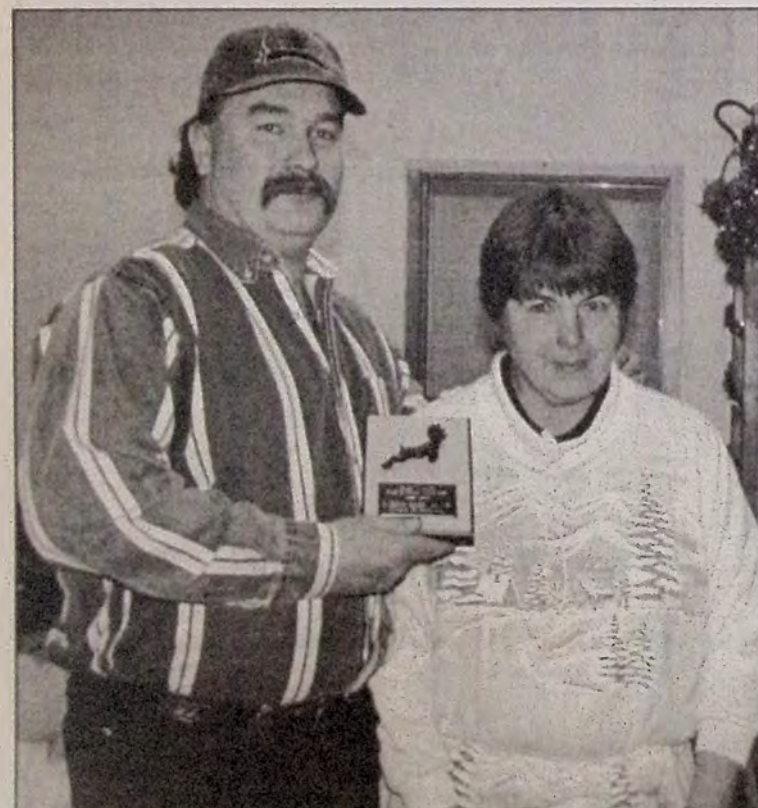
Premiers tell Feds "Restore health funds"

VANCOUVER - The decline in confidence in Canada's health care system can only be reversed by the federal government guaranteeing full restoration of health care dollars in next year's budget, B.C. Premier Clark and Premier Brian Tobin of Newfoundland stated on December 11.

"Canadians are suffering because of the cuts the federal government has made to health care transfer payments, which have been putting pressure on all provinces since the early 1990's," said Clark. "The federal government must take responsibility."

"Premiers across the country are united on this issue," Tobin said. "We collectively demand - Canadians demand - that the federal government put funding back in health care. The situation is critical, and we need a guarantee from the federal government that health care funding will be completely restored in next year's budget."

Clark and Tobin joined their provincial counterparts last Tuesday in calling on the prime minister to protect core health care programs by restoring transfer payments.

Village may prosecute business owners

A decision to legally prosecute 16 business owners in Keremeos has been put off until after the new year. The mayor and Council tabled the issue at the December 7 meeting.

The businesses are currently operating without licences and Chief Administrative Officer Eileen Oliver-Bauer recommends legal action. Each owner has failed to pay an \$80.00 fee which was due November 1.

Many businesses claim to be following the example of Councillor Gurevitch. He was late paying his own licence fee and other owners wonder why they should be pushed into compliance.

Deb Gilmore, owner of the Hair Emporium, said several Chamber

of Commerce members decided not to pay until Gurevitch did. She knows that the Councillor has now paid but said she has not had time to give the Village her cheque. The hairdresser laughed at the idea of a mass legal prosecution.

"They can't. It's B.S.," she said. Gilmore claimed Oliver-Bauer had hand delivered notices to all businesses at the end of October. "Thirty days hadn't passed yet."

Gilmore also questioned why the Village spent money on a union employee when notices could have been mailed more cheaply.

Zacks Town trader is on the list. Owner Irwin said he has not paid because he just does not have the money.

"It's hard to make a living," he said, "after water and land taxes

and garbage removal, there isn't much left."

He said, "The Village will have to wait in line."

Brenda Terra operates Naturally Yours Health Food and is nearly ready to close down. Terra said she does not understand why her name is on the list.

"I paid in February and shouldn't owe again until next year."

She, like Gilmore, found the idea of prosecution amusing. Terra stated she does not know what the town is doing.

"They are supposed to help us. A lot of businesses feel like closing up."

Terra is upset because she was forced to remove her sidewalk sandwich board and claims to have less business now.

"I don't know why they picked on me. Other businesses still keep things on the sidewalk," she said.

Terra's store was broken into on October 31. She feels the Village should provide more security.

Below is your CHRISTMAS TREE FREE USE PERMIT which allows you to cut a tree in the Merritt Forest District.

Cutting Christmas trees free of charge is strictly for PERSONAL USE ONLY and you are not allowed to sell them. You are allowed to cut one tree per family. It is the permit holder's responsibility to ensure that he/she is cutting on Vacant Crown Land. Do not transport your tree to outside the province.

This authorization is only from the MERRITT FOREST DISTRICT OFFICE within the Kamloops Forest Region.

Please fill in the blanks, sign the Permit and carry it with you in case you may have to show it when you're asked to do so.

CHRISTMAS TREE FREE USE PERMIT

This permit is valid until December 25th, 1998 with the following conditions.

1. A tree may be cut from area(s) of Crown land such as along right-of-ways (except highway right-of-ways) or powerline right-of-ways where the trees will not be allowed to reach maturity, or in areas where stocking levels are excess.
2. A tree cut from plantations will be considered as trespass and will be dealt with accordingly.
3. A tree cut under this permit must not be offered for sale.
4. No waste portion of the tree will be left on the area.
5. The permittee agrees to indemnify and save harmless the Ministry of Forests and any other Crown agency which may be involved as land holders in the event of personal injury or damage to improvements.
6. The permittee will comply with the Forest Act and regulations and the Forest Practices Code of British Columbia Act and regulations.

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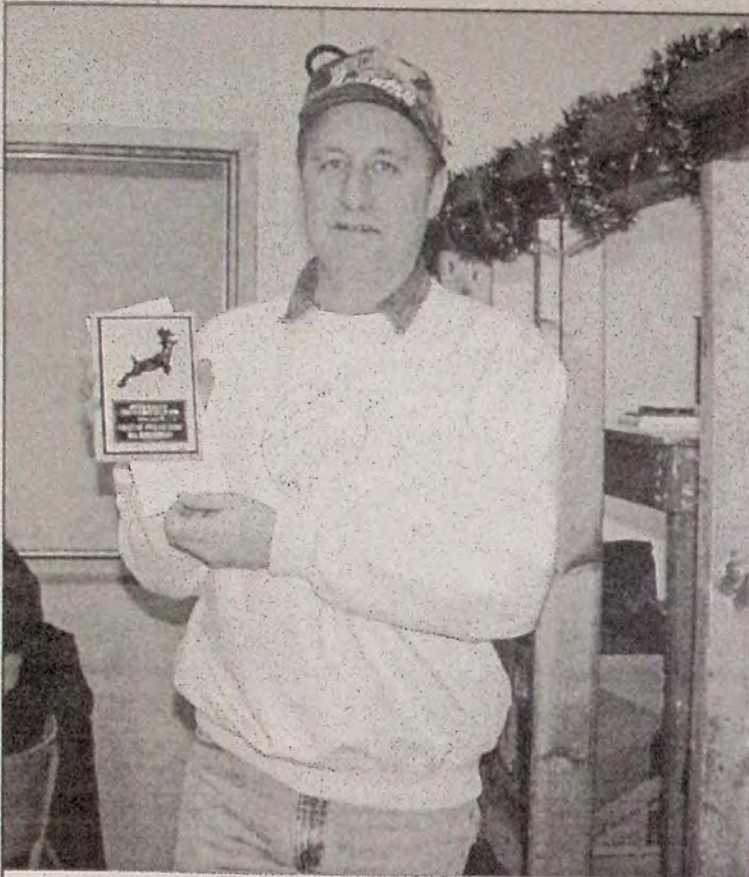

VICTORIA - Amendments to the Family Relations Act now in effect will make it easier for grandparents to remain part of children's lives when the parents are no longer together.

The act now clearly identifies the people who may be considered in determining the best interest of the child when custody and access decisions are made. They include parents, grandparents, relatives and others who have a close and ongoing relationship with the child.

The amendments respond to grandparents and grandparents' organizations who wanted legislative changes to help them maintain relationships with their grandchildren after separation or divorce of the children's parents.

"I am gratified that government has recognized the value of grandparents to their grandchildren," said Nancy Wooldridge, founder and president of the provincial and federal chapters of the Canadian Grandparents Rights Association. "During and after the emotional upheaval of separation and divorce, these loving relationships can provide much-needed support and stability to children."
