The organizing groups put outstanding effort into the projects. Unless a person participates in the effort, the amount of sheer physical work required would not be understood. Not only is the work hard, the hours are long and the pay is zero. Year after year, volunteers make Christmas happen for needy families in the valley. They work for weeks, organizing, promoting and finally, putting together hampers and toys to give to those who most need them.

This year was a tough year. The economy has been down, money has been scarce, but ordinary citizens came forward with contributions to the funds to help others. They, too, are part of the picture of giving and sharing, forming the heart of what 'community' means.

## Village agrees to spend on safety project

At the December 21 meeting, Keremeos Village Council decided to spend \$2,400 on a safety program. The project is being organized by the B.C. Municipal Safety Association in order to comply with new WCB regulations.

Chief Administrative Officer Oliver-Bauer recommended participation. She noted her office does not have the manpower nor anyone trained to develop a safety program for Village workers.

Oliver-Bauer said, "It's a fair price for the work they will do for us."

After some discussion, Mayor and Council committed themselves to the project, stipulating they want written confirmation that the project's focus will be on smaller communities.

# Public hears resort plan

PRINCETON - A public hearing into changes in the Rural Land Use bylaw was held December 21 in Princeton. The focus of the hearing was the reason for the change: an application by Weber Raumbau Group Consulting Inc. to amend the bylaw to include a new land use designation to permit a year-round health and recreation ranch use.

Alan Frydenlund, spokesman for the developer, explained the project to the public. He described the 2,000 acre project as a "destination-style equestrian resort". Frydenlund said the company had been looking for a location for such a resort, and had seen no location more beautiful than the ranch belonging to the Willis family.

The resort would be located south and east of Princeton, along the road to the Willis home ranch. The home ranch would not be developed as a resort, but would remain a working ranch. Guests of the resort who wished to participate in ranching would have the opportunity, but the ranch would continue as before, as a hay-growing operation. The hay will be needed for the number of horses at the resort.

The center of the resort is a

67,000 square foot lodge with 28 accommodation rooms, plus 50 "cabins" which can house 15-160 guests.

When in operation, the resort will need 80 to 100 full-time employees and an additional 40 to 60 casual or seasonal employees. Services available locally will be used. Frydenlund gave, as an example, using a local baker for pastries, local massage experts, and a local laundry, if one were available.

Frydenlund told the 90 local people in attendance that Weber Raumbau wants "to establish an environmentally friendly development" for the enjoyment of outdoor recreation. The company intends to preserve the views of the valley, and will not allow cars to be driven within the resort complex. Golf carts will take guests from one location to another, such as from lodge to stables.

In addition to equestrian pursuits, guests will hike, go fishing, canoeing, or enjoy other local activities, depending on the season.

There is no plan to divide the ranch into parcels to be sold in the future.

There was only one objecting

voice on record. Regional District Planner Lindsay Mills read a letter, from the Upper Similkameen Indian Band, objecting to the fact that the company had not consulted with the Band regarding possible archaeologically significant items connected with the land. Frydenlund stated that the company will be meeting with Band Manager Philippe Batini in January to discuss the objection and find a solution.

Area H Director Linda Allison chaired the meeting, and called for questions, comments, and presentations from members of the public. Two supportive statements were made. The hearing adjourned after nobody responded to the third call for comments.

## Town budgets \$3 million for 1999

PRINCETON - Town Council has given preliminary conditional approval to a 1999 provisional budget totalling \$3,100,000. Of the total revenue, taxes and grants are expected to bring in \$1,250,000. Revenues include collections for other governments totalling \$1 million. Collections for other governments include school district and hospital taxes, which the Town of Princeton collects and sends to the other taxing authorities.

## Lower taxes slated for Keremeos

Keremeos residents will pay less taxes next year.

Mayor J.C. Stranart reported the good news during the December 21 Village Council meeting. Mayor Stranart said Council is working on a preliminary budget and aiming for a "zero per cent" tax increase.

The Village will reduce total taxes collected by more than \$40,000 for landfill costs. Contrary to what most people believe the Village does not keep this revenue. The municipality collects the money on behalf of Regional District, which operates the dump.

When tipping fees start next spring, residents in Keremeos and Areas B and G will pay for actual usage instead of being taxed. The mayor said taxes will partially pay for recycling, closing the present dump and opening the new one.

## B.C. Ski industry is growing

VICTORIA - The B.C. government predicts B.C. ski areas will continue a 20 year trend of strong growth and in the year 2000 will attract over five million skiers to BC mountain resorts.

Skier visits to BC mountain resorts have increased an average of six per cent per year since 1978. In the past 10 years, BC has almost doubled its market share of skier visits in the Pacific Northwest, which includes Alberta, Washington, Montana and Oregon, to more than 40 per cent.

BC ski areas are growing at almost twice the rate of competing resorts because BC is recognized internationally as a ski resort destination. The exchange rate of the Canadian dollar versus the American dollar has helped resorts compete.

The BC ski industry includes 60 ski areas representing more than \$2 billion in investment, and providing 8,500 jobs.

## Town budget .....from front

The actual budget for the Town is \$2,100,000 after disbursements to other governments. The biggest single expenditure is wages, at \$280,000. Grants to organizations total \$60,000. Environmental Health Services total \$150,000, and transportation services is up to \$370,000. Recreation facilities and services total \$160,000, while cultural Buildings and facilities total \$45,000. Insurance costs \$60,000. Fiscal services transferred to capital total \$392,000. Transfers to regional library are \$66,000.

There are other items in the budget. For careful study of the provisional budget, consult Town Hall.

Include a separate types sheet with your name, address, phone number, title of songs, and a 500 word maximum biographical narrative describing your performance experience, musical and life ambitions, and expectations from the workshop. Cassettes will not be returned. Include a self-addressed stamped envelope for notification.

Deadline for submissions is March 24, 1999.

Delegates selected will receive free lunches and dinners, in-town transportation, and admission to most Festival events.

## Study shows

# Canada's highways need work

VICTORIA - Harry Lali, Minister of Transportation and Highways, welcomed the release of a series of reports on Canada's national highway system. He stated the studies will prepare the way for increased investment in transportation.

"The reports show clearly that Canada is falling behind," Lali says. "Our national highways are deteriorating. Investing in improvements to these routes is vital to Canada's future economic health. We need increased support for alternative transportation modes and methods."

The National Highway Policy Study, released December 16, says the national highway system has not improved since 1988. Bringing the routes up to an acceptable standard will require a \$17 billion investment, which will in turn generate an estimated \$30 billion in economic benefits for Canadians.

Lali says federal help is crucial to properly address current trans-

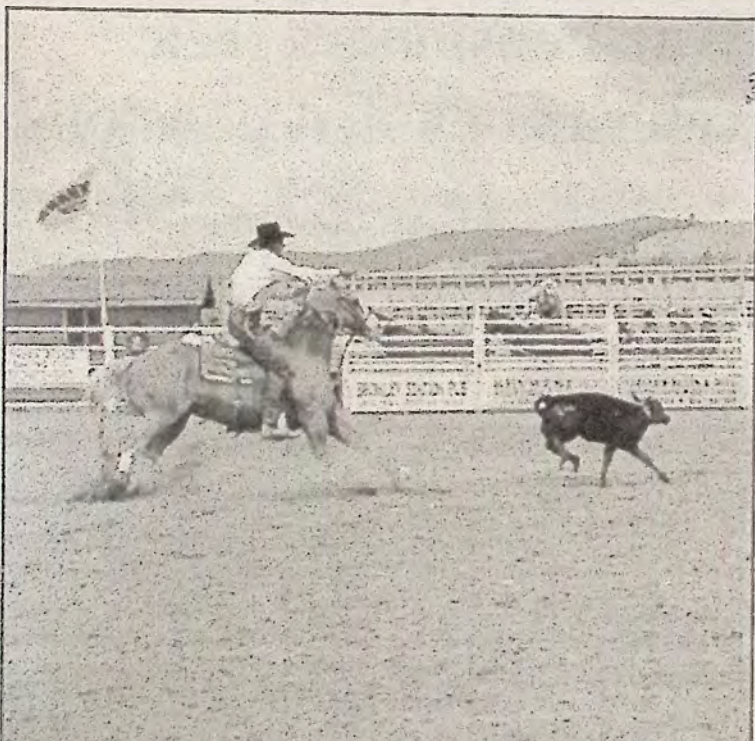
**LOSSES**

# POINTS OF VIEW

## OUR VIEW

### The big year before 2000

It is likely the most significant thing about 1999 is our approach to the Year 2000. Undoubtedly, the fact that 2000 years have passed since Christ was born is awesome to think about.

There are people who wish we were going backward in time because our world is so complex. They feel we are going forward too fast. The evidence of archaeology says we may just be catching up to where we were 13,000 years ago!

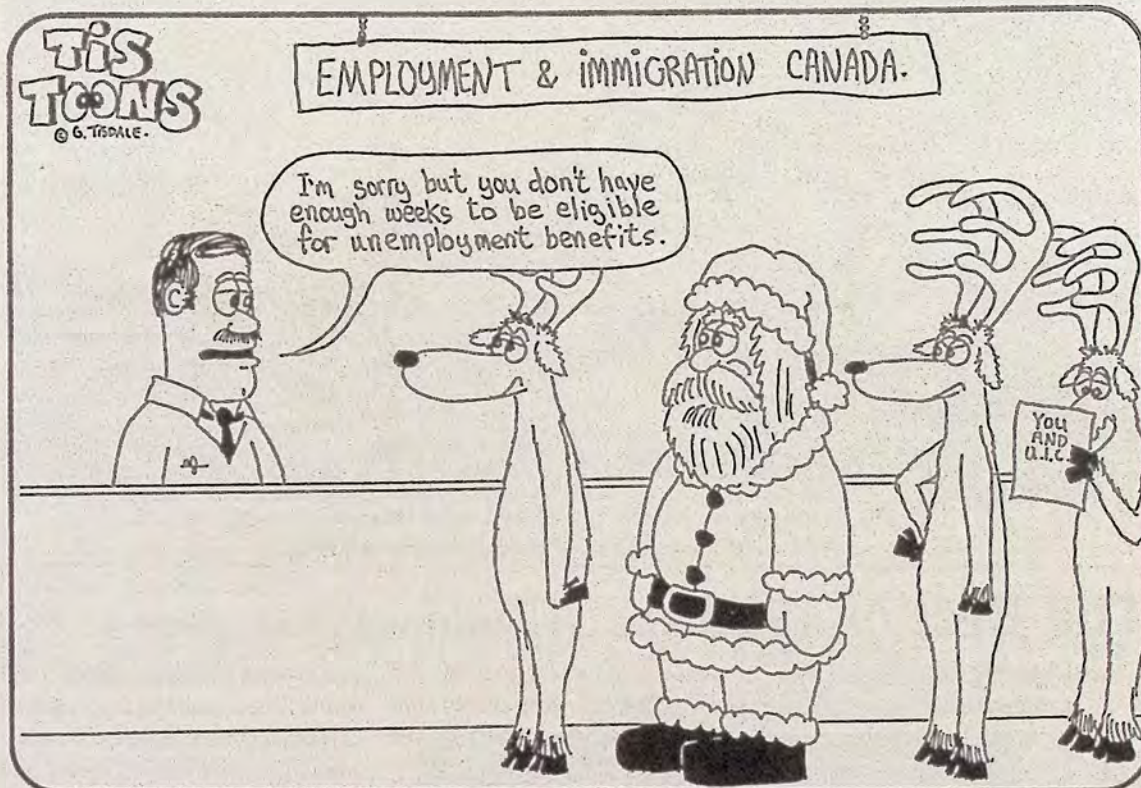
The probable truth is that we have not gone forward fast enough. We have clung to ignorance and bigotry and plain traditionalism for far too long after the Great Flood that wrecked everything that came before it. The Flood was an unimaginable catastrophe that pushed people back into the primitive survival, but there is too much evidence around the world showing us that great civilizations existed before The Flood.

People came to believe The Flood was a divine punishment for not living righteously, but ancient texts point to some kind of meltdown of the south polar ice cap. Maybe the Earth tilted too far. We do not know for sure what happened.

What we do know is that there were sophisticated civilizations before The Flood. We have been pulling ourselves up by our own bootstraps since then.

Perhaps, fearing another round of 'divine punishment', we have held ourselves back from daring to achieve all we could. Perhaps ignorance in the past was more comfortable.

### Overspending causes Canadian decline

Dear Editor;

During the period 1991 to 1995, the provincial debt grew by a massive 46 per cent, helping to put Canadians with the fastest growing tax burden of all the G7 countries. This overspending has helped to cause the decline in the Canadian dollar. This passed on in the form of less government funded services, our hospitals and other medical services are now a shambles. Patients are dying while awaiting long-delayed examinations and necessary operations. Our nurses, doctors and other patient care staff are burning out. The loss of confidence in the way our government is handling this excessive taxation income applies to federal taxation, too.

During a period of the mid-90's a \$6 billion infrastructure program conceived by our federal Liberal government did not produce a single permanent job, but what it did do was contribute \$400 million in compounding interest payments, thus reducing our standard of living by eating up our income by 8.4 per cent.

When spending like this does nothing to contribute to the future economy, I call it waste. We cannot spend our way into prosperity unless there is a continuing profitable benefit from it.

Instead, we have seen only massive cuts to the higher-paid labour force. In a loss of confidence by those holding our bonds, both provincial and federal, companies are moving out

or have already moved out due to higher taxation and increased labour costs. This again is lowering our bond ratings and then higher interest rates for future borrowing in B.C.

The deficit will in '98 add another \$1 billion or more to the debt in B.C. Will this cause another drop in our bond rating. The sooner we learn that old-time spending ideas cannot alleviate the recessionary pressures. The better for all of us.

This present folly of giving in to union pressures for more wages and benefits, instead of hiring more people, will go on as long

as unions feel that a strike will accomplish what they want — more wages and benefits. Then automation will continue to erode the number of jobs available, thus pushing back the day of payment for some years to come. Will it be passed on to our children? And how will they pay it back after automation forces them into disheartening jobs with Big Mac? So, now the banks are seeing a drop in profits. Will this bring on more automation from this sector of the labour force?

A pension is not guaranteed with this application. The Canadian Government has the final say.

It is therefore extremely important that we all make this most serious request. Nothing will be done unless we all pull together, as never before, and mail in a completed application. Make copies as you have so thought-

fully done in the past, and make sure that every veteran and widow you know gets a copy to complete and mail to Ottawa (no postage necessary).

Canadian War Veterans were recognized over 100 years ago with pensions for wartime services.

Canadian WW2 Veterans served many more years, much farther afield and under a great deal more stress than veterans of their day. Many of you have received the standard reply from government representative quoting: (1) "there were business and land settlement loans, re-establishment credits and education benefits exclusively intended to

assist veterans in their return to civilian life." (2) "as there are believed to be approximately one million veterans and surviving widows" etc.

The truth of the matter is:  
 (1) Of the 1,079,475 who enlisted for service during WW2, over 86% were unable to partake (in 1 above)  
 (2) Of the 1,079,475 who

enlisted, there could not possibly be 1,000,000 war veterans and surviving spouses at this late date. Also noteworthy are statistics from the latest published annual report from the Department of Veterans Affairs showing 80% of all first-stage applications for disability pensions are rejected. From the above straight-forward statistics, the only option open to

## Minister urges residents to return their empties

KAMLOOPS - British Columbians are being urged to think about the "three Rs" when dealing with holiday waste, including returnable beverage containers.

Cathy McGregor, Minister of Environment, Lands and Parks, says, "This time of year means a lot more packaging, wrapping paper and increased use of drink containers. We're asking everyone to make a gift to the environment by reducing, reusing and recycling materials that don't belong in B.C.'s landfills."

McGregor toured a bottle return centre in Kamloops recently and

recognized the success of the expanded beverage container return program, which was launched October 1.

During October, 1.7 million wine and liquor containers were collected at BC Liquor Distribution branch stores, a 40 per cent return rate in the first month of the new program.

Under B.C.'s beverage container program, deposits and refunds apply to the majority of ready-to-serve drink containers with the exception of drinking boxes, gable-top containers, stand-up plastic pouches, milk and milk substitutes.

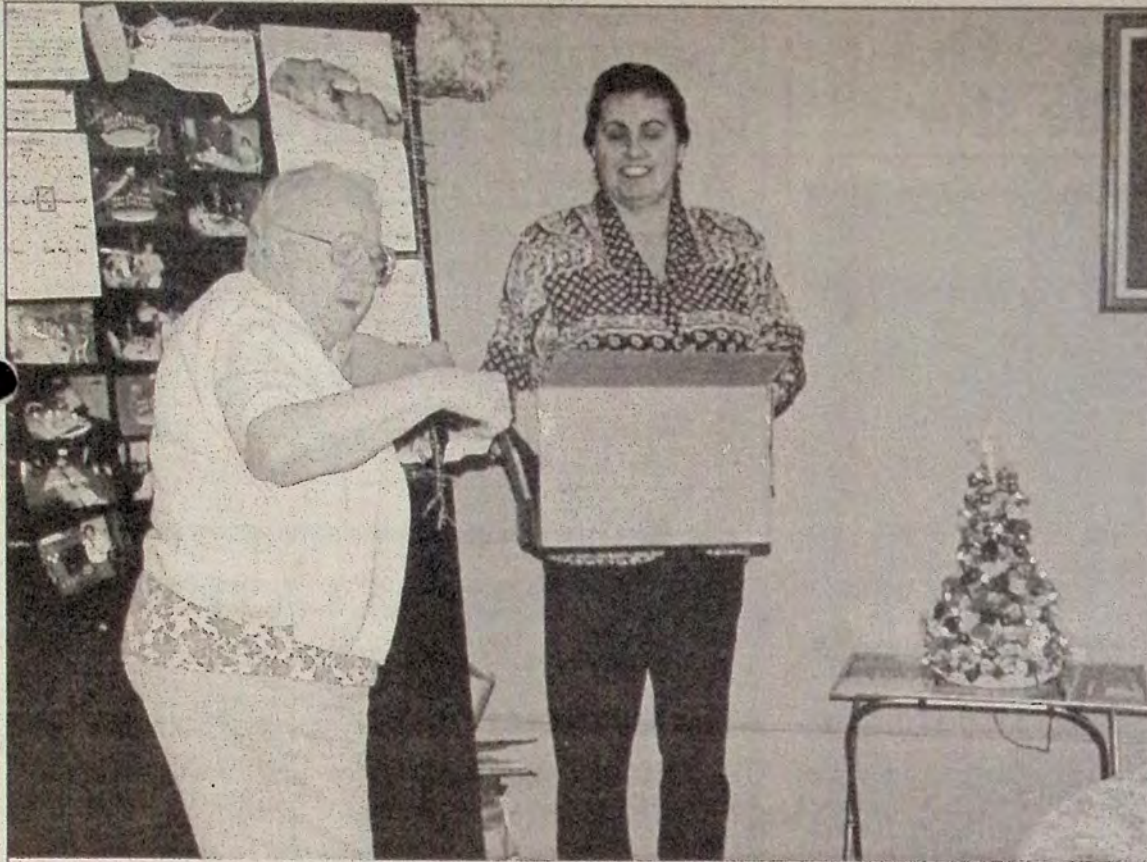

# 'Tis the season to shovel!

Although we have been getting off easy this year with regards to snow-fall, we will inevitably have to dust off that snow shovel. Each year, after the first significant snow-fall, many people have back troubles from being over-enthusiastic with their shoveling. To prevent injuries, there are a few points we should keep in mind.

The most important aspect of injury prevention related to shoveling (and any other activities), is posture. Simply standing in the wrong position places much stress on the low back. Our low backs are designed to withstand tremendous forces in the upright position; however, it is during shoveling, when the ideal posture is compromised, that injuries occur. When shoveling, never stand in one position while pushing, lifting, twisting, then throwing the snow. Walk with the shovel, stop, then bend the knees and lift. Also, when you have to push the snow or lift it, keep your feet shoulder width apart and bend the knees.

## Snow!

Heavy snow warnings were issued Christmas Eve. Snow continued all day, and for the next two days, accumulating enough to be a boon or a nuisance, depending on who was looking at it or playing in it.

Highways crews were hard-pressed to keep up with clearing the snow and maintaining road surfaces. Their Christmas required a lot of work and absence from home. Let's not take them for granted.

The role of our low back muscles in injury prevention is also very important. Other than providing movement in our bodies, an important duty of our muscles is to limit stress on joints. When the muscles tire, injuries may occur as the joints are no longer naturally protected. Keeping this in mind, remember the entire driveway doesn't have to be done in 10 minutes. Take a break half way through to give the muscles a chance to recuperate. Stretching

before such activities is also very beneficial.

The only way to guarantee no low back problems from snow shoveling is to hire someone to remove your snow. Unfortunately this is not always feasible, and actually, inactivity can also lead to low back problems, so... get out there, be careful, and you will be able to enjoy the holiday season pain free. Your body may even appreciate the fresh Princeton air and the exercise.

## Budget '98 initiatives

VICTORIA- The following budget changes were announced November 6 by the provincial government:

**Tax reductions for individuals -**

- Personal income tax general rate paid by middle income and low income families is reduced for the third year in a row to 50.5 per cent, and will go down to 49.5 per cent in January, 1999.

- Personal Income Tax top marginal rate paid by high income earners will drop to 52.7 per cent for 1999

**Tax reductions for small business -**

- To reduce the number of businesses paying Corporation Capital Tax (CCT), the exemption threshold will be increased from \$1.5 million to \$2.5 million January 1, 1999 to \$3.5 million January 1, 2000 and \$5 million January 1, 2001

- When fully phased in, these threshold increases will eliminate the CCT for over 10,000 taxpayers so that by 2001, 90 per cent of businesses in B.C. will not pay this tax

- The small business Corporate Income Tax is being reduced in stages from 10 per cent in 1996 to 8 per cent effective January 1, 2000

- a two-year Corporate Income Tax holiday is introduced for qualifying small businesses

**Tax reductions for high tech, tourism and film -**

- provincial sales tax exemptions for 1-800 lines

- tax credits for domestic film producers (since introduction of the film tax credit five months ago, 63 productions have taken advantage of the benefits for a total of \$430 million in direct spending. For every dollar of direct spending in the film indus-

try, three dollars are spent in hotels, restaurants, construction companies and many other businesses).

- jet fuel tax reduction, one per cent in 1998 and one percent on April 1, 1999

**Tax reductions for agriculture -**

- elimination of tax on coloured fuel as of July 1, 1998

Ministry of Agriculture budget increased by \$11 million to help farmers recover from weather-related crop failures

**Tax reduction for mining -**

- a new Mining Exploration Tax Credit came into effect August 1, 1998, and individual prospectors and companies can now claim 20 per cent of eligible expenses for exploration conducted after that date.

**Tax reductions for forestry -**

- lower stumpage rates
- changes to Forest Practices Code will streamline the system, reduce bureaucracy and cut regulatory roadblocks

**Streamlining and cutting red tape -**

- a Business Task Force was formed and to date has produced two reports recommending additional ways to streamline and eliminate unnecessary regulations and procedures

- new "one stop" business centres

- removing duplication

**Hydro rate rebate for businesses and households -**

- two per cent of last year's electricity bill has been rebated to all residential and small commercial customers

- one per cent rebate has been granted to large commercial and industrial customers

**Tax freezes continue -**

- rural residential tax rates, residential school taxes and non-residential school taxes remain frozen

to the year 2000.

- ICBC premiums remain frozen this year

**Reducing the provincial deficit -**

- the provincial government has been reduced from \$2.5 billion to \$152 million, a 94 per cent cut

- the audited 1997/98 financial results included a \$33 million better than expected deficit in the Consolidated Revenue Fund

- despite weak economic performance, the government is committed to cutting its operating deficit to \$95 million in 1998/99

**Healthcare services -**

- B.C. has increased health care spending by 15 per cent per person since 1991 (the only province to do so - Ed.)

- the health care budget increase by \$228 in 1998/99

- improved premium assistance

- \$93 per student more than last year

- 400 new teachers and 300 new teaching aides

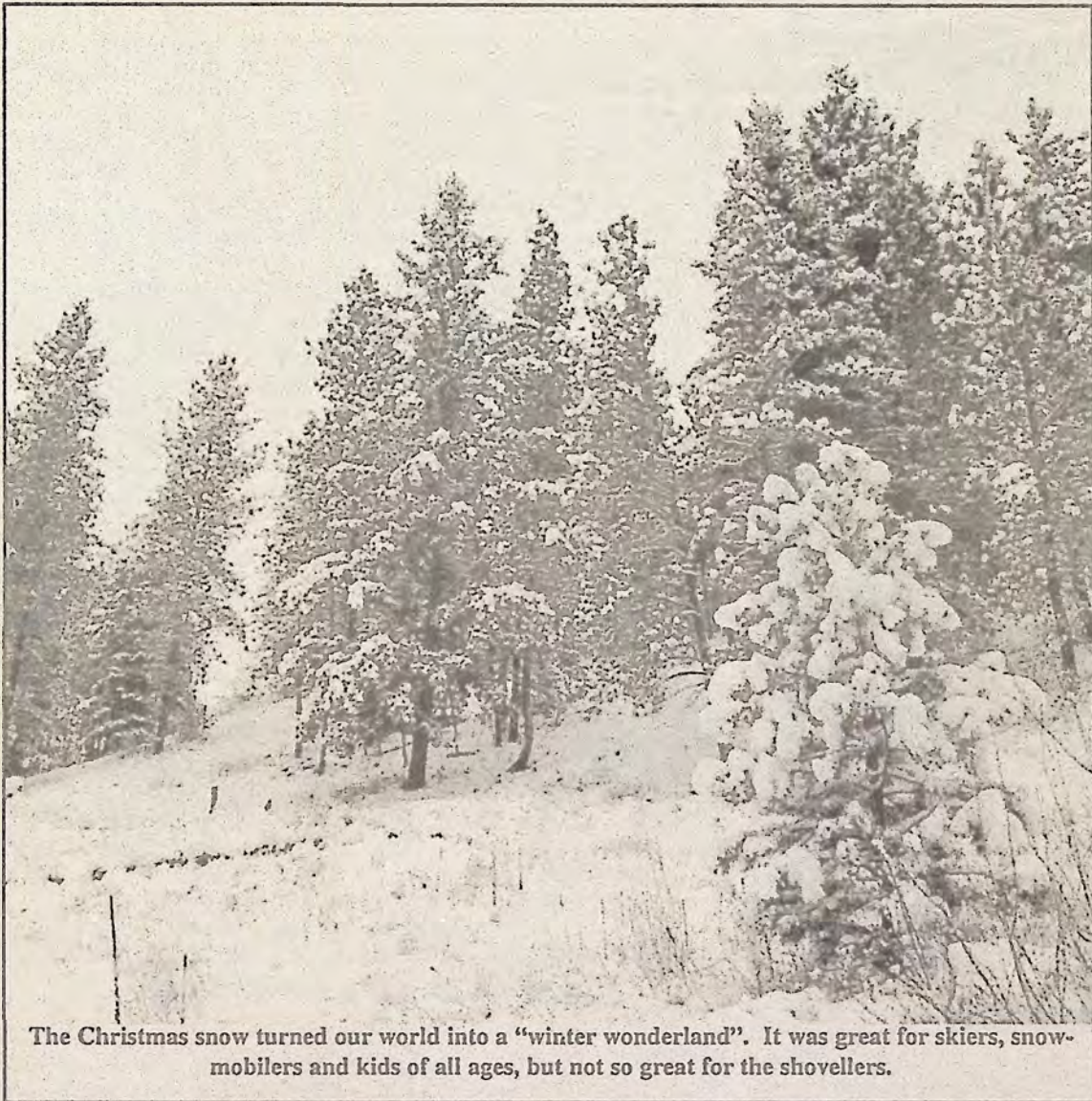

## Renovations at Ridgewood Lodge

"This is my home"—is the thinking that's going into the planned renovations at Ridgewood Lodge. The present intermediate care facility was built for a different time and needs.

"People are living at home much longer than they did before," says Dorothy Cobb, Community Administrator. "When they do come to Ridgewood, they are older and need more help."

The plan calls for upgrading the existing facility to meet the needs of the more frail resident. This means adding rails and providing for more wheelchairs. The project will cost about \$1.5 million and will bring the 10 extended care, 21 intermediate care, and two transition beds together into one multi-level facility. An additional three beds will bring the total bed count to 36.

"We would need fewer acute beds, because some of the people in those beds now should be in Ridgewood," says Dorothy. "We have approval from the Ministry for this project, which is a positive one for this community."

Some patients will be moved from the Hospital to Ridgewood Lodge. "This move will bring about appropriate patient care," says Dorothy. "We are working with our local unions to bring about a smooth transition to the new beds at Ridgewood Lodge."

Appropriate health care doesn't mean less care, only that the patient or resident is receiving a level of care that suits the need. This may be different from what has happened in the past but the difference should mean more quality health care.

## Making progress

In the past year, we have made progress in our operations at Princeton General Hospital and Ridgewood Lodge. For several years now, PGH has operated with a deficit which was carried into the next year to be covered by government grants. The result was we were falling behind financially and not making necessary improvements to our operations.

A feasibility study earlier this year made several recommendations that we are now implementing. One of these is the upgrading of Ridgewood Lodge mentioned elsewhere in this report.

With regionalization of health services, we were able to link through computers to other hospitals in the Region. This has been useful in our communication with Penticton Regional Hospital.

We also receive our supplies through the Regional system. The larger buying power of the Region passes on savings for those supplies we order.

Other functions, such as finance and payroll, have been transferred to the Region. This allows us to use more of our budget for patient and resident care.

Due to the efforts of the Region, doctors serving Princeton have concluded

an on-call payment agreement. This ensures that our community will have medical coverage in off-hours.

Next year will present more challenges to us. Our goal is to integrate the work of all community health programs, including the Hospital, Ridgewood Lodge, home care, public health, home support and other programs. By working together more effectively we can continue to deliver appropriate and acceptable health care services to our community.

## Report from the Foundation and Auxiliary

A bright spot in Princeton health care is the work of the Princeton General Hospital and Ridgewood Lodge Foundation, as well as the work of the Hospital Auxiliary.

### Activities

The Auxiliary raises funds through its Spring Raffle, fashion show, and craft items made by members and sold in the Gift Shop. Volunteers also take a tuck cart around the Hospital and Lodge three times a week. Proceeds from the sale of items add to the funds raised for medical equipment and other needs at the Hospital and Lodge.

### Purchases

During the past year, approximately \$45,000 was raised to purchase a number of items, including a defibrillator, holster monitor, fetal monitor, four Baxter infusion pumps, digital scale, thermometers, and some furnishings.

### Other activities

Auxiliary volunteers sit with patients and help feed residents in Ridgewood Lodge. The Auxiliary will also increase its annual bursary from \$500 to \$1,000.

## Report from Ray Huey, Chair, CHAC, Princeton

### Fall Education Session

The CHAC Fall education session, sponsored by the Regional Health Board, was held in Summerland on Nov. 5, 1998. The CHAC evaluation was the main point of discussion and resulted from a questionnaire that CHAC members completed. Most CHAC members supported continuing these advisory committees and there were recommendations for change that will be taken to the RHB to become policy.

This meeting recommended that CHAC members continue in their roles until March 31, 1999 so that a recruitment and appointment process can take place.

### Strategic Planning

At its meeting on Nov. 23, 1998, Princeton CHAC finalized a community health planning process to begin in January 1999. This planning process will take place according to the following schedule:

#### Care providers/CHAC planning

session (Jan. 1999)

Community education sessions (Feb/Mar. 1999)

Community feedback through focus groups (April/May 1999)

The goal is to present a final draft of the Community Health Plan to the Regional Health Board in June 1999.

### Public Health

Mrs. Beatrice Bibby has been appointed Public Health Nurse, effective Dec. 14, 1998.
