Museum granted Pollard fossils

PRINCETON - In an outstanding act of generosity, Shirley Pollard, of Princeton, has donated the extensive fossil collection left by her late husband, Joe Pollard, to Princeton Museum and Archives Society. Rosemary Doughty, Museum President, made the announcement January 12 at the

society's annual general meeting.

The collection, which includes phosphorescent fossils which glow under black light, took forty years to assemble. It will not be divided, separated or loaned out in any part, but kept together as one collection.

Doughty commented, "Joe

Pollard labeled, photographed and recorded the entire collection, which would have taken a team of museum workers years to accomplish."

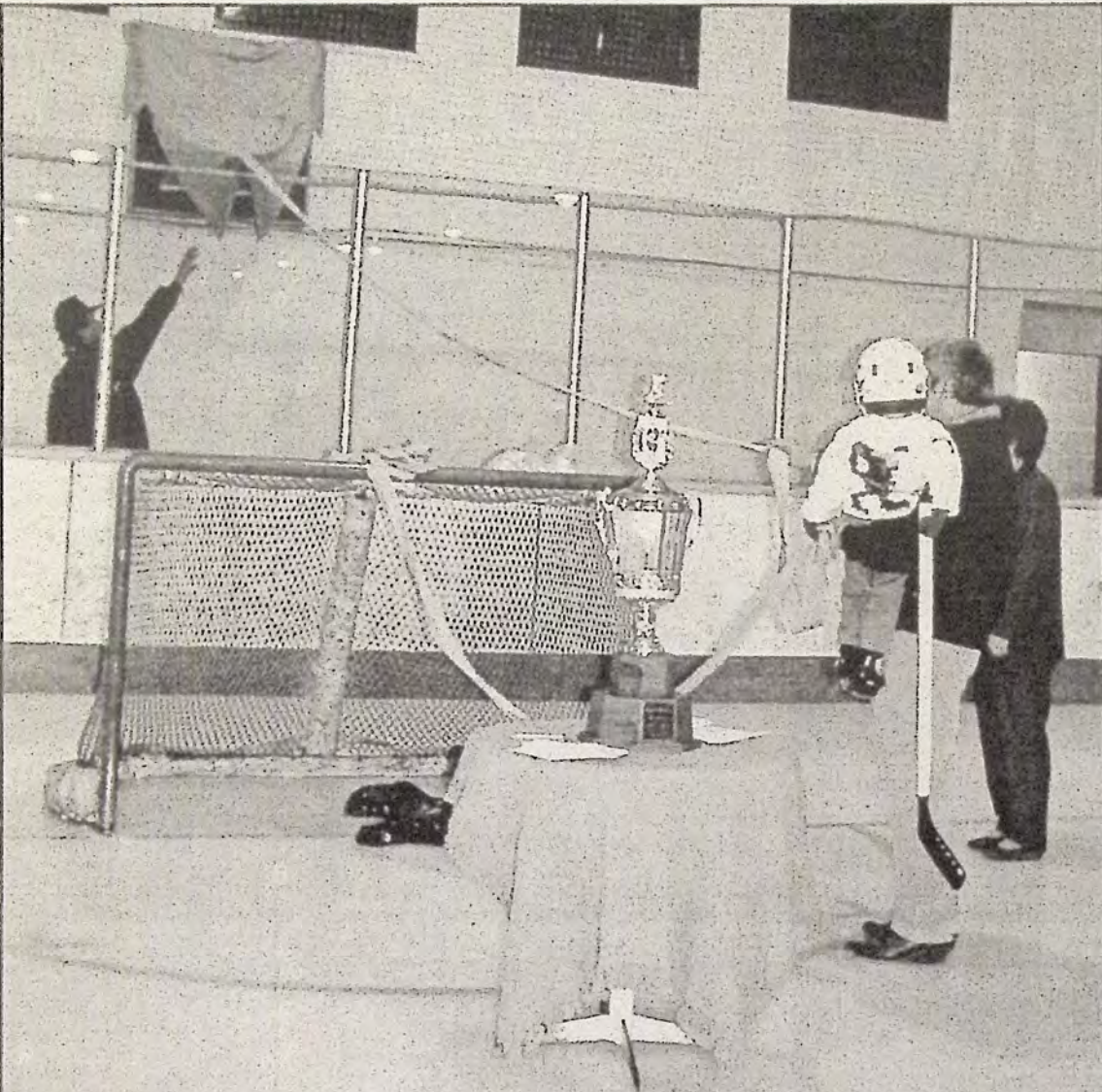

Common causes of ski hill injuries

As the ski season is now into full swing, it is important to discuss skiing injuries. Strains of muscles and tendons, and sprains of ligaments in joints are the most common injuries (45%), followed by cold exposure and frostbite (20%), cuts and bruises (11%), and fractures (10%). Over half of these injuries involve the lower limbs.

A few of the common causes for the above problems are:

1. "Digging a Tip" - This is when the tip of the ski gets caught while tuning. This usually results in twisting the knee and falling forward. If the forward momentum is sufficient, a "boot-top" fracture may occur which is a fracture of the lower leg just above the top of the hard ski-boot. The best way to avoid this type of injury is to have the ski bindings properly adjusted so they will release early enough. over the top of the hard ski-boot. 2. "Abnormal lower leg

Alignment" - a skier which is excessively bow-legged or has foot troubles such as flat arches will have troubles turning and gliding with the ski flat. These misalignments may be improved

with adjustable boots or orthotic insoles from a chiropractor or a podiatrist.

3. "Fatigue" - most skiers don't prepare for the season by adequately conditioning the muscles. When a skier tires but continues to ski, they are more prone to fall. Most injuries occur in the last run

4. "Inadequate warm-up and overuse" - most muscle strains are due to inadequate warm-up or overworking the muscles. The typical weekend-warrior skier rarely warms up and usually skis very hard, only to discover knee or low back pain the next day.

These are just a few common causes of ski injuries - almost all which are preventable. Keep these points in mind next time you hit the slopes and the season will be much more enjoyable and you will make it to enjoy spring skiing.

The goal of the BCWF in offering the "Becoming an Outdoors-Woman" program is to provide opportunities for women to learn skills that enhance and encourage

participation in hunting, angling and other outdoors activities. The workshops allow women to learn outdoor skills in a non-threatening, non-competitive atmosphere. One of the strengths of the workshops is the balanced format: one third hunting/shooting, one third fishing related, and one third non-consumptive activities. Non-consumptive courses offered will include: Off Road Driving, Horseback Riding, Chainsaw and Axe Safety, Kayaking, and Wetland Ecology.

These workshops not only teach new skills or help improve on some already tried (skills that can be passed on to the participants children) but also teach appreciation of nature and wildlife. The B.C. Wildlife in offering this program is opening the door to par-

Museum members approve new executive for 1999

PRINCETON - A new executive for 1999 was elected at the annual general meeting of Princeton and District Museum and Archives Society held Tuesday, January 12. Rosemary Doughty will be president for a second year with Don Coyle as vice-president. Bob Ostrosser as treasurer and Evelyn McCallum as secretary. Directors are Kathy Clement, Lorraine Lance, Eric Jacobson and Dorothy Stenvold.

President Rosemary Doughty, gave her annual report. She emphasized changes during the year, beginning with changes in displays.

Members of the society have done a great deal of work in caring for stored artifacts, as well as cataloguing and numbering archives and artifacts.

Security for the museum became a major concern. The society did not wish to risk the lost of valuable artifacts donated by the community. All of the locks were changed and allocation of the keys is controlled.

The society celebrated its fortieth anniversary in 1998, joining with the Hospital Auxiliary in presenting a historic fashion show.

During the summer, the Arts Council held an arts event at the museum. The event included music, poetry, photography, crafts, and art, as well as hands-on art works and refreshments.

Amber LeComte, a local student, helped keep the museum open seven days a week during the summer.

The museum featured its fossil collection by moving them from

the basement to the main part of the museum. At the annual general meeting, after Doughty had announced that the museum had been given the Joe Pollard fossil collection, some discussion took place regarding ways and means of adding a 'fossil wing' to the existing museum. That project will be explored further.

A Fossil Club started during 1998.

Doughty expressed appreciation for the archival work done by Lorraine Lance and Eric Jacobson. Lance undertook re-sorting of the existing archives, while Jacobson sorted the original archival collection left the museum by the executor's of David Taylor's estate. Taylor operated a

newspaper in Princeton for many years prior to World War 2, and wrote extensively for other publications. There is a wealth of historical information available from the Taylor archives.

Lance will continue her work this year, making copies of the museum's collection of photographs with lists, labels, indexing, cross-referencing, lists of fonts and descriptive information.

The President's Report praised Town Council for the renovation project which revitalized the museum and allowed wheelchair access. Special thanks and applause were given to Councillor Kathleen Clement for her dedication to the project.

Fossils promise visits in the future

With the addition of the Joe Pollard fossil collection, Princeton Museum becomes a destination for a number of different categories of tourists. The fossils may appear to some local people to be merely a collection of old rocks, but to those people interested in the history of the world, fossils are as good as gold. For Princeton, the fossils are like money in the bank, waiting for the future.

People interested in paleontology, mining, and geology will be interested in our fossils. The unique paleontology of the Great Interior Plateau draws 40,000 visitors per year to the sleepy little town of Republic, Washington. What we have now far surpasses what Republic offers. We would be fools if we did not take full advantage of our fossil treasures. They are meant to be seen and appreciated.

Those members of the Museum Society who voiced a desire to add a Joe Pollard wing to the museum are thinking along the lines that will lead to making Princeton and area a destination of great importance. A fossil wing on the museum building, well-lighted, easily accessible, will draw at least 50,000 visitors per year. We believe local merchants are crazy if they do not give this project top priority in 1999. Tourists who come to see fossils may spend hours, even days, looking in the museum and looking in the area. Hours translates into meals, gas station stops, and a walk around town. Days translates into motel units, more meals, souvenirs, and full gas tanks. If 50,000 visitors come here each year, and spend ten dollars each, they will bring our area half a million dollars a year of added revenue. That figure is the least of what these fossils are worth. Let's not "look a gift horse in the mouth."

Let's build the Joe Pollard wing!

The Last Century

Women came a long way

Perhaps the biggest change of the past century has been the changing role of women in society. In 1900, women were homebodies, for the most part. A woman in the professions, or in business, was unusual in our society. As the year 2000 approaches, we see women in all kinds of roles which may, or may not, include keeping a home and raising children.

Women fought to gain the right to be recognized as persons. They obtained the right to vote, and the right to sit in legislative assemblies, early in this century. When we look back, what we seen now is in sharp contrast to the days when Florence Nightingale was seen as some kind of 'hussy' when she went to Crimea to nurse soldiers.

There never was anything wrong with being a wife and mother. However, it was restrictive to women. Nobody deprived a man of the right to vote merely because he was a man, and nobody expected a man to give up his job and stay at home just because he was a husband and father.

The real problem with the relationship between men and women for the first three-quarters of this century was who had power and who did not.

Women were owned—first by their fathers, then by their husbands or the church. Women were "given away" in marriage,

transferred from their fathers (or some other dominant male in the family) to their husbands. In our society, a husband was often bribed with a substantial dowry to take a particular woman as his wife.

Another significant improvement in the freedom of women was the development of the contraceptive pill. A "sexual revolution" took place in the 1960's as "The Pill" came into common use. A woman no longer need worry about pregnancy, and marriage was no longer a necessity for women if they were sexually active.

As women fully grasped their freedom, they began to demand increasing economic equality. For most women today, marriage is not an economic nor sexual necessity, as it was 100 years ago.

The most obvious way in which women have changed in this century is in their appearance. When the year 1900 arrived, women wore whalebone corsets cinched tight at the waist. Women often fainted in the heat, perhaps because they could not breathe! Over the corsets, they wore dresses that reached to their ankles or to the floor. Under their corsets, they wore panties that went to their calves.

As the century wore on, women's hemlines rose. By the 1920's, the flapper girl adopted a masculine-looking chest, short

haircut, and a hemline above the knees. Worst of all, the flapper smoked!

Flappers followed World War I. They disappeared when the Great Depression arrived. Hemlines never dropped back to the ankles, except for evening wear. However, women were wearing slacks.

The second world war saw women don uniforms in the military and coveralls in the factory. When the war was over, glamour came back as every woman tried to find her man and raise a family. Christian Dior introduced "The New Look", longer skirts and shaplier figure.

In the 1970's, mini-skirts and the Twiggy look had a brief fling. Now, women's clothing tends to go more toward comfort. We've come a long way.

Next to The Pill, and the vote, pantyhose was the best invention for women. Good-bye, garters!

Many people have different ideas about whether or not this was a good change, but I would guess the majority of women saw it as positive, because it was what women wanted and demanded. The present situation may have its downside, but few women would relinquish their present status for that of women a century ago.

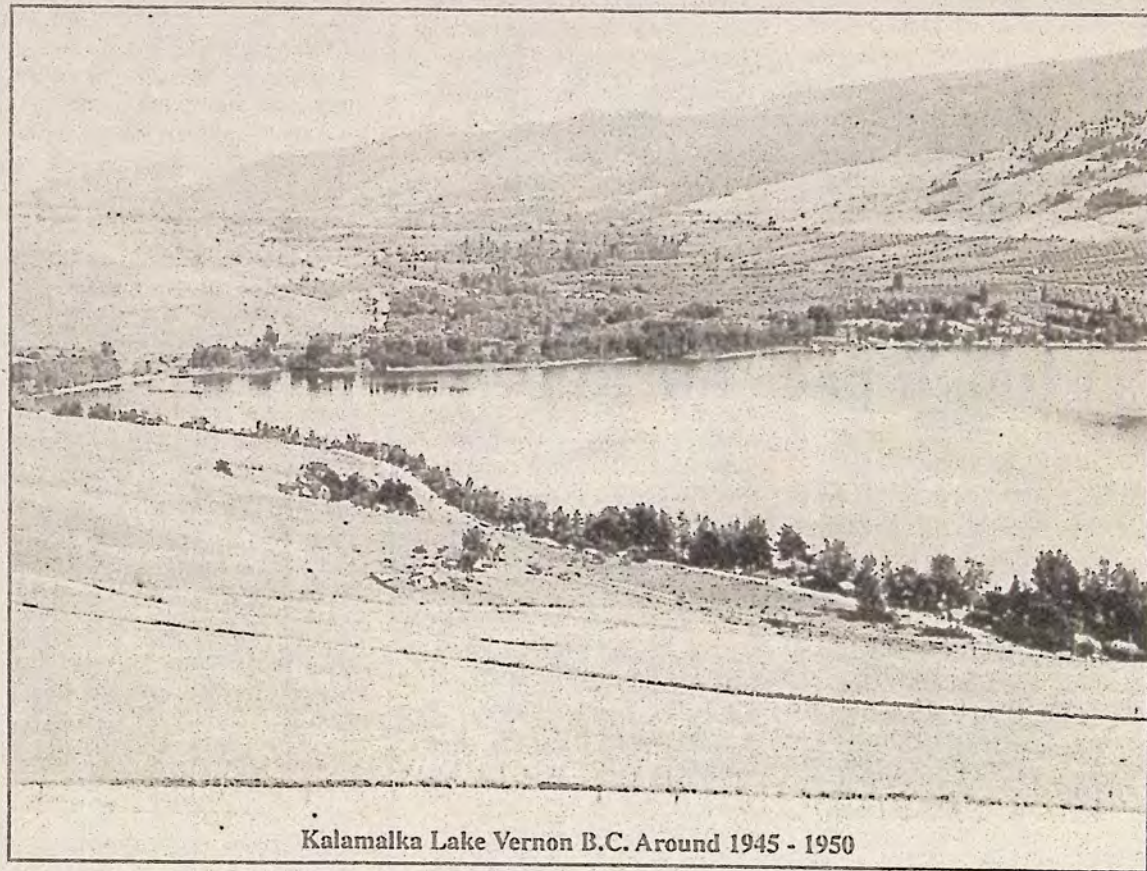

Mentat's basic laws of business: Law Seven: Lies of Omission

Readers who follow this column will find immediate business benefits by applying the principles outlined to an existing or proposed business. The following may not be politically correct but there is a real basis to that old saying 'caveat emptor'.

LAW SEVEN: ALL SALESMEN ARE LIARS.

Most practice the lies of omission.

Years ago I had the delightful task of training salesmen. The first rule of sales is, 'When the customer says yes, shut up and take the order'. Salesmen who talk too much lose sales. When you are in business you have no recourse to such things as consumer protection. Unless you are the subject of fraud there is little you can do. Imagine trying to sue someone for not answering a question you didn't ask. Under the law, as a business person you are deemed to be capable of making intelligent decisions in an unregulated marketplace.

Before you sign on the dotted line for anything, make sure you have all the information you need. This means taking the time to educate yourself thoroughly. If a salesman makes you feel stupid for asking basic questions, take your business elsewhere. My method is simple. I get a basic set of information and pricing from one source. I then use that information on another source to appear more knowledgeable and gain more advanced information and possibly better pricing. I repeat this process until I feel absolutely comfortable that I am ready to make a purchasing decision. At every stage I make it clear that I am doing competitive pricing. If in the end I decide I really do need the product or service, I go back to the first source for new pricing. Faced with a suddenly knowledgeable customer, the salesman can be quite surprised.


Spending money can be a time consuming process. With your business at stake it is wise to take the time to make well informed decisions.

Arena Board elects new chair

PRINCETON - Ted Coyne found himself the unanimously acclaimed Chairman of the Arena Board of Management on January 12. Former Chairman Bob Westran forced the election by stating he could no longer chair meetings due to demands of his job. Other board members agreed with Westran that Coyne was the right person for the position.

A skate sharpener will be brought from Alberta for next season. It could be here sooner, if somebody would bring it from Alberta, but arena manager Lyle Thomas saw little chance of that happening and said he will fetch it later this year, when he has time.

The new condenser is on site but is not yet installed in the arena. The person responsible for installation warned that the ice might be lost during installation, a fact not mentioned at purchase time. As a result, the Board asked for,

and received, an extension on the warranty to 18 months.

Dogs are prohibited in the arena, but the Board was made aware that more than one dog has been brought to hockey games, and it is time the rule is enforced. A number of complaints from disgruntled spectators brought the issue to the Board. In the future, persons bringing dogs will be asked to remove the dog from the building immediately.

At the next meeting, on February 9, the budget will be reviewed, along with the costs of a new roof. Doug Leahy, Treasurer for Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen, will attend and discuss the financial situation of the arena. Linda Allison, Regional Director for Area H, suggested to the other Board members that they consider many approaches to determining the financial obligations for the future.

Okanagan Regional Library tax rate climbs

SIMILKAMEEN VALLEY - Both Princeton and Keremeos will see an increase in library taxes in 1999. Keremeos will go up \$1,100 and Princeton will be up \$200.

The Okanagan Regional Library Board approved an overall increase of \$175,597 to the budget approved at the November, 1998, meeting, for a total budget of \$8,955,425.

The only constituent unit paying less for library service in 1999 is the Okanagan Similkameen Regional District, representing

rural areas, with the exception of Area H. Rural area residents will pay \$800 less than they did in 1998.

The cost sharing formula is based on population figures which are updated annually as a predictor of library use, and the value of land and improvements in each community, which is thought to reflect the community's ability to pay.

From 1998 to 1999, Keremeos per capita costs will decline by \$1.00, and Princeton will increase by 60 cents. Rural area residents will increase by 62 cents.

Settler's grandson will be missed

Roy Thomas, the last grandchild of John Fall Allison still resident in Princeton, will be remembered by his friends as a man of strong opinion and good humour. Roy passed away January 15, 1999, in Princeton General Hospital. He lived in Princeton his entire lifetime, except for his tour of overseas service during World War 2.

Roy resided in the same home his parents lived in, the home where he was born, on the farm owned by family. It was the property originally settled by John Fall and Susan Louisa Allison, the first white settlers to reside permanently in the Princeton area.

Following the war years, Roy

worked on the farm and constructing houses and other buildings. Before the war, he had worked at Allenby.

Roy was an ardent skier, and taught the ski troops during the war. He learned to ski at Amber Ski Hill, and was a dedicated member of Amber Ski Club. Many Princeton youngsters learned to ski under Roy Thomas' instructions.

He loved to read and to write letters to the editor (*Editor's note: the News Leader staff will miss Roy's weekly visits and his letters about what the government should be doing to keep Canada a free country.*) He had a wonderful

collection of photographs, most of which he had taken himself, and notebooks full of family history which he had recorded for posterity. Although it was family history, it included the history of the Similkameen Valley.

In later years, one of his great joys was his weekly pool game at the Senior Citizens Hall.

One of his recent observations deserves to be preserved, and we quote: "What they oughta do is take the Canadian tax officials, put 'em on the obsolete Canadian navy, take 'em 200 miles out to sea, and require that they swim home."
