

Lali brings \$1.5 million for beds

PRINCETON - MLA Harry Lali brought \$1.5 million worth of construction to Princeton on Friday, February 5. On behalf of Health Minister Penny Priddy, Lali announced funding for a project to add 15 multi-level care beds to Ridgewood Lodge.

"This funding is welcome news for the people of Princeton area," Lali said, noting the project had been "in the works for quite some time."

"Our government is not about to abandon small communities like Princeton," Lali said. "This will send confidence to people who live here and come here that there's a first class health facility here."

The government has no specific plans drawn up for the new construction.

"It's up to the Regional Health Board now to determine the specifics," Lali said. "Our goal is to finish it by the end of 2000."

Mayor Randy McLean credited Lali and his government for procuring funds for improvements to Ridgewood Lodge, and added some words of appreciation for solving the highway devolution problem (a road exchange - Tulameen for Bonlin, Jacobson and Darcy). Mayor McLean said it had been "a good two weeks for Princeton" thanks to Lali's efforts.

Keremeos Village

Council protects museum

KEREMEOS - South Similkameen Museum Society will receive a \$376 grant in aid which usually goes to Keremeos Old Age Pensioners. The OAPO receives the grant based on the number of members living in the Village of Keremeos.

Earlier this year, Village Council learned that the museum is not covered by municipal insurance. The Museum Society had to come up with the money for insurance or close the doors.

Village Council discussed the matter with Keremeos OAPO, and both agreed the OAPO would suffer least if no grant were given.

In other Village Council business, neither the Chamber of Commerce nor Economic Development raised objections to the business bylaw.

Economic Development was pleased to receive repayment of

\$1,500 loaned to Keremeos Chamber of Commerce last year to keep the Tourist Information office open.

Councillor Holley attended Lower Similkameen Community Services Board meeting, and noted that Walter Despot advised the Board that the cost of the multi-level care development planned for Keremeos had run \$400,000 over the \$7 million budget.

The business license bylaw received third reading at the February 1 Village Council meeting. One amendment was made stating that a business cannot change the nature of the business without the approval of the building inspector. This means that an office area, for example, cannot become a restaurant, without first passing inspection.

Town, Indian Band share valley historical project

SIMILKAMEEN VALLEY - The Town of Princeton and Upper Similkameen Indian Band are entering a joint project in Princeton to create a heritage park.

The park will utilize Crown land and an adjacent Indian Reserve parcel located between the Chamber of Commerce building and Memorial Park on Highway 3 within town boundaries.

Mayor Randy McLean has asked the Ministry of Highways to lease the Crown land to Princeton, and has put in a request to MLA Harry Lali's office to fast-track the lease agreement with a letter of intent so work can commence as soon as spring arrives.

The Upper Similkameen Indian Band has applied to government for a grant for the project.

Mayor McLean noted that the Crown land adjacent to the Chamber property had been iden-

tified as an "eyesore" by local citizens. Mayor McLean agrees, and feels there could be a promising development on the property if tied in with the Reserve. Philippe Batini, Band Manager, sees a high potential for a successful development by linking the properties and creating a tourist attraction.

The shared vision is a park showing the history of the people of the Similkameen Valley and includes tourist services. Discussions between the Band and Town Council, scheduled for this week, will determine the exact nature of what will be built, but both parties agree the plan will include both native and non-native history.

"This is a good place to do it," Batini commented, "It is right across the river from where there was a native people's village long ago."

The project is large in scope and will require intensive research as

well as careful development, but both parties agree it should be done, although it will likely be done by stages.

Truck crashes

PRINCETON - At 10:00 p.m. on January 28, a tractor-trailer unit eastbound on Highway 3 at Similkameen Falls struck a rockface and B.C. Tel pole.

The driver, 38 year old Dale Anderson of Edmonton, Alberta, lost control while negotiating a right-hand curve on a light grade. The truck skidded across the road on the snow and collided with the rockface.

Anderson was not injured, but the unit had approximately \$10,000 damage.

Police believe speed relative to driving conditions was a factor, and issued Anderson a violation ticket for failure to keep right.

Victoria makes Forest Renewal changes

VICTORIA - After completing nearly \$2 billion in forest sector investments, Forest Renewal BC is changing its structure to become a smaller, more focused investment agency.

Forest Renewal BC chair Roger Stanyer said February 2 the restructuring completes the transition from the project-driven corporation set up in 1994 to a new, planning-based organization. Instead of thousands of annual projects managed by hundreds of Forest Renewal and partner staff, Stanyer said, this more efficient and strategic approach means a smaller number of contracts for longer terms delivered by fewer staff.

Ray Huey, Princeton's representative on Regional Health Board, had a different kind of announcement regarding Princeton General Hospital. The proposal regarding loss of acute care beds was sanctioned by the Community Health Advisory Committee on February 4 at a special meeting.

Huey said the Advisory Committee will be going to the public to talk about the Community Health Plan and will be looking for input. The plan must be complete by the end of June.

agency, with three distinct business units dedicated to accomplishing these objectives:

- investing in land-based activities
- assisting communities and workers in crisis

As an investment agency, Forest Renewal will provide funding to its partner groups to undertake forest renewal activities.

Forest Renewal BC chief execu-

tive officer Lee Doney said a smaller, more focused organization fits the current economic climate faced by the corporation. Forest Renewal's funding comes from stumpage fees paid by forest companies for the right to harvest timber on Crown land. Lower revenues from stumpage fee reductions and the current market downturn mean cuts in investment levels and a further decline in staff requirements.

Blakeburn coal project faces big problems

COALMONT - The proposed development of Blakeburn coal has been delayed. The owners of the small company which would have done the work was backed by a major British company, Rackwood, which has withdrawn its financial support.

The mining company was awaiting a mining permit, and has received it, but is unable to proceed at this time.

Upper Similkameen Indian Band (USIB) manager Philippe Batini says the band has been working with the developers in trying to establish the mine, and is disappointed in the way things have gone. USIB continues to assist the mining company in trying to find new backers, and in exploring possible local uses for the coal.

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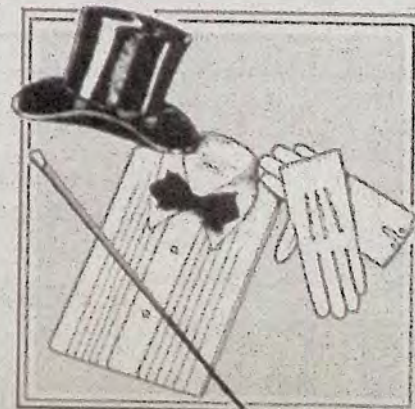

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Forest Service reports to public

PRINCETON - A public meeting hosted by Merritt Forest District was an opportunity to report on what is happening, and to present certificates of appreciation to many people for their assistance during the Tulameen fire of September 1998.

District manager Rod DeBoice told the gathering of 50 people, "There were enough extraordinary circumstances occurred in 1998 to justify having this meeting."

The Tulameen Fire

The Tulameen fire was one of those circumstances. It was rated as "extreme fire behaviour", moving 70-90 meters per minute, "unprecedented in the province, a fairly significant fire storm."

The cost of the fire was estimated at \$6.8 million, including the rehabilitation work "a daunting task itself."

One of the problems faced during the fire was the extreme levels of fuel that accompany natural old forests. Combined with high daily temperatures, lack of rainfall and a wind pushing it, the fire turned into a holocaust. Fuel management in the district is being re-evaluated in the wake of last year's experience.

The fire burnt 8,000 hectares of forest, 1,900 of which was two meter tall well-established plantation. The timber loss was 770,000 cubic meters, the equivalent of 22,000 truckloads of logs.

The area is closed to recreational use because falling snags pose a danger. Tree roots were burned away. Recreational use will be reconsidered in May or June.

CHBC is making a video of the fire which will be sold by Tulameen Community Club as a fundraiser.

Citizen appreciation

DeBoice thanked everyone for their help during the fire. Many people received certificates of appreciation, beginning with the

people of Tulameen.

"The community in Tulameen was incredible," DeBoice said, "Everybody pitched in and pulled together."

Trudy Parolin accepted on behalf of the people of Tulameen.

Presentations were made to the Parolins for their help, Myra Brewer, Neil and Loretta McDiarmid, Jordie and Dennis Cook, and Weyerhaeuser.

photo of the fire, and the message, "In recognition of a valued team member's effort and support in the fire operations on Lawless Fire 639."

Bug kill harvesting

The Mountain Pine Beetle infestation is expanding at 20 per cent per year, and the southern area has an epidemic situation. Harvest is increased by 18,000

truckloads over two years.

"If we don't increase the cut, we're never going to catch up to the beetles," DeBoice said.

The affected area covers 3,500 hectares or 3.3 million cubic meters.

A question from the audience showed concern over future harvest levels. DeBoice explained that current harvest levels could

be sustained for another 110 years. The increase in harvesting will reduce the number of years to 90, but as DeBoice pointed out, there are more trees growing in the meantime.

Reforestation of the bug kill sites will be paid for through an \$8.28 levy on stumpage designated specifically for those areas under the uplift project. However, there are no funds for the burned area, although grass and tree seed were dropped by air not long after the fire was out.

The meeting concluded with a video showing the Silver Creek fire near Salmon Arm and the Lawless Creek fire near Tulameen, including a view of Lawless Creek after the fire.

Your choice of a good time

On January 23, Princeton Concerts Society wound up their 1998/99 series with an excellent performance of music arranged for four saxophones. On stage were three of the original members of "Saxology", the closely-knit and widely acclaimed saxophone quartet from Winnipeg, who have been making music together since 1996.

Sasha Boychuk, Chuck McLelland and Shane Nestruck have now teamed with Julia Nolan from U.B.C. - she's adjunct professor of saxophone there. Julia is no stranger to the format of four saxes. She and her husband, David Brantner, are part of a west coast saxophone quartet based in Vancouver.

Saxology consider themselves fortunate to have attracted an associate who has already made a name for herself as a much sought after solo saxophonist, as well as working with CBC Jazz Orchestra, VSO, Vancouver New Music Society, and Vancouver Opera Orchestra.

Although ours was only the fifth time the new team had played together in public, it was obvious that an excellent rapport had already been established. Each player was very aware of what the others were up to, good-naturedly tossing musical exchanges back and forth, maybe surprising one another at times, but obviously delighted at the way things were working out. And they delighted us!

Shane Nestruck introduced the musicians, drawing our attention to the way the saxophone can be made to sound like a cello (as in the introduction to "William Tell" by Rossini) or like an organ (Bach's "Tocata and Fugue" was the example).

We celebrated Gershwin with "Liza" and "Lady Be Good", enjoyed a traditional Bulgarian chant, Latin jazz, Oliver Nelson's "Don't Stand Up", Brubeck's "Blue Rondo a la Turk" and Chopin's "Minute Waltz".

Joplin's "Maple Leaf Rag" celebrated our Canadian heritage, Bach's "Air on a G String" showcased the tenor sax, and piano virtuoso John Kamora Parker's rendition of Chopin's Nocturne Op.7 #1 showed how Chopin can sound like Bach.

Whatever style of music they were presenting the group gave it all they had. By the time the Big Band Medley came along, the audience was definitely "in the Mood" and did not need much encouragement to join in. This saxophone quartet knows what entertainment is all about.

Although this last season the Concerts Society has offered lively, entertaining performances by first class artists at a very reasonable price, Concert Chair Madelon Schouten informed the audience, with regret, that not enough season's tickets had been sold to cover all expenses, leaving a small deficit can be expected despite strict economical management.

Let's look at the figures for PGH acute care beds

The problem at Princeton General Hospital with the numbers in the acute care beds is this: they leave us wondering whether they add up. We need to ask a few questions about the way they add up and why using the beds makes a deficit. We have been promised a public meeting where some of these questions will be answered, so let's ask the questions.

If we take away eight acute care beds and turn those eight beds into alternative care beds, does that beat the deficit? Will the hospital receive more money per patient if patients occupy a bed called something else? Certainly, more alternative care beds do not add up to fewer staff? Surely it does not change the picture so long as there are still ten acute care beds? What's in a name when you are sick and need a bed?

What about the situations with which our hospital contends in flu season and in tourist traffic season? What about those times when all of the beds are in use and the emergency room beds are occupied by acute care patients? It is a funny thing about people - they do not schedule accidents and illnesses for times when lots of beds are empty.

One of the questions we would like answered is this: when somebody decided we use up our hospital beds at a rate unjustified by our small population, did somebody include the extras from out of area who use our beds, such as the summer residents, the accident victims, and our good folks from Hedley, who voted to be included with Princeton but were ignored?

If fewer people use our hospital beds, will that solve the deficit problem? Are we supposed to refuse care to people because our allowance from Regional Health Board is not adequate? Just what is the problem at Princeton General Hospital that makes it so hard for us to add it up?

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Health care alert letter

Dear Editor;

The citizens of Princeton have shown that we are committed to saving our health care system. We have sent thousands of letters to provincial and federal politicians, we have attended public meetings regarding health care; filling to capacity the Okanagan-Similkameen Regional Health Board meetings that were held in Princeton. We have shown repeatedly that we are interested and insist on being included in the process of changes being made to the health care in our community.

Citizens of Princeton and surrounding area, health care workers, support service workers and staffs have been excluded from meaningful dialogue, debate and discussion about the changes being made to our hospital and community service support. It seems the meetings we have attended, the concerns we have raised have been answered with platitudes and the Board's agenda has continued on with little or no consideration given to our ideas. What a sham!

Thousands of dollars have been spent on gathering material and data for reports, such as the one done by Mr. Klippert, Mr. Burroughs, et al. These people have collected data, analyzed it and on these basis have come up with ideas like cutting acute care beds at Princeton General Hospital, centralizing services so it would be provided from Penticton or Kelowna, at supposedly less cost.

What variables have been included in this data? ... the cost of job loss in Princeton? The data is incomplete and bias especially when it doesn't include sitting down with the workers in each department and asking them for ideas on how to cut costs or change the way things are done to be more cost efficient. It takes an "expert" coming in at billable

hours to tell the employees how best to do their jobs in a cost effective manner?

I suggest the data is suspect; the way it is being used and secondly, I suggest the context in which it is being analyzed is biased. Statistics can be made to come out in a particular way depending on the original question hypothesized and the number and type of variables taken into account.

I wonder how many employees PGH or at Princeton and District Community Services have had meaningful input into the process? Bad data can skew results and when asked questions about it the number cruncher can answer blissfully, "but the data shows we need to cut the budget".

I have heard, (so I admit this is hearsay), that home care for a couple of people has been reduced so drastically that a couple of these people ended up in the hospital for an extended period, (past the 3-day utilization rate quota) at a huge cost to our hospital and of course, raising our utilization figures. If adequate home care had been provided, these people may have managed at home at a fraction of the cost to the system. Where is the saving in that decision?

I implore Mayor and Town Council, Community Health Advisory Board and the citizens of Princeton to call for a public inquiry into: a) the allocation and immediate distribution by the provincial government of funds required for the level of health care we deserve, (b) the request that the Okanagan-Similkameen Regional Health Board provide a public forum, open to all, to discuss the impending changes, how those decisions came to be made; health care issues critical to Princeton. These changes should not be "fait accompli" without this discussion.

Princeton has a lot of smart, committed people willing to give some practical, reasonable ideas which I think need to be heard by the Regional Board. The Board needs to start listening and acting on our behalf as well as that of Penticton and Kelowna. Princeton Hospital is always compared by the Regional Board to other small town hospitals and I understand their job is tough enough without having to profile in detail small hospitals in the region. However, the least the Board could do is look into data that has been collected and put it into a context defined by the people who work at the hospital. A framework of change must include meaningful input by the people who work in the system, otherwise an enforced change, without ownership, will fall down like a house of cards. This happened in Manitoba, and they are now pumping millions of dollars into their health care system to rectify the effects of the same kind of regionalization problems. The cost to the taxpayers, in the end, is far more, than if we allow some real power at the local level to have real input into making decisions about our own health care.

I can tell you from personal experience that, as excellent as the staff at the hospital is, and as hard as they work, and as they keep going under assault after assault from one corner or another, the patient care is slipping, which is the main issue. The standard once held proudly by Princeton General Hospital is impossible to uphold under present circumstances and patients are feeling the effects. As a community, we need to support our health care and support care workers or we will one day be in need of their help and it won't be there.

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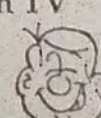
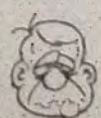

Tell the world who you are, where you are, what you do, what you have, and why they should do business with you. Any time you find a method of promotion that works well, do more of it.

NEVER STOP PROMOTING

People love to hear interesting things. Recall the opening lines when you meet a friend or stranger; What's new? What's happening? What do you do? There is a theme here. The problem for most of us is that our definition of what is new and/or interesting is based on the length of time we have dealt with the issue. Old hat to you can be radical news to someone else.

At one time I had run the same

advertisement in the same paper for ten years. Over that time I got calls every week asking me why I hadn't put an ad in that paper before. Supposedly the reader had been looking for my service for 'years'. They only saw the ad when they were ready to act.

Promotion does not have to involve spending money. Every form and size of media has to fill the empty spaces between the advertisements. It is far easier to get your promotional information in than you could possibly believe. Get the editor or reporter interested and they want to tell the story. Don't forget clubs and organizations are always looking for speakers on interesting topics. Show up with the information and you become their 'expert'. The only limit to the ability to promote effectively is your imagination and willingness to recognize and seize opportunities.

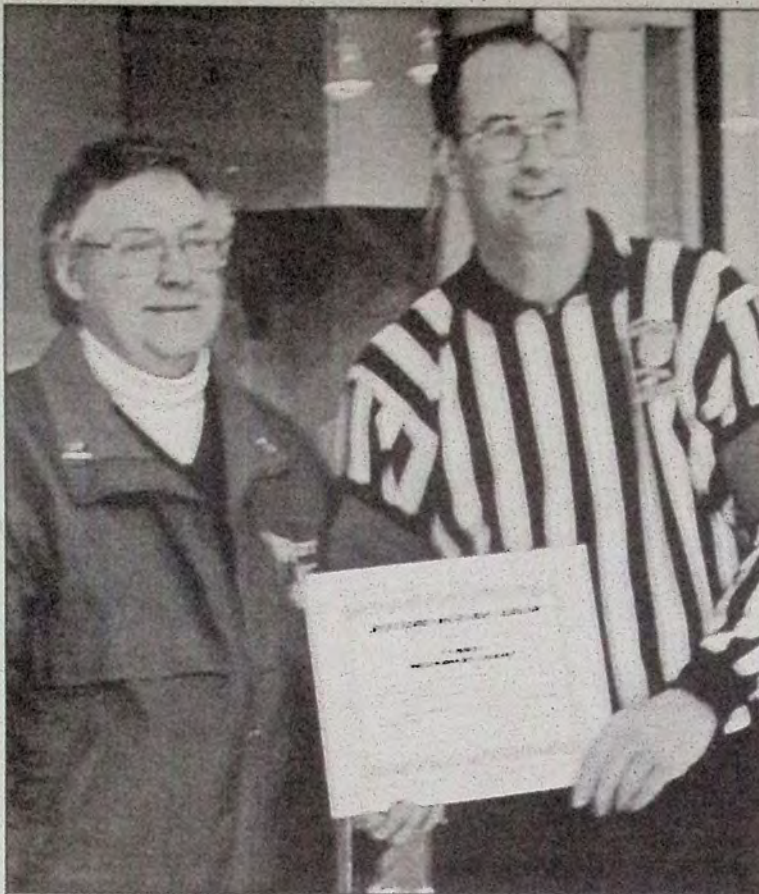
"Without this kind of person, minor hockey doesn't exist," Berg said.

Truck flips near Hedley

HEDLEY - A 1971 GMC flat deck driven by 43 year old Renee Lariviere of Hedley flipped near the Stirling Creek bridge on Highway 3 west of Hedley.
