## Grey Fox robs mayor

PRINCETON - Bill Miner crashed the community breakfast held in the early morning hours of March 12.

It was billed as a public event, but he was one member of the public not expected to appear. The Grey Fox and his gang held up the Welby Stage as it pulled up to Castle Restaurant. The stagecoach, the only remaining authentic stagecoach in the world, carried Mayor Randy McLean and Miss Kitty, a flamboyant woman of questionable ladyship. Miner ordered the surrender of all of the mayor's revenues, which were rapidly turned over by a chicken-livered lawyer whose name we do not choose to publish.

Having obtained the loot, Miner and his gang rode off into the sunrise, half-heartedly pursued by

the world's slowest posse.

The mayor, Miss Kitty, the lawyer and the fifty or more witnesses enthusiastically applauded the performance done by local horsemen who often re-enact this piece of local history.

The breakfast continued on schedule, with Lyle Thomas as chair. ## Pay now at Forest Service camps

VICTORIA - Camping at Forest Service campgrounds stopped being free on Saturday, March 13. The good news is the campgrounds will not be closed.

Effective April 1, 1999, campers must hold a camping pass to stay overnight at a Forest Service campground. An annual pass will cost \$27 (\$22 for seniors) and will allow an individual, a family or group of up to six persons to stay overnight at Forest Service campgrounds. Single night camping passes will be available for \$8 per night for campers who do not wish to purchase an annual camping pass.

At a few heavily used campgrounds where security and extra

maintenance are needed, a fee of \$10 per night will be charged to pay for these services. For those who have annual passes, the fee will be just \$5.00. All funds raised by the fees will go directly into maintenance of the Forest Service campgrounds, according to the Ministry.

Fees collected at provincial park campgrounds will remain in the provincial parks system to maintain interpretive programs, camping facilities and security. Fees will range from \$8 per night for a basic service campsite to \$18.50 per night in high-use campgrounds with flush toilets, showers and interpretive programs. The new parks fees came into

effect March 13.

Forest Service campgrounds are rustic facilities with outdoor toilets, fire pits and picnic tables. They are reached mostly by Forest Service or logging roads. These campgrounds differ from the BC Parks campgrounds, which often include shower and toilet facilities, firewood, a reservation service and educational facilities, and are located within provincial parks.

Forest Service camping passes will be available for purchase at government agent offices and from some maintenance contractors on site.

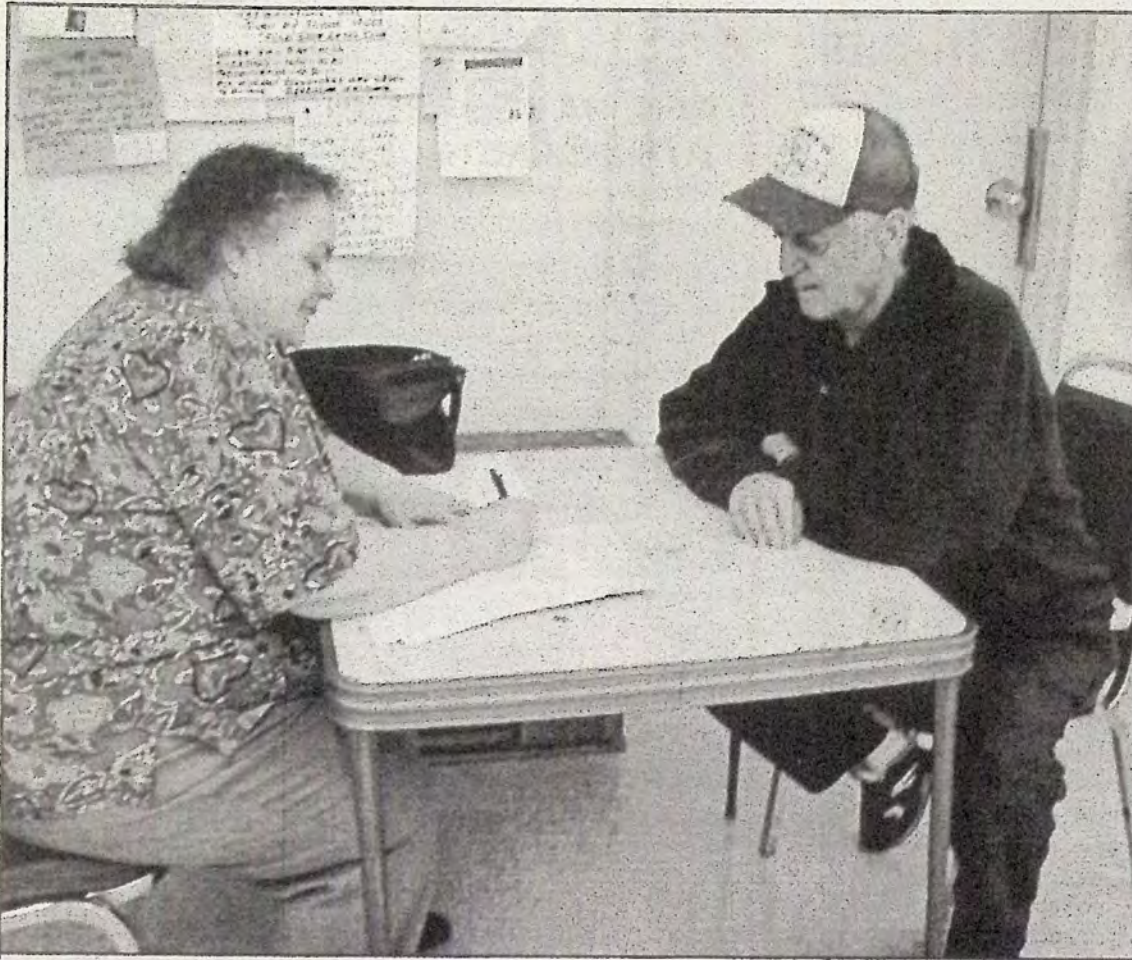

## Naturalists climb to Keremeos Columns

On March 6, a sturdy group of 20 naturalists trudged through a couple of feet of snow to reach the Keremeos Columns, those huge crystals of basaltic rock on the mountain high above Keremeos. There was no snow in the valley, but as we trudged up the road, it grew deeper, and had it not been for our tough trail breakers, Sandy and Bill Spring, and Lisa, some of us might not have reached our goal. As we climbed, the valley spread out below us, and the huge K-shaped slide on the mountain south of the town shone white in the sun, as did the Cathedral Mountains far off down the river. There were few signs of wildlife, but we had a good stiff hike to get us into shape for the summer. The scenery was magnificent. Princeton is a wonderful area to engage in North America's fastest growing outdoor recreation - the observation of birds. Over 250 species have been counted in the area, from golden eagles to rufous hummingbirds. When you are able to recognize a number of species and apply names to them,

each bird you see seems like an old friend. You are hooked on 'birding' as devotees call the sport. You can observe at your back yard feeder, or pack your binoculars in your car, or hike the woods with a lunch, and add each new species you see to your list. Such information and experience will be offered by Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists, who are sponsoring a Bird Identification Course beginning on April 7.

The next rip on Sunday, March 21, will combine a survey of the migrating birds at Vaseaux Lake, with a moderate climb up MacIntyre Bluff, which looms over the lake, and which may offer views of mountain sheep. No dogs, please. Call Madelon Schouten at 295-7078 if you plan to join the group, and meet at Princeton bus depot at 8:00 a.m.

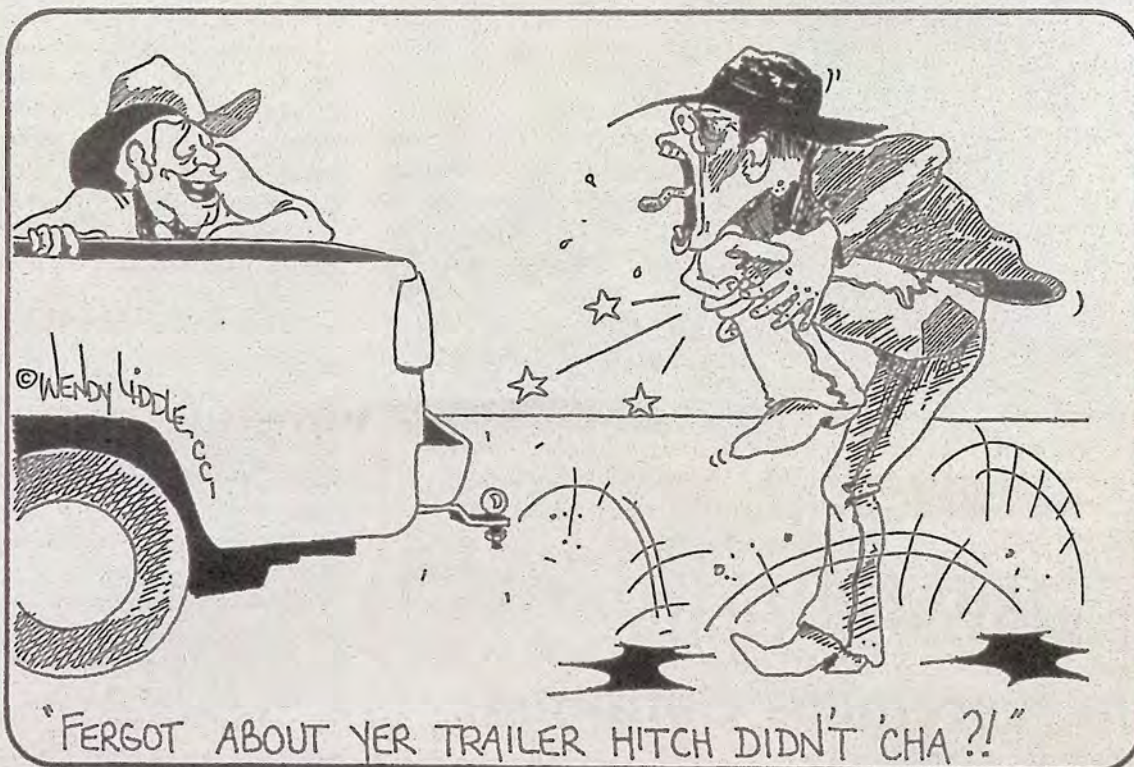

When he had money, he shared it with widows and orphans and others who were down on their luck. His generosity and good manners made him part of the community. As a community-minded citizen, Miner won many friends and was welcome in most homes.

Okay, so he robbed a train. Think about him, a man who had emerged out of the War Between the States, who drifted west, penniless, without a home or family to sustain him. He could not go down to the local social assistance office and receive money on which to live. Instead, he robbed stage coaches. He never killed anyone.

When he came out of prison, he moved here and did what he could to earn a living. He had two other men depending on him -- his partners. They made very little money. Times were tough. Moving horses around the country was hard, cold labour, and none of them were young anymore. So they robbed a train (losses covered by insurance even back then) and shared the wealth.

Today, we have people who live on the bounty of the taxpayer and do no work, contribute nothing to their community, and if what we see in court is an indication, many of these freebooters rob hard-working local people whose losses are not covered by insurance.

We could say Bill Miner collected "western welfare" and spread it around to the needy.

### Lali asks for more input

Dear Editor;

Re: letter and article on Princeton Hospital beds - Ridgewood Lodge extension

I hope the News Leader intends on following up the story about the Ridgewood Lodge Expansion with some detail on the differences between a hospital setting and a facility designed to provide extended care for residents requiring it. I know you will find a great deal of difference between the two.

As to the total number of beds funded in Princeton, I am aware of the great interest in the issue expressed by Princeton residents. I am keeping informed of the questions raised by local residents and I - through my staff - have asked the Health Region to investigate those concerns. They have assured me that they will and I know that Princeton residents will enforce that agreement.

I am pleased to note that the organizers of the movement to divert more health care dollars into the hands of the medical community (physicians on call) are stepping into the breach to demand further funding in Princeton. I am somewhat disturbed, however, that they appear to be putting up an argument against improving extended care accommodation in favour of other services in the community.

Surely the discussion should be around improving all available services and making the best

possible use of our limited health care resources, as opposed to taking the promise of badly needed facilities away from persons who are least able to advocate for themselves. Health care practitioners and support staff have access to effective lobby groups and are also represented on both the Regional and Community Health bodies. Health care patients, or potential patients, have representation as well, and are able to attend the meetings called by those boards. Extended care patients need the support of everyone.

Please continue to be involved in the health care planning process in Princeton. It may

seem frustrating, it is often a little scary, but it would be a lot less effective and a lot more difficult without the input, advice and direction of all concerned. While we are spending fully one-third of our provincial budget on health care, it needs the careful oversight of all of us to ensure that money is wisely spent and fully accounted for.

In the meantime, I shall keep on top of the issues raised by the community and attempt to have answers brought to the questions you pose.

### How can we vote?

Jim Hart says he believes the people in B.C. want the native land claim issue resolved with a fair and affordable agreement that promotes the rights of both aboriginals and non-aboriginals, and that there should be a referendum for all people to vote on.

Firstly, with the secrecy of the negotiations of the Nisga'a Agreement for self-government, etc. I have to question how it could be possible for the citizens of B.C. to vote on Bill 51 when they have no knowledge of its contents. All the public have been exposed to is sheer propaganda, not true facts of the agree-

ment.

I have videotaped all of the debates in the Legislature to date and the thrust of this treaty as a template for another 60 such native bands to accept is absolute discrimination against everyone in this province except band chiefs and councils. The most complaints about this bill come from the native band members who have been kept in the dark and disagree with it.

What Jim Hart should be promoting is a national referendum on the federal government's Bill C49, which is the Native Land Management Agreement and Land Code. Continued on P. 7

# Are small towns being abandoned?

Dear Editor;  
Are small towns being abandoned? Are we all to move to the cities?

Who, in this town and district, isn't upset with the possible loss of acute beds at our hospital? So, now that everyone's on board, how do we keep the ship afloat?

If I've got it right, the reason we could be losing some acute beds at our hospital is because of over-utilization - we're using the beds too much. In that case, if they remained empty most of the time, would we then keep them? If we need them, they're scrapped, and if we don't need them, we can keep them. Nonsense.

If the bottom line in health care is expenditure of money (or lack of it) then how many dollars will be saved by axing these beds? If the Princeton beds are being more than utilized and they're not going to be in Princeton anymore, where will these patients be treated? In Penticton and Kelowna, of course. Ten new beds in Ridgewood Lodge will look after ten people in a year, but how many patients over the same period of time will be accommodated in ten acute beds at our hospital? Many times more.

Princeton is situated at the outer perimeter of our Okanagan Similkameen Health Region. We are the farthest community from the hub of our geographic area. We all know what this means: for many, many medical services we already have to travel and be treated in the Okanagan. Now, the powers that be are proposing to rob us of even more local medical services. In other words, "suck the hind tit, you're the scrawny pup in the litter."

If these cuts come about, the very elderly and infirm will suffer by possibly having to be shipped by ambulance to Penticton if acute beds are not available in our hos-

pital. Many of our elderly citizens can't drive anymore and rely on others for transport. Why should more of our ill people be stranded from their friends and loved ones? And what about our infants and children? Are they to be driven to Penticton when no beds are available here? Anyone living here, or visiting and travelling in the vicinity of Princeton, and needing medical attention, could be vulnerable to delays in treatment which might mean the difference between living and dying.

I'm sure that everyone who lives in this town knows someone who has moved to a larger centre to be close to more sophisticated med-

ical services. Cutting our local health care would drive more people from our community and definitely would not entice new families to reside here.

Everybody must get on side in this fight to maintain the quality of our medical care in this town. We can all sign petitions and demand we have a public forum or rally on this vital issue. If necessary, we must take to the streets with placards flying and get our dander up.

Possibly the media outside of our town will then take notice and expose the whole insane issue.

I explained the donations of \$212,000 which went into the common area, which encompasses the lounge, dining area and kitchen. BC Housing does not provide money for common areas. emphasized that \$212,000 was a huge amount of money for a small community to raise. I especially mentioned the wonderful donation of \$100,000 from the Rebekah Housing Society. All of this was edited and cut from in the interview.

- 2) make a point of ensuring credit is given to the generous people and groups who helped make this project a reality.

I have videotaped the debates in the House of Commons on that Bill and have a copy of it as well. The 14 native bands named in that Bill include the Musqueam, Westbank and Squamish First Nations. Jim merely recommended amendments, along with other Opposition MPs. The 155 Liberals run into Parliament to vote against any amendments and outnumber the opponents to Bill C49.

Even the Native Women's Council are suing the Federal Liberals for discrimination against the band members, leaseholders and non-natives alike by not protecting their rights. Unless senators can stop Bill C49, there could be many such lawsuits to follow.

When Bill C49 is ratified, all 650 Native bands will have the power given to band chiefs and council members to make laws that will be above every law in Canada, both provincially and federally. It is designed to literally abolish the Canadian Constitution and the Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

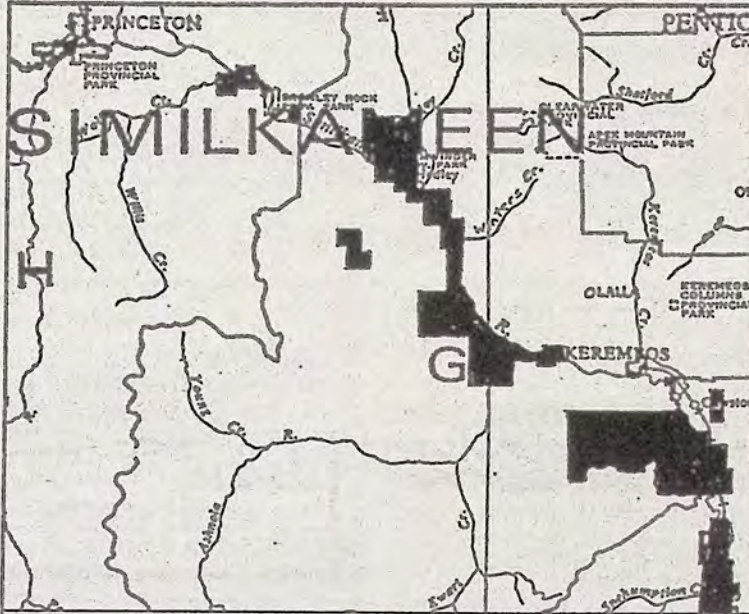

# Keremeos Municipal Council

KEREMEOS - Though the first non-aboriginal residents settled here in the 1800s, the Village of Keremeos wasn't incorporated until 1956. It now has a population of 1,167 (according to a 1996 census) and is governed by a Municipal Council comprised of a Mayor and 4 Councillors. Supported by provincial funding and local tax dollars, Council, among other things, helps provide some basic services to Village residents and helps co-ordinate action on constituent and area concerns.

Mayor J.C.Stranart, as Chief Executive Officer for the Village, chairs Village Council meetings, is an appointed Director on the Regional District Board, recommends by-laws, establishes standing committees and much more. The four Councillors, Jeremy Evans, Mark Gurevitch, Steve Hecoeks, and Arden Holley, attend council meetings and are appointed by the Mayor to act as liaisons with or serve on regional or local committees that are comprised of area residents and reflect such public concerns as Native Relations, Economic Development, Recreation and Similkameen River Planning, to name a few.

Council has a Chief Administrative Officer, Eileen Oliver-Bauer, hired to be responsible for the overall management of Municipal Administration.

Keremeos Municipal Council holds its regular, open to the public, meetings on the first and third Monday of each month at 7:00 p.m. in Council Chambers, lower level of Victory Hall. Any time changes are posted on the bulletin board in the Victory Hall foyer and in the newspaper. Council also holds In-Camera meetings (not open to the public) to deal with confidential issues--personnel, land, legal, etc. . . Municipal Council is elected every 3 years by all Keremeos residents, 18 yrs. or older. The next election will be November 20, 1999.

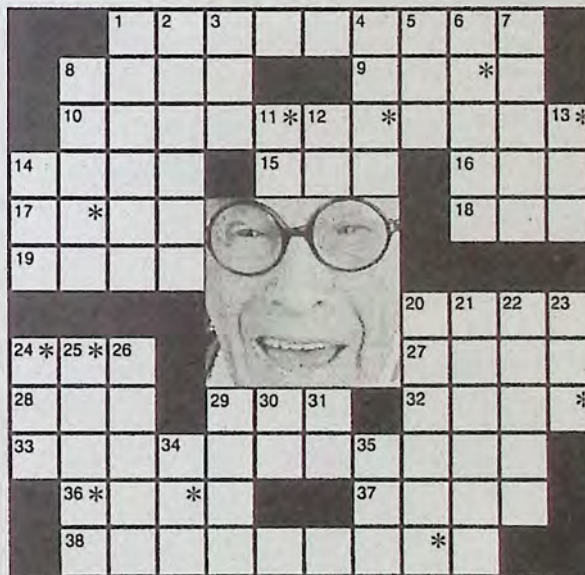

# Mines say fixed taxes are too steep

VANCOUVER - The Mining Association of B.C. says a recent study of operating mines in B.C. show fixed taxes have increased more than 260 per cent between

1990 and 1998. These are taxes that increase the costs of mining in B.C. and reduce the ability of mines to compete with mineral suppliers in other jurisdictions.

of the Mining Association. "To keep BC from losing out to its competitors in other provinces and other countries, we must become a more competitive mining jurisdiction. This means reducing the high rate of taxation and cutting red tape. We will be watching the next provincial budget for relief from some of these onerous costs."

In less than 10 years, annual fixed taxes - which includes sales tax, water rental fees and licenses, capital taxes, and fuel taxes - have gone up by an average of \$14,126,500 for the mines in the study. During the same 8-year period, 14 mines in the province have closed while only seven new mines have opened.

The study was conducted in January 1999 of a coal mine and a metal mine and averaged to give an indication of the overall impact of the increases in fixed taxes. The averaged fixed taxes for 1990 was \$5,433, and for 1998 the total averaged fixed taxes amounted to \$19,559.
