

B.C. expects floods in southwest

VICTORIA - Cathy McGregor, Minister of Environment, Lands and Parks, has updated flood preparedness since the April 1 snowpack survey. The snowpack, water levels and weather continue to indicate flooding could occur across southern B.C. in May or June.

The snowpack for the Similkameen Valley averages 37 per cent above normal, with no significant melt at mid-elevations due to continuing cool weather. Emergency Services have had meetings in both Keremeos and Princeton (see page 8 for Keremeos planning). Tulameen has had a meeting to discuss preparedness. The News Leader will have more recommendations in next week's issue, as it has become clear that it is the Similkameen River which is likely to cause the most problems, not

only in the south Similkameen Valley, but around Princeton as well.

There will be new, decisive readings taken on May 1 and 15, but if the cool spring weather continues, the flood potential will become greater. The less snow that melts now, the greater the likelihood of sudden high temperatures causing a massive run-off due to all of the mid-elevation and upper elevation snow melting at the same time. A gradual melt with no prolonged warm spells could result in a run-off where rivers are high but below damaging levels.

Provincial Emergency Program is increasing the inventory of sandbags to 5.5 million bags, and placing mobile sandbag-filling machines in Kamloops, Osoyoos,

Logger injured in Kelowna crash

At approximately 7:45 a.m. on April 9, Dave Kerfoot was taking a load of logs over to Kelowna when the truck he was driving crossed into the southbound lane near Boucherie Road and hit a truck. The logging truck continued across the oncoming lane and over the bank, dragging two vehicles with it.

One of the vehicles was a van in which the driver was trapped for an hour. Logging equipment was called to the scene to prevent the logs crushing the van. The driver had no serious injuries.

Kerfoot was trapped in the cab of the logging truck for two hours. According to Wayne Schnitzler,

Westbank Fire Chief, the cab was caved in around Kerfoot, and had to be ripped away from him in order to remove him from the cab. Kerfoot's injuries were not life-threatening. He was taken to Kelowna Regional Hospital for treatment.

As of Friday afternoon, no cause of the accident had been determined.

Crook steals dog

PRINCETON - In the early morning hours of Sunday, April 11, a thief broke into the dog pound and stole a dog locked within the building located behind the town yard. The thief removed a brick in the side wall of the building then cut open the fencing to allow the dog to escape. Property damage is estimated at \$200.

On April 10, police responded to a break and enter in Coalmont. A thief entered through a bathroom window and stole a Sony radio and Sanyo tape deck. The residence was unoccupied during the past month.

Commissioner touts Similkameen

SIMILKAMEEN VALLEY - Movies are worth money. Mark Flett, Commissioner for the Okanagan Similkameen Film Commission, attended the April 6 meeting of Princeton Town Council to explain what he is doing to promote the film industry in the Similkameen Valley. He pointed out that the film *Shegalla*, shot in the Keremeos area last September, dropped a quarter of a million dollars into the Okanagan and Similkameen economy, and it was a low budget movie.

In 1998, movies contributed \$808 million to the B.C. economy, Flett told Town Council. There were 171 productions, of which 117 were Canadian. Most of the money went to the lower mainland area, and Flett wants to see more money spent in the Okanagan Similkameen this year. Flett showed Council some locations files. These are file folders with photographs and descriptions of locations for filming. He has assembled 750 to 800 such files, with room for more. In addition, many of the locations are

shown in a full colour brochure of what Flett offers film companies in his region, which includes all of the Okanagan, Similkameen and Kettle Valley/Boundary. This material proves to film makers that the Commission is well-organized and geared to attracting the film business. The outstanding brochure was taken to trade shows in Los Angeles, Banff,

New York and Vancouver as part of Flett's promotion. He is now receiving inquiries.

The Okanagan Similkameen Film Commission is funded by HRDC until November. Flett told Council the Commission needs \$150,000 per year to continue, and he will be going to regional districts and municipalities for funding for the next year.

Debts listed in the letter from the receiver totalled half a million dollars.

PRINCETON - The second annual Rodeo Club Heritage Dinner was the second annual success. The food was good, the company was fun, and guest speaker Hugh McLennan was a hoot.

Mayor Randy McLean gave a warm welcome to everyone, praising the Rodeo Club for their "great idea."

Stan Thompson told a delighted audience about how he sold Mayor McLean some pre-dug post holes.

Following dinner, certificates recognizing longtime members of the ranching community were awarded to Ted and Katie Worthington, Dan Rice, Bill and Bernice Cromarty, Jack Powell, John Bey, and in absentia Gene and Edith Rice. The honoured ranchers and cowboys from 1998 were recognized with applause.

The ranching industry has been a source of economic stability for the Similkameen Valley for the past 100 years. The recognition is well-deserved. Many ranchers have worked for "cash money" in logging and mining to sustain the ranch, or, as John Bey puts it "to support the habit."

Brenda Crimmon, who was honoured last year, remarked one day, "The way things are going, the ranches might be all we have left to depend on."

Hugh McLennan took the floor and told so many jokes people had trouble stopping their laughter before the next joke. He recited a poem about how a cowboy shops for a bra, and joked about how to cure crossed eyes in a bull. McLennan seemed to have an endless supply of cowboy and rancher jokes and poems, along with some of the philosophy that makes his "Spirit of the West" show so popular. It should be noted that his wife is an exceptionally good sport about the

jokes.

There was a good turnout to the dinner of 128.

One local businessman commented, "Anybody who's anybody in this town is here tonight." One of the "who's who" was Bob Pelly, who was honoured last year, and spent time serving cake this year. It was Bob's birthday, and he was given a cake, a song, a knife to cut the cake, and a stack of dishes on which to serve it.

The loonie auction put Master of Ceremonies Dean Stinson to work, along with the bucket handlers and spotters. The loonies clinked into the buckets just as fast as Dean could make the count. He did an excellent job as auctioneer, keeping the loonies and toonies on the move for three

hours.

Items for auction included art prints, hay, a lamp, golf balls, manure, jeans, jackets, stud service, boots, many small items and refreshments, all donated by local businesses (including a Penticton business). 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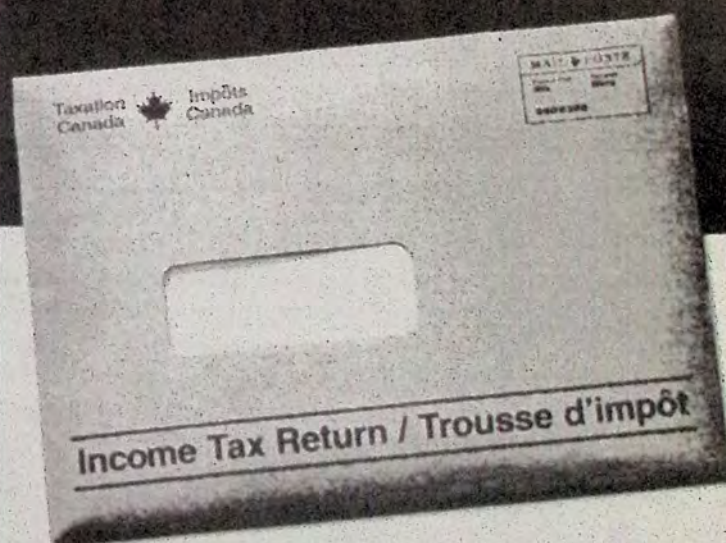

RCMP issue party warning

Princeton RCMP report that spring complaints heard every year have begun. RCMP are trying to resolve issues so everyone is satisfied but would like cooperation from the public.

Several complaints were received of dirtbikes riding on the

railbed around town. This is not illegal if the bikes are driven safely and not on the highway, but riders are asked to show consideration for residents living in homes near the trail. Common courtesy demands riders continue on to a secluded area so as not to prevent others enjoying peace and quiet. These bikes are noisy and disruptive.

Police received complaints of kids hanging around downtown and around banks after school. This tends to make people leary. Police ask any large groups to move to parks where they can meet without disturbing others. There has been a good response from the young people.

Police request people use garbage cans for refuse to keep our town looking nice.

On the illegal side, bush party season has begun again. Police realize these events take place but ask anyone who is attending to remember common courtesy and common sense. Drinking under age is illegal and police will take action if minors are found in the presence of alcohol. Drinking and driving will be monitored. Bush parties often start fires. Monitor

the fire season to ensure there is not a ban, and ensure fires are contained.

RCMP remind the public that we live in an area where there is lots of available firewood and there is no need to steal fences or pallets. Police have had complaints of pallets stolen from a wood manufacturer and from a homeowner who has lost approximately \$100 worth of fencing. Remnants of the fence were found in firepits by the Similkameen River. There is plenty of scrap wood lying around and no need to destroy private property!

From April 19 to 23, local volunteer representatives of the White Ribbon Campaign will be on Princeton's streets seeking commitment from other Princeton men to stop the violence against women. A national, non-profit, non-partisan organization, the White Ribbon Campaign is an alliance of men who have renounced the use of violence in their relationships with women. Men will be asked to show their support for the principles by signing their names to the poster.

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Helpers learn how

People want to help. Approximately 32 people turned out to the Elks Hall on April 8 to volunteer to learn how to assist in an emergency or disaster. A number of volunteers were from Tulameen and Coalmont, people who had lived through emergencies and disasters in the 1995 flood and the 1998 fire.

Dan Kastor and Earl Driver, of Emergency Social Services, with George McKnight from Red Cross in Kamloops, signed up and trained volunteers in Level 1, the handling or registrations of victims of disaster, and responding to concerns of victims and their relatives and/or friends.

The two-hour session involved volunteers in the basics of completing Emergency Social Services file forms which tell authorities information about victims and their families and

describe what their needs are as a result of the emergency situation. Completing the forms is the first step toward receiving assistance for those who find themselves without the basics: food, shelter, clothing, transportation, personal hygiene items, medical help, and pet care.

The trained volunteers may be asked to work at Emergency Social Services Registration Centres during local emergency or disaster situations.

The next session will be supervision in disaster. This session will include volunteers from all of the Similkameen Valley, Tulameen area and Merritt area. It will be an eight-hour, high pressure, full day of training in problem-solving and decision-making. Trainers hope to give the course by June at the latest.

He walks to tell others

Stretching saved his life

Jacques Gauthier, now age 60, faced worse than death - long years as an invalid in pain.

He owned a heavy equipment parts business near Montreal when he became ill in 1981. He kept working for nine years as his disease, vasculitis, slowly disabled him. He was on medication, steroids, cortisone and prednisone.

His disease caused the small arteries to shrink. No nourishment reached his muscles and nerves. His left arm was totally useless and numbness was creeping up his feet and his right hand. There was no cure. Gauthier sold his business. Then his doctor told him the steroids had caused a 20 per cent bone loss, and in years to come, there would be more bone loss and Gauthier would not be able to walk. Jacques Gauthier had plenty of time to lie in bed and think. He decided to go off the steroids. As a result of quitting suddenly, he was afflicted with arthritis in every joint in his body.

He was in agony. He prayed and meditated. He promised God that if any way could be found to lead

a normal life again, he would share it with others.

Gauthier heard of a man who taught arthritic people to reduce pain by stretching exercises. For three weeks, he worked with the man, then went home to do it himself. When he went home, about 50 per cent of the pain was gone. Six months later, Gauthier was free of pain!

They sold their home and bought a motor home. Gauthier is walking across Canada to tell people how to help themselves achieve better health. He gave the News Leader his video, called Stretching, available from Videomatic in Vancouver 1-800-665-1469.

The stretching is great. Nobody has to stretch until it hurts. The stretching will exercise 95 per cent of the muscles in the body. The best part is this: the next day, a couple of us old fogies who did it were not stiff and sore.

Winners forget they're in a race: they just love running.

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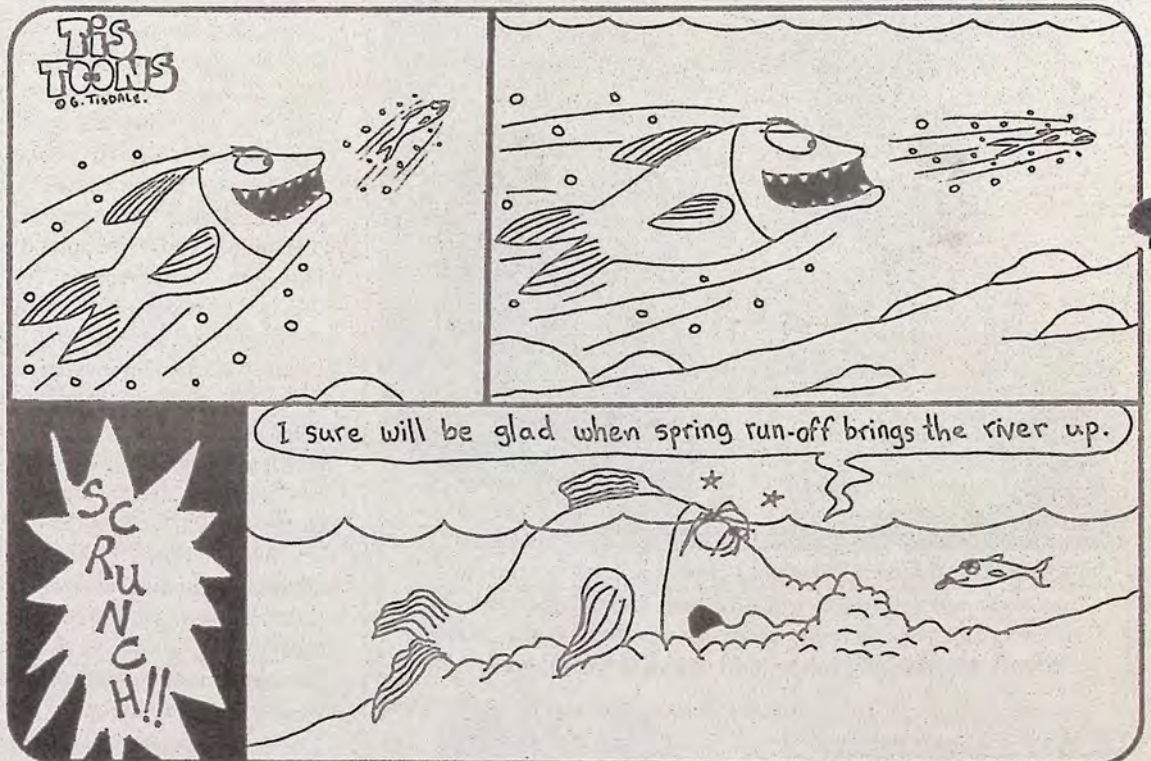
Princeton has faced difficult times during the past two years and yet, the citizens deserve credit for their optimism and persistence. In the face of one economic disaster after another, local citizens have chosen to build for the future.

The Museum Society, blessed with the gift of an outstanding fossil collection, is into the initial stages of planning a new wing on the museum building to display the fossils. It is their hope that the building will attract enough visitors to pay for the project and an employee to greet the visitors and maintain the display. They hope the completed wing will be enough of an attraction to draw visitors on a steady basis and provide more income for businesses in Princeton and area.

The Golf Club, having increased its membership and greens use during the past few years, has decided to expand the course from nine holes to eighteen holes. Thanks to their confidence in the project and their generosity, an impressive number of local people have volunteered their time, equipment and expertise to clearing the land, contouring the course to design specifications, and expanding the clubhouse, to the tune of half a million dollars plus.

Work began last week on leveling the higher area, where structures will be built in the future to illustrate dwellings of the aboriginal people who once had a village at the confluence of the Tulameen and Similkameen Rivers, and to illustrate the dwellings and outbuildings of the early non-native residents of the valley.

These builders for the future deserve congratulations and support for their refusal to lie down and let the town die.

SIMILKAMEEN - In anticipation of possible flooding in the region, the South Similkameen Emergency Social Services Organization met at SESS on Wed. March 24 to share, learn and prepare. Cheryle Hendbee, acting Director, opened the meeting and welcomed guests and members including Keremeos Municipal Emergency Coordinator Bob Stanley, Keremeos Emergency Coordinator retired Ed Leaf, Hedley Fire Chief Derick Lily, and Herb Newman of Citizens on Patrol (COPS). The Emergency Social Services Organization (ESS), formed over seven years ago, covers Olalla, Hedley, Keremeos and Cawston, and has about 15 members. They would like one more member from Olalla. Though this key group is being trained to know what to do in an emergency, such as fire or flood, and will be able to set up emergency reception locations for evacuees, they also need the general public to educate and prepare themselves and to help out where required. Cheryle displayed and explained the Emergency Social Services Kit used to set up an emergency reception area. The kits cost \$950 each and contain large signs, emergency hats and jackets, forms and office supplies.

SESS and Cawston Hall are two areas already designated as emergency reception buildings where displaced people can register and apply for necessary accommodation, clothing and food. ESS is hoping to arrange a reception area in Hedley as well. The BC Govt. emergency funding for displaced persons will cover basic needs for the first 72 hours. Almost all area businesses have been approached to sign on to a supplier's list. Evacuees are given forms

from the ESS reception area stating that they qualify for govt. assistance. They take these forms and get what they need from local businesses on the suppliers list. Businesses send the form and receipt to the BC Govt. for reimbursement.

Bob Stanley explained to the group that the snow pack is 115% above average this year. A lot of property, mostly rural, doesn't have a diking system. He said that, if flooding occurs, rural residents should head for higher ground such as Upper Bench, and suggested residents living in these areas could be contacted ahead of time to see if they would be willing to take people in in an emergency. Olalla is an area of great concern. The river won't come over the downtown Keremeos dike first. He said the possibility of a major flood will be advertised in all the papers. Bob explained that Rural areas B and G don't yet have an emergency plan or coordinator and unfortunately the Provincial Govt., because of liability, no longer allows the Keremeos Municipal Coordinator to cover those areas. The Cawston Hall Society is hoping to have a community meeting on flooding concerns about April 22. Though Bob can't go outside his jurisdiction, he gets Search and Rescue groups together and they help with sandbagging, if necessary, outside Keremeos. He will be checking the dikes several times a day during run off and will be receiving regular reports from Tulameen. Responding to an audience question about Native Bands, Bob explained that they take care of their own flooding problems, but usually come to him for sand bags, and they can use the Emergency Social Services if they like.

If people leave town during an

emergency, they should still register at a reception centre so no one will think they are missing. When Ed Leaf mentioned that some seniors won't leave home and perhaps a list should be made, an audience member suggested that maybe the OAP could help, and Reg. District and Village tax requisitions could be used to locate people. People should make sure, if their animals aren't taken to kennels, that their dogs are properly equipped so they can be chained to fences near the reception area and their cats have cages. Two fenced pens and a tennis court have so far been made available for larger animals.

Any businesses who have not yet been approached to be on the supplier's list can call Claudette Brind'Amour at 499-5695 or Cheryle Hendbee at 499-2257. The Dept. of the Environment has been checking the creeks. People with concerns can phone them at 490-8200. Though the Keremeos Village Office already offers simple, easy to follow, brochures on various aspects of emergency preparedness, it is also completing a public, information handout on flood preparedness. Spare copies should be available from the Village Office by mid-April.

As part of their continuing effort to make people aware of their organization and of what to do in a flood, ESS will make pamphlets available during Emergency Preparedness week in May that describe an emergency supply kit, what people should pack ahead of time to take with them if they have to evacuate in a hurry. Bob Stanley will be giving a home protection and sandbagging course for the general public for two or three hours beginning at noon on Sunday, April 25, behind the Sewer plant in the Public Works gravel yard.

To all residents of the Lower Similkameen River Valley and all other users of the Ashnola Road.

Please be advised that the GOVERNMENT OF THE LOWER SIMILKAMEEN INDIAN BAND claims ownership of the portion of the ASHNOLA ROAD that passes over I.R. #10.

Our Band Government has always believed its ownership of the road to be legally defensible. We have acted in good faith with our neighbours in the valley and with other users of this road in allowing free access.

We have now received information from our researchers and legal counsel that strongly backs up our contention of ownership.

The Ashnola road was constructed through the Lower Similkameen I.R.#10 in 1912, without the consent of the Lower Similkameen Indian Band, and without compensation to the Band. The route of the road was altered in 1964 and additional lands were taken from our Reserve for road construction purposes, again without the consent of the Band. The Lower Similkameen Indian Band received \$150.00 for this unjust land taking in total.

In the Landmark Supreme Court decision on Delgamuokw on December 11, 1997 the Justices held that the Crown must engage in a process of meaningful consultation with aboriginal people in decisions taken with respect to any development on their lands. No such consultation has ever occurred for the taken of this road, despite repeated requests by our Band Government.

While the Lower Similkameen Indian Band continues to pursue this issue with the provincial government, we invite the public to use the road as usual. In the meantime, please obey any posted notices along the roadway as it passes across I.R. #10.

We will provide advance notice in the event of any change in use status.

Dental Hygiene: Up in smoke

Did you know that in Okanagan Similkameen Health Region 23 per cent of residents age 12 and over are current smokers? Most of us are aware that smoking causes many types of cancer, heart disease, and lung disease, but many may not realize that smoking can also have harmful effects on the health of your teeth and gums. Tobacco and its products can damage the gum and bone support around your teeth and can lower your resistance (immune system) to gum disease. Smokers do not heal as well as former or non-smokers after gum treatments. Even with good oral hygiene habits and regular cleanings, smokers tend to continue to lose bone support over time. The success rate of dental implants is less predictable in smokers. Tobacco use also causes the obvious dental conditions such as bad breath, staining of teeth or dentures, and increased calculus formation.

Does smoking cessation provide dental benefits? The good news is "Yes!" The harmful effects on healing after gum treatment are reversible after smoking is stopped. Bone loss stops or dramatically slows after quitting cigarettes. You will have less need for lengthy dental prophylaxis treatment, saving time and money, and you will experience white teeth and fresher breath.

April is Dental Health Month, so to promote the smoke-free message to young people, dental health professionals in the Okanagan region are sponsoring an "Up in Smoke Challenge" available to students in grades 4 to 7 on CD Rom at their school. This project is designed to educate students about the hazards of tobacco use in an enjoyable, interactive way. They will learn about peer pressure and tobacco company advertising, and about the health and environmental effects of smoking. Participation makes them eligible to win a new computer for their school and individual fun prizes.

Dog bylaw changes

PRINCETON - The draft of the new dog control bylaw was passed at the April 6 meeting of Princeton Town Council. The change to the former bylaw re-defines a dog running at large.

The new definition includes a dog not under direct control of the owner and not confined behind a fence or in a building. In other words, if a resident leaves a dog tied to a fence or tree, and leaves the scene, the dog is deemed running at large and can be apprehended.

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What do Public Health Nurses do?

Over the last year, I've been asked by a number of people "What do Public Health Nurses do?" My nursing colleagues at the hospital, doctors, members of the Community Health Board and clients want to know. Most people are familiar with some of the care and knowledge hospital nurses provide but are unsure of the programs and expertise public health nurses have.

Public Health Nurses are degree prepared Registered Nurses who specialize in preventing illness and the promotion of optimum health. The motto is "The health of the community is a reflection of you".

Much of the work we do involves preventing communicable diseases in the community. Regular immunization programs take place for infants, school children and adults. In the last month, nurses traced contacts, provided preventive care and teaching to people exposed to tuberculosis, hepatitis A, pertussis, mumps, and measles.

Public Health Nurses promote wellness in families. Every family

with a new baby received at least one visit from a nurse. About 60 per cent of Penticton and area families take part in the Early Maternity Discharge Program for mothers who leave the hospital 48 hours after delivery. Breastfeeding and other supports are available at Baby Talk, a parent drop-in program. Prenatal classes for teens and those who need extra support are given by Public Health Nurses.

A Public Health Nurse is assigned to schools.

Public Health Nurses provide information to the public on a wide range of health topics. Consultations are available by phone, individual appointment and on request from groups of teachers, parents.

Each community in the South Okanagan is staffed by one or two Public Health Nurses who provide basic services with referrals to the Penticton office for specialized programs such as Travel Clinic and STD Clinic.

If you would like to find out more about programs, call your local Public Health Nurse.

Ramsey says rank is not fair

VICTORIA - The Fraser Institute's ranking of B.C.'s more than 260 secondary schools is simplistic and unfair to students, teachers, parents and staff, according to Education Minister Paul Ramsey.

"This ranking is called a 'report card' on B.C.'s secondary schools," Ramsey commented. "These folks (Fraser Institute) have never set foot in these schools, never spoken to the staff and students, yet somehow they feel able to pass judgement and rank our schools."

This well-publicized remark was made when the Fraser Institute released its ranking.

Princeton Secondary School received a low rank, but this is not the first time there has been a controversy about the ranking in Princeton Secondary. Part of the problem begins with how many students do the exams. Every student in Princeton Secondary does the exams, making the average lower than in schools where only the top students write the exams.

The Education Minister blames social and economic factors for lower marks, but a public school system must take all students of all economic and social backgrounds.

As Ramsey points out, the results of the ranking are misleading. Any school has a wide range of levels of intellectual skills, and many students at Princeton Secondary School have achieved outstanding results on their provincial exams.

Any parents concerned about the Fraser Institute ranking should talk to their local school trustees or district superintendent.

Evans strengthens farmers' disaster fund

VICTORIA - Agriculture Minister Corky Evans boosted the Buy B.C. program and set up a trust fund to protect farmers and food processors against unforeseen disasters.

"The B.C. Agriculture Council came to the economic council of ministers last year and asked government to expand the Buy B.C. program to help strengthen public support for a strong and sustainable provincial agri-food industry," Evans said. "They also asked us to create a trust fund for safety net funding that would build a reserve capable of dealing with disasters. The ministry's budget for 1999-2000 delivers on those requests."

The ministry's budget is \$56.87 million, \$5.62 million less than last year's allocation, but new federal funding for whole farm insurance will provide at least \$10 million extra in farm income loss assistance. When whole farm insurance is combined with crop insurance and the net income stabilization account, B.C. farmers will have access to more than \$38 million this fiscal year in federal and provincial safety net programs - an increase of \$6.8 million over last fiscal year.

Highlights include:

- Buy B.C. - an extra \$1 million to increase consumer support for and awareness of B.C. produced food and beverage products, and highlight the industry's potential for job creation and economic opportunities
- Whole farm insurance - federal and provincial combined will boost the program to \$17 million in assistance
- Trust fund - the trust would ensure that whole farm income insurance program is always

available to meet unforeseen disaster. The trust will include farmer's insurance premiums and fees as well as any federal and provincial funds that farmers do not use this fiscal year. Unused funds will be allowed to accumulate for the future.

- The provincial small business income tax rate has been reduced from 8.5 per cent to 5.5 per cent. This could benefit 3,528 incorporated farms. To be eligible, farms need to be incorporated and have a taxable income of \$200,000 or less after paying salaries and shareholders. Small business food and beverage processors will also benefit.

- provincial sales tax exemptions have been provided for bona fide farmers, including a number for greenhouses.

"The agri-food industry is one of B.C.'s most successful resource industries with strong potential for job creation, economic growth and rural development," Evans said. "This budget will help build B.C.'s food and beverage industry, which has an annual value to the province of more than \$17 billion, generates over \$1 billion in exports and employs more than 255,000 people - one in seven British Columbians."

Landfill costs skyrocket

KEREMEOS - Village Council was surprised to learn at its regular meeting, April 6, that consultants Sperling Hansen Associates had changed their estimate of when the Keremeos Landfill would reach capacity. January 13, 1999, they had stated it would reach capacity in the year 2007, but, after further technical review and discussions with the Ministry of Environment, they now advise, as reported in a March 15, 1999 memorandum to the Keremeos Solid Waste Committee from D Duckworth, Public Works Manager for the Regional District, "that the landfill will reach capacity, under the best-case scenario, in the year 2002." Mayor Stranart reported to Council that when Roger Mayer, Regional District Chairman, was recently asked why Sperling Hansen was chosen to do the landfill study, he said that Regional District Directors feel obliged to go to the lowest bidder.

Councillor Gurevitch wanted to know where the five years of garbage went?

Mayor Stranart said he was really steamed about the situation and added, "People of this valley are being shafted. The estimated cost of \$700,000 to \$1,000,000 to close the current landfill site and prepare the new one is too much to come up with in 2 years." The Keremeos Landfill user-fee system that the Regional District has advertised will come in to effect May 15, 99 could, according to Municipal Chief Administrative Officer Eileen Oliver-Bauer, help cover the cost of closing the current landfill and constructing the new one by building up a cushion over seven years, but two years is not long enough. Council consensus was that the difference between the two Sperling Hansen estimates was unacceptable.
