



## Truck rolls at Whipsaw Bridge

The DCT Chambers truck above rolled on its side on Whipsaw bridge 15 km. east of Princeton just before 11:00 p.m. Wednesday, April 28. Lawrence Nickerson, age 50, of Chilliwack, was driving. His right shoulder was injured. The trailer was seriously damaged and the bridge was damaged. Single lane traffic proceeded during the night, and the Hope-Princeton highway was closed at the bridge for an hour while a crew from Mission inflated air bags to right the trailer. (Note compressor at far right.) The truck had been carrying a load of sawdust, which spilled over the side of the bridge and down the steep embankment to the creek.

## Rescue team needs vehicle

The top item of concern at the annual general meeting of Princeton Highway Rescue Society was the need for a new rescue truck. Year end accounts showed \$2,200 spent on repairing the truck now in use, and a list of other repairs required showed the truck is reaching the point where it ought to be replaced.

Members had quotes on other vehicles, and were looking at a cost of \$50,000 to \$60,000 for a four ton two wheel drive vehicle if purchased new. The other option is to buy a two year old vehicle of the type they need.

Highway Rescue Society is looking for recruits. The group is open to anyone of any age, size, or sex. Not all members must go out and do rescue work. Some members are needed to do the paperwork, phoning and communications. President Nick Goreas commented on the executive being "stretched to the limit" with things to do.

The society will be looking for a committee of volunteers from the community to raise funds for a new truck. Fundraising activities put too much additional pressure on the small group. Some local people will be approached to see if they will form a fundraising committee.

With just \$17,000 in the Highway Rescue account, fundraising will be a big project for the group.

## Advisory group works on new terms

Princeton - Isabella Gambouras, on behalf of Okanagan Similkameen Regional Health Board, attended the April 26 meeting in Princeton of the Community Health Advisory Committee (CHAC). She advised them of the new terms of reference for CHACs. She said she will present the terms of reference to Keremeos on May 26.

Gambouras told CHAC members their role is to plan for the community's needs, identify health issues in their community, help set priorities in the community and receive proposals from the community for health initiatives.

The purpose of the CHAC, Gambouras said, is to promote wellness in the community. Some funds have been allocated to the CHAC for that purpose.

Innovation funds are available for projects and applications are available through the CHAC or Princeton General Hospital administration.

Ray Huey, CHAC Chair, said three applications had been received and would be judged against the criteria established for such projects.

### Health Board nominations

On questioning from Councillor Kathleen Clement, Gambouras explained the process for nominations for the Regional Health Board. She said there must be two nominees. If there is only one application from a community, a name will be put forward from another community, depending on whether the community "hates" the one nominee.

"The idea is to get the best possible person," Gambouras said.

Regional Health Board makes recommendations as to the suitability of the persons wishing to be on RHB and sends those recommendations through to Victoria for the official appointment. The local CHAC has no decision on who is appointed.

### Little interest in Health Plan

Huey expressed disappointment in the lack of interest in the Community Health Plan. He said letters had gone out to 16 groups, asking the groups to invite the CHAC to talk about the plan and only four answered. Only one of the groups, Community Services, had set a date for the meeting.

### Ridgewood expansion

The architect is working with local staff on the design of the building. They will work for the next 6 to 8 weeks and then put it out for tender. Anticipated completion date is in 2001.

### Hospital privileges

Surgeons wishing hospital privileges must fill out an impact study to send through to Regional Health Board. This information will outline whether or not the proposed surgeries will impact on the hospital budget.

### The Foundation

Princeton General Hospital and Ridgewood Lodge Foundation is planning to hold a major fundraiser in October, Laurie Currie told the CHAC. He praised Valley First Credit Union for making a commitment to work with the Foundation on any projects.

PRINCETON - Twenty people, representing resource management interests, met in Princeton on April 27 to form a local resource management committee. Bob Miller, hired by Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation to facilitate the formation of the group, expressed admiration for the way the group meshed.

"There was a quick movement toward our focus," Miller said. "People seemed very positive and were participating in good faith." Miller said people like the idea of community-based resource planning.

"They can use their experience here to give advice to the Ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks," Miller commented.

The group decided to have one meeting per month in the formative stages, with the next meeting set for May 25.

There was solid representation from a broad base of interests. Members of both Princeton and Otter Valley fish and game clubs attended, ranchers were represented, landowners were involved and the Upper Similkameen

Indian Band was represented.

The initial focus will be elk.

"It's off to a good start," Miller said.

People lingered after the meeting to discuss items of interest, always a sign of a highly-motivated group.

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## OUC nursing program aids rural Ghana

Okanagan University College is about to take its expertise in education and training nurses to West Africa as part of a federally-funded initiative. Beginning in May, nursing faculty from OUC will travel to Tamale, Ghana. They'll be taking part in a four-year Rural Nurse Practitioner project, that is being funded by the Canadian International Development Agency in conjunction with the Association of Canadian Community Colleges. The project is a partnership with the University for Development Studies and is intended to provide Ghana's nurses with the specialized knowledge and skills needed to practice in rural communities and remote clinics.

"Nursing education in West Africa has been based on a traditional western model which assumes that nurses work under the supervision of physicians," explains Alan Davidson, OUC's Dean of Health Sciences and Human Services. "The reality is that in many rural areas there are few or no doctors. The statistics tell you that Ghana has one physician for every 10,000 people, but 80 per cent of those practice in urban areas. Seventy per cent of the population lives in rural areas. The responsibility for health care in most of the country falls to nurses who are often ill-prepared for their role as primary health care providers."

The new program - which will be established at the University for Development Studies in Tamale, Ghana - will be a post-diploma program for local registered nurses who want to qualify as Nurse Practitioners. OUC nursing faculty will travel to Ghana to collaborate with UDS personnel on needs assessment, curriculum development, teacher training, program design, and instruction. Nursing faculty from Ghana will travel here to learn Canadian teaching practices. Part of the project will also see an exchange of nursing students.

"This has enormous potential to improve access to health care services for thousands of people in West Africa," notes OUC President Katy Bindon. "The community health model on which this program is based will empower local people to get involved in the planning and delivery of health services in their community."

"The project is especially important to rural women in Ghana because they are the ones who will benefit most from improved access to health care for themselves and their children," she adds.

### Love your forest

This week is National Forest Week.

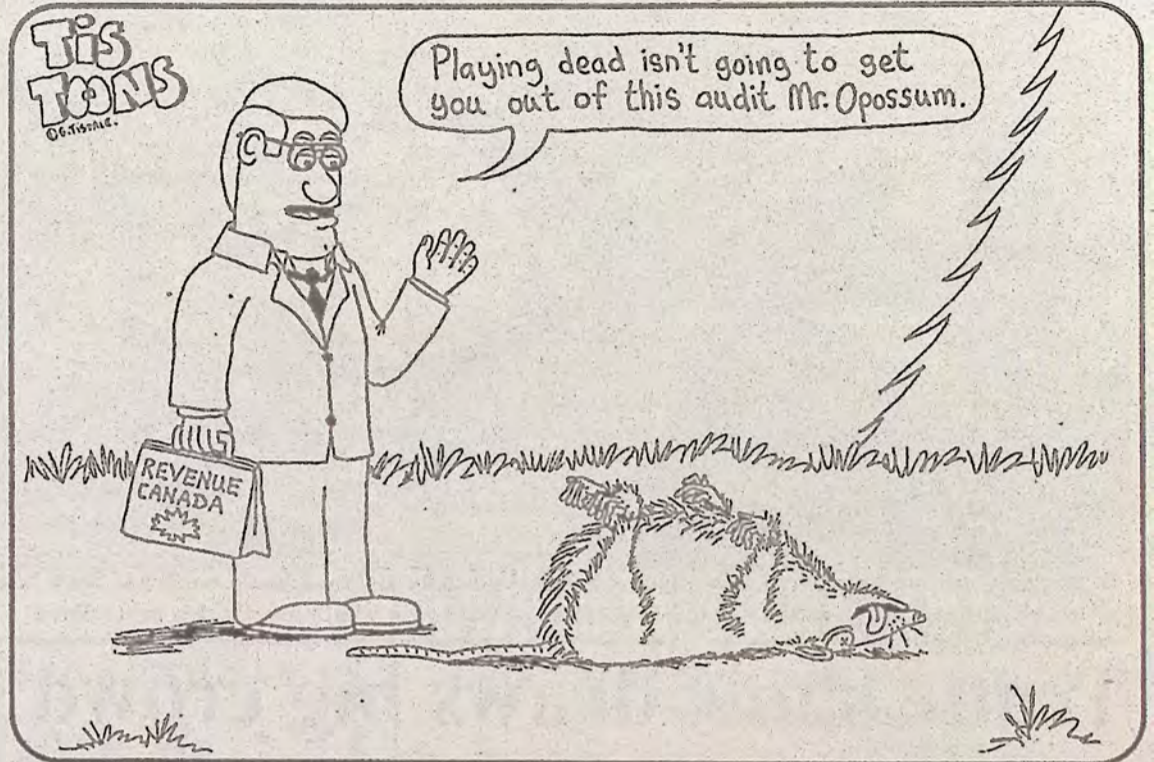
Too many people do not love our forests because all they see is trees. It takes a lot more than trees to make a forest. Forests are home, fuel, building materials, food, a place for fun, a place to restore the soul and the breath of life.

Forests are home to birds and animals of all kinds. Humans can build homes from forest products and dwell within the forest, but for many creatures, survival depends on the habitat the forest provides. The forest is food for grazing animals, birds, rodents and predators. Anyone who has picked berries or mushrooms knows the forest manufactures food for people, too. The recreational value of our forests includes camping, angling, hunting, birdwatching, photography, hiking, trail riding, snowmobiling, and biking. These activities restore the soul. Young healthy trees, still growing, are the source of oxygen, the breath of life.

Sometimes, too many trees ruin a forest, especially if the sun cannot reach the ground in an old forest. Then, the beauty and diversity of the forest disappear as bushes and grasses die on the forest floor. The oxygen-producing ability of the forest is seriously compromised, but the building materials and fuel value is still there. It is time to harvest and plant a new forest.

To love our forests, we need to understand more than the trees. We need to see the forests for what they are – more than trees, more than the economic value of the wood. We have to see the forest as a resource for many creatures, many plants, and diverse human activity.

During the past twenty years, the Ministry of Forests has changed its approach to managing forests. Forest Service workers see the forest as an economic resource among many other values. The new vision of our forests will increase biodiversity, making forests more valuable as a resource for all who depend on forests for life.

The Ministry of Forests' theme for this year's National Forest Week, May 2 to 8, is "The Magic of Biodiversity." This theme reflects the numerous programs and roles the ministry provides to the forest sector and public. Not to be overlooked, however, are the diverse challenges facing

I want my tax dollars spent in a way to move the town forward.

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# Lali pans Liberals over Highland Valley

Speaking from his Victoria office, Yale-Lillooet MLA Harry Lali called the state of talks on the future of Highland Valley Copper 'encouraging'. Noting that "Jobs Protection Commissioner Eric Van Soren has commented publicly and optimistically on the potential for assisting the mine," Lali went on to state: "This augers well for the continued viability of the operation and for the future of the workers at the mine-site."

While complimenting the workers, the company and the JPC, Lali had other words for the Liberal MLA from Kamloops North-Thompson.

"The MLA from Kamloops North-Thompson has made statements in the press recently which could lead a casual observer to believe certain inaccuracies about BC Hydro rates," said Lali. "Personally, I believe that the incorrect figures he presented about American companies getting a better deal from BC Hydro than Canadian firms spring more from his inability to get his facts right than from any malicious

attempt to mislead the public."

Lali went on to point out that the MLA is well aware that the two companies in question received power sold in the US at rates above those paid in BC by local industrial companies. The first mention, Telco, pays a higher rate direct to BC Hydro, while the second refers to a situation where an American company purchased power from BC Hydro at rates above our provincial industrial rate, and then was forced to resell power surplus to its needs at a lower rate to other American companies, such as Longview Fibre. BC Liberals are apparently not able to research even relatively simple transactions such as these ones.

"And these are the people," says Lali, "who want to govern the province?"

Lali said, "BC Liberals are some of the more opportunistic people I've ever run across. They will take any side of any issue, as long as they think it will score more points for them politically."

Lali does not think the Liberals

are pulling the wool over anyone's eyes in Yale-Lillooet.

"The Liberal Forestry critic ran away and hid when Weyerhaeuser Canada announced they were going to abandon Merritt. It was our government working with the workers, community and the companies that kept the jobs and the fibre in the community." The Liberals attacked our efforts to bolster the economy of the north-west by sustaining Skeena Cellulose and have said many times that we should let Prince Rupert, Terrace and the Hazletons die. And now they say they want to 'save' Logan Lake? We should all hope that we will never be victimized by Liberal saviors."

Lali expressed his confidence that everyone involved in the attempt to rescue Highland Valley Copper, including BC Hydro, would do their utmost to bring a successful answer to the problem. His confidence is further bolstered by the recent increase in the price of copper by more than ten per cent to around 70 cents US per pound.

## Multi-level care planners await government report

**SIMILKAMEEN** - On April 20, Walter Despot, Lower Similkameen Health Centre Project Building Committee Chairman, said they were still in the process of going through a value analysis with the B.C. government for the project in relation to funding. The committee and the Ministry of Health look at the effective use of space in their planning and the complete medical picture for the next 25 to 30 years, whereas the B.C. Finance Ministry concentrates on costs. The project has been thoughtfully designed to give the taxpayer value for his money. The value analysis started on January 1/99 when the diagrams were given to consultants and engineers for their scrutiny. The committee had a meeting at the end of February and the end of March in Vancouver, where the bulk of the consultants are. They expected the analysis to take 8 weeks but it has taken 14 weeks so far.

The 7 Million dollar Multi-Level Care Facility, whose proper name is the Lower Similkameen Health Centre, will be located on the full city block #83, across from Forner's Fruit Stand, and has been designed to hold an extra 25

beds above the original 25. It will have a new, enlarged second care wing and will accommodate up to 4 doctors. Many services such as Home Support, Adult Day Care, Meals on Wheels, and Physiotherapy that are now in separate locations will be operated in or from the Lower Similkameen Health Centre.

Once the analysis is complete and the committee receives the report, it will go to the Ministry of Finance for review. It then goes to the Province of BC Treasury Board. If it's not acceptable to them the committee may have to make changes. After the project, which has so far cost \$280,000 in preliminary work, is approved, architects and engineers together will complete the working drawings which will then go to public tender. The Building Committee was hoping to have received the report by the last week in April but according to Walter, the wheels of government bureaucracy grind very slowly. He says a lot of people inside and outside the govt. are working on it. He doesn't know what future role the old Diagnostic Centre, located only a block from the new one, may have, as it's not included in present planning.

KEREMEOS - In a cooperative arrangement between the Similkameen Rec. Centre, teens doing work experience, and parents with small children, Parent and Tot Gym time at the Similkameen Elementary School continues to provide a great opportunity for small children to develop physical and social skills. Volunteer Supervisor Becky Avery says that though the Wednesday night program, which included Fun on Wheels, had to be cancelled do to lack of participation since the warmer weather, the Monday afternoon Parent and Tot Gym time is still going on. Two teens, Andrew Duhn and Garry Brar, who attend Sandra Peregrym's 11-12 PE class, agreed to do their required work experience hours with the Similkameen Recreation Centre sponsored program. According to Becky, the young men have been a great asset, and though they have finished their hours, she may involve more work experience teens if need be.

The Similkameen Rec Centre sees to administrative details, while Supervisor Becky Avery instructs the teens on how to work with children, oversees the setting up and taking down of equipment and interacts with the children on different levels depending on the need of the moment. Parents must sign a liability waiver that can be obtained at the drop-in, and each parent can bring a maximum of two children, aged 1 to 4.

Parents are responsible for supervising their children on the equipment which includes a balance beam, and a slide donated by the Penticton Kinetts. Indoor floor hockey is scheduled as well as indoor mini soccer coached by parent Peter Ruocco. Becky hopes more parents and tots will drop in to the SESS Elementary Gym Mondays 4:15 to 5:15 and help keep the program going until mid-June. Parents pay a fee per child per drop in time--\$3.00 for the first child and \$2.00 for each one after that.

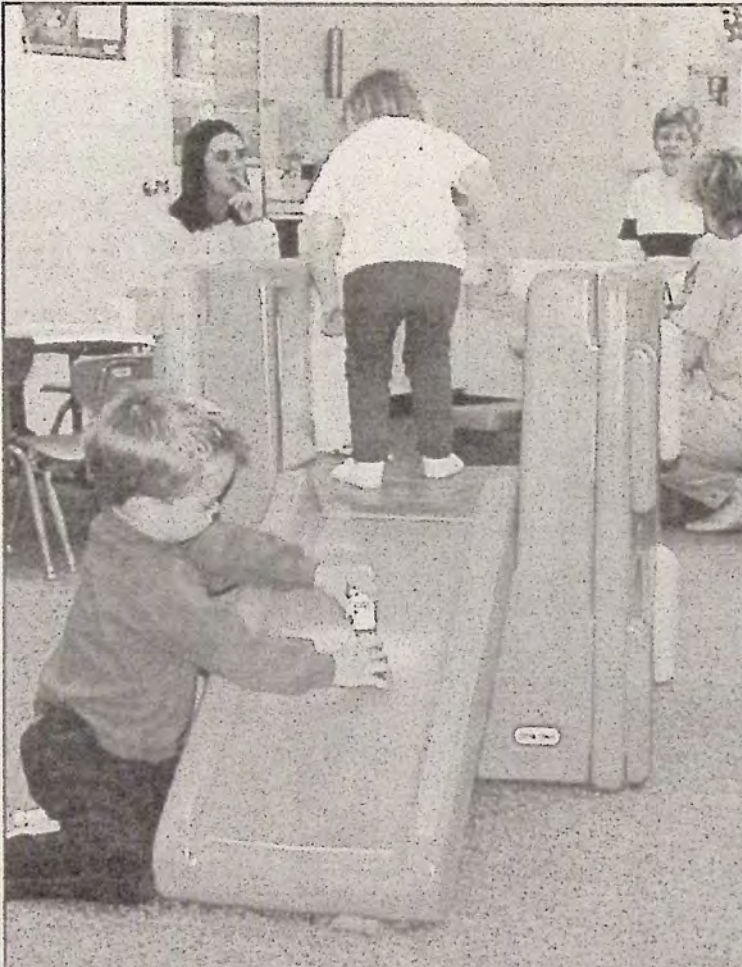

How many dump trucks would be required to move 13 to 14 tons of stamps? I don't know the answer to this question myself, but that is about how many stamps have been collected, trimmed, and sorted since the Order of Eastern Star began this very worthwhile project in 1954. The stamps are sold by the pound to stamp dealers and the money used to buy gauze bandage material, which is then made into bandages and supplied free-of-charge to cancer patients through their doctors or cancer clinics.

The Eastern Star Chapters in B.C. & Yukon have raised over a Quarter of a million dollars since we began this project. A group of dedicated workers gather at the home of Sister Gladys Pierce, Co-ordinator of the 45-year-old Cancelled Stamp Project, several days per month and prepare the stamps for sale.

The Eastern Star does not solicit money for this work. This is a very easy way for individuals and businesses to help their fellow man. We will gladly remove the stamps from your envelopes and recycle the envelopes as well. This donation does not cost you anything and you know that your



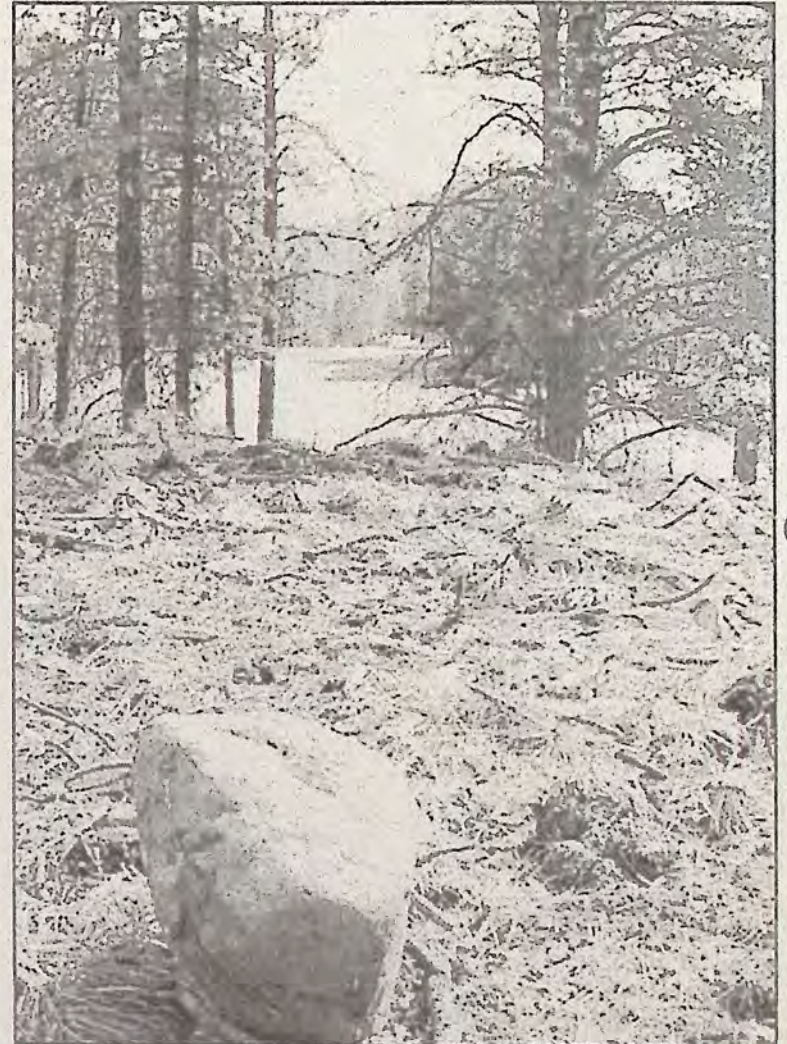

**CIBC/gov't deal**  
**Loan program boosts  
 value-added companies**

VICTORIA - Small and medium-sized value-added wood manufacturing firms will have better access to capital to expand or modernize their businesses under a new joint loan program provided by Forest Renewal B.C. and the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce, Forests Minister David Zirnelt announced on April 22.

"B.C.'s value-added wood manufacturing sector is recognized internationally for the quality, innovation and workmanship of its products, but it is still in the developmental stage," said Zirnelt. "Last year we took several steps to increase the supply of fibre to value-added producers. This year we are increasing their access to capital to help them expand and lead us into a modern forest economy where we can get more value from each tree cut."

The program offers loans at prime plus one per cent to secondary wood manufacturers that employ fewer than 250 people, have net sales of less than \$20 million annually, have a viable business plan and require financing of \$250,000 to \$1.25 million. Loans must be used to purchase fixed assets for expansion or plant modernization that will lead to improved productivity or viability.

The Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce is making a revolving loan fund of \$10 million available for five years. Forest Renewal BC is backing the loans to a maximum of 20 per cent, or \$2 million.

 of pyramid scheme**

 SIMILKAMEEN.- Keremeos RCMP have been investigating, since January 1999, a pyramid scheme described as women helping women. A person contributes \$5,000 to get a return of \$40,000 (minus the \$5,000). The Police are aware of people in this area who are involved in the scheme and are concerned because the people who get taken by it are often those who can least afford it. Schemes where a person pays a sum of money to receive from another person a larger sum of money are illegal under Section 206 of the Criminal Code of Canada and parties to such schemes are guilty of an indictable offense.

movies, notably *Sling Blade* and *The Newton Boys*.

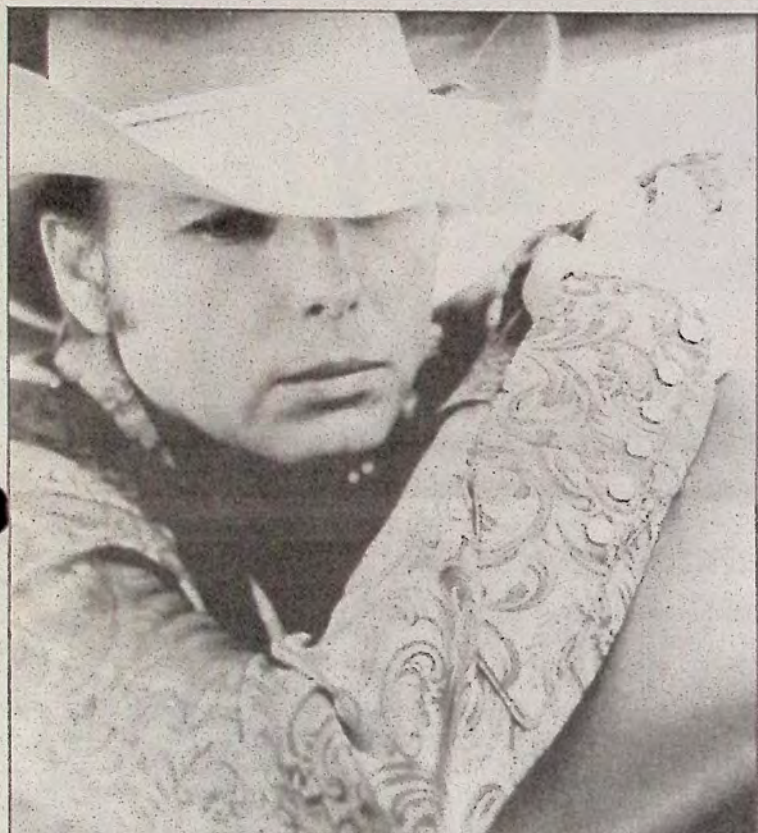

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## Return of White Pine

VICTORIA - A new blister rust resistant gene discovered in Oregon might help B.C. scientists right a 90-year-old wrong and bring the western white pine population back to where it belongs, in the forests of British Columbia.

"White pine had a significant role throughout the history of North American forestry. Today, because of a blunder in 1910, it's only a fraction of its natural frequency in our forests," said Dr. Mike Carlson, Ministry of Forest tree improvement researcher.

"Now that we understand how it happened, we can use natural resistance and increase its numbers and restore the lost diversity in our forests."

In 1910, white pine seedlings imported into the Lower Mainland from Europe spread the deadly blister rust throughout B.C. and the northwestern U.S. Only one in every 5,000 trees survived.

In the early 1960s, the U.S. Forest Service in Idaho started a white pine breeding program after they found surviving white pines that were genetically resistant - not completely immune but damage was greatly reduced. That meant these surviving trees could be bred to produce resistant 'children'.

The Canadian Forest Service started a white pine breeding program in the early 1980s in cooperation with the B.C. Ministry of Forests. To speed up the effort, Ministry of Forests scientists Dr. Alvin Yanchuk and Dr. Michael Carlson developed contacts with the U.S. Forest Service scientists and brought a very select population of white pine to B.C.

White pine is a highly valued tree, a fast grower and good for making furniture and panelling.

"There's reluctance to use it in reforestation because of the disease," said Chris Walsh, supervisor of the Ministry of Forests Kalamalka Seed Orchard outside Vernon, B.C. "We're hoping to make it more attractive for reforestation."

Today, the western white pine breeding program in B.C. has successfully identified several dozen partially resistant trees. The Ministry of Forests has planted three orchards using grafts from these trees to produce resistant seeds for reforestation.

The seeds from these orchards will grow western white pines with a minimum of 60 per cent tolerance to rust infection. With the discovery of an additional resistant mechanism in Oregon populations of white pine, the ministry hopes to make the Western White Pine an even more attractive choice for reforestation.



Our forests are more than just trees, or even many kinds of trees. Streams, lakes, grass, wildlife, food, recreational areas, and a workplace for thousands, define our forests. The forests of British Columbia help pay for health care, highways and education. Forests are a crucial part of our way of life.

## When forest fires are a good thing for the forest

VICTORIA - Most forest fires are caused by lightning. Others are caused by careless hikers dropping a match or letting a camp fire get out of control. Others are started by the very organization you would think would try hardest to stop fires: the B.C. Forest Service.

"The idea that forest fires are always bad and destructive is not necessarily true," says John Parminter, a research ecologist with the Ministry of Forests. "Sometimes, in fact, they are necessary to ensure biological diversity is maintained in the forest."

Since the glaciers receded, wild-fire has been a central force in shaping the nature of the forest and its vegetation and wildlife.

In some forest, such as those in the dry, low-elevation areas of B.C.'s southern interior, fires used to occur regularly about every 10 to 20 years. Now, due to good fire prevention, open stands of sun-loving ponderosa pine are gradually being invaded by large numbers of shade-tolerant Douglas fir, resulting in a very different landscape than nature intended.

"The resulting dense forest puts the ponderosa pine at greater risk to being killed in a canopy, or tree-top fire," says Parminter, "and that affects other vegetation and wildlife as well."

Badgers, for example, require open forest and grassland for survival. If the forest cover builds up too much, they too can be crowded out of their natural habitat.

"Fire enhances grasses and shrubs, by consuming old, dead

plant material and stimulating resprouting," says Parminter. "It also helps control insects and disease. Fire is a natural part of ecology, a natural part of rejuvenation. A number of species - trees, plants, animals and birds - have adapted to fire and some have even come to depend upon it. There are birds who need standing fire-killed trees in which to nest. Some shrubs and trees will only release their seed when they've been heated by fire." Continued on next page...

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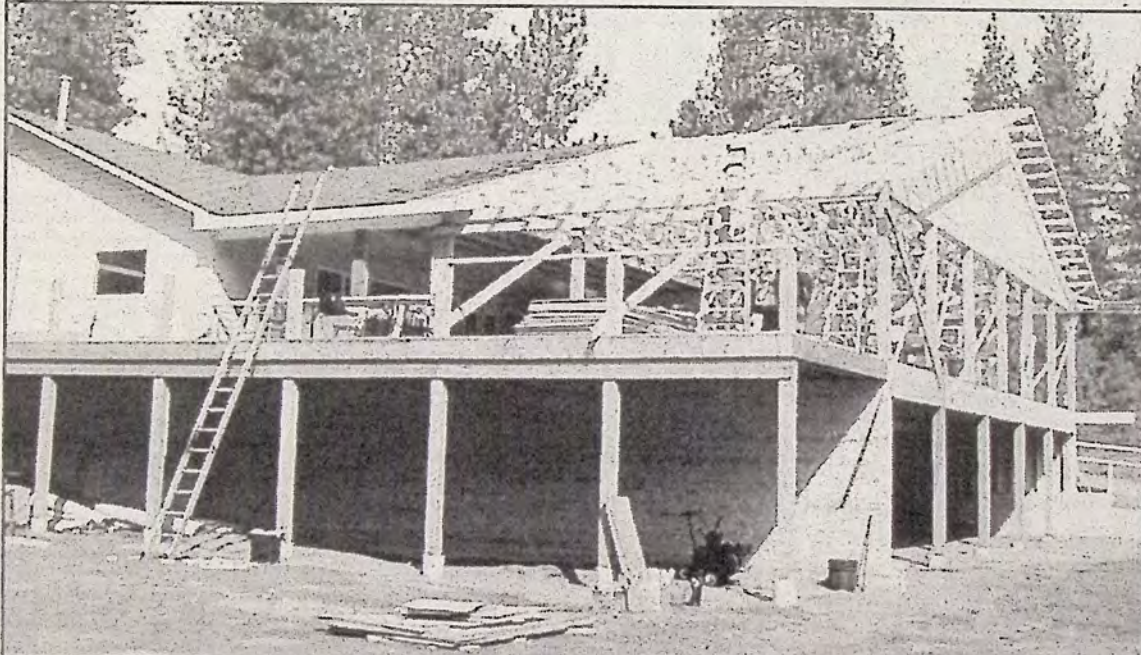
## Forest industry people help to build a strong local community

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
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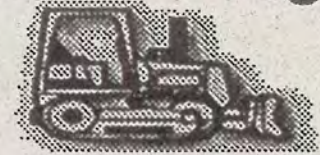

## Forests need biodiversity

The term "biodiversity" means "a mixture of different living things". When the term is applied to forests, it refers to many species of trees, shrubs and other plants sharing the same forest system. For British Columbians, there is an economic pay-off to biodiversity in the forest. The more species we grow, the more

we can meet or adapt to market opportunities.

Biodiversity is especially important to value-added wood industry. Locally, we know that timber that was considered useless, or without value, can be utilized.

Each market use enhances the value of the forest, and improves our economy. Locally, Weyer-

haeuser fills the lumber market, Princeton Wood Preservers makes posts and rails, Mego Wood makes posts and furniture and fencing, Firemaster makes fuel wood and Princeton Co-Gen makes pellets. All of these producers create jobs and form the backbone of our local economy.

## Fires are good.....

Prescribed burning, designed to copy the effects of a natural fire, is conducted by trained fire specialists, following a 'prescription' for a particular forest or stand of trees developed by a team of experts. Other involved experts include forest and wildlife managers and plant ecologists. Local citizen groups concerned with wildlife management, plant communities and ranching may also be involved. The prescription they develop outlines the objectives of the burn (to improve habitat for grazing deer, for example, or to remove undergrowth to reduce the risk of future wildfire). The prescription also determines the size and intensity of the burn required to achieve those targets.

From there, the fire specialists identify control lines, place pumps, fire hoses, water tankers and firefighters in strategic locations, and monitor the weather to make sure the conditions are right. When conditions are right, a prescribed burn is carried out. Once the burn goals are met, the fire is fully extinguished by trained firefighters.

"Of course fire can be destructive," says Parminter, "and it's something we need to take a lot of care with. But it is a natural process, a process we can use for positive ends, to restore ecosystems back to where they used to be and to not just maintain, but enhance biodiversity."
