Pow-wow: share the energy

The Cathedral Lakes Pow-wow was an outstanding success. The sunny weekend, the draw of rap star Litefoot, and the ambience of the Ashnola Valley combined to bring people to a place where the shared energy was invigorating and positive.

On Friday evening, 1,000 people had gathered for the first night of pow-wow. On Saturday, 2,000 people entered the grounds, and there is no total for Sunday, although it may be close to the Saturday figure. The organizing

committee can be justifiably satisfied that their hard work paid off.

The star

Litefoot arrived amid a great deal of excitement from the younger crowd. He is a dynamic performer with a message for young people: be proud of who you are and walk a righteous path.

As the music was adjusted, the youngsters crowded in close to the stage, and Litefoot encouraged them to come close to him.

"When I say *native*, you say *pride*," he told them.

They were soon responding enthusiastically.

Litefoot likes his audience up close. He is a young man, filled with exuberant energy, and confesses he gains energy from his audience by being close to them. During his performance, he left the stage and walked among the youth, giving a hug here and there, clasping hands with many, and moving close as he rapped out his message.

His songs have a lot to say about the way the world at large sees "Indians". He wants to destroy the stereotypes.

"Don't listen to people who try to take you down," he told the youngsters.

By the time he was ready to close the show, they were chanting, "Litefoot! Litefoot!"

The star just chuckled and did one more song, but his audience had to be represented on stage by a number of young people he invited to join him there.

"I don't want people to think I'm somebody up there, better than other people," Litefoot told The News Leader.

In an interview the following day, Litefoot, a tall, good-looking young man, said he like to "share the energy" with his audience. He likes the young people actively involved, speaking out, being vocal. He wants to free them of the repression that has characterized native North Americans for so long.

Pros rodeo this weekend

PRINCETON - Fun! That's what Senior Pro Rodeo means to the audience and to the contestants. The top rodeo professionals across the west will be in Princeton this Saturday, showing that even the rough, tough sport of rodeo is just fun to the experts. The pros are coming from Texas, Oklahoma, Oregon, Alberta, Saskatchewan and, of course, B.C. Those coming early will join local people at a supper at the fair grounds on Friday evening.

Action starts at 10:30 a.m. with the Tonasket-Princeton team penning challenge.

Rodeo Club members have been giving out gate passes to everybody. There will be gate prizes so be sure to bring your tickets. There is no admission charge to the rodeo, but the tickets are the key to the gate prizes. Other prizes will be available.

The concession stand will be open for eats, and a refreshment garden will whet your whistle.

The main events start at noon, with the grand entry, anthems, and cowboy prayer, then the fun really begins.

If you've a mind to see how the old pros ride and rope, get yourself out to the fair grounds on Saturday (Highway 40). Take a warm jacket and a blanket for your seat if the wind is blowing.

Events include saddle bronc, bull riding, bareback, steer wrestling, team roping, barrel racing and calf roping.

Flood expected this week

SIMILKAMEEN VALLEY - The May 15 snow pillow readings put the percentages above normal even higher than they were on May 1.

Brian Symonds, of Water Management Branch, Ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks, found there had been little melt during the first two weeks of May, and actually some accumulation at the higher elevations. Because of these factors, the percentage above normal for this time of year is higher. The Similkameen watershed is 57 per cent above normal.

Symonds describes the situation as "increasingly dangerous", because temperatures are bound to rise, beginning with the past weekend. This is the week we really have to watch the river.

A small amount of melt took place at the mid-elevation levels, but nothing at higher elevations. If temperatures spike for a few days in a row, the rivers and creeks will rise rapidly. Do not look for a gradual rise - the water will rise suddenly, in a few hours, if overnight and day temperatures remain high.

As stated in previous issues, remove livestock, machinery and irrigation equipment from flood zones when the river begins to rise rapidly. It is imperative to move quickly, as underground seepage may make removal impossible within hours.

MELP okays Hedley gas compressor

HEDLEY - A new compressor station to be constructed at Hedley as part of the Southern Crossing Pipeline will be built. The pipeline has received a project approval certificate that gives B.C. Gas Utility Ltd. approval in principle, subject to conditions, to build and operate the 312 km. natural gas pipeline from Yahk to Oliver.

The economic benefits of the project are expected to be substantial, with a capital investment of \$344.6 million with more than 900 construction jobs, many of which will be locally hired.

Chevron agrees

PRINCETON - Chevron Canada paid Town Council \$535 to pay for grading and levelling of the Chevron-owned portion of the area east of the Princeton service station.

Chevron went on to say, "We are willing to spend a further \$7000

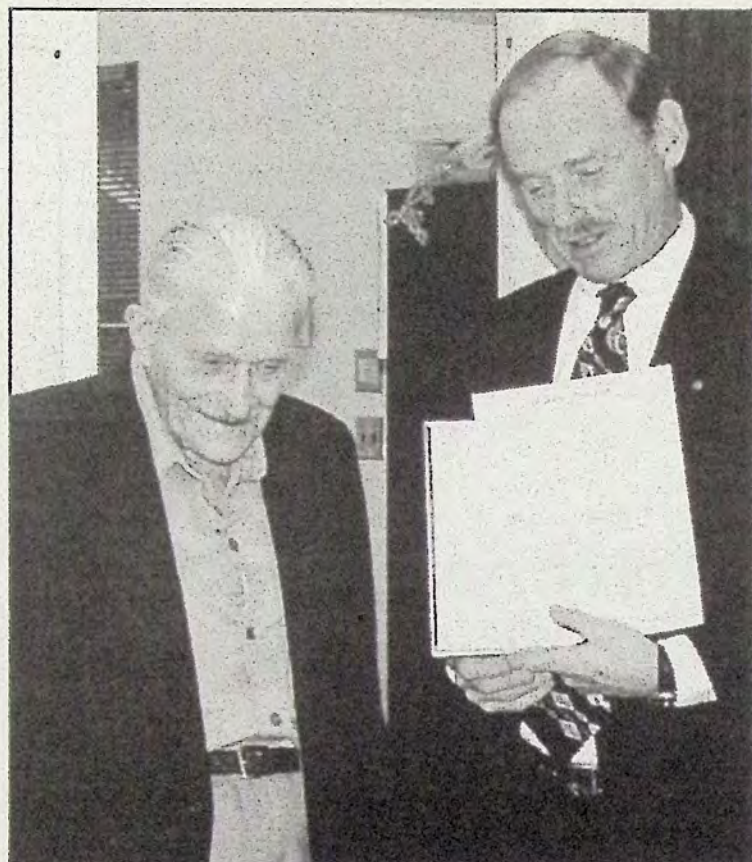

After the show, he signed approximately 300 autographs, giving each person his undivided attention and making a special effort for school groups.

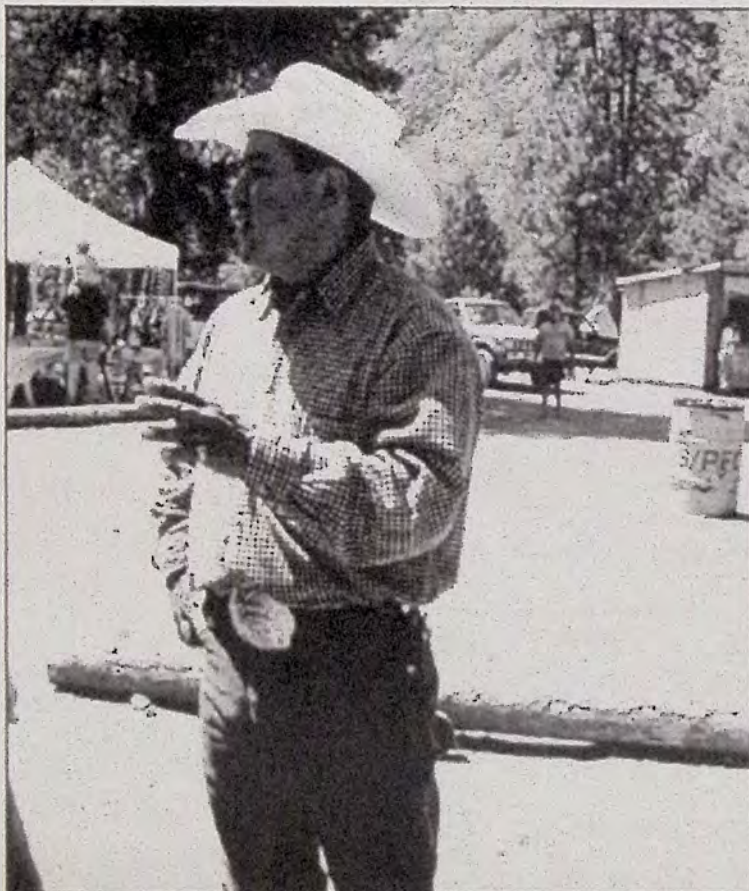
Compared with most of the powwows Litefoot plays, Cathedral Lakes is very small, but small makes no difference.

"If people want me to come, I'll come."

Litefoot's message is aimed at his own people, native "Indians". He started his career in Tulsa, Oklahoma. He is a Cherokee, and he can relate to many of the feelings of the young people he speaks to in the poetry of rap.

Litefoot admits to having a quest, of helping to awaken spiritual strength in youth from the "rez".

While not sharing the young people's enthusiasm for rap music, many elders approved of the message behind the music. Litefoot tells the young people to stay away from booze and drugs and follow the "red road" of right living which the traditional people endorse.

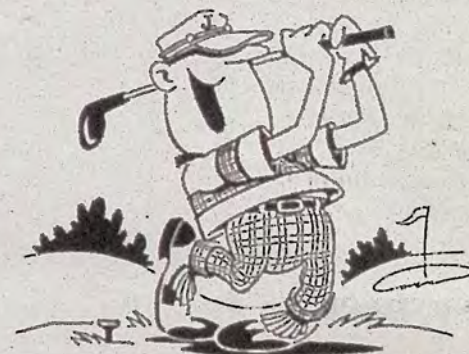

Local students meet the best

There were 2,000 secondary and post-secondary students in the Trade and Convention Centre at 8:00 a.m. They were given their assignments and worked until late afternoon. As they worked, judges assembled and the day ended with the judges' decisions as to who would be going to the national finals.

Grandstand roof could be cheaper

PRINCETON - The grandstand roof at the fair grounds could come cheaper than the \$26,000 quoted at the Princeton Exhibition Association meeting.

At the May 17 Town Council meeting, Councillor Jim Manion told Council the roof could be patched for \$5,000 to \$7,000 which would extend the life of the roof some 10 to 15 additional years.

the competitions. There were welders, hairdressers, clothing designers and tailors, mechanics, and so on.

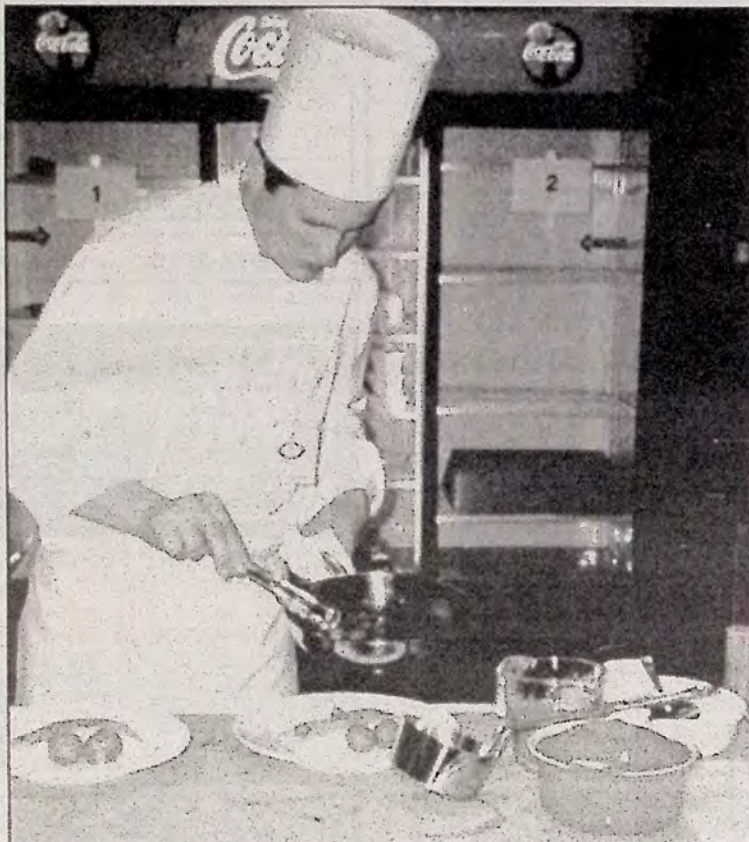
Both Reid and Pattison were impressed with how everyone was made welcome.

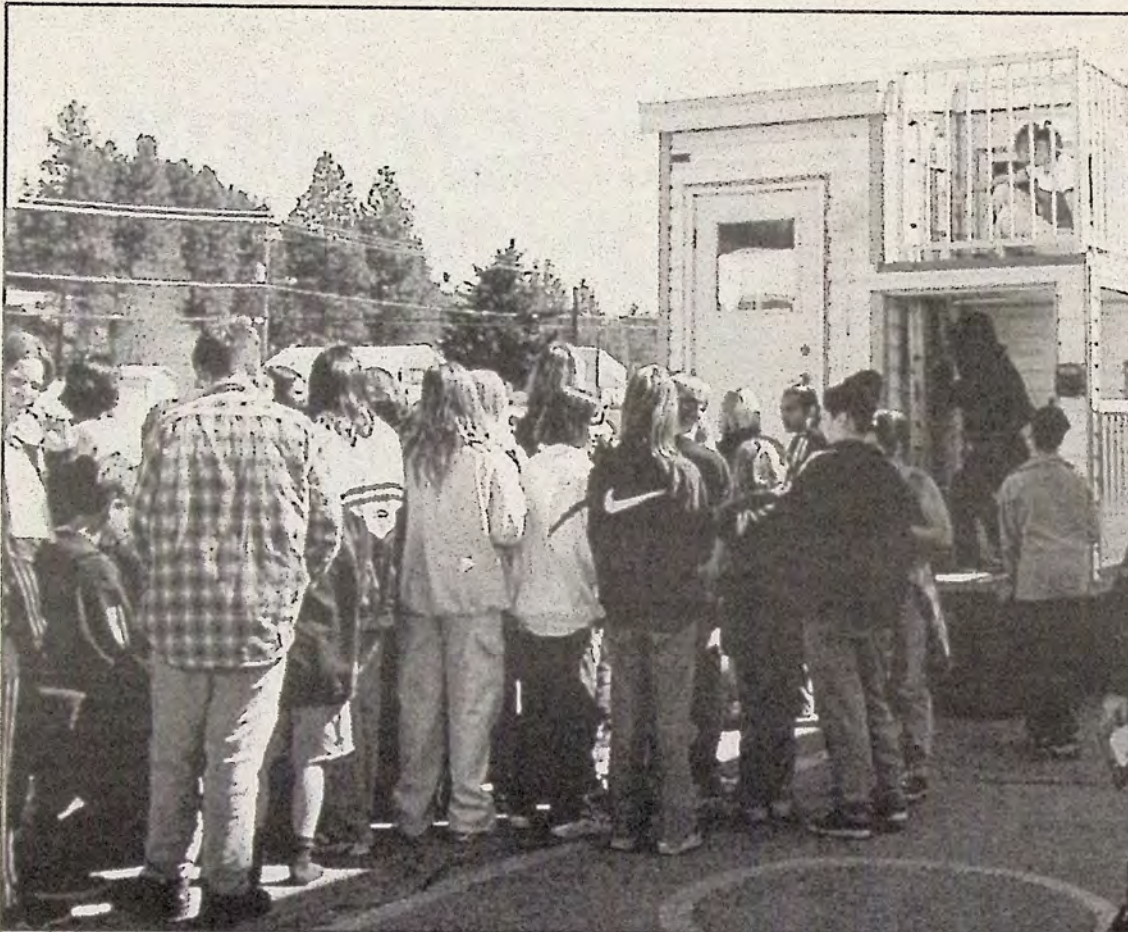

Ashnola Land Claims

Band wants speedy solution

SIMILKAMEEN - In a letter dated May 13/99, to Gordon Wilson, B.C. Minister of Aboriginal Affairs, Lower Similkameen Indian Band (LSIB) Chief Moses Louie requested a meeting with Mr. Wilson and other provincial government ministers to "discuss urgent matters relating to the access and usage of the Ashnola Road by Gorman Bros. Lumber Ltd. for forest development purposes." Chief Louie stressed the important timing of this meeting, as logging and hauling is scheduled to begin later in May, and says "the Band Council is vigorously opposed to any such activity in the absence of formal protocol agreements with both the company and with your government." He added that "there remains a dispute between our governments on the status of the portion of Ashnola Road which crosses our community at I.R. #10" and mentioned "similar unresolved issues on I.R. #12 and I.R. # 12A." These last two reserves are located west of Twin Lakes on the road to Apex.

In the Ashnola matter, Moses expressed the Band's feeling that, though Gorman Brothers and the Ministry of Forests had "participated reasonably in negotiations on working protocols," capacity issues have compromised the Band's ability to participate meaningfully in land and resource management within their territory, and greatly affected their ability to successfully participate in the Forest Development Review and related

plans. The letter asks for a commitment from the Provincial Government to provide the necessary resources that will enable the Band community to "meaningfully and effectively participate in these negotiations," and reports that the Band has requested Gorman Bros. Lumber Ltd. to cease all development activities in the Ashnola Watershed until the "broader issues of road ownership and access are resolved" between the respective governments.

The letter expresses the Band's frustration over the length of time it has taken the government to deal with the Ashnola Road issues and says, "the Lower Similkameen Indian Band has no desire to unduly disrupt the local economy through our actions, nor do we intend to be anything less than diligent in our efforts to protect our land and our people from the misguided actions of others." They prefer to remain committed to open negotiations "carried out in good faith and supported by adequate resources." The Band sent copies of the above letter to Gorman Brothers, to several levels of government, including Native, to the Okanagan Similkameen Regional District and to Keremeos Mayor J.C. Stranart.

Responding to its copy of the above letter at its regular meeting of May 17/99, Keremeos Council agreed to send a letter to the Ministry of Forests stating they hope for a speedy resolution to the Ashnola Road Issues and encouraging them to work with

the Ministry of Aboriginal Affairs on the problem, because valley jobs are dependent on these issues being resolved. At the same meeting, Keremeos Council received a copy of a letter dated May 6/99 from Gorman Bros. to the Minister of Forests, David Zirnhelt, stating that for the "1999-2000 harvesting year, 25% of our timber supply is at risk due to the uncertainty of access over Ashnola Road" and that not accessing this timber would cause "immense hardship" to the 250 employees involved, because it represents 13 weeks of operation. Gorman Brothers' letter urges that the LSIB Ashnola Road issues "need to be resolved quickly and to a degree that will allow operations to continue."

Judge orders fine

Stephen Tait, a Hedley resident, pled guilty to a charge of driving without due care and attention when he appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on May 20.

Crown Counsel advised the court that Tait had been driving a tractor trailer unit on Highway 3 when police saw him stop in the middle of the highway. His load was loose and part of it dragging. Tait then went on and later pulled-off the highway, taking the turn too wide. Police followed and charged Tait.

Judge B. Grannary ordered Tait to pay a \$500 fine.

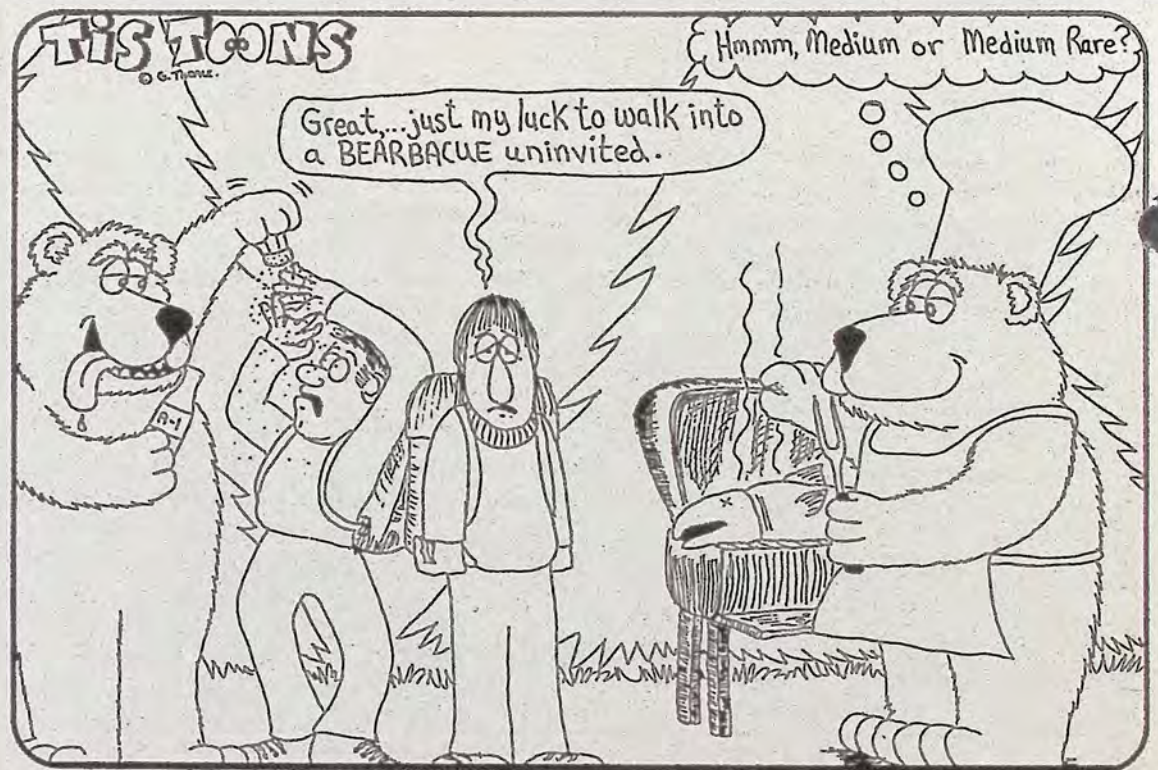

Kingsvale route makes sense

Dear Editor;

Re: the Kingsvale-Aspen Grove route for the Okanagan cut-off:

This route seems to have far too much common sense for politicians to be able to understand it.

Prior to construction of the Okanagan connector, there were many meetings on the subject, and all meetings that I attended were in support of the Kingsvale-Aspen Grove route, and in opposition to the reconstruction of Hamilton Hill. Support came from all Okanagan municipalities, Chambers of Commerce, agricultural groups (cattlemen, orchardists, etc.). Highways personnel argued in favour of the Hamilton Hill route, probably under pressure from their political bosses.

Highways personnel made some statements I consider almost false, such as: it would take a loaded truck only 15 minutes longer to go from Kingsvale into Merritt and back up Hamilton Hill than it would if they could go direct.

If anyone is in doubt, just look at a map and check the mileage and elevation differences.

The cost of the Kingsvale-Aspen Grove route would have been far less than the Hamilton Hill reconstruction and they, or should I say we, would have retained the very usable Hamilton Hill road. I do not recall the savings estimate.

Princeton has been fleeced by

politicians in favour of Merritt for many years, in my opinion, because we do not have the voting strength. Estimates released say 65 per cent of the timber in Merritt Forest District lies south of the Similkameen and Tulameen Rivers, but the Forestry Office in Princeton was closed and moved to Merritt. Now forestry workers have at least 200 kilometers to travel each day to serve that area. No common sense there.

It seems to me the present upgrading of about 40 kilometres of the Princeton-Merritt road, along with the Minister of Highways Lali's double-laning project is another ploy in getting the timber to Merritt, rather than it being processed in Princeton!

The building of the Kingsvale-Aspen Grove route should be of prime importance to the Okanagan. The added cost to all goods, to and from the Coast, must be substantial. These are costs the consumer must pay.

The fuel savings, in litres as well as dollars, along with fuel emissions, are an item I think all Highways constructors, Ministers included, should take very seriously!

I think Highways Minister Harry Lali will have a difficult time to find arguments in favour of his proposal.

When political expediency overtakes economics and common sense, we should not allow it to happen.

While we can be cautiously optimistic about the state of the forest sector in the short term, the government is working to address long-term issues.

It's a few years now since Tina (not her real name) built the fort up in the bush with the other Tulameen kids. This past fall, we bumped into her while browsing through Eaton's Centre Mall in Victoria.

Tina, after graduating from Princeton Secondary School, left Tulameen, spending almost a decade in the naval arm of Canada's armed forces based in Esquimalt.

"Yes, I'd be in the Gulf now were I not mustering out," she told us. This was just before Desert Fox in Iraq.

She had enjoyed being out to sea. Of a complement of 250 members on a frigate, 40 were women. She was never subjected to sexual harassment and felt that it there were any, it would probably be no more than in civilian life. She felt that some of those who did suffer from it brought it on themselves.

Tina said it was time for her to move on to family life, and there is no daycare centre on a frigate. She had loved her experience in the Forces.

We don't always realize where and when our young people are serving to maintain peace and order in the world at personal risk.

It is doubly disturbing now, when we hear the hassle between the federal government and the provincial government to close

from something, and in the end, takes away from the event itself.

Town taxes climb one per cent

KEREMEOS - Four Bylaws received third reading at the Keremeos regular Council meeting of May 3, and were adopted by Council at a special meeting

on Friday, May 7.

Expenditure Bylaw No. 592, 1999, allows for \$7,000 to be appropriated from the the Sewer Development Cost Charge Reserve Fund, having an uncom-

mitted balance at April 28/99 of \$31,002.37, to pay a portion of the Sewer Treatment Plant upgrade debt. Any unspent balance from the \$7,000 will be returned to the Reserve Fund.

Annual Budget Bylaw No. 593, for the year ending December 31, 1999, allows for total General Fund Revenue of \$1,197,973 and total General Fund Expenditures of \$1,185,781, leaving a surplus of \$12,191; total Water Revenue of \$48,000 and total Water Expenses of \$47,470, leaving a surplus of \$530; total Sewer Revenue of \$280,814 and total Sewer Expenditures of \$275,644, leaving a surplus of \$5,170.

Capital Works Budget Bylaw No. 594, 1999, outlines fund sources and expenditures for Capital Works up to the year 2004. Total Capital Expenditures balance with Total Capital Funds for each year. The 1999 figure is \$131,594.

Tax Rates By-Law No. 595, 1999, represents a 1% across the board tax increase for Municipal, Regional District, and Regional Hospital purposes.

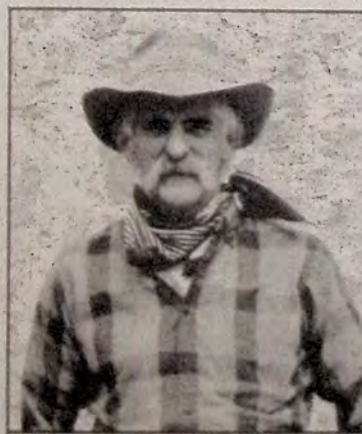

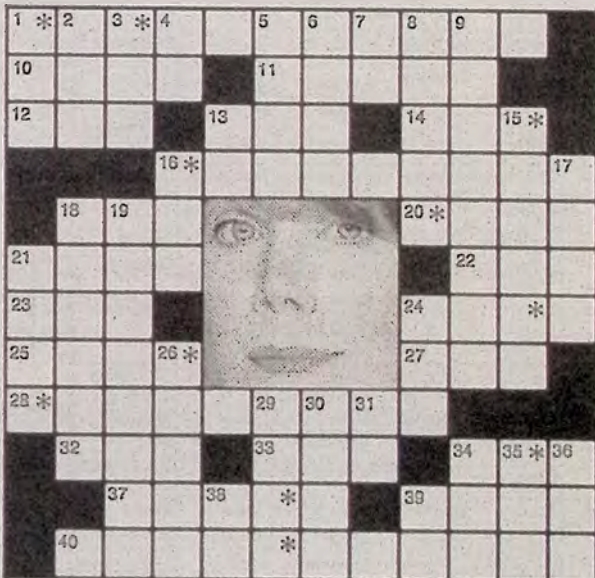

PRINCETON - On May 17, two tourists from Blackridge, West Lothian, Scotland, arrived in Vancouver and drove to Princeton to try to locate the gravesite of Matthew Marshall, a victim of the Blakeburn Mine disaster of August 13, 1930.

The two tourists, both Robert Marshall, are the son and grandson of Matthew Marshall. They stayed at the Princeton Motel. When Robert Marshall Sr. was a boy, he lived at Blakeburn. He related his story to Dulcie Magistad, who operates the Princeton Motel. She said she had heard of the old town, but referred them to Eric Goodfellow.

Goodfellow took the Marshalls to funeral director Fred Netherton and explained their quest. Fred contacted the Town office and they soon produced a map showing the Blakeburn section of Princeton Cemetery.

Only a few names were shown, the rest marked as unknown graves. Fortunately, the name Matthew Marshall was there and the exact spot of his gravesite was located. With the help of Larry Catlin, the unmarked plot was measured out to the inch and the gravesite defined. The next morning, Fred placed a temporary plastic marker on the grave.

The two gentlemen from Scotland had other places to go, but said they would be back for the weekend and would order a proper headstone to place in loving memory of their father and grandfather.

They hoped the roads would be clear enough for them to visit the Blakeburn townsite and recall the tragic event of 69 years ago.

They were ecstatic with the success of their trip, and appreciative of all those who helped them.

Trophy hunting adds conservation

What is trophy hunting?

Does it have a place as a management tool in the conservation of wildlife resources?

Trophy hunting is a greatly misunderstood term. It could be defined as a concept similar to that of catch and release fishing where people are asked to catch their limit, but limit their catch. In hunting, this is done by selecting for quality, not quantity. For example, a hunter may choose not to harvest a particular animal in the challenge of finding one which fits a personal, pre-determined set of criteria based on body size, antler or horn size, fur quality, or sex.

This concept of trophy hunting came about during the late 1800's from a desire to encourage hunters to reduce their harvests. At that time in history, Wildlife was badly depleted and many species were in danger of extinction. During this era hunters received recognition and prestige for their success', based on the quantity of game harvested. In order to shift the emphasis away from quantity and to encourage limiting the harvest, trophy competitions and records keeping was started. The recording and publication of records became useful in two important ways. The first was as a historical record of wildlife quality, enabling ongoing comparisons for the future to indi-

cate positive or negative trends in wildlife populations. The second was to help promote fair chase ethics and to educate hunters on the need for the principles of conservation, wildlife management, and good sportsmanship.

In today's society hunters receive far less recognition for their hunting abilities, and often receive negative recognition for these activities. There is the notion that trophy hunters kill only for the prestige gained, and do not utilize the meat of the animals harvested. In reality, this is not what happens. Most hunters hunt for meat and trophies are a secondary bonus to that pursuit. Hunters that are trophy hunters utilize the edible meat of animals harvested.

Ian Tyson

Second high with second career

Ian Tyson is one of a kind... authentic and durable. During the British Invasion of popular music, Ian and Sylvia evolved into pioneers of country rock.

After hosting a national Canadian television music show from 1970 to 1975, Tyson realized his dream of returning to the Canadian West.

The music and marriage of Ian and Sylvia had ended and it was now or never. Disillusioned with the Canadian country music

scene, Tyson decided the time had come for him to return to his first love - training horses in the big ranch country of southern Alberta.

After three idyllic years cowboy-ing in the Rockies at Pincher Creek, Tyson, at the urging of his new wife, Twylla, recorded the album *Old Corrals and Sagebrush* consisting of cowboy songs, both traditional and new.

Unbeknownst to Tyson and friends, the cowboy renaissance was about to find expression at the inaugural Elko Cowboy Poetry Gathering in 1983. Tyson was invited to perform his "new western music" and the overwhelming response at Stockman's Casino brought Tyson the realization that he had found his true audience.

Tyson considers himself a very fortunate man. His second music career takes him to concerts all over North America, where he is able to ride the deserts and sage hills with his friends from Alberta to Mexico. "I like to surround myself with the most talented musicians," Tyson says, "so that people not directly from the ranch culture can enjoy an evening with us through the music alone. Everyone, it seems, can relate to a song like *Someday Soon* and that's the kind of communication I strive for."
