Judge Archibald Gallowsmith arrived in a four-seater carriage for a criminal court special session at the Community Skills Centre. Mayor Randy McLean accompanied the judge, as did two women of questionable repute, stirring hushed controversy and speculation as to the group's recent activities.

Miss Kitty. This woman, dressed in a very short black satin dress that exposed a considerable area of black silk stocking between hem and boot-top, wiped lipstick from Judge Gallowsmith's face while he was on the bench! and actually planted a kiss on him, giving all persons in the gallery a shocking rear view of the above-mentioned silk stockings. At one point, Miss Kitty was heard to exclaim, "Way to go, Pookey!" The first person to be tried was schoolmaster Shane O'Malley,

accused of contributing to the delinquency of minors by teaching them to gamble. All cases were defended by a country lawyer who appeared to have limited courtroom experience and a loose grasp of the law. O'Malley was rapidly convicted and sentenced to wearing a Bill Miner T-shirt.

Val and Jim Kjarsgaard, respectable local proprietors, had been arrested for encouraging undesirables to loiter at their place of business. Despite

protests and lack of evidence, Val was pronounced guilty and Jim, who was not present, was found guilty in absentia. Both were sentenced to having a last supper at Castle Restaurant.

Mayor Randy McLean and Councillor Kathleen Clement were accused of encouraging vandalism in the form of paintings on the walls of downtown businesses. For once, the defense made a point with Judge Gallowsmith, reminding him that Town Council paid his salary. That case was thrown out of court.

Exports increase

VICTORIA - Export numbers released by Statistics Canada for the month of March show a steady upward trend in B.C.'s exports. The March figure was 10.6 per cent over March 1998, with an 8.4 per cent increase for the first quarter over the same quarter in 1998.

Goods valued at \$6.5 billion were shipped from B.C. from January

through March 1999, half a billion higher than 1998.

Other resource-based provinces in Canada showed decreased exports for the period over last year's performance.

B.C.'s manufactured goods are showing an increased percentage for export shipments. They have been steadily increasing for the past 12 months.



Just imagine Noah

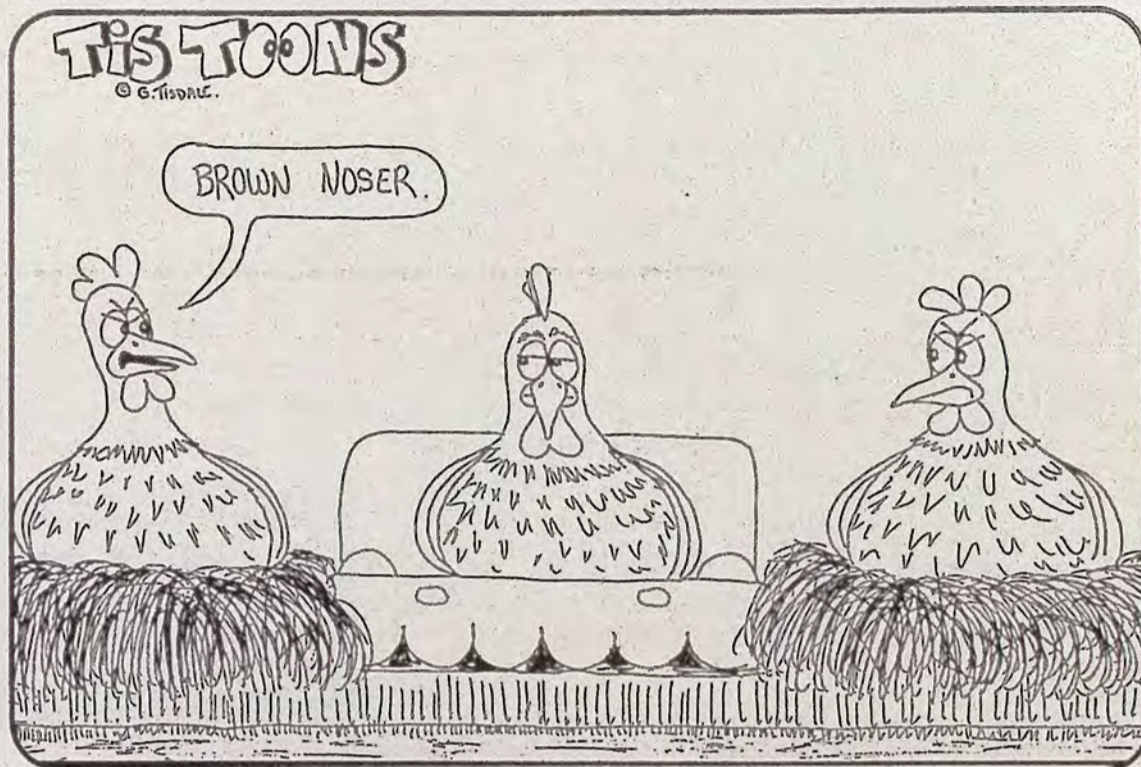
We prepared for flood in the Similkameen Valley. We built dikes, stored sandbags, had countless meetings, trained people, and we did everything we could to meet the coming problem. However, these are modern times, and can you imagine what Noah would have had to go through if he received a vision today of world-wide flood?

Visualize this: Noah wakes up and announces he is going to build an ark because God told him to do it. First, he has to get a building permit. This may take months, because the building inspector will have to check into whether or not arks are allowed in Noah's zoning, and then the inspector will have to find the regulations in the Building Code for proper construction of an ark. All of this comes only after Noah has submitted detailed drawings of the ark (in triplicate).

If Noah does manage to acquire a building permit, then he will have to deal with naval authorities to ensure the ark is seaworthy according to the standards set for ships. If the authorities are the same people who approved the most recent B.C. ferries, Noah should pass that test with no problem.

The final hurdle will come when he attempts to stock it with animals. There will be permits required for confinement of wildlife, and more permits for the importation of exotic animals, and he will have to employ a veterinarian. Further, he will have to ensure the safe disposal of all animal wastes in a manner that does not contaminate the environment. If Noah ever jumps these hurdles, he will have to deal with the human health authorities who may condemn the ark as unfit for human habitation.

If God has any intentions of doing away with the human race again by a flood, the survivors on any possible ark will not come from urban North America. The authorities would never permit it.

As far as I know, he is the only corporate head in Canada who has done so. Equally ironic is the fact that only months before, this same Board of Trade had invited Premier Ralph Klein of Alberta to address the board and presented him with an award for so drastically cutting health care and other social programs in his province.

Baillie described himself as the "son of a small town doctor whose compassion in the days before Medicare was too often all that stood in the way of the sick having to choose between retaining their life savings or preserving their health."

"I believe it is high time that we in the private sector went on record to make the case that Canada's health care system is an economic asset, one that today, more than ever, our country dare not lose. If there is one priority that brings Canada together from coast to coast, it is the desire to see our universal health care system preserved. It is the number one issue. Our publicly-funded health system is

the fairest, most equitable of all alternatives."

Replying to the advocates of a two tier health system, Baillie replied that while he supports the market system, "it cannot work in the context of universal health care."

He described the advantages of Medicare as including administrative savings and economies of scale.

He noted that in the United States, with its privatized health system, over 40 million Americans are not covered and warned that under a private system in Canada "a by-pass operation would cost \$50,000 to \$100,000."

He told his business audience that a privatized health care system in Canada would not be good for them.

"It would cost every business, large and small, more if they had to pay for benefits themselves. In an era of globalization, we need every competitive and comparative advantage we have, and the fundamentals of our health care system is one of those advantages."

Baillie also called for some

changes in our health care system including more and better home care and community care facilities, treating people who now go to emergency in community clinics, the creation of multi-disciplinary clinics that would operate on a seven day week and provide a full range of providers, more research and resources for illnesses that will affect our growing elderly population, such as diabetes, osteoporosis and Alzheimer's disease, improvements for nurses whose numbers will need to be increased by 110,000 in the next decade, and more attention to the health of our youth where there is a crisis of obesity and disturbing data on sugar and fat intake.

This speech by Charles Baillie, which is certainly in sharp contrast to that of the views of his corporate colleagues, will be welcomed by the vast majority of Canadians who support our publicly-funded health care system.

From Keremeos, Terra Lewis placed fourth in Break Away Roping with a time of 3.0 seconds, and the Barrington Ranch Team of Mathew and Brad Quaadvlieg and Mackenzie Keller scored first in the Wild Cow Milking contest.

Princeton cowgirl Renee Willis won Novice Ladies Barrel Racing for the second year in a row winning the Don and Marg Carleson Trophy. The Carlesons were involved in the Rodeo organization for 25 years and their son James was this year's Rodeo

Announcer. In Team Roping, Princeton's Kenny McLean took third place with Stan Thompson and a time of 6.7 seconds, and fifth place with Ty Lytton and a time of 8.1 seconds.

Wayne and Charlene Parker of the K Mountain Inn gave out 16 Mutton Bustin' Trophies. There were 83 entrants in the Calf Scramble, the most in Secretary Manager of the Elks Rodeo Committee Joe Reichert's memory. The IGA sponsored Calf Scramble Trophy went to Jeff Tebrinkle of Cawston. The \$500 Elks Charity Draw went to Tara Stewart and the Brahma Boots to Charlie Peterson.

According to Reggie Reichert organizer, the Rodeo Parade had about 106 entries, and only 8 were last minute. There had been steady participation in parade preparation since mid-March. Last year there were 109 entries despite the rain. This year's

"These kinds of transactions take place in the home or face to face, where people can be subject to high pressure sales tactics," said Attorney General Ujjal Dosanjh. "Now, consumers have 10 days to change their minds if they want to return what they bought or cancel a contract."

The new regulations cover direct sales contracts and for all contracts for future services and personal property time-shares.

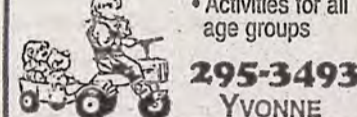

Small community grants protected through 2001

SIMILKAMEEN - Keremeos and Princeton will still receive their small community grants through 2001. In a news release dated April 21, received at Keremeos Council's May 3 general meeting, the Ministry of Municipal Affairs states that "unconditional provincial grants for communities with fewer than 5,000 people will be fully protected for the next two

years." It adds that these grants have been protected since 1996. The total grant is to be maintained through 2001 at \$23.8 million and is shared among 68 B.C. communities. Municipal Affairs Minister Jenny Kwan says the grants have been protected to allow small communities to provide core municipal services at levels comparable to larger centres.

Keith Chapman of Georgetown, Texas, won Saddle Bronc first section.

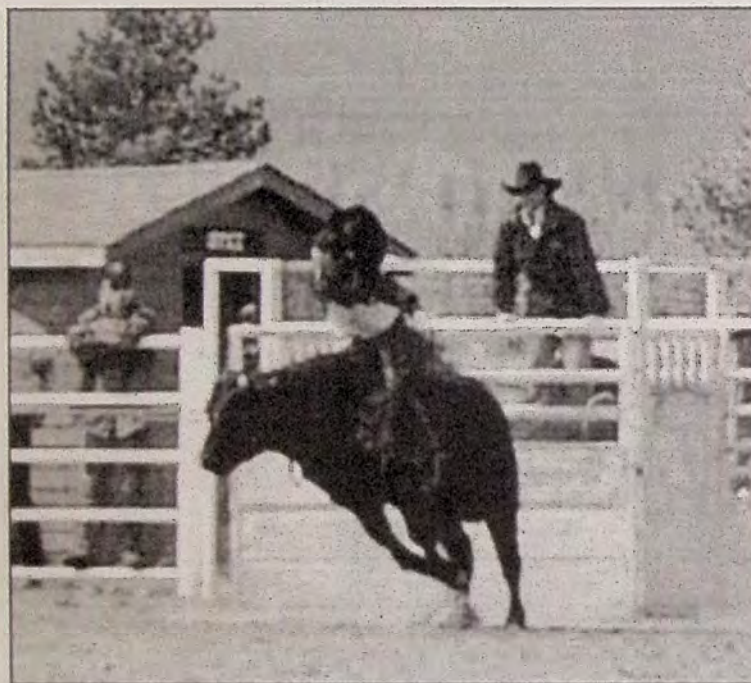
Alberta ladies tied for first place.
