

Last Pony Express of the millennium

It was the "last of the millennium", to quote Princeton Mayor Randy McLean as he wished the riders well on their way to Tonasket.

The flag-bearers paraded to Princeton Post Office early Friday morning, where the customary ceremony took place. Patti Harrower sang both the American and Canadian national anthems, Mayor McLean said a brief prayer, and Lily Ford handed over the saddlebags containing the pony express mail to first rider Linda Allison.

Flag-bearers for Princeton were Melissa Bowen, Mandy Thair and Paula McLean. Flag-bearers for Tonasket were Sarah Sassie, Omak Stampede Queen Rozalyn Pellegrini, and Katie Walker.

Riders for the Canadian side were Patti Harrower, Bob Lind, Linda Allison, Roy Harker, Ralph Kuntzman, Bob Wicks, Justin Smith and Jack Thomas.

Riders for the American side were Jim Weed, Josh Kuhlman, Bob and Pete Moyer, Jim Zackman, Travis Stansbury, Katrina Helleson and Clint (?).

Riders for the ambushes, which took place in Keremeos and just west of Chopaka Customs House, were Paul Joe, Wayne Terbasket, Greyhawk Peone and Skin Michel. These riders had painted their horses, and two had painted their faces. Tourists in Keremeos were highly impressed with the two young men with painted faces and requested the opportunity to have their photos taken with the horsemen.

The border ceremonies included dignitaries from both sides of the border. Mayor Randy McLean was the announcer. Patti Harrower sang O Canada, and Kay Manning sang the American national anthem.

The Town of Oliver was represented by Mayor Linda Larson. She expressed the wish for many more years of "this successful event."

John Brent stood in for Member of Parliament Jim Hart. He brought good wishes from Parliament, and from Hart, who had just returned from a conference on Kosovo, and wished everyone well "as you celebrate this much-envied friendship between our two nations."

Senator Bob Morton from Olympia, Washington, attended for the state.

"We have the responsibility to see that the freedom of the free passage across the border is preserved by young people in the new millennium," Morton said.

Ashnola dispute not with people

SIMILKAMEEN - In an interview on Monday, May 31, Dixon Terbasket, Lower Similkameen Band Manager, stated that the Ashnola Road Issues dispute is with the B.C. Government, not the general public. The general public is still allowed passage. The Band and Gorman Brothers Lumber are currently waiting for the B.C. Government to respond both to the Bands May 13 request for a meeting with provincial government ministers to discuss Ashnola Road issues and Gorman Brother's May 6 letter to the Minister of Forests stating that Ashnola Road Issues needed to be resolved quickly.

Dixon explained that the Ashnola Road that crosses Indian Reserve #10 was originally an Indian trail, then a wagon trail for prospectors. Without consent, or compensation to the Band, the Ashnola road was constructed through Lower Similkameen I.R. #10 in 1912. Later, the B.C. Government decided to expropriate the road under Order of Council #1036. Any road built before 1938 was designated by the B.C. Government as a 1036 road.

Additional lands were taken from the reserve in 1964 when the road route was altered without the consent of the Band. Dixon says you can still see where the old road crossed the new in places. The Band was only compensated \$150 for a small section, 1.75 acres, where the road crosses the railway. This was done through the Indian Commissioner in 1963.

Health Plan attracts few to meeting

PRINCETON - The May 30 meeting inviting several groups to review the local draft health plan drew only six people.

Ray Huey, Chair of Community Health Advisory Committee, expressed disappointment with the turnout, but each person represented a group. He hoped they would pass on the information to their members.

Huey commented favourably on the meeting held with Princeton and District Community Services. He appreciated their written submission and hoped other groups would give their views in writing.

Ambulance costs
After some discussion at a previous meeting about the cost of transporting patients to other hospitals, Hospital Administrator Dorothy Cobb researched the information (ambulance costs are not part of the hospital budget).

Each ambulance trip has a basic pick-up cost of \$54.00, which covers the first 40 km. Every additional kilometre is billed at 50 cents. Then the cost of staff comes on top of the travel costs for the machine.

A trip to Penticton costs \$96.50 plus \$162 for staff (\$258.50) A trip to Kelowna costs \$121.50 plus \$216 for staff (\$337.50). A Vancouver trip would cost \$184 plus \$324 for staff (\$408).

Although these costs do not come from the hospital budget, they are part of total health care costs for B.C. The initial discussion was about whether or not so many ambulance trips are justified, and whether the transportation of so many cases had an adverse impact on hospital utilization.

Work continues on plans for Ridgewood Lodge and should go to tender soon.

Councillor Kathleen Clement asked what would be put into the space left when extended care is removed, but no plans have been made.

Laurie Currie reported that money is still coming in to the Foundation, but he was not sure what the current total is, nor what plans are being made for future fundraisers.

Three applications are being considered for the \$1,780 innovation fund. The CHAC has a plan of its own under consideration. They were thinking of putting on a health fair.

Regional Health Board

The Regional Board will meet in Princeton on June 16 at 7:00 p.m. at the Skills Centre. This will be a public meeting.

Princeton has had no voice on the Regional Health Board for the past four months, and the CHAC has been asking for an appointee.

Two nominations have been submitted. An announcement was promised for May 15, but none was made. CHAC chair has complained to MLA Harry Lali about the delay.

Don Coyle is now on the CHAC, attending the May 31 public meeting. There is still no representative from health care providers, although that group has been asked to send a spokesperson. Huey suggested the CHAC may have to appeal to the public for a person to fill the vacant seats.

Nancy Allison, representing the Similkameen Indian Bands, began, "Welcome to our territory, and safe passage through our territory."

This brought grins and chuckles all around.

She added her wishes for a good ride to Tonasket.

Former Princeton mayor Gloria Stout had the opportunity to chide her former alderman, Randy

McLean, on his introduction, much to everyone's delight. She remarked on the origins of the relationship between Tonasket and Princeton, saying all of the Okanagan communities had been encouraged to form sister cities, but Princeton and Tonasket had been the only sister cities that kept the relationship alive. She congratulated all of the riders and workers.

Both rodeo club spokesmen, Bob Wicks from Princeton and Bert

Beeman from Tonasket, talked about the hard work of the ride, and thanked everyone.

The official flag exchange was once again, and for the last time this century, done by William "Pinky" Foster (formerly of Princeton) and Bill Higgenbottom, of Tonasket, who did the flag exchange so many times over the years.

The riders went on to Tonasket, stopping en route at Loomis for pie and ice cream.

The rest of the weekend, for those who remained in Tonasket, would be taken up by the Founder's Day parade and rodeo. Princeton sent the Welby Stage for the parade and rodeo grand entry.

(Editor's note: There is something remarkably satisfying about the border ceremony as a testimony of friendship between people. The cowboys, ranchers and politicians who make the effort to keep this border ceremony alive are to be commended.)

The Band consent form dated January 24/63 that grants the right for B.C. Highways to purchase the 1.75 acres shows only "typed" signatures of the Chief and one Councillor. In his letter of Feb. 19/63 to Indian Affairs Ottawa, J.V. Boys, the Indian Commissioner for B.C., states that "the eventual transfer for the proposed right of way for forestry access purposes will involve 1.75 acres only." The new road construction in 1964 involved 11.75 acres more than what was originally agreed to by the Band. This new area off the original road path is in dispute as well as the original \$150,000 purchase that the band feels was unjustly done. According to Dixon, the Ministry of Transportation and Highways is now claiming ownership of the disputed section and declaring it to be a public road, but actual legal documents deem it to be a Forest Service Road only.

Dixon says the Natives were very sensitive to the original settlers and helped keep them from starvation. He says the Natives today are still trying to act in good faith, but they need the government to respond in good faith and help them with public education, and with capacity issues such as manpower, money, and resources that currently affect the Band's ability to effectively participate in negotiations.

Chocolate lilies on Hembre Ridge

PRINCETON - The hike scheduled for this date was to be up to Bear Lake, but that was changed when two feet of slushy snow were reported on the trail. Hembre Ridge, during the peak of the chocolate lily - Calypso flower bonanza was a great alternative. Fifteen members of the Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists strolled through the beautiful open aspen groves and open rangeland studded with the biggest and oldest Douglas Fir and Ponderosa Pine I have ever seen. The area had been logged long ago, but the biggest trees were left for us, I am told because they were too big to handle with horses and sleighs used for logging in those days. May they stand forever.

This is an area where brown Chocolate Lilies abound, interspersed with our local orchids, called Calypso Flowers or Fairyslippers, smaller relatives of the Lady's Slipper Orchid. You have to get down on your knees to savour the full beauty of these small jewels, but try not to smell the Chocolate Lilies, which have a scent of rotten meat, much prized by the beetles which pollinate them. Lupines are showing signs of future blooms and brilliant blue larkspur, yellow Desert Parsley, Lemonweed and small white Woodland Star are in full flower.

Our group had lunch in a clearing by an ancient cabin, built with great skill long ago, but now open to the sky. From the crest of the ridge, we could look down into the valley of Summers Creek, and far away to where the Three Brothers mountains, in Manning Park, shone white with a heavy burden of snow.

One of our group picked a number of Early Morel mushrooms, and dined on them that evening. He was still feeling fine when he phoned me, presumably because he was careful to parboil them to remove any toxins before frying them and to refrain from con-

sumption of alcohol before he ate them. The guidebooks claim that alcohol and morels don't mix very well at all. After taking such precautions, he proclaimed them delicious. Linda Neuman led this relaxing hike through a wonderful country.

The next hike is scheduled for June 7, Monday, up Polecutter Road, to catch the breeding birds on the plateau, especially Hermit Thrushes. It will involve very short hikes along old logging roads. Call Jerry Herzig at 295-7384 if you wish to come, and

be at the bus depot at 8:00 a.m. A second much longer hike is scheduled for Darcy Mountain, on Saturday, June 12. Meet at the depot at 9:00 a.m., and call Myrna Bosomworth at 295-3374.

The monthly evening meeting of the naturalists will be held Monday, June 14, at 7:00 p.m. in Town Hall. Tom Ethier will speak on his research on Goshawks on Vancouver Island and will discuss the Swan Lake conservation project, in which we will be involved.

Imperial earns more

VANCOUVER - Imperial Metals Corporation reports first quarter revenues of \$23,996,000 compared to \$13,215,000 in the first quarter of 1998. The 1999 quarter included a full three months of operations for both the Mount Polley Mine and the Huckleberry Mine. The comparative quarter in 1998 included the three months of operations for Mount Polley but only one month for the Huckleberry Mine, which was acquired effective February 28, 1998, in the merger with Princeton Mining Corporation.

Weak commodity prices in gold

and copper were partially offset by improved operating efficiencies which included higher throughput and recovery rates. Operating profit was \$359,000 in 1999, a significant improvement over the operating loss of \$2,068,000 in the first quarter of 1998.

Repayments on long term debt totalled \$3,529,000 and capital expenditures were \$1,919,000 during the three months ended March 31, 1999, compared to \$367,000 and \$1,473,000 in the first quarter of 1998.

Former Blakeburn resident joins Hall of Fame

Lloyd Gilmour will attend the Blakeburn/Coalmont reunion with the glow of an honour bestowed on him. In July, in Penticton, he will be inducted into the B.C. Hockey Hall of Fame.

Gilmour has lived in Nanaimo since 1977, but his 23 year career as a professional hockey referee began with his officiating in the Okanagan Hockey League in the early 1950s.

Penticton, Kelowna, Kamloops and Vernon were in the league in those days. He began with the league as a player, but a broken leg put an end to his ambitions. He wanted to stay involved, so he became a referee.

He worked with the Western Hockey League, then went on to the National Hockey League in 1960, and spent 16 seasons as one of the most respected referees in the league. He estimates he officiated in 1,250 games in the NHL and 314 games in Stanley Cup

play-offs.

Gilmour did not expect to be inducted into the Hall of Fame. At age 70, and retired, he is still an active individual and still an NHL fan, keeping a critical watch on the performance of the referees.

Blakeburn is no more than a fond memory, and its former residents have scattered, going on to lead useful lives and achieve their goals. Lloyd Gilmour is one who has achieved more than he expected in terms of national recognition.

Steep fine for no lights

Gary Lind appeared in Provincial Court on June 3 to plead "no contest" to a charge under section 4 (1) of the Motor Vehicle Act, driving without proper headlights. The offense had taken place in March, 1998. He was ordered to pay a \$500 fine "forthwith".

Father responds to gun lobby letter

Dear Editor:
Re: Where's the gun lobby?

In response to the article of Tuesday, June 1, 1999, "Where's the gun lobby?", I would like to assure Mr. Toews that local gun lobbyists remain very active and that our position is not only defensible but is also in the public's best interest.

I have great sorrow for those who've been directly or indirectly affected by the recent tragedies in both the United States and Canadian School Systems. The pain of the families directly affected by the shootings must be horrendous and we should implement changes to prevent these tragedies from continuing to occur. I do not believe that gun control can provide the solution to our problems.

I have two sons, aged two and one, they are not old enough to attend school but I do have concerns about their future and their future safety. Although I am unable to guarantee their safety from the action of others, I am able to educate and instill in them common sense, morality and basic gun safety. I read to them and provide them with educational and fun videos. If you were to ask my two-year-old what he should do if he were to come across a gun he would respond: Stop! Don't Touch! leave the area, tell an adult.

This, in itself, does not equip him with all the necessary knowledge that he will need to be a responsible member of our society, but the process has just begun. It is my belief that if legislation is required to combat our society's problems, then the first

piece of legislation to be introduced should be on which makes a course in parenting a prerequisite to having children!

One thing that I am certain, is that you will not find my sons manufacturing pipe bombs in their bedrooms and you will not find my sons packing my .22 rifle with them to school! I feel this is my responsibility, I must show my sons how to act and what is appropriate and what is not. I must ensure that my children do not have access to items that could potentially harm them or others. I believe parents should be accountable for their children and their children's actions.

Society's problems cannot be addressed by banning this or restricting that, society's problems must be addressed at the root and not on the surface.

Fertilizer is a useful tool that we can use to enhance crops in our gardens. Diesel fuel is a useful tool that we can use to provide ourselves with fuel for heat or transportation. Pipes are useful tools that we can use to move liquid or gases over distances, however, if we combine all of these things together we end up with a deadly bomb! Should we ban or restrict these items? It would seem to me that we should not and in fact, it is not the material or the tool that is to blame for the malicious acts that appear on the nightly news, but the intent of those who commit those acts.

I spent the first 16 years of my life in Liverpool, England. England has very strict gun control legislation and very few individuals have firearms. It is very rare to hear of crimes being

committed utilizing firearms. Does this mean Liverpool, England, is a peaceful place to live? NO! In fact, Liverpool is a very violent place. Whether attending a soccer game in Liverpool on the weekend, or a little old lady walking home from the grocery store, you stand a much greater chance of being injured or killed than you would living in Canada. Where I grew up, it was common to hear about someone's grandma being mugged in an alley, attacked with a bottle, knife, beaten or raped! The perpetrators motivation was money, which usually would be equivalent to \$20 or less! I am sure it may be true that if these individuals had firearms they would most certainly use them to commit their crimes, but once again it is not the tool that commits the crime, it is the individual with the intent.

I now live in the most beautiful place that I have ever been to. The natural beauty surrounding our town, our province and our country astounds me.

I have guns and use them. I live out of town and have frequent visits from bears, cougars, coyotes, etc. and I have two small children. I feel that I need to have a gun on the ready if an attack of some kind were to occur. I hunt, I provide our family with meat that is natural and good for us. I do not poach and I do not take more than we can eat. I believe my actions are responsible, environmentally sound and appropriate. I believe my guns are my tools, dangerous tools, but tools nonetheless.

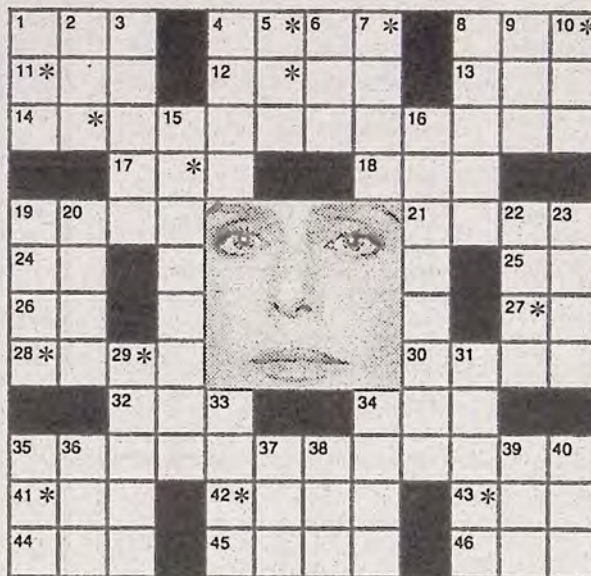

His all-time hit song, The Gambler, is the kind of song known so well that people will join in the chorus "You gotta know when to hold 'em, know when to fold 'em."

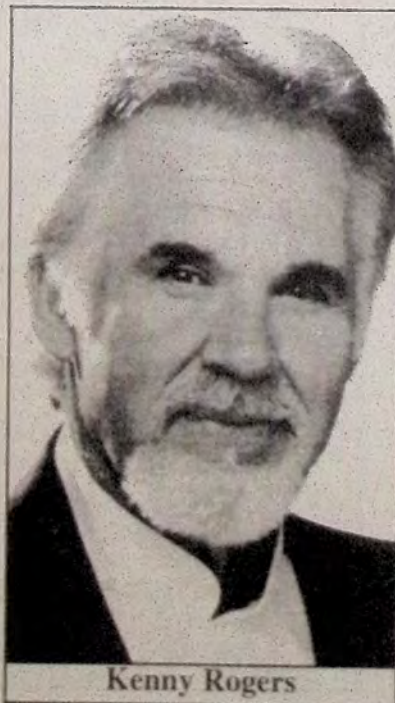
That song launched three television mini-series, adding to the legend of the singer.

Judge ends separation

After being separated since April 10, David Ivan Kristan and his wife, Rebecca, are back together, following a ruling by Judge G. Sinclair in Provincial Court in Princeton on June 3. Kristan appeared to plead guilty to a spousal assault charge, and asked that he be allowed to be with his wife again. His wife was willing. The "no contact" order was imposed at the time of the incident, and upheld later by Judge B. Grannary. The circumstances were questioned when Rebecca

Kristan testified that the statement she gave police on the night of the assault had been a lie. She had told police she had been beaten 30 times prior to the April incident. She said she did not remember giving the statement to police. Both Kristans had been intoxicated at the time of the assault. She said she wanted to return to her husband. Judge Sinclair placed Kristan on probation and warned him, "Any more of this behaviour will land you in jail."

Judge orders fine for breach

Robert Arthur Mullin appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on June 3 to plead guilty and be sentenced for a breach of probation. Mullin failed to report to a probation officer for a period of time in 1998, although he has reported since. Judge G. Sinclair heard statements and read a report telling of Mullin's chronic serious alcohol problem, and noted Mullin had treatment earlier this year and is

taking counselling sessions. The judge ordered Mullin to pay a \$200 fine plus \$20 victim fine surcharge. Judge Sinclair warned Mullin that further convictions as a result of abuse of alcohol, cocaine or other drugs would result in incarceration. Mullin is still on probation. As Mullin left, Judge Sinclair wished him luck on with his abstinence from alcohol.

Two await sentencing

The probation officer is to make a recommendation which will be heard on July 22, when the men will appear for sentencing.

Judge G. Sinclair wanted to impose a "no contact" order between McFarlane and Spahan and Leon Marchand, Jason Alvarez and Sam and Dan Holmes. This was not feasible, as Alvarez often works with McFarlane and Spahan. The judge then ordered that Alvarez was not to be in their company unless there was another adult present.

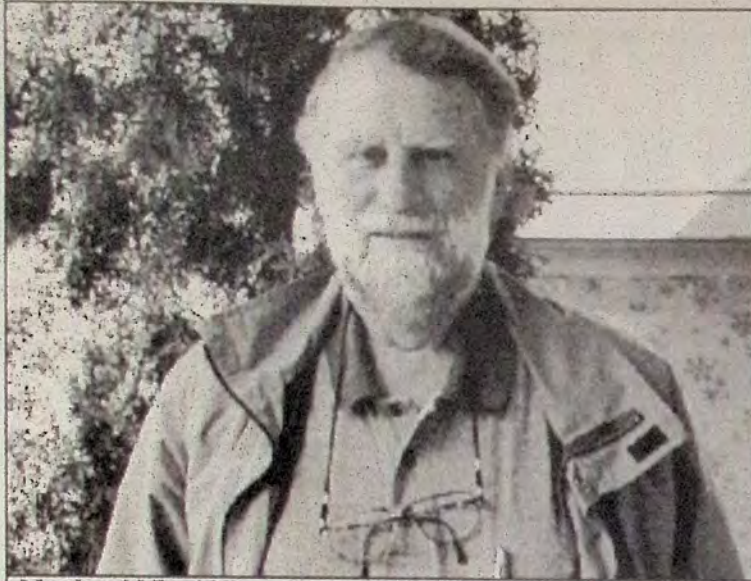
