Horses race Sunday

Leave baby alone!

Conservation Officer Al Lay wants people to be very clear on what to do if they see a fawn, moose calf, or elk calf, or any other baby animal lying alone in the woods.

"Leave it there and leave it alone," Lay warns.

His warning follows a recent incident in which people found a fawn and took it home, believing it to be abandoned. After persuasion from Lay, they took it back, and found the doe waiting for it.

A female deer, elk or moose will leave its young along in the woods for up to 12 hours while she feeds.

"These young may look abandoned, but they're not," says Lay.

Not only does removing a young animal constitute stealing it from its mother, it could be dangerous for the person doing the removing. A doe, cow elk or cow moose may be close, and may attack to defend its young.

Kelowna protesters follow Health Board to Princeton

A busload of Kelowna residents cared enough to bring their protests to Princeton, the location of the June 16 meeting of the Board of Directors of Okanagan Regional Health Board. They were protesting the closure of May Bennett Home, a residence for the elderly, after eight years of promises of rebuilding and expansion.

The meeting at the Skills Centre was crowded. There were not enough chairs for all of those who attended and many stood for most

of the two and one-half hour meeting.

The protesters from Kelowna echoed many frustrations Princeton people have had regarding the future of accommodation for elderly people.

Princeton's Ridgewood Lodge expansion was on the agenda, with Dorothy Westfall and Dorothy Cobb showing the Board the layout design.

Board Chair Murli Pendharkar announced that Alan Rock will be in this region in the third week of

July. Efforts will be made by Regional Health Board members to promote this region as an example of senior's health care and the problems associated with the region.

The Board accepted a Standard of Conduct policy for Okanagan Similkameen Health Region employees. At the end of the meeting, a representative of the health care employees of the region stated they would be having a meeting about the policy

Racing Days: A history of local racing

In a country where a horse was as indispensable as a man's legs, horse racing was a common occurrence. Racing between the natives' and the settlers' horses was always an excuse for a celebration. "The South Similkameen Saga", from Lynda Carter's book *Tall Tales of Horse Racing in the Okanagan Similkameen*, notes that one of the earliest known places for horse racing in this area was about four miles from town on Jura Stock Ranch. Believed to have been in use from approximately 1860 until 1900, this was one of several locations where horse racing took place.

Vermilion Avenue, in Princeton, was used for racing, including the Kloo-chmin (Chinook for "women") Race prior to 1900 and into the twentieth century.

In 1914, the Princeton Athletic and Racing Association purchased 12.7 acres of land located where the airport is today. There were two tracks built on this site. The first existed from 1914 until the land was requisitioned by the government for an airdrome in 1933. The second track was moved closer to the hill and was in use until about 1941 when it became part of a full scale airport and emergency center during the Second World War.

There were two years of racing at Coalmont and Tulameen between 1922 - 1925. For a brief period, racing also took place from 1946 to 1949 at the rodeo grounds on Coalmont Road.

For a number of reasons, primarily lack of employment and economic considerations, racing was fairly dormant in the Princeton area during the late 1940's and 1950's.

In the early 1960's, the Village Recreation Commission asked the government for more recreational facilities and finally, in July 1963, the Village was given 40 of the 300 acres surrounding Swan Lake, with first rights on the remaining portion.

In October, 1964, the Village approved leasing the 40 acres at Swan Lake for recreational use. On October 14, 1964, Princeton Racing Days Association held its first official meeting.

After an all-out effort by a dedicated group of volunteers, utilizing donated manpower, equipment and materials, the first Racing Days at Swan Lake took place July 15 to July 17, 1965.

For better than one hundred years, horse racing has been an important part of local entertainment and Princeton's history.

"There was a collection taken at the gate to get in and a lot of the purses were sponsored by local business men, who welcomed the extra revenue that these events brought to Princeton."

Some of the businesses were Ewart's Hardware, Taylor's Sawmill, Huff's Sawmill, Princeton Hotel, Kit Summer's butcher shop, G. Geddis Lyall's drugstore and Bill Garrison's Livery Stable, just to name a few." (from Lynda Carter's book).

The gambling game

Labour minister responds to pension change critics

Dear Editor;

Over the last several days, the Opposition has attacked our government for "depriving people of their pensions". There is only one problem with these stories: the Opposition is lying.

The legislation I have proposed will not allow the government to take away the pensions earned by employees. It will not stop people from working in non-union jobs. It will not stop them from working in their own businesses.

Contrary to the Opposition's campaign of misinformation, anyone in a pension plan will get the pension benefits they've earned whether they choose to work or not and no matter where they choose to work.

The amendment I have proposed will do one thing only: it will allow pension plan administrators the option of suspending special early retirement benefits that are subsidized by employers and plan members if the early retiree goes back to work in the same trade in the same industry. These extra benefits are above and beyond the benefits actually earned by the retiree. This legislation does not affect the 1000 plus pension plans in B.C. as the Opposition claims. It affects only the 33 multi-employer pension plans in B.C.

It affects only these 33 pension plans because single-employer plans already have this protection, and there is a common sense reason for that protection.

Pension plans are based on pensioners taking their benefits at

age 60 or 65. But a person opting for early retirement will take benefits for a period that is not covered by the payments made to the plan. That is a significant extra cost to the pension plan and it has to be made up somewhere.

Sometimes employers or other members of the plan subsidize that cost. Some of the money they pay each pay-cheque goes towards covering the extra cost of early retirement for other workers.

Working people do not just do this out of the goodness of their hearts. They subsidize early retirement because it is a way to open up employment opportunities for young people. It is also a way to minimize the harm to workers when companies restructure and lay off people, especially older workers who may have trouble finding new employment to carry them over until they reach retirement age.

In other words, there are good economic and social reasons to ensure that pension plans can continue to subsidize early retirement benefits. But those subsidized early retirement benefits are not sustainable if anybody is free to take early retirement benefits at any time and under any conditions. Why would anyone continue to work and pay into the plan? How could a pension plan keep paying for extra early retirement benefits if too many people in a plan took early retirement benefits because they could collect benefits and continue to work doing the same job?

We could, as the Opposition hopes, do nothing. Then pension administrators would probably decide these kinds of subsidized benefits were beyond the ability of the plans to pay for and simply discontinue them. Workers would lose an important extra benefit.

The amendment we have introduced gives pension plan administrators - not the cabinet as the Opposition claims - the ability to set eligibility rules for subsidized early retirement benefits only. It does not affect the regular pension benefits plan members are entitled to after they reach the retirement age set by the plan. But it does ensure that these 33 pension plans will have the rules they need to be able to continue offering subsidized early retirement for pension plan members who have not reached the retirement age set by the plan.

To guard against abuse of this option, there will be disclosure requirements and appeal mechanisms to ensure that plan administrators can justify suspending subsidized early retirement benefits.

This amendment does not take away the regular pensions earned by workers as the Opposition suggests. It protects workers and pensioners who rely on healthy pension plans to pay them the benefits they are entitled to - and even pay for some extra benefits like subsidized early retirement benefits.

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Land Commission will review T.L. Timber request

CAWSTON - Ross Blackwell of the provincial Agricultural Land Commission (ALC) said, when interviewed Tuesday, June 15, that thought the July 1 shutdown deadline for T.L. Timber is still in effect, the Commission will be reviewing new T.L. Timber information this week. If the information is significant, the Land Commission will reconsider Dave Lusted's application to have the land on Which T.L. Timber operates removed from the Agricultural Land Reserve.

Blackwell explained that ALC options go anywhere from refusal to outright approval and anything in between. There are three condi-

tions for reconsideration under Section 26 of the Agricultural Land Commission Act: new evidence not available when the original decision was made, previous decision made on erroneous information, and the Commission may decide to confirm, reverse or vary its previous decision.

Dave Lusted reports that, as of Wednesday, June 16, all his soil

test results are in from retired horticulturist Ted Swales, from the former Summerland Research

Station (now called the Pacific Agrifood Research Centre) and from Fitzpatrick Land Consultants. All confirm that the T.L. Timber operation does not endanger the soil's agricultural possibilities.

Government completes Health Centre analysis

KEREMEOS - The B.C. government has completed its value analysis of the plans submitted by the Lower Similkameen Health Centre Project Building Committee, a process that was to have taken eight weeks. According to Building Committee Chair Walter Despot, the analysis has taken 22 to 23 weeks. On Tuesday, June 15, Walter Despot explained that the value analysis for the building previously known as the Multi-Level Care Facility had just gone to the Ministry of Health.

Despot says that those involved "theoretically" have looked at all necessary changes during the value analysis project, and the Ministry of Health "theoretically" should take about two weeks to do the necessary paperwork, and adds that there "theoretically" should be no more road blocks.

Despot says October is still a

possible date to begin construction, and the site will likely be cleared in September.

"We are working on finalizing legal requirements for the different utilities, at the present time, Despot says, and adds, "There is a lot of energy being expended on obtaining equipment now."

Some equipment will come from the Diagnostic Centre, but the larger facility will require more. The Committee has an equipment grant that will probably cover 60 percent of what they need, but once the Committee has a better idea of what they will still need for both their "must have" and their "wish list", the community will be able to participate in obtaining those things.

Despot says that, though the Building Committee still controls facility development, Okanagan Similkameen Health Region is starting to become more involved, as they will be running the facility when the building is complete.

SIMILKAMEEN - Pat Kilt of Environment Canada reports that, as of Thursday, June 17, the Similkameen River has peaked and there should be a gradual drop in levels. Kilt states the snow that could do any significant damage is now down into the

system and the river level will not rise unless there is an "extremely significant rain event."

Keremeos Village reports that the water marker under the White Bridge registered plus 2 on June 17 and was down to 0 by June 18. The Village does not worry until the marker is at plus 1.5.

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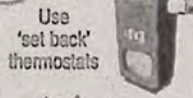

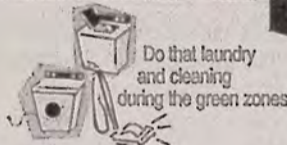

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
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Trout Talk

Nine of the best trout flies for Princeton area lakes and streams

Some years ago, Alex Kinsey, neil McDiarmid and I were teaching adult education fly-tying classes together. We met in room 105 in the old high school. For three years, we gave a handout to class members. It was titled "Eight of the Finest". It described the eight best patterns for B.C. fishing.

Since then, I've come to the conclusion that, for me, the best nine flies for the Interior are as follow (not necessarily in this order):

1) The Royal Coachman is not only the oldest pattern, dating back to Victorian times in England, but also one of the best. Nothing in the lakes or streams looks like it but, no matter, the trout love them. Ask Stan Pietras and other local stream fishermen! I think the white wing is the main attractor, and the red band on the body doesn't hurt, either. Rainbow trout are attracted to red.

2) Next on my list would be the Doctor Spratley. Year in and year out, more people buy the Doc Spratley than any other fly. For the southern Interior, the first sly I usually tie on my leader, on any lake, is a black Doc Spratley. It roughly imitates a leech, closely imitates as dragonfly nymph or damselfly nymph and, in smaller sizes, a caddis fly larva. I like this pattern tied in olive green.

3) The Halfback Nymph is another traditional pattern with years of success in our lakes. Another dark pattern, it represents a number of insects - namely, the dragonfly and damselfly nymphs, Mayfly nymph, and chironomid, when used in smaller sizes. I like to tie my halfbacks with pheasant feather legs, letting them trail back under the body. I call it the Shaggy Halfback.

4) The Green Sedge is another dandy pattern, which I must put on the list. I don't use it a lot myself. However, while saying that, others fishing it have great success. The sedge (or caddis) is abundant in both lakes and streams. This light green fly with gray mallard wings works well in both types of water. Bob King, who fishes Dry Lake almost exclusively, uses this fly very successfully, year after year. Try it trailing behind a bubble bobber of the torpedo type. Spin casters will find it is a deadly combination.

5) Don Gapen, the creator of this fly, grew up near the Nipigon River in Ontario. The Nipigon is famous for huge brook trout. The world record 14.5 pound brookie came from this river. The fly Don developed to fish for them was the Muddler Minnow. It is supposed to imitate the sculpin minnow. We call them bullhead minnows out here in B.C. The Muddler Minnow is my favourite fly. It can be fished dry (as a caddis or grasshopper), wet (as a minnow) or just drifted down a stream (as "who knows what"). Whatever the trout think they are, they really smack them. I use a white muddler I call the Ghost

Muddler to fish in the late evening on McCaffery Lake. It is deadly. I've caught brook trout, rainbow trout, cutthroat trout, Dolly Varden, yellow perch and smallmouth bass with it. If I tried them for other fish, I sure the Muddler would work on them also.

6) Everyone knows the Mosquito. It is the sixth pattern I would put on my list and in my fly box! A size ten Mosquito is the very good imitation of many dry flies found on lake and stream. A few it represents are the Mayfly, midge, gnat, sand fly, and of course the mosquito. Tied with a quill body and hackle tip wings, it is a great fly. It is especially good for stream fishing - the Similkameen and Tulameen. For example. When I was fishing in Alaska in 1980, it was the only pattern I could catch Grayling on. Try some small sizes, 14 or 16, for fussy trout on mid-summer days.

7) Those who have fished a lot have probably wondered if I would mention the Tom Thumb. Well, I certainly will! It is the goofiest-looking dry fly going. It is also the best! Enough said. Try one and you will never go out without a few in your fly box. As they are a fragile fly, made from brittle deer hair, which is also very buoyant, they get chewed up quickly. It doesn't seem to matter how beat up they get from being mauled by trout. The Tom Thumb just keeps working.

8) The last two flies I'd recommend are the newcomers to our area. The Idaho Nymph, a very dark and shaggy-looking fly, is taking second place in my fly sales (The Doc is still #1). Tied on a long-shanked hook, with a clipped hackle body which traps air bubbles, it is an excellent producer. Fished deep on a sinking line, it is a better spring pattern than a Doc, in my opinion. It is taken for a dragonfly or leech, I think. It is difficult to tell what a trout is thinking some days. Try a larger size, say a #4 or #6. I think big trout like meals, and many of our dragonfly nymphs are big!

9) Chironomids are last on my list. I use the plural on purpose. There are many different-coloured larvae, so you should have four colours anyway. These are red, light green, black and tan. Many insects take on the colour of their surroundings and lake bottoms, where chironomids live, are various colours in our southern Interior. The Bloodworm Chironomid pattern gets its red colour from the haemoglobin-rich fluids in its body. These tiny larvae live in oxygen-poor water and need this iron-rich haemoglobin to absorb what little oxygen they have available. Chironomids are the number one food of trout in our lakes. It is odd in a way that it has taken so long for fly fishermen to catch one, pardon the pun, to using their imitations. We have finally done it, and they are deadly, especially in mid-summer. If you are ever "caught" without a

chironomid pattern, a good substitute is a trimmed size 12-14 dry fly Mosquito pattern. Just cut the wings and most of the hackle off, tie it on a two- to three-pound test leader, and toss it out! Let it slowly drift in the surface film of the lake. Watch your line carefully, and when it twitches, gently (because you are using a small hook) strike. Then the fun will begin as an angry Kamloops trout takes to the air.

I realize when writing this that everyone will not agree on my nine finest. Last night I was reading Laurie Currie's Princeton Fishing Lakes written in 1975. Laurie knows our area lakes and streams well, and was President of the local Fish and Game Club then. He included a list of his best 12 flies for our area. Eight of the 12 are the same as on my list. I read Laurie's book after I made my list.

The four patterns he included, which I did not, are the White Moth, Mayfly, Green Shrimp and Green Doc Spratley (which I mentioned in passing).

What am I saying? Just this: patterns come and go, but the old reliables are as good today as they were 25, or even 50, years ago. So you do not need dozens of different patterns. While we don't need them, most fishermen and fisher-women cannot resist them. I am convinced that a lot of patterns on the market are there to catch fishermen more than fish! But who can resist? I have over 350 flies in my tackle box and vest. I usually put on a Black Doc Spratley when I start fishing!

Have fun with your fly fishing. It is one of the world's best sports, in my opinion.

Thief pleads guilty - Judge wonders what to do

Frank Duchon appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on June 17 to plead guilty to having stolen blankets and food from the municipal campground in Princeton on April 14.

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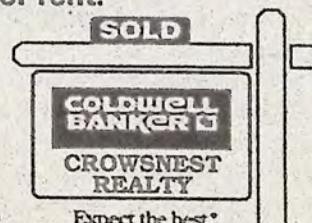

Exports improve

VICTORIA - Numbers released by Statistics Canada show B.C.'s April exports rose by 12 per cent over the same month last year.

Mike Farnworth, Minister of Employment and Investment, said, "April is the eighth month in a row in which exports were up over levels in the previous year. Obviously, these are positive signs that the economy is starting to recover."

Goods valued at \$9.1 billion were shipped from B.C. from January through April 1999, compared with one billion less for the same period in 1998. Much of B.C.'s exports are from resource-based sectors. To date, B.C. shipped \$4.7 million in forestry exports, up 14.8 per cent over January to April 1998. Machinery and equipment increased 17 per cent, and agricultural and fishing products improved 6.9 per cent.

Regional District supports economic development

On June 17, Regional District Economic Development Committee Chair M. Pearce provided the Regional District Board with an overview of economic development activities undertaken by the committee to date. The creed of the committee is "Economic development is job #1."

Industry retention initiatives:

1. Similkameen Valley: Cawston sawmill operation

Keremeos Mayor J.C. Stranart and Electoral Area Director B. Bush provided an insight into the potential job loss associated with an ALR shutdown of a Cawston area sawmill operation. The Committee responded by encouraging the Village of Keremeos, Areas B and G and Agricultural Land Commission to jointly reassess the specific situation and participate in a valley-wide ALR review process with the objective of identifying suitable parcels of land for future industrial use.

2. Similkameen Valley - Ashnola Road Logging Operation

Regional Chair Roger Mayer and Princeton Mayor Randy McLean volunteered to attend a critical June 8 meeting between the Ministry of Transportation and Highways and the Lower Similkameen Indian Band. The purpose of the meeting was to gain a better understanding of the road ownership issue and assist the provincial government and Lower Similkameen Indian Band in their efforts to develop an equitable and sustainable road tenure agreement to preserve logging related jobs.

3. Valley-wide tree fruit industry

R. Husch, President, B.C. Fruit Growers Association, requested support from Regional District in respect to lobbying the provincial government for short and long term funding commitments, and identified the need to assess the competitive advantages bestowed on Washington State growers by

the provincial government via the passage of the Columbia River Treaty Agreement. The Committee responded by supporting the Association's provincial funding request, and a reassessment of the Columbia River Treaty Agreement and Agricultural Land Commission act in the context of the Association funding concerns.

Industry Expansion Initiatives

1. Valley-wide High-tech infrastructure

Regional District Chair Roger Mayer provided an overview of the urban and rural high-tech employment and educational opportunities associated with creating a valley-wide high speed communication link. The Committee responded by agreeing to set aside \$1,040 to fund a portion of the first phase high-tech survey costs. As Chair of the Okanagan Hi Tech Council, he will lead an initiative to become the first region in Canada to develop a jointly funded second generation high speed communication network. This will increase the capacity, speed and access for educational, government and Internet service provider agencies within the Okanagan and Similkameen Valley.

2. Region-wide wine industry survey and potential symposium

D. Milne, City of Penticton Economic Development Officer

and W. Beggs, Community Futures Director, presented a proposal to assess current wine industry regulatory concerns with a view to identifying industry expansion opportunities. The Committee responded by issuing a letter of support for the initiative and extended an opportunity to present a future wine industry symposium funding request.

New Industry Initiatives

1. Summerland and Area University

Summerland Mayor D. Cameron and Economic Development Officer G. Millar presented a proposal to establish a small world class University within the region to provide enhanced educational and employment opportunities to regional constituents. The Committee responded by agreeing to set aside \$5,000 to get the university started.

2. Regional Business Summit

Penticton Chamber of Commerce President J. Howard-Coady presented the concept of convening a regional business summit in partnership with Chambers of Commerce and Community Futures Development Corporation to identify strategies for strengthening the regional economy in order to attract new businesses to the region. The Committee responded by agreeing to set aside \$5,000 to fund a portion of the estimated costs of the summit.

Cards and fraud

Don't let anyone see your personal identification number (PIN) when you key in.

Don't use obvious PIN codes like your birth date or phone number. A thief who steals your wallet and ID could gain access to your bank accounts.

Preventing fraud - refuse any offer if you feel uneasy or unsure. If you won a prize, you should never have to pay for it or buy anything or pay for delivery.

Be wary of contractors who provide quick estimates or offer to do work you did not request.

All contracts MUST include a SEVEN DAY cancellation clause. You do not have to give a reason for cancelling.
