KEREMEOS - Mark Quaedvlieg, President of the Keremeos Stockbreeders Association, and representative for the Southern Interior Cattlemen at the Okanagan-Shuswap Land and Resource Management Plan (LRMP) table, says, "As ranchers, we are looking for balance, and we realize the land use decisions being made will have a major impact on our grazing tenure."

In a petition to Keremeos Village Council at the June 21 meeting, Quaedvlieg stated, "As ranchers, we want fair consideration. We ask that you recognize impacts to our interest when supporting others."

He expressed the ranchers' concern that "a major portion of the southern Crown grasslands are likely to become protected areas or new parks."

Quaedvlieg said the ranchers did not favour more park designation as parks have a history of gradual exclusion and they felt "enough of the Similkameen was taken in Manning and Cathedral."

"Resource management zones recognizing the wildlife values make the most sense and we support a managed timber resource," Quaedvlieg said.

The ranchers suggested that lower level planning from the Co-ordinated Resource Management Plan (CRMP), where all interested parties are included, would be the best forum for finding solutions to the various interests and issues.

Council briefly discussed some aspects of the petition with Quaedvlieg and thanked him for his presentation.

Police arrest former resident for murder

Following a lengthy investigation, Princeton RCMP have arrested 25 year old Jason Richard "Roy" with respect to the murder of Joseph Kenneth "Phen" Drushka.

Roy is a former resident of

Princeton who was residing in Port Alberni, B.C. Princeton RCMP members travelled to Surrey on Friday, June 25, 1999, to make the arrest. Roy was returned to Princeton. He appeared before a Justice of the

Peace in Princeton on Saturday, June 26, charged with the second degree murder of Drushka.

Roy was remanded in custody to appear in Provincial Court in Penticton on June 28.

The body of Phen Drushka was

discovered in his Princeton residence on December 5, 1998, and the investigation has been ongoing since that time. Sgt. Tom Payne of Princeton RCMP detachment was in charge of the investigation with the assistance of the RCMP Major Crimes Sections from Vancouver and Kelowna.

Phen Drushka was known to many Princeton residents as an outgoing, friendly person.

Ice in Space wins Cup fourth time

Armstrong wants local rep

PRINCETON - Councillor George Armstrong is not pleased with what he heard at the June 16 Regional Health Board meeting. He reported to Town Council on June 21 that there was no guarantee Princeton would have a representative on Regional Health Board.

"They stated they had not made an appointment yet, but when they did, it would be a person for the region, not for Princeton,"

Armstrong told Deputy Mayor Kathleen Clement and Council.

Armstrong went on to say it had been his understanding, when the region was formed, that each Health Area (community) would have a representative. He did not agree with people being appointed strictly to represent the region.

"They were supposed to have been elected at some point, but it seems the Minister has changed that idea," Armstrong remarked.

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Lower Similkameen Indian Band meets Aboriginal Affairs Minister

Gordon Wilson, Minister of Aboriginal Affairs, scheduled a meeting on June 28 in Penticton with representatives of Lower Similkameen Indian Band regarding Ashnola Road. Chief Moses Louie, Band Manager Dixon Terbasket and Council members agreed to meet with the Minister and provincial staff.

The government of British Columbia believes the federal government must play a key role in any solution to address the Band's concerns.

In an official press release from the Lower Similkameen Indian Band and the Village of Keremeos, the following statement was made:

"The Ashnola Road and the Ashnola Wilderness Area are open for the use of the public. Local people and visitors are welcome to camp, hike and enjoy this area, provided that they use the land in a respectful manner (for example - stay on trails, do not damage vegetation, etc.). The

Lower Similkameen Band's dispute over this road is with the Province of B.C., not with the people of this province.

The Lower Similkameen Band sees the Ashnola Road as highly symbolic of the injustices that have been perpetrated on its people by the Provincial Government since the 1870's. Today, the inequality that exists between the Lower Similkameen Band and the province, with respect to governance and jurisdiction within the traditional lands of the Okanagan Nation, is little changed from 1911 when the Ashnola Road was originally gazetted.

The entire community within the Lower Similkameen River Basin - not just the Band - has been unfairly treated by the policies of the Provincial government. Our respective communities suffer from high unemployment and one of the lowest family income rates in Canada. Currently, there is little to entice new businesses to

locate in our community and even less to compel our youth to remain.

The Lower Similkameen Indian Band and the Village of Keremeos believe that only through greater local control and direct involvement in the management of lands and resources can a sustainable future be realized for the people who live in this valley. We also believe that all people in the Lower Similkameen River Basin need to work co-operatively to meet this challenge.

Joe talks about God in public

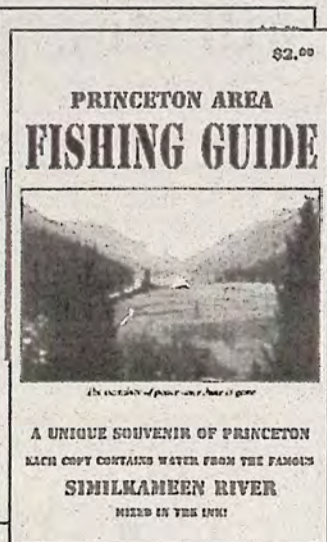

We need a local voice on regional board

In this issue, we cover remarks made by Councillor George Armstrong regarding the appointment of representatives to the Okanagan Similkameen Regional Health Board. Nobody is more qualified than Councillor Armstrong on Town Council to make criticisms of the system. He has served on the former Community Health Council, and he has served on the former hospital board and the Regional Health Board. When Councillor Armstrong expresses his opinion on these matters, it is after six years of experience with the new "Closer to Home" initiatives and the new regional health board.

The question raised by the announcement at the most recent meeting of the Regional Health Board is that of representation. People attending the meeting have been told that representation will serve the interests of the region, and the person appointed to the Regional Health Board will not necessarily come from our area. The Minister of Health will appoint a representative according to what the Minister feels is in the region's best interest.

Councillor Armstrong recalls that the original statements about appointees to the Regional Health Board was that representatives would, in the future, be elected to the board, and that appointments by the Minister of Health was an interim measure. The intention understood by the general public was that representatives would be elected from each local health area. That concept has not survived the reorganization process.

We have gone from a time when we elected people to a hospital board to a time when the property owned by the hospital board was expropriated by the provincial government. In some communities, in which the government had originally built the hospital, the take-over might not have rankled so much as it did in Princeton, where the people built the hospitals, past and present. We have gone from a time when we had a voice in how things were run to a time when we face the possibility that the Minister of Health will appoint people to look after us, rather than appoint one of us to be our voice about our health concerns.

Freedom of choice is our right

Re: "Freedom of Choice" by W.M. Goddard June 19/99.

How sweet it is, even under an administration we do not like, we have freedom of choice. Mr. Goddard says he has opted for private insurance, even if it costs more than the public brand.

If he believes so much in this freedom, he can also opt to pay for his doctor, nurses and hospital. He may opt to send his children to private school, and hire his own security guards, and when his senior's cheques arrive, he may return them unopened. These are choices we all have.

When ICBC announced another premium reduction, I did not get

an explanation, but I believe I know why it's possible - their aggressive involvement in making our roads safer is paying off, i.e. photo radar, paying for police enforcement, red light cameras, graduated licences, and increased driver education.

Now, here is what gripes me. Since our Crown corporation can reduce premiums due to these expenditures, is it fair that private companies should reap the benefits by creaming the drivers with the best safety records? I think not. ICBC's mandate is to insure everyone, regardless of driving ability, and the private sector should be bound by the same rules.

Having been victimized by private auto insurance for more years than I care to remember, I would like to say I had many choices, all bad, and all of my premiums went south.

I would also like to point out that there are other things Crown corporations can do cheaper and better than the private sector, i.e. the provision of electrical power, the maintenance of highways, the postal system, the RCMP, the telephone system, and I'm waiting patiently for a federal government which will take over our lending institutions, so they can eradicate our "national debt" in short order!

Liberals doubt NDP will stop gambling expansion in B.C.

Dear Editor:

We've all heard about the social costs of gambling. It hurts families, and increases crime in our communities. That's why the government should never rely on gambling revenue as a cornerstone of its fiscal policy.

Last week, the NDP announced they are reconsidering their policy of expanded gambling. To many British Columbians, it appeared the government was finally recognizing that its policy was wrong, and was scrapping expanded gambling altogether.

If only it was true. In reality, the government is completing its gambling expansions, and continuing with plans to open seven

new casinos this year. The government never stated any plan to increase the number of casinos beyond the seven now under development. So its reversal of policy is something of a shell game.

The government has also conceded that some existing casinos in Vancouver and Surrey may be relocated and expanded elsewhere, because those cities have legally won the right to block expanded gambling in their communities. That hardly constitutes a halt to expanded gambling.

Gambling has already expanded dramatically under the NDP. Betting limits have been increased by 2000 per cent and

thousands of new slot machines installed across B.C.

Expanded gambling is no way to build a thriving economy. It is a tax on income. The government always wins because you always lose. British Columbia does not need an economy based on losers. If the government were truly committed to shutting down expanded gambling, it would halt the seven new casino licenses and use every legislative means at its disposal to prevent these facilities from opening, short of violating contractual obligations.

Birth, Death Marriage free records available

VICTORIA - British Columbians researching their family trees can do free online and microfilm searches instead of paying \$50 per document to the B.C. Vital Statistics Agency.

Historical genealogical records are protected under the privacy provisions of the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act. Marriage registrations are released 75 years after the date of marriage, death registrations are released 20 years after the date of death and birth records are released 100 years after the date of birth.

More than 23,000 births are included in the first release of birth registrations which covers 1854 to 1898. Each year another year's worth of records will be released in accordance with Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy act guidelines. In addition to using the records to trace family trees, people can use the information contained in these records to fill in details of their family medical history. Details of medical history are not part of the online summary but may be available in the original document. Genealogists, historians and other researchers use these types of records to trace a history of community or patterns of illness over time. While official copies of original records must still be obtained through Vital Statistics, the majority of researchers who do not require legal copies can now find this information online and view full records at six organizations across the province.

Organic cherries were delayed two weeks by chilly spring

CAWSTON - John Hutchinson, organic orchardist on Barcelo Road in Cawston, says this year's cool spring caused a later bloom, delaying both conventional and organic cherry harvest in the area for about two weeks, to July 5 or 6. There will be a short crop this year, as April's cold weather affected most cherry orchards in Oliver and Osoyoos.

The organic cherries John started growing 19 years ago occupy one and a half acres of his ten acre organic orchard. Peaches and apples make up the rest.

John claims growing cherries is labour intensive and several approaches combine to ensure a

healthy crop free of pests and pesticides.

First, he feeds the soil, to produce healthy trees. There are no organic sprays available to control Cherry Fruit Fly, an insect difficult to get rid of once it is established. John relies on effective combination of location, clean harvesting, and chickens.

The Hutchinson orchard is on a slope facing southwest, so he can harvest early, before the insect has a chance to lay eggs in the fruit, thereby breaking its mating cycle. He is able to avoid possible infection from other trees because Cherry Fruit Fly does not migrate for a great distance, and there are no subdivisions or orchards near-

by.

Abandoned fruit is an open invitation to the flies. The fruit fly pupae live in the soil under trees. When they hatch, they fly into the trees, lay eggs in the cherries, the cherries either fall or the larvae crawl out and fall to the ground. Hutchinson says conventional farmers who abandon their trees should treat them with pesticides.

Cherry Fruit Fly has become a problem in the last 20 years and clean harvesting goes a long way toward helping control it.

The Hutchinson chickens help by picking cherries off the ground and eating the larvae. John uses reflective tape on his trees to discourage other birds. Robins sometimes nest in his trees, and eat some pests, like leafrollers.

With 10 other organic orchardists, John Hutchinson belongs to a co-op marketing group called Organics Plus operating from a warehouse cold storage facility on Main Street, Cawston. They held their grand opening on June 26 weekend, but will not be open for counter sales until late summer, during peach and apple season. Though most of the co-op's cherries are pre-sold yearly to Vancouver and Victoria, many of the organic cherry growers, including Hutchinson, have farm gate sales for the general public.

South Similkameen will join Yale-Lillooet

SIMILKAMEEN - The Similkameen Provincial Electoral boundaries are in the process of being changed.

When interviewed on June 22, Keremeos Mayor J.C. Stranart explained that the Okanagan Boundary riding used to go from Hedley to Grand Forks and included Oliver and Osoyoos. Last year the Electoral Boundaries Commission wanted to put Oliver, Osoyoos and Keremeos in the same riding as Penticton. Keremeos Council felt that, under this arrangement, Penticton would likely receive most of the attention, leaving with the smaller communities with the "crumbs".

Mayor Stranart went to the Electoral Boundaries Commission and explained that being included with Penticton was not acceptable to Keremeos Council. The Commission came back with a proposal to put Keremeos in the Yale-Lillooet riding. Then the entire Similkameen Valley, from Manning Park to the U.S. border, would be in the same riding as Princeton.

Keremeos Council responded to that proposal by saying they would either like to remain as they had been, or, if that was not possible, be included with Yale-Lillooet as long as "Similkameen" was included in the riding name.

In the Commission's December 3, 1998 report, they renamed the riding "Yale Similkameen" and included Keremeos.

"We were not overjoyed," Mayor Stranart said, "because we would have preferred to be left in the old riding, but it's better than being lumped in with Penticton."

In its June report, the Commission made some minor adjustments and changed the riding name back to Yale Lillooet. Council sent a letter requesting the Commission to name the electoral area Yale-Similkameen-Lillooet.

Stranart says, "We feel we have more in common, environmentally and economically, with Princeton than with Penticton."

There has been no reply as to what the Commission's next step will be.

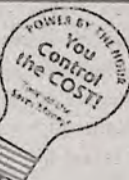

Fourteen naturalists trudged up the China Ridge cross-country trails last Saturday, a bit ahead of the actual day when summer begins - that is, when the daylight hours are longest, and when the sun at noon is highest in our sky (the actual date this year was June 21).

Though it was a fine day, summer temperatures have been very slow in coming, and birds and flowers are unseasonably late. We saw early specimens of intense blue Larkspur, ominous stalks of Death Camas. Holboell's Rockcress (which the guidebook says can be used to ease toothaches), Desert Parsley, Pinedrops, and beautiful yellow stars of Arnica. False Azalea and Red Osier Dogwood were in bloom, and there was plenty of Stonecrop (Sedum) on Sedum Ridge.

The fourteen made the long hike, ending on a slope overlooking the Tulameen River, with the peaks of the Coquihalla and Hozameen range shining in the distance. Another group of eight took the short hike up to the picnic table on Sedum Ridge. From there, you can see far down the Similkameen Valley and those with 20/20 vision or good binoculars can pick out the old mine buildings clinging to the cliffs above Hedley.

Later, all hikers converged on the home of Lyn Grants and John Beltz for a mid-summer feast. The stars of the show were Carol Brodie and her two daughters, who came clad as priestesses of the ancient Druids, with long white robes and flowers in their hair, perfectly suited to dancing around Stonehenge.

The next scheduled hike is set for Saturday, July 10, to Rampart Lake. This is a moderate stroll along an old logging track to a beautiful lake. More a hike than a birding expedition. Meet at the bus depot at 9:00 a.m., and phone Don Burbidge at 295-6009 if you wish to come along.
