

Vandals hit local businesses

Sometime overnight on Thursday, July 8, vandals sprayed white and black paint on several Princeton businesses and buildings in the downtown area. The buildings that incurred damage included the liquor store, Pharmasave, the rear of businesses located between CIBC and Home Hardware, and the BC Government Agent's office. The damage was limited to the rear portion of the buildings along the alley that follows behind these buildings, which face Bridge Street and Vermilion Avenue.

Authorities suspect beef as poison source

PRINCETON - There were ten cases of E. coli 0157:H7 reported to Public Health from Princeton. Seven cases were confirmed by laboratory analysis.

Ken Cooper, of B.C. Public Health Service, told the News Leader the E. coli strain involved in the poisoning is Haemorrhagic Colitis commonly called "bloody diarrhea", sometimes called "hamburger disease".

Cooper said every effort was made to trace the source of the poisoning, but it could not be con-

firmed. However, the common thread running through all of the cases was eating beef on a bun purchased from the concession at the racetrack. Cooper said the leftover meat was tested, and no E. coli was found, but the meat had been frozen so samples taken may not have shown any contamination due to the freezing process.

All of the people who became ill had eaten the beef on a bun.

"We can't say one hundred per cent sure that they got it from there, but that's what we suspect," Cooper said.

There are many ways the meat could have been contaminated. According to Cooper, all meat has E. coli on the outside of it, and cooking destroys the bacteria. The contamination could occur after the meat is cooked. Not cooling it fast enough, having it handled by somebody who had used the washroom and failed to properly wash their hands before handling the meat, or contamination from coming in contact with a surface which had not been washed after the raw meat had been on it.

"From 4 °C to 60°C is the danger zone," Cooper said. "Food kept

Crash kills local woman

Princeton resident Phyllis Ann Johnson, age 83, was fatally injured in a collision on Highway 3 in Princeton on July 17. Melvin Woodford, age 82, driver of the vehicle in which Johnson was a passenger, sustained serious injuries.

The collision occurred when Woodford attempted to make a left turn into Mohawk service station when an eastbound van pulling a travel trailer collided with Woodford's pick-up as it was making the turn.

All parties involved in the collision were taken to Princeton

General Hospital. Every effort was made to save Johnson's life, but she died as a result of massive internal injuries as well as cranial trauma. Woodford was treated at Princeton General Hospital, then transported to Penticton Regional Hospital for treatment of a broken pelvis and other possible fractures. The 41 year old driver of the van sustained numerous minor injuries. Passengers in the van suffered neck and shoulder injuries.

Police are continuing their investigation into this unfortunate incident.

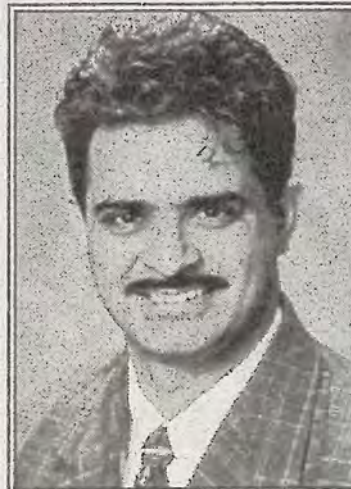

Ten people met at Manning Park Lodge on July 15 to discuss plans for the upcoming anniversary of the opening of the Hope-Princeton Highway.

October 23, a Saturday, was chosen as the official celebration day. A ceremony will be held at Manning Park Lodge, and dignitaries will be invited: Highway 3 mayors, Minister of Transportation and Highways and the Premier.

The committee, formed by Hope Chamber of Commerce, hopes to have a cavalcade of motor vehicles from the lower mainland and from the Similkameen, Okanagan and points east, converge at Manning Park. It was suggested that both Hope and Princeton host events, such as a wine and cheese party with entertainment, on Friday night for dignitaries and invited guests who will be participating in the Saturday celebrations. The committee wants to encourage museums in Hope and Princeton to create displays of

Hope-Princeton Highway memorabilia.

The group agreed to publish a newspaper featuring all of the history of the Hope-Princeton Highway, which replaced the Hope Road, which had been part of the Dewdney Trail.

The Department of Highways will be contacted to see if the digital road condition sign could be used to advertise the event, and television stations will be asked to announce it in their road

reports. The Sun and Province newspapers will be contacted for coverage.

Previous discussions had included vintage automobiles (circa 1949) could be in the cavalcade and former highway construction crew members be encouraged to come forward to join the celebration.

The next meeting will be at the "Bear's Den" at Manning Park Lodge.

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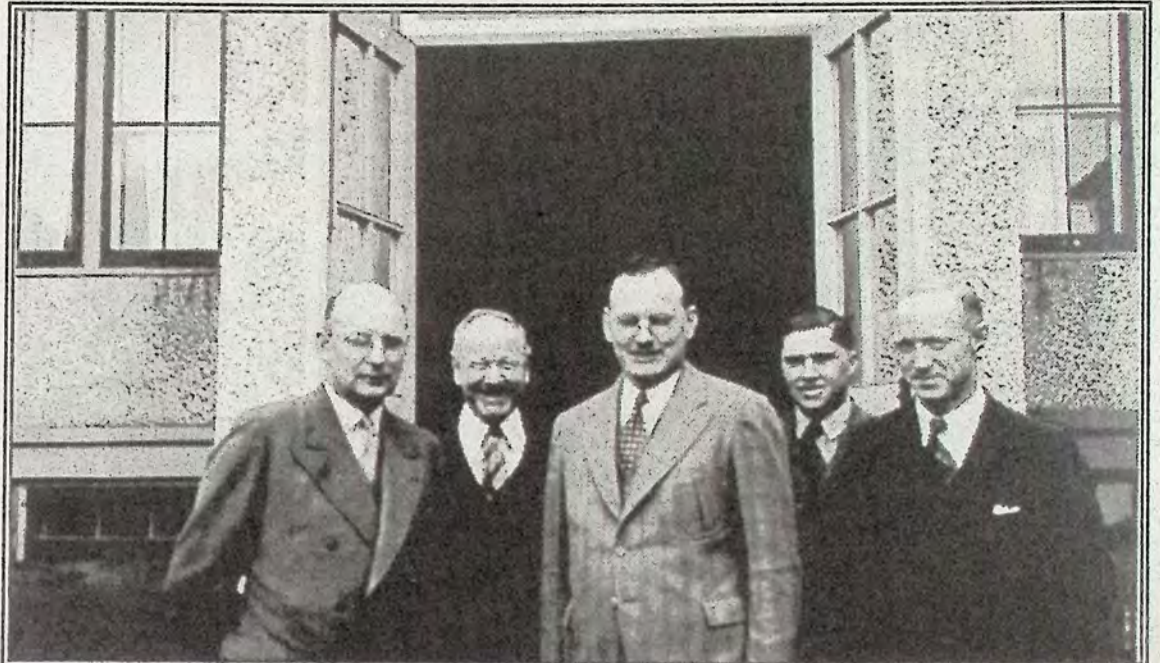

Statistics reveal truth

Seniors live longer, numbers increase

Here are some more revealing statistics to mull over as we celebrate 1999 as the International Year of Older Persons.

Canada in 1998 had 3.7 million seniors over the age of 65, constituting 12 per cent of the population. Their numbers have been increasing rapidly. In 1921, seniors comprised only five per cent of the population. Statistics Canada projects by 2021 the figure will rise to 18 per cent.

The most obvious reason is that

the average lifespan has lengthened. In the 1940s a 65-year-old had a life expectancy of 79 years. Today, their life expectancy has risen to 83.

In 1971, Canada had 140,000 who were 85 years of age. Today that figure is 380,000.

The majority of seniors are female. They comprise 57 per cent of seniors who are 65 or older. Seventy per cent of seniors 85 and older are women. A 65 year old woman in 1996 could

expect to live another 22 years while a man could expect 17 years.

Most seniors aged 65 are married. But 65 per cent of women have been widowed, while only 1.3 per cent of male seniors are widowers, another strong indication that women are likely to outlive their spouses.

Many seniors have chronic health conditions such as diabetes, heart troubles and arthritis. In 1981, 85 per cent reported that they had at least one chronic health problem, with 39 per cent declaring that this restricted their activities to some extent.

Seniors have a hospitalization rate almost three times higher than that of people under the age of 55

Most seniors, particularly those in their 60s and 70s, have an active lifestyle, spending about two hours each day socializing, visiting or talking on the phone to friends, going to restaurants, having people over for meals and so on. Others have leisure activities such as hobbies, sports, playing cards and driving for pleasure.

Many seniors are physically active with 46 per cent reporting that they engage regularly in regular physical activities, mostly walking and hiking.

Antique machinery shed nears completion

PRINCETON - The shed built at the fair grounds to house antique farm machinery is nearly complete. George Armstrong is preparing the equipment for display, and has expressed a desire to be allowed to move it into the shed when he feels the equipment is in top condition.

George Armstrong, George Elliott, Skip Jones and Gord Walker have been working on the project.

Another project yet to be completed is the caboose project. It must be moved onto ties and rails and firmly set into place. Jones, said they would like to have it done for the Allison family reunion on the August long weekend.

President George Elliott reported an excellent grounds clean-up job done by Youth Council members, and recommended a cheque for them.

Princeton Rodeo Club requested approval for a team roping event on the August 21 weekend. No details were available, but there were no objections.

Neighbours help injured in Cawston head-on collision

CAWSTON - The first people on the scene of a two vehicle head-on collision on Hwy 3 in Cawston at about 1:23 Wednesday, July 14, were Herb Newman of Citizens On Patrol (COPS) and Pat Sanderson and son. According to Herb, they phoned 911, and while Herb directed traffic, Pat Sanderson and another man who arrived on the scene attempted, with a long metal bar, to open the door of one vehicle, driven by a female from Cawston. The Fire Dept.

arrived shortly after and Herb says that he, Pat and volunteer fireman Steve Heacocks worked on getting the door open. "It took three of us to pull the door open, and our pulling twisted the door so bad it broke the glass in the door." Meanwhile other neighbours were rendering assistance to the couple in the other car who were from Virginia.

According to Herb, just like the woman in the car from Cawston, the male driver from Virginia was pinned against the steering

wheel. The female passenger from Virginia had staggered out of the car and was lying on the grass being tended to by the neighbours. Herb told the man from Virginia not to move until the proper authorities arrived, as moving could injure him further.

Keremeos RCMP report that, as a result of the accident, three injured people were taken to Penticton Hospital with undetermined injuries. The accident is still under investigation to determine the cause.

Health Minister announces new food premises regulation

VICTORIA - A new food premises regulation will control the cause of food-borne illness more effectively and ensure the delivery of safe, high-quality food to consumers says Health Minister Penny Priddy. The new regulation was announced on July 12.

Under the new regulation, every food service operator in B.C. will be required to complete the province's Foodsafe training program on safe food handling practice, and produce and follow written procedures for safe food preparation. These requirements come into effect July 1, 2000, to allow food operators time to comply.

"With this regulation, government and industry are adopting new approaches we believe will be more effective in preventing the main cause of food poisoning - unsafe food handling - and making sure food in B.C.'s restaurants, fast food outlets and cafeterias is safe to eat," said Priddy.

The new regulation places more responsibility on the industry. Health inspectors will continue to monitor food services to make sure that they meet the overall

safety requirements. They will focus on the areas of highest risk to public health: how food is prepared and stored, and premises with a history of non-compliance with regulations.

It is estimated that over \$400 million is spent annually in B.C. on health care and lost productivity as a result of food-borne illness.

All of these incidents are preventable and result from mistakes in safe food handling practices.

The Foodsafe course is recognized by food industry groups and government in British Columbia as well as nationally and internationally as a top quality food safety education program.

Person to person wins

There is an advertisement on television for directory assistance. The hook on the line is "why talk to a recording when you can talk to a real person"? From our point of view, this advertisement is a real person to person winner.

Most of us have experienced the frustration of phoning a government department or a major corporation, only to be welcomed by a recording that says, "if you want this, press that" and you listen to another recording that says, "if you want this, press that" and on and on until you hang up. You can bet we would love to talk to a real person!

In a world increasingly run by so-called artificial intelligence (very artificial, in fact, a cheap imitation of intelligence), we appreciate the intelligence of a real person at the end of a telephone line or even across a desk or front counter. Sometimes people may seem to be not so intelligent, but even so, they are superior to doing business with a machine (or attempting to do business with a machine).

The biggest problem with talking to a recording is this: you cannot develop a feeling relationship with a recording, and you cannot ask it questions, tell it your problems, or even make a complaint, and have any kind of intelligent response. For example, the directory assistance problem. You want a number for any motel in a city outside your area, because you are going there and you do not know the name of any of the motels. Will a recording tell you what motels there are? No. A person would go to the listings and offer a few numbers to call, but the recording will not tell you anything.

Relationships happen between persons, and the business that offers relationships will beat the business that offers recordings. We will likely see increasing numbers of advertisements offering some kind of relationship with a potential customer. People want to relate to people, and good relationships are increasingly important in our impersonal world.

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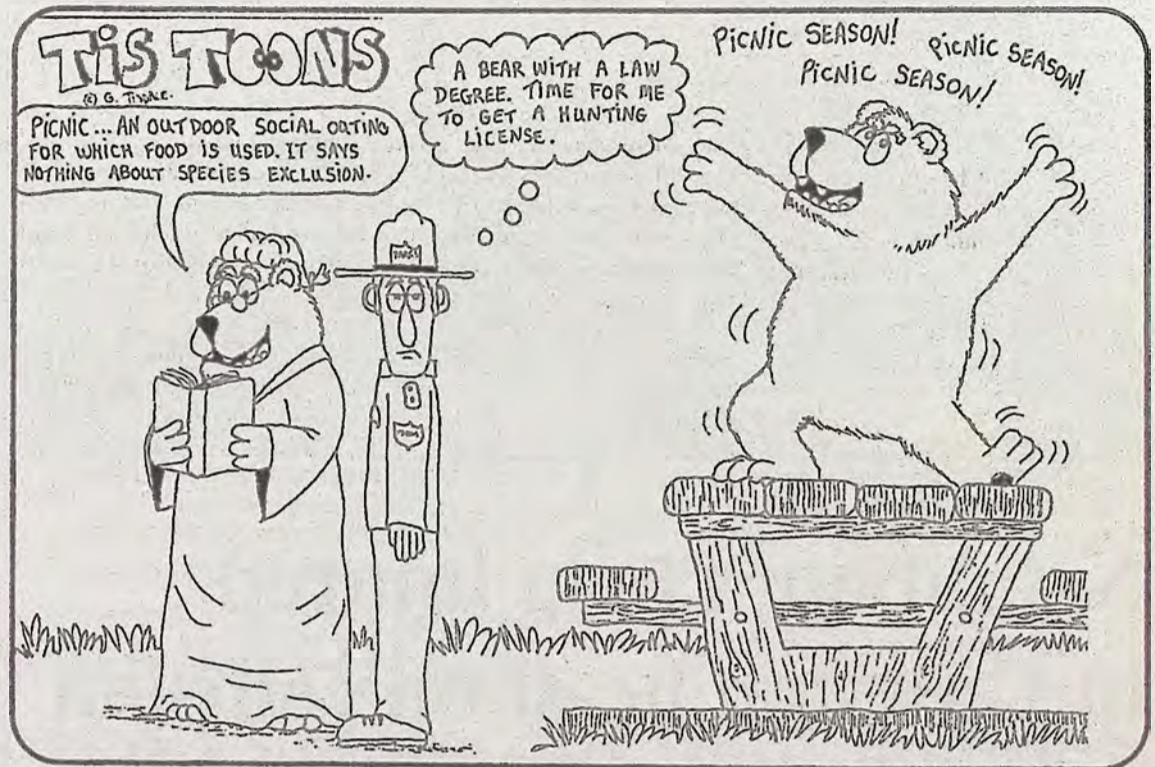

B.C. citizens dislike MAI

VICTORIA - New international trade rules must be developed in an open, democratic forum and must allow Canada and its trading partners to put the economic and social well-being of ordinary citizens first, New Democrat MLA Joan Smallwood stated on July 15.

Smallwood is Chair of the BC legislature's Special Committee on the Multilateral Agreement on Investment.

Her remarks referred to two of the all-party committee's 34 recommendations in its report on public hearings held on the MAI and international trade rules in 10 B.C. communities this spring.

Smallwood said the committee found a high level of concern about the MAI across BC and she is recommending this public consultation continue in

September with a focus on protecting BC's fresh water resources from demands for bulk exports.

The all-party committee would also examine the upcoming agenda of World Trade Organization (WTO) which is seeking to implement a number of the rules that led to the demise of the MAI.

"As chair of the committee, I was particularly glad to see how many British Columbians have thought through these complex international issues," she said. "The people who came out to speak to us represented workers, businesses and communities. They had a very good handle on how these trade rules might shape our future and the fight we still have in trying to protect those things we value in our

economy and our society."

"Many pages of our committee's report are dedicated to reproducing verbatim the thoughtful and forceful statements we heard from people across the province. We heard a lot of interest in new protections for BC's water and a lot of concern that, through the WTO, our federal government may negotiate many of the same rules that led Canadians to reject the MAI.

"An all-party committee of the legislature will respond to these concerns by taking a more in-depth look at the protection of our water and by consulting British Columbians on this issue and the other trade negotiations that will have an impact on how the BC economy and the BC government operate," Smallwood said.

5. Minimize all noises at the time of his arrival - eliminate the noise of the washer, dryer, dishwasher or vacuum. Try to encourage the children to be quiet.
6. Be happy to see him: greet him with a warm smile and act glad to see him.
7. Don't greet him with problems or complaints. Don't complain if he's late for dinner. Count this as minor compared with what he

might have gone through that day.
8. Make him comfortable: have him lean back into a comfortable chair or suggest he lie down in the bedroom. Have a cool or warm drink ready for him. Arrange his pillow and offer to massage his neck and shoulders and take off his shoes. Speak in a soft soothing, pleasant voice. Allow him to relax - to unwind.

9. Listen to him. You may have a dozen things to tell him, but the moment of his arrival is not the time. Let him talk first.

10. Make the evening his: never complain if he does not take you out to dinner or to other places of entertainment. Instead, try to understand his world of strain and pressure, his need to be home and relax.

GOAL: To make your home a place of peace and order where your husband can renew himself in body and spirit.

Stevens will run civic election in November

PRINCETON - Lawrence E. Stevens has been appointed Chief Electoral Officer for the Town of Princeton. He will accept nominations, review documentation of nominees, and supervise the civic election.

Civic elections for Town Council, School Board and Regional District Director take place every third year in British Columbia, and will take place in November this year.

Common-law and same-sex partners have equal rights to estate benefits

VICTORIA - Legislation introduced on July 8 by Attorney General Ujjal Dosanjh will mean people in common-law or same-sex relationships will have the same rights as traditional married couples when their partners die.

Couples who have lived together at least two years will benefit from the amendments.

The changes will mean:

- surviving common-law and same-sex partners will have the same rights as married couples if one of them dies without a will
- common-law and same-sex partners will be able to sue for wrongful death of their partner
- common-law and same-sex partners will have the same right as married couples to be consulted about disposing of their partner's body.

Heart Food

If you were asked the following questions, I wonder what your answer would be. What is the single most outstanding thing about God? What's His most important characteristic? I am sure there would be a variety of answers but would they agree with God's own answer? In Exodus 33, Moses is asking God to show him His glory. The word "glory" could literally be translated "heavy-weight" and it refers to the biggest, heaviest, grandest thing about someone. It refers to the sum total of their worth. Moses was actually saying, "I want to see the weightiest thing about you or your grandest attribute." God replied and said, "I will make all of my goodness pass before you." That happened many years ago but it's still true today. You might say God has never shown me any of His goodness. Let me ask you: have you put yourself in a place to receive it? He is offering a covenant of grace to you today based on His goodness. You might say, "What is a covenant of grace?" It is a relationship of favour that gives you access to someone else's power. Here is an illustration. The old Sicilian family members had this with the "godfather" of the family. In that family, a weak person might come in and ask the Don for a favour. The Don would say, "I will grant this favour and I will ask a favour of you and when that time comes I will collect it." Once that was said, the weak person would become excited, for he knew that if anyone tried to rough him up, he would now have the presence of the head of the family with the assurance that he had nothing to worry about. He would walk out thinking everything is taken care of. All I have to do is whatever the Don asks me to do and he knows I don't have anything, so whatever he asks me to do, he'll provide the means to do it. That is grace (goodness) which is God's willingness to enter into covenant with you and give you everything He had in exchange for everything you have. He took your sin to give you His right standing with Almighty God. He took your sickness to give you His health. He took your way of thinking to give you His wisdom. Whenever He asks you to do something, He provides everything you need to carry it out. That is the goodness of God at it's very best. Taste and see that the Lord is good all the time. He is waiting for you with His goodness.

B.C. government funds free counselling for abused women

SIMILKAMEEN - The B.C. Ministry of Women's Equality funds a free counselling service, available at confidential locations in Princeton and Keremeos, for women who have experienced sexual abuse as a child or adult, or are presently living in an emotionally or physically violent relationship. Counselor Patricia Kristie, is a Registered Nurse with a Masters Degree in Counselling Psychology who has taken a number of courses with the Justice Institute of B.C. on issues pertaining to violence against women. Patricia says that B.C. is the only Canadian province with a Ministry of Women's Equality. As well as protecting women and children, the Ministry has a mandate to

develop women's equality and economic opportunities.

Patricia Kristie says woman can refer themselves for this free counselling service that she says has been "well used" for the last couple of years. She says almost all referrals come from friends of former clients or by word of mouth. There used to be a time limit on the number of visits, but no more. It is now left to the discretion of client and counselor together to decide this.

Patricia stresses that her service is confidential and that client and child safety come first. She takes a wholistic approach to counselling, concerned about the client's health and well being, and what the client feels comfortable with. Patricia keeps a

library with books and pamphlets on boundaries, self esteem, children, family of origin etc., including some in Punjabi, that women may use, even if they don't wish to become a client.

Patricia says it's important for women who have been or are living in a violent relationship to give some consideration to how this experience may be affecting the children. No matter how hard a woman tries to hide the abuse, she won't be able to be happy and fully relaxed with her children. She adds that "at no time is it appropriate for the couple to seek couple counselling until the abuser has first dealt with his own responsibility for his behavior."

Patricia helps women connect with community resources such as police and the legal system and reminds women that the transition house in Penticton can be called "for safety purposes and getting help to find resources to relocate" at 493-7233. Patricia can be reached Tuesday and Thursday in Princeton at 295-4453, and Monday and Friday in Keremeos at 499-5928.

B.C. Amateur Hockey Association provides equal opportunity to females

VICTORIA - The first program in B.C. that will give women and girls equal opportunity to play on the hockey team of their choice has been put in place by the B.C. Amateur Hockey Association. The female hockey development program was developed as part of a settlement agreement between the B.C. Amateur Hockey Association and the B.C. Human Rights Commission.

The program is an outcome of a human rights complaint filed with the commission in 1996 in which a 14 year old girl was barred from a male Bantam team. The complaint alleged that the Minor Hockey Association and the BCAHA discriminated against the girl because of her gender, contrary to Section 8 of the B.C.

Human Rights Code.

This new program, granted special program approval by the commission, will help address the disadvantages girls and women face in sports by promoting female hockey teams and providing girls with the opportunities to participate in a full range of competitive hockey. Girls will now qualify to participate on female teams and integrated teams, and may register to play on both during the same season.

Although local associations independently decide whether or not to implement the BCAHA's new program, those that do not may face human rights complaints. The special program approval granted by the B.C. Human Rights Commission will apply

only to those minor associations ensuring that female-only teams in their area are one option for female players and that there are no barriers to equal participation on integrated teams.

"The BCAHA is delighted that female participation in our game has been clarified by these latest developments," said BCAHA president Mike Henderson. "Our whole membership has worked hard over the last few years to encourage minor and senior female hockey players and officials to take part in our various hockey structures."

Princeton has had active female participation on both all-female and integrated teams.

Hedley, Keremeos, Cawston see final copy of development strategy

SIMILKAMEEN - Judy Chisholm, Keremeos and South Similkameen Economic Development Commission Chairman (EDC), says the existing commission members have received the final copy of the South Similkameen Economic Development Strategy, are reviewing it, and will have a meeting on whether they will accept it.

Chisholm says, when she presented the final copy to the five area government leaders, Roger Mayer, Bill Bush, Mayor J.C. Stranart, and Band Managers Dixon Terbasket and Philippe Batini, she "got no negative feedback," and the sponsor, Human Resources Development Canada, considered it a good report.

The Development Strategy, prepared for the Economic Commission by Urban Systems of Kelowna, has been in the works about a year and a half and focuses on Keremeos, Cawston, Hedley, Olalla, Okanagan-Similkameen Regional District electoral areas B and G, and the Upper and Lower Similkameen Indian Bands. The final copy explains that, from 1991 to 1996, the Similkameen's population increased 17%, with Keremeos registering an increase of 25%. The report estimates the South Similkameen population to be about 4,500-5,000 and says that agriculture still commands the highest industrial labour force in the region.

Quoting 1991 statistics, the strategy lists manufacturing (mainly wood processing) fifth in the labour force line-up, and forestry tenth and last stating, "This continues to indicate that value added production is still in its infancy in this region."

The Strategy says "the Similkameen Valley has an

excellent natural resource base to sustain outdoor recreation based tourism" and cites the Similkameen and Ashnola rivers as crucial elements. Tourist attractions, natural and man made, will in turn affect the service and hospitality sector.

Though mining is ninth on the labour force list, the strategy states that "mineral development activity should not be forgotten in the Similkameen," "the greatest potential is likely in industrial minerals," but precious and base metals "have recognized potential due to historical discoveries."

The 87 page document outlines an action plan and marketing approach for the region and states "The South Similkameen region needs this strategy mainly to promote economic prosperity, sustain growth, diversify its employment base, create awareness about the region and to plan for future economic opportunities."

Chisholm has met with the five area government leaders to discuss forming a new EDC that is not acting under any one of the area governments, like the present EDC that acts under the Village of Keremeos. Chisholm says to have an EDC for the

South Similkameen, they have to incorporate the whole, and what is good for one is good for all.

Chisholm and the five leaders agreed that this would be something to work towards. The five leaders have asked Chisholm to search for different by-laws already used by other economic development groups in other communities to see if they can be used to create South Similkameen EDC by-laws. They have also asked Chisholm to look for funding from government and private sources.

According to Chisholm, Wayne Beggs from Community Futures of Penticton has offered three days work from a co-op student to help her organize the by-laws and funding.

Chisholm and the five government leaders will be looking to the existing EDC members and to the general public for volunteers to act as directors and members of the new EDC, but Chisholm does not expect too much to happen before the fall.

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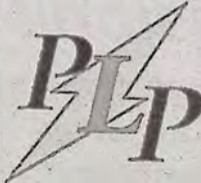

too long within that temperature range is high risk. It is important to move food quickly through that zone."

Cooper said he would like to have the concession premises inspected.

In making general comments, Cooper said it is a good idea for organizations using volunteer help to have food safety rules posted on the wall, and to train some of the volunteers in Food Safe, a program designed to teach people safe handling of food. He added that Diane Huey and Sandra Taylor, of Princeton, are qualified to teach the course.

Ancient bones tell of Africa in America

A cave in Nevada, in a site not disclosed in order to prevent "tourists", scientists have found a rare treasure from 40,000 to 50,000 years ago. Fossils of fish and plants from the Similkameen Valley date back to that era, but the find in Nevada's cave is far more exotic. Camel, llama and cheetah bones were found in a cave in which the temperatures are below zero, acting as a freezer full of African animal remains.

Creatures now extinct, such as the giant short-faced bear, huge deer and bison species, are evidence of a very different picture of North America tens of thousands of years ago. These are animals commonly found in grasslands of Africa.

Scientists believe the cave was the den of predators who dragged their prey back into the cave to feed. Among the prey are horses, mountain sheep, pronghorn ante-

lope, coyotes, lizards, bats and birds.

These are not the first remains of such animals, but because of the unusual state of preservation, these remains give scientists hope they can extract DNA to compare with similar species alive now, and see the similarities and differences in genetic make-up.

Locally, this evidence may lead to hope of discovering fossils of mammals. The find in Nevada was at the 7,000 foot elevation. Perhaps fossil hunters here have to look a little higher up the hills. There have been no human remains found from that time, and general belief is that humans lived only in Africa 50,000 years ago. However, if there was a link between America and Africa in terms of wildlife, then the possibility exists that there were humans in America. Finding the evidence is the problem.

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Fall Fair prepares for deadline

Naturalists walk dusty road to Rampart Lake

There are a number of ways to reach Rampart Lake. The first way is along the main logging road coming from Hembre Ridge, very hot and dusty on the warmest day so far this summer. Then there is a pleasant old logging track, cool, well-shaded and resplendent with summer flowers. Twelve members of the Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists began the trek to the lake on the old track but, owing to a monumental miscalculation on the part of the leader, found themselves on the dusty highway. After impending mutiny was averted, the goal was achieved.

The first part of the hike was idyllic, since the old logging track abounded in brilliant blue lupines, purple asters and meadowrue, and golden brown-eyed Susans. There were also splendid red columbine, indistinguishable from those in our gardens, the first showing of tiger lily, smaller and more delicate than the domesticated variety, and big white clusters of fragrant blooms on the snowbrush - useful, claims the guidebook, in making tea, and in curing tuberculosis, eczema, dandruff, arthritis and rheumatism. I confess I am not acquainted with anyone who has tried it for any of those purposes.

Swainson's thrushes sang to us along the way, and every now and

then we encountered the vile odour of mistletoe, growing in big clumps on coniferous trees. A couple of the party claimed to like the smell, but I confess I cannot stand it. This is not the festive variety of mistletoe, and I cannot somehow see anyone hanging it over the doorway at Christmas. It looks, and smells, like the ugly parasite it is.

The plan for the hike was to follow the well shaded track down into the clearcut close to the lake, but the leader became disoriented, and led the group down an old road which twisted back until it was obviously going in the wrong direction. He then plunged headlong into the forest, with his followers, muttering ominously, trudging along behind, through a maze of old logging tracks, virgin woods, and across a recent clearcut. Eventually we emerged onto the main logging road about a mile short of Rampart Lake.

Then half the group trudged on up to the lake, through blazing heat and dust, and the other half walked back to get the vehicles. We were saved from heat stroke when a saviour appeared in the form of Al Lay, our Conservation Officer, who ferried us the last mile to the cars. We then drove back to pick up the others, who were relaxing by one of the more beautiful little lakes in the district.

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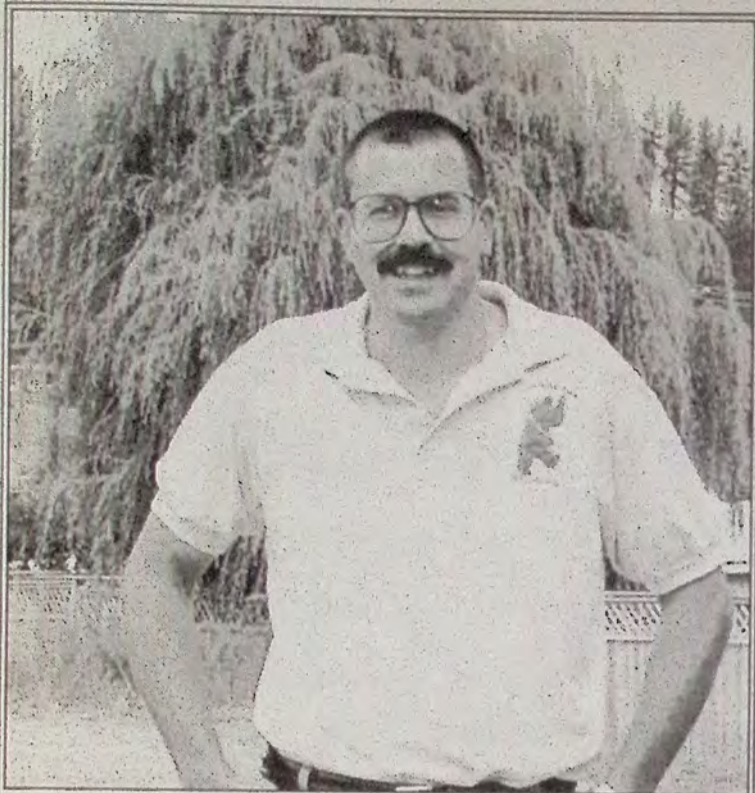

BCWF Why are we naked?

B.C. Wildlife Federation

As citizens, we rely on governments to ensure that the population is protected from events that are beyond the individual's control. Governments do that by passing laws or regulations, setting standards that business has to meet. So you have things like the Health Act, the Motor Vehicles Act and more importantly for us The Forest Practices Code, The Fisheries Act, the Wildlife Act and the various environmental rules and regulations designed to protect our waterways.

All of this legislation has one thing in common. It needs someone to ensure it is happening. For example, if a tourism operator wants to build a shack on a sheep lambing area, someone needs to ensure that the sheep are accounted for, someone else needs to ensure that public access to the area is not blocked, someone needs to ensure there is enough water for the downstream users, etc. This what is now called "red tape" and, if you listen carefully to the fly by night developers, this is what is keeping the province from nirvana.

People forget why these rules were developed. To listen to some, you would think that peo-

ple in Victoria did nothing but jump up in the night shouting "Eureka!" and writing down new ideas to screw the free enterprise businessman.

Ninety-nine percent of the environmental regulations in this province arose because someone neglected to protect the citizenry!

As we are all aware cutbacks are affecting how government people do their jobs. It is just a matter of time until a citizen is killed or injured by the failure of a government employee to ensure the regulations are respected. The term for this lack of action is "regulatory negligence" and it is becoming more and more common as governments across the country try to cater to the business sector while at the same time trying to appease the populace on real issues. Think what would happen if a major irrigation dam burst in the Okanagan and it could be shown that it had never been inspected. Think what could happen if the Adams River salmon run was destroyed by a mining operation that was allowed to proceed without any government inspections.

New plan for parks

VICTORIA - New protected areas legislation and a five-year parks business plan will launch the next stage of B.C.'s protected areas strategy.

Environment, Lands and Parks Minister Cathy McGregor announce on July 15, "B.C.'s protected areas system is one of the best in the world, and we plan to strengthen it further and ensure the ecological integrity of our parks as we move into the next millennium."

Derived from public input to the parks legacy project, recommendations were made by the parks legacy panel for the development of new legislation. McGregor is expected to introduce the legislation during the spring 2000 legislative session. This will coincide with the government's achievement of doubling park and pro-

ected areas between 1992 and 2000.

The five-year parks business plan will examine the full range of possible revenue options recommended by the legacy panel. The plan will outline a revenue base to support the expanded parks system as well as potential new programs. The province is particularly interested in measures that will:

- strengthen ecological stewardship
- provide more recreation opportunities for local residents and tourist
- develop closer bonds between communities and their protected areas
- find new ways for youth to participate more actively in park stewardship
- create ecotourism opportunities to help diversify rural economies.
