



Accident sends two to hospital

Princeton RCMP attended a single vehicle accident five kilometers west of Princeton on Highway 3 at 4:30 p.m. Friday, July 23. The driver, Roberta Kovacs of Oliver, fell asleep at the wheel and went off the highway to the right on a gentle curve. Her vehicle hit the ditch, struck a driveway embankment leading to a gravel pit, and became airborne for approximately 23 meters (50 feet). Fortunately, the vehicle, a Ford Contour, landed on four wheels and the occupants sustained no life-threatening injuries. Both were taken to Princeton General Hospital by ambulance and later released. Police feel that although the crash was serious, the fact that both occupants were wearing seat belts, and the airbags deployed, prevented serious injuries.

New attraction at Grist Mill

Armstrongs cut ribbon on Apple House

KEREMEOS - About 75 people gathered outside the Grist Mill's Apple House Theatre on Sunday afternoon, July 18, to watch George Armstrong of Princeton, a descendant of the original Apple House owner, and his son, John Armstrong of Keremeos, cut the ribbon to officially open the building. Almost everyone then went inside to enjoy a rousing old time music hall performance by the "Okandians," a

song and dance troupe from Penticton.

The Apple House Theatre seats about 70 people on benches facing an approximately 8 ft. by 12 ft. performance area. It was originally built sometime before 1910 as a root cellar to store fruits and vegetables for winter use. Before George Armstrong cut the ribbon, he took a moment to donate an old wooden apple box still in good condition as, in his words, "a contribution to the

heritage concept of the Apple House." The box, marked with the initials of the root cellar's original owner W.H. Armstrong, was once used to store apples in this very building. George said, "...this Heritage building now serves a new purpose, but it continues to preserve and highlight our past."

The Okadians' first half hour performance began with a medley of Cockney songs, followed by a duet, a humorous sketch, a pantomime-assisted poetry recitation, and a finale chorus.

Producer and performer, Jim Wood from Peachland, said that a turn of the century music hall performance used to be "a very bawdy affair, but it has been tidied up since then. We like to think it's in the best of taste." This newly formed amateur group of performers of all ages, mostly from St. Savior's Anglican Church of Penticton, began rehearsing in January, and already has regular bookings until October.

Judge gives man last chance: jail next time

PRINCETON - In Provincial Court on July 22, Judge G.G. Sinclair told David White, "If there is a breach of this probation order I'm about to make, you're going to jail."

The warning came after Judge Sinclair heard about break and enter charges laid following thefts at the Leisure Inn in Princeton and possession of stolen property. White entered a guilty plea to the crimes, and a pre-sentence report had been prepared. The probation officer who wrote the report

noted that White is now steadily employed and paying his bills, and recommended probation.

Crown Counsel referred to a probation White had served last year on a youth charge, during which he had not complied with the conditions. He had not paid restitution nor completed community work service hours.

Judge Sinclair "reluctantly" agreed to grant another term of probation. White is to serve 15 months and pay \$250 restitution.

Mayor talks stern line to Board

PRINCETON - Mayor Randy McLean told Council, "I took a stern line."

Mayor McLean was reporting to Council on a meeting of Regional District at which Health Board Chair Murli Pendharkar and CEO Murray Ramsden made a presentation called Directions in Health Care.

Mayor McLean said the presentation outlined the usual situation of not enough money, but McLean brought up two issues which are not budget items.

The first was the continuing lack of appointees from Keremeos and Princeton to the Regional Health Board.

The second issue was the matter of a Dr. Chris Shackleton, who is a surgeon who wanted to move to Princeton and waited 13 months for hospital privileges.

McLean said he challenged them as to why one doctor can come to Princeton and have hospital privileges in one month, and another comes to Princeton and waits a year without a reply. McLean said he warned others from small towns "there is an agenda for small hospitals."

McLean claimed he said to Pendharkar and Ramsden, "The only reason you wouldn't support it (Shackleton's hospital privileges) is because you want Princeton's operating theatre to be no more."

There was no reply from Pendharkar or Ramsey.

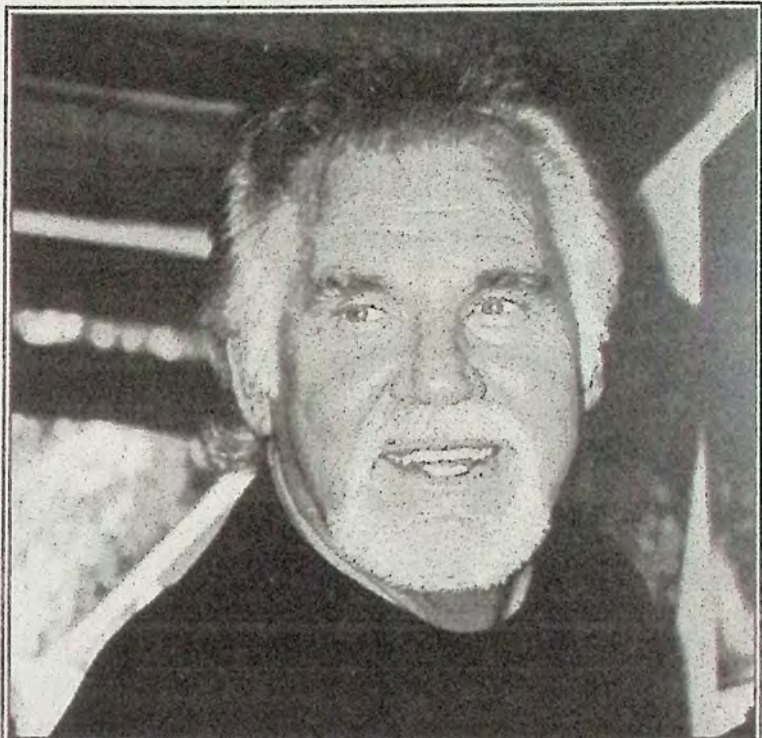

T.L. Timber works and waits

CAWSTON - While Dave Lusted of T.L. Timber in Cawston waits for the Agricultural Land Commission's (ALC's) decision on his mill operation, he says "I'll keep on truckin' 'till they tell me no." The ALC has so far shifted T.L. Timber's July 1 shutdown deadline to the week of July 19.

When asked on Friday, July 23, whether the Agricultural Land Commission had completed its July 19 week review of the the soil test information Dave Lusted submitted June 21, an ALC back-up person for Ross Blackwell, Sherry Sumpton said "If a decision has been made, it's not public information yet. The people involved in the review are out of the office until next week. It usually takes us 2-3 weeks to clear correspondence after a Commission meeting. It may take that long to contact Mr. Lusted. It's a very time consuming process."

Mayor McLean commented to Council, "They talk about the brain drain to the United States. It's on TV all the time. Here is one American, well-qualified, who wants to be here, and he can't get in."

Councillor Dan Sulentic asked whether Regional District would go further with the matter, but Mayor McLean said there was support regarding appointees to RHB.

Mayor McLean went on to say members appointed to RHB do not seem to be able to criticize the government, and this failing is the result of lack of elected representatives.

"You need a board to go public when the dollars aren't coming. They should be screaming blue murder. We need to elect people who see to it money goes into our health care system," Mayor McLean said. "Because they're appointed, they don't have the ability to bring it to the public."

Councillor George Armstrong agreed, saying, "Only public reaction will force the government to act."

Trails group hears work project funding by government

PRINCETON - Vermilion Trails Society heard about youth employment and work projects that might be applicable to trail construction for the Trans Canada Trail. There can be 10 to 20 weeks depending on the number of Youth Environmental teams (E-teams) used to clear the trail, with \$16,000 maximum for expenses such as vehicle leases and vehicle fuel. These teams operate under contract. They could clear debris from trestles, pick knapweed, or deck the trestles. E-teams would be paid by a

combination of sources: Trails BC, Community Futures, the B.C. government and Human Resource Development Canada.

Steve Graham, regional chair for Trails BC, spoke of a long list of projects submitted by Vermilion Trails Society, and advised the group that the stewardship agreement which had previously been required had been waived for the present.

At the same time, engineers' drawings, which had previously not been necessary, are now required before projects can be

approved.

Jim Manion remarked, "We'd have been better off if we played renegade and went ahead and did what we wanted."

Graham went on to say, "Basically, they want the glory. They don't want hassles. All they need now is a project."

Graham gave John Byatt a project proposal summary form and told him a project proposal manual would be given them the next day.

Vermilion Trails Society is considering a number of projects.





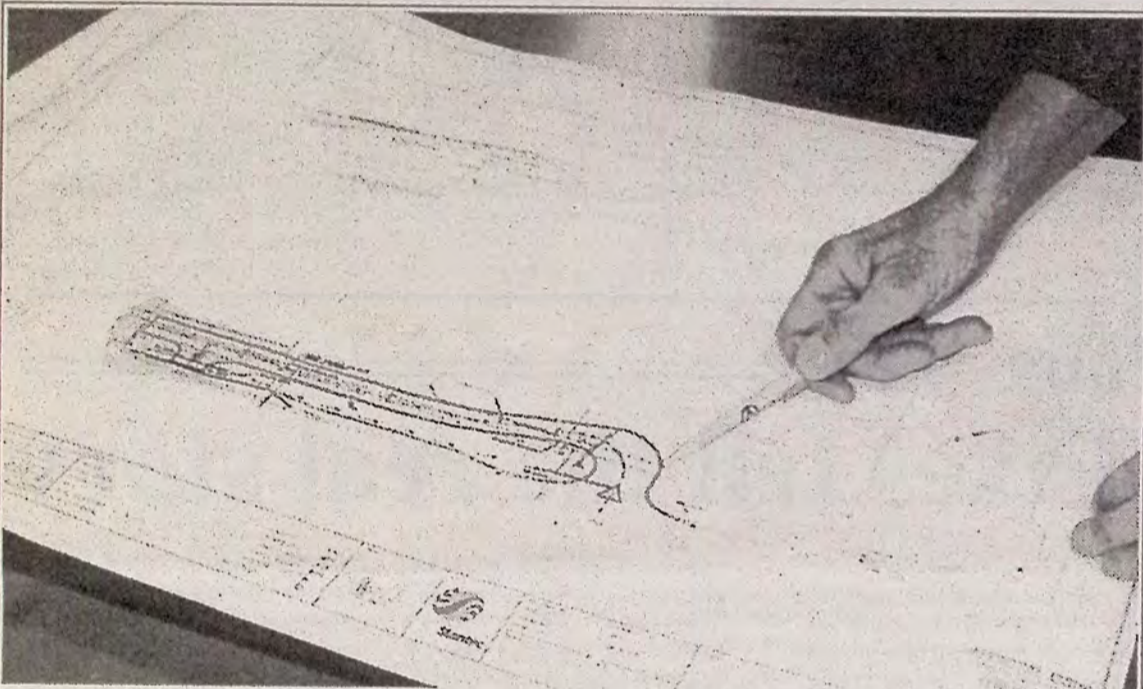

Council approves highway access road

PRINCETON - Direct highway access to Princeton Plaza and Dairy Queen has been approved by Town Council, clearing the way for construction. This access, originally denied, has been a long-standing problem for property owners who wanted the direct access to improve business. At the July 19 meeting of Town Council, the blueprints for the plan were reviewed and approved. Council had requested a wider entrance and an additional dry well, and Highways District agreed. Highways final approval for the plan is pending, but is expected to be approved soon. The plan calls for a right-hand

turn from the westbound lane on Highway 3, with a curve at the bottom of the slope leading to a frontage road that exits back onto the same lane of Highway 3. At the curve, the access encroaches into the present parking lots of both Princeton Plaza and Dairy Queen, but the property owners have agreed in order to gain the advantage of direct access. This access will enhance the ability of both businesses to draw customers from the highway, and should enhance rentals in Princeton Plaza, as well as improving business for existing tenants.

A question of election

Mayor Randy McLean spoke out at length, and with considerable emotion, about health care problems faced by small communities with small hospitals. The frustrations we experience were obvious as he spoke, but his comments about the need for elected representatives on regional health boards pinpoint the origin of many of the problems we deal with and the frustrations we feel.

Our provincial government, when the first community health councils were appointed, promised us elected representatives for future health councils. When community health councils were scrapped, our government promised us elected representatives on regional health boards in the future.

This year is civic election year, and to date, the promise of elected representatives on regional health boards has not been announced as being likely this year.

This is not a criticism of the people who serve on regional health boards now. They are volunteers who spend countless hours planning, budgeting, dealing with complaints and proposals. They work hard, travel long distances, and confront the frustrations of the public without the power to solve the problems.

The other thing regional health board members have to deal with is the suspicion, by many knowledgeable members of the public, that there is a hidden agenda and health boards will not reveal that agenda. There is a suspicion that health boards are withholding information, and that lack of money from the provincial government is not the entire picture. These suspicions are damaging to the personal reputations of health board members as suspicions mount that they are not telling the whole truth.

This unfortunate situation is the direct result of the structure of regional health boards. Perhaps there is no hidden agenda, but the helplessness of anyone to respond effectively to concerns justifies the public's suspicions.

Grower invents bedmaker

CAWSTON - Destin Lydiatt, Similkameen-Okanagan Organic Producer's Association (SOOPA) Vice President and its Organic Certification Committee Chairman, says he can't think of anything he'd rather be doing than farming. Looking over his organic carrot field on Beacroft Rd. in Cawston, he says, "Farming is a lifestyle, and I like it."

Destin is surprised that young people in the area don't come to him for a job. He says "I pay perfectly good money, and I'm a good boss." As a part of the largest industry in the south Similkameen, Agriculture, and as one of several organic ground croppers in the area, Destin employs four workers during the growing season. This year they are from Quebec and the Kootenays.

Destin joined SOOPA about ten years ago and has been a full time organic ground cropper the last four. He says his wife Elaine is a "great partner in the operation" and seven year old daughter Britney "tries to help where she can." Specializing in carrots this year, he says they are a lot of work, but there's a good market for them. His go to a Vancouver wholesale-Distributor Pro-Organics, and to the Vancouver Island Thrifty Chain..

This year, Destin invented his own "bed maker," creating raised carrot beds that can be stepped over and easily weeded, with less bending over. And he says carrots grown in this manner should harvest easily with a mechanical harvester because they will be "sitting up nice and proud." Weeding is done by hand or with an adjustable Swiss Wheel hoe. Destin says he "actually enjoys weeding" as long as he's not feeling rushed, and he uses an ordinary screwdriver to pull couch-grass out by the roots.

Destin says that the fertile bottom land on his farm is "ideal for ground crops." He says root crops in particular need unobstructed, clear soil. Destin feeds his soil by composting. He has been using a local farmer's manure, but says one of its drawbacks is that it contains a lot of pine needle bedding that resists breaking down. He mixes the manure with whatever soil or greens he feels are safe. He doesn't put greens that have gone to seed in his compost because the seeds may not break down in the composting process, and unheated seeds are capable of sprouting. Seed in a regular-compost pile

will break down if the compost pile reaches 140 degrees Fahrenheit at least three times. Because Destin is composting in the field, it's not a perfect process, 100% of the pile doesn't get heated. Turning it every six to eight weeks, it takes at least two years to get a finished product.

Destin thinks compost is precious, and has plans to design a

precise spreader that will apply the compost in a slot between the rows "so the goodness of the compost gets into the root zone."

He says he is working toward using horses for as much of the work as possible. He is still investigating how to do it and where to get the proper equipment.

Council will go to referendum on OAP plan

KEREMEOS - In an April 1/99 letter to Keremeos Council, the Old Age Pensioners Organization O.A.P.O. (Branch # 65) requested permission to extend the area of their downtown building "by approximately 29' x 39' to square off the building." The letter explained that the increase in centre activities over the past year had created the need to expand. The property used for the expansion would come from Memorial Park. Council decided to take the question to the general public in a referendum to be

held in conjunction with the November 20/99 Municipal election and to tape off the proposed area for the public to view. Council has created the necessary By-Law # 598, 1999 and has given it three readings at its July 5 regular meeting. In the November referendum, voters will be asked to give a simple yes or no answer to this question, "Should the Old Age Pensioners Organization Branch 65 Recreation Society be allowed to extend their building in Memorial Park by 1053 sq. ft. in order to square off the building?"

South Similkameen Museum protects outdoor artifacts display

KEREMEOS - The South Similkameen Museum Society requested and received approval from the Village of Keremeos at their July 5 regular Council Meeting to build a roofed-over area with a cement pad at the north end of the Museum property to better display and protect some of the Society's outdoor artifacts.

According to the Museum Society, the shelter will "provide some protection from the weath-

er, eliminate weeds that grow in and around the displays," thus improving the museum yard's appearance, and provide a clear space for holding public events "that could make residents and particularly the younger generation more aware" of the museum's value to the community.

Grants from the Canadian Millennium Partnership Program and BC 2000 Arts and Heritage Program will fund most of the project. Fund raising will provide the rest.

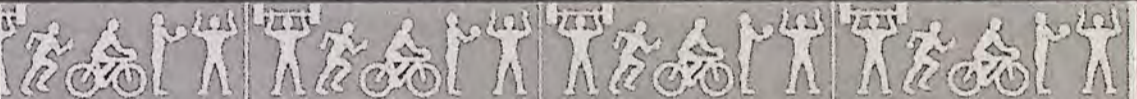

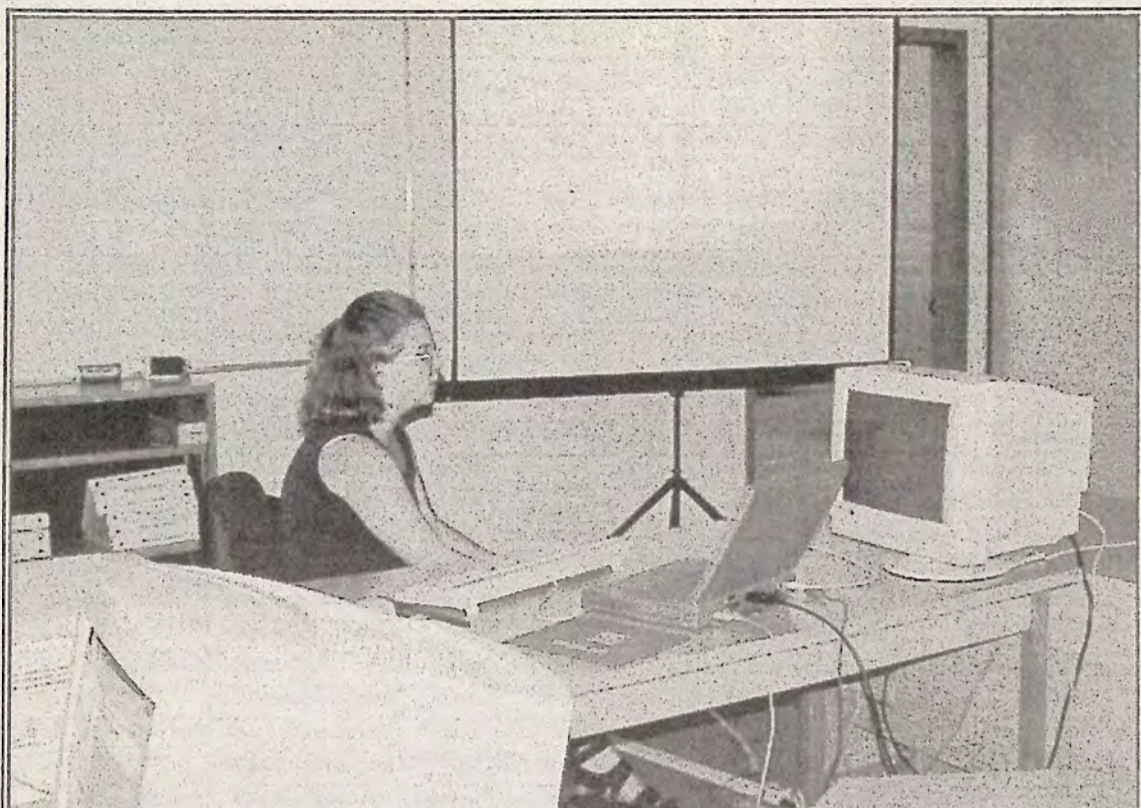

Few attend Open House for youth employment opportunities

PRINCETON - The Open House invitation to the Youth Employment Resource Centre drew few people to the Skills Centre on July 20. Despite the work of Meredith Porter and Meghan Barrie in establishing an excellent job resource and an outstanding open house presentation, those who should have responded to the invitation were not in evidence. Porter and Barrie had invited employers and potential employees to the Open House to learn how their system works to link the two through computer on the Princeton web site (<http://town.princeton.bc.ca>).

Thirteen young people seeking work have filled out their applications and are listed on the site. A good job listing was shown, along with deadline for applications. A computer lab was set up to demonstrate how to navigate the site to find needed information.

Porter explained that many of the youth who register are unem-

ployed, but some employed youth who want to move to a more appropriate job are listed on the site.

Princeton Youth Employment Resource Centre will be holding courses for youth seeking work. On August 17 and 24, young people may take Job Search and Entrepreneurship. The courses are free, but there is a \$5.00 fee for materials.

Another of the services offered, for the cost of the paper on which

it is written, is a printout of grants available for youth in 1999-2000.

Meghan Barrie has volunteered to keep the listings updated during the winter months, and Porter hopes to be able to launch the service again next spring.

Anyone wishing assistance from the Youth Employment Resource Centre, whether a youth seeking work or an employer seeking a worker, may call 295-4051 and as for Youth Employment.

'Smokies' earn money for highway rescue group

PRINCETON - The sale of "smokies" in a bun a Pinewood Pottery Art and Music Festival '99 earned the Highway Rescue Society \$245, matched by Pinewood Potteries for a total of \$490. This money will go toward a new highway rescue vehicle.

The society is made up of volunteers who go through rigorous training to prepare themselves to be competent in rescuing people who have been in highway accidents. Their skills are needed in the most difficult incidents, when vehicles go down steep embankments or when vehicles go into the river. The society is not funded by the provincial government and is a service offered by the people of Princeton.

B.C. exports climb ninth month in a row

VICTORIA - B.C.'s exports rose by 13.6 per cent in May, marking the ninth month in a row that exports were up over levels in the previous year.

Mike Farnworth, Minister of Employment and Investment, commented, "More than one in four jobs in B.C. and 20 per cent of our gross domestic product depends on exports, so when we start to see a consistent upward trend emerge, it means more employment and economic growth."

Goods valued at \$11.5 billion were shipped from B.C. from January through May 1999, compared with \$10.2 billion for the same period in 1998. Much of B.C.'s exports are from resource-

based sectors. In the first five months of 1999, B.C. shipped \$6 billion in forestry exports, up 15.7 per cent over January to May 1998. Machinery and equipment increased 13.6 per cent and agricultural and fishing products improved 5.9 per cent.

"We are seeing some signs of recovery in various areas of our economy," Finance Minister Gordon Wilson said. "Exports are up 12.6 per cent from January through May over the same period in 1998. As well, we saw growth in employment in June, and Statistics Canada reported an increase of eight per cent in manufacturing shipments from January through May compared with the same period in 1998."

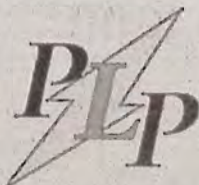

B.C. patients gain from new implant

VANCOUVER - Some patients with Parkinson's disease, multiple sclerosis and other movement disorders will benefit from funding for deep brain stimulation technology. Deep brain stimulation involves placing a permanent electrode in the region of the brain that produces the tremor, dramatically reducing the problem. The electrode is connected to a power source under the skin on the chest - like a cardiac pacemaker - that can be adjusted as symptoms dictate.

Funding of \$185,000 will allow treatment of 20 patients for 1999-2000. This funding will cover surgery and other hospital costs including nursing support and follow-up maintenance for each patient. Last year, the Ministry of Health allocated \$77,000 for 10 devices. The program will continue as part of the ministry's base funding and will be reviewed annually and expanded as needed.

Dr. Christopher Honey, neurosurgeon at Vancouver General Hospital and assistant professor of neurosurgery at UBC stated, "Patients who have been fully assessed and are waiting for this procedure will benefit greatly from this funding. The main advantage of deep brain stimulation technology is that it can effectively turn off that part of the brain that causes shaking, slowness or pain without destroying it (the brain). We also predict this technology could ultimately save health care dollars in reduced hospitalization, home care and drug costs."

Two of Dr. Honey's patients who have undergone the procedure have seen remarkable results.

"This has been a miracle for me," said Peter Booth, who has multiple sclerosis. "I am able to feed myself for the first time in two years."

"After the operation, I hope to be able to return to work after being disabled for so long," said Linda Muskat, who has Parkinson's disease.

Deep brain stimulation products are approved by Health Canada's health protection branch as safe and effective.

Dr. Honey is the only neurosurgeon in B.C. who does this procedure and has successfully implanted the device in 10 patients.

Mayor backs artists

PRINCETON - Mayor Randy McLean reported to Council on activities of the Arts Council and gave his personal full support for their upcoming Sight and Sound event. He went further, saying Council should encourage artists to show more of their work.

Sight and Sound is scheduled to take place on August 14 at the museum grounds. The event will include arts, crafts and music.

People make history, and BC Hydro employees helped make B.C. history. Marcel Lamarre, of Summerland, is one of BC Hydro's retired employees who is proud to talk about the part he played in shaping the destiny of our province.

Lamarre, who lives in Summerland, visited Princeton Town Council on July 19 to present a book called *Gaslights to Gigawatts*, a book written from the personal stories of retired BC Hydro employees who call their organization "Power Pioneers". The book was fully sponsored by BC Hydro, and all sales of the book go to CKNW Orphans' Fund and B.C. Children's Hospital. A total of \$20,000 has gone to each since the book was published.

In accepting the book, Mayor Randy McLean remarked, "I can't remember anyone ever giving us a book before."

Lamarre told Council some of the interesting facts in the books,

and mentioned the many characters who shaped BC Hydro during the years, including Premier W.A.C. Bennett. The book is about people, power and projects, told by the workers who remember their part in the projects. The story begins in the 1860's, when gas lamps first lit the streets of Victoria, up to present day of billion-watt (gigawatt) projects.

Gaslights to Gigawatts, A Human History of BC Hydro and its Predecessors, contains the memories, memoirs and photographs from over 200 people and 150 interviews. Many of the photographs have never before been published. The information comes from line workers, dam builders, sales reps, labourers, managers and trade unionists.

Mayor McLean told other Council members they would have to wait in line to read it.

The book is available in hard cover at most B.C. book stores for \$37.25.

Use caution with aspirin when children are ill: there is danger

Are you aware that giving your children aspirin while they are ill may not be in their best interest? Children under 18 years of age should not be given aspirin for symptoms of viral infections, such as a sore throat, due to the risk of a rare but serious complication called Reye's syndrome. Reye's syndrome usually occurs about six days after the viral infection during which aspirin was ingested. The child may experience nausea and vomiting followed by a change in mental behavior. These mental changes

vary from mild amnesia to intermittent episodes of disorientation and agitation, in some cases, death. Aspirin use increases the risk of acquiring Reye's syndrome some 35 times; however, the exact cause of this syndrome and how it is related to simple viral infections is unknown at this time. Although further investigation is required, the use of aspirin by

individuals under 18 years of age should be avoided. This article is not intended to scare you; however, it is very important to make informed decisions concerning the use of all medications. 

“Access denied”

There are many activities and programs in process today that have may result in severely restricted public access to Crown Lands in the future. The only way to secure and maintain access on public land is to stay informed, know the issues in your area and get involved. Some of the land use issues that will affect access:

Backcountry Recreation Policy: The government currently has hundreds of applications for Crown Land tenures for commercial backcountry recreation on file and in process. Many of these activities may be incompatible with traditional recreational pursuits like hunting, fishing, and trapping and have the potential to cause restricted or no access to persons pursuing these traditional activities, not to mention the possible impacts to wildlife habitat.

Protected Areas Strategy Plan: When the government embarked on the Protected Areas Strategy the, BCWF supported this initiative because we were promised a separate legislation would be created to administer these areas, and that traditional recreational activities would be allowed to continue. When the decision that BC Parks would be given the mandate to manage protected areas the parks policy regarding hunting, trapping, and angling automatically was applied to these areas. The Parks Branch policy is very restrictive and unsupportive of these activities.

Native Land Claims: Most of our Provincial Crown Lands in BC are the covered by native land claims. Treaties to date have given large areas of land as part of the settlement and also have given natives large allocations of the big game and fisheries harvest. Overlap of traditional terri-

tories could give natives first right to a huge segment of the fish and wildlife harvest. (Access to fish and wildlife "denied")

Grizzly Bear Management Area: The government has fallen into the environmentalist's trap and assisted in the iconization of the grizzly bear in BC. Large grizzly bear conservation areas are being planned that will have include no hunting and restricted public access. This ironically happens at a time when grizzly bear populations in BC are healthier than they have been for over 75 years.

The selling off of crown holdings and land by government: Recently our government has made a deal with MacMillan Bloedel. The government owes 83 million in compensation, and instead of money, the government is using our land, yours and mine, to pay the debt. When land becomes private, our access is most likely lost.

When addressing public access we must put resources and wildlife habitat first, but we must also enter into decisions with caution. The Impact of many of these land use issues will determine our access to Crown Lands.

Rolly says he has already cut and stooked most of the barley, so it can dry for threshing, but he has left an area uncut, so he can demonstrate the whole process to the public. He has organized plenty of parking space and he hopes people of all ages will come out to enjoy and participate in the bee. A team of

mules driven by an elderly man from Armstrong will be hauling the barley bundles. Rollie's famous tractors, seen each year in the Elks Rodeo Parade, and at Hedley's 100th anniversary celebration will be on display. There will be an on-site concession. Admission to the bee is Adults \$3, Seniors and youths \$2 and under 12 free.

The Grist Mill will have a pancake breakfast from 8:30 to 11:00 both days and will hold its threshing demonstration on Sunday charging Adults \$5, Seniors \$4, Youth \$3 and Family \$12.

Ambulance and highway rescue crews train together

PRINCETON - Ambulance and highway rescue crew members had a joint training weekend on July 17 and 18. On the Saturday, the ambulance group, consisting of seven members, attended an in-house training session. On Sunday, they were joined by six people from Highway Rescue Society for an outdoor exercise on a slope north of Weyerhaeuser sawmill.

The training session included an embankment rescue exercise in which the crew learned how to avoid falling while they conducted a rescue. The ambulance crew learned patient rescue procedures. Nick Goreas of the highway rescue crew helped to co-ordinate the exercise.

The two crews needed to train together because, out in the field, they must work together and know each other's equipment and procedures. Part of the B.C. Ambulance safety program says ambulance personnel are not supposed to do embankment rescues without training.

The training session was a mock embankment rescue lasting four to five hours.

Both ambulances now have

ropes, harnesses and equipment. They are now able to go to the patient immediately and begin care without waiting for the rescue crew to arrive and bring the patient up to them.

The sooner patient care begins, the more certain the ambulance crew can be that they are able to meet the "golden hour". The golden hour is the first hour after trauma occurs. Experience has shown that patient care begun within that hour optimizes the patient's chance of survival.

Youth will serve sentence in jail

PRINCETON - A Princeton male youth was sentenced to 25 days in open custody at a youth containment centre following a trial in Provincial Court on July 22.

The youth was tried on charges related to break and enter crimes committed last year.

In addition to the custody sentence, the youth was sentenced to 60 weeks probation with conditions including drug and alcohol abuse counselling, no contact with victims of the crimes or their premises, and \$750 restitution.

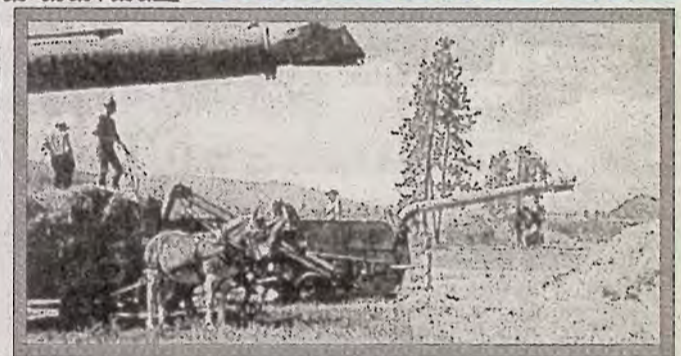
