



Fatal accident

Valley teams save lives as fatal head-on closes highway

Hedley, Keremeos and Princeton emergency personnel responded to a high-speed head-on collision on Highway 3 near Sterling Creek bridge two kilometers west of Hedley. The accident occurred on the highway adjacent to the access road to the Ralph Williams ranch.

Princeton RCMP and Provincial Ambulance and First Response Crews from Hedley Volunteer Fire Department and Keremeos Volunteer Fire Department, and Keremeos ambulance crew, rushed to the scene of one of the worst accidents in the area in many years. The Hedley crew was first on the scene, followed rapidly by ambulance crews from Keremeos and Princeton.

Tammi Lezlie Sayers, age 31, of Vancouver, driving the west-bound vehicle, was dead at the scene. Her three sons, ages 7, 4 and 10, were passengers in her vehicle. Two were taken to Princeton General Hospital and released to their fathers the same day. The third was taken to Penticton Regional Hospital for treatment and released the following day.

The eastbound vehicle, which had apparently crossed the center line into oncoming traffic, was driven by Helle Frisch, age 30, of Denmark. Her husband, Max, age 29, was a passenger, and both were taken to Penticton Regional Hospital for treatment and remained for the week. Max

Frisch was seriously injured. Their two-year-old son was taken to Penticton Hospital and released.

Walter Despot, of Keremeos, was at the scene as head of the fire department rescue crew.

"I was comfortable with our extrication. We could've been a bit faster, but we had a helluva mess of steel and high-impact plastic."

The crews were at the scene for two hours. A great deal of gasoline and engine oil spilled onto the highway and had to be covered with kitty litter before traffic was permitted through the area. The Keremeos crew took care of that chore, ensuring nobody skidded on the greasy surface.

Eastbound traffic was tied up for three hours. Westbound traffic was re-routed to Princeton via Old Hedley Road, where delays were caused by vehicles making a left turn at the intersection of Old Hedley Road with Highway 5A, and a further left turn into Bridge Street to proceed to the junction with Highway 3. Traffic on Old Hedley Road was backed up as far as the sawmill. Traffic on Highway 5A was backed up from Bridge Street to the Old Hedley Road intersection.

Councillor Kathleen Clement wants slower traffic within town limits

PRINCETON - Councillor Kathleen Clement wants the 60-kmph speed signs on Highway 3 moved further west.

Councillor Clement introduced a motion at the August 3 Town Council meeting to have speed reduced to 60 kmph west of the Westridge subdivision entrance.

"I believe the reduced speed should be from town limit to town limit," Clement said. "I think it would be a much safer community."

Clement did not meet with any real support as she requested a letter to the Department of Highways from Council to support her motion.

Some felt speed had nothing to do with a recent fatal accident near Mohawk service station. There was some discussion

of where the highway narrowed and Councillor Jim Manion expressed concern about safety in that area.

Councillor Dan Sulentic said Council had discussed it with Highways Department, but Clement pointed out "that was a

year ago and they haven't done anything."

Mayor McLean felt that Highways should look at it.

After much discussion for and against, Councillor Clement's motion passed.

Council okays rally

Princeton Town Council has approved a Jet and Scale Rally for Princeton airport.

On August 3, Council discussed a request from the Model Aeronautics Association of Canada Jet Committee to hold a model aircraft rally in Princeton in September.

This will be a public event

attracting not only the participants but large numbers of radio-controlled model aircraft buffs.

Arrangements have been made with Transport Canada for use of the airport. Council approved temporary snow fences for crowd control. The sponsors will provide security, a concession stand and washroom facilities.

Moody Street goes one way

PRINCETON - Moody Street is approved as a one-way street. Following a request in writing, Town Council reviewed the Moody Street situation. The street is on Third Bench, with an awkward curved entrance into Mayne Avenue, the secondary route to downtown or the hospital. The junction of Moody and Mayne is such that a driver attempting to exit Moody into Mayne cannot see traffic coming up the hill from Second Bench. Council has approved one-way traffic into Moody. Drivers wishing to exit from Moody Street must go around the block and exit at the next intersection.

Vehicle kills bear

PRINCETON - A motorist travelling Highway 3 on the evening of August 2 collided with a black bear seven kilometers west of Princeton. The bear carcass remained at the edge of the highway. Conservation Officer Al Lay received reports of the bear still moving, and went to investigate on Tuesday morning. "The bear was dead," Lay said. "It was not moving. It had been dead at least 12 hours." In the meantime, rumours continued to circulate to the effect that there was a hunt for a wounded bear. Rumours died after the bear carcass was removed.

Judge orders fine for man resisting arrest

In Provincial Court in Princeton on August 5, Jimmy Parks entered a guilty plea to a charge of resisting arrest on December 3, 1998. The incident occurred when RCMP attended a motor vehicle accident at a service station in Princeton. A person wandering around, somewhat intoxicated, told police there had been three people in the vehicle. Police saw Parks walking around the service station lot, apparently dazed and intoxicated. He was arrested for being drunk in a public place and handcuffed, then placed in the back seat of the police vehicle. Parks then began to kick and bang around in the back seat. One of the constables opened the door and he attempted to leave the scene. This occurred a second time, at the detachment office, where constables struggled with him. Parks said he tried to get away, but did not attack them. He said he would apologize to Cst. Prouse. Judge Sinclair told Parks, "It would be manly of you to apologize." Judge Sinclair ordered Parks to pay a \$300 fine and \$30 discharge.

No driving for ten years

Robert Arthur Mullin appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on August 5 to plead guilty to three charges: driving while prohibited, driving while impaired, and refusing to give a breath sample. All charges related to Mullin's arrest on November 28, 1998, in Prince George, where he was stopped in a roadblock. On May 13, 1997, Mullin had been prohibited from driving for four years. When convicted in 1997, he had eight prior impaired driving convictions. Mullin's defense counsel explained that the 48 year old man "has had a lifelong fight with the demon alcohol." He noted that Mullin had attended residential treatment and alcohol counselling. Judge Sinclair sentenced Mullin to nine months in jail and a 10-year driving prohibition, and a one-month jail term concurrent for driving while prohibited.

Land Commission looks at local ALR

PRINCETON - Councillor Jim Manion met with members of the Agricultural Land Commission in late July. The topic of concern to Council is removal of some land from the Agricultural Land Reserve to free it for industrial use. "They said it was the first time they left the office to travel and look at the land we were talking about," Councillor Manion said. Manion accompanied the group to the area in question and described Council's needs and plans for the future. "They looked at the land and tried to determine what should be in and what shouldn't," Manion said. Commission members did not give a decision on site. Council expects to hear from the Commission soon.

Move PNE? Not likely, says Mayor

The P.N.E. is not likely to move to the Interior, says Princeton Mayor Randy McLean.

Mayor McLean attended a conference in Penticton last month regarding the idea of moving the Pacific National Exhibition to Penticton. At the August 3 Town Council meeting, he told Council he thought the P.N.E. representatives were using the idea of moving to the Interior as "leverage for the coast."

"They have a site in Surrey they want," he said. "They want to build a \$70 million project."

At the same time, Mayor McLean learned a great deal about how such facilities are managed to create a steady income to support the facility.

"They co-ordinate activities so there's always something going on," McLean told Council. "They're willing to share their expertise with other groups."

He believes they have knowledge that could be of value to Princeton in managing our local facilities.

There was no discussion of accessing the expertise, although there was some discussion of changing the way the fair grounds are managed, and the need for co-ordination of local events.

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Auditor General of reports on finances

VICTORIA - On July 29, Auditor General George Morfitt issued his annual report on the B.C. government's financial accountability for the 1997/98 fiscal year.

Morfitt notes the government's progress in issuing the Public Accounts earlier than in the past, and in pursuing its program of capitalizing tangible assets. However, he continues to be concerned that the 1997/98 summary financial statements of the province do not provide a full accounting of government. These statements, Morfitt reports, exclude public health care and educational bodies, though such organizations are accountable to and controlled by the government. Morfitt is concerned about the lack of comparability of these statements with the government's annual estimates of revenue and expenditure.

The Auditor General notes in his report that the government was somewhat late in issuing its report on debt. Further, Morfitt is concerned that government plans for managing provincial debt have been altered too often.

"When plans are frequently modified to a substantial extent," says the Auditor General, "the purpose of having them in the first place is defeated."

The Auditor General was satisfied with the progress of the government in resolving Year 2000 issues. The Auditor General notes a pro-active approach by ministries and Crown corporations to resolve Year 2000 issues.

Beach hazard

Syringes/needles - lost and found

Recently, while my children were visiting a local beach with their grandma, they were asked if they had something with which to pick up a used syringe. My children, especially the older two, stood wide-eyed and watched as a lady picked up the syringe and discarded it in the trash.

That evening, the dinner conversation was far from dull.

What's a syringe? Who left it there? Why is it dangerous?

Many questions were asked and much discussion took place. Here is some of what we talked about. A needle that someone else has used contains a small amount of blood (you may not even see it). This blood may carry viruses such as the AIDS or Hepatitis B virus which can make us very sick. If you find a used syringe/needle in the future, always leave it where you found it and tell an adult immediately. Needles need to be disposed of in a safe manner so they don't hurt you or someone from the local

When picking up a syringe or a condom (we did not talk about condoms - saving that for a dinner conversation in the near future), use a pair of sturdy gloves, tongs or pliers. Condoms can also contain infectious body fluids. Condoms should be placed in a plastic bag. Syringes and needles need to be placed in a puncture proof container. A coffee tin, or a strong plastic or metal container with a lid will work. Always wash your hands carefully with warm soapy water after handling these items.

It is important to note that while the risk of infection from used condoms and syringes/needles is very low, it is best to limit the risk as much as possible.

That evening's dinner conversation did not end when dinner was over. Many questions continue to surface. Children are curious and eager to learn. We, as adults, need to prepare our children and provide them with the information they need to prevent such injuries.

On that note, should you accidentally prick yourself with a

dirty needle, you should keep the needle stick area low to the ground which will help to promote bleeding. The area should be washed thoroughly with soap and warm water. You will also need to go directly to the Emergency Room for follow-up. I can only hope that those using these needles and syringes are taking the necessary precautions and discarding the needles in an appropriate manner. However, in the rare instance where a needle or condom is found, we need to be prepared to dispose of it and rid ourselves and others of the potential injury.

Threshing bees attract hundreds of people

SIMILKAMEEN - Eight hundred curious people, about 200 Saturday in Cawston and 600 Sunday at the Grist Mill, attended the Old Time Threshing Bee on the August long weekend. The Keremeos Youth Association provided a concession on Saturday, and the Grist Mill, a pancake breakfast on Saturday and Sunday. On Sunday, the Grist Mill also featured Old Time Music with Brooker's K-Mountain Band, old time songs at the piano, and a Historic Okanagan Flour Mills slide show and talk by Cuyler Page in the Apple House Theatre. On both days, Stan and Jean Pollard of Salmon Arm set up a tools and antique display that included an old galvanized metal washing machine, old lawn mowers and 1943 skidoo made in Broken Head, Manitoba, using a 1929 Model A transmission.

Each day, the Spallumcheen Pioneer Power Club members and local volunteers drove about 20 of Rollie Bilodeau's vintage

tractors in a parade around the field. Spectators had several opportunities on Saturday and Sunday to view the different components of grain processing including cutting, stooking, loading the stooked bundles by hand onto a wagon driven by a mule team, and transporting them to the circa 1920 threshing machine to be loaded and processed. A 1948 John Deere stationary engine was connected to the threshing machine's drive belt to make it run. Threshing Bee organizer Rollie Bilodeau says that before fuel powered stationary engines, steam engines were used to run the threshing machine, and before that, in the late 1800's, horses on a treadmill.

Grain bundles are carried from the wagon into the threshing machine on a wooden conveyor that moves them through blades, cutting their strings, then through cylinders that cut the plant, breaking the grain off the stems. The chopped material

then falls onto decks that shake and separate its components. The chaff and straw are blown out onto a pile that can later be baled.

The weeds fall through a small screen, but not the grain. It goes through a small elevator on the side of the threshing machine onto a waiting vehicle, like the 1947 Reo grain truck used in the weekend demonstration.

According to Rollie, the first steel threshing machine was built in 1914. Before 1914, wooden threshers, like the one presently on display in the Grist Mill parking lot, were used.

The Grist Mill's wheat field was not ready to be threshed until Thursday, August 5, so Rollie moved barley bundles from his Agar Road, Cawston, location to the Grist Mill for Sunday's demonstration. On Thursday, he threshed the Grist Mill's wheat and returned the vintage Case Threshing Machine to the Spallumcheen Pioneer Power Club, a co-sponsor of the event.

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Our drivers need more education

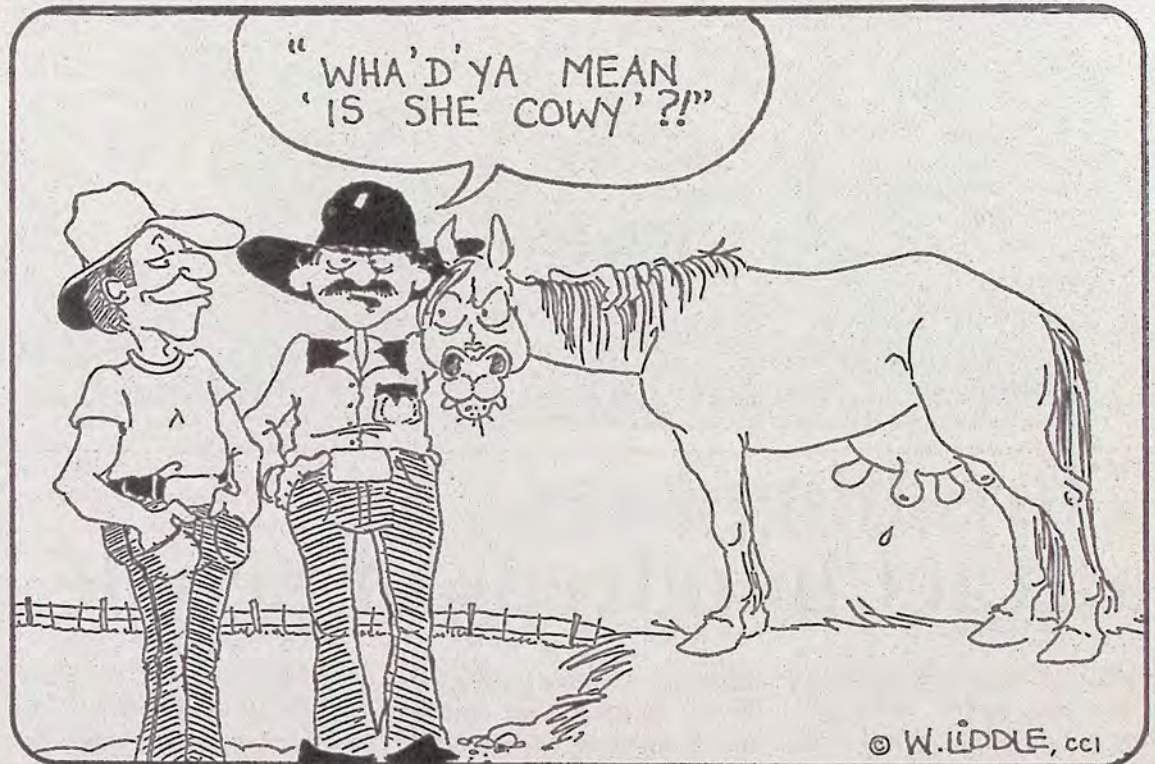
The rash of highway accidents of the past few weeks, and particularly during the long weekend, resulted in fatalities. The loss of a human life is costly in our society, yet the stories coming to us from the driving public make us wonder whether all individuals driving our highways value their own lives, to say nothing of the lives of others.

Following the horrendous accident near Sterling Creek bridge last week, we discovered driver after driver with a story of highway stupidity that would send chills down any driver's spine. One person after another told us of an experience on the highway this summer that was too close to causing a fatality.

Many of the stories involved the greed for speed and breaking safe driving rules. We heard stories of driver's who passed on a double solid line, pulled out when there was not room enough to pass, forcing others off the highway and onto the shoulder. We learned that 100 kilometers per hour was still not fast enough for some people. We heard about excessive speed of vehicles driving through town, and we had our own experiences of drivers hugging our bumpers because we slowed down to the speed limit.

The speed greed is only part of the story of highway stupidity. People over-tired from long hours behind the wheel made stupid moves because they were no longer alert. Others misjudged their ability to pass, or to stop, because they were pulling, or carrying, the unfamiliar load of a camper.

We need more enforcement to educate our drivers to show them they need educating, before they kill themselves or somebody else. Their highway stupidity seems to be growing by leaps and bounds this year.

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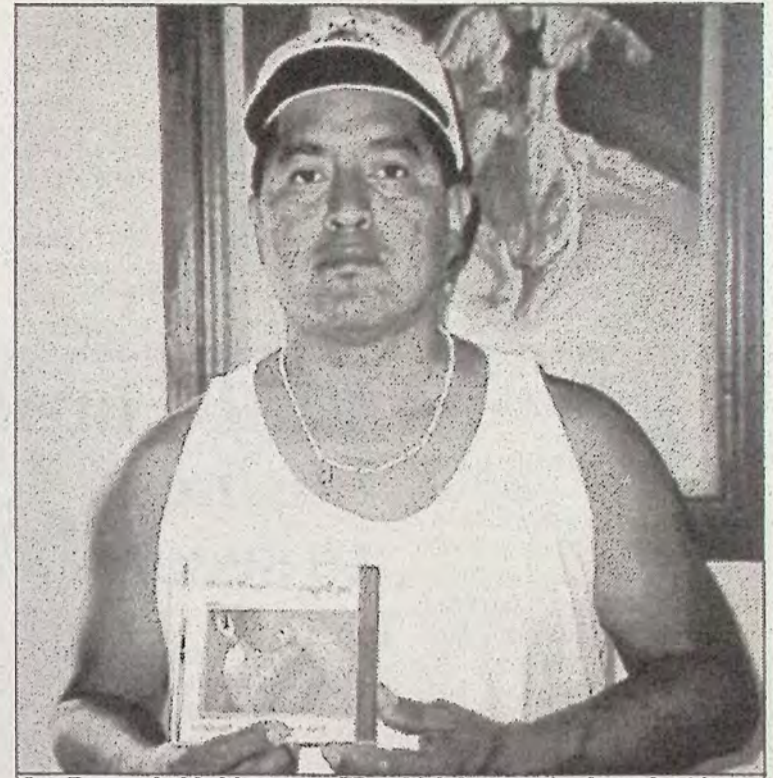
Musician goes international

SIMILKAMEEN - Jay Begaye, local Navajo graphic artist, craftsman, musician and singer, says his company Jay Begaye Entertainment is booked with performances into late fall including a three week tour in France beginning the last weekend of September, singing for an international group of Native Dancers based in Winnipeg.

Jay's group opened for the well-known Native American band, Redbone, at the Assembly of First Nations Conference in Vancouver, B.C., in mid-July and will play at the Assembly of Chiefs Pow-wow in Winnipeg August 27 to 29. Jay designed the logo used at the Pan-Am Games Pow-wow. Jay says he alone, or his group, plays mostly at music festivals, pow-wows and opening shows for rodeos in Canada and the United States. Jay's drum group, called The Cathedral Lake Singers, will be the host drum in Salt Lake City in the first week of October.

Pow-wow singing brought Jay to the Similkameen in 1987 where he has lived for 12 years with his wife, Loren, and their daughter, Tiinesha, who is an accomplished native dancer. From his modest trailer on the Lower Similkameen Indian Reserve, Jay runs his entertainment company pursuing a variety of interests from native

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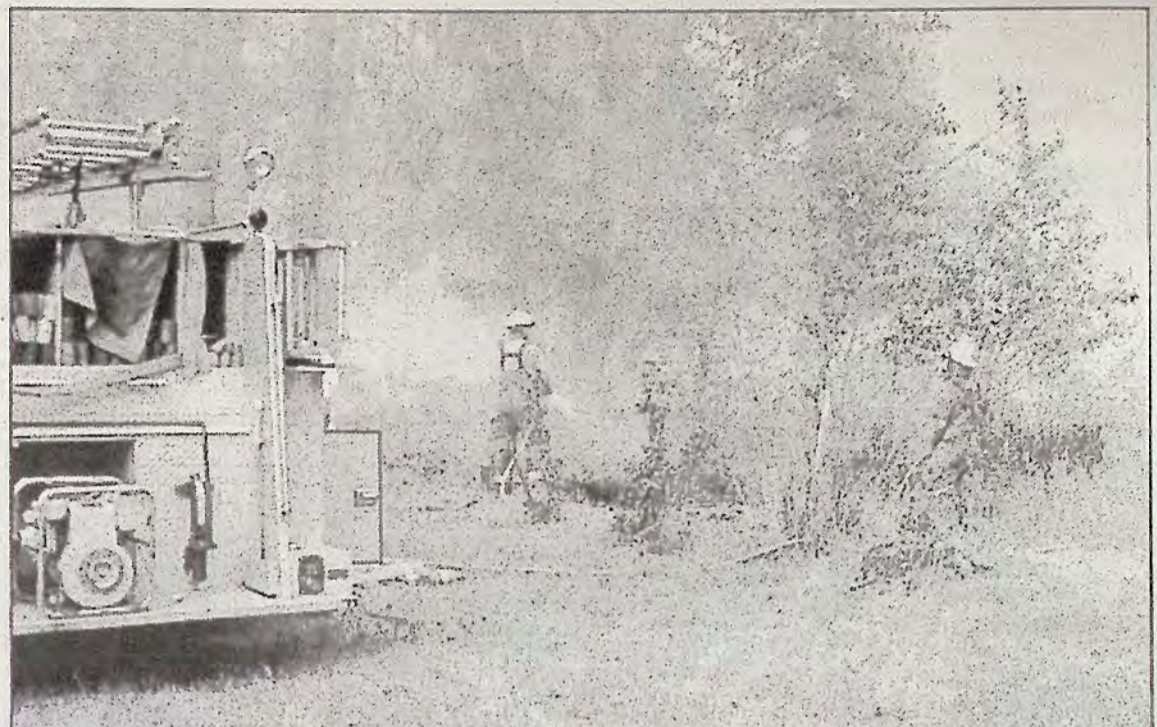

Trees help lost children survive alone

SIMILKAMEEN - How can trees help lost children survive? According to the HUG-A-TREE and SURVIVE Program, available through Princeton RCMP or through Keremeos Search and Rescue (SAR), hugging a tree, sitting by it, and even talking to it will calm down a lost person of any age and prevent panic.

"By staying in one place," the program brochure states, "you will be found far more quickly

and won't be injured trying to find your way out."

The HUG-A-TREE program originated in San Diego California in 1981 after a lost child's tragic death from hypothermia. Organizers wanted to teach children how to keep from getting lost, what to do if they become lost, how to stay warm and dry, and how to help searchers find them.

The program has worked very well and was released in Canada in 1996. According to SAR tracking instructor Eugene Deschamps, it has been presented in Hedley and Cawston Elementary Schools. He says it should have been done again this year, but was not.

During the course, instructors give each child a whistle and a bright orange plastic bag, that should always be carried on a picnic, hike or camping trip. They explain to each child, "If lost, make a hole in the bag for your face and put it on over your head; it will keep you warm and dry."

They encourage the children to use their whistles to call for help, because a whistle will carry farther than a child's voice and requires less energy. They ask the children to find a tree to hug that is near a clearing so, when they are rested, they can make crosses or other signs with broken shrubbery or rocks, or by dragging their feet in the dirt. If they hear searchers, they should wave their orange bag. The program teaches that at night, they should blow their whistles at any noises they may hear because, "If it is an animal, it will run away. If it is a searcher, you will be found."

The Program teaches children to

always tell someone where they are going and, if they become lost, to admit it to themselves so they can "take actions to be comfortable and maintain a positive outlook until the searchers arrive." Children are reminded that "even adults" get lost.

According to HUG-A-TREE, "Time and again, children have avoided searchers because they were ashamed of getting lost, or afraid of punishment"

Parents should explain to their children that, if they become lost, the parents will not be angry, only concerned about their safe return. Parents should also teach their children that "searchers are not strangers who want to hurt them."

Parents should never let a child walk trails alone and should teach the child to pick out high landmarks and note the sun's direction. Parents should call the police right away if their child is lost, and be available for interviewing.

The Program asks parents to footprint their child, "a five minute exercise that could cut down the time of the search by several hours."

Parents should have their child put on his or her hiking shoes and step onto a piece of aluminum foil that has been set on soft carpeting or a folded towel, and mark the footprints with the child's name. This will enable rescue trackers to separate the child's tracks from others and quickly determine the direction of travel.

Wildlife Federation says "Refuse the fee" on campsites

by Phil Hallinan, Forestry Committee Chair, Director at large, BC Wildlife Federation.

Has the Federation become one of those radical environmental groups that councils breaking the law? Is the issue so serious that it has come to this? We believe this one is. Our government has decided, rightly or wrongly, that certain ministries will take precedence over others. We suspect the Ministry of Health or the Ministry of Education spends more money on coffee than is needed for the entire ministry of forests recreation program.

The natural resource ministries have never received more than a small portion of the moneys they generate to government and have, as a result, not been able to deliver the necessary stewardship needed to ensure long time wealth creation. The destruction of the Fish and Wildlife and Forest Service budgets illustrates these decisions.

The entire budget for the protection of wildlife in this province is now paid by hunters, the fisheries budget by anglers, and now the government is asking them to pay the \$4 million needed to maintain forest service recreation sites. This comes about even though the forests of the province generate \$1.4 billion in direct stumpage and fees.

Many of the recreation sites throughout the province were built by members of the Federation as a service to the public. They recognized the destruction of wildlife and fisheries habitat that was occurring as campers followed the logging companies as they pushed roads father back into the wilderness. The unorganized camping along lake shores and stream sides caused much of the damage. Garbage was strewn about, trees were cut down, often in sensitive riparian areas, and wildfires were becoming a problem. The building of the recreation sites solved much of these issues. Now, because of the shortsightedness of government, we are returning to those days.

So what can you do when approached by a Forest Service employee and asked for the fee? First ask him for identification and make note of his name. Then ask that they show you where the recreation site is and where Crown land begins. Crown land camping is still free and if he can show you the surveyor stakes then you simply move out of the recreation site and camp on the surrounding Crown land. If he gives you an invoice ask him where you can appeal the invoice. The Forest Appeals Board is a good place to start. We

might as well involve them in these matters. Write your district manager (ask his name and address from the employee) and ask him to have the road upgraded into your site. Report any lack of services like dirty toilets or garbage that needs removing. In short let him know that the level of service must increase if he wishes you to pay for it. Ask him to pass the message on.

This province has the highest level of personal income taxes in Canada. We continually get less and less for our money.

Governments have now discovered the "User Pay theory" and all of them are charging towards this new nirvana with glee. The Federation believes enough is enough. We have already paid for these services through our taxes and selling our timber. It's time government recognized that we are not a bottomless pit.

Refuse the fee!

Penticton man wins Ultraman race

Nick Mallett, an Australian who lives in Penticton, won the 1999 Ultraman Canada. This is the event that makes Ironman Canada look easy. Princeton was on the itinerary for the long weekend races, designated as the finish site for the bicycle race portion.

The finish line was set up on Lime Street, adjacent to Rotary Park. The local portion of Ultraman received little publicity, despite the entourage filling one of Princeton's motels.

Mallett finished the three-day gruelling test of stamina in 25 hours, 19 minutes and five seconds. During the weekend, he set a new swim record, a Day One total time record, plus and overall Day One plus Day Two record. The 35 year old man won the 1994 Ultraman.

There was one female participant who joined the men in the race. Ultraman is comprised of a 10 km. swim, a 418.3 km. bike course, and an 84.3 km double marathon run. The athletes were given 12 hours to complete each day's event. Tracy Preston, age 29, of Penticton, set a new record time for women of 29 hours, 31 minutes and 44 seconds, giving

her fourth place overall.

Second place finisher was a 45 year old Brazilian, Sergio Cordeiro. Cordeiro spent approximately \$10,000 in air fare costs, plus his \$500 entry fee, vehicle rental and other costs.

Third place finisher was 42 year old Rick Kent of Austin, Texas, in his second Ultraman competition. There were three rookies in this year's Ultraman Canada: Lorne Lovett, age 37, of Kaleden; Paolo Chiarino, age 33, of Italy, and Steve Brett, age 39, a Penticton resident. They finished fifth, sixth and seventh respectively.

On Monday, August 2, athletes began Day Three of the event, the double marathon over Highway 40 to Summerland.

This course showcases the beauty of the Okanagan-Similkameen area of British Columbia, and truly challenges the participants.

Ultraman Canada is considered the ultimate qualifier for the Ultraman World Championships which are held in Hawaii each November. Several of the athletes who have just completed the Canadian event are looking forward to the Hawaiian experience.

tude of that love just shook me." The year 1984 changed Grady's life. He enrolled in drug and alcohol treatment programs, and broke the chain of addiction. He believes God led him to those programs.

For five years, Grady was involved in prison ministry. He could reach inmates with his songs.

He has released a CD reflecting both his change of heart and his celebration of God's mercy. *Running Too Long* touches on human brokenness but focuses on the grace of God. Grady will be singing many of the songs from his CD when he appears in Princeton on August 13.

Western movie shoots Similkameen

A movie scheduled to be shot in the North Okanagan will include some footage from the Similkameen Valley around Keremeos. The movie *By Dawn's Early Light*, is being made for U.S. cable network Showtime.

Described by Okanagan Film Commissioner Mark Flett as a "modern western", the story is about a youth who goes from Los Angeles to Colorado to spend a summer on his grandfather's ranch. Changes benefit farm worker

VICTORIA - Changes to provincial Employment Standards Regulations benefit both farmers and farm workers, according to Minister of Labour Dale Lovick and Minister of Agriculture and Food Corky Evans.

"These changes simplify payroll calculations while making it easier to monitor compliance with employment standards in agriculture," Lovick said. "That's a win-win solution for both agricultural employers and employees."

Changes include: streamlined calculation and payment of vacation and statutory holiday pay, wages and salary; banking of overtime for hourly and salaried workers; and adjustments to licensing, bonding and deposit requirements for farm labour contractors.

"Changes to the way holiday pay is calculated will make sure that farm workers receive benefits they are entitled to and will result in a real wage increase for many agricultural workers," Lovick said. "The new regulations will also simplify and improve enforcement of employment standards, leading to real improvements for many farm workers."

Council says 'yes' to Area 120 with conditions

PRINCETON - Area 120 Youth Drop-in Centre hopes to hold a Youth Street Fair on August 21, but they will have to meet a condition imposed by Town Council before they can block off the street.

The Youth Summer Committee requested permission from Council to close Veterans Boulevard and one block of Vermilion Avenue to hold the street fair.

Council agreed to allow the closure providing that the committee secure support from businesses affected by the closure.

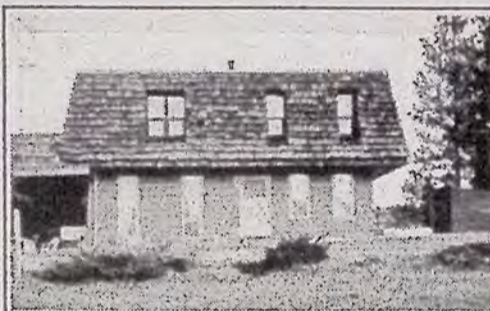

Week's second fatality

Provincial Ambulance and Princeton Highway Rescue rushed to the scene of an accident on Saturday evening at 6:48 p.m. A white 1989 Honda Prelude had gone off a curve 23 km. east of Princeton. It was wedged between pine trees 20 metres down a steep embankment.

Rescue Society and ambulance crews arrived at the scene in the midst of a thunder storm and cloudburst. Wind and a heavy downpour soaked them to the skin in minutes, and low cloud cut

visibility to a minimum. The crews succeeded in removing the lone occupant, 18 year old Shane Stanley Fuller, from the vehicle and carrying him up the bank to the ambulance. It was outstanding effort in a heavy downpour.

Fuller was seriously injured. He was rushed to Princeton General Hospital, but was pronounced dead on arrival.

Princeton RCMP and the Coroner's Office continue to investigate.
