ALC orders closure

CAWSTON - On August 20, Dave Lusted, owner of the T.L. Timber mill in Cawston, received a fax from the Agricultural Land Commission (ALC) explaining that the Commission had reconsidered his application to remain at his present location, but has confirmed its original resolution that T.L. Timber must close down. The Commission fax also states that the Commission "has now referred the matter to its Coordinator of Enforcement for action."

The original resolution had stated that T.L. Timber was to shut down by July 1, 1999, a resolution Mr. Lusted had appealed. He continued to run T.L. Timber while waiting for the ALC to reconsider its decision. On June 21 he submitted soil test samples proving the mill operation was not harming, but was enhancing the soil. ALC staff visited the T.L. Timber the week of July 20.

Lusted says that T. L. Timber is not going to take any immediate action. He says "we will wait until the Coordinator of Enforcement tells us what to do, and then we'll launch our action against the Land Commission." Lusted says he will request a copy of the ALC minutes of the meeting where this latest decision was made, just as he did the first time the ALC told him he had to close the mill and return the land to its original condition.

On August 20, ALC representatives Brian Underhill and Ross Blackwell were not available for comment.

Area 120 needs adult help

PRINCETON - Aly Murphy, Coordinator of the teen drop-in centre, known locally as Area 120, reported to Town Council on August 16. Murphy, and his assistant, Spenser Coyne, reviewed the clean-up and renovation of the building, saying everyone is impressed with the new look.

Murphy said the coffee shop idea was not as appealing to the teens as he expected it would be, but there were always young people coming to the centre, and its popularity grew as summer progressed.

An anonymous donation helped purchase a new CD player, new lights and a new felt for the pool table, all welcome additions to the centre.

Murphy told Council the volunteer support is not as good this year. There must be adult volunteers in order for Area 120 to remain open.

"Without stable and definite adult volunteers, Area 120 will be lost," Murphy told Councillors. "Young people have good inten-

tions, but adult stability is required."

Murphy praised Coyne's assistance, saying because Coyne was there, the entire building could be used and more young people came to the centre. When only one person is there, the upstairs is closed.

Leaky grandstand roof needs support beams

PRINCETON - Town Council received the engineer's report about the condition of the grandstand roof. According to J & B Engineering Ltd., a Penticton firm, the grandstand roof "is not capable of supporting the snow load without excessive deflection, which has caused leaks in the roof membrane."

The report goes on to say "To install new metal roof on existing structure would only lead to addi-

tional leaks after the first winter of snow loading."

What the engineer suggests is installing a mid-span post and beam system to carry the load to new foundations installed below the bleachers. The best solution, the engineer says, is several smaller beams laminated in place by bolts.

Council has referred the report to the building inspector for an estimate of costs.

Success brings Coalmont Carving and Crafts to new location in Princeton

PRINCETON - Town Council has approved first and second reading of a rezoning bylaw that will allow Coalmont Carving and Crafts to relocate from Coalmont to the building currently occupied by ProAutomotive. By October 1, ProAutomotive should be located elsewhere, and the value-added wood business should be located in Princeton.

Coalmont Carving and Crafts is owned and operated by Howard Gerein, who has five employees now working at his shop in Coalmont. However, business is so good that Gerein needs more space for his specialized manufacturing.

Gerein started making his deco-

orative, folding wood trivets/baskets a few years ago. These sell well in Japan and the United States. The trivet turns into a basket made of wood, if you turn it over. Each trivet/basket is cut from a different design, such as a heart, or pig, or other. Howard Gerein signs each basket.

These items have been excellent seasonal sellers through an outlet at the coast, but there was little production during the winter months.

Things changed two years ago when Gerein was asked to make some moldings for composition floors. He began to receive repeat orders, and moldings are now 20 per cent of his manufacturing.

This end of the business is growing, and Gerein needs more room.

When he is settled into his new building, he intends to create a showroom for tourists to visit and learn how he makes the trivet/baskets.

Judge orders probation

On August 19, 1999, in Provincial Court in Princeton, Delane Bennett-Milligan pled guilty to a charge of wilful obstruction of peace officers in the execution of their duty.

The charge arose from an incident shortly after midnight, May 8, 1999, when Bennett-Milligan, and her husband, Joel Milligan, became involved in a loud argument.

Police attended, and believed there was a fight going on. Milligan was arrested for causing a disturbance by being drunk, and he resisted arrest. Bennett-Milligan went to help him and she was arrested. Both continued to

resist arrest and Milligan scuffled with police until subdued with pepper spray.

Cst. Tracy Ross and Cst. Gilles Gosselin suffered bruises and pulled muscles.

Judge B.J. Grannary was informed that the 26 year old mother of three had no prior criminal record, and alcohol was a factor in the disturbance.

Judge Grannary order a one-year probation, during which Bennett-Milligan may be asked to undergo alcohol abuse assessment and treatment. She was ordered to write letters of apology to Csts. Ross and Gosselin.

Petschl said she hopes Town Council is proud of what the Youth Council has done.

Deputy Mayor Kathleen Clement replied, "It's always a pleasure to welcome you to our table."

She wished them well in the future.

Town sends plenty to region

It looked like Town Council suddenly became spendthrifts. Expenditures for the month of July were approved at the August 16 meeting to a total of \$357,166.20, an unusually high figure.

Councillors explained that Regional Hospital District's share of taxes was \$63,486, and

Regional District's share was \$96,000, making "spending" appear higher than normal. The

Town collects taxes for other local government agencies, including school district. In fact, Town Council did not really spend the money, they simply transferred tax revenues.

Stop school lunch boredom

Everybody becomes bored with the same old lunches after the first week at school. We offer you some ideas to introduce variety without sacrificing nutrition.

Treats: cheese chunks, nuts, hard-cooked egg, yogurt, taco chips with sauce, stuffed celery (cream cheese or peanut butter), cored apple filled with cheese,

fruit tart, raisins. Salads, stews and soups add variety, but salads must be kept cold, and stews and soups must be kept hot.

Instead of bread: bagels, scones, biscuits, muffins, flat bread, pita bread, rice cakes, crackers, melba toast, bread sticks.

Veggies: turnip sticks, carrot sticks, cucumber sliced lengthwise, celery sticks, flowerettes of cauliflower and broccoli, baby corn, radishes, zucchini sticks, peas in a pod, sweet pepper strips, cherry tomatoes.

Fruit: berries, kiwi, grapes, cherries, peaches, pears and any other fruit. Preserved fruit in a container can be part of the lunch, especially in winter.



How to discipline your teen: everything has natural consequences

The B.C. Council for the Family gives advice for parents on how to discipline teens without imposing discipline.

Discipline is education for life, says the Council. It provides teens with the guidelines they need to make good decisions for themselves. Discipline is instructional and future-oriented. It empowers teens to take control of their own lives. It gives them tools to move forward into a capable adult life. Teens want to become responsible for themselves, and this desire is the most powerful tool a parent has in motivating a teenager to learn how to make good decisions.

The Council for the Family recommends discipline in the form of "natural consequences" rather than punishment, because life does have natural consequences

to poor decisions. Parents need to set up logical consequences. For example, if Joe keeps losing things, make sure Joe is the one who pays for replacing what is lost. The natural consequence of losing a jacket would be to go without a jacket, but no parent wants a child to freeze, so making Joe pay for his jacket would be a logical consequence.

The other thing parents must decide is whether or not an issue is a teen's problem or a parent's problem. When what the teen does affects you, the parent, then it is your problem. If what the teen does affects the teen, it is the teen's problem. For example, if Dorothy did not save enough money to go to the film she wanted to see, that is Dorothy's problem. If there is no money for a

prescription for Dorothy, that is the parent's problem. Discipline is a family issue, and should be discussed as a family matter.

Keep kids safe

As children go back to school, it is a good idea to remind them of some of the safety rules. Returning to school means excitement and stress for most children, as routines abruptly change, and a new grade, new classmates and a new teacher offer more changes. Children may forget some of the basics you thought they knew by heart last year.

- * Walk safely. Watch the cars, do not fool around with friends at the edge of the street.
- * Ride your bike safely. Pay attention to rules of the road.
- * Obey the school crossing guard.
- * Do not go home with friends without first having permission from a parent.
- * When walking home, walk straight home.
- * Do not leave school except with permission, and do not leave with any person for any reason unless you have your parent's permission. Phone first.
- * If approached by anyone who wants to take you with them, yell, scream, and run away.

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Back to school means back to basics at home

After all the summer fun and easy-going days, parents sometimes have difficulty placing their children on a schedule for school days. It is important to establish the schedule before school actually starts, so that children are not trying to deal with too many changes at once.

Any teacher, or child development expert, will assure parents of the importance of a daily routine. A routine is predictable, and the predictability of a schedule makes a child feel safe and secure. Often, children will create a fuss that baffles adults, when the problem is that something is going on that disrupts the daily routine.

A schedule on school days helps a child achieve in school. Parents may be able to adjust to changes in bedtimes, or rising extra early in the day, but children are not as adaptable. They need to eat and sleep at regular times. The schedule gives them predictable adequate rest periods. Meals at the same time every day help their digestive systems and energy levels stay healthy.

Kindergarten children are most in need of a schedule. Well in advance of the child starting school, the parent should set a

bedtime and mealtimes that will most closely match the schedule imposed by school hours.

Good grooming habits such as brushing teeth, bathing and washing hands should be part of the

schedule. A child accustomed to a routine bath followed by bedtime will be less difficult to manage when a good night's sleep and a fresh morning appearance is required for school.



The need for friends is very strong in children, but friendship is a learned skill. Children may start with one or two young friends, and perhaps consider a pet a best friend, but when they go to school, their opportunities for making friends expands and they may need some guidance from parents about friends and friends.

Help children learn friendship

Making friends is one of the joys of going to school. Every child should be encouraged to have friends, and parents should make space in the child's life for friends. This may mean the parent will have to organize outings or join with other parents in activities such as Girl Guides or Scouts, or any number of sports, but the effort is well worth what the child learns by interacting with others.

Friendships are fragile in childhood and yet they are flexible, too. A child may come home sobbing because of a dispute with a friend, and yet, a day or a week later, all is forgiven and they are the best of buddies again.

Like everything else to do with

relationships, children need to know they do not have to sacrifice their own needs in order to have friends. They also need to know they cannot bully others and expect to have friends. A good parent will listen to a child's concerns about friendships, and will discuss feelings and disappointments with an open mind.

The most important thing a parent must do is refuse to dictate who may be a friend, unless the child is being physically abused by some other child, or is being led into vandalism or theft. Then, the harmful associates must be screened out of the child's life. In these circumstances, a parent must explain the concepts of personal standards of behaviour.



Pack a safe lunch

* Fix lunches ahead (try after dinner) and refrigerate

• Use an insulated bag with freezer pack or chilled thermos to keep food cool. Frozen juice or milk in cartons keeps food cool.

• Use a thermos and reusable plastic dishes and bottles to pack lunches instead of throw-away packaging.

• Do not reuse plastic bags - they can harbour bacteria.

• Wash lunch containers every night to keep bacteria from growing and, once a week, clean them with baking soda to rid them of odours.

A grizzly story

One of the advantages of being a valley newspaper is hearing the news from both ends of the valley, and putting facts together based on our long experience in the valley. We see something we have seen before. The picture is not pretty.

Grizzly bears are going to be "restored" to Manning Park. This scenario ignores the fact that there are no salmon in the Similkameen. Without salmon, the grizzlies must aggressively pursue the wildlife available in the area, thereby upsetting the current balance. Ask if it makes any sense.

The other issue is turning Ashnola Valley into a protected area, which would effectively close it to resource use.

Neither of these issues receives local support. Hunters and ranchers do not need the added pressure of hungry grizzlies in the valley, and Mayor J.C. Stranart of Keremeos has been vocal in his opposition to the LRMP process that was forwarded to the provincial government with environmentalists and local people unable to reach a consensus on the Ashnola Valley question. There is a concerted effort by environmentalist groups to join Manning Park and the Ashnola Valley in one big park. This is called the Cascadia project. If you think this has nothing to do with grizzlies, think about Libby, Montana, where the forest resource was shut down when grizzlies were "restored" to that area.

In 1994, residents of the Similkameen Valley joined a battle against the Cascadia project, which is a good source of income for environmentalist groups who receive funding from a foundation in Seattle. No Cascadia means the members of these groups have to make a living some other way.

We urge you to voice your objections to MLA Harry Lali, who was party to the Cascadia battle in 1994, and knows what will happen to his riding if the resource lands are shut down by environmentalists. Say 'no' to grizzlies and 'no' to the protected area plan. These are pressures from both ends to meet in the middle - the Cascadia project.

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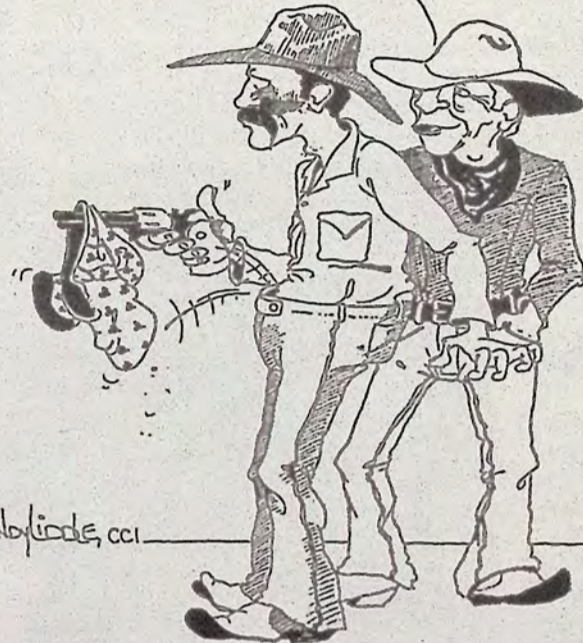

Miller's story brings memories

Dear Editor:

Your Tuesday, August 10, paper had an article titled "Bill Miller recalls Princeton businesses". The list included the name of "Doc" McCaffery. It brought back the memory to me of an incident that included him and another prominent early resident of Princeton.

Albert "Pop" Irwin raised a family of good skiers and many other kids who were to go on to Canadian and international fame in all disciplines of skiing. The Amber Ski Club was a passion of his. The name of the club was a result of repairs he made on broken skis for the kids with pieces of tin cut from the can of pipe tobacco he smoked (Amber Pipe Tobacco).

The incident was another in my growing up years on the Stenvold farm (now owned by Arnie and Diane Willis).

After school, during the week, I would walk up the river past the power plant and the Neilsen place to the ranch. It was always time to gather the cows for the evening milking by that time and "Smokey, who doubled as the farm work horse, was usually ready.

There was a pretty good collie type of dog named "Jack" when I started working a couple of years earlier, but he was old and I don't remember, he just kind of expired.

Looking back, I don't know why, but Carl brought home a Doberman to replace him. He wasn't much of a cow-dog but he loved to run with you when you were on horseback. This particular afternoon "Pa" Stenvold said

the cows were probably up at the Allenby townsite.

Now Smokey was a big, strong horse and I was a skinny kid, so you just bailed on and he would run for maybe a mile, then settle down to a nice pace.

We headed west up the field with the Doberman in hot pursuit. He ran in front and under the horse. After the dust settled, he lay there on the ground with a compound fracture to one of his legs.

Looking back, it must have been Pa Stenvold who told me to ride to town and get Doc McCaffery. (There was no such thing as a veterinarian in Princeton at that time.)

Smokey and I crossed the river and headed for town at his usual pace, and when we got to town, I saw Doc McCaffery and Pop Irwin across the street from

Ewart's Hardware, standing talking. I explained to Doc what had happened. He said he would go right out to the farm.

Pop Irwin looked at my lathered horse and said in disgust, "Kill a good horse to save a ---- damn dog."

Smokey and I made it back at a slower pace and got the cows back from Allenby in time for milking.

The Doc by this time had amputated the leg.

The story has a happy ending.

I left about a year later for greener pastures, but talking to Carl Stenvold a few years ago about the incident, he said the Doberman lived a good long life on three legs.

I don't know if he ever made a good cow dog.

I am one who shares the local trails, on horseback, with many others. These others include people on motorized off-road vehicles. In the 10 years I've been using these trails, at least 90 per cent of those dirt bike riders (and other off-road vehicle operators) have shown much common sense when they are approaching people mounted on horses.

Many of them slow, allowing their revs to drop to a level that may not alarm most horses. Others pull off the trail and turn their machines off, waiting for riders to pass. Still others leave the trail and go around. (It should be mentioned there is no reason a

horse and rider cannot leave the beaten path and get out of the way of an approaching dirt bike, we can often hear them long before they can see us.)

Some horses don't care what passes them, but others could be in for a real scare, and a serious accident could easily be the result of an unthinking or uneducated bike rider.

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Heart Food

Cancer, heart disease, multiple sclerosis. When we think of killer diseases these are some of the names that quickly come to mind. However, the truth is that there is a far more deadly killer on the loose today, and it has destroyed more lives than any of us can imagine. It's called tradition. 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Organics Plus opens market in Cawston

SIMILKAMEEN - Organics Plus, an co-op organic produce market on Main street Cawston is now open for retail customers. Manager, Tevor Evans, says that all 11 growers involved are "certified" organic according to the Canadian Food and Drug Act under the Similkameen-Okanagan Organic Producers Association (SOOPA).

Organics Plus President, Ron Schneider, says that, in 1960, direct marketing by fruit farmers was against the law. B.C. Tree Fruits used to have a monopoly on all fruit sales. He says he remembers when the RCMP used to come and tell his grandfather, Dave Schneider of Cawston, to take down his fruit sale sign. Today, many farm operations have direct sales.

Evans says, though organic fruits and vegetables sales presently account for only five per cent of the worldwide produce market, they are growing by five per cent a year. He says the Similkameen Valley has "the largest conglomeration of organic farmers" anywhere in Canada.

Doe Gregoire, Organics Plus Chairman of the Board and Vice President, says the Similkameen Valley's isolation made it an ideal region for organic growing, testing and research.

Evans says the growers created Organics Plus to merge several small farms into one large operation that could have enough supplies for an extended worldwide market. He says that before the farmers started the co-op, they would be "fighting with each other." Together, their annual sales have gone over the one million dollar mark, and are comprised of 85 per cent tree fruits, and about 15 per cent ground crops. Evans says Organics Plus is "not a closed shop," and is "welcoming organic growers to come by and take out an associate membership."

According to Evans, the Organics Plus logo, designed by

local native artist Jay Begaye, portrays the idea of Caucasians and native Indians working together to keep the Similkameen Valley environmentally sound. Lower Similkameen Indian Band Chief, Moses Louie, of Louie Organic Farms on the Chopaka Reserve, is an active co-op member.

Currently, Organics Plus sells fruits and vegetables in an open facility, but eventually they want to put in a store front for a full line of organic foods. People are welcome to drop in by the front or side doors Monday to Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and browse or buy. For product information call 499-5233.

Stranart, says that he and several other directors for the Regional District of the Okanagan Similkameen (RDOS) are frustrated by the fact that nobody really knows how much Regional District staff time is available for regional issues. He estimates that only about 10 per cent of RDOS staff time is spent on regional issues. Most of their time, he says, is allotted to electoral areas.

In 1965, The British Columbia government established regional districts to provide services to rural areas and deal with regional issues and problems. They are funded primarily by Regional District taxes, collected by the Province. The RDOS has a total of eighteen directors, and an office at 101 Martin Street, Penticton. Besides Stranart,

Regional District directors serving the Similkameen are Mayor R. McLean for Princeton, Linda Allison for Princeton Rural area "H," Roger Mayer for Keremeos Rural Hedley area "G," and Bill Bush for Cawston area "B."

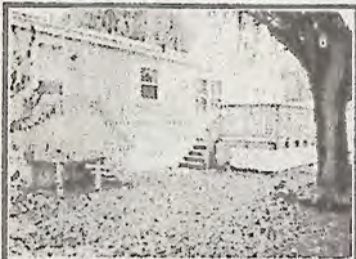

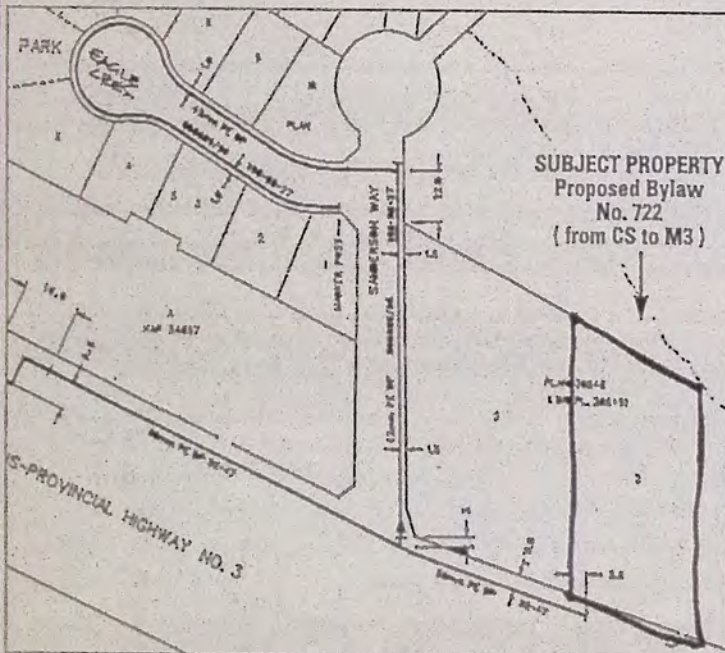

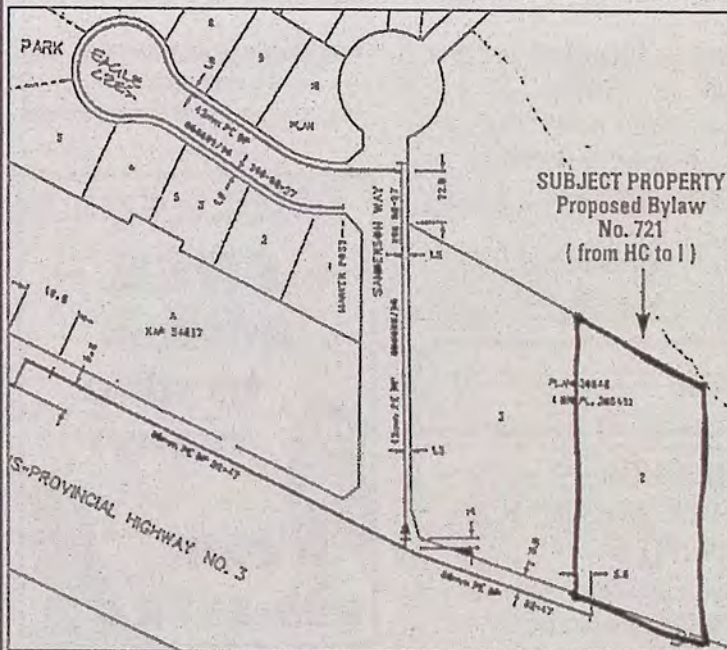

Watch for deadly dog infection

Dr. Allen Gill reports a recent mini-outbreak of canine parvovirus, based on clinical findings during the past two weeks. A litter of puppies died, and other dogs were treated for the illness.

Symptoms at the onset are acute drooling and vomiting during the first 24 hours. Then, as the disease progresses, the dog will suffer from bloody, foul-smelling diarrhea.

Dogs can die from this disease due to dehydration and damage to the heart. Treatment includes intravenous fluids and antibiotics.

This disease is preventable by vaccination. After the initial puppy vaccinations, a booster is required every year. Anyone in doubt as to whether a pet dog has been vaccinated in the past year should call the dog's doctor and check.

Dr. Gill says an outbreak of parovirus is not unusual in a dog population that has not been vaccinated for parovirus within the year.

Too much speed, says Councillor

PRINCETON - Deputy Mayor Kathleen Clement commented again on highway speeds through town. At the August 16 Town Council meeting, Clement raised the issue again of having speed reduced from the west boundary of Princeton to the east boundary. "Many people have spoken to me about how fast the traffic is going through town," Clement said.

A letter had been sent to Department of Highways, and Clement agreed to wait for a reply, but added, "We may have to make it stronger."

Shellfish disease alert

PRINCETON - Eating raw or uncooked oysters, clams and mussels could make you sick, warns Dr. Murray Fyfe, associate director of epidemiology at the BC Centre for Disease Control.

Recent warm water temperatures have resulted in higher levels of bacteria in bivalve shellfish. B.C. oysters monitored this summer have shown increased levels of a bacterium carried in shellfish. The bacterium occurs naturally in sea water but multiplies in summer months when water temperature rises. High levels of the bacterium can cause diarrhea in people who eat contaminated shellfish. The risk of illness can be reduced by thorough cooking.

Consumers can reduce the risk of illness by purchasing shellfish from approved sources. People harvesting their own shellfish should collect them as soon as the tide goes out, keep the shellfish shaded from the sun and refrigerate as soon as possible.

Weight affects bone structure

Most people are aware of the number one killer, heart disease and strokes, and their relation to obesity and diet; however, there are also many other mechanical problems resulting from increased stress on bones, joints, and tissues.

A common region susceptible to damage due to increased weight is the low back. Obesity changes the effects of gravity on the spine, especially if much of the weight is in the abdominal region. Excess weight in the abdominal area pulls the spine forward, increasing the lumbar curve and changing the normal distribution of forces in the spine. This places excess stress on the discs and posterior joints which may result in early degenerative changes.

Other areas susceptible to increased mechanical strain due to extra body weight are the joints in the lower limbs. Arthritis may be found in the feet, ankles, knees, and hips of individuals who are overweight.

Not everyone will experience such degenerative changes, but the extra weight does increase the risks.

To most effective means of limiting the effects of the increased weight is obviously to work at losing a few of those extra pounds. The safest and healthiest way of losing weight is to

gradually increase the calories burned while decreasing the calories consumed. In other words, exercise more and eat less.

Starting with a simple, regular walking routine is the best way to change from a sedentary to an active lifestyle. Be sure to start slow, perhaps only walking a short distance initially to see how the new activity is tolerated, then gradually increase the length and intensity of the exercise. Ideally, one's goal should be to raise their heart rate through exercise for 20-30 minutes, 3 - 5 times per week. Once comfortable with walking without experiencing any physical complications, look for different physical activities in order to prevent boredom with the exercise routine. With some perseverance, the extra stress on the joints in your limbs and spine will diminish as the weight is lost.

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Agreement on Ashnola Road expected September 7

SIMILKAMEEN - Lower Similkameen Indian Band (LSIB) Manager, Dixon Terbasket, says the Provincial Government and Gorman Brothers will, hopefully by September 7, have "some kind of workable road use agreement," regarding Ashnola Road, "whereby the Band doesn't feel it's being used, set aside, or stepped on." He says that the government has been biding its time, putting both Gorman Brothers and the LSIB in the position of defending their rights. But, he says, "Gorman Brothers has been bending over backwards for us," trying to get a working agreement.

In an recent interview, August 12, Terbasket said the Band wants a long term land use plan for the whole Lower Similkameen area, not just the Ashnola. He said that the LSIB would like to be involved in a similar plan to the Joe Rich 160 year plan in Kelowna that demonstrates the effect of development on culture, forests, resource values and soil.

Terbasket says the capacity funding the Federal Government recently approved for the Band will help them develop community in all areas, such as forestry, wildlife management, aboriginal interest studies, and planning for future use of the whole LSIB area, including the watersheds. He says the Provincial Government has promised to match the Federal funds.

Terbasket says, "We question the sustainability of Gorman Brothers' resource extraction. It's only a five year plan. We want to look at a long term plan with long

term projections." He says, "We have been negotiating for almost three years on all resource management issues. The Ashnola Road Issue was just a focal point, a way to develop capacity."

He asks, "When are Canadians in general going to wake up to the fact that an American Company, Weyerhaeuser, controls much of the forestry resource throughout B.C.?" He wonders when the general public is going to question the loss of so many timber profits to the United States.

Dixon says he is concerned about local jobs and recreation facilities for both native and non-native youth who live in the area. He asks, "Are we going to stand by and not do anything?" He says, "We try to get along here. We don't want to hurt our relationship with the locals. People

have to become more aware of what's happening."

Dixon says that land use is a very complex issue. He says the government wants the natives to prove they have a right to the land, but the natives don't want people to start digging up burial sites as part of finding that proof. He says there are still people living on the Lower Similkameen reserve who were alive when the B.C. Government, under Order of Council # 1036, expropriated any roads built before 1938, including Ashnola Road.

According to Terbasket, the Ministry of Transportation and Highways says the road is theirs, but the LSIB says the road belongs to the Band. Terbasket says, "We're not going anywhere. We want to have a say about the land."

Trail crews start work

Neufeld attended the August 18 meeting of Vermilion Trails Society to make local organizers aware of some of the rules the E-team must follow. The government funds the project, and Workers Compensation ensures that the E-teams are extremely safety conscious. Lead hands and sponsoring groups must follow the rules.
