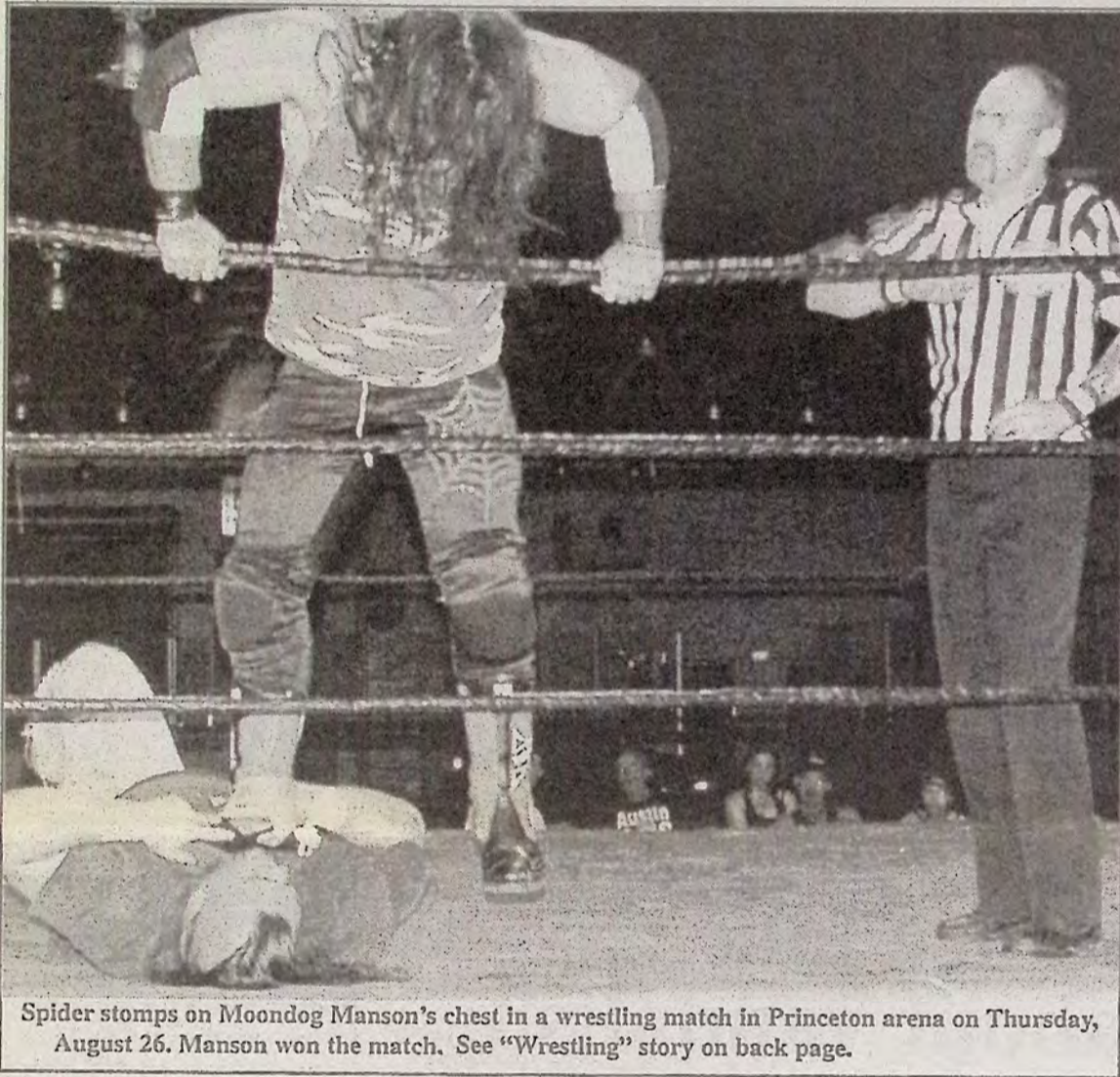


House numbers confuse residents

Rural residents in the Princeton area have been advised that the home numbers were allocated to their property. Each resident received a letter from T. Underwood Engineering advising of the new number, and asking residents with questions or comments to meet with the firm's representative on August 25.

Approximately 30 people gathered at the Community Skills Centre in Princeton, most with complaints. The Hohns, who live in the Osprey/Link Lake area did not like the fact that the new numbering system did not conform to the system they have been using for five years.

Residents in the Missezula Lake subdivision had been using a numbering system that worked for five years, and have been allo-

cated numbers which do not conform to the previous system and are actually confusing. For example, there are duplicated numbers across the road from each other, although one is 3907 Summers Creek Road and the other is 3907 Missezula Lake Road. However, an on-site inspection would show both properties have driveways on Summers Creek Road.

One Airport Road resident discovered to her dismay that she is listed as living at 218 Old Hedley Road, which would be in the opposite direction.

Some people were pleased with the numbers and felt the system clears up some problems.

Errors and points of confusion were described to the T. Underwood representative. Residents will await further information.

B.C.'s new deal

Tariff costs more

The cost of shipping softwood lumber to the United States has gone up again following the conclusion of stumpage arbitration. The arbitration began in July, 1998, when the U.S. claimed B.C.'s reduction in stumpage rates violated the five-year Canada-U.S. Softwood Lumber Agreement which became effective April 1, 1996.

The first 14.7 billion board feet of softwood lumber shipped to the U.S. was to go in without a tariff. The next 650 million board feet were subject to a tariff of \$52.93 US per thousand board feet. Now, 90 million board feet of the 360 million board feet allocated to B.C. subject to lower fee base will see and increase to \$52.93 US (\$71.55 Cdn.). Above that level, the new fee level is \$146.25 US (\$197.44 Cdn.).

The settlement will have no effect on about 98 per cent of B.C. exports covered by the

Softwood Lumber Agreement.

Under the deal, B.C. forest companies continue to benefit from the 1998 stumpage reduction.

"We're staying" says T.L. Timber

CAWSTON - On August 23, when Dave Lusted of T.L. Timber in Cawston, received a copy of the Agricultural Land Commission (ALC) minutes for the meeting at which they confirmed their original resolution that T.L. Timber must close down.

Lusted says he was shocked to discover this meeting was held on July 21, because in an August 6 News Leader interview, ALC spokesperson Ross Blackwell denied that a decision had been made on T.L. Timber, and stated the Commission was still "reviewing and considering the options available to it."

The July 21 minutes describe the Commission's refusal, for reasons of "impact and agricultural capability," of T.L. Timber's original request for retroactive approval of their a sawmill/log home building business, and the Commission's request that T.L. Timber property be "rehabilitated to its original condition in six months." The minutes explain the Commission refused a T.L. Timber application for a 3 year extension of sawmill cessation

date, so T.L. Timber could search for an alternate site, and Keremeos Village and Electoral Areas "B" and "G" could review lands suitable for industrial use.

At the same time, the Commission offered to defer enforcement of mill closing until April 30, 2000, if T.L. Timber could produce "a \$75,000 letter of credit in the Commission's favour." T.L. Timber did not pursue the letter of

credit option which expired June 1, 1999. The minutes end with the Commission's confirmation of its original July 1 shutdown resolution, and that "Commission staff consult with legal counsel and pursue the necessary steps to discontinue the unauthorized non-farm uses and to reclaim the land."

Dave Lusted says he began his mill operation with son Tom three years ago on a neighbour's piece of land that was in the ALR, because he could not make a living farming his ten acres, only half of which were arable, and, at that time, the government was

pushing for value added manufacturing.

Together with Sierra log homes from the United States, T.L. Timber purchased a lathe to produce the logs for homes. Through observing other log home operations in the Okanagan and Similkameen, T.L. Timber realized they needed visibility to promote their products. They decided to move their operation onto Dave Lusted's property, lot #12, because it had Highway 3 access.

Lusted says that when they started T.L. Timber, he did not know "you could apply for non-conforming land use." He thought once the land was frozen, it was frozen. They went ahead with the mill, based on the fact that they had observed a number of other non-conforming farm users in the area. Even fruit stands, he says, until recently, did not conform to government guidelines.

Lusted says he has never applied to have the land out of the Agricultural Land Reserve. He is

Police talk about vandalism

PRINCETON - Concern about vandalism may be justified, but local police see it as much a community problem as a policing problem.

There are seven constables at Princeton detachment, including administrative staff. They must police Manning Park, Tulameen, Coalmont, Princeton, Osprey Lake area, Highway 5A, Missezula Lake and Hedley, and all points in between. Vandalism does not occur in front of police, or when there is a police vehicle cruising the neighbourhood.

Local police do not accuse "kids" of doing all of the vandalism. They regret that all young people are tarred with the same brush when vandalism occurs. Vandalism could be done by an adult who feels angry and vengeful, and who may have had too much to drink.

Vandals cannot be apprehended without adequate evidence, and an eyewitness report is the best evidence. Police would like people to watch and phone when vandalism is in progress, and to remember when suspicious activity occurs.

Vandalism affects the whole community, and everybody pays.

Cst. Chris Newell believes a Citizens on Patrol group would be a good way to prevent vandalism. The way things are now, the victim of vandalism pays the cost, but if a vandal can be convicted, based on a witness' testimony, then the vandal will pay the cost.

If you witness vandalism, or see something like spray paint on a person's hands or clothes indicating possible involvement in vandalism, the number to call is 295-6911 or Crimestoppers at 1-800-337-8477.

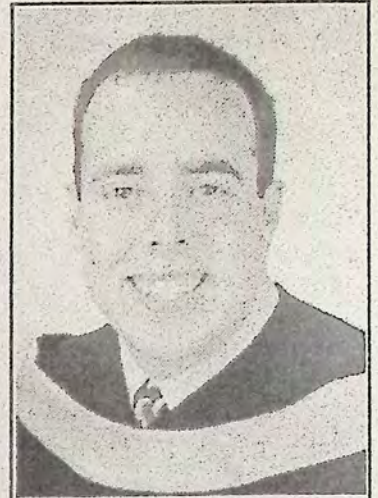

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Rosemary Doughty: a good reason for shaving her head

Rosemary Doughty will have her head shaved at 4:00 p.m. Saturday, September 15, at the Overwaitea in Princeton as part of the Cops for Cancer fundraiser. She is not a police officer, but she supports what they are doing because she has a special personal reason for having her head shaved.

"I have a sense of pride in being able to participate in this program," Doughty says. "It's meaningful for me."

Doughty is one of five daughters born to Sheila Doughty in Ontario. Sheila is a survivor of breast cancer. She is also a carrier of a mutated gene vulnerable to cancer.

Two of Rosemary's sisters died of breast cancer, Jean James, in Ontario, was first to go in 1992. She was 43 years old, the mother of two sons age 18 and 20. Geri Hibbard, of Saskatchewan, died in 1998. She was also 43 years old, and the mother of sons age 18 and 20. The day Rosemary has her head shaved is exactly one year (almost to the hour) from the day Geri died.

Rosemary and her sisters have gone through a struggle trying to identify who carries the gene leading to breast cancer. Her sister, Geri, and her mother were genetically tested by Myriad Labs of Salt Lake City, Utah, to identify the faulty gene. The first test cost \$3,000 U.S. All other members of the family paid \$350 U.S. for the test. The government would not cover the cost, although the government was willing to cover the cost of radical mastectomies (\$25,000) and hysterectomies for high-risk women who wanted surgery as a preventative measure against breast cancer.

The reason they went to an American lab was because results came two weeks after blood samples arrived at the laboratory. If they had gone through the Canadian Cancer Society, they would have had to wait two years to find out if they were carrying

the gene.

Rosemary's sister, Fiona, sued the Ontario government for refusing to cover the cost of the tests. The Globe and Mail newspaper

shaved when her sisters lost their hair. She is going to do it now to honour the memory of her sisters and because she believes it might help her understand how people

did a story on the family, and public response was immediate and astounding. People sent money to help others receive the testing. A foundation was established for that purpose.

Rosemary, Fiona and Linda do not carry the gene.

As her sisters went through chemotherapy, Rosemary watched as their hair fell out and their appearance altered. She remembers a time when she thought of having her head

feel when their hair is gone. As well, she wants to help raise money for cancer research, to help those who now suffer from the disease.

"I know my hair will grow back very rapidly, and I have this choice, but people fighting cancer don't have a choice."

RCMP personnel who are planning to have their heads shaved will be carrying pledge forms around town. They are looking for your support.

OUR VIEW

Here we go again!

The spectacle of British Columbia politics is a never-ending show of outrageous conduct and incredible uproar, both from the politicians involved and the major media. Our government is always fair game for criticism, and nobody hesitates when the time comes to lay blame. Individual politicians must be extremely careful in their conduct or they become individual targets for criticism.

During the past decade, we have seen three British Columbia Premiers forced to resign, beginning with Bill Vander Zalm. The major media certainly exposed his deals and has continued to scrutinize every politician with a magnifying glass to see if there is a juicy story in what they find. This is the way it is done, and it is not new.

British Columbia has had a remarkable history of colourful politicians who raised eyebrows across Canada. Our first was Amor de Cosimos, whose name means "lover of the universe." This was the unlikely name he chose, and it was the subject of media derision in Victoria over one hundred years ago. De Cosimos may have set the trend for our political ambience, because it certainly has not changed much.

We went from one political party to another, becoming increasingly polarized. Today, we are not really polarized, just confused. The Liberal Party of British Columbia could make no headway until the defeated Socred politicians swelled the ranks. The Reform Party made a good stand in the last election, but appear to have fizzled out. The only political party we know and understand is the New Democratic Party, and they are not nearly as socialist as they were in the past. Under Premier Glen Clark, they often seemed conservative.

Now we have Premier Dan Miller, and the prospect of another election to give somebody the mandate to govern, and the only thing of which we can be certain is this: whatever happens, it will cost us money.

Hart questions Transport Minister

Dear Minister Collenette;

As you are aware, a mid-air collision between two airplanes at the Penticton Regional Airport on Friday, August 20, resulted in 5 fatalities.

On Monday, August 23, 1999, the Transportation Safety Board said that there was no evidence that mechanical failure caused the accident. As a result, they will not be pursuing this as a factor in the crash. One of the possible factors being considered though is the elimination of air traffic controllers at the Penticton airport four years ago.

When your government decided

to remove Air Traffic Control, I raised a number of concerns with former Minister of Transport, David Anderson. Foremost, I was concerned that removing Air Traffic Control in a mountainous valley would increase the likelihood of mid-air collisions because pilots are forced to rely on vision only to determine where local air traffic is located.

While the Transportation Safety Board's final decision on the cause of Friday's tragic accident may be some time away, I urge the government to commit to putting the safety concerns of Canadians first. If the lack of Air

Traffic Control were found to be a factor, I would expect that the government would commit to the return of air traffic controllers to the Penticton airport.

In the meantime, I would like to obtain a breakdown of the cost savings resulting from the elimination of air traffic controllers from the Penticton airport. In 1994, this was forecasted to be \$400,000 annually. From my understanding, as a number of employees were relocated, no jobs were lost due the removal of Air Traffic Control. Therefore, I would like to see where precisely the forecasted savings were realized.

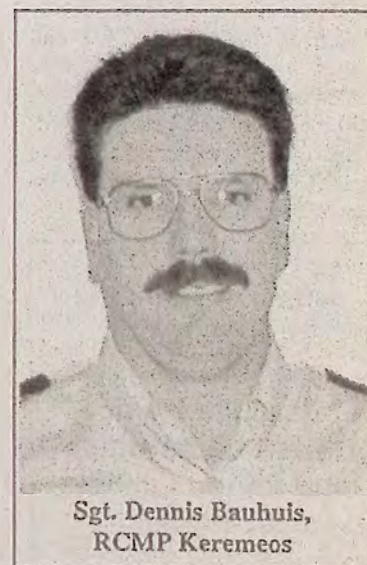

looking for a special use permit, similar to the the permits given in recent years to the new Lower Similkameen Health Centre in Keremeos, and a boarding kennel in Cawston. According to Lusted, recent soil tests have proven the mill operation is not harming the soil.

Lusted says he did attempt to find an alternate site, as the ALC requested, but the Department of Highways property offered was too small, and did not have year round road access. A local realtor had not been able to find any suitable property, although Princeton Economic Committee offered land, T.L. Timber did not want to

move the operation to Princeton. The company wanted to create opportunities for gainful employment in the South Similkameen. T.L. Timber has had as many as 18 employees, not including the bush crew.

Lusted says that, compared with the Okanagan, the Similkameen has been neglected when it comes to allowing industrial land use.

On August 24, Keremeos Village C.A.O. Eileen Oliver Bauer said that ALC staff has been working on mapping land in Keremeos, Cawston and Hedley areas that consistently shows poor agricultural potential and might be suitable for light industrial develop-

ment. The Commission recently supplied Oliver-Bauer with maps and information for her to study. Oliver-Bauer says, after her preliminary study, she will meet with Keremeos Council and Areas "B" and "G" to review it. She says she had aimed for the end of December to have the project completed, but it's not clear whether it will be done by then.

Dave Lusted and son Tom, owner of T.L. Timber, are exploring their legal options.

Dave says, "We'll keep going, and then we'll see what the ALC's next move is. At that time, we'll have to file another appeal. We aren't going to go away."

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Be "bear aware" now

The entire Similkameen watershed is home to black bears. Generally, the bears avoid residential areas, but there have been many incidents through the years in which bears were aggressive in seeking food in yards and homes. Rural area residences, and in-town residences near hillsides and rivers, should avoid attracting bears.

The Ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks sent a reminder to the public to be "Bear aware" and take precautions to discourage bears from homes and campsites. Autumn is the season for bear encounters in our local area as bears try to store enough fat to hold them over the winter.

To avoid confrontations between bears and humans, now is the time to practise special care in orchards and backyards. Odours from human food, fallen fruit, improperly stored garbage, dirty barbecue grills and unprotected composts are all irresistible magnets for bears, who have an excellent sense of smell. Most bears will overcome any natural fears if the promise of food is strong enough.

Here are some suggestions on how to bear-proof your home and

- property:
- store garbage indoors until collected
 - protect beehives, compost, livestock and fruit trees with electric fencing
 - secure compost bins and other potential food sources in airtight containers
 - wash barbecue grills after use.

Conservation officers have the right to order homeowners to remove or contain compost, food waste or domestic garbage that

 - do not put meat, fish or animal parts in compost bins
 - do not throw cooking oil or grease outside
 - create breaks along natural pathways by thinning out trees.
- Bears are especially dangerous if they are defending a food source,

may attract wildlife. Hunters are reminded to take extra precautions while dressing their meat and when returning to a kill site to pack up meat. Bears will find freshly killed game and are not shy about claiming it. If approached by a bear at a kill site, hunters should abandon the meat and back away from the bear, and then report the incident to a conservation officer.

sugar and obesity, kidney stone, osteoporosis, heart disease and dental cavities.

According to the U.S. dept. of Agriculture, people consuming 2000 calories per day should eat no more than 10 teaspoons of added sugar. However, the average American eats 20 teaspoons of sugar per day. Soft Drinks, which contain about nine teaspoons of sugar per 12 oz. can, are a leading contributor to increased sugar consumption. The per capita consumption of pop has doubled since 1974.

The main problem is that this extra sugar - mainly coming from junk foods such as soft drinks, cakes, and cookies - squeezes healthier foods out of the diet.

The experts warn that pop may

be contributing to osteoporosis because many teenage girls and young women drink pop instead of calcium-rich beverages.

With all the focus on fats in the diet, sugar is often overlooked. People must begin limiting sweets in the diet to attempt to reduce the very high levels of sugar we are eating. Next time you are thirsty, try water with a slice of lemon instead of a soft drink. Your thirst will be better quenched and you won't be eating those 9 teaspoons of sugar.

Teach children bicycle safety

Thanks goes out to Cst. Bryce Petersen, South Okanagan Highway Patrol, for this article.

A bicycle is subject to the same traffic rules as are automobiles. Riders must obey stop signs, signal turns, ride only on the right side of the roadway and display lights when riding at night. These are just a few examples of good cycling practice each parent should ensure their child knows. Accidents involving bicycles that

cause injury or damage in excess of \$25.00 must be reported to police.

There are also a number of rules that govern passengers and equipment. A bicycle may carry one passenger for each seat, but not more. There must be a red light and a red reflector at the rear of the bicycle.

The operator of a cycle must also wear an approved bicycle helmet.

Bicycles must not be ridden on the sidewalk or in a crosswalk. The rider must sit on the seat and keep both hands on the handlebars. When riding in a group, ride single file and as close to the right side of the roadway as is practicable. If riding in darkness, a bicycle must have lights, just like a motor vehicle. Riders must obey all traffic lights and signs, just like a motor vehicle driver.

Bicycle riders who break the rules may be issued a ticket just like the driver of a car. The tickets are even the same price - expensive! A judge may also order a bicycle impounded for a period of time for violations.

Obey school zone rules

Schools are opening again next week, and children will be thinking about the warm weather and fun they had all summer.

Schools have been dormant all summer, and will suddenly become very busy places. It is time to remember that school zone signs mean "exercise caution at all times" and sometimes at a speed of 30 km/h.

School zones are in effect every school day from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. When the sign displays a tab showing 30 or 30 km/h or a white background, drivers must not

exceed that speed when approaching or passing the school zone. Please slow down to avoid an accident with children using the highway.

Children are impulsive and will run out onto the roadway without thinking. Their peripheral vision is not well-developed like that of adults. You may see them, but they really may not see you, so take care around schools.

Construction starts on Keremeos riparian park

KEREMEOS - Before deciding, at a special meeting August 24, to award the public tender for Riparian Park soil placement and pathway development to local contractor, Dutchies Transfer, Keremeos Council discussed why there was a need to improve the soil, and why one year old cow manure, rather than fresh, had to be used.

Chief Administrative Officer Eileen Oliver-Bauer explained that the soil needed to be improved because it has been damaged over time by levelling. Council discussed the fact that fresh manure, as it decomposes could damage plants, but year old manure should not, will be more pleasant to work with, and will still benefit the plants next year.

By September 30, the soil must be placed along the dike's lower slope, and approximately 1,000 feet of pathways must be built, leaving time for volunteers to

plant some of the already potted samples of flora and fauna that can grow successfully in the area. More will be purchased and planted next spring. Council can apply for a Provincial grant to cover 50% of the contractor's fee, just under \$24,000.

Keremeos Council awarded local contractor, Dutchies Transfer, the tender for Similkameen River dike repairs, consisting of riprap retrieval and replacement, and riprap placement. Council normally budgets \$5,000 a year for dike repair, but this year, because of high water damage, it will amend its budget, to pay the almost \$13,000 required to complete the work. Dike repairs can only be done between September 7 and 30, due to fish habitat concerns. To defray costs, Council has applied for a \$5,320 grant through the Provincial "Disaster Financial Assistance Program (PEP).
