

# Knife heist: Mohawk again

For the second time this month, Princeton Mohawk was hit with a knife-point robbery.

Just before 9:00 p.m. Saturday, September 11, a male and female wearing masks partially covering their faces walked into Princeton Mohawk carrying knives. They demanded money from the two clerks working at the time.

The robbers were given a small amount of cash and they then fled in a blue vehicle similar to a newer Honda Civic. They trav-

elled eastbound on Highway 3. A surveillance camera in the Mohawk customer service area captured the culprits on film.

In the matter of the September 1 knife-point robbery at Princeton Mohawk, charges are pending against a 42-year-old Princeton resident.

# Year 2000 timber supply review begins

MERRITT - The public is invited to comment on the timber supply review information report and data package for the Merritt timber supply area released September 9 by British Columbia's chief forester, Larry Pederson.

In December, 1998, Merritt timber supply area's allowable annual cut was temporarily increased from 1.45 million cubic metres to two million cubic metres per year to allow for the emergency harvest of timber damaged by wild-fire and timber infested with mountain pine beetle.

As there is only a short time in which to salvage the timber burnt by the Tulameen fire, and to control the mountain pine beetle outbreak, the increase is in effect only until the end of 2000. By that time, this timber supply review will have been completed and a new allowable annual cut will be set by the chief forester.

The most recent release of the information and data package marks the start of the new timber supply review for Merritt timber supply area. The information report summarizes technical information and management practices found in the corresponding data package, on which the upcoming analysis report will be based.

"It is an important part of the timber supply review process that the public and stakeholders have an opportunity to examine and comment on the factors upon which the upcoming review will be based," Pederson said.

Public input on the Merritt tim-

ber supply area information report and data package will be accepted until October 12.

The timber supply area covers 1.2 million hectares in British Columbia and includes the cities of Merritt and Princeton. Before the 1998 temporary increase, the previous allowable annual cut for the Merritt timber supply area was 1.45 million cubic metres, beginning in 1996.

During year 2000, as part of the Merritt timber supply review, a timber supply analysis report will be released for public review and comment. Following that, a summary of public input and the chief forester's allowable annual cut decision will be released.

## FIRE AT LIQUOR STORE

At approximately 10:30 Friday morning, Princeton Volunteer Fire Department was called to fight a fire at the liquor store parking lot. The fire started when equipment used to heat tar for an asphalt roofing project caught fire and blew up, spreading fire through nearby tar supplies. Flames set the building's wooden railings and stair canopy on fire on the radio station landing and set fire to trees and bushes on the hillside to the rear of the parking lot. The fire was soon doused. Nobody was injured.

# Traffic concerns Councillor

PRINCETON - The Ministry of Transportation and Highways feels the speed on Highway 3 west of town is appropriate for the highway.

Councillor Kathleen Clement requested a letter be sent to Highways Department regarding speeds within Town boundaries, with special attention to the area at the west Town boundary. In this area, part of the three lane highway collapsed, reducing the number of lanes to two by closing an uphill lane for faster traffic. In the same area, from the west, four lanes abruptly narrow to two lanes, and the speed drops from 100 km/h to 80km/h and the steep downhill slope begins. near the bottom of the hill, the speed into town further drops to 60km/h. Clement has argued that the speed should drop to 60 km/h as vehicles enter the west end of town, before they start down the hill.

"I'm very disappointed," Councillor Clement said. "I don't understand his remarks regarding people being able to judge the speed. Nobody obeys the speed limit."

Councillor Clement expressed a personal experience of returning from the coast four times this summer, and finding the speed of vehicles coming into town is too

fast for safety. She noted the difficulty of making a left turn from Highway 3, particularly as there is no left turn lane.

Council decided to refer the matter to RCMP for comment.

Following the meeting, during Question Period, there was a great deal of discussion about the volume of traffic this summer, and the speeds. Nobody had any confirmed information about traffic volume, but the impression was that volumes had been up substantially during August.

Highways area manager Bill Coates says electronic traffic

counts were done this summer, but will not be available until later this fall.

One person, who is out on the highway as part of his employment, said he believed traffic volume was higher, and noted the traffic through town seemed to be going faster than in previous years.

Referring to the letter from Highways Department, she told the person who had commented, "I guess we'll have to wait until enough citizens complain before the Highways Department agrees with us."

## Council plans grandstand roof repair

PRINCETON - Town Council has no money budgetted to repair the grandstand roof, but it must be done. Council will call for tenders to meet the engineer's recommendations for repair.

Money for the project will come from monies set aside for maintenance of the fair grounds, and from other monies not yet used and not top priority. Council will look to Princeton Exhibition Association for approximately \$10,000.

If the combined total is still not enough to do the job, Council will appeal to other community groups to co-operate in fundraising for the project.

Administrator Cornie Froese told Council the work must be done soon, as there is dry rot in some uprights and leaks in the roof. He told them it was a question of public safety. If the work was not done, the grandstand would have to be shut down.

## Head shave Wednesday

Police will ride bicycles into Princeton and arrive in time for a professional scalping.

He was ordered to report to RCMP weekly, and to the probation officer for a pre-sentence report, pending the court receiving information on his Ontario charges.

On September 9, when Duchon did not appear, the court learned he had not been reporting, and had not had contact with his lawyer.

Judge B. Granmary ordered a warrant be issued for Duchon's arrest.

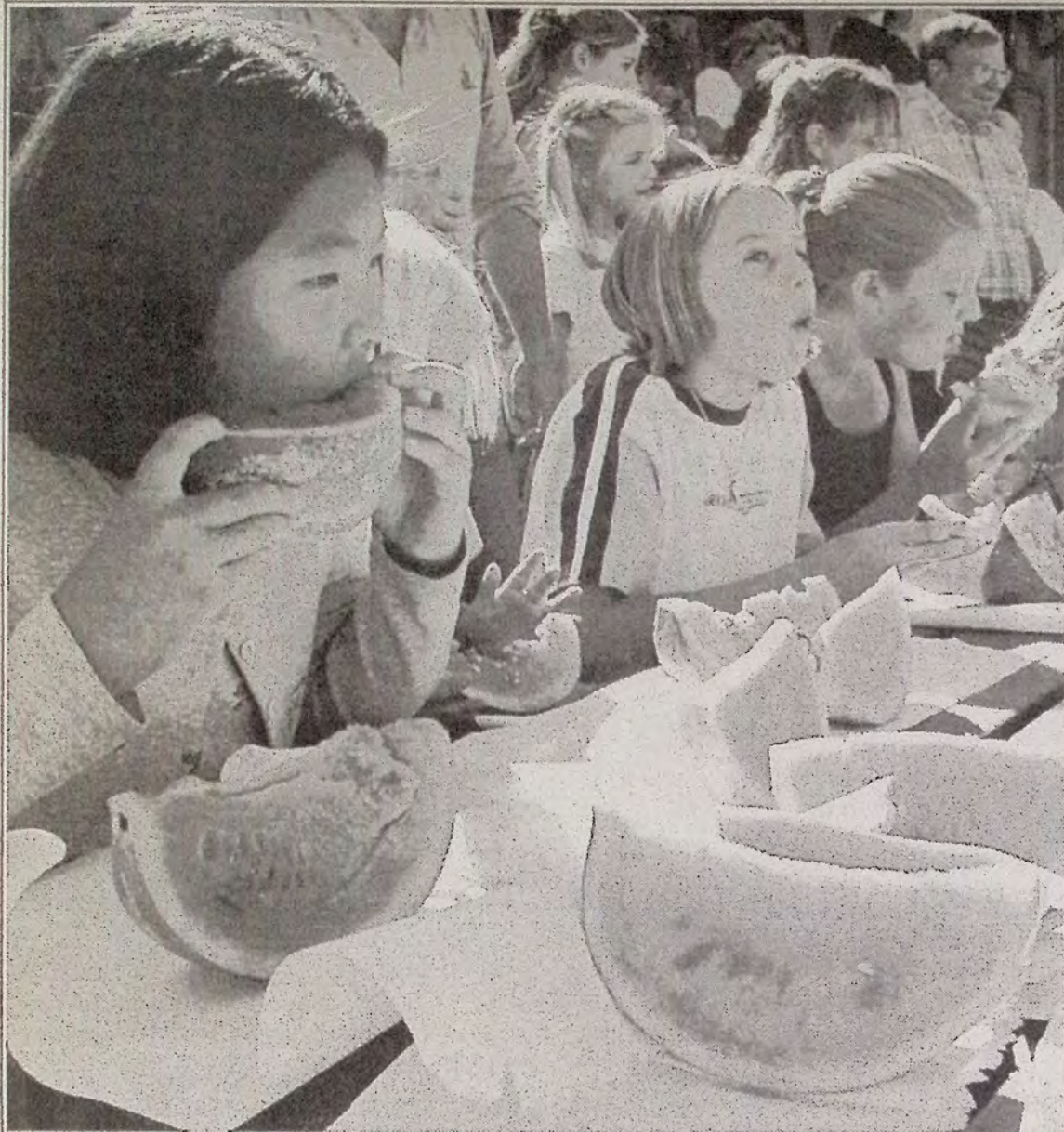

PRINCETON - In 1949, 26 year old rancher, Dick Trehearne, asked Bill Shopshire to feed his cattle during January and February. Dick was going to the University of British Columbia to take a course in practical agriculture. Bill figured Dick was going to the coast to look for a wife, and told Dick not to waste any time while he was down there.

Dick took his advice. He fell for the course instructor.

At age 24, Maggie was a Vancouverite with a Bachelor of Science in Agriculture. She was on the staff of the Dominion Provincial Youth Program, training young people age 16 to 30 the practical skills required in agriculture.

## Assessing the risk of osteoporosis

PRINCETON - On September 22 and 23, 1999, Pharmasave Princeton is sponsoring an Osteoporosis Awareness Clinic in an effort to help the public become more knowledgeable about osteoporosis with and emphasis on the importance of prevention. As a feature of the clinic, BMD Osteoporosis Outreach Services Inc. will provide heel ultrasound testing in conjunction with a private one-on-one consultation with a pharmacist.

"If people discover they are in a moderate or high risk category for fracture, they may be able to take preventative action," says Outreach Program Co-ordinator, Phyllis Edwards.

Recent studies show that quantitative ultrasound measures bone quality and predicts hip fractures as accurately as DEXA, a low-level x-ray system that measures mineral concentration in bones.

"We are using an Achilles+ Ultrasonometer, the model that has been used in the major world-wide trials," says Edwards. "The machine uses two ultrasound measurements to derive a person's score, which increases its accuracy over older models. With women, their score is compared to a control group whose peak bone mass and bone loss progression have been charged. With men, there is not as much data

available, but we can compare their score to peak bone mass."

The data collected through Osteoporosis Outreach Services will be maintained for future reference and research.

Osteoporosis is a huge problem. One in six women over the age of fifty will suffer a broken hip in her lifetime, and 17-25% of those women will die within one year. Men over 50 are affected half as often as women. With increased

awareness of what causes and what can prevent bone loss, people can work with their physicians to reduce the risk of fragility fractures and the associated health implications.

## Youth and Alcohol: prevention

SIMILKAMEEN - Alcohol is one of the most dangerous drugs in our society, yet many times I have heard parents say, "yes, he was drinking but thank goodness he didn't do drugs!"

### What a statement!

Alcohol is most definitely a drug - it is a poison and when ingested, kills brain cells.

Adolescence - that transition between child and young adult - is an exciting time for youth and, as we are all aware, a time of risk-taking and experimentation. Unfortunately this risk-taking all too often ends in tragedy - how too frequently we see deaths through car accidents which involve alcohol.

Drinking alcohol is legal and seen by many as a social pastime - it is illegal under the age of 19 yet by 19 years of age some adolescents have become alcoholics. Kids typically (as shown by surveys) start to use alcohol around age 13, long before their minds and bodies are mature enough to handle the effects of a powerful drug. Alcohol also affects males and females differently - females because of lower body weight and less water in their bodies than men, become intoxicated more quickly. Research shows the earli-

er kids start drinking, the more likely they will develop a problem with alcohol or other drugs in their lives.

Once kids start drinking, the world becomes a dangerous place - girls are often forced into unwanted sex, which can lead to pregnancy or sexually transmitted diseases. Boys fight and commit acts of vandalism. School grades plus attendance suffers to the point where kids often drop out of school.

Alcohol acts as a depressant. Short term effects of alcohol include memory loss, poor judgement co-ordination, altered perception and emotions. Long term effects include loss of appetite, vitamin deficiency, liver damage, heart and central nervous system damage.

Here are some tips to prevent your kids from drinking:

- talk openly about alcohol use
- be responsible yourself in your use of alcohol - show that alcohol is NOT necessary for fun
- check out where your child is attending a party - will the parent be there? - are they allowed alcohol?
- give your child some skills to get out of dangerous situations "Sorry, I'm allergic to alcohol"
- make a deal that they can call

you if things are out of hand, and you will pick them up, no questions asked

- encourage the use of a buddy system to keep each other safe

Our children are important. They are our future. Be an informed parent and keep them safe.

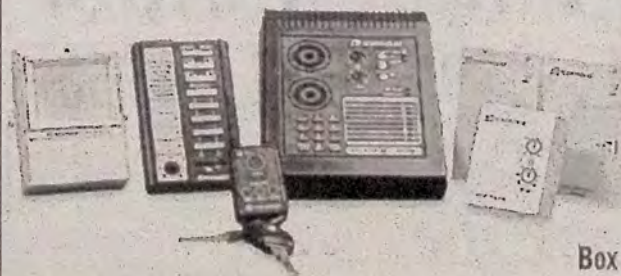

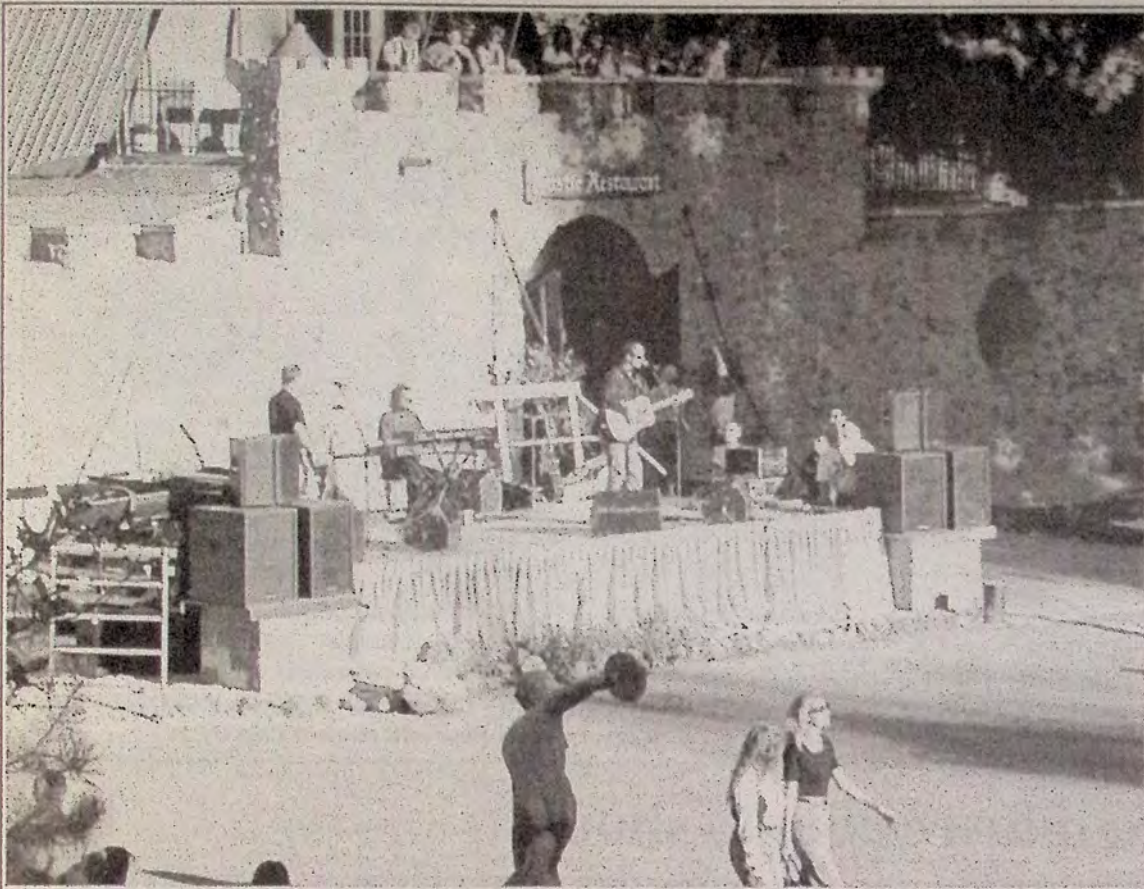

## Council vetoes air lines

**KEREMEOS** - At its September 7 meeting, Keremeos Council declined West Kootenay Power's request to construct a new three phase overhead power line along 8th Street to the dyke, and across the Similkameen River. In a letter to Council, West Kootenay Power (WKP) stated an up-grade to the existing power line is required "due to increased demands caused by residential growth on the south side of the Similkameen River."

WKP said "the most practical route" would be a new river crossing at the end of 8th Street, and added, "this would be the most feasible and economical for all concerned." The power company said they had "surveyed other areas along the river for

possible crossing options," but the river's width at other sites had prohibited "a suitable choice."

Council decided they did not want to have electrical wires going over the Riparian Park now under construction. Council By-Law No. 470, 1993, states "where there is no existing overhead service, all new service is required to be underground."

In her report to Council, Chief Administrative Officer Eileen Oliver-Bauer said she and Public Works Foreman Bob Stanley had reviewed the WKP request.

She said, "Staff does not support any additional overhead service wires or pole placements in the Village of Keremeos."

Council asked Oliver-Bauer to work out a new arrangement with WKP.

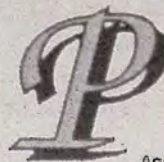

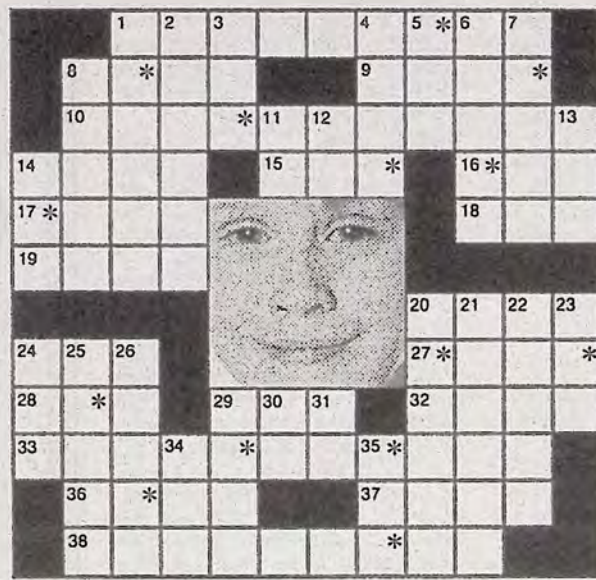

# Are hunters endangering wildlife in B.C.?

Listening to all the "doom and gloom" about the environment, I'll bet you're convinced that BC wildlife is endangered. Right? Particularly big game species -- like moose and elk -- that are vulnerable to hunting.

Wrong. Many species -- even big game -- have thrived over the 20th century. If you live in or near Vancouver, you can't miss the parks littered with geese. Do you think they're threatened? If you live anywhere in BC, you're aware of the increasing numbers of bears, cougars and beavers over the past few years.

Wildlife is thriving in BC even though the human population has skyrocketed. In 1870, the population of BC was estimated at 10,000; today, our population is over 4 million. According to the "ecological doomsters," who see people as the main problem for the environment, BC wildlife should be close to extinction.

There is no ecological catastrophe looming over BC just because the human population is increasing. People, it turns out, can act wisely. However, we must continue to manage BC wildlife properly if we want this success story to continue. Unfortunately, recent government cut-backs in the Wildlife Branch imperil this success.

Wildlife populations are thriving all across North America. It all started before World War I when U.S. President Teddy Roosevelt and Canadian Prime Minister Wilfred Laurier got together to introduce rational hunting laws.

We should be proud of the current system of wildlife management and we should tell the world about it. It works for both people and wildlife.



Hunting season has begun. Do hunters endanger wildlife balance? B.C. Wildlife Federation says "No".

This system involves the following principles: [a] wildlife is the property of the Crown, which is responsible for maintaining healthy wildlife populations, [b] hunting is strictly regulated, and [c] the public can harvest "surplus" wildlife, thus providing an incentive for public support of conservation. Unfortunately, the past few BC governments, have not upheld their part of this bargain by failing to provide adequate funding for wildlife management. Government doesn't need further legal powers, like the Endangered Species Act, it just needs to honor its previous commitments.

Hunters play an important part in making this system work. Not only do their license fees pay for wildlife management, but also what they spend on hunting trips injects badly needed cash into the Canadian economy -- particularly small rural communities.

Canadian hunters spend approximately one billion dollars annually on hunting trips.

Most importantly, Canadian hunters volunteer their time and donate their money to conserve vital wildlife habitat. Groups like Ducks Unlimited purchase habitat to provide badly needed places for wildlife to thrive. Gun club volunteers raise and release salmon into BC rivers. BC Wildlife Federation volunteers help the badly underfunded Conservation Officers to enforce the wildlife regulations.

We don't need a Draconian new law to protect the environment, we just need to adequately fund wildlife management. In times when government has cut back on programs and services, hunters and anglers have picked up the slack.

### Traditional education: is it the best education?

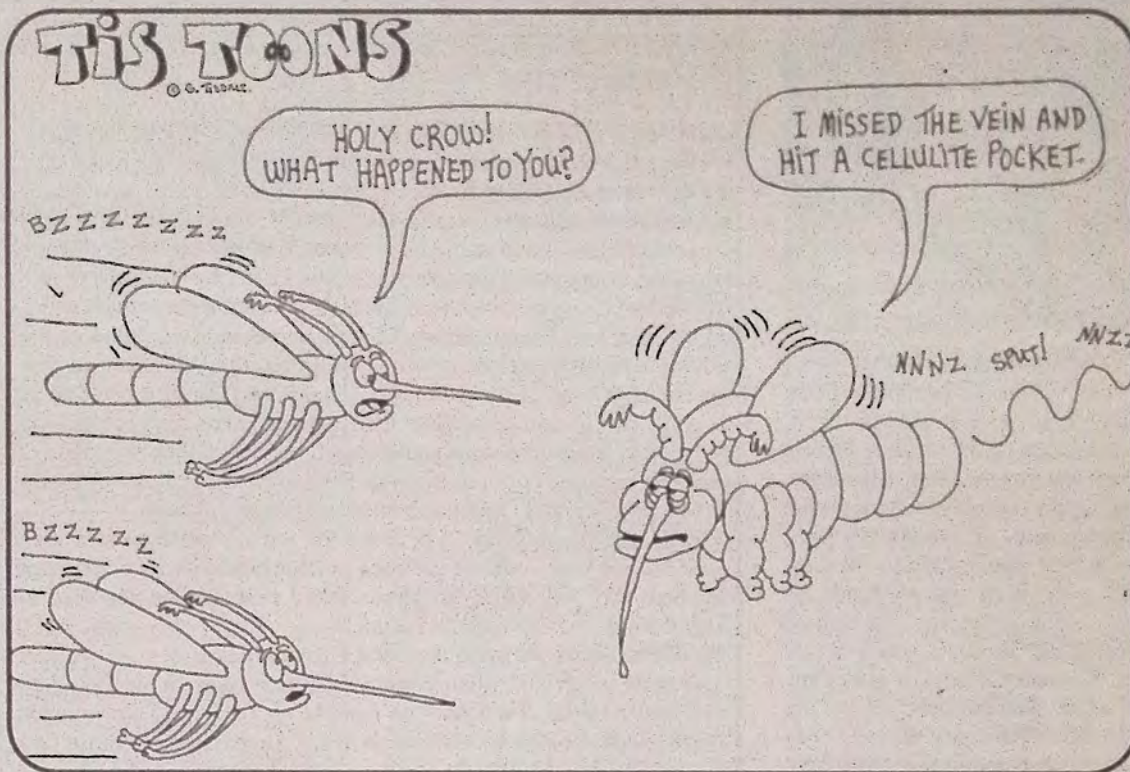

**We can stop rust buckets**

The present dilemma faced by Canada regarding the smuggling of Chinese in rust bucket ships across the Pacific reminds me of my first meeting with an immigrant following World War 2, in the late 1940s.

I was asked by a fellow worker if I would befriend a young man he sponsored from Japan who would be employed with us. I looked forward to meeting him and getting him acquainted with friends and the country.

To my surprise, when he arrived he was not a Japanese native but caucasian and spoke perfect English with a deep southern drawl. He, his brother, mother and father were interned in Japan in a camp during the entire war. Upon U.S. military occupation, a U.S. division of black soldiers operating a transport motor pool took him in as their 16 year old interpreter and mascot because of his knowledge of the language, country and girls. That is where he got his southern drawl. Because of his association with the U.S. troops, he very much wanted to see the United States, so one evening we headed for Bellingham, Washington, making sure to tell the U.S. customs that my friend "Guido" was not a Canadian citizen. The officer asked us to park the car and come into their office. There, they cautiously questioned Guido about his background. Guido's father ran a British import-export firm prior to the war. His father was Italian, his mother was English, and Guido was born in Shanghai, China.

Finally, the officer said, "We could let you in, but there is a very good chance you wouldn't get back and because you're a citizen of nowhere and your father is Italian, you'd probably be deported to Italy even if you can't speak Italian."

Needless to say, we made a quick U-turn home.

The point here is: it's their country and their rules. So it should be with us in Canada: we just can't invite all the world's problems. There is a fine balance between showing compassion for those taking the risk crossing the Pacific in rust buckets and, as the Chinese have stated, making an invitation for others to follow.


Are we feeding a crime syndicate which means we will need more police officers that already are understaffed and underpaid. One wonders why they couldn't be immediately returned to the affluent state of Hong Kong (part of China) and let them follow the regular immigration procedures.

If we are going to follow the same procedures of meeting these boats and taking them in, why not send our fast ferries right to China to pick them up, process them on the way over and release them. Firstly, at \$30,000 to \$50,000 per ticket for 100 people, that would translate into \$3-5 million per trip. Secondly, the savings of accommodation and transportation. At least, that way, the fast ferries would soon be paid off and the risk of the Chinese drowning in the rust buckets would end.

## Council okays new park

Princeton Recreation Commission has asked Town Council to investigate whether there is an opportunity to create a riverside park at the junction of Tulameen and Similkameen Rivers.
