

Lali brings grant for museum wing

• Pollard's legacy stays in Princeton

PRINCETON - The Pollard Wing is one step closer to reality with the \$40,829 grant MLA Harry Lali announced September 15.

A group gathered at the museum for the official announcement. Mr. Lali toured the museum, talking with museum members and congratulating them on their excellent application for the British Columbia 2000 Community Spirit grant.

Mr. Lali described the Pollard Wing project as worthwhile to Princeton.

"This prestigious collection will be a significant addition to the museum," said Lali.

Shirley Pollard, widow of fossil collector Joe Pollard, was a special guest at the museum to acknowledge the grant announce-

ment. On the death of her husband, Shirley Pollard expressed a desire to give his outstanding collection to Princeton's museum if it could be suitably housed and displayed for public appreciation. The museum wanted the collection, but did not have sufficient space.

Since Pollard's death, persons and institutions eager to own the collection have appealed to Shirley Pollard to give or sell the collection. She has refused, hoping to see the Pollard Wing added to the existing museum building.

Another development in the spring of 1998 added impetus to the need to capitalize on Princeton's fossil riches. When Tulameen Road collapsed near

Couple charged in armed robbery

PRINCETON - RCMP from the Princeton Detachment arrested Princeton residents Harry Elmer Buttimer, age 42, and his common-law wife, Angela Marie Markowsky, regarding the September 1 and September 11 knife-point robberies at Mohawk Princeton.

Buttimer was charged with armed robbery, two counts, for

both robberies, and one count of assault with a knife. Markowsky was charged with one count of armed robbery.

Both appeared in provincial court in Penticton on September 16, and were remanded in custody to appear again on September 20.

Persons convicted of armed robbery face a life imprisonment penalty.

Fall Fair hits record attendance

PRINCETON - Fall Fair President Bert Blanchette reports record attendance at the September 11 and 12 Fall Agricultural Fair. Although exhibits were down in some areas, and Little Britches Rodeo cancelled at the last minute, there was something for everyone.

Blanchette says the midway operator, Wagner Shows, was disappointed in the number who went on rides, and the operator told Blanchette the midway would not come back to Princeton next year if there was no Little Britches rodeo. It is the youngsters on the rides who pay midway expenses.

Blanchette wants to make some changes in the location of the entertainers at next year's fair. He would like the stage to be located east of the grandstand where there is room for seating and the sound

system does not interfere with vendors. The problem with moving the stage is the lack of power at the east location. The fair grounds have reached the maximum output possible with existing electrical equipment, and better electrical service would cost more than the fair association or the grounds management association can afford.

The Year 2000 Fall Fair will be the setting for the celebration of Princeton's 140th anniversary since being named Princeton. In 1860, Governor James Douglas changed the name of the settlement from Vermilion Forks to Princeton in honour of a visit by the Prince of Wales to North America. The combined fair and community celebration should make the fair another great success.

PXA receives 1999 grants

Princeton Exhibition Association is wondering why the annual Regional District grant is so low this year. At the September 14 meeting, the fair grounds management society received a \$4,000 grant from the Town of Princeton, but only \$1,500 from Regional District, half what Regional District usually grants. The society will inquire about the reduction in grant money. One third of the grant must go to the heritage fund for further development of the fair grounds.

The grandstand roof tenders are now publicly advertised. PXA President George Elliott said the roof repairs will include replacing the announcer's tower and changing the access to the tower. The new tower will have better security. As for remarks made at Town Council's September 7 meeting about the PXA 'chipping in' \$10,000 toward the cost of the project, Elliott said he was sure it was a facetious remark.

Repairs to the sidewalk in front of the exhibits buildings cost approximately \$500 for materials,

but the labour was done by volunteers. The PXA will bill the Town of Princeton for the repairs.

The facade on exhibits building 1 is pulling away from the main structure. As repairs are a safety concern, this repair will be a priority item.

The log tables in front of the con-

cession building need some repairs, but not as extensive as first believed.

The PXA believes it is spending too much on phone service to the fair grounds. The phone in the agricultural building will be removed, and the office phone

The next PXA meeting will be held October 12 at the fair grounds office.

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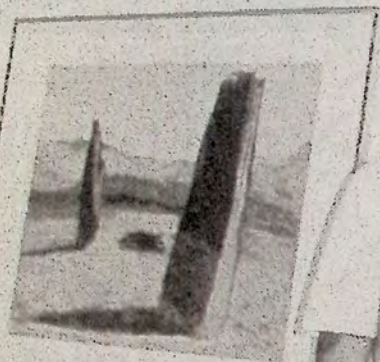
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Susan LePoidevin: A Celtic Journey

Local artist gains recognition

SIMILKAMEEN- Sue Le Poidevin's pastels and pottery drew exclamations of awe from visitors to her South Gallery exhibition at the Art Gallery of the South Okanagan in Penticton.

This Princeton artist is well-known locally for her unusual pottery but this is her first "one man" show at the invitation of a gallery.

Susan LePoidevin - A Celtic Journey brings together her many impressions of the year spent in Scotland while her husband, Steve, was on teacher exchange there. The whole family was fascinated with the 5,000 year old stone megaliths scattered throughout Scotland, particularly on the outer isles. Her pastels focus on views of these ancient markers.

Le Poidevin's pottery reflects structural images of Scotland. One is built like a castle, another like a house, with movable storks on the roof and chimney. Le Poidevin's pottery is created through a "primitive-firing" process which gives a completely different kind of finish to the clay. At the reception, Le Poidevin was

introduced and some of her personal history explained. She was asked to speak, and told how Celtic history had influenced her to make sketches while in Scotland then do the work when she returned home. She received a great round of applause.

the Thomas ranch, bulldozers uncovered a fossil deposit yielding large fish fossils, which can be seen at the museum now. The fossil bed was a treasure trove, and these fossils deserve public attention.

Troy Shenton, President of Princeton Fossil Club, was in attendance to hear the announcement. This Princeton student will see an expansion of fossil hunters in the area by the time he is ready to graduate. As the Pollard Wing becomes well-known, it will begin to draw a great many people, both amateur and professional, to search the Princeton area for more exotic fossils.

Mr. Lali praised the application prepared by Don Coyle, saying it made the grant decision much easier.

Several friends attended the opening of Le Poidevin's show, and she was very happy to see the support from the hometown group. Princeton people were obviously pleased to see a local artist's work recognized in a larger center.

Rosemary Doughty, Museum Society President, sees the grant as the beginning of fulfilling a new passion she has developed since coming to Princeton two years ago. She knew nothing about fossils when she arrived, but soon became fascinated with the record in the rocks.

Longtime Museum Society member Ev McCallum was asked how the society would raise the remaining \$30,000 required to build the Pollard Wing.

"We'll raise it," she said. "We will find ways and means to raise the money. We'll get it."

The Pollard Wing is seen as a longterm community investment that will ultimately yield dividends in the increased number of visitors to Princeton.



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WTO threatens Canadian Medicare

Last year the federal government was on the verge of signing the Multilateral Agreement on Investment (MAI) drafted in secret in Paris by the 29 member Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, of which Canada is a member. Among other things, the MAI could have resulted in the privatization of our publicly funded medicare in Canada and its replacement by the U.S. private for-profit system. The Council of Canadians secured a copy, exposed it to the world and it was defeated by an upsurge world of opposition in which France and the people of Canada played a leading role. The federal government which had endorsed MAI was compelled to back off.

But we all knew it would come up again in some other form. Now it has.

Last spring, trade ministers of Canada, Japan, the U.S. and the European Union, meeting in Tokyo, agreed that a new MAI should be introduced through the World Trade Organization (WTO).

The WTO was established in 1995 with headquarters in Geneva. Today, 135 countries belong to it. It was set up to enforce a multitude of existing trade agreements such as the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) by fines and sanctions, and to negotiate new ones. It is dominated by politicians and bureaucrats representing the interests of the world's biggest global corporations.

In essence it is a new world order set up to serve global corporations and enable them to penetrate and control the economies and resources of all countries. Maximum profits is what they are all after.

The WTO meets in Seattle in November. The plan now is to bring in amendments to a WTO agreement already in effect called the General Agreement on Trade in Services. These are even worse than the MAI.

U.S. representatives on the WTO are demanding that all public services in all member countries currently provided by any level of government be opened up for penetration by private capital. One of these is health care.

Here is what the U.S. Coalition of Service Industries, backed by the U.S. government, is saying and demanding:

- public ownership of health care has made it difficult for U.S.
- U. S. business must be allowed to expand into foreign health care markets

- more privatization must be encouraged

- The entire spectrum of geriatric services, both community and institutional, should be explored for privatization

- Majority foreign ownership of health care facilities must allowed

And what is the position of the Canadian government to these outrageous demands for U.S. ownership of health care facilities in Canada? Until recently, the government of Canada had generally refused to let the provisions of GATS apply to public services, but now the federal government has reversed its position - it has agreed that all public services, including health care, be "on the table" for negotiation in Seattle!

What a sell-out this is of our most loved social program in Canada!

We should let our government know in no uncertain terms that we will never accept this betrayal. Medicare belongs to the people of Canada. Its privatization is non-negotiable.

"It's really motivating to work with young people," Patry says.

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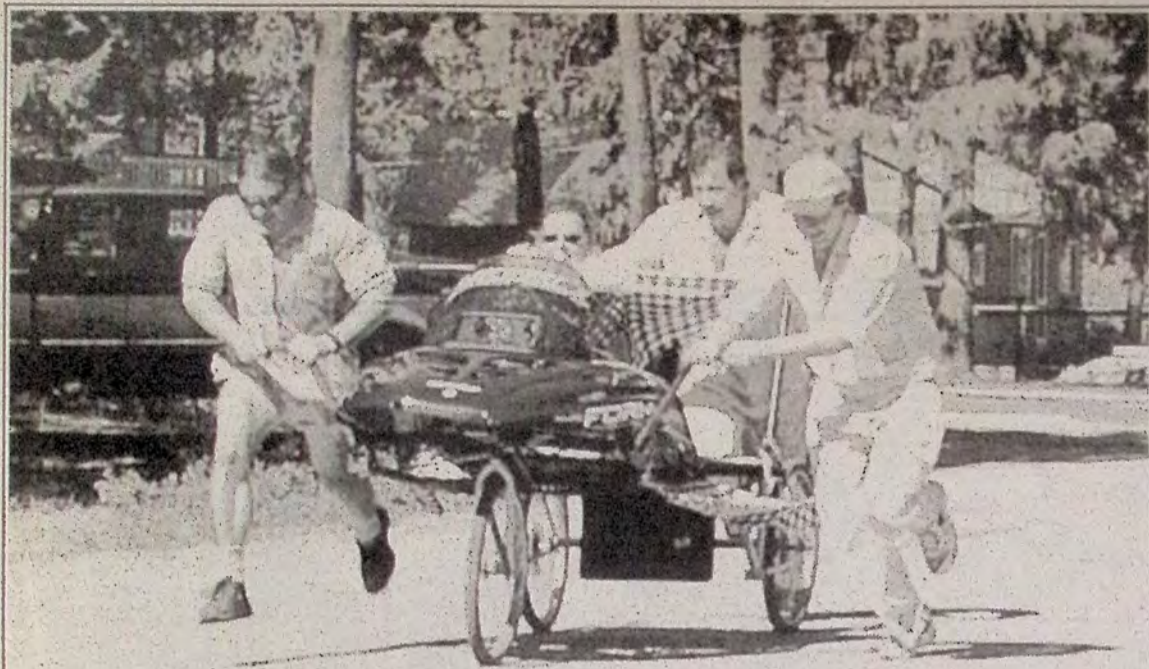

Terbasket to stand trial

Terbasket was involved in a single vehicle accident at the intersection of Barcelo Road and Highway 3, east of Cawston, on

March 14, 1998. Larry Allison, age 27, was pronounced dead at the scene. Terbasket and passenger Shaun Turcotte were injured in the mishap.

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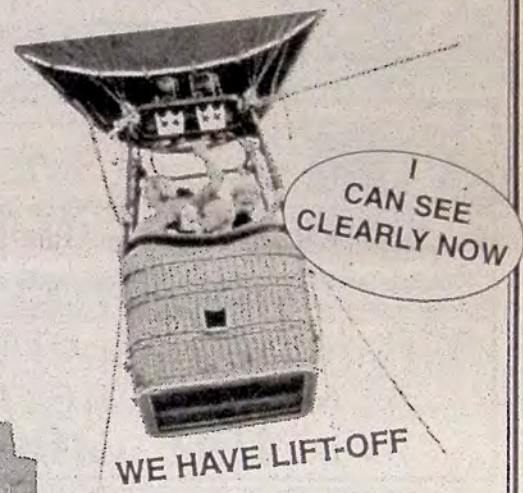
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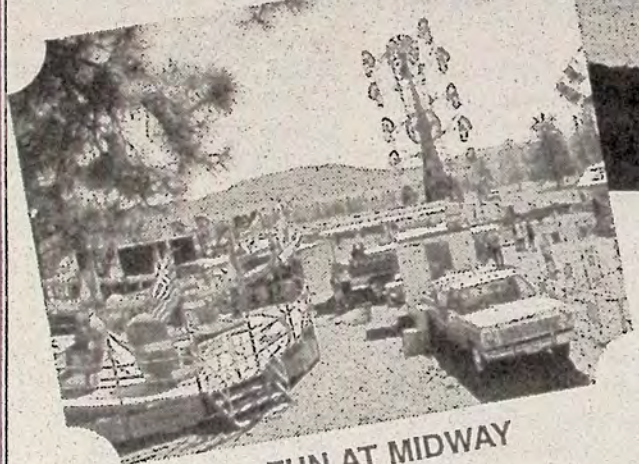


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More delays

Council cannot buy corridor yet

KEREMEOS - Keremeos Council's application to acquire portions of the railway corridor in order to have land for industrial development has been delayed indefinitely, but at its September 7 meeting, Council approved Chief Administrative Officer Eileen Oliver-Bauer's recommendation "to apply for a long term lease of the former railway corridor in the Village of Keremeos for public recreation purposes, and public parking."

Oliver-Bauer reported that the Ministry of Transportation and Highways (MOTH) suggested this option to the Village provided "no permanent structures are built on the property."

Oliver-Bauer says until it is developed as a highway, this land is designated in the Village of Keremeos Official Community Plan for interim use as a pathway, forming part of an overall trail network that includes the dyke.

MOTH used to pay the Village to mow the railway corridor, but in 1999 the Ministry initiated a weed spray program. Council decided that they did not wish the weed spray program to continue, as people take their children to the area.

Who can vote?

SIMILKAMEEN - On November 20, elections will be held for Keremeos Mayor and four Councillors, and area "G"-- Keremeos Rural Hedley-- and area "B"-- Cawston Regional District Directors.

The School District will elect one Trustee.

All residents in those areas who are 18 years or older, or non-residents who own property, can vote.

Keremeos Council Chief Administrative Officer and this year's Chief Elections Officer, Eileen Oliver-Bauer says, "Registration as a federal or provincial elector will not place you on the Village's List."

Oliver-Bauer says those who have moved to Keremeos or the Regional District since November, 1996 are probably not registered. For Keremeos, applications can be picked up at the Village Office and returned there when completed.

Advance registration closes September 28. Oliver-Bauer recommends that voters pre-register now to avoid line-ups on voting day. All non-resident property owners must pre-register.

Regional District has a one-step election-registration process on voting day, so pre-registration is not necessary. More detailed information is posted at the Village Office.

Property sold for tax

KEREMEOS - In Council Chambers, at 10:00 a.m., on September 27, the Corporation of the Village of Keremeos will offer, for tax sale, properties within Keremeos that have outstanding 1997 taxes and interest, unless the outstanding amounts have been paid prior to the sale date. By September 16, four owners had already come forward to pay their delinquent taxes, leaving five properties with amounts still outstanding.

Owners have one year to redeem their property after it has been sold.

Chief Administrative Officer Eileen Oliver-Bauer's report to Council at its September 7 meeting states, "Council may authorize a person to bid for the municipality at the tax sale up to a maximum set by Council."

Tax sale purchases must be paid for in cash or by certified cheque. After one year, the purchaser must pay a 1% Property Purchase Tax. See Village Office bulletin board for further information.

Elders' memories guide team

SIMILKAMEEN - This year, in and around the Similkameen, archaeologist Brenda Gould coordinated three research projects for the Upper Similkameen Indian Band (USIB) involving herself, archaeology field worker Charlene Allison, elder interviewer Nancy Allison, and archival researcher Christine Squakin. Gould says, in previous years they have done "quite a bit of field work," but it was not until they started interviewing elders that they were able to make further progress.

She says, "We've found it's highly important and really sheds more light."

In January, the USIB team began assessing the predictability of finding archaeological and traditional use resources of areas burned in the August 1998, Lawless Creek fire in the Tulameen. They worked with the Nicola Tribal Association and Gould says, without the elders, "we would never have found out the information by just looking at the burnt ground.... The erosion is incredible."

The team discovered that the burn area was probably a place for gathering food, and technological and spiritual resources. "You have every type of environment there," Gould says, adding that people could get everything they needed, except for trade items. "Some areas, in and around the burnt area are sacred."

Gould says historical records and interviews indicate two or three village sites in Tulameen, outside the burn area.

She says, "Camp Des Femmes and Black Eyes Camp have already been documented by the Hudson's Bay Company and other archaeologists."

The USIB team's next project was to conduct an "aboriginal interest study" about history and land use in the area between Oliver and Yahk, near Creston B.C. that will be affected by the proposed B.C. Gas Southern

Crossing pipeline. The USIB, and Lower Similkameen and Osoyoos Indian Bands cooperated on the project that began in May, and is just ending.

Though the team conducted field reconnaissance, looking for plants, animals, deer, and berries, most of the project was elder interviews. B.C. Gas already had an archaeologist looking at the area.

Gould says, one "overwhelming conclusion" about the Southern Crossing area was that it has "exhibited use, uninterruptedly until the present time."

Nancy Allison says elders she interviewed had to go beyond the residential school experience, where they had been told "not to remember the past."

"Up to the present time, natives from the Similkameen and Osoyoos would go east to Creston and the Rockies to procure resources, material and spiritual," Allison says. "Even a couple of years ago, they had a salmon feast in Castlegar and in O.K.Falls."

Christine Squakin, who spent most of her time on this project wearing gloves and a mask to protect herself from mould and dust on documents found in archives and basements, says Okanagan Similkameen natives used to gather in OK Falls for fish, to socialize and to trade.

Gould and Squakin add that, at such gatherings, marriages were arranged, and kinship ties and acquaintances were renewed.

Though Nancy Allison reports that on the B.C. Gas pipeline area, "a lot of burial sites" were found, Gould says these sites will not be impacted by the proposed gas pipeline.

The USIB's third project this year was in the Whipsaw Creek area near Princeton. Gould says they investigated the "whole watershed, and all of its tributaries, up to the height of the land."

Stan Copp, an archaeological consultant from Port Moody, and teacher at Langara College,

directed the project, and conducted an archaeology field school on the Chuchuwayha Reserve during June and July. Gould says the Whipsaw watershed corridor was used by explorers, trappers, gold rushers, and horse supply trains as a way to get over the mountains.

She says, "There's a lot of big holes and piles of rock, attributed to mining activity," in the area. She adds that these activities, and modern logging have "pretty much erased evidence of

prior occupation."

Gould says that the USIB team is almost finished this year's field work that was variously funded by Weyerhaeuser, Forest Renewal B.C., B.C. Gas, Ministry of Forests, and the Upper Similkameen Indian Band. They now have to prepare their reports and submit proposals for next year.

Gould says the USIB team would be happy to visit and or talk to any members of the public, anonymously if necessary, who have anything to offer regarding area native history, such as artifacts discovered on their own property. The USIB team does not want to take the artifacts, they only want to look at them, take photos or, in some cases, make plaster casts of the items. People need not fear losing their discoveries.

Nancy Allison says they "just want to record" the items, and Gould says, "We welcome them to call us. We are not out here to be the archaeology police."

Gould says she hopes the increased knowledge from these projects will "bring about more respect for native values."

"The conclusion to every project is the 100,000 more questions you haven't answered," Gould says.

24 Hours of Adrenalin

I arrived at Silver Star on Friday somewhat apprehensive after spending the week in bed sick with strep throat. It was a sunny, beautiful day. Three of my team mates were waiting for me. There were five of us. The others were from Vernon. Our combined ages added to 81 so we were in the 100 and Under category. My weekend started rather inauspiciously, during my pre-ride I did an "endo" (going over my handlebar) and for the rest of the weekend, I walked around with a bruised lip and a scar on my chin.

Saturday morning the mountain air bristled with excitement. We were told there were 750 competitors. The race started at Village Green at 12:00 SHARP. Marty McKay, our fearless captain, had to do a 1/2 km. run with the other team captains, return to Village Green, pick up his bike, and start the 18 km. lap.

The course started with a gradual climb which took riders to the top of Silver Star Mountain, followed by a rocky descent filled with mud holes and patches of snow. We started smack in the middle of the pack but Marty soon got a flat on his back tire and he had to stop and fix it. Then, half way round, he got another flat, this time on his front tire. He persevered and the baton was handed to our next team member, Jennifer, who completed the lap without mishap. However, Dave, our next rider, got a flat a few kilometers from the start.

By this time, our overall time was not too impressive. I was the fourth rider, and I managed to do it without any mechanical problems. Our fifth rider, Kevin was doing okay for the 1/2 half of the lap, then his saddle blew up and he had to finish the lap with no saddle. Do you know how hard that is?

My second ride was 9:20 p.m. and by now everyone had their night lights on. I had never ridden at night, and my sickness the previous week had prevented me from practicing at night. It was the scariest ride I had ever done. My lights did not work properly. The light on my handlebar was either right over my tire or flipped straight up at my face. The downhill portion was downright horrifying. When I got back to the village luckily for me, my Dad and Mom were there to help me fix the glitches.

My next ride took place at three in the morning. My lights worked fine but it was so dark and rather scary. I found myself all alone. The music was blaring at the Paradise Camp and that was somewhat comforting. By now I had been awake for 18 hours. It had been raining when I left the village but now at the higher elevations it was snowing and at the very top there was a blizzard happening! I'll never forget that eerie ride, but at the same time my adrenalin was at its highest. It was weird to think that I was riding when I should be sleeping. On the downhill there were lights strung in the trees from riders who had whipped out. My last ride was

do it again? You bet! The guys and I are already talking about next year.

Firewood

Load security regulations

Thanks to Lyle Zimmerman of Whistle Stop on Highway 3 near Princeton for suggesting the topic for this article.

Thoughts of a cheery blaze in the fireplace during our cold, wet winter are prompting many to prepare for the season by cutting their firewood now. Pyramids of wood higher than the roof of the pick-up cab can often be seen on local highways. The problem is, many of them are not secured in the proper manner.

"Ah, I've been doing it this way for years and I've never had a problem," is the common justification for the situation.

Think of your own safety. A front-end collision will send this pile through the back window of the cab with serious consequences for any occupants. If you consider others, a block of wood falling off the truck is travelling at the same speed as the truck and will also have serious consequences for any pedestrian, cyclist or other vehicle.

Division 35 of the Motor Vehicle Act Regulations set out the requirements for load security of all loads carried on a highway or other roads in the province. Section 35.03(a) sets out the general offense of operating a vehicle carrying a load when the load is not secured in a manner which

ensures that the load or portion of the load will not escape from the vehicle. The current ticketed amount for a violation of this section is \$86.

A pamphlet titled Project Load Security is available free of charge at weigh scales.

Trial reveals story of Hedley area murder


SIMILKAMEEN - The remains of Christine Browne were found October 31, 1992, just off Nickel Plate Road, near Hedley, B.C. Hunters who found the skeletal remains testified in Penticton on September 16 at the trial of Terry Samuel Arnold, age 37, who had resided in Keremeos. The Christine Browne story began in the Similkameen with the discovery of the remains, and a drawing was circulated by RCMP in hopes somebody might remember the identity of a missing person. Christine Browne's

remains were identified when a forensic laboratory linked her remains with a missing person file and matched dental records. Testimony by the hunters revealed bones strewn around the site, and clothing wrapped around the lower jaw. Jeans were found in another location. RCMP were assisted by many tips from people concerned about the fate of the 15 year old Kimberley girl. The Supreme Court jury trial continues in Penticton this week.

American colonel says Roswell is true, space aliens are real

"The Day After Roswell", a memoir of Col. Philip J. Corso, retired from the American Army, tells the story of what the military personnel found at Roswell, New Mexico in July, 1947. Further, he tells why the government chose to cover up the truth, and what the government did with the technology discovered on the downed spacecraft. For the past 50 years, local people have seen the strange lights over Miner Mountain, and a few people have had close encounters with the craft. One of the great things about "The Day After Roswell" is that those who have seen the spacecraft can now relax. explanations was top secret, and was viewed as having been done by space aliens. The main thrust of what the American military did with the information was work on weaponry capable of defending against alien spacecraft. Those weapons have been developed and are ready for use. The book tells of many "sudden" technological advances, such as the silicon chip for computers, developed as a result of reverse engineering from items found at Roswell. The author notes, at the end of the book, an Internet address describing the influence of Roswell materials on the development of the transistor. The most interesting thing about the book is the matter-of-fact, business-as-usual reporting of the colonel's recollections, including his views on the space creatures themselves and what he thinks they really are.

Hidden Cities: The discovery and loss of North American civilization

BY ROGER G. KENNEDY, (1994) Penguin Books

When we speak of ancient civilizations, we think of ancient Egypt, Rome or of India and China. We never think of North America. We are ignorant of the ancient civilization of our own continent.

Kennedy's *Hidden Cities* tells the story of what is known of the ancient civilization of the Mississippi Valley, whose structures date back to 4,500 BC. These ancient people built massive structures which pre-date the Egyptian pyramids. One of the cone-shaped structures is bigger than any pyramid in Egypt or Mexico!

In our own Similkameen Valley, points (stone spear or arrow points) have been dated back 8,000 years. People who lived in North America so long ago were not "savages", they were builders. Their trade routes criss-crossed North America from north to south and east to west.

In the Mississippi Valley, some of these people built huge structures of earth called "mounds". Like pyramids, these structures were not built to be lived in, but to live *amid*.

Kennedy provides a scholarly look at why the mounds have been "hidden", but he likewise exposes some truths about the great civilization of North America.

Before Stonehenge, before the glory of Egypt, before Athens and Rome, there was a civilization of North American people who cultivated crops, made great structures in their cities, built roads, created works of art, made pottery and dressed in clothing made of woven cotton.

Furthermore, the "indians" were still building similar structures when the first Europeans arrived in the Mississippi Valley scarcely 200 years ago.

Kennedy explains how all of this civilization, and its great cities, has been ignored by "regular" historians because of social factors and political goals based on European pride and prejudice.

Perhaps it is time North Americans claimed their right to regard their continent as the home of one of the world's most ancient civilizations. Kennedy lays the groundwork for such a revolutionary perspective.

Kennedy is the Director of the National Park Service and former Director of the American History Museum at the Smithsonian Institution. He writes from the most reliable evidence currently available.

Rules for pedestrians on roads

Firearms registration: Ottawa's dream crashes into reality

In order to market their firearm legislation to the Canadian public, the federal government played fast and loose with a number of facts and statistics. The one that is going to come back and haunt them is their often stated figure that there are 3 million firearm owners and 7 million firearms in Canada.

This estimate came from a phone survey commissioned by the federal government, although this survey actually referenced firearm ownership on a per household rather than an individual ownership basis. The estimated 3 million firearm owners flew in the face of a 1992 United Nations survey that put the number of Canadian firearm owners at 7 million. A 1995 study by Mauser and Buckner placed the number of firearms in Canada in the area of 13 million, a figure that is in line with the U.N. data and almost double what the federal government likes to quote. Some have estimated that the number could be as high as 20 million.

It was important to the federal government that their estimate came in as low as possible. This was required in order to convince the general public and the media that firearms owners were a small group and the number of firearms in Canada low enough that it would be physically possible to accomplish their proposed registration program. They were

wrong on both counts.

The new firearm legislation says that all firearm owners must be licensed by January 1, 2001. With 7 million owners, this means that they would need to register an average of 14,000 applications a day. An access to information request by federal M.P. Gary Breitkreuz found that only 36,886 firearms licenses were issued between December 1, 1998 and June 6, 1999. This works out to 290 licenses per working day. Even if they could get their productivity up to 1,000 registrations per day, it would take over 25 years just to register the existing firearm owners.

In addition, they need to register the conservative estimate of 13 million firearms presently owned in Canada. Just 21,163 private firearms were registered in the first six months that the registry was open. This is only sixteen-one hundredths of one percent of the 13 million firearms that are owned by Canadians citizens.

The government claims that the

Canadian Firearms Centre is now registering 15 hundred firearms per day. Even if that figure is correct, it would take almost 25 years to register just the existing firearms in Canada, to say nothing of the transfers and new purchases. This is in addition to the time required to license firearm owners.

It is becoming increasingly apparent that the federal Liberal's firearm registration plan is simply not achievable at any reasonable cost. The Canadian public was told that the cost of this program would not exceed \$85 million. By March 31 1999 those costs had risen to \$216 million and are still climbing. This does not even account for the \$30 million spent on a separate registry being run in the province of Quebec, but evaluating the cost of firearm registration is another story.

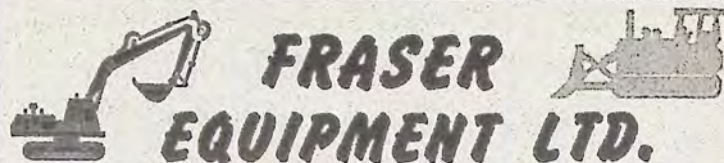

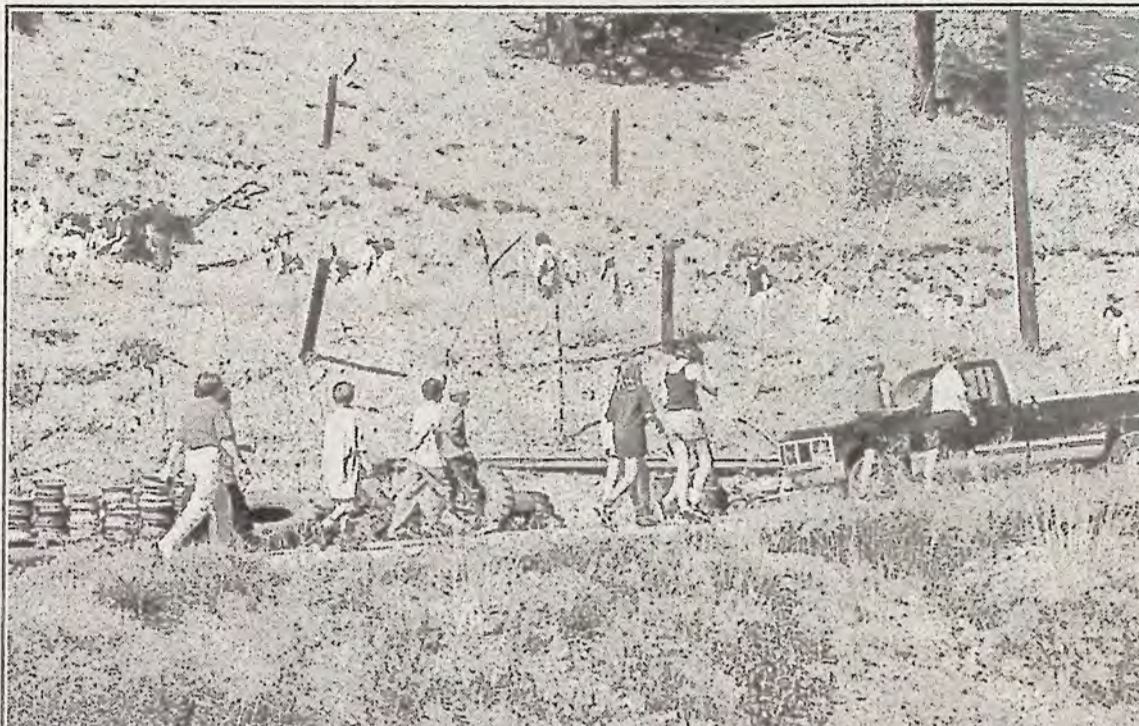

Scientists find hormones in baby bottles

JAPAN - Chemical female hormone in baby's bottle?

Toxicologist Koji Arizono of the Prefectural University of Kumamoto, Japan, and his colleagues, tested 10 different brands of polycarbonate baby bottles, along with other clear plastic tableware, and all leached bisphenol A, a chemical that mimics the hormone estrogen, into liquids kept in the containers.

Pollutants that mimic hormones, especially estrogen, have emerged in recent years as a major environmental concern. Animal studies suggest they may increase the likelihood of developing certain cancers, and if taken by a child or immature animal, may disrupt normal growth and function of reproductive tissues and the brain.

Roughly 95 per cent of all baby bottles currently on the market are made of polycarbonates, the rigid clear plastic used in many types of containers. This is not the same plastic as in milk jugs, which are made of soft, cloudy plastic.

Clear rigid plastic, used for water containers, unbreakable kitchen tumblers, picnic cutlery and baby

bottles, when heated or when holding hot liquids, leaches out the chemical estrogen into the liquid. The older the bottle, the more chemical estrogen leaches out.

The same characteristic is true of plastic resins used to line food tins, and plastics used to protect teeth from decay.

The major concern stemming from finding chemical estrogens leaching from plastics is the

impact such estrogens could have on infants and children, particularly in development of their reproductive organs.

Parents with concerns may feel more comfortable switching to glass, although plastics industry reports say there is a higher likelihood of dangerous accidents from glass bottles. However, glass will not leach chemical hormones.

Death goes to Keremeos

SIMILKAMEEN - Coroner Gary Davidson has turned the death of a Keremeos orchard worker over to the RCMP for further investigation. Kulwinder Singh Dhaliwal died July 16 after two months of rapid physical deterioration. The 22 year old immigrant had been spraying in his family's Keremeos orchard, and became ill. He was admitted to hospital in Penticton and was found to have kidney and liver damage. Two weeks later, doctors found that Dhaliwal's lungs were shutting down from fibrosis, a disease that collapses the tiny air sacs in the

lungs. Dhaliwal ultimately died of lung collapse.

The chemicals used were Diazinon and Thiodan. Now, Davidson does not believe those chemicals led to Dhaliwal's death.

When a coroner turns a case over to the RCMP, it is an indication that the circumstances of death are suspicious. Further investigation may, or may not, indicate a crime was committed.

PRINCETON - The 1999 swim season was a great success for Kokanee Summer Swim Club. The biggest thrill was seeing several members qualify for the provincial competitions.

August 20 - 22 was a very exciting time for seven swimmers from Princeton. Corbin Clement, Keaton Brown, Marlow Dieter, Jordan Hilton, Nigel Bertrand, Zach Brown and Rikki-Lee Tremblay competed at the 1999 Speed Swimming Championships in Richmond. On Friday, August 20, Nigel raced in the 200 meter Individual Medley event. Nigel swam eight strong lengths of the pool to finish 21 out of 22 swimmers.
