Bear shot near school

PRINCETON - Conservation Officer Al Lay states he shot a black bear at the rear of John Allison Elementary School just after dawn on September 20. Lay had become concerned about the bear's boldness on the previous Sunday, when the bear had walked down a residential street in mid-afternoon without showing any sign of fear.

Repeated reports of bear sightings by people living in the Asp Creek area led Lay to go to the area to watch for the bear. He saw it at the base of the hill between John Allison Elementary School and Tulameen Road and decided the bear could prove to be a danger to the children.

Lay estimated the male bear weighed approximately 300 pounds (140 kg.) and was approximately six years old. Many other reports of bears causing trouble resulted in the shooting of another black bear before the week was over.

Victoria wants public input on horse racing

Joan Smallwood, Minister of Labour, says she wants public input before any decisions are made on the recommendations of the Horse Racing Review.

The Horse Racing Review was commissioned before government's June 1999 decision to end gaming expansion.

"On June 17, our government ended further gaming expansion and signed an agreement to work together with municipalities on gaming issues. That affects how we deal with some of the issues outlined in the Horse Racing Review," Smallwood stated on September 24.

There are seven racetracks in B.C., in Vancouver, Cloverdale, Sidney, Vernon, Princeton, Kamloops and Osoyoos, and 24 simulcast racing teletheatres. According to the report, the sector has a total economic impact of more than \$190 million and creates 4,040 full-time jobs. Wagering on simulcast horse racing has grown over the last decade, while wagering at live events has steadily declined. Attendance at live events dropped from more than a million in 1992 to 586,000 in 1998.

Smallwood said one recommendation of the Review will not be considered. Racetracks will not receive approval to install slot machines. The report, prepared by Price WaterhouseCoopers, presents a review of the industry and its economic viability. Recommendations touch issues from gaming to taxation and support for the agricultural sector.

Smallwood said, "Before our government considers the recommendations dealing with gaming, I want those recommendations to get full public scrutiny. I am also providing the report to municipalities and other agencies for their comments so decisions can be made with the knowledge that all affected parties and the public have been consulted."

The review says horse racing should be viewed as a sector of the entire gaming industry, which includes lotteries, bingo, electronic gaming devices and casinos. All gaming sectors should be treated consistently. If applied to horse racing, the industry would share in revenues generated by the seven per cent provincial tax on wagering.

The end of the party

A 14 year old Keremeos boy was killed by a hit and run driver on Ashnola River Road approximately 1.7 kilometres from the Red Bridge near Keremeos. The boy was hit around 2:00 a.m. shortly after he left a party in the vicinity. The youth was pronounced dead at the scene. The family was notified, but no names were released by police.

Keremeos R.C.M.P. requested assistance from anyone who had any knowledge about the accident, and asked witnesses to come forward.

Hart sees Highway 97 as the Inland Corridor

Jim Hart, local Member of Parliament, attended the B.C.-Washington Inland Corridor Task Force planning session in Osoyoos and pressured the B.C. provincial government for much-needed improvements to the section of Highway 97 and Peachland. It would appear Hart expects the corridor to go through the Okanagan, a route truckers do not favour. Truckers prefer the Similkameen route.

Princeton Town Council announced at their September 20 meeting that there was no mem-

ber of Council available to attend the inland corridor planning session to represent Similkameen interests.

Hart told Senator Ross Fitzpatrick and Liberal MP Lou Sekora, "When the House returns next month, all the Okanagan Reform MPs will be pressuring the government to bring Highway 97 to the forefront of the national agenda. It is vitally important to the economic growth of our region to improve the North-South flow of goods, services and people."

Council sees bug kill damage to local forests

PRINCETON - Merritt Forest District personnel took Councillors Kathleen Clement, George Armstrong and Dan Sulentich on a tour of forest damage done by mountain pine beetle in the Whipsaw Creek area. All expressed astonishment and dismay at the extent of what is commonly called "bug kill."

"It's unbelievable," Clement said.

"I was amazed at the amount of

bug kill up there," Sulentich told Mayor Randy McLean.

They were dismayed at the number of standing dead trees. Sulentich noted that loggers are taking "60 truckloads a day out of the Whipsaw."

Mayor McLean commented, "You have a choice - leave it or get some use out of it."

There was some discussion of the potential for forest fires such as the 1998 Lawless Creek fire.

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Hundreds attend Regional economic summit

There was a palpable air of excitement on September 21 as over 200 people from throughout the South Okanagan and Similkameen gathered in Penticton to look for ways to improve the regional economy. There were business people from all areas, Princeton to Cawston, Summerland to Osoyoos and points in between. Thanks to the Summit being advertised province wide, there were even potential investors from Vancouver in the audience.

They exchanged ideas, and shared solutions in workshops on Agriculture, Aboriginal Partnerships, Hi Tech, Transportation, Tourism, Retail/Service, Retirement and Manufacturing. At the end of the day, lists of priority items to help their sector move forward were brought forward. The creative juices were spurred by an impressive line-up of speakers, including Finning Chairman and CEO Jim Shepard and President of the

economic Development Association of Canada, Robert Fine.

This was the first time such a gathering had taken place in the region, and it is seen as an essential step in giving direction to economic development initiatives. Funded primarily by Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen, Human Resources Development Canada and Community Futures, the Summit will form the foundation for planning economic renewal in the region. RDOS Chair Roger

Mayer, was delighted with the participation in the event and hopes those attending will continue their efforts to shake up the local economy.

The next step will be a meeting with Economic Development Officers from throughout the region on October 5, when action plans will be formulated to keep the process moving forward. A full report of the day's proceedings will be circulated to all participants in mid-October.

New program helps diversify rural and coastal economies

The provincial government has launched a new \$10 million Community enterprise program to encourage greater economic diversification in coastal and rural communities. The announcement made September 21 by Jan Pullinger, minister of community development, noted, "People in coastal and rural communities know their own strengths and they have told us that economic diversification is the key to their prosperity."

The new community enterprise program provides communities with seed funding to develop and implement locally-driven, new and innovative initiatives. The program will provide support to communities to implement local economic development plans and to assist co-operatives to enter niche markets.

The program has three main components:

- Community and co-operative business development - matching contributions of up to \$100,000 per project are available for community-based agencies to support the establishment of economic enterprises that create jobs.

- Community capacity building - up to \$50,000 will be available for pilot projects supported by the voluntary sector that generate work and sustainable income for individuals from marginalized groups

- Community venture capital - raises share capital for investments in "value-added" business ventures such as tourism, research and non-traditional agriculture.

Provincial Court Resisting arrest leads to sentence

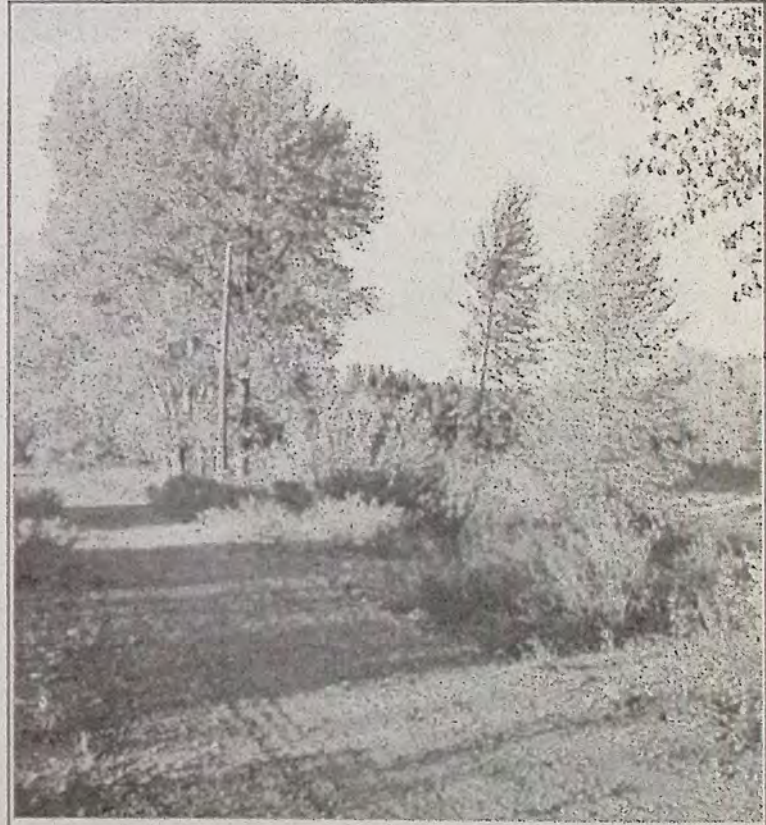
PRINCETON - On May 8, 1999, Joel Milligan was arrested for being drunk in a public place. He was involved in a loud argument with his wife in a downtown location when police heard them. He strongly resisted arrest, to the point of bruising the arresting officers.

Milligan, who has a prior record, is age 26, father of three children, and his wife testified he is an "excellent" father. Milligan admits to having difficulty with drinking and aggressive behaviour.

Judge G. Sinclair ordered Milligan to do 60 days in custody on the Electronic Monitoring Program, followed by a year's probation during which Milligan is to abstain from alcohol consumption and the use of non-prescription drugs.

"They're just poison to you," Judge Sinclair told him.

In addition, Milligan is to take whatever counselling his probation officer recommends.

Chad and Lynn Dixon are bringing part of the 19th annual Okanagan Wine Festival to Princeton with four evenings of winemakers' dinners at Castle Restaurant. This festival celebrates the grape harvest of British Columbia and the winemakers who have made the industry world-class.

On Friday, October 1, Castle Restaurant features Hester Creek Estate Winery, with the winemaker present and four award-winning wines paired with four courses.

On Saturday, Tinhorn Creek Estate Winery will present four of their award-winning wines with a four course dinner.

On Friday, October 8, dinner will be paired with Sumac Ridge Wines, and founder Harry McWaters will be present with his four award-winning wines. McWaters poured wine for the Queen last year, then brought home gold medals from New York for Sumac Ridge Merlot wine.

On Sunday, the format changes to a special event. At 4:00 p.m., a celebration of The Golden Mile begins. The Golden Mile is a strip of wine-growing territory near Oliver, B.C. which is one of the finest in the world. It has the right soil, the right climate, and prolonged exposure to sunlight for prime length of growing season. The grapes produced in vineyards of The Golden Mile make the

wine to be served along with five light dishes. The featured wineries are Hawthorne Mountain Vineyards, Hester Creek, Tinhorn Creek, Jackson Triggs, and Inniskillin Wineries. Each wine served will be an award-winner from consumer tasting and judging done the day before at the Convention Center in Penticton.

This consumer judging takes place each year and tells the industry what consumers prefer. It is the last big event of the festival. The official judging by expert wine judges takes place prior to the Consumers' Choice awards. Then, the consumers attend and taste, and cast their votes for their favourites in each class of wine.

At each of the dinners at Castle Restaurant, the winemaker of the evening will take guests through the characteristics of each wine and the relationship between the wine and the dinner course served with it. Chef Chad Dixon gives the example of the wild berry flavours of an Okanagan ice wine served with a wild berry and chocolate dessert will bring out the best in both the wine and the food, like a good marriage of food and wine.

These four events at Castle Restaurant are drawing people from all over the Pacific Northwest and Alberta. A few seats remain for local people, but they must reserve immediately to be sure of the opportunity to join

in this exceptional educational experience.

Both Chad and Lynn encourage people to go to the events in the Okanagan Wine Festival.

"The industry is important to the B.C. economy, both for tourism and exports," Chad says. "Wine is more globally in demand than ever before, and we live in the gateway to some of the finest export wines in the world."

His only regret is that provincial taxes are so high on B.C. vineyards that consumers can buy foreign wines cheaper than wines produced right here.

Exports rise

B.C.'s exports rose by nine per cent in July, marking the eleventh month in a row that exports have increased over levels in the previous year.

For the first seven months of 1999, exports were up 12.2 per cent over the same period for 1998. Goods valued at more than \$16.4 billion were shipped from B.C. from January through July 1999, compared with \$14.6 billion for the same period in 1998. B.C.'s exports continue to be dominated by resource-based sectors. During the first seven months of 1999, B.C. shipped more than \$8.5 billion in forestry exports, up from \$7.4 billion over 1998's first seven months. Agricultural and fishing products have increased eight per cent.

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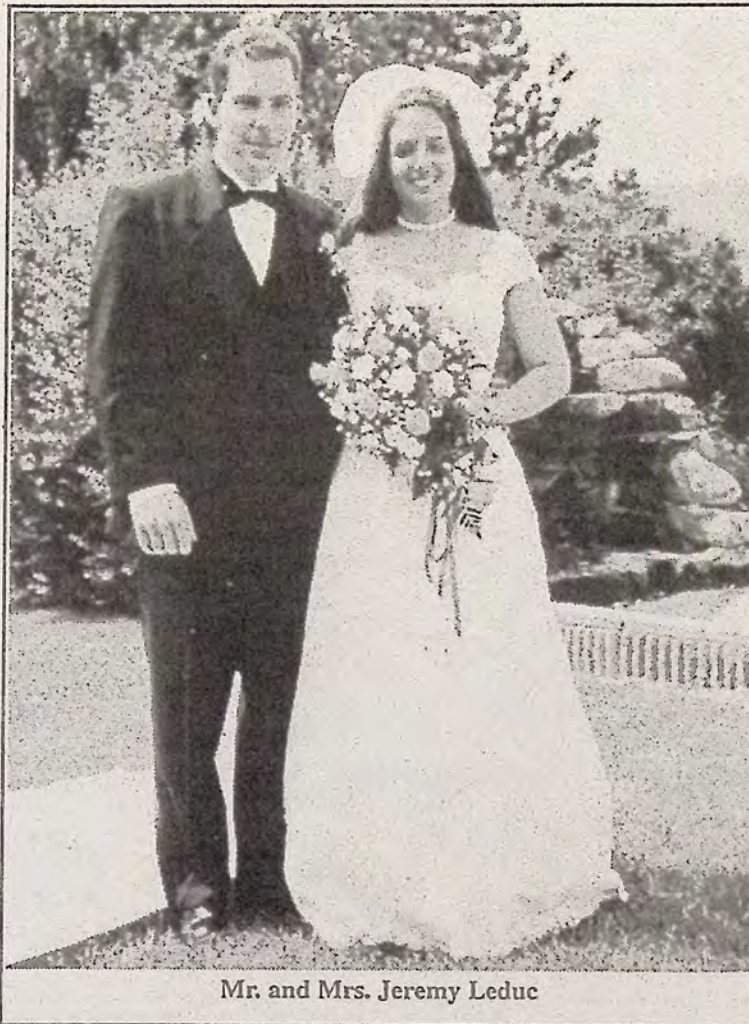

1. Always start with the gifts, talents, knowledge and skills of young people. Find out what they like to do and are good at doing.
2. Always look for the positive in the unique individual. For example, it should be, "Maria with the lovely voice," not "Maria, the pregnant teen."
3. Every community is filled with useful work and service opportunities for young people. The corollary of this is that there is no community, institution or organization that cannot find a useful role for a young person.
4. Always distinguish between real work and games or simulations, because young people can.
5. Fight age segregation. Youth today are the most age-isolated generation in our history, to

- everyone's detriment.
6. Avoid aggregating people, especially young people, by what they don't have. Too often, we group people by their deficiencies instead of letting those who can help those who can't.
 7. Move as quickly as possible beyond "youth advisory boards" or committees with only one youth on them.
 8. Constantly cultivate opportunities for young people to teach and lead.
 9. Constantly reward and celebrate creativity, energy and effort - loudly and with spirit.
 10. Amplify continuously "we need you." Young people are not a problem, they are our solution.
- Whenever possible, let young people take the lead on the form the celebration will take.

“We enjoyed your town and your hospitality,” Weins told the News Leader.

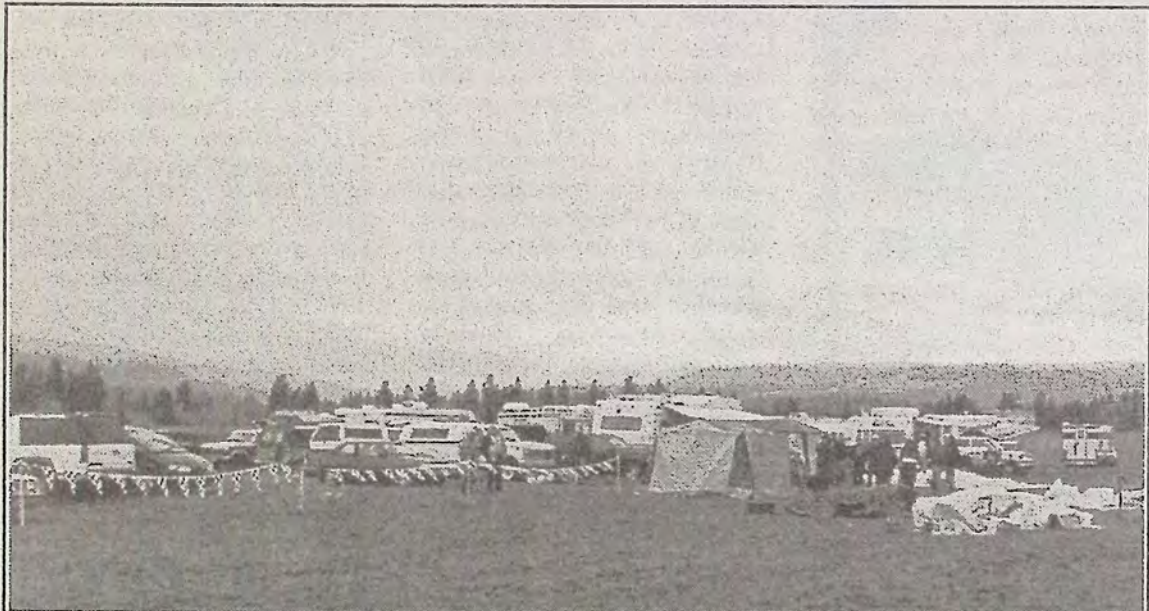

Hart takes shots at media

This past week, I traveled east in preparation for the return of the 36th Parliament of Canada. The Reform Party caucus team met to discuss the many important issues facing our nation, such as illegal migrants, the war in East Timor, the possible merger in the airline industry, high taxes and criminal justice. These, and a medley of other significant issues, require immediate attention by the House of Commons. Unfortunately, however, the federal Liberals didn't see it that way, and this, my friends, is 100% pure balderdash!

Let's look at the issue of sending Canadian troops to East Timor. Firstly, this is not a Peacekeeping mission. This is Peacemaking. That means our men and women of the Canadian Armed Forces could find themselves in jungle warfare, something they have not been trained in since prior to the disbanding of the Canadian Airborne Regiment. For strictly political reasons, the federal Liberals removed this capability of our Forces, and now, combined with already existing deployments around the world, our Canadian Forces are over-stretched to a dangerous degree.

have followed the necessary procedures and who are still patiently waiting for admission into Canada.

Undaunted by the arrogance of the Grits, Preston Manning has vowed to ask the questions he would have asked the Prime Minister if the House were in session. Again, I am amazed at some of the national media who tried to paint the Opposition as taking advantage of prorogation and dismissed this as a media stunt. To those folks, I would say that the role of the Official Opposition is written into the constitution. We, the Official Opposition, have a constitutional responsibility to hold the government accountable to the people of Canada.

I would also have to ask the national media why they did not make the same charge to Mr. Bouchard and his gang of sepa-

ratists when they held the title of Her Majesty's Loyal Opposition. Loyal? They could have declined Official Opposition status but instead, made a mockery of the constitutional responsibility assigned to this important post. Why? Because it was a media stunt of gigantic proportions. It also vaulted their cause of Quebec secession into the headlines every day during the 35th Parliament of Canada, from 1993 to 1997.

No, my friends, asking the questions of the people is not a media stunt. It is a job that Reform Party Members of Parliament take very seriously. The government now has three extra weeks to consider their responses to the people.

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Keremeos RCMP continue investigation

KEREMEOS - The death of farm worker Kulwinder Singh Dhaliwal is under investigation after Coroner Gary Davidson referred the case to Keremeos RCMP. Dhaliwal died in Penticton Regional Hospital on July 19. He had fallen ill after spraying chemicals in an orchard. Initially, Dhaliwal's illness and death were believed to be the result of pesticide poisoning.

As the disease progressed, Dhaliwal displayed a condition of acute pulmonary fibrosis which caused his lungs to collapse. This was not consistent with the type of pesticides in use, but was consistent with a death caused by

paraquat, a chemical used as a herbicide.

Paraquat is a highly toxic compound widely used for broadleaf weed control that destroys green plant tissue on contact. It has been employed for killing marijuana in the United States and Mexico. To quote from information obtained from Pesticide Information Project, "Effects due to high acute exposure to paraquat may include excitability and lung congestion, which in some cases leads to convulsions, incoordination, and death by respiratory failure."

RCMP will likely investigate how Dhaliwal ingested a chemical that would not have been used to spray a productive orchard.

SIMILKAMEEN - Dixon Terbasket, Lower Similkameen Indian Band (LSIB) Manager, says Gorman Brothers has "completely backed off" for now on its plans to log Ashnola area. In a September 23 interview, Terbasket said Gorman Brothers was "trying to stay away from confrontation." He says Gorman Brothers and LSIB are "going on a field trip together on September 28 and 29" to review Gorman Brothers "plans in the field," which this year include road building.

Terbasket says, "Gorman Brothers has been respecting our wishes, and trying to work something out."

According to a report on Gorman Brothers Lumber activities in the Lower Similkameen, presented September 8 by Nick Arkle to Keremeos Village, Regional District and First Nations, "Activities in the area have increased over the past few years as the need to manage pine beetle infested stands in the mid and north parts of Gorman Bros.' operating area has dropped off. In subsequent years, it is expect-

ed that 25% to 35% of Gorman Bros.' timber supply will come from the Lower Similkameen area. The volume to be harvested will vary from year to year, but operations will be planned to ensure that activities are sustainable over time."

Among other things, the report states "100% of all silviculture activities" have been offered first to local businesses, "one third of road building and deactivation activities," including operations outside the Lower Similkameen, have been offered to a LSIB member, and a harvesting contract representing 25% of the volume harvested in the area has been given up by existing operators, and offered to the LSIB to make room for band involvement.

Terbasket says the LSIB has had 142 meetings since January 1997 with government ministers, Coordinated Resource Management Plan (CRMP), Gorman Brothers, Weyerhaeuser, Keremeos Village and others to try to resolve issues of capacity, community first concept, social and economic development, and job creation.

Vehicle forces car off highway

Barisoff wants to save Cawston jobs

CAWSTON - Provincial MLA Bill Barisoff, T.L. Timber of Cawston and Agricultural Land Commission (ALC) Coordinator of Enforcement, Colin Frye, met September 23, to, in Barisoff's words, "find some kind of grounds to save those jobs in Cawston." After the meeting, Barisoff said it had been "very productive."

He said, "I think we're doing everything in our power to come up with some solution."

He said it's mostly the ALC and T.L. Timber that will be working toward a resolution, and this meeting was the "first step" toward finding "something that will work for everybody."

Barisoff, who organized the meeting, had said in a September 14 interview that he wanted to do whatever he could "to help find some kind of compromise" to keep the 18 people at T.L. Timber working and added, "I'm going to do everything in my power to find the ways and means."

After the September 23 meeting, attended by both T.L. Timber owner Tom Lusted, and his father Dave Lusted, Tom Lusted commented that T.L. Timber is going to "work together with the ALC" to try to resolve the situation.

Dave Lusted, T. L. Timber landowner, says he stopped fruit farming in 1988 because he could not make a living at it.

He says, "I grew up on the farm, and started changing sprinklers when I was about 11."

He bought the farm from his parents in 1976 and says, in 1978-79, they "did quite well," getting

\$130 per bin for their fruit. In 1980, the price dropped to \$27 per bin. Prior to 1980, the Farm Income Assurance Plan, covered all the fruit in a farmer's orchard, but in 1980, the plan was changed to apply to only one million pounds of each fruit. At that time, Lusted had just purchased another orchard, and was farming about 16 acres. He was encouraged by the Social Credit government of the day who "wanted farms to get larger," but he was left with two and a half million pound of apples not covered by Farm Income Assurance.

Dave Lusted says, when the government froze the land, the "Farm Income Assurance plan was brought in, in exchange for farmers losing their rights to their properties. We have been frozen on agricultural reserves," and successive governments have chewed away at this program until there is nothing left of it."

Speaking of apples, he says, "Unless we can grow a variety that Washington can't, we're in deep trouble."

Dave Lusted admits there are "some very successful, very good orchards in this valley" who have financial backing and good soil.

Robert Dawson of Cawston is one orchardist who has made a success of his 100 acre orchard. When asked September 16, he said key is "that you have to grow what the market wants." According to Dawson, the market wants apples like Royal Gala, Fuji, Rayburne and Granny Smith, produced by high density, dwarf trees, that bring in excess

of 25 cents per pound to the grower, not varieties such as red delicious that bring in around five cents per pound to a grower whose production costs are 20 cents per pound. He says, this year, prices for standard varieties such as red delicious and mac "have been the lowest in real terms, meaning purchasing power, since 1932."

Dawson says the distress of orchardists is very real, because "80% of valley production is still in older, traditional varieties." He says the new system requires substantially more up front capital, and high skill levels.

In 1986, Dawson travelled to Europe with other growers to study the new high density system.

Referring to keeping up with market preferences and having enough land to plant new varieties when needed, Dawson says, "given the ferocious competition that exists out there, it's difficult to make a living off five to ten acres of fruit farming."

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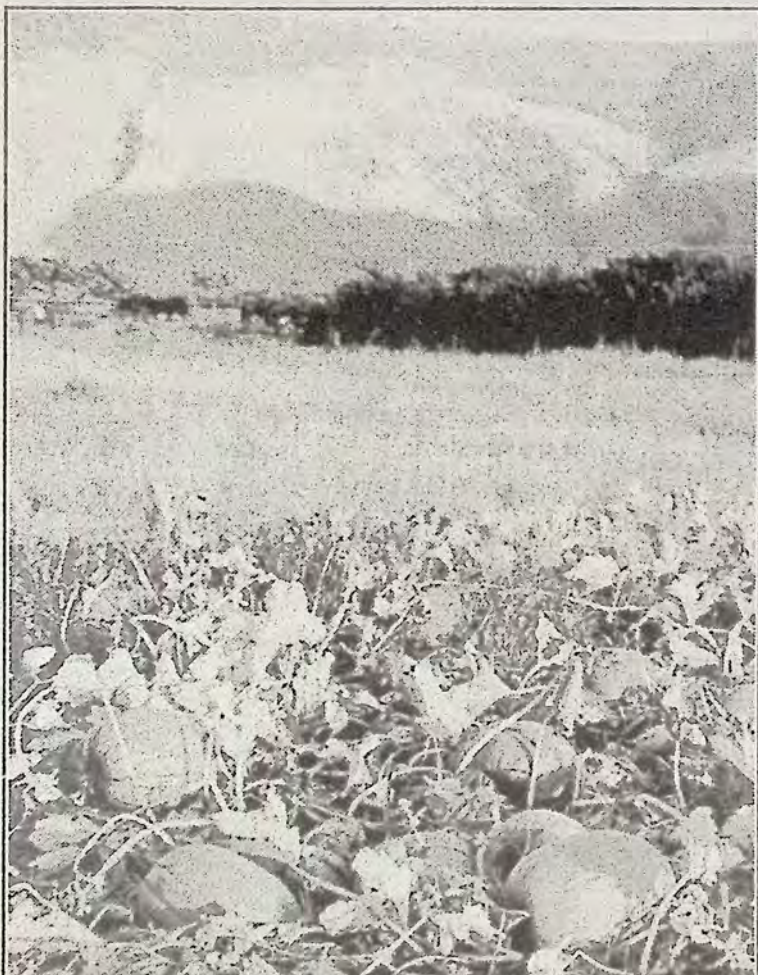


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Vermilion Court marks its second anniversary since its grand opening day on October 4, 1997. This facility is now a model of housing for the independent older person requiring some assistance.

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Local man convicted of Employment Insurance fraud will work for no pay

PRINCETON - Jordan Bey of Princeton pled guilty in Provincial Court to a charge of failing to declare earnings while receiving Employment Insurance benefits. He appeared in Princeton on September 23 for sentencing after his case was waived from Houston, B.C.

A federal Crown Counsel told Judge G. Sinclair that Bey had two charges from 1997 and two from 1998. On four previous occasions, Bey had failed to declare earnings, and the matter had been handled without charges. The newest four incidents involved Employment Insurance benefits totalling over \$5,000 while, during the same reporting periods, Bey had earned over \$14,000. Crown Counsel requested six months in jail as a sentence, along with fines.

Judge Sinclair retired to his chambers to make a decision on

sentencing. When he made his statement to the court more than a half hour later, he said he had considered what was the most important issue, and had decided it was most important that taxpayers recover Bey's "ill begotten gains."

Bey apologized to the court and said he had resolved to "clean up my life." He is employed full-time and received a supportive letter from his employer.

Under new legislation, a judge may decide on a conditional sentence to be served in the community. Bey was ordered to four months during which he must keep his job and make every effort to repay the EI fund. Bey must also pay \$300 on each of the four counts, and perform 48 hours of community service work while maintaining full-time employment. Should Bey fail to comply, he will go to jail in an institution.

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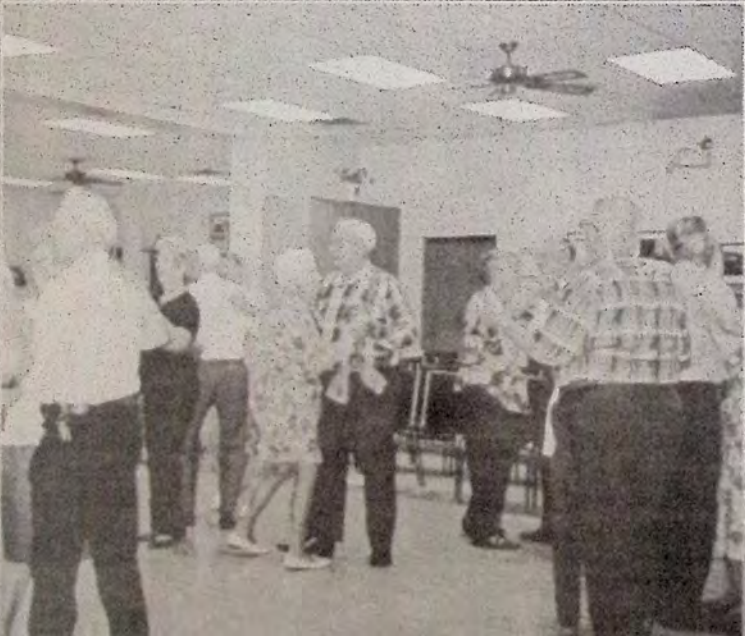


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





The Hopi Survival kit

(published by Stewart, Tabori and Chang, New York)

The astonishing thing about The Hopi Survival Kit is that it is written by a retired Lutheran pastor working hand-in-hand with a Hopi Elderly Elder (age 102 when the book was published).

Surprisingly, there is no conflict between the author's Christian viewpoint and the Hopi Traditionalist approach to the way the world is today. Both agree that we have gone about as far as we can go, short of self-destruction.

Hopi prophecies predict the end of the world "if" we humans do not change from within ourselves. The Hopi Survival Kit tells humans what they must do to change themselves so they can survive the end of the world, which is prophesied in their teachings in more detail than in the Bible under "Revelations".

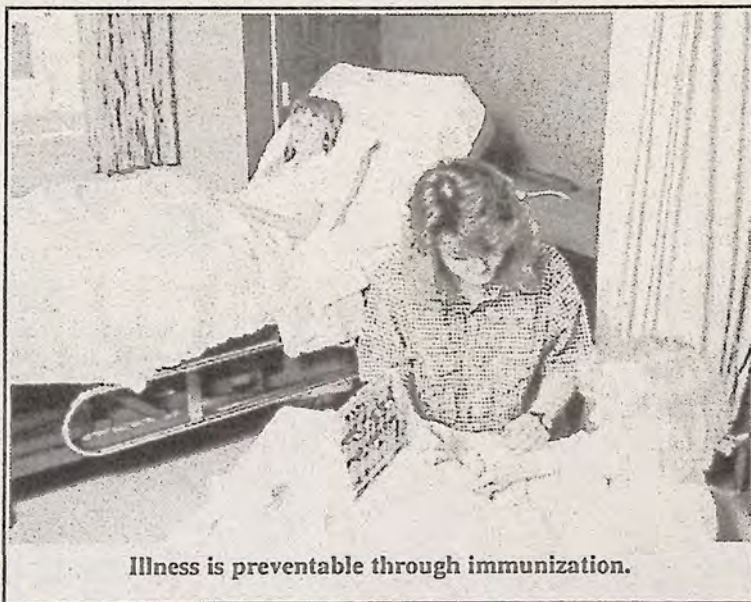
Thomas E. Mails first tells a great deal of Hopi history. This is an amazing history, because the Hopi are people of peace who were persecuted because they chose religious freedom under a Constitution that guaranteed religious freedom. The Hopi, who did not want modern utilities, are being coerced into accepting them, unlike our Hutterites, who also choose a simple way of life without modern amenities, and are given the freedom to follow that path without coercion. Hopi fathers were jailed when they refused to send their children to residential schools.

The Hopi Survival Kit is worth reading, if only to learn how far government will go to control and corrupt free people who seek a peaceful life, but there is much food for thought in the prophecies and the means to survive fulfillment of the prophecies. The Hopi Traditional Way says we can protect our children and grandchildren if we change our inner selves now. The secrets are revealed in The Hopi Survival Kit, and are too detailed to describe in a newspaper book review.

The Hopi Survival Kit is available through good book stores, but you may have to place an order and wait.

Driver found guilty

Prevent Hepatitis B

"Why should I consent to give my child the Hep B vaccine?"

A good question for parents to ask as there has been much controversy over this issue in recent times.

In 1998, UNICEF stated "immunizations are the world's greatest health bargain!"

Hepatitis B vaccine is included in this claim.

Consider the harmful effects of Hep B, the increasing rates of Hep B in B.C. at the time of initiating our provincial school immunization program and where we are now.

Hepatitis B is one of several viral infections that can affect the liver. Up to 10 per cent of people who contract this disease become chronic carriers. This means they feel healthy but still have the Hepatitis B virus in their systems and are able to pass the virus to other people. Eventually, because of the lingering (chronic) infection, the person develops liver disease or liver cancer, but this may take many years to appear.

In 1992, B.C. was experiencing rising rates of Hepatitis B, rates that were much higher than the

national average. In B.C. there were 16 new cases in 1980, 373 new cases in 1986, and 830 new cases in 1991. Most new cases were occurring in young adults. These statistics gave the impetus to begin the grade 6 Hepatitis B immunization program in B.C. schools in 1992.

In 1996, the number of Hep B cases began to decline. This decrease came on the heels of a number of interventions, including the grade 6 immunization program and increased efforts to target individuals in risk groups. As the grade 6 group moves into adulthood in the coming decade, a decrease in the rate of Hep B cases can be expected.

You can trade in drink boxes

As of October 1, drink boxes, flexible plastic pouches and gable tops will be added to the provincial deposit-refund program.

When the expanded beverage container program was implemented October 1, 1998, manufacturers of gable-top containers, drink boxes and plastic pouches were given a one-year extension to examine recycling solutions that would meet both industry's business requirements and government's environmental protection goals.

Gable-top containers, drink boxes and plastic pouches will be accepted for refund at all regular collection locations, including retail outlets of Encorp return depots in the same way as metal, glass or other plastic containers.

This measure excludes milk and milk substitute containers.

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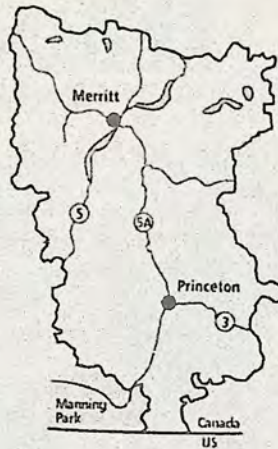

Bush talks back in Area 'B' report

by Bill Bush, Area B Director

In this report I would like to discuss the rumors concerning the threat of flooding this year, and make a few comments concerning the Long Term Care Facility, the Recreation Centre and the tax requisition for Area B.

I had predicted there would not be any flooding this year and I was right. In fact, the run-off was barely at normal levels. I find it is always easy to brag after the fact! However, the river peaked on May 25 behind my place and again came within inches about the middle of June. Thus the potential was there for some serious flooding had the weatherman not co-operated.

As for the rumors that we didn't have the same protection as in past years and that all I had to do was sign a paper with the Village and everything would be "taken care of" is simply not true. The provincial government has always had the responsibility to look after our interest in the case of an emergency. They do it under the auspices of the Provincial Emergency Program (PEP). Signing a mutual aid agreement with the Village of Keremeos is not an option either, as the RDOS does not have that power. I believe Village staff did not understand the difference between being a municipality and a regional district when it comes to emergencies.

Municipalities have to have an emergency plan, whereas regional districts are covered by PEP. Up to about the mid-90's, the municipalities received a small grant from the provincial government to have an emergency plan for their municipalities and surrounding areas. In the mid-90's, this

was discontinued. During the flooding of '97, the Village of Keremeos took on PEP's role again, the same role they have taken before. PEP had always reimbursed the Village for their costs. This time, because of provincial cutbacks, they paid all of the Village's costs except for a \$6,000 labour bill. Consequently, the Village taxpayers had to pick up the tab. The Village Council said "to heck with that", let PEP look after their own emergencies from now on! I don't blame Council for their decision. I would do the same.

This year, the contact person is the Minister of Highways and we have set up a plan of our own (Areas B and G). To me, this makes sense, as we then have more than one person knowledgeable in emergencies in the Lower Similkameen to work with the Ministry of Highways and PEP.

The other aspect of all this is if we had had a bylaw authorizing us to sign a mutual aid contract with the Village of Keremeos, we would have taken the financial and legal liability away from the province and placed it on RDOS. Then Area B would have had to pay the \$6m,000 bill and contribute to the cost of Keremeos' emergency plan annually.

I like the idea that the province is responsible, mainly because their resources are far greater than ours, and or, the Regional District. As for the Village, I thank them for their past help but, if I were a taxpayer in the Village, I would rather have my staff at home in case of an emergency instead of miles down the valley at somebody else's emergency.

If the Long Term Care facility becomes a reality, and there is a

good chance it will, there are a lot of people to thank. However, the two who have worked the hardest and longest are Roger Mayer and Walter Despot. They have put countless hours in on your behalf. Roger and Walter deserve a hearty "thank you."

I was disappointed in the response we got back from our survey for the Recreation Centre. There was only one game played in the racquetball courts this summer! Swimming, bowling and skating seem to be the activities of most interest and we will continue to provide for these areas.

The tax requisition for Area B has been fairly constant over the years. In fact, you may have noticed a slight decrease if any changes at all. The average house in Cawston is assessed at \$76,300, and would pay \$224 to Regional District. This does not include Okanagan Regional Library, School Board or provincial taxes. Some of you would pay even less because you do not pay fire protection or mosquito control. The Directors and staff of the Regional District have done an excellent job in being fiscally responsible.

Princeton's Eastern Star celebrates seventy-fifth anniversary

PRINCETON - Eastern Star celebrates a Diamond Anniversary. This charitable organization is 75 years old this week. On September 27, 1924, the Princeton chapter of Eastern Star was constituted with 24 charter members.

The original group met at the IOOF Hall, where the Leisure Inn is located now. Fourteen years later, the chapter moved its meetings to the present location, the Masonic Temple on Vermilion Avenue.

One of the longest-serving members was Branch Forsyth, who received her 65-year member pin in 1991. Jean Cook has been a member for 58 years. Margaret Stoneberg for 51 years. Mabel Burr for 58 years and Margaret Carrington for 54 years.

Princeton's Eastern Star members held positions of importance beyond the boundaries of their own small chapter. Sister Ethel Doerflinger was Grand Warder in 1928. Sister Eliza Jane Avery was Grand Organist in 1934 and Grand Electa in 1943. Sister Margaret Maywood was Grand Martha in 1954, and in 1960, Sister Ina Knowles served as Grand Adah. Grand Warder for 1969 was Sister Audrey Hamilton, and in 1975, Brother Hurd Cooper. Sister Gloria Stout was Grand Adah in 1979, and Sister Jean Cook served as Grand Esther in 1985. Sister Pat Follett was Grand Marshall in 1989.

Through the years, Princeton Sisters have served as Grand Representatives to other provinces and American states.

Eastern Star members have done outstanding community service during their history. Community work took on a world-wide nature during the Second World War, as Eastern Star members became supporters of the Red Cross, the War Services Fund, the Cenotaph Fund, Teen Town Canteen, blood donor clinics, the Queen

Alexandria Solarium in Victoria and the crippled children's home in Vancouver.

Locally, Star members began the cancer dressing project, and has made 23,700 bandages and shipped them to the B.C. Cancer Clinic or supplied them free of charge to local patients on a doctor's orders. This project was begun in 1946, and continues to this day. Longstanding members of the cancer dressing committee are Isobell McRae, Ann Mandich and Donna Currie.

In 1954, a further effort to assist in cancer research resulted in a committee to collect cancelled stamps, post cards, and later, computer paper and envelopes. A total of \$280,363 has been raised through these efforts of the past 45 years, and continues to this day. The money is used to buy bandage materials.

Scholarship funds and training funds are raised by Eastern Star on a province-wide basis, and locally, Eastern Star gives a bursary to a student graduating from Princeton Secondary School.
