• Kill explodes 'before our eyes' — Merritt Forest District tells media on Whipsaw tour

Merritt Forest District is a mountain pine beetle killing field. Kerry Grozier, Operations Manager for the district, describes the Similkameen watershed bug kill as a 'catastrophe.' The mountain pine beetle is out of control, and infected areas are expanding.

"The expansion is exploding before our eyes," Grozier told a media tour on September 30.

The tour took a route up Whipsaw Creek to 14 Mile Creek, then on to Sunday Summit. Bug kill was in evidence everywhere.

"What we're seeing is the beetle moving to higher elevations than before and attacking younger trees than before," Grozier told the group. Continued on Page 2.....

RCMP seize hit and run vehicle

Keremeos RCMP seized and are examining a vehicle they believe was involved in the hit and run death of Clarke Eustache Jr. of Ashnola Road, near Keremeos. The teenager was killed in the early morning hours of September 25 on Ashnola River Road, approximately 1.7 km. from the Red Bridge. He was pronounced dead at the scene. An autopsy confirmed he died as a result of injuries sustained in the accident. The matter is still under investigation.

Jury hears gruesome Hedley murder story

A jury hearing the trial of Terry Arnold in a Penticton courtroom last week heard the details of the murder of Christine Browne in 1991. Browne's remains were found near Nickel Plate road, near Hedley, and RCMP spent months trying to find a lead to the identity of the girl. She had left her parents' home in Kimberley, B.C. and was finally linked to the remains found in the Similkameen Valley.

Evidence revealed Arnold had confessed to an undercover police officer posing as a gang member. Arnold had been contacted in the Maritimes, and had told the undercover police about the murder to gain the "gang" trust. The confession was part of a five-week operation by police to convince Arnold he was working for a gang.

Arnold took the undercover police to the scene of the murder and told them he had wanted sex with the 15 year old Browne, who had obliged him a first time. He forced himself on her the second time, and she tried to run away. He caught her, he told police, struggled with her, then bashed her on the head with a rock.

Bands support Westbank logging

SIMILKAMEEN - On September 29, Lower Similkameen Indian Band (LSIB) Manager Dixon Terbasket said, on behalf of the LSIB, "We support Westbank First Nations on the political direction they took on extracting natural resources."

September 29, the Upper Similkameen Indian Band (USIB) released a similar statement--"As the Chief and Council of the Upper Similkameen Indian Band, we express our full support of the activities, Right and Jurisdiction of the Westbank First Nation Council, or any other First Nation to manage and harvest forest and all natural resources in their area of interest to meet their community's need as they have done since time immemorial."

The USIB statement explains there is "no such thing as Provincial Crown Land in B.C. until the Crown acquires it from Continued on page 2

On September 27, Princeton RCMP, South Okanagan Highway Patrol and B.C. Ambulance attended a single vehicle accident on Highway 3, four kilometres west of Manning Park Lodge.

The driver of the vehicle, 66 year old William Foote, fell asleep at the wheel, crossed the center line, and struck the concrete barrier on the opposite side. The truck rolled but landed upright. Foote and his wife were injured. They were taken to hospital in Hope.

the Indians as per the 1763 Royal Proclamation," and that, "as confirmed by the 1997 Supreme Court of Canada Delgamuukw decision," the "Indians' Title to that land and resources together with the Rights to use them for their communities' needs, have not been extinguished in B.C."

The USIB adds they "strongly believe in" sound environmental management, the sustainability of natural resources, and the "traditional relationship and spiritual bond between the natural resources being harvested and the Aboriginal People's daily life."

In a September 29 news release, the Ministry of Aboriginal Affairs states "the British Columbia Cabinet has given its approval for measures that would revitalize the existing B.C. treaty

process and ensure the Government of Canada contributes its fair share to make treaty negotiations work." The news release explains, "During the course of negotiations, the province has entered into interim arrangements that preserve land negotiating options by delaying resource extraction or other development on lands that are on the negotiating table, or provide medium-term resource and economic opportunities to the First Nations before final agreements are concluded."

A September 29 news release from Ministry of Forests states they "received communications" from the Westbank First Nation that they may be prepared to stop harvesting.

Ministry spokesperson Dave Hall is quoted as saying, "If true, this is a positive step forward and we hope other First Nations will follow this lead." Hall says if this a permanent cessation, it will also allow a meeting between the Westbank First Nation, the Province and the federal government to proceed September 30.

On September 29, Pauline Terbasket, Administrator for the Okanagan Nation Alliance in Westbank said, "Westbank themselves confirmed that they will respect the Court's ruling and will stop logging."

Terbasket added that all Interior Chiefs would be meeting on Friday, October 1, and would "make further statements on their plans."

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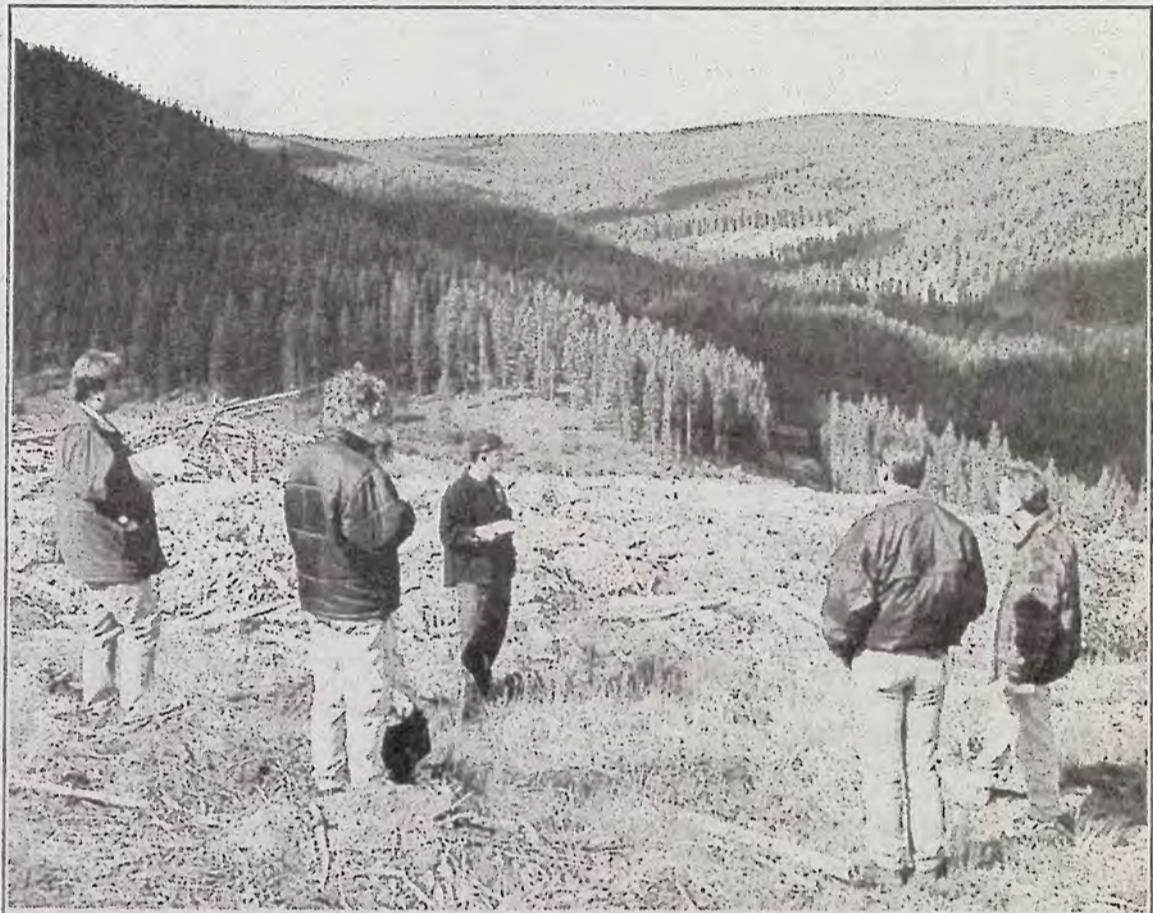

The major issue now, Grozier says, is to salvage as much usable timber as possible, for jobs and for the economic value to the province. The "uplift", as the extra logging is called, is necessary just as a salvage operation. All of the logging companies in the district are harvesting bug kill trees. Approximately 1.8 million cubic metres of wood is damaged, of which 200,000 is green timber. Grozier said the El Nino winter of 1997/98 and the hot summer in 1998 created ideal conditions for the mountain pine beetle. The other side of the equation is a forest full of mature trees, which are the most vulnerable to beetle attack. It was a recipe for disaster and the beetle population expanded beyond control.

"Our resources are strained to the limit," Grozier told the tour.

Two million cubic metres are being harvested, but that is half a million more than Merritt Forest District sawmills are capable of handling. The rest must go to mills outside the district.

To add to the stress on district personnel, they have been visited by Forest Watch, a brand of the Sierra Club, who are keeping an eye on what is happening here. Grozier said the Forest Service met with Forest Watch and explained why all the logging was necessary, but a report by Forest Watch has not been seen.

Planning, at this stage of the infestation, cannot keep up with the beetles, but there are a couple of positive factors in the larger picture. First, the long cool spring kept this years flight down (mature beetles fly away to attack a new stand and lay more eggs).

The larvae may not become well-established.

The second positive factor deals with the future of the forest. Where the trees have been logged, stands of young, healthy trees take the place of the over-mature timber. The age of the forest of the future will be staggered, rather than all one age as it is now. The young forest can resist beetle kill and has many positive environmental contributions.

The Forest Service goal is to maximize utilization of the wood before the trees have been dead too long, to control fire hazard, and at some point, try to slow down the beetle attack.

Chain Lake receives grant

Chain Lake Property Owners Association has been awarded a government grant worth \$2,250 from the Public Conservation Assistance Fund. The grant from the Ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks was awarded to clean a ditch of earth and gravel that had filled it as a result of a slide, and to clear willows and install culverts.

Chain Lake, northeast of Princeton on the road to Summerland, has received one of

15 grants awarded under funding for public conservation projects.

Minister Joan Sawicki announced the grant recipients on September 30, commenting, "these conservation projects encourage communities to protect fish and wildlife and introduce environmentally sustainable practices. By partnering with local people, our government is promoting a stewardship ethic as well as environmental benefits for local communities."

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**Community Services Society
marks year of home support cutbacks**

Princeton and District Community Services held its annual general meeting on September 27 and reviewed a year of considerable stress. The most outstanding stress was the result of government cutbacks to home support services. Over 1,000 hours were chopped, and no housecleaning services are allowed anymore, putting a lot of stress on some of the people receiving home support care.

Other factors, such as an aging population of developmentally impaired adults, puts other stresses on the organization, now in its twenty-sixth year of operation.

Some budgetary savings accrued during the year, most of which could be attributed to full occupancy at Vermilion Court, a residence built as a place where the elderly can enjoy independent living while having 24 hour a day care on site. Every apartment is rented, and demand for apartments continues strong.

The financial review, done by Cunliffe Schreurs Tupper, showed an \$18,000 drop in administrative costs and a reduction in funding of \$100,000, most of which came out of home support.

Mr. Schreurs, who delivered the financial report, commented, "This society uses its resources to the fullest. It runs itself very lean."

Schreurs pointed out that there is no cash reserve, and if other sources of funding dried up, the society would have no operating funds.

In closing, he added, "Princeton is fortunate to have a society that performs so many services for the community."

Community Service now has a disaster plan in place in case of a Y2K emergency, or any other major emergency situation. All of the facilities operated under the Community Service umbrella will be covered.

New directors were elected at the meeting: Jean Marlin, Albert Robinson, Torry Small and Dawn Johnson.

Fran LaBrasch received a pin for 20 years of service as an employee of the society. Edith Carlson received a 10-year pin.

Regional District defends rural ambulance service

SIMILKAMEEN - At its September 16 meeting, Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen (RDOS) endorsed a resolution that included their belief that "the continued loss of full time Ambulance Unit Chiefs within rural communities will return the provision of emergency pre-hospital medical services to pre-1974 conditions." The resolution explains that before the British Columbia Ambulance Service (BCAC) was created in 1974, pre-hospital medical services were "supplied by a mixture of commercial operators" where "standards were not uniformly observed, and effective patient care was often an afterthought."

The resolution contains the RDOS decisions to "urge the Minister of Health to re-examine the policy of not replacing full time Ambulance Unit Chiefs within communities that have

less than six hundred annual emergency calls," and to "implore the Minister of Health to reaffirm BCAC's commitment toward bridging the major regional disparities in both geography and population density that contribute to significant differences in the actual cost of providing ambulance service from region to region."

The RDOS resolution was in response to an August 19 letter from the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako to all B.C. Regional Districts about the fact that the Village of Valemount B.C. will be losing its full time unit chief, because their number of calls does not fit the Provincial criterion. The Bulkley-Nechako Regional District is concerned that this strict adherence to numbers ignores the other risks that rural communities face, such as distance from hospitals and airports, after hour physician avail-

ability, and the number of residents working in high risk occupation like forestry, mining, fishing etc., forcing them to place more reliance on BC Ambulance.

Keremeos has a part-time unit chief. When interviewed September 30, Princeton's full-time unit chief, Jim Fiske, could not give the exact number of calls Princeton area gets each year.

He said, "its difficult to tell" because, depending on staff availability, "a lot of transfers get done by other stations."

Celtic to folk to blues. They accompany their voices on a number of different instruments including the guitar, keyboard, banjo and penny whistle.

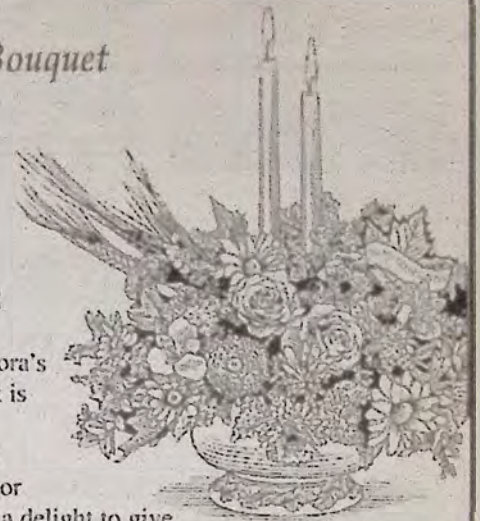

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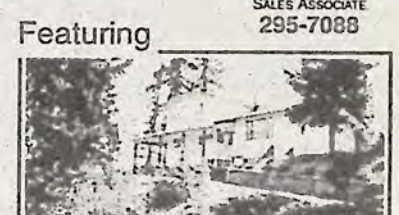

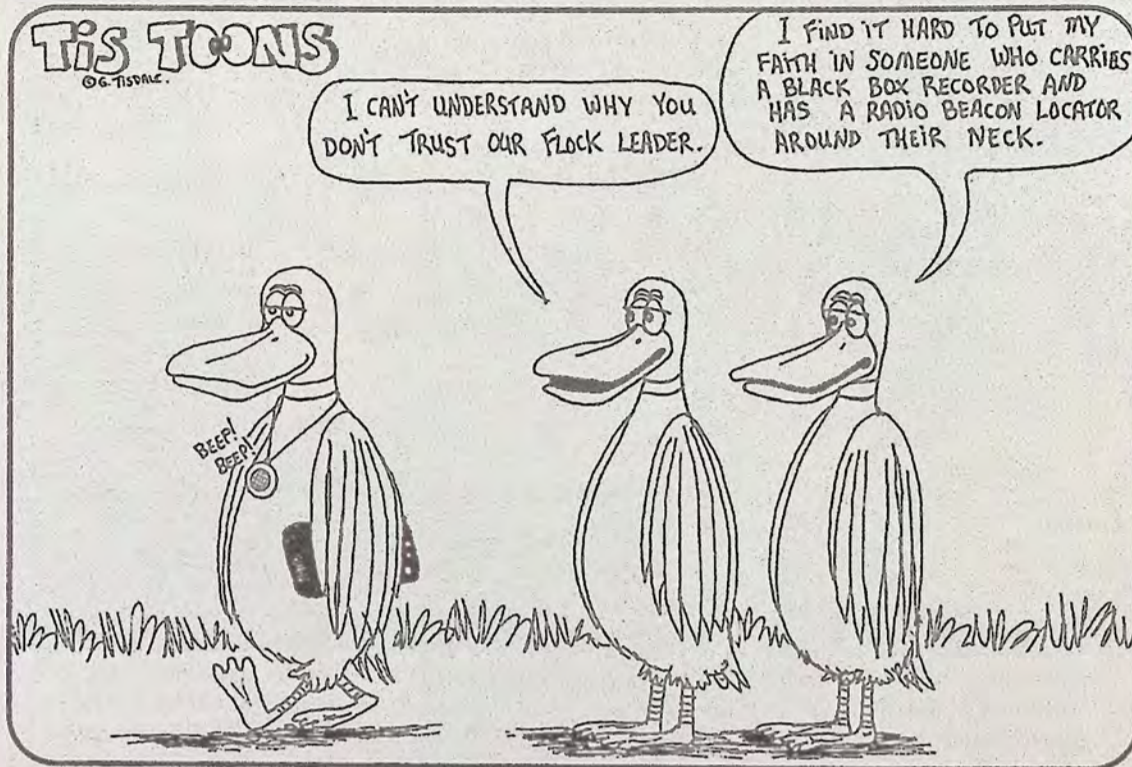

Year 2000 events slated for Okanagan

In April 2000, the giant British Columbia Book will travel through the Okanagan to Keremeos, Osoyoos, and points east and north. Everyone will be encouraged to write their name in the book.

After visiting the communities, pages will be left behind at local credit unions for people to continue signing. At the end of 2000, the British Columbia Book will be assembled and put on display in the Royal British Columbia Museum.

Keremeos welcomed thousands

KEREMEOS - The Keremeos and District Chamber of Commerce Info Centre greeted 3,012 parties of people, totalling 4,550 individuals, during summer 1999, from the end of May to early September. Funding would only allow the information centre to be open full time from June 27 to August 27, and part time before and after.

According to the monthly Chamber of Commerce reports to Keremeos Council, the main reason for visitor inquiries was general tourism. From May to the end of August, several thousand brochures were picked up or given out. There were a total of 17 inquiries about moving to or investing in Keremeos and district.

Ken Randle, who managed the centre this year, suggests that more local brochures, with more specific information are needed, because visitors make specific requests such as "Where can we get an ice cream cone?"

Randle says it seemed that the "lousy" weather at the beginning of the season slowed things down, but he adds it was a "really strange year." Days they expected to be busy were slow, and vice versa. He says the two local high school students they hired, Jamie Curr and Lana Agar, were "younger than we normally had, but I think they did an excellent job." The centre is funded by Keremeos Village, Regional District Area G, and the Provincial Government, and Randle says it will be open part time, "hopefully 'til Thanksgiving."

Ancient native man pre-dates Columbus

CHAMPAGNE, YUKON - The well-preserved remains of a hunter, found early this summer in Tatshenshini Alsek Park, have been dated at 550 years old, according to radiocarbon dating of the artifacts found with the body.

Culture Minister Ian Waddell commented, "This latest piece of information makes the Kwaday Dan Sinchi find just that much more interesting, particularly now that we know for sure the site dates back several centuries before the first known contact between First Nations and European culture."

Two samples, one from the hat and another from the cloak belong to the ancient person, were sent to a lab in Florida last month for radiocarbon dating. The lab found the material used to make the hat and the animal skins for the robe were harvest around the same time, somewhere between AD 1415 and AD 1445.

Human remains in a frozen state dating to pre-contact times are extremely rare, as are the associated artifacts made from organic materials.

A management team is developing a research strategy for the human remains, now in the care of the Royal British Columbia Museum in Victoria.

Pumpkin: it is good medicine

In this day of being conscious of weight, fibre, fat, and nutritional value, pumpkins are definitely worth knowing better. One cup of pumpkin will give you all of the vitamin A you need for a day, and then some. A pumpkin has little fat, and one cup is only 81 calories. Pumpkin contains calcium and plenty of fibre, as well as potassium and phosphorus and iron.

This is the time of year to make the most of pumpkins. They are not expensive, and do more for you than a head of lettuce or an apple. (We can include most yellow-flesh squash for high nutritional value.)

Thanksgiving is traditionally time for pumpkin pie, but some people feel guilty about enjoying more than a tiny slice. However, if you use a whipped topping made with that powdered stuff (no brand names) and skim milk, and if you leave the crust, pumpkin pie is loaded with lots of good things, but especially Vitamin A and calcium. Of course, it is loaded with calories from the sugar and eggs in the custard, but it is too good for you to pass it by.

The News Leader asked for pumpkin recipes for October, and Marg Eyre has obliged by sending us a pumpkin pie recipe. She describes it as a "mild, custard-like pie)

Marg's Pumpkin Pie

- 1 1/2 cup cooked or canned pumpkin
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1 tsp. salt

- 1/4 tsp. nutmeg
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 3 slightly beaten eggs
- 3/4 cup canned milk
- 1 cup milk

Blend pumpkin, sugar and spice. Add eggs and milk. Mix thoroughly, pour into a pastry-lined pie plate. Bake at 450°F. for 10 minutes. Lower heat to 325°F. for 50 minutes. Cool. Serve with whipped cream or whipped topping.

Thank you, Marg, for that easy-to-follow recipe. Marg added another recipe, for soup.

Pumpkin and Zucchini Soup

- 3 cups peeled and cubed pumpkin
- 3 cups cubed zucchini
- 2 medium potatoes, peeled and cubed
- 1 large onion, sliced
- 2 cups chicken stock
- 2 tbsp. vegetable oil
- 2 tbsp. fresh parsley, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 3/4 cup 2% milk
- 1 tsp. basil

In a large saucepan, combine first eight ingredients. Cover and simmer, stirring occasionally until vegetables are tender (about 45 minutes). If stock simmers down, add water to reach original level. In a food processor, blend or purée mixture in small batches and return to saucepan. Add milk and basil. Heat just to boiling. Serve at once. Garnish with a sprig of parsley or a mint leaf.

Who conquered them? What became of them? Nobody knows.

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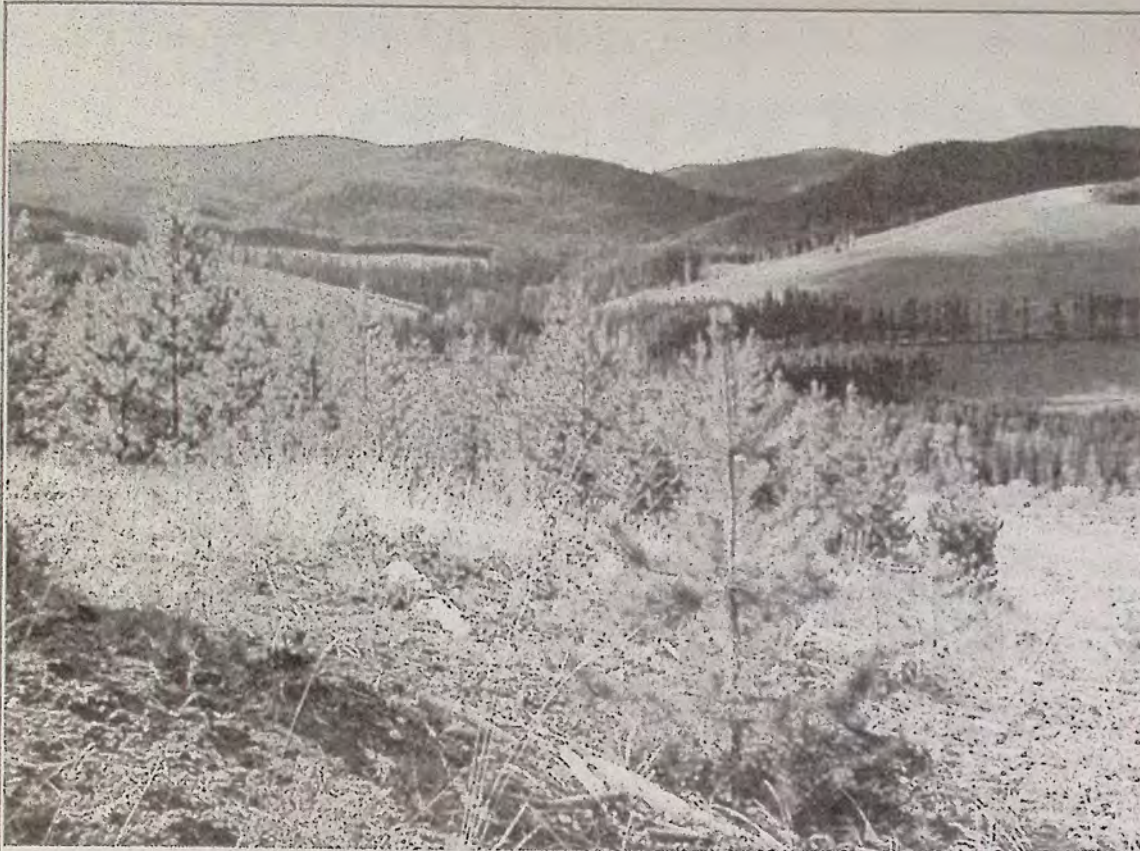

Town sign frustrates value-added manufacturer

PRINCETON - The sign on Highway 3 annoys David Isaacson. It tells him Princeton is a good place to invest, and encourages people to come to Princeton to start a business or industry. Isaacson, who arrived in July this year to start an industry, has found Princeton a hard place to start.

Isaacson has a company called Osprey Lake Manufacturing. It is affiliated with Kozy Kabins U.S.A., located in Sacramento, California. Isaacson makes custom wood furniture and post and beam cabin structures. He knows where his market is, and he knows where his wood supply is. His market is in exports, and the wood is, for the most part, in slash piles slated for burning.

Isaacson has won awards for design and for utilizing wood nobody else wants. He started in Hope, B.C. after being injured in a logging accident. His products are environmentally friendly and qualify for certification. Forest Renewal B.C. held a contest for design and utilization of 'waste' wood to produce value-added wood products. Isaacson won a first for his region and a third in the province.

He admits he has had some bad luck with investors in the past. In a partnership with some Chinese immigrants, he was left holding the proverbial bag while they went back to China with the money. However, he knows he can make the company work, and he knows he can employ people, if he can just raise some capital. He is trying to obtain backing from Community Futures, and he is trying to find a building.

What has discouraged and frustrated him most is Town Council. He made a presentation to Council in a private meeting, and

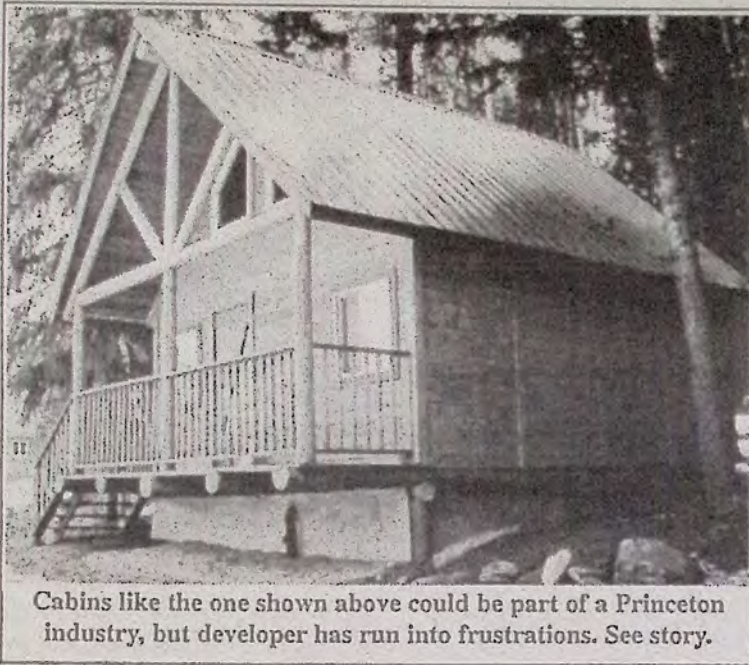
The steel reinforced door and frame resisted all efforts by the would-be criminal(s). Princeton RCMP note that sometimes a bit of extra reinforcement pays off.

Police investigate Tulameen dog poisonings

Princeton RCMP are currently investigating the poisoning of five dogs in the Tulameen area. One dog died. The dogs appear to have eaten "warfarin", a rat poison. It is unknown whether the poisoning was accidental or deliberate.

Affected dogs will look ill, they will vomit and have diarrhea, and they will drool. The drool may contain flecks of blood. Hair loss may also be evident. If you suspect any poisoning, the dog should be taken immediately to a

veterinarian. It is suggested that if you are using poison, do it in a safe manner to ensure the safety not only of animals, but small children.

Police would like to remind people living in rural areas that, under the Livestock Protection Act, allowing your dogs to run at large is an offense.

Anyone having any information regarding the dog poisonings is asked to call 295-6911, Princeton RCMP detachment.

Diversified markets saved B.C. last year

B.C.'s more widely diversified markets helped the province keep the decline in its total exports to 2.5 per cent in 1998 despite a 25 per cent drop in exports to Japan because of that country's stalled economy, says Employment and Investment Minister Mike Farnworth.

"This downturn was not as severe as the ones in the early 80s, when exports dropped about eight per cent, and in 1990 and 1991, when they fell by 9.2 per cent and 8.7 per cent respectively," said

Farnworth. "Our export markets are now more widely diversified than those of most other Canadian provinces and we are encouraging further diversification to ensure

our regional economies are strong, dynamic and resilient to cyclical swings. For instance, our value-added exports last year accounted for 22 per cent of our total exports, providing a higher return on our resource inputs and stable, higher-paying jobs."

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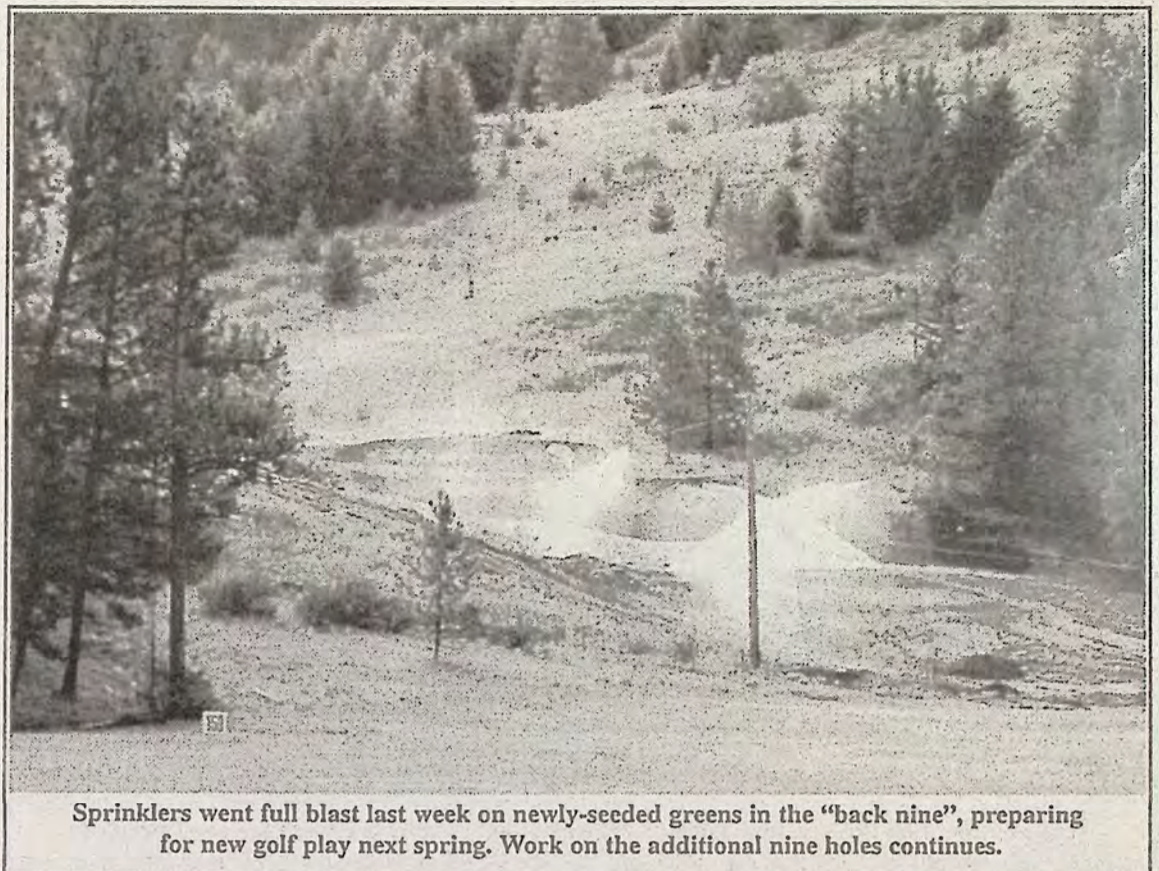
