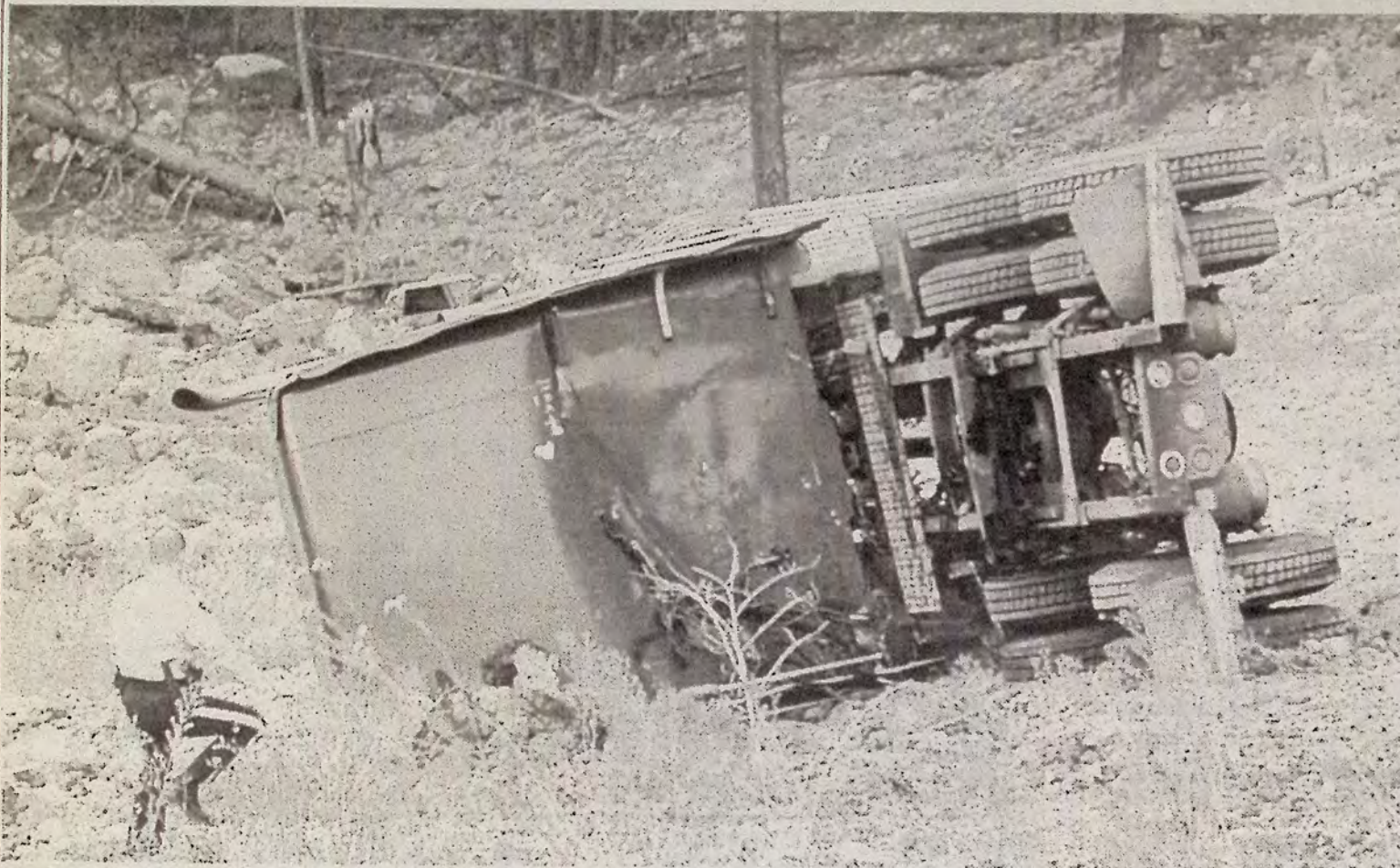


Mystery truck found at CopperCreek

Councillors - Kathy Clement, George Elliott, Lorne Esselink, Keith Olsen and Dan Sulentic have filed nomination papers as candidates for the four Councillor seats on Town Council.

Chairman outlines Regional District concerns

SIMILKAMEEN - In two recent interviews, October 6 and 13, Regional District (RDOS) Board Chairman Roger Mayer outlined some current and future RDOS concerns.

Mayer says he didn't realize "it would take quite this long" to complete the Health Centre construction. He says planners have shortlisted the contractors for the project, have received the final working drawings, and received

approval to go to tender. He says "We're in the process of preparing the documents. We will be shipping them out on October 20. We give contractors four weeks to review the plans and come back with bid prices."

For Olalla, Mayer says, "We are seeking nominations for four commissioners to run the Olalla Community Water system. (see article on Olalla Community Commission)

For Hedley, Mayer says, "We

need to get Candorado to finish the reclamation of their mining operation and the tailing piles within the Hedley area."

Mayer wants to see the Keremeos and District Landfill relocated. RDOS owns a 66 acre parcel west of Keremeos. Hydrological studies are required and the Lower Similkameen Indian Band has identified

Grandstand roof too high

Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) met on October 12 and learned from Councillor George Armstrong that it is unlikely the grandstand roof will be fixed before spring. Armstrong told the members that the single bid in response to the Town's tender was far too high to be affordable, and other ways of achieving the needed repairs will be looked at, but not before spring.

In the meantime, Councillor Armstrong recommended that the PXA remove snow from the roof as required to prevent any further stress.

A Princeton husband and wife team, Carol Esselink and Jim Hardin, plan to run a 42.2 km. marathon in San Jose, California on October 31.

Carol jokes, "Jim is dressing up as Marathon Man."

The Silicon Valley Marathon is one of the flattest courses in the United States. It drew 8,000 people in 1998.

This is Carol's fourth marathon. She started running nine years ago "to keep up with Jim." Jim was a competitor in Iron Man races.

She and Jim begin training eight weeks prior to the marathon, running for one hour four to five times per week, and a 20 km. run on Sundays. Their longest run was 30 km. on October 10. Carol takes vitamin supplements while in training.

Carol does a marathon only once in two years.

"It's like being in labour," she wisecracks, "It takes two years to forget the pain."

She and Jim will fly to California the day before the marathon and pick up their entry folders.

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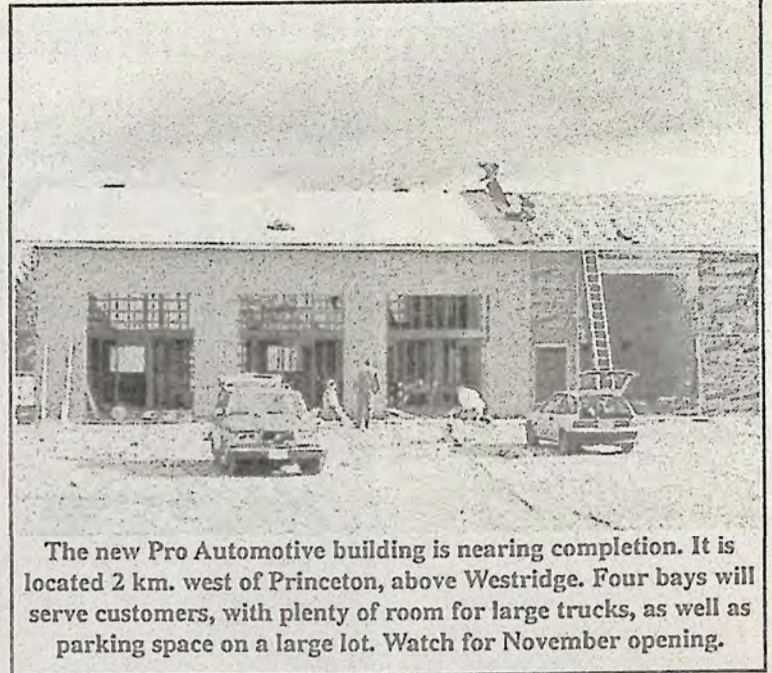

Barbara was born with a learning disability. She attended school for a number of years in Fernie, then moved to Tranquille, where she lived in a dormitory for a few years, then in her own room.

When Community Services offered her a different life, she checked it out for a week, then moved. She has never been sorry she came to Princeton.

Barbara was very shy when she first arrived. She worked at the Mini Chef, took reading and writing classes there, and gradually worked her way into waitressing, a job she loved. When the Mini Chef closed, she missed her customers, who had become her friends. She now volunteers at Vermillion Court three days a week, helping kitchen and cleaning staff, and she enjoys the work. Barbara joined a church after she moved to Princeton, and has many friends in the congregation.

From a shy person who did not talk to others, Barbara has become an outgoing woman with lots of friends. She is a changed person, and she believes it is because she is happy. Since coming to Princeton, she took her first airplane ride, and went to Disneyland with the Mini Chef crew.

"I had a great time," Barbara says, with a big smile.

She belongs to New Beginnings, where she does art work, plays bingo and has fun.

As she sees others grow older and less able, Barbara hopes there will be a place for her in Princeton.

Paul Gabriel's story is very different from Barbara's. He was born and raised in Princeton. He was a normal child at birth, but a series of seizures and convulsions left him with a learning disability. Paul remembers the seizures, and says they were "very scary."

Paul stayed with his parents and attended school, right through Grade 12. At age 19, he moved to Mary Anne Apartments.

Being part of the community is what Paul's life is about. He is a member of the Elks lodge, works with a men's group through Community Services, and is the

top (35 homes) carrier for Similkameen News Leader. He is a top bowler, and loves riding his bicycle, often on weekend trips

with Backroads Bike Club. He took karate, as he likes anything athletic. He keeps in touch with his family and travels with them.

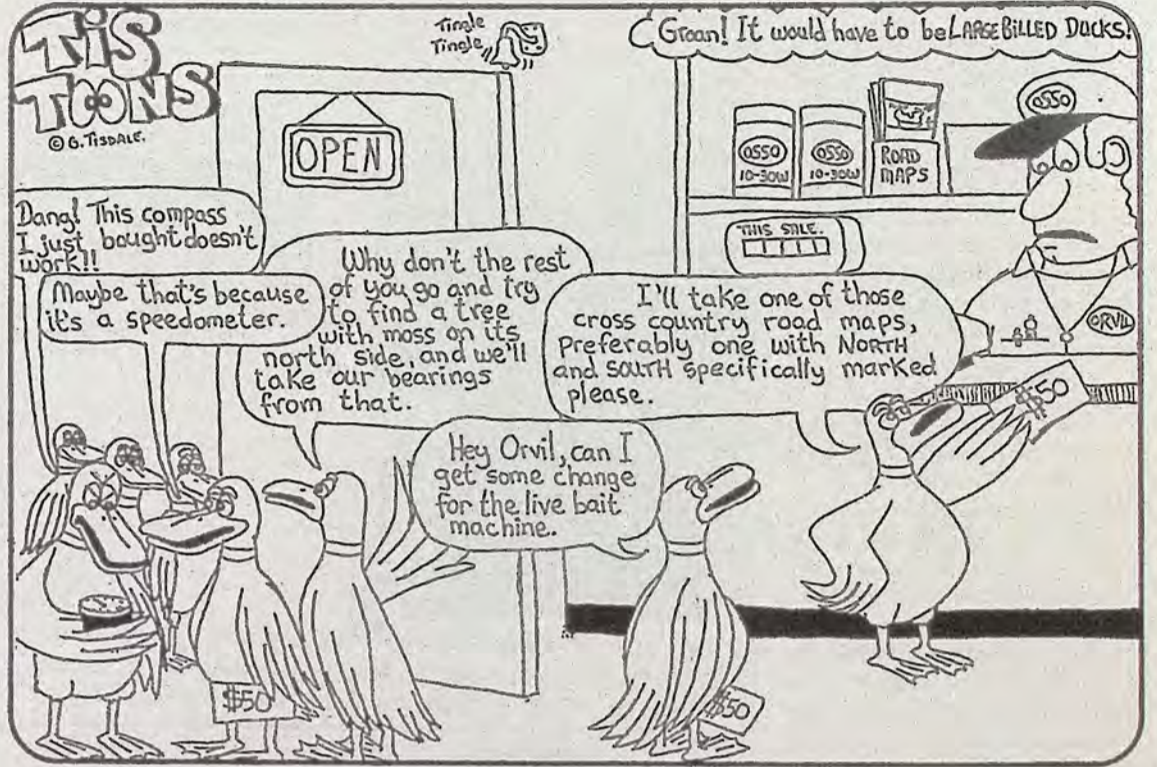
The race for municipal councils in the valley should make November 20 an interesting day at the polls. New government will take over, and we will be watching with the anticipation that goes with new blood in local government.

Bill C-80 undermines food and drug safety in Canada

Dear Editor:

Last April, Bill C-80, the Canada Food Safety and Inspection Act, was quietly introduced in the House of Commons. Don't be fooled by its name. Bill C-80 is actually aimed at dismantling the Food and Drugs Act which is Canada's charter of rights to protect our citizens against foods and drugs dangerous to our health.

Bill C-80 places the mandate to administer and enforce food safety into the hands of the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA). This agency has the mandate to promote biotechnology like genetically engineered foods, to promote food production and to promote trade. The CFIA has a policy of voluntary compliance and non-enforcement of regulations.

Canadian beef is banned in Europe; their research provided evidence that it is laced with cancer-causing hormones. Some European countries ban genetically engineered Canadian canola. Yet the CFIA claims that biotech food is safe even though "adverse effects are likely to be irreversible."

Would you, could you, trust the CFIA which has such a policy and record to take potentially harmful foods off the market when produced by chemical giants like Monsanto or one of the giant pharmaceutical corporations?

Not only that: Bill C-80 eliminates the mandate of the Minister of Health to administer and

enforce food safety regulations, to conduct end-products inspections and investigate food poisonings. Under Bill C-80, the minister will no longer have that responsibility.

Furthermore, Bill C-80 requires proof of harm that any food "is injurious to health" before it can be taken off the market. Under the Food and Drug Act, the manufacturer must demonstrate a product is safe. Bill C-80 reverses the burden of proof. This gives legal protection to companies who do, or may, produce

dangerous foods or drugs.

To make matters worse, 183 food inspectors have been laid off. The government says the food industry can be trusted to regulate itself.

This dismemberment of Canada's food safety program must be stopped.

Schools have changed

If you had attended Princeton Secondary School in your past, and saw on TV news serious race problems now exist there, including violence using machetes and pipes, it would leave you very distraught. This is not the case in Princeton but it is at Vancouver Technical High, which made an impact on me.

Starting in 1944, many families moved from Copper Mountain to the Coast. The war was winding down and miners were no longer frozen to their jobs. So it was with our family and I moved from a very small school, grades 1 - 12, perhaps 150 students, to Vancouver Tech, said to be about 1,000 boys. The girls school of 300 or so was separate.

Van Tech was a premium public

school providing all academic subjects plus all types of shops, from setting type for news printing to motor mechanics. Some of the Army were in training there.

The day started with reporting to home room for roll call, then marching, two by two, to the auditorium, where Principal and staff gave a Bible reading and we recited the Lord's prayer. We would march to each class in the same manner, then stand beside our desks until the instructor said "Good morning, boys." He would then tell us to "be seated." If this wasn't done in a satisfactory manner, we would have to repeat it until it was. We were always addressed by our last names, and always

Schools continued from page 6 addressed the instructor as "Mr." or "Sir."

If anyone was seen smoking on the way to school, he was in trouble. If a student misbehaved, he would be required to go to the front of the class, bend over a desk, and get a few whacks with the metre stick (that's how we learned the metric system). If you were talking with your classmate instead of paying attention, both would be called up to the front and the boys would have to administer the metre stick to each other.

Sometimes, if there was a fight, the boys would have to settle it with boxing gloves in the gym. In severe cases, a student could be sent to the Principal's office for the strap. This was very rare.

Because of the war, the entire school was in Air Cadets as part of our curriculum. It was quite a sight to see them on the parade square or march past.

Our principal became the first principal of B.C.I.T. and our home room teacher, Mr. Dean Gord, also became a B.C.I.T. principal.

There was a spiritual moral code and discipline, which taught responsibility and accountability. We had excellent instructors. A good teacher, like a neighbour or friend, is priceless. Perhaps our code of conduct is outdated by today's standards, but we never had to worry about machetes or pipes.

Pearce says the funds raised will provide the facility with more and newer equipment, "especially in the diagnostic, laboratory and physiotherapy areas." The funding will also provide new furniture for the common rooms and home support services, and equipment and furnishings for patient rooms to develop a more homelike setting for bedridden patients.

Pearce presented a 6 minute video to Council that included a statement from Walter Despot, Health Centre Building Project Committee Chairman. The video stressed the need for bedridden

patients to be close to family and home, "to share meal times, lonely nights, and special occasions." Pearce says the South Similkameen is the "only area of its size in British Columbia without a residential care facility."

He says, "At last, we will be able to maintain our citizens in our own community."

The foundation's public campaign will last until April, and will include canvassing area people. To encourage and recognize large financial commitments, the foundation offers several "naming opportunities," such as a \$100,000 donation to name the building, or a \$10,000 donation to name a patient room.

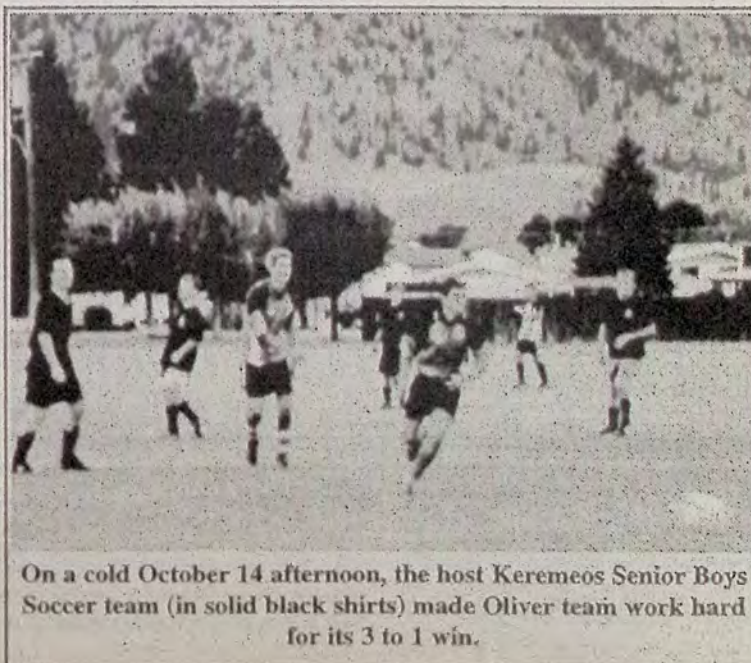
She said the plants "would have to have water for a month to get them established."

He was not objecting, just surprised. He had no idea B.C. had different climates.

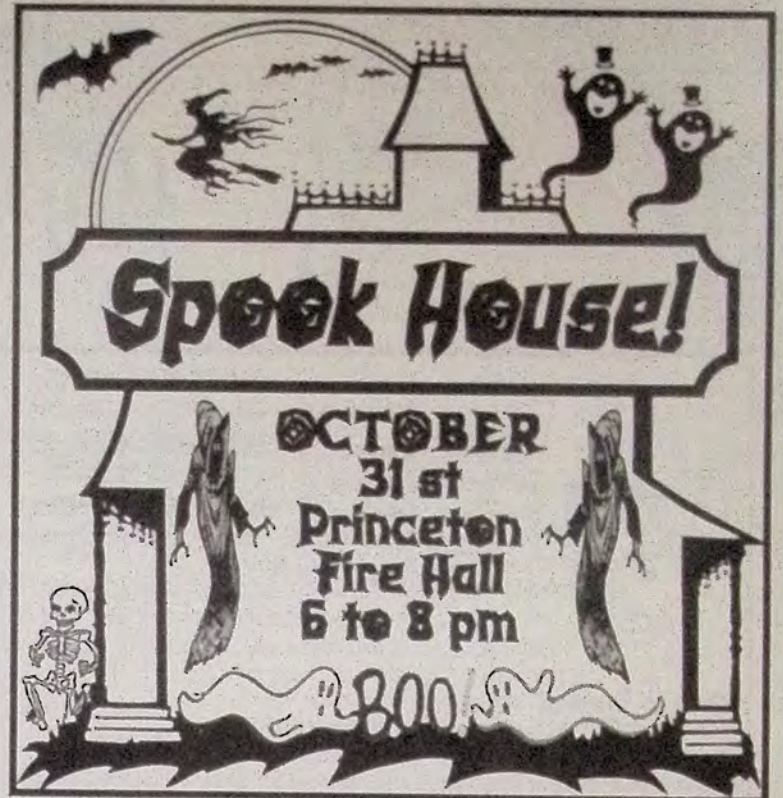
When he left here, Paine was on his way to Vancouver Island. He will leave October 31, and hopes

to come back to B.C. for another trip in the future, including the Rockies in his itinerary next time.

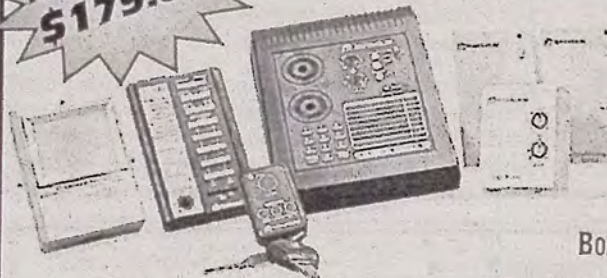
He found prices in B.C. "reasonable", and has enjoyed his overnight camping and backroad bicycle tour.

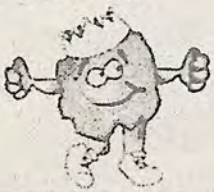

Hi! I'm Peter the Plug and this is my friend Professor Meter. We're here to tell you about electricity - where it comes from how we use it and how we measure it. Let's start by asking:

What is Energy?

Energy is what makes things work. Every minute of every day we use energy in one way or another. When you ride your bicycle, you're using your own physical energy to turn the pedals. Whenever your dad or mom drive the family car, they're using the energy in gasoline. When you turn on a light, you're using electric energy.



There are two types of energy:

Renewable

Renewable energy comes from resources which will always be with us. Some renewable energy resources are water, sun and wind.

Non-renewable

Energy resources that we will eventually use up are non-renewable. Non-renewable energy resources include coal, oil and natural gas.

Non-renewable energy resources are created over millions of years from the remains of animals and plants. The gasoline your parents use when driving your family car will take millions of years to replace.

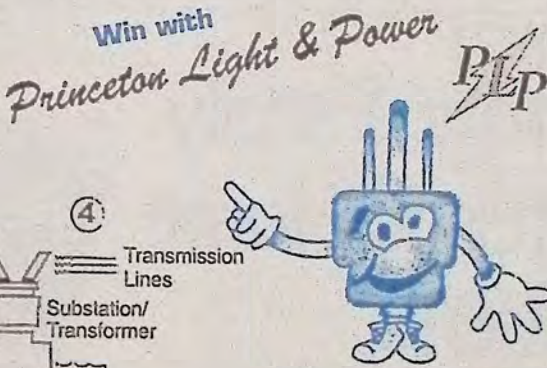
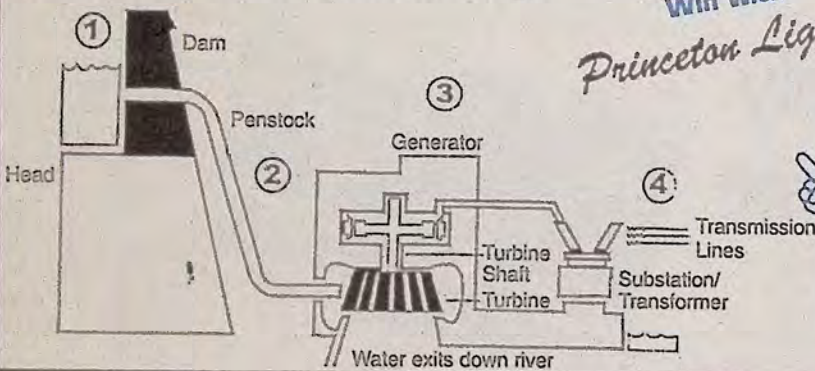
Hydro Electricity (hydro means water)

Water is used to generate most of the electric power in B.C. A very small amount is also generated from wind, natural gas, diesel and other resources.

Hydro electric plants use the energy in rivers, a renewable resource, to generate electricity.

1. A large amount of water is held by a dam in a reservoir.
2. Rapidly moving water is directed through tunnels to turn turbine blades, creating mechanical energy.

3. The mechanical energy is then turned into electric energy by a generator.
4. The electricity is transported to your home or farm through high-voltage transmission lines. (Those big metal towers).
5. Smaller distribution lines carry the electricity throughout your home or farm buildings to electrical outlets.



Just How Much Electricity Do Things Use?

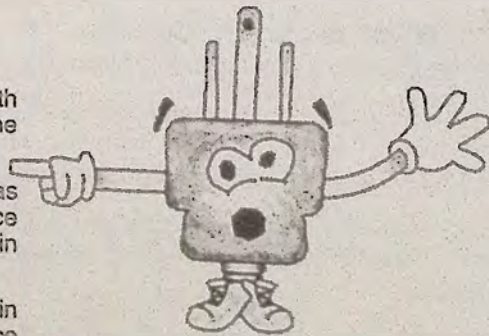
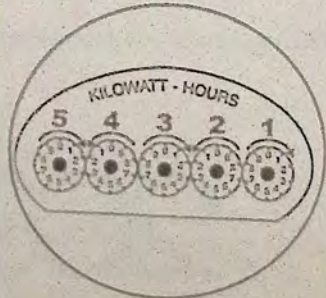
Cars and appliances have one thing in common - they both need energy to work. A car uses the energy in gasoline while an appliance uses electric energy.

The amount of gasoline a car uses is measured by a gas pump in litres. The amount of electric energy an appliance uses is measured by the energy meter in your home in kilowatt-hours.

Just as the speed of a car at a point in time is measured in kilometres per hour, the amount of electricity an appliance needs to work is measured in watts or kilowatts (1 kilowatt = 1,000 watts) and is called wattage. Every electrical appliance has a nameplate which indicates wattage (how many watts of electricity it uses) of the appliance.

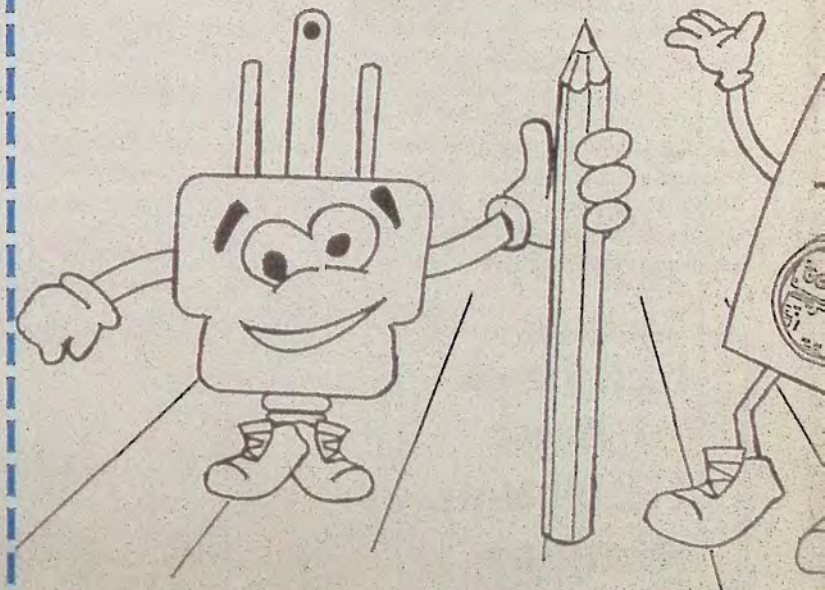

We know that large cars use more fuel than small cars. Well, as a refrigerator, uses more electricity than a small appliance, like a television. To find out how much electricity an appliance uses, multiply the wattage by the length of time it operates. For example, a 100 watt appliance operating for 10 hours, it consumes: 100 watts x 10 hours = 1,000 watt hours.

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Pastor meets only friendly people

PRINCETON - Pastor Peter Rytkonen (pronounced right-ko-nen), his wife Linda, and daughter Jennifer have moved to their new home and Peter has begun his first pastorate at Princeton Baptist Church.

The 38 year old new pastor began life in southern Ontario where his family had a vineyard. He went to university in Ontario to study chemistry, then went into the wine industry as a laboratory technician doing quality control. In 1990, he was transferred to the Okanagan.

Hope Princeton Highway: A Century of History

**Excerpts from The Similkameen Star
September 26, 1900**

Mr. Denis Murphy, MPP, is paying his promised visit to Princeton after his labors at the last session of the provincial parliament. He rode in from Hope, B.C., accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. James Anderson and Mr. George Aldous. Mr. Murphy had a most enjoyable trip, the day and arriving in Princeton in time for dinner on Wednesday evening. He was very enthusiastic about the feasibility of building a good wagon road from Hope to Princeton. He says it will be ten times easier to build a road to the Similkameen than it was to build the old Cariboo road. Grades are much easier and the snowfall evidently much lighter and of shorter duration than that on the road to Cariboo.

In speaking of the twenty-five miles of road already constructed from Hope, Mr. Murphy is of the opinion that from \$3,000 to \$5,000 will be sufficient to put it in first class condition. He was surprised to find the grade from the summit to Princeton such as gradual descent and easy to build. Mr. Jas. Hislop, PLS, who is now engaged in surveying the road, is finding no difficulty in keeping the grades down to the maximum point allowed by the government, viz., 10 per cent. The work is progressing rapidly and the survey of the section from the summit down to the end of the old road will be completed early next week.

The probable cost of completing a good road between Hope and Princeton is estimated at \$40,000. This amount will build a good serviceable road, allowing

freighters to load up to their full capacity.

The Pacific coast merchants seem to be slow to realize the benefits they will naturally derive from the construction of the Hope road. Although they have had the matter thoroughly explained to them and comparisons drawn with their experience of the development of the Kootenays, they are still holding off in their

usual lukewarm style, contenting themselves with the remark, "Oh yes! we think the road is a necessary one." Vancouver, Victoria and New Westminster have shown little or no energy in building up the southern section of the province and it is only after it is too late the coast cities will make a spasmodic effort to get the trade they might have had, but which was allowed to slip through their fingers.

Monday, June 8, 1936

Assurance that the Hope-Princeton road construction will continue was given at the banquet tendered to the visiting Vancouver Board of Trade party at Penticton on Saturday.

Mr. Charles H. Tupper, MLA for Similkameen disclosed that he had written assurance from Premier Pattullo himself that the task discarded by the Department of National Defense would be taken over, with a strong possibility that the work will be put on a much more satisfactory basis.

He added that this had been confirmed by Hon. S.F. McPherson, Minister of Public Works on the occasion of his visit to the Okanagan Thursday.

Princeton delegates, with the full
April 23, 1942

support of Penticton, went to the feast armed to the eyes to stage mortal combat for the highway, but folded their weapons discreetly and did not press for any pledge of Vancouver's support after hearing Mr. Tupper.

They did however, put in some useful missionary work for the road, with Mr. Gibson the principal speaker.

The Vancouver men visited Oliver and Summerland earlier in the day and were much impressed.

About 95 sat down to the repast in the Incola Hotel. The Princeton delegation comprised Messrs. S.R. Gibson, J.D. Saunders, E.E. Burr and (Rev.) J.C. Goodfellow.

USIB develops Mascot strategy

by Laurel Arnold

HEDLEY - Upper Similkameen Band (USIB) Manager Philippe Batini says the Band is "developing a strategy" for Hedley Mascot Mine in response to a recent USIB requested, provincially contracted, safety inspector's report. Batini says the USIB wanted the inspection done early, instead of waiting until the day before opening.

The report revealed safety and other issues that the inspector said needed to be dealt with. Batini says some of the inspector's requests, like removing all stones from the mountainside, and bringing power to all the buildings could be "very expensive" and may be "unreasonable."

Batini says the USIB team "is not giving up." They work on the Hedley Mascot project every day and hope to be working "til the snow flies."

Public safety concerns and unexpected setbacks will delay helicopter tours until next year. Batini says the helicopter company is "really interested" in the project and has already helped bring lumber to the site. Materials are usually brought to the site on people's backs.

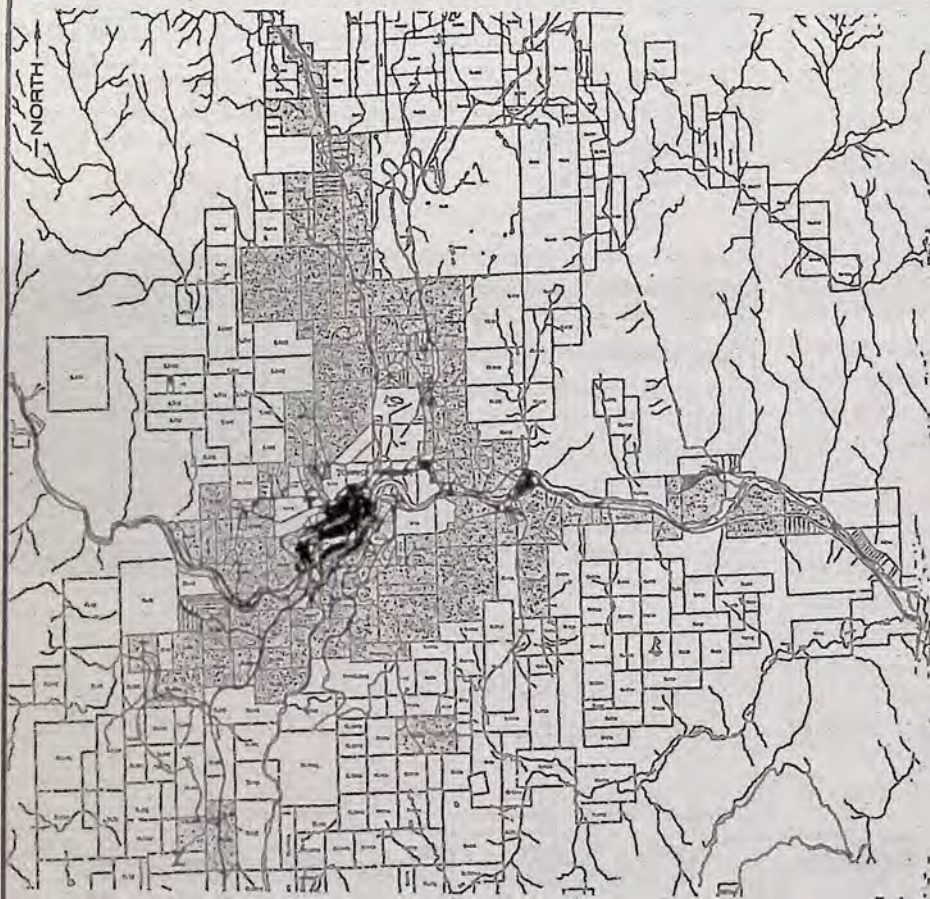

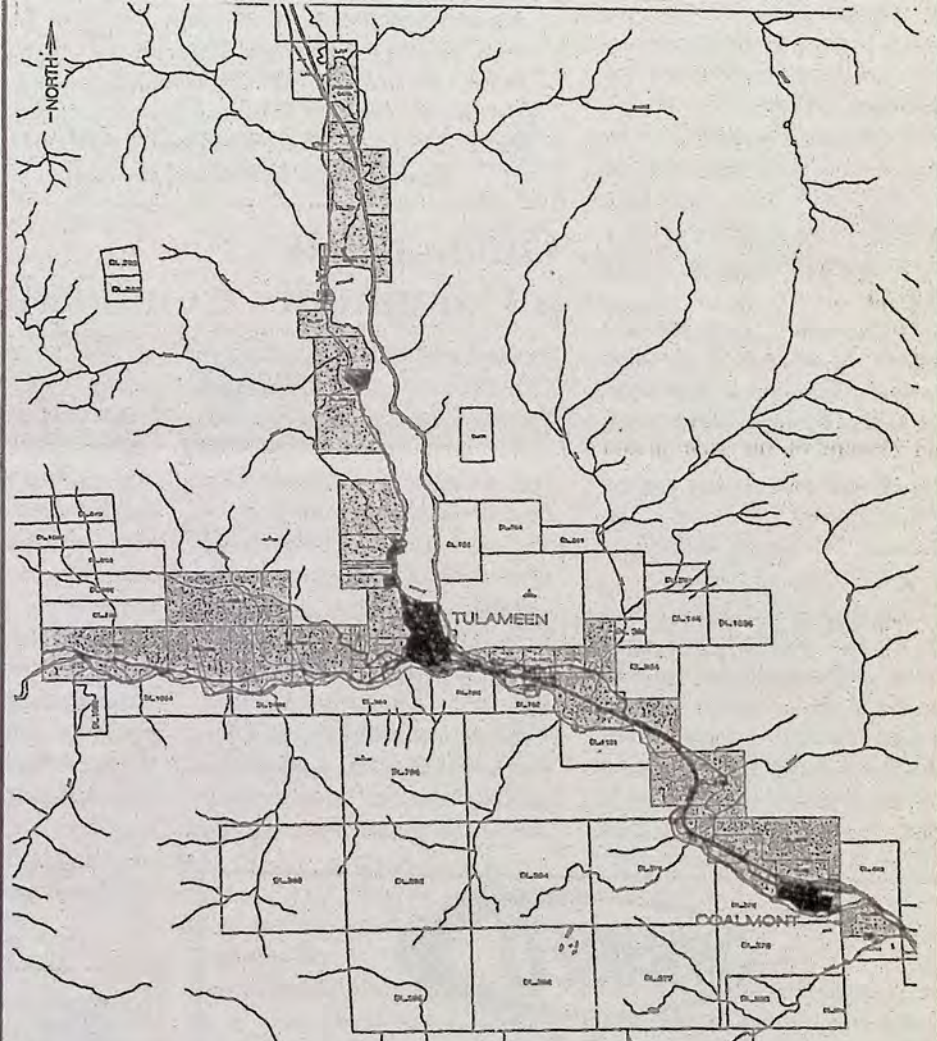

They live good lives with a little help from a whole town of friends

PRINCETON - B.C.'s provincial government has proclaimed October is Community Living Month. Princeton and District Community Services Society is celebrating the achievements of people with developmental disabilities and the contribution they make to their neighbourhood, workplace and community.

Community Service Administrator Joyce Fraser says, "With the media's attention on several of our people, it is our hope that their efforts will promote greater recognition and understanding of this often invisible and misunderstood population."

The key purpose of Community Living, Fraser explains, is to empower and support people with disabilities as valued, contributing citizens in inclusive communities.

Community Services Society was a pioneer agency breaking new ground in the early 1970s, instrumental in bringing developmentally impaired persons to Princeton.

Prior to coming to Princeton, they were housed in institutions. Institutionalization of persons with disabilities began in B.C. more than 100 years ago with the creation of Woodlands. Tranquille in Kamloops was the first institution to close its doors in 1985.

"With our agency's visionary ideals and caring, we were 10 years ahead of the down-sizing and closure of the first institution," Fraser says.

The newcomers were provided with residential living in Mary Anne Apartments Level 1 and Mary Anne Court Level 2. Each resident has a private suite, life skills are taught and all amenities are provided between the two programs. Funding of support services are done by contracting with the Ministry For Children and Families.

The very popular "Mini Chef Restaurant" employed the new Princeton residents.

"We gained national recognition with this innovative and unique program," Fraser recalls. "It gave our people a purpose and made a meaningful contribution to the community. Our adults are like anyone else, but they need a little help."

The Mini Chef workers soon learned the job, with a little help, and customers learned to appreciate the individuality of the people

who served them. The Mini Chef employees made many friends who saw them as people first, and like the Community Services staff, came to value the uniqueness of each individual, respecting their strengths, gifts and talents.

"We have seen many miracles in the lives of our people and former clients, some who have secured jobs, married, and live a normal life," Fraser says.

For the past 25 years, many members of the staff have been advocates for their clients. Innovative programs were developed to meet client's needs, from life skills, self help, recreation and skill enhancement, volunteer opportunities and transportation. New Beginnings Day Program met needs of people retiring from their jobs at the Mini Chef.

Princeton became "home town" to those people who left institutions to become part of the community. Thanks to their jobs at the Mini Chef, they soon became part of the community, greeting people on the street and being greeted in return. In many ways, the community included them in the fabric of community life, and people adopted a protective attitude toward the new residents.

Today, for many of the first to leave the institutional environment, aging has become a problem.

Fraser describes the situation. "We are now facing a major dilemma as they age and can no longer cope with stressful situations such as deteriorating health, accessibility, inability to prepare meals, do shopping, laundry, and so on. Of the 14 clients under our care, many were institutionalized and warehoused. They age very quickly, starting around 50, because of the medication, treatment and lifestyle. It is being called a "national emergency" because the federal government is the missing partner."

True community living must include care in old age as well as in earlier years.

"Our agency will continue to explore options that will provide the next level of supported housing and care to maintain their independence in this wonderful community," Fraser asserts.

Fraser credits the many people in Princeton who reached out in friendship, acceptance and love.

"This has added to their quality of life, which is second to none," Fraser states.

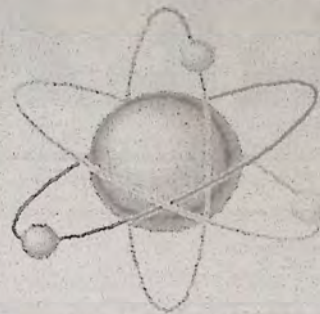



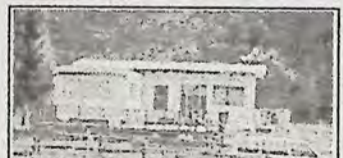
