SIMILKAMEEN - Deputy Chief Election Officer Barb Gould has officially declared Randy McLean elected as Mayor of the Town of Princeton by acclamation.

School trustees Gordon Comeau, Ken Heuser, and Robert Westran have been declared elected by acclamation.

Candidates for the four seats as Councillors for the Town of Princeton are Lorne Esselink, George Elliott, Dan Sulentic, Kathy Clement and Keith Olsen. Those elected will serve a three year term.

Advance poll is on November 10 at Town Hall. General voting day will be November 20, at Town Hall.

Area H: Karl Newholm, Chief Election Officer for Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen has declared Gerri Logan elected as Area H Director by acclamation.

Area G: Roger Mayer has been declared elected as Area G Director by acclamation.

Local area must raise \$100,000 for Lodge expansion

PRINCETON - At the October 25 Community Health Advisory Committee meeting, Administrator Dorothy Cobb announced the Ridgewood Lodge expansion is about to go to tender. The details will be taken care of over the winter and construction should begin next spring.

Cobb advised there must be a major campaign to provide equipment for Ridgewood. The community would have to raise \$100,000. She said the Foundation would do some of the fundraising in a Spring Gala.

Jean Haugland suggest groups could do fundraising. She requested a "wish list" be made available to groups.

Cobb said it is too soon to make the list public.

In other Advisory Committee matters, members plan to sponsor a 'health fair' in early spring. This fair would bring together the various types of health care available in the community, and offer an opportunity to the public to see and discuss concerns with providers. Two members will attend a similar fair in the Okanagan before working out details for the local fair. They are looking for ideas.

In addition, they hope to attract others to serving on the Community Health Advisory Committee. At this time, the committee has two vacancies, and even after advertising, nobody expressed interest.

TransCanada Trail

Lali visits trail crew at work site

PRINCETON - Yale-Lillooet MLA Harry Lali planned a visit to a work site near Jura on November 1. A TransCanada Trail work crew has been building the trail on the old Kettle Valley Railway right of way through a partnership between the provincial Environment Youth Team, Human Resources Development Canada and the Trails Society of B.C.

A second crew is working at Otter Valley, near Tulameen, B.C. Two other crews are working at

Naramata, near Penticton, and Trout Creek, near Summerland. Crews at Kettle Valley and Okanagan Highlands have already completed work for the season.

In total, the E-team has employed

36 young people in the Thompson-Okanagan area. The jobs are part of a provincewide \$10.75 million Youth Options B.C. jobs program delivered by the Ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks.

will be held November 20, from 12:00 noon to 4:00 p.m., and the November 22 Election day will take place from 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.. A swearing-in ceremony will follow on November 23 at 11:00 a.m. in the LSIB office.

Voters lists are posted at the Cawston Store, Chopaka Church, Keremeos Post Office and the LSIB Office. Eligible voters are registered Band members who are 19 years old as of October 20, 1999. The Electoral Officer is Lillian Gottfriedson and the Returning Officer is Tamara Peterson.

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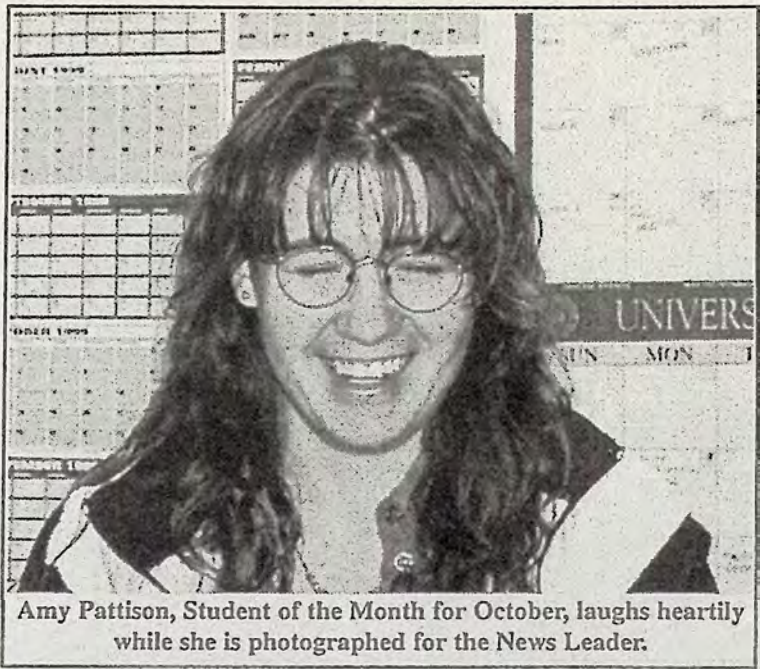

**Pattison named "Student of the Month"**

PRINCETON - Amy Pattison, a Grade 12 student at Princeton Secondary School, has been named Student of the Month for October.

Students can be nominated by a fellow student, a teacher, or a member of the community (just fill out a form at the school). Recognition is given for something exceptional or an accumulation of better than average actions.

The selection team consists of Principal Stoochnoff, a teacher, a student and a parent. The Student

of the Month award is sponsored by the Parent Advisory Committee, who will present the student with a gift.

Stoochnoff describes Pattison as "a super student" who tutors other students, is involved in sports, takes difficult courses, and is starting a school store selling gym strip, pens and other items. Pattison is noted for "working behind the scenes", Stoochnoff says. He was pleased to see that others had noticed her efforts and nominated her.

**An aspirin a day, right?**

In 1988, medical researchers studied a small group of men who were at high risk for heart attacks. They found that taking daily doses of aspirin could cut the number of heart attacks in half.

But, they also found the same dosage of daily aspirin caused the men to suffer more strokes. Because of that sometimes fatal "side effect" - plus the limited size of the study group - the researchers warned that patients should NOT start taking aspirin to prevent heart disease.

The day after the study was published in the Journal of American

Medical Association, the aspirin makers flooded the media with press releases saying "an aspirin a day" could prevent heart attacks. Now, for more than a decade, people have swallowed the pills every day in the misguided belief they were safeguarding their cardiac health.

However, instead of making them healthier, the aspirins are increasing their risk of stroke and serious gastrointestinal damage as well as numerous other potential side effects. Recently, researchers reviewed sixteen controlled studies and found more evidence that the so-called "aspirin therapy" increases the risk of brain hemorrhages, also known as hemorrhagic stroke which accounts for 15% of all strokes.

The research showed that, although aspirin lowered the risk for heart attack by about 32%, it increased the risk for hemorrhagic stroke by 84%.

Previous research into the dangers of aspirin in the U.S. has also shown that 1600 children die each year from allergic reactions to aspirin. Also, patients with blockage of arteries in the brain are three times more likely to have a stroke if they are taking aspirin. Dyspepsia and gastrointestinal hemorrhage occur in 31% of those taking 300 mg of aspirin per day. Other side effects include anemia, bleeding ulcers, confusion, and dizziness and numerous other problems.

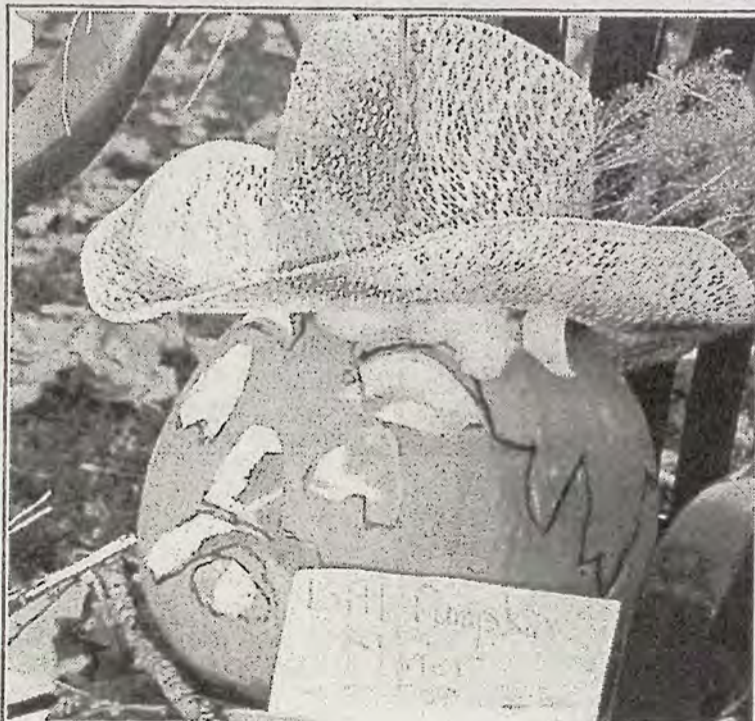

### We have new hope for fighting cancer

During the past two months, announcements have been made that will change how we see cancer. Medical researchers found that breast cancer, cancer of the cervix and some cancers of the penis are caused by a virus. This adds to the list begun by Japanese researchers who identified a virus as the cause of one kind of leukemia. Researchers are working on a vaccine for at least one of these infections.

Until a vaccine becomes commonplace, we can change our attitude about cancer and how to fight it, as well as how to prevent it. In years to come, we may see our present attitude as primitive as saying lepers had leprosy because they were evil. When we know it is a virus that causes cancer, we know we can fight it, and we know we have the disease because a "germ" infected us, not because we did not live right.

We know we can fight cancer virus because our bodies fight viruses all the time. The common cold is one of those viruses, so is influenza. Both are unpleasant, but we know our immune systems can fight these viruses if we take good care of ourselves.

We may have to face the fact that our lifestyles may make our immune systems weaker than they should be, but there are many ways to strengthen our immune systems. That is our first defense against cancer.

Our second defense is attitude. The knowledge that we are fighting just one more virus can give us the confidence to fight back and win. A positive attitude, rather than hopelessness and despair, makes a tremendous difference in the fight against any disease. There are medications and vitamins that fight viruses. They will make a difference until a vaccine is available.

### Liberals question Attorney General on rifle range rules

Dear Mr. Attorney;

I am writing regarding your news release of October 21, calling on the federal government to postpone the December 1 implementation of your Ministry's new shooting range guidelines.

I am confused as to why you are calling on the federal government to delay guidelines that were drafted by your Ministry's Chief Firearms Office and are within your jurisdiction as Attorney General to suspend. These are provincial guidelines and impose requirements that

appear to far exceed the general criteria specified in the federal Firearms Act Regulations for the provincial approval of shooting ranges. Moreover, in some respects, these requirements appear to bear no relationship to any reasonable sense of threat to public safety.

I would note that you have made no attempt to publicly defend or discuss your Ministry's new guidelines with the shooting

ranges that will be adversely affected by them. I would further note that I have still not received a reply to my letter of September 9, requesting that you immediately halt the implementation of these guidelines.

Many of these clubs are run by volunteers, enjoy tremendous safety records, and simply do not have enough time or money to

budget was \$85,000. In fact, Area H paid \$53,700 of that budget. On a fair share basis again, the Town overcharged Area H by \$11,000. The Town has always been the owner and sole management of the facility. Council has refused to hear any constructive input from Area H. You state you may start charging a tipping fee if Area H doesn't provide more money. Please do. Area H can then save the current portion of its budget and leave the Town to cover all closing costs, which will be in excess of \$250,000 on its own. Your tipping fee had better be at market, because we do have the option of shipping elsewhere. This would, of course, eliminate the need for the Area H director to attempt to change the completely incompetent management of the facility by the Council.

You, of course, kept very quiet at your press conference about the

arena. Again, Area H is bearing the brunt of the costs and even though the facility is paid off this year, you want Area H to continue to pay for a non-existent mortgage so the Town can continue to get a free ride on its recreation program. If you feel the new Area H Director will roll over and let you continue to take advantage of Area H, think again. We will be watching and reviewing every negotiation and will demand the Direct act in every case in the best interests of Area H. Far from getting more money to squander without accountability, you have made it very obvious that the referendums should fail and that no money should be budgeted for use by the Town without complete oversight and input from Area H. **KEREMEOS** - About 150 people witnessed the South Similkameen Health Centre sod-turning at 2:00 p.m. on October 23, marking the official beginning of the facility's long-awaited construction. Before Regional District Chairman Roger Mayer and possible Health Centre resident Catherine Learn lifted the first shovel of dirt, and during the course of several short speeches given under a tent erected for the ceremony, Ken Jaggert, President of the South Okanagan Similkameen Health Services Foudation announced that \$400,000 of the one million dollar miracle goal for equipment and furnishings "was surpassed as of today."

MLA Bill Barisoff brought greetings from the Legislative Assembly, congratulated all those who worked "extremely hard to make this happen," and said the "real credit" goes to the people of the Keremeos area.

Ellen McCrae, Vice-Chair of the Okanagan Similkameen Health Regional Board, said "this is a pure demonstration of what a community working together can achieve."

Walter Despot, Chairman of the Health Centre Building Committee, explained that they will open contract tenders on November 18 for the building, and construction should take about 12 months.

Despot said, "I think we've had at least 100 people involved in the project over the years." Among those he mentioned were Frances Peck, Ellen Dyke, and Eugene Deschamps who serve with him on a local steering committee that administers and assist with fundraising in the Similkameen in conjunction with the

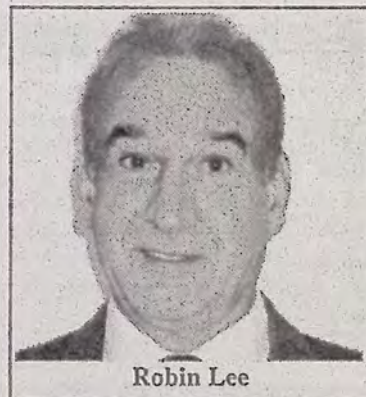


Catherine Learn, left, and Roger Mayer turn first sod.

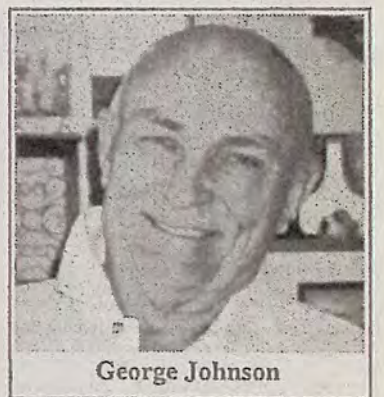

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# Why seniors should "blast" the flu bug

Public Health Nurses in the Okanagan Similkameen Health Region are preparing to give over 30,000 flu shots during the month of November. More than 3/4 of these injections will be given to seniors. I would like to focus on why seniors should blast the flu bug.

Influenza - 'the flu' - is a very contagious virus that infests the lungs. It is easily caught and easily spread. Headache, chills, fever, dry cough and muscle aches are its main symptoms. Full recovery can take up to six weeks. While most people recover, the real threat from flu comes when it wears down the body's resistance, leaving the person vulnerable to other infections.

If you are 65 years old, it is likely your immune system is weaker than it once was. That makes you more likely to end up with the number one complication of influenza - pneumonia. Every year more than 1,000 Canadians die as a result of the flu. Seniors with chronic heart, lung or kidney disease, or suffering from diabetes, cancer or anemia, are especially at risk.

guard against flu, giving you up to 70 per cent protection. A flu shot reduces the seriousness of the disease should you contract it. The vaccine starts to provide protection two weeks after it is given. The effects of the vaccine last for about four months before they start to wear off. Flu season generally strikes from December to March. If you have a flu shot in November, it will provide you with the protection you need to cover the whole season.

Each year the World Health Organization identifies the strains of flu the new vaccine must protect against. This year the vaccine

will protect you against the A/Sydney, A/Beijing and B/Yamanashi strains. The vaccine does not contain live virus and therefore cannot give you the flu. Less than one third of people experience mild soreness at the injection site. One in ten people experience headache and muscle pains which can last for one or two days.

There are so many reasons why it makes sense for seniors to have an annual flu vaccination. Talk to your doctor or public health nurse if you have any questions. Contact your local Health Unit for clinic times and dates.

**Survey shows OUC grads  
are satisfied with degree programs**

The second annual survey of OUC graduates shows that more are finding jobs sooner, that location is less an issue in selecting OUC than it used to be and that nine out of 10 grads ranked the value of their education (in terms of an investment) as good, very good, or exceptional.

"These surveys are extremely valuable in helping us assess strengths and weaknesses," says Ken Burt, director of OUC's Institutional Research and Planning office. "With the second one now complete, we can start to examine trends and see how attitudes and outcomes are changing from year to year."

This year, 342 questionnaires were mailed to graduating degree students; 120 were returned. "A 35 per cent response rates is very good for this type of survey," says Burt. "It shows that the graduates are interested in telling us how we're doing."

The survey and results were compiled and analyzed with the help of Dr. Jim Small, an expert in higher education research and an emeritus professor at the University of Alberta.

One of the questions asked on the survey probed the issue of why students choose to come to OUC. In rank order, the important or very important reasons are the availability of programs (96.7 per cent), the quality of instruc-

tion (95.8 per cent), the cost of tuition (90.8 per cent), living expenses and class size (80.7 per cent each). More than three-quarters of the graduates (76.5 per cent) said institutional reputation was an important or very important reason for attending OUC - more than the number who said location was important or very important (67.5 per cent). Last year, location was the highest-ranked influencing factor.

"What this tells us is that students are coming to OUC not just because it's the closest post-secondary institution, but for other important reasons," says Burt.

Another important element of the survey focused on student satisfaction. What OUC found was that graduates were satisfied with their programs and courses, and that the highest levels of satisfaction were expressed in areas that relate to instructors' attitudes toward students and teaching responsibilities.

An impressive increase in graduate satisfaction is to be found in academic counselling: this year, 55.5 per cent said they were moderately or very satisfied with counselling. Last year, only 17.1 per cent rated the counselling as good or very good. OUC grads also seem to be making better connections with the work world than they did the previous year, says Burt. The survey shows that

69 per cent of students had secured a job at graduation and that 62 per cent said the jobs were clearly related to their studies. The 1998 survey showed 59 per cent with jobs at graduation, with 56 per cent saying the jobs were related to their students.

"It's interesting to note that nearly half - 49 per cent - of the graduates that responded felt that their expectations of the degree programs had been exceeded," says Burt. "Another 32 per cent felt their experience had met their expectations. Sixty-five per cent felt that their education had been a very good to exceptional investment, and another 26 per cent ranked the investment as good. That means 91 per cent of our degree program students are graduating OUC thinking they've spent their money wisely."

"The results of this survey, considered in conjunction with some of our other initiatives, suggest that the university college is moving in the right direction in terms of addressing student satisfaction issues," says OUC President Katy Bindon.

"The survey also reiterates the importance of teaching and instructors to how an institution is viewed by the people it serves. Our faculty has reason to find pride in these survey results."

## Moose hunters lose out again!

Moose hunters planning their annual trip to the Cariboo-Chilcotin will have to either look elsewhere for their moose hunting opportunities or take up golfing unless they were lucky enough to be drawn for the few authorizations made available. In a surprise last minute move. The BC Wildlife Branch cancelled the open bull moose season throughout Region 5 and adopted a full Limited Entry only bull moose hunting season with no opportunities for general open season hunters. The decision was based on surveys which revealed that Williams Lake Wildlife staff have been unable to reverse the decline in the bull to cow moose ratio since it first became problematical five or six years ago. This should not be surprising since the Williams Lake Region set bull moose hunting seasons for the past several years which focussed entirely on bulls including both limited entry and post rut general open seasons. Heavy harvests of bull and lower than average calf recruitment have resulted in a steady decline in bulls as well as the population in general.

A recent review of moose management in the province proved that limited entry antlerless and any-bull seasons combined with general open seasons for spike-forks and calves as practiced in the Omineca Region meets the test of sustainability for the harvest and the moose population and hunter opportunity. The Cariboo-Chilcotin Region Wildlife staff were aware of the success of the Omineca Region's moose management strategy yet decided to try a different strategy - one which by their own admission has resulted in overcrowded hunting conditions and further over harvesting of bull moose.

The Provincial Wildlife Harvest identify immature bulls. Information from the adjacent regions where spike-fork regulations have been in place for a number of years show that these fears are unfounded. Although those regions experienced start-up problems while hunters learned to identify immature bulls, hunters have become educated and very few of the larger bulls are now killed mistakenly.

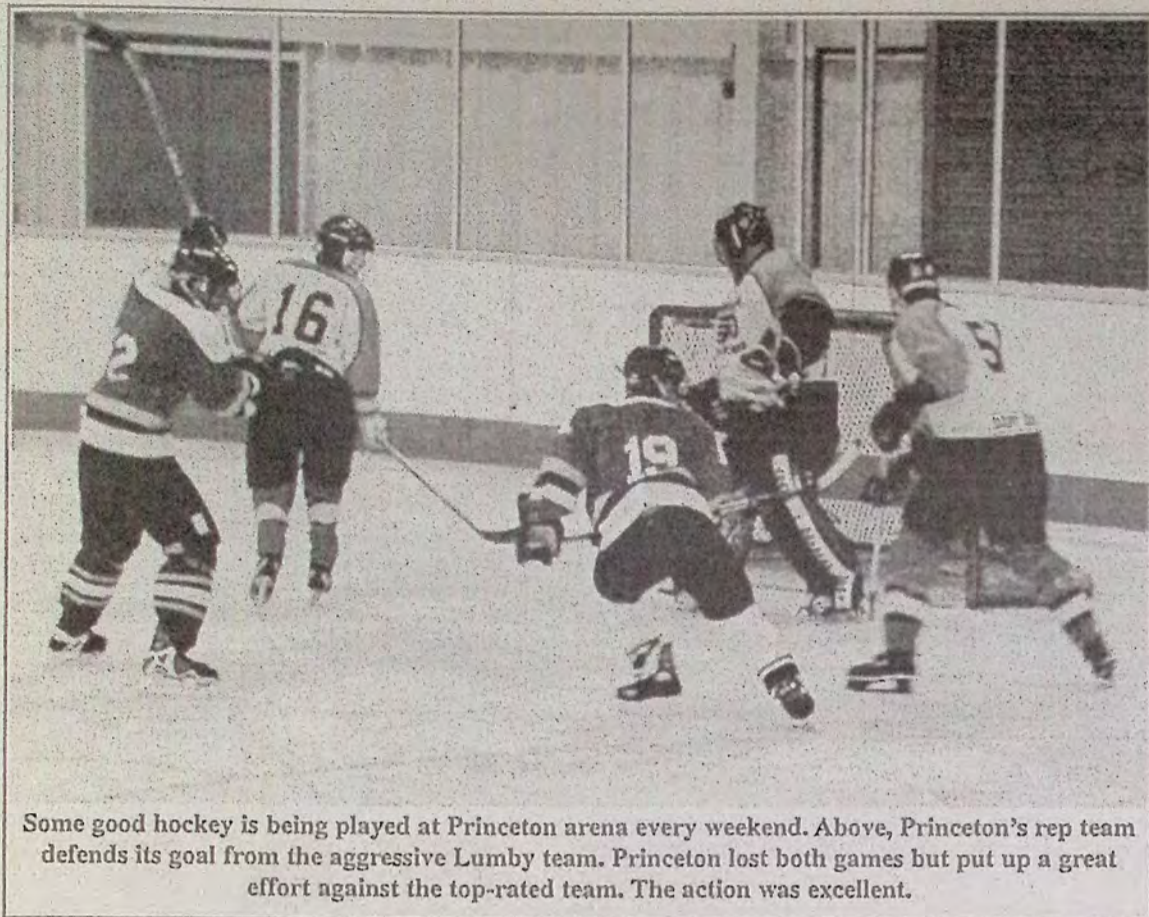
The situation is more complicated by the steady erosion over the

past three or four years of the province's wildlife management capabilities. Strapped for management funds for such routine monitoring activities such as winter aerial surveys and suffering the loss of experienced wildlife management staff, the Wildlife Branch has become increasingly more conservative when setting seasons. Without reliable data, and facing increasing criticism from hunters and anti-hunters alike hunting seasons are being closed or put entirely on males-only limited entry throughout the province. To make matters worse, habitat enhancement projects which might increase the stocks of big game populations including moose are nearly non-existent in the cash strapped Wildlife Program. The results speak for themselves - and now the province's moose hunters are once again paying by losing more hunting opportunities.
