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Village buys Diagnostic Centre

KEREMEOS - Village Council announced November 5 that it has agreed, by unanimous Council resolution, to purchase Keremeos Diagnostic and Treatment Centre from the Okanagan Similkameen Regional Hospital District for \$330,700. Payment for the D & T Centre will be spread over three years, using funds from the Village operating account's accumulated surplus, which, with careful management, including residential tax reduction, will have grown from \$140,000 in 1996 to an estimated \$410,000 by the end of 1999.

This purchase will not only be an aquired asset for the Village. It will benefit the Regional Hospital District responsible for building the new Health Centre.

Mayor Stranart says sufficient funds for future sewer extension will come from the Sewer Development Cost Charges (DCC) trust fund.

Stranart says, "The timing of the purchase was really outside our

There is a heated debate going on in the News Leader this week as a result of an open letter to Mayor Randy McLean from Area H resident Ed Muckle. The subject was two referendum notices which appeared in the newspaper and surprised Muckle, and a press conference held by Mayor McLean regarding the Town's need for more money from Area H residents for the landfill and fire protection.

Muckle's letter stirred up a great deal of controversy. This week, the News Leader has two long letters, one from Regional Director Linda Allison and the other from Mayor McLean. Both present what they see as the truth, in an effort to refute some of Muckle's statements. There is another letter from Muckle to the editor this week, which is likely to raise hackles in more than one quarter.

Area H residents will have an opportunity to learn more about the issues in a meeting at the arena mezzanine on Saturday, when the referenda will be explained.

Councillor candidates talk to public

The five candidates for four Councillor positions for the Town of Princeton talked to the public on November 4. Princeton and District Chamber of Commerce hosted the open forum at the Community Skills Centre. Approximately 30 people attended the forum. Dean Stinson was moderator, Maggie Trehearne on the timer, giving each candidate five minutes to speak and a two minute rebuttal.

Incumbents Kathy Clement and Dan Sulentic looked at the job from different perspectives. Clement identified issues that must be addressed as jobs, health care, industrial park, safety and tourism. Sulentic talked about keeping taxes level, improving job opportunities, and improving the water system.

Newcomer Keith Olsen said, "Princeton needs to be re-invented." He would go out and market Princeton to attract business, as he feels there is a high potential for growth.

Lorne Esselink spoke briefly. He would promote the business park to improve the tax base.

George Elliott noted it takes a combination of skills and talents to meet everyone's expectations.

Question period was friendly, and the evening ended early.

Lali visits E-Team at Jura TransCanada Trail construction site

On November 1, Harry Lali, Minister of Transportation and Highways, visited workers at a site on the TransCanada Trail. The E-team (Environment Youth Team) was constructing a gazebo for trail users on the slope above

Jura Stock Ranch, where the trail is being developed on the old Kettle Valley Railway right of way.

The gazebo was designed by the E-team to fit on top of a concrete base used for a water tower when Kettle Valley Railway still used steam power. Next year, hikers and bicyclists will be able to use the gazebo as a shelter from rain or sun.

Lali spoke with members of the E-team, and with Jim Garner, of Human Resources Development Canada, one of the partners in the project. The five E-team workers are between the ages of 16 and 29, and work under supervision of an older, more experienced person. Tim Neufield, who owns the company who contracts to put E-teams to work, hires supervisors to teach the young workers the many skills they need to complete the projects.

Funding for the projects is available through a partnership between the federal government's Human Resources Development, which pays the wages, B.C. provides project management, safety

monitoring and funding for supervisors. Trails B.C. pays for building supplies and transportation.

Neufield attended a TransCanada Trail meeting in October during which he became the subject of interest as he explained the three-way partnership and how it worked.

"B.C. is the only province to have done this," Neufield told the News Leader. "Other provinces are interested in trying the partnership idea."

There are six E-teams working in the Thompson-Okanagan Region, and the three partners contribute one-third each for a combined total of \$960,000. Last week was the final week of the 12-week program for E-teams working in the Princeton area. John Henry supervised a second E-team repairing the trail between Princeton and Brookmere.

Neufield and Garner explained their goals to Lali following Lali's inspection of the project. Garner told Lali the federal government helps youth make the transition from unemployment to a job.

more schooling, or entrepreneurial activity. The E-team experience is that transition, as employees are encouraged to think beyond where they are and to visualize what else they could do. One E-team member took first aid training and has received, and accepted, a job in northern B.C. Another person is being assisted in drawing up a business plan.

Lali appeared to be impressed by the structure the team was building, and took time to speak with each of the workers. He commented on the amount of work still required to develop the TransCanada Trail, saying the government may put more E-teams to work in the spring.

The E-Team is a \$10.75 million job creation program within the provincial government's Youth Options BC program. The goals of the program are to improve the environment, provide youth with practical employment and training experience, and create environment and outdoor recreational legacies.

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OCTOBER 12, 1899

Canada joined Britain in the war in South Africa. Many believed Britain's war was Canada's war, but French Canada opposed it. Canada sent 7,000 troops, but already there was a strong voice for Canadian independence. The war was an election issue in 1900. Soldiers from Canada fought as British soldiers. The war ended June 5, 1901, with 224 Canadian soldiers dead and 252 wounded.

AUGUST, 1914

Canada was once again called to fight on foreign soil for the British Empire. B.C. formed its own Navy to protect the coast. The first contingent of soldiers from Canada left Quebec City on October 1. For the first time, they would fight together in units called "Canadian," not just reserve soldiers of the colony. For the first time, women went to war as members of the Canadian Army Medical Corps, working in field hospitals and driving ambulances. Kathleen 'Kit' Watkins of Toronto was the first female war correspondent.

World War I saw 400,000 Canadians overseas, thousands buried in fields in Flanders. More

than 50,000 Canadians were buried in Europe during World War I, and Vimy ridge and Ypres will be forever Canada's soil because Canadians won it with their lives.

A Nanaimo youngster named Ray Collishaw was an "ace" pilot, second only to Billy Bishop, an Owen Sound, Ontario, top ace in the first air war. Bishop shot down 72 German aircraft, Collishaw shot down 68. They flew for the Royal Air Force. Captain Roy Brown, another Canadian, shot down the famous "Red Baron" von Richtofen. Canadians held eight of the top 20 air "ace" positions in the Royal Air Force.

World War I ended at 11:00 a.m., November 11, 1918. That day was first known as Armistice Day, and is now called Remembrance Day.

SEPTEMBER 9, 1939
Canada declared war on Nazi Germany, in support of British allies. Canadians would fight six years in the bloodiest war in human history, yet fewer Canadians would die in this war than in the first World War. A total of 50 million people died in World War II, but only 42,000 were Canadians.

Canada consisted of 11,300,000 citizens in 1940. The soldiers, sailors and airmen went to war and the nation went to work. Canada helped Britain finance the war with food, clothing, gasoline, timber and money.

For six years, Canadians fought in every place in the world - North Africa, Italy, the Battle of the Bulge, the slaughter at Dieppe, in Hong Kong, Singapore, Burma and China. A Canadian doctor, Norman Bethune, is still remembered in China as a Canadian hero.

Canadian military personnel earned recognition for Canada as a nation. In 1947, the Canadian Citizenship Act took effect and we were no longer British subjects, we were what we are - Canadians.

Those who returned from the war were weary of war and wanted no

more of it. Canada embraced the role of United Nations peacekeepers, then went to war in Korea in 1953.

As a peacekeeping corps, Canadians joined NATO and the United Nations in Europe, Pakistan, Cyprus, the Belgian Congo, the Gaza Strip, Somalia, Bangladesh and Bosnia.

Increasingly, Canada's military alliance shifted to partnership with American military, but Canada opposed Viet Nam.

As an independent nation, Canada defined itself as a peaceful, progressive nation. Canadian veterans turned their efforts to building a better Canada - better standard of living, more social benefits, higher standards of education and health care.

As this century ends, we can look back at the bravery of our military personnel as the key to making us a nation.

For the first half of this Century of Valour, Canadians fought under a British flag. During the Second World War, Canadians painted the red maple leaf on tanks, ships, trucks and whatever, to show they were Canadians. Today, the red maple leaf is our own flag. As we look back on this Century of Valour, we can see Canadians fought and died for Canada.

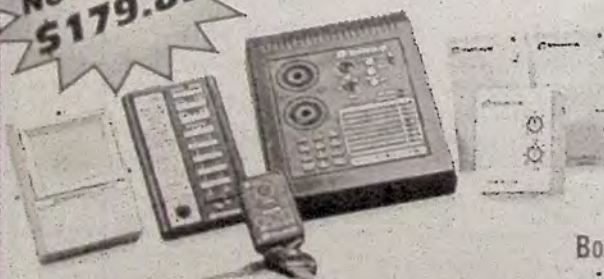

Area H resident asks questions

Dear Editor:

Residents in Area H must really be wondering what is going on. Three years of thundering silence from the current director resulting in overpayments to the Town and referendums with no plans or information divulged to the voters. Key issues involving solid waste management and the arena are completely up in the air and the Town is asking for \$100 THOUSAND in overpayments next year. When will the Director inform Area H? Perhaps at the arena meeting November 13.

The Director Elect has told me she will not get involved nor attempt to meet with Area H residents or the current Director

until such time as she is sworn in. In the meantime there is time for her to have ongoing meetings with Mayor Randy? This really creates the impression of a serious conflict of interest. When the Director Elect stood for office there was an implied commitment to the voters of Area H to do an effective job. This requires the Director communicate with the constituents to learn the issues and let them know what is going on. The Director is an employee of the constituents, not an autocrat. The time requirement is a minimum of 36 days per year in exchange for the \$10,000 stipend.

The Director Elect also has a

responsibility to let Area H know how the very real conflict of interest at the Skills Centre will be handled. As an employee of the Skills Centre, will she be able to effectively represent us on any matter involving employees, which is just about every matter?

The information and expertise you need to effectively represent Area H is in Area H, not Town Hall, and there are people in the wide-ranging communities in Area H who are willing to assist you. There is too much at stake for taxpayers in Area H for them to feel uncomfortable with their representation. Please clarify these issues for us.

Open letter to Area H residents

Dear Editor and Area H residents:

It was with dismay that I read our local papers. The comments of the mayor are untrue and insulting to myself and those living in Area H. We have only to look at our tax notices to know that we paid an increase for services provided by the Town. Thank you, Ed Muckle, for pointing out that I should have been reporting to the citizens of Area H on a regular basis.

I found it frustrating to deal with issues relating to the Town of Princeton. During my term of office, I met with the Town many times to specifically discuss the landfill and fire protection. The Town has remained adamant that we should be paying our

share (sometimes 50%) of those costs. My stand has been in order for us to share costs on any level, we need to have an equal voice in how those activities are conducted. Landfill and Fire Protection are people-related services. Population relationships and user statistics, as opposed to converted assessment, should be a fair way to allocate costs. If that is the case, we may be paying too much. I believe a public consultation process should gain constituent input prior to preparing any formal service agreements with the Town. Talk to your new Director about this.

Speaking to Fire Protection, the callouts are approximately 1/3 Area H, 2/3 Town. There are 448

residential properties in Princeton Rural Fire Protection area. Our current Fire Protection Agreement with the Town expires at the end of 1999. We have always been aware that the cost of our fire insurance decreases by being within a Fire Protection Area. In the past few years, our contributions to the Town have been as follows: 1996 - \$30,800; 1997 - \$30,356; 1998 - \$30,348 and 1999 - \$49,041.

I feel a Solid Waste Management Committee should be set up and meet regularly to address the issues surrounding solid waste management. All other landfills within our Regional District have tipping fees and

bylaws and control what goes into their landfill site. We are unique here in that the Town owns and administers the landfill. Our contributions to the landfill have been as follows: 1996 - \$27,500; 1997 - \$27,500; 1998 - \$32,394; 1999 - \$53,700.

In addition, grants have been given to the Recycling group, increasing our total dollar contribution to Solid Waste Management. The costs will continue to rise in response to new waste management requirements included in the Town's Landfill Operation Certificate. Talk to your new Director about setting up a Solid Waste Management Committee in Area H.

The 25 year mortgage on Princeton Arena ends this month. This should result in a reduction of taxes. It has been my opinion that taxation should NOT contin-

ued at the same level and dollars in a contingency fund should be capped. Regional District owns and administers the arena. A local Arena Board oversees management of the arena and sets the budget. That Board consists of a Town Councillor, two Town appointees, the Area H Director or Alternate and two Area H appointees. In the local paper, it stated that the Recreation Commission continually makes repairs at the Princeton arena. (not this local paper) This is not true. The repairs and maintenance are funded through tax dollars, donations and labour from user groups. A great deal of credit goes to those groups. The arena tax subsidy in 1999 is \$137,964. Of that amount, \$83,893 is contributed by Area H. Now that the arena is mortgage-free, talk to your new Director about changing the taxation structure. Recreation issues need to be reviewed. Area H does have a recreation bylaw that allows us to tax up to \$20,000 per year. The Town has been receiving \$15,000 per year.

Each year, I received numerous requests for grants in aid. During my term, I gave grants to Highway Rescue, Search and Rescue, RCMP Bike Patrol, RCMP Auxiliaries, PXA, Princeton Recycling Society, Princeton and District Chamber of Commerce, Tulameen Community Club and Vermilion Trails Society. As our costs for services increased, I decreased the grants.

It is critical we move forward with Emergency Planning. I anticipate the contract to prepare the plan will be awarded later this month. We have the potential for wildfires, floods and slides in many of our areas, as well as spills of dangerous goods along our highways. The plan will be a changing, living document to

coordinate our efforts. Coordinators are in place throughout Area H. In conjunction with Emergency Planning, it is vital the house numbering system be resolved. At this point not everyone has a house number.

A long-term plan for growth of Area H is crucial. It is to be hoped that this will move forward and become a public process. The growth in the rural area is phenomenal. To the end of October 1999 there were 30 building permits (\$3,185,500 value) issued for houses and five permits issued for modular homes. In 1998, that figure was 20 houses and 10 modular homes. A large number of people relocating here are starting home based businesses. It will be in our best interest to have a plan of where we want to see development take place.

Some ongoing issues will be waiting for our new Area H Director. Some of those unresolved items are residents wanting noise bylaws, street lighting in rural subdivisions, upgrading water facilities and zoning issues. The landfill, fire protection, recreation and arena will require prudent negotiation with the Town of Princeton. Let your new Director know how you want your tax dollars spent.

I will be participating in an Open House Public Meeting at Princeton and District Arena on Saturday, November 13, for 3 to 5:30 p.m. I will provide information on the upcoming referendums. Please feel free to attend and voice your concerns. We have many people residing in Area H with a great deal of expertise in many different areas. I hope you come forward to help lead Area H into the next century.

Thank you, residents of Area H, for the time, energy and ideas you shared with me.

Mayor answers Muckle

Dear Editor;

I am writing in response to the letter "Area H resident challenges the Mayor" from Mr. Ed Muckle, a concerned citizen. I am very pleased that Mr. Muckle has taken the time and initiative to examine the issues of the upcoming referendum and its impact on the taxpayers of the area.

Mr. Muckle raises a number of points. In the matter of fire protection, he suggests that since the value of assets protected in the specified area are only 1/3 that of the Town, Area H should only pay 1/3 of the total Fire Budget. This, in fact, is precisely the formula agreed upon by the Town and Regional District. The total 1999 Fire Operating budget was \$111,000. 1/3 of that amount is \$37,000. He states there is an inequity as Area H paid the Town \$49,000. In actual fact, the Town was paid only \$45,000 and of that amount, \$8,000 was a late payment from 1998, thereby equaling the 1/3 amount agreed upon. It should be noted that the insurance premium on a \$100,000 property, when covered by fire protection, will have a saving of \$386. With the 1999 tax rate on that home being \$141, the overall saving would be \$245 annually. To clarify, only residents living in the Specified Fire Protection Area will be affected by this referendum and allowed to vote on this matter.

With respect to the landfill, the Town budget for 1999 was \$85,000, using Mr. Muckle's 50 per cent fair share basis, which again is consistent with the negotiations, Area H would owe \$42,500. He states that as Area H paid \$53,700, this constitutes an overpayment of \$11,000. What Mr. Muckle is unaware of is that the Town was paid only \$50,000. 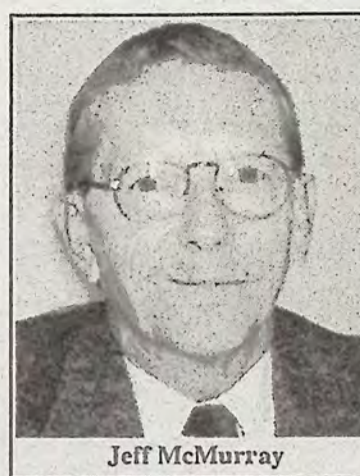

Candidates speak to voters

SIMILKAMEEN - On November 3, at Victory Hall in Keremeos, November 20 civic election candidates for Keremeos Mayor and Councillors, and for Area "B" Cawston, had an audience of 175 people to listen to their speeches and ask questions. The Keremeos District Chamber of Commerce, who organized the meeting, also asked Roger Mayer, elected by acclamation in Area "G," Keremeos Rural Hedley, to express his views. Mediator Chuck Bennet gave each candidate three minutes to speak. After speeches, he kept order in a sometimes heated public question period. All candidates were free to respond to any questions, even those directed at a particular candidate.

Questions most often asked were about conflict of interest and the proposed new landfill site. More candidates responded to questions about youth and land for light industry, than to any other question. Other questions were about the November 20 OAP Referendum, Village employee costs, Cawston building regulations and zoning by-laws, T.L. Timber, garbage incineration, recycling, biosolid use, and sediment build-up in the Similkameen River.

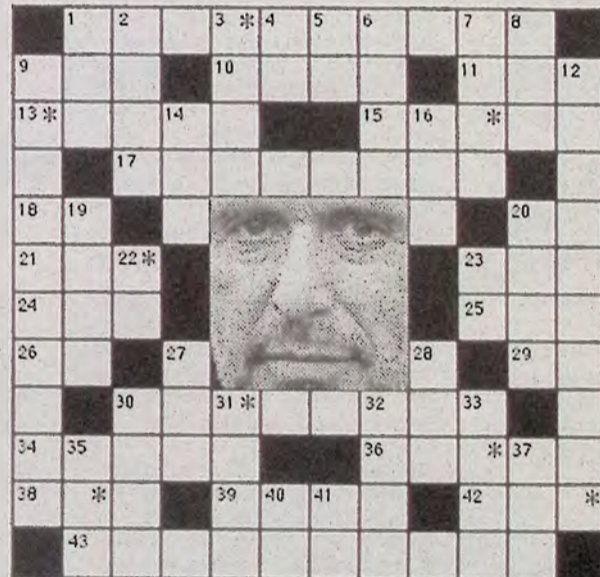

Council questions golf RV expansion

PRINCETON - Town Council received a letter from Princeton Golf Club requesting permission to expand the RV park from 10 sites to 25 sites.

Councillor Jim Manion did not think it was a good idea, as the municipal campsite is across the road and the golf club would be in direct competition with the municipal campsite for revenue. Manion pointed out that, if this sort of thing continued, Council might find it difficult to find somebody to operate the municipal campsite due to declining revenues.

Mayor McLean suggested it was not Council's place to deny golfers the convenience of RV parking at the golf course and force them to use the municipal campsite.

Manion asked, "Where does it end? They started with 10, now they want 25. When do they ask for 50?"

There was some concern expressed as to whether the RV park would conform to any existing legislation on facilities required to service an RV site. On questioning by the News Leader, Council "thought" there had been a verbal agreement "around 1988" for the original 10 sites, and there would be no liability to Town taxpayers if there was failure to conform to legislation because of a clause in the Gold Club lease requiring the club to have insurance. However, Council was not sure what legislation exists governing RV park requirements.

The request was tabled pending further information.

The Bobber

We sit and watch them for hours.

When I was a kid, I used a cork. It had a slice in it so I could push it onto my line. Later, I had a red and white plastic bobber, with a hole in it, so you could run your line through and set it at the desired place with a little peg, which I kept losing. My next bobber was equipped with a button. You pushed it, and a little hook, which you ran the line through, came out the bottom. You released the button, and the bobber snapped tightly on the line.

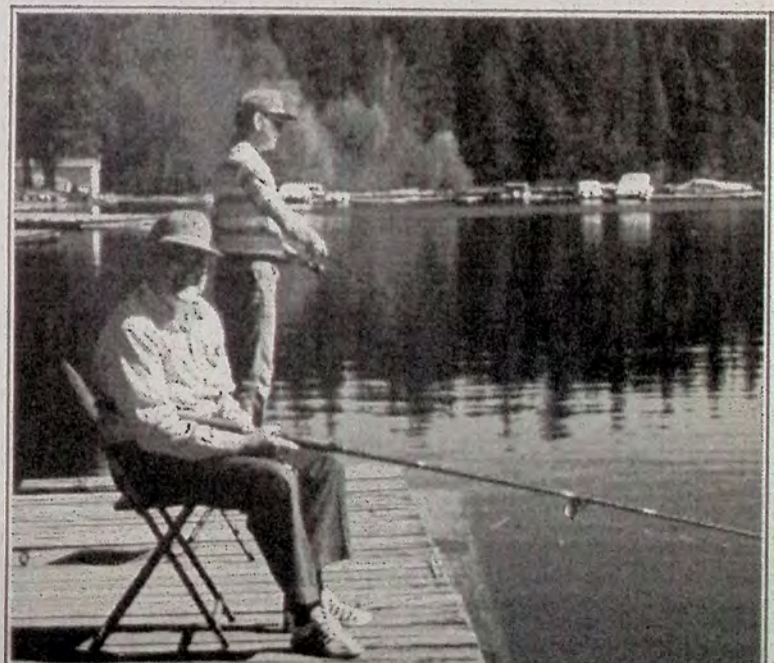
The next bobber I remember was very clever. It was whistling bobber, which looked like a buoy bobbing up and down in the water. When a fish pulled it down, the bobber made a sharp whistle. I used to blow on it when I got bored, to see if it still worked. No fish ever completely pulled it under - it was huge, almost two inches long. As I recall, I did get a couple of tentative toots out of it when a Northern Pike pulled on my line one day.

By now, I was reading all the sporting magazines, like *Outdoor Life* and

Stream. Ads on bobbers that lit up, that set the hook when the fish bit, that were filled with water so you could make them invisible to the fish, and so on, appeared and fascinated me.

One of those partially water-filled bobbers was my next acquisition in the long string of bobber purchases I've made. I still use them occasionally on my T and T rigs. My latest bobber, which absolutely fascinates me, is a little jewel, which lights up on the slightest trout bite. It has a tiny lithium battery, which is supposed to power it forever, something like the pink rabbit run by Energizer batteries. Not only does this bobber fascinate me! One night, a little brown bat came down and grabbed it. It lifted the bobber about three feet out of the water before letting it go! Devan Brown and I were flabbergasted and I'm sure that bat wondered, too!

My bobbers have come full circle now. I'm back to making my own - I don't use cork any more, finding the Styrofoam sewing thread spool a better material. But I am still fascinated with bobbers. In fact, I'd rather watch a bobber as it sits on the surface of the lake than watch a TV tube any day!

Flu shots sold out due to demand

Princeton Pharmasave was surprised by the high demand for flu shots this year. Owner Wen Wong said he ordered 100 shots well ahead of the flu clinic sponsored by Pharmasave, then had to go back to the wholesalers for more. People continued to book appointments beyond the 100 shots available. On going back to the three big pharmaceutical wholesalers, Wong found out they were sold out. He was able to purchase more vaccine from a smaller wholesaler, where he continues to purchase an average of ten

shots per week. The week of October 25 through 29 was hectic for Pharmasave. Nurse Patrice Ryan administered the shots to teachers at local schools three days that week, and at Mac's Auto Parts on October 29. On October 27, the Pharmasave public clinic was very busy.

"We booked appointments in advance, five minutes apart," says Wong. "Everything went smoothly for that day, but we still have people coming to us to buy vaccine."

Customers include people who are eligible for free flu shots, but prefer not to stand in line. They buy the vaccine at \$10.99 per

dose, then have their doctor or a public health nurse give the injection.

Wong is conscious of the growing concern of the B.C. Centre for Disease Control, an agency predicting a major epidemic next year for which there may be no vaccine. He hopes people are building their immunity now.

Those who ordered flu vaccine but have not yet paid for it have until November 12 to go to Pharmasave and claim it. After that date, due to the shortage of vaccine, the available supply will be sold on a first come, first served basis. However, orders for vaccine will be accepted and delivered as it becomes available.

Judge fines thief

In Provincial Court in Princeton on November 4, Judge G. Sinclair ordered Larry Andrew Carper of Princeton to pay a \$200 fine. Carper had entered a guilty plea to charges laid in the lower mainland after a witness saw him stealing money from a vending machine.

Local man found not guilty

On November 4, in Provincial Court in Princeton, Judge G. Sinclair heard the testimony of Lisa Gilhooley, commonlaw wife of Richard Wesley Readman. Readman had been charged with spousal assault on June 26, 1999.

Gilhooley testified that she and Readman had been at a party. When they returned home, Gilhooley passed out. Readman went for a ride and his vehicle was impounded. On his return, he awakened Gilhooley with this news. She said she was so angry she began hitting him, and he hit back.

After hearing Gilhooley's testimony, Judge Sinclair pronounced Readman "not guilty."

Naturalists explore The Bear's Den and Stemwinder Mtn.

The location of the Bear's Den is lost in the mists of history but it relates to an ancient tale of how two prospectors, searching for pay dirt in the hills north of Blakeburn, drove a drift (horizontal mine shaft) into a hillside in the fall of the year. When they returned in the early spring, they found that their hole had been taken over by a hibernating bear, who understandably objected to being roused from a sound sleep for something as inconsequential as gold or silver. Nobody now knows which drift it was, so the name applies to the area north of the vanished town of Blakeburn and west of Coalmont.

On the glorious fall morning of October 23, seven naturalists began the hike across the Bear's Den area. After three kilometres, we paused to admire the view of the village of Coalmont nestled in autumn splendour far below. Three Willow (Ruffed) Grouse roared away as we ambled through a grove of aspen, while golden leaves drifted down to form a rich carpet on the old road.

We admired the remains of an abandoned derelict old cabin and continued to a sunlit slope where we sat down for lunch and a cup of tea. We never did find the drift appropriated by the bear, but after skirting a majestic meadow, we returned through the shimmering gold of the aspens and descended to the cars, well satisfied with our efforts.

Stemwinder Mountain, which rises above Hedley on the north-west, was apparently named at the beginning of the twentieth century, when the invention of a stem

for winding watches replaced the old method of winding them with a key, which was constantly getting lost. Since the name then indicated excellence, it was a good name for this mountain, which offers, from its summit, a magnificent panoramic view of the valley of the Similkameen and the surrounding plateau.

However, a comedy of errors disrupted the beginning of a trip which took place on October 30, when 14 members of Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists began the drive up the McNulty Creek Road. First, the driver of one vehicle ran out of gas and vanished into Hedley for more, leaving the rest of us wondering. Then a second driver found his radiator spouting a geyser of steam and had to leave the truck halfway up the road. Finally, the noble leader missed a turn, leaving his devoted

Similkameen, the Town undertook a Design/Operating and Closure Plan study at a total cost of \$25,000. This plan was completed in 1998 and Area H's 50 per cent share (\$12,500) was added to the 1999 payment.

I can understand the confusion. However, I do take exception to his remarks of Area H having no input concerning the landfill. When Regional District recommended a landfill environmental impact study the Town agreed and participated fully. Sperling Hanson and Assoc. contracted to provide direction and guidance well into the future. Of greater importance, Linda Allison and members of the Area H Advisory Planning Committee as well as Myrna Bosomworth, Betty Rose and others of the recycling society volunteered countless hours to help guide the landfill operation both from an environmental and efficiency standpoint. Their efforts and input should not be overlooked.

This referendum does not mean an immediate increase to the maximum quoted in the referendum, it does give Area H the ability to

raise their contribution in the future as a result of any environmental requirements and/or closure costs.

With regard to the arena, Mr. Muckle states that, as of November 2, 1999, the 25 year mortgage on the facility is paid and residents are going to be asked to pay on a non-existent mortgage. In fact, the Arena Board, which includes Area H representation, has examined this issue and have suggested it would be prudent to set money aside each year for major capital expenses that are expected to be required in the near future, such as replacing the roof, rather than presenting taxpayers with a major capital expenditure all in one year. This is a common practice and simply effective management.

Finally, I believe there is one more issue he raises that needs to be addressed, when he states, "Randy, if you are expecting cooperation from Area H, I suggest you give your head a shake." I believe he has missed a very important point and that is: we all live together in this community. I do expect cooperation from Area

H, as Area H has every right and reason to expect cooperation from the Town of Princeton. Many people from Princeton own property in Area H, many people from Area H own businesses and work in Princeton. In fact, all five members of Council negotiating for the Town of Princeton pay taxes in the Regional District. By cooperating, we are able to provide better services, better fire protection, better recreation and better educational facilities. It is especially imperative we cooperate in order to protect and maintain our hospital and health care services. All these things and many more we do better together as a community.

I do believe, Mr. Muckle, that you have the best interests of this community at heart and upon reflection, you will agree that we can accomplish a great deal more by cooperating. I do genuinely appreciate the time and effort you have taken to raise these issues and I hope this letter has cleared up any misunderstandings you may have had.
