Sean Penn scouts Similkameen

There is a rumour about Sean Penn and company stopping at the Coalmont Hotel. The rumour is correct.

On November 16, Mark Flett, Okanagan Film Commissioner, confirmed that actor/director Sean Penn has been scouting locations in the South Okanagan and Similkameen for an upcoming,

shot in B.C., movie "The Pledge." Penn will be directing the movie, which revolves around the central character who has made a pledge

to the mother of a murdered daughter to find the killer. He proceeds to buy a service station at a junction of highways as he believes the killer is from that

area and he expects him to someday come to the gas station. Jack Nicholson is considering the starring role.

In discussions with the representative of the BC Film Commission who showed Penn the area, Penn is very impressed with the entire Similkameen region including Keremeos, Princeton, Coalmont and Tulameen. The company is just in preliminary location scouting mode and there is no confirmation as to whether the film will shoot in the area.

Sean Penn starred in Fast Times at Ridgemont High, Dead Man Walking, Casualties of War,

The Thin Red Line, She's So Lovely. His first movie as director was The Indian Runner. Penn first scouted near Duluth, Minnesota, for a movie location for The Pledge.

"It seems that the hard work of the Okanagan Film Commission in bringing the region to the attention of producers and directors is working," stated Flett.

Flett and the Okanagan Film Commission are busy fundraising from various different govern-

ment agencies to raise money to keep the film commission alive.

Flett has recently been elected President of the Regional Film Commissions Association of B.C. whose mandate is to convince the provincial government to match local funding for the seven regional film commissions in B.C. Flett remains optimistic that the various levels of government understand the positive economic and employment benefits of a local film industry.

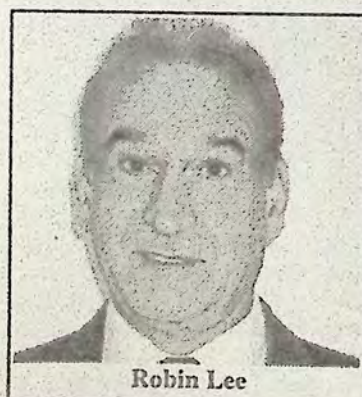

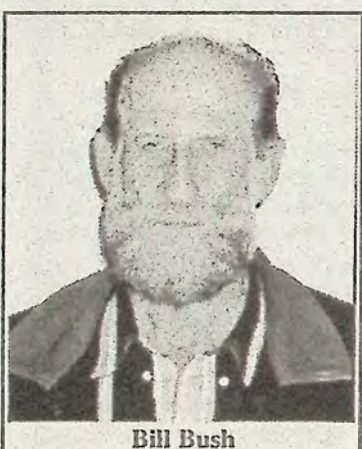

Expert choir thrills crowd

PRINCETON - The Vancouver Chamber Choir received a standing ovation at the end of their November 19 benefit concert at the Baptist Church. No figures are available at this time as to the proceeds from the evening, but more than 100 people attended the concert, and the key auction yielded \$290, thanks to Byong Jo, owner of Best Western Motel.

For those who are not familiar with a chamber choir, the simplest way to describe their music is as a totally vocal kind of music. The 20 singers and choirmaster John Washburn present a concert without musical instruments.

RCMP gives loot to Crown

HEDLEY - At a road check in Hedley on November 13, Princeton RCMP and South Okanagan Highway Patrol seized \$104,310 in U.S. currency.

A suspicious vehicle came through the road check at approximately 9:00 p.m. Officers asked the vehicle to pull off the road for further questioning. RCMP had approached the driver of the vehicle, a B.C. resident, when the passenger bolted from the vehicle. A brief foot chase ensued, then officers arrested Eric Waters of the Spokane, Washington area. RCMP checked the area where the chase occurred and found a bag containing \$45,000 cash. A search of Waters' backpack yielded another \$68,700.

The 20 year old American citizen was arrested and held in custody. He was charged with resisting arrest and released. He is supposed to return to court in Penticton on November 22.

The money is still subject to investigation. Investigating officer, Cst. Chris Newell, says, "We are looking into where the money came from."

The money is believed to be the proceeds of crime, as Waters had no credible explanation for where he obtained the money. Cst. Newell says a relinquishment of claim is being prepared so the money can be turned over to the Crown.

Snow causes two crashes

On Sunday, November 21, Princeton RCMP responded to two crashes resulting from snow. Both accidents occurred east of Princeton on Highway 3. One was at 6:30 a.m. near Bromley Rock and the second was at 9:30 a.m. 6 km east of Princet. In Both cases, drivers lost control on the curve, crossed over and went into the ditch on the opposite side. One rolled. Nobody was injured, but the vehicles sustained major damage.

In each crash, the vehicles were small four-wheel drive.

Cst. Chris Newell says, "Some drivers have the misconception they can go faster with a 4X4, which is not true. The smaller trucks and sport utility vehicles have a shorter wheel base, are often lighter, and have a higher center of gravity. This makes them less stable. In slippery conditions, they often spin out of control and will roll sooner than a car."

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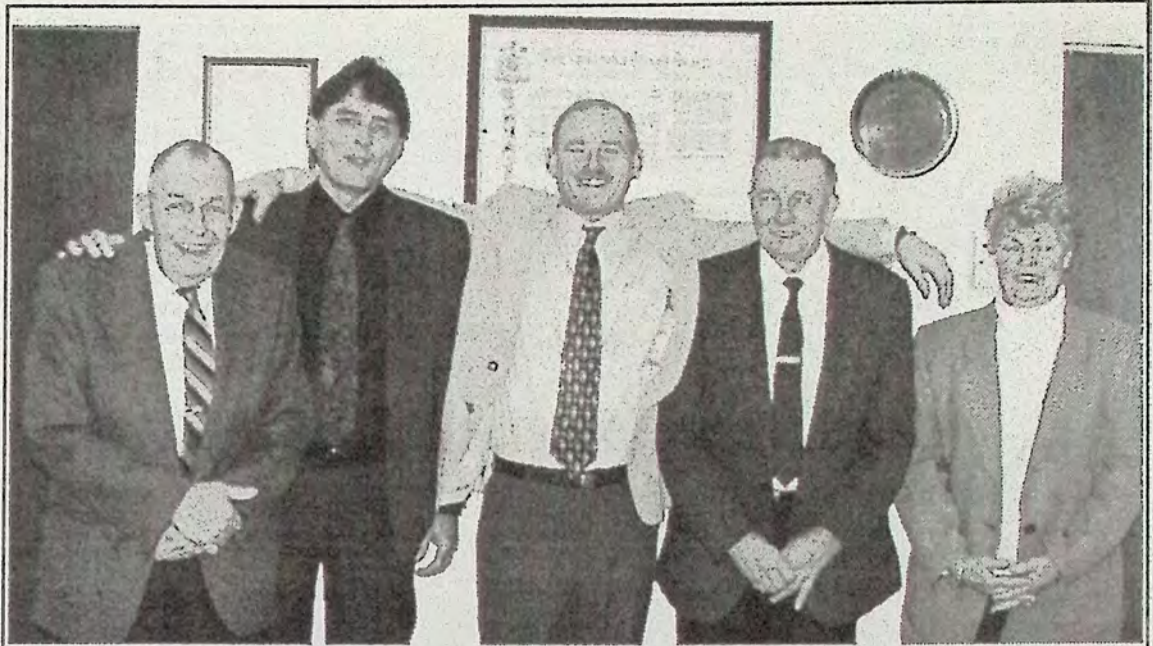

Council puts museum money in reserve for 2000

PRINCETON - Rosemary Doughty, President of Princeton and District Museum and Archives Society, and Directors Don Coyle and Eric Jacobson, attended the November 15 Town Council meeting to ask about money for the Pollard Wing.

Doughty introduced Coyle, who is project chair. Coyle thanked Council for assisting in applying for the grant to build the extension on the museum to house the Joe Pollard collection of fossils, as well as Princeton's own collection.

Coyle asked Council the current status of the project. He said he knew Council has signed a grant project contract, but had heard rumours about other ideas for the project.

Mayor Randy McLean said he had mentioned the idea of moving the Pollard Wing into the library, and moving the library to a different building. He said he had spoken with MLA Harry Lali and assistant about the possibility of expanding the museum into the library, and he had spoken to the Regional Library Board and

asked them to look at other buildings for the library. He had hoped for an answer in two weeks.

"I think it would be great to have the whole museum in one building," Mayor McLean told Coyle.

Rosemary Doughty told Mayor McLean the Museum Society wants to see the Pollard Wing extension.

"I want to move forward with this project," Doughty said. "It will be built with the right shelving and the right display for the phosphorescent fossils."

Coyle ascertained that the Town

was still committed to the project.

Councillor Dan Sulentic spoke in favour of keeping the library in place and building the new wing.

Coyle told Council the museum had attracted 1200 visitors during the summer, and Doughty added she had escorted three tours of paleontologists to dig sites.

Councillor Kathleen Clement introduced a motion to reserve the budgetted amount from 1999 to be committed to the 2000 budget and that the remaining \$15,000 be set aside in 2000 for the museum extension. The motion passed.

Lali seeks support

SIMILKAMEEN - Harry Lali, Minister of Transportation and Highways, was in Princeton on November 18 to discuss with local people the kind of support he needs if he is to become a candidate for leadership of the New Democratic Party.

The number of delegates in support of a candidate at a convention depends on the number of memberships in the riding. Each riding is allowed one delegate per 30 members.

Bob Longdo is the Princeton membership chairman. He was told the party will accept pre-authorized cheques so people can pay a small amount each month rather than a single large amount, as NDP give consideration to the economic circumstances of members. Seventy-five per cent of membership dues are deductible from income taxes.

The delegate selection meeting will be held on February 5 in Merritt. The leadership convention will be held in Vancouver on February 18, 19 and 20, but candidates will be asked to attend policy debates around the province long before that date, giving delegates an opportunity to learn the priorities of the potential leaders. The person elected to lead the NDP will automatically be the next Premier until a provincial general election takes place.

Lali's priorities will be the needs of rural communities, with special emphasis on resource industry needs, and the forest industry in particular. One of his priorities is integrating the aboriginal population into the forest industry.

Lali told the News Leader he will make his decision two weeks from now, when he can ascertain whether or not he has the number of delegates he needs.

Mayor Randy McLean became emotional as he thanked Jim Manion and George Armstrong for their hard work as Councillors, and presented each with a soapstone carving by Jonasia Faber as a memento of their years on Council.

Robert Murchy Smart appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on November 18 for sentencing on two impaired driving charges. On May 2, 1999, he was apprehended near Princeton after Highway Patrol observed him speeding.

Two days later, Smart was stopped for speeding and erratic driving in North Vancouver. He was apprehended for impaired driving.

Smart had five prior convictions and had pled guilty to both charges in May. Judge G. Sinclair sentenced the 41 year old man to two months in Kamloops Regional Correctional Centre for the May 2 offense and four months consecutive for the May 4 offense, for a total of six months in jail. In addition he is prohibited from driving for three years.

Watch for bogus bills

KEREMEOS - Keremeos RCMP say merchants in the area "have received several counterfeit bills of various denominations over the past several weeks."

In a November 18 interview, Sergeant Dennis Bauhuis said, "Generally people come through from out of town and stop at a store or garage sale, where they will buy something of lesser value and get change in real currency."

Counterfeit bills were discovered when deposited at the bank.

Sgt. Bauhuis says, with laser technology, criminals "are forev-

er turning out better counterfeits, "there are aspects of real money that are very hard to duplicate. For example, ink will not run on a real bill when it gets wet, but will on a counterfeit. Other counterfeit signs to watch for are poor quality foil rectangles that get damaged and show paper through, solid lines instead of the tiny printed lines that say Bank of Canada and the bill amount, the queen's eyes look lifeless, the paper does not feel fibrous enough, and little green dots cannot be removed without damaging the paper.

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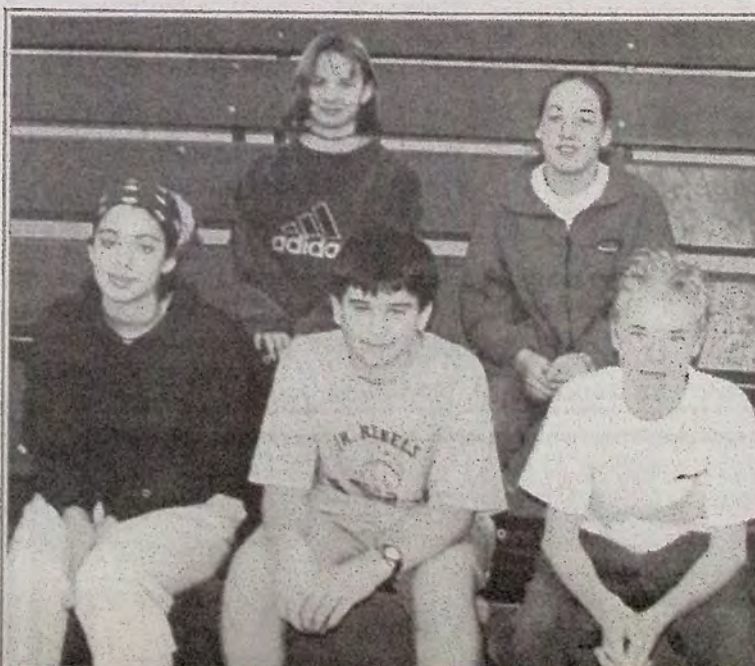

Widowed parents will benefit from new earnings exemption

VICTORIA - A new BC Benefits exemption will put more money in the pockets of hundreds of widowed parents raising their families on low incomes.

"Starting in the new year, and extra \$100 a month will be available to families who are eligible for both BC Benefits and the Canada Pension Plan orphan's benefit," Moe Sihota, social development and economic security minister, announced on November 15.

The CPP orphan's benefit is paid to the natural or adopted child of a deceased contributor or a child in the care of a contributor at the time of that person's death. The child must be under the age of 18, or between 18 and 25 and attending a recognized post-secondary institution full time. The monthly benefit is \$171.33 per month. In the past, no portion was exempt from consideration as income for BC Benefits, which meant the full amount was deducted each month from their welfare cheques. About 275 parents receiving BC

Benefits will be eligible for the CPP orphan's benefit income exemption.

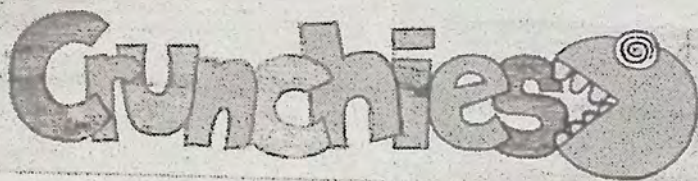
"This fulfils a long-standing promise of government that no one receiving BC Benefits would be financially worse off because

they applied for federal CPP benefits to which they are entitled," Sihota said.

The annual cost of this change is projected to be approximately \$330,000. The change will take effect January 1, 2000.

Chimney fire threatens roof

CAWSTON - At about 3:00 p.m. on November 14, when the Keremeos and District Fire Department responded to a call to a chimney fire on McKenzie Road in Cawston, they arrived on the scene to discover the fire was actually on the outside of the chimney and involved part of the roof. The owner had already dealt with a chimney fire earlier that morning.

According to Fire Department spokesman Bud Coyston, the chimney was designed so it had a layer of wood on the outside of the chimney and then another layer of bricks. The wood had been nailed into the chimney. The nails heated up, and the wood caught on fire. Using a chain saw and water, firemen removed the

flashing, took a small amount of the roof away, and removed the burned wood.

Coyston says, "We weren't that far away from getting a full structural fire." He says, though the firemen were able to isolate the fire to a small section of the roof, "there's still between five and seven thousand dollars damage."

Council hires sewer system manager

KEREMEOS - During recent contract negotiations with Public Works staff, Council discovered the sewage treatment plant was not working as it should. Staff reported they had been putting in volunteer time to keep the plant operating in compliance with the Ministry of Environment permit. According to Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) Eileen Oliver Bauer, filamentous bacteria have been keeping the sludge suspended, preventing it from separating so the water can be removed, and the residue dried. The normal bugs that break down the sludge can't compete with the filamentous bacteria.

According to Keremeos Council, the new sewer system, installed in Keremeos three years ago, is in between an aerated system and an activated sludge system. It was supposed to be a Rotating Biological Contactor (RBC) unit, but the public would not approve the funds to build it. For a million dollars less than what the RBC would have cost, Associated Engineering of Kelowna designed the new sewer

system to include part of the RBC system. It is projected to become a complete RBC system in the future when a second upgrade will be done, paid for by new development in Keremeos.

At the November 15 regular meeting, Council approved Bauer's recommendation to award a one year, \$10,779.96, plus taxes, Sewage Collection and Treatment Facilities Management Contract to R & D McCabe Ltd., with additional work required by the Village to be billed at \$320.00 per day plus expenses. Council stated McCabe had the "extensive operating experience" called for in Bauer's report where she states that "the aim is to ultimately decrease sewer operating costs by maximizing plant efficiency."

McCabe will supervise and manage staff, and liaise both with Village staff and Associated engineering to resolve the ongoing sewage problems.

Stranart said, "Council is relieved to have found a third party familiar with this type of problem."

ed by the Credit Union. The evening will include judging of downtown lights, the Buckaroo Jake's Kid's Christmas Show sponsored by the Keremeos IGA at 7:00 p.m. at Victory Hall, and a Turkey Bingo at the Elks Hall.

December 4 and 5, each morning, the K. Cafe will present "Breakfast with Santa," and during each day, there will be an Arts and Crafts Fair at Cawston

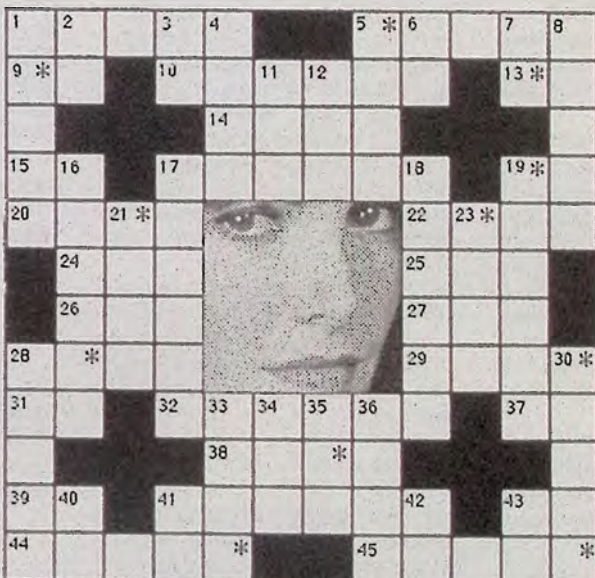

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Workshops teach women outdoor skills

Ten women paddle their canoes around Comox Harbor, eight more learn the safe handling of an ATV, over a dozen peer through binoculars for a closer look at the rare Trumpeter Swans in the harbor. Several are learning the skills involved in backing a boat and trailer down a ramp. The first winter workshop of the "Becoming An outdoors Woman" program is underway in the Comox Valley.

The event will guarantee any woman a most enjoyable memorable weekend. Ninety registrations for age 19 and over will be accepted starting now. Courses will in addition to those mentioned will include cross country skiing, snow-shoeing, winter survival, first aid, outdoors cooking, archery, firearms safety, marksmanship, trap and skeet shooting, black powder shooting, backpacking, kayaking, orienteering, fishing, fire starting, chain saw use, and photography.

The "Becoming An Outdoors Woman" program was born in Wisconsin in 1991 as a result of a forum held in 1990 to identify the barriers that prevent women from participating in outdoors activities to the same extent as do their male counterparts. Since 1991 these training courses have spread like wildfire to 42 states and nine provinces, with over

12,000 women having participated. B.C. Wildlife Federation brought this opportunity to B.C. in 1997 and over 350 women have participated in workshops held at Winfield, Prince George, Lake Cowichan, Aldergrove, and Cranbrook.

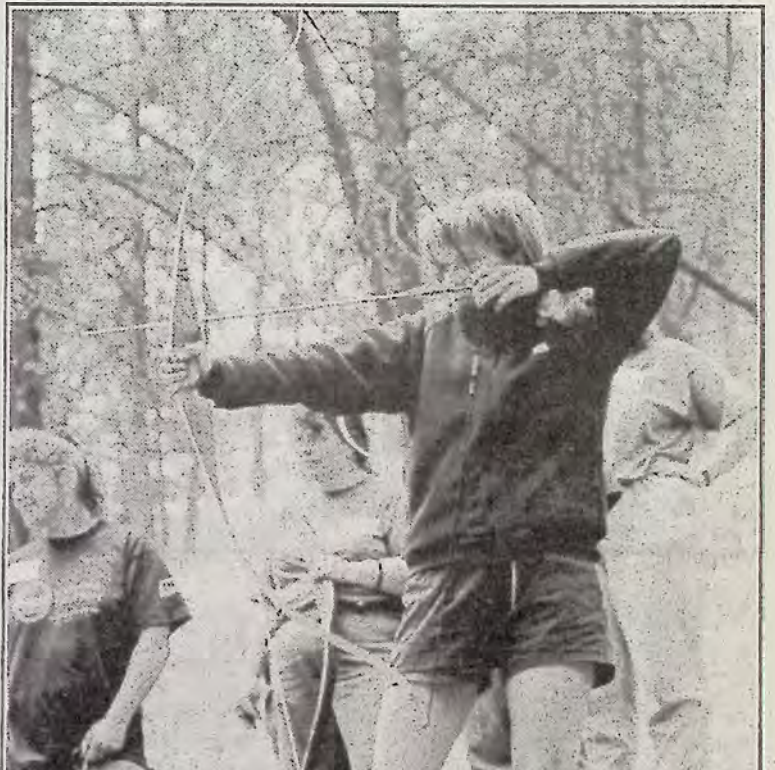
Workshops begin at noon Friday and run until noon Sunday. During that time each woman takes four, 4-hour courses. All instruction is geared to the novice. No one is expected to arrive with any degree of knowledge. Cost is \$180.00 for BCWF members and \$200.00 for non-members.

LIVING PAST 100

Baby boomers could live to be 150 years old.

Seminar via satellite: the Lessons in Leadership

PRINCETON - Business leaders and management experts Tom Peters, Ken Blanchard, Robert Cooper, Ted Turner, Stephen Covey, Margaret Wheatley, Richard Branson and Steve Case (owner of America On Line), came to Princeton via satellite. Business people, government employees, people from as far away as Osoyoos and Keremeos attended the Worldwide Lessons in Leadership Seminar held November 17 at the Community Skills Centre. A seminar that would have cost them approximately \$3,500 each was available for \$100, including breakfast, lunch and coffee breaks.

Each participant received a workbook filled with information about the speakers, some of each speaker's views, lists of relevant books, and lessons to do at home for further study.

Each feature speaker gave a speech about what he or she thinks is happening in business, industrial, and government organizations. There was a great deal of discussion by each about the impact of new electronic technology. Two of the speakers, Blanchard and Wheatley, stressed the importance of refusing to allow technology to dominate human values.

Ted Turner was downright opposed to much of what is hap-

pening in daily life. The former owner of Turner Broadcasting and now Vice-President of Time Warner Inc., he complains he cannot operate his new VCR. Turner is a genuinely funny man without intending to be. His big advice for business success was, "Early to bed, early to rise, and don't forget to advertise." He said he started CNN so he could hear the news, because there was never any news on before he went to bed at 9:00 pm and none on when he arose at 5:00 a.m.

Tom Peters told his audience they should be involved in destroying their company organizational structure or somebody else would do it for them. He explained that everyone must adjust to the new technology and re-invent how they organize themselves and how they work.

There was plenty of humour along with plenty of substance in the seminar. Those who attended were extremely pleased with the experience. Many commented they could never have gone to such a seminar because the cost would have been prohibitive, nor could they have spared the time away from their businesses to travel to the seminar, proving again that the teleconferencing capability at the Skills Centre can inexpensively expand the world for business people.

Trails group plans relay for Year 2000

PRINCETON - Jim Stolth, Trudy Kotzian and Shirley Morrison have applied to be part of Relay 2000 as it travels through the Brookmere to Osprey Lake portion of the TransCanada Trail. Each must carry a vessel of Pacific Ocean water over a 10 kilometre stretch of the trail. The water will go to Ottawa eventually, to be joined in a fountain with water from the Arctic and Atlantic Oceans.

The status of trail management plans was a hot topic at the November 17 annual general meeting. An agreement had been reached with BC Assets and Lands, but when the government version of the agreement was faxed back, it was different from what Vermilion Trails Society believed they had agreed. BCAL decided they wanted the agreement signed by BC Trails Society, TransCanada Trails and Byatt as President of Vermilion Trails Society. Vermilion Trails had questioned some items in the new agreement as received, and decided not to sign without Vermilion Trails members reviewing it. Byatt was told that if it was not signed by November 21, the local society might have to pay \$500 for a permit to use the trail.

Jim Manion argued against signing the agreement because it is a contract between BC Assets and Lands and BC Trails Society.

Stolth and Peter Hohn reported on projects done this year. Washouts between Princeton and Brookmere are still a major concern. Hohn commented on garbage left at the site where a gazebo had been built, and said there should have been some kind of garbage receptacle in the plan.

Trudy Kotzian, of Princeton-Brookmere Rails to Trails, said that group would like a footbridge constructed from Otter Lake Provincial Park to the old railbed, a distance of 250 feet of bridging.

Larry Kohler, of Tulameen, reported that a trail access built by the E-team has become a route for range cattle to follow, and herds are now becoming mixed. He asked if a fence or cattle guard could be installed next spring.

Kotzian conducted the election. John Byatt was returned as President, with Peter Hohn as Vice-President and Shirley Morrison and Jim Stolth as Interim Treasurer and Secretary, respectively. Directors are Larry Kohler, Linda Allison, Dan Howland, Jim Manion, Peter Jack, Yvette Stolth and Philipe Batini. The next meeting will be December 15.

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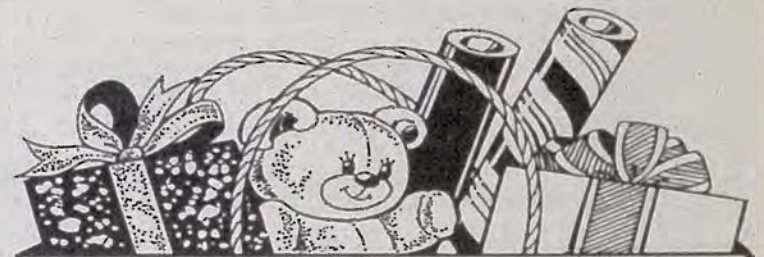

The civic elections are over. Next week, new Councils and Area Directors will be sworn into office. Soon, the previous politicians will be a part of past history rarely considered important.

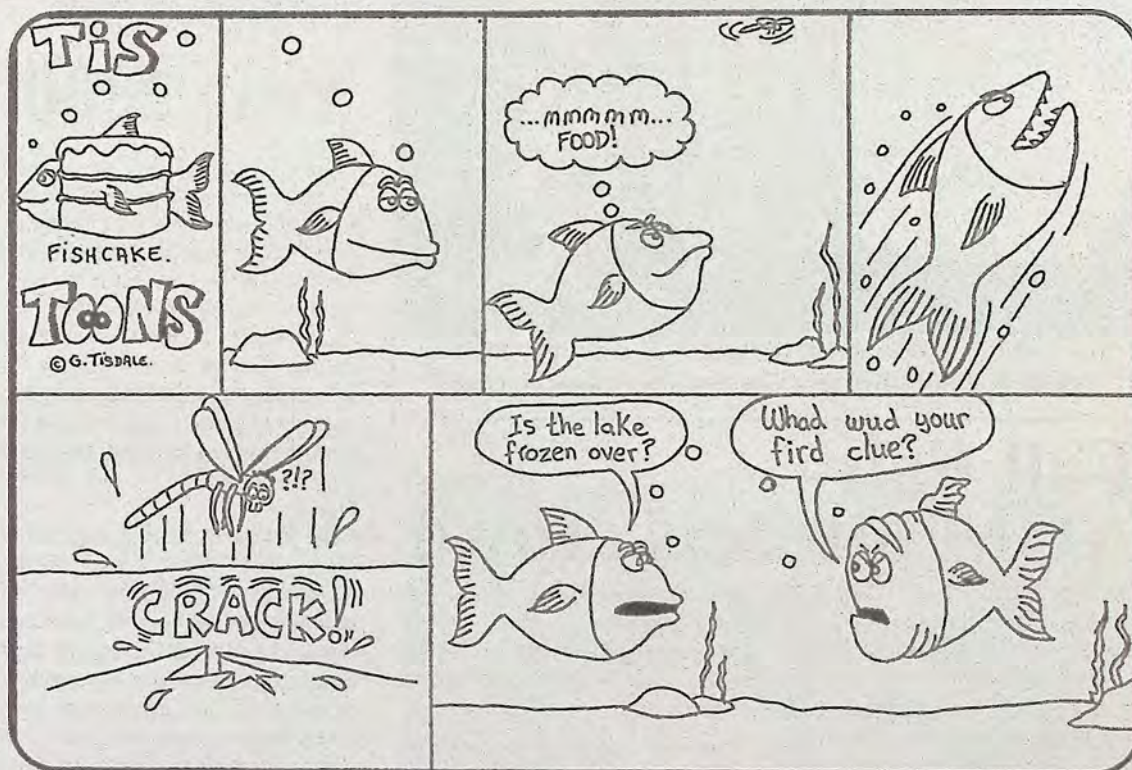

Open letter from Mayor to Regional Library Board

I regret my inability to attend today's meeting. I would like to thank the Board for giving me the opportunity to serve as Chairman this past year.

While many things were accomplished, I do have a concern over the choices we are being forced to make at this time. Perhaps we should all be reflecting very carefully on the purpose of the library system and of whom we serve. These unfortunate decisions, which we are now forced to make, have come about as a result of budgets of 0 and 2 per cent increase over the past two years. I do not believe that it was expedient to balance municipal budgets at the expense of a library system so vital to the region.

To those who live in small communities, this is of particular concern. In larger centers, we pay considerable money to situate branches on main streets and malls in order to make them accessible and visible. While we spend these funds in order to save users walking an extra block, is it justifiable to ask people in small communities to drive out of town?

I would point out that in the case of children and senior citizens

who constitute a large part of our circulation, this is not a viable option. They do not have public transportation systems nor do they have the wide range of alternate amenities available in larger centers. When we think the library may very well represent one of the main sources of education and entertainment to many of its users, are we sure that out of an \$8 million budget we cannot afford the \$10,000 it takes to operate Hedley Library annually?

I believe we should be working to expand our libraries in smaller communities. Residents whose library service is being threatened have taken the time to write letters and circulate petitions. Are the needs of these residents who find this service so vital any less important than those of larger centers? I would urge you as a board member to at least maintain our present service.

a number of years ago to allow the discontinuance of the BookMobile service for Hedley, Olalla, and Keremeos, with the understanding that library services would be available in a limited for to the people of Hedley. To now close these limited services to the residents of Hedley would be a breach or our agreement at the time and an elimination of services to the residents of Hedley.

The community is more than 29 kilometers from the nearest Regional Library Services, and we do not have a regularly scheduled bus service that meet the needs required if library services were only offered in Keremeos and Princeton. As well, many residents do not have transportation of their own to travel these distances to other facilities.

Area G's contribution to the Regional Library Board exceeds more than \$40,000 for only just over 1800 residents and a circulation of just over 16,000. This clearly shows that we are more than paying our fair share of Regional Library Funding, which I fully support, provided that we receive a reasonably equitable level of service.

Closing down the Hedley library services does not meet my definition of equitable service for the residents of Hedley, and if it is the Board's decision to reduce the level of service to residents of Hedley, I will have no alternative but to re-evaluate Area G's participation of this function, which could mean a reduction of revenues to the Board of more than \$40,000.

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

The ski group, which developed China Ridge ski trails, has been opposing Bear Mountain's application to extend the boundaries into Crown land which the ski club sees as its own.

Kukula told ski club members the trails had legally been designated and gazetted February 9, 1995, and although the trails may have existed and been in use long before that time, in legal terms, the trails had existed only since gazetted. Further, BC Assets and Lands (BCAL) sees the interest of the ski club as only the 10 metre wide strip where the trails are laid down, not the entire area. The cross country trail will be intersected by a snowmobile trail at one point.

Ski club members voiced several objections to the snowmobile crossing.

Kukula told them, "You're not going to change their (BCAL) minds on this."

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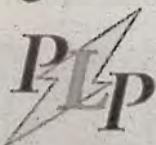
