B.C. economy strengthens

VICTORIA - B.C.'s exports showed continued strength with a 5.8 per cent increase in September as compared with September 1998.

B.C.'s exports are up 10.3 per cent this year over 1998. Goods valued at more than \$21.3 billion were shipped from B.C. between January 1, 1999 and September 1999, compared with \$19.3 billion for the same period in 1998.

Forestry products led the continued growth in resource exports, up 15.6 per cent, with agricultural and fishing products up 10.2 per cent.

B.C.'s wholesale sales increased 1.1 per cent in September, while

overall wholesale sales for Canada declined one per cent. This is the fourth increase in B.C.'s wholesale sales in the past six months. The new consolidated format for the B.C. government quarterly report was released November 25 by Finance Minister Paul Ramsey.

Figures for the first six months contained these highlights:

- The summary accounts deficit was \$276 million, \$182 million below last year
- The consolidated revenue recorded a shortfall \$392 million better than what was planned for this time of year
- Within the consolidated revenue fund, revenue was up \$447 mil-

lion, mainly due to strong natural resources revenues.

- The net contribution of Crown corporations was \$235 million.
- Provincial debt totalled \$34.6 billion, up \$2.5 billion from the start of the year. Over \$1.6 billion of the debt increase was advance borrowing to take advantage of lower interest rates earlier this year.

- * The revised forecast for the summary accounts shows a projected deficit of \$1.2 billion - \$308 million lower than the March budget forecast. This includes an allowance of \$100 million for unforeseen events.

Clubs decide steps to future

PRINCETON - Club and organization presidents met for a planning breakfast on November 24, organized by a combination of Chamber and Commerce and Town of Princeton recreation. Lyle Thomas was the facilitator.

Thomas reminded everyone of the purpose of the meeting: to have well-coordinated events to attract visitors, and to be creative and enjoy what is created.

Thomas commended community leaders for what they had achieved in the past year.

Mayor Randy McLean welcomed everyone and commented on the theme, pride in the town.

"We have to start realizing what a great town we live in," Mayor McLean said.

Lori Thomas, Chamber of Commerce office manager, gave a brief overview of Christmas Light-up on December 10, and reminded Chamber members the annual general meeting will be December 8.

Lawrence Newman talked about the goals of Princeton Youth Soccer for the coming year: to raise the level of coaching skills through a coaching clinic. He then switched to his other interest, the 4-H Lamb and Rabbit Club. He praised their achievement, saying they now walk away with most of the prizes and trophies at out of town fairs and shows. Newman said there may be a show in Princeton next year.

Ruth McLeod reported on the Hospital Auxiliary, which is giving \$38,000 for beds, and puts in 500 hours of volunteer work each month. She noted the auxiliary has increased its membership during the past year.

Dorothy Cobb, Rotary President, told the group that Rotary has committed to a gala night in the spring to help the Hospital Foundation raise money. In May, they will have the annual Golf Calcutta, and will sponsor the Racing Days parade, as usual. Rotary is looking for a partner club to do the Las Vegas Night, as the work is just too much. In the fall, Rotary plans to have a community concert and loonie auction. Rotary plans to continue with the community walkway project next summer.

Elk transplant update: will you support new elk in the valley?

Following a number of meetings of the Upper Similkameen Elk Co-Management Committee during the spring of 1999, the committee agrees there should be an elk transplant of 50 elk in Princeton and Hedley areas during the winter of 1999/2000 to rejuvenate the local herd. For the first time in 65 years, a new gene pool will be introduced into the herd, which is on the decline as a viable, sustainable herd due to inbreeding.

There is a long history of elk in the Similkameen watershed. If there is local public support for the project, the plan is to transplant elk from Alberta in late winter. The timing allows the elk to find an area familiar to return to after a summer at higher elevations.

A number of elk will be radio collared and their movements monitored. Health of the overall herd will be evaluated and future population levels will be regulated.

Local people will be kept involved and informed about latest plans and initiatives relating to the herd.

Two open house meetings are planned. The first is at the Legion Hall in Princeton December 6, 7-9 p.m. The second is at the OAP Hall in Hedley December 7, 7-9 p.m.

Dream becomes success

SIMILKAMEEN - Barb Allison had always had a keen interest in art, and when her family was grown, she had a dream of owning an arts and craft store. She likes artists' way of looking at the world, and she wanted to work

with art in some way. Barb has artistic talent, and when she was young, her grandmother Selina Bent taught her how to make moccasins and gloves, saying, "You'll always be able to make some money if you know

how to do this." Barb did not make a living with moccasins, but when her son was unemployed in 1993, Barb and her husband, Henry, decided to turn the north end of their house into an arts and crafts store while their son, Henry, attended an entrepreneurship course and made a business plan. They were not eligible for any kind of government assistance, so they had to stock the store from their own resources.

"When I looked at some pictures from when we first started," Barb said, "I laughed because we had so little in the store."

That is certainly not their situation today. Standing Rock has one of the finest collections of native art and crafts one could ask for. They sell carvings, jewelry, paintings, baskets, leather goods, clothing and hand-loomed blankets. Clothing comes from Barthline of Merritt, and is simply outstanding. Blankets and mats come from wool weavers in the southwestern U.S.A. and Mexico. Standing Rock specializes in goods: authentically native American.

Standing Rock asks customers to sign a guest book. This year's book shows people have visited from all over the world.

"People are really surprised when they find out this store is owned by native people," Barb says, "and they are pleased when we tell them."

People come to the store to look for something different, and that is exactly what they find.

Standing Rock store is located between Hedley and Keremeos, across Highway 3 from one of the seven sacred stones of the Similkameen Valley, Standing Rock, from which the shop takes its name. This rock was used to test young men's skills when they were on a vision quest. The challenge was to run up the rock to the top.

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There is nothing like a visit from Santa Claus to bring a sparkle to children's eyes. Santa was the star, as usual, at Pharmasave during Moonlight Madness, as children told him their wish list for Christmas. It was all part of what appears to be another successful Moonlight Madness for Princeton's Christmas shopping season kick-off.

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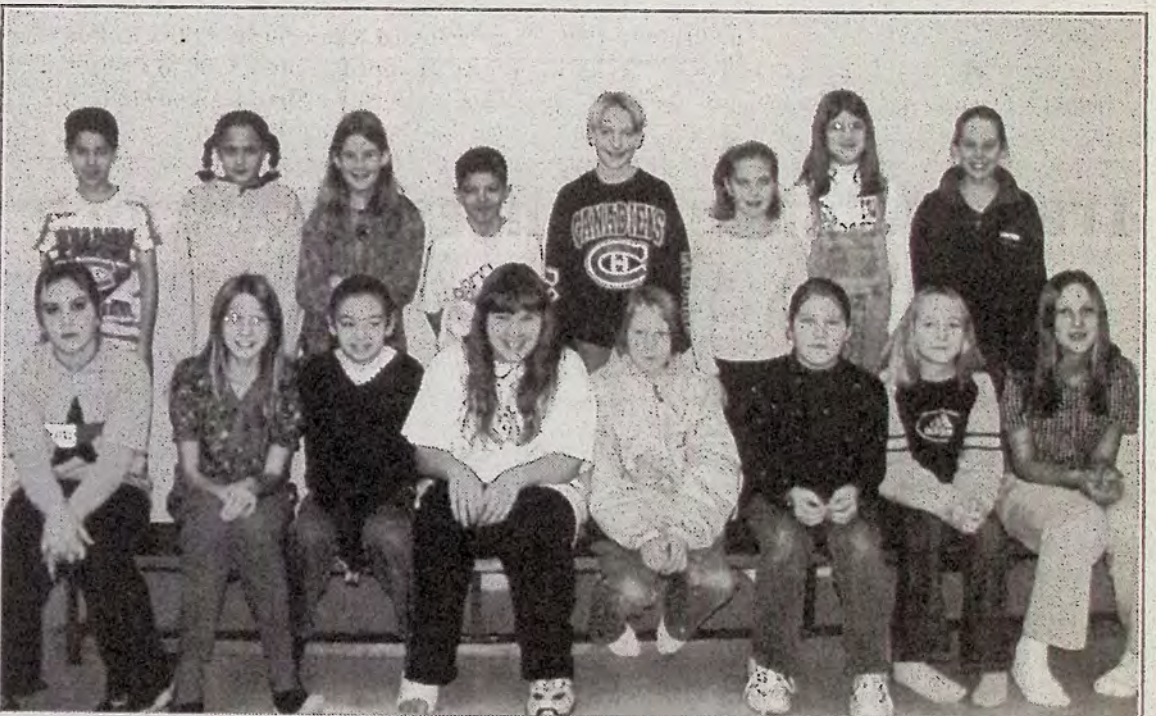

Health Officer warns of E. Coli

The B.C. Centre for Disease Control and Dr. Perry Kendall, Provincial Officer of Health, have issued a province-wide health alert after more than 55 people have contracted food poisoning, believed to be linked to Hungarian salami. At least 10 people have been hospitalized. Cases of the E. coli infection (often referred to as "hamburger disease") have been reported in the lower mainland, Vancouver Island, Fraser Valley, Coast-Garibaldi, Okanagan and Peace River regions.

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The salami is sold under the brand name of Fleetwood Sausage and manufactured in Surrey, B.C. The product is sold in retail stores in bulk, packaged slices and from deli counters. The product has also been distributed to restaurants and other commercial food outlets in B.C. The processing plant is cooperating with federal and provincial officials and has stopped production and distribution of the product.

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Trade ruling helps livestock exports

TERRACE - Corky Evans, Minister of Agriculture and Food, expressed pleasure at the U.S. rulings ending trade duties imposed on Canada's hog and cattle industries. In commenting in Terrace, Evans said the rulings prove the value of a strong, rules-based international trade system.

"I am pleased U.S. authorities finally did the right thing and brought this trade action against our cattle exports to an end," Evans said. "I am disappointed the U.S. industry group has decided to appeal, but I am confident the decision will be upheld.

B.C.'s cattle industry here in the north and around the province fought long and hard against duties that just didn't make sense."

The U.S. International Trade commission ruled earlier this week that imports of cattle from Canada are not injuring or threatening to the U.S. industry. Anti-dumping duties collected over the past year will be refunded to Canadian cattle exporters.

"This U.S. trade action hit B.C.'s cattle industry hard because most of its production is exported," Evans said.

Duties of 5.6 per cent (about \$50 per head) were imposed on all Canadian feeder and slaughter cattle exports to the U.S., including B.C. cattle exports worth \$80 million in 1998.

In a separate decision last week, the U.S. agreed it should lift 15 years of countervailing duties against live swine imported from Canada. Although the U.S. has never been a major market for B.C. hogs, the countervailing duty had depressed the domestic price of hogs, pushing down the price B.C. farmers received.

Gorman Brothers and LSIB reach agreement on Ashnola logging

 SIMILKAMEEN - Gorman Brothers Ltd and the Lower Similkameen Indian Band (LSIB) have recently signed an interim working agreement regarding logging the Ashnola. Effective until March 31, 2000, the agreement will allow Gorman Brothers to log 35,000 cubic meters, as long as the LSIB can log a certain amount, and can be involved with, or have input into, silviculture, technical layout, wildlife and other studies, and forest development plans.

According to Dixon Terbasket LSIB band manager, Gorman Brothers originally proposed a 65,000 cubic meter cut.

In September, Gorman Brothers had backed off logging in the Ashnola in an effort to stay away from confrontation. In a report presented September 8 to Keremeos Council, Regional District, and First Nations, Gorman Bros stated, "In subsequent years, it is expected that 25% to 35% of Gorman Brothers timber supply will come from the Lower Similkameen area." The report outlined the efforts Gorman

Brothers had been making toward an agreement with the LSIB, such as offering an LSIB member "one third of road building and deactivation activities," including operations outside the Lower Similkameen, and offering the LSIB a harvesting contract representing 25% of the volume harvested in the area.

In a November 19 interview, Terbasket said of the interim agreement, "It was the most difficult thing for our Chief and Council to do--give in again in the act of good faith. We did not get our road use agreement or stumpage appraisal."

Town Hill will be pretty

KEREMEOS - Beautification is being planned for Keremeos Town Hill. In a letter dated November 4 to Keremeos Village, W.R. Coates, Ministry of Transportation and Highways (MOTH's) Area Manager, said that Dan Doyle, MOTH Deputy Minister, had "confirmed the Ministry's participation in this project, as discussed."

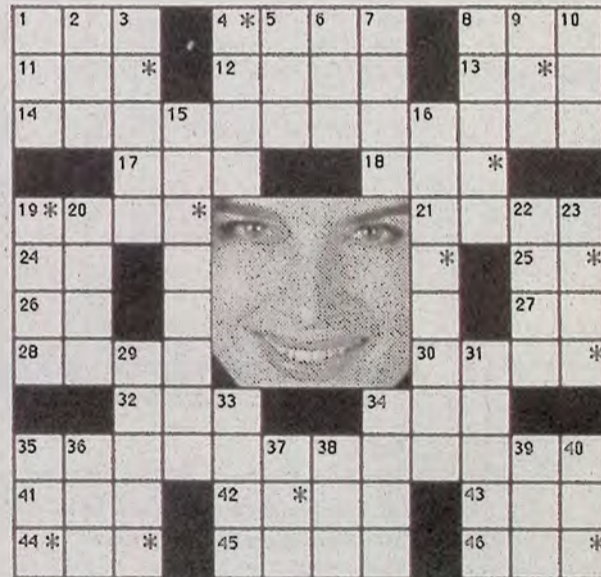

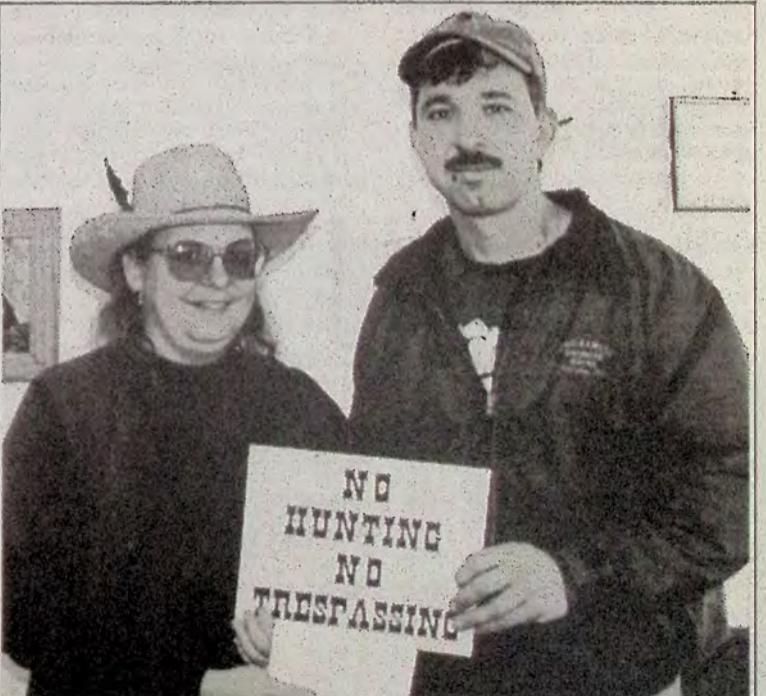
of the southwest flank.

Sex hormones fight aging

Healthy sex organs keep you young.

People function on hormones, especially sex hormones. That is why aging accelerates as our reproductive function slows. It is as if Mother Nature is prepared to shut us down and discard us as soon as we can no longer reproduce. Females function on estrogen and progesterone. Males function on testosterone. Maintaining healthy sex organs is a must for long life.

Although Mother Nature may have decided to scrap us, there are other ways of gaining the sex hormone levels needed to remain healthy. Hormone supplements, certain minerals, vitamins and enzymes can help tremendously.

Never take hormones except by prescription and in the amounts prescribed by a doctor with a keen interest in keeping you healthy. Never mess around with hormones because they have side effects if not handled carefully.

Estrogen supplement after menopause (surgical or natural) is essential to women, preventing osteoporosis and Alzheimer's disease. Estrogen supplement during menopause can overcome many of the adverse effects of menopause.

Progesterone helps the female body create other hormones. Vitamin E in low doses (150 IU) raises the level of progesterone. At the Academy of Anti-Aging Medicine, doctors recommend phytoestrogens, found in plants, which raise the level of both estrogen and progesterone. Soy products and wild yam products are good sources. Wild yam creams are considered beneficial. Low progesterone levels are often associated with breast cancer. Testosterone, the male hormone,

protects men against heart disease, makes them feel happy, and gives them energy. Men's levels of testosterone begin to decline in middle age, but before they consider hormone replacement, they need to use preventive care. There are hazards to testosterone supplements, and protecting male sex organs is a far better approach.

Men need zinc, a low fat diet, plenty of green vegetables, very little alcohol, and no nicotine, in order to keep hormone levels healthy. Men should stay away from dairy products. Saw palmetto and evergreen tree extract will help keep male sex organs healthy. At least one hour a day of vigorous exercise maintains healthy male sex organs. Men should eat tomatoes with their skins on. The more they eat, the better they are protected against prostate cancer, a major killer of men.

The couch potato with his beer, cigarettes and fatty snacks is a man headed for a shorter sex life and a shorter life. It is the male hormone that keeps men young.

Hormone supplements, and natural preventive measures, trick the body into believing it is still young. A body with the right hormones continues to repair tissues, resists disease, and resists aging.

Warning: the Academy of Anti-Aging Medicine warns against consuming synthetic estrogen, imitators which occur in products stored in clear plastic containers. These are especially dangerous for men and boys. Plastic containers you can see through include soft drink bottles, salad dressing bottles, ketchup and cooking oil bottles.

We still need a voice in health care

Anyone attending Community Health Advisory Committee meetings will notice how few attend and how few sit around the table. This is certainly a change from the days of the Hospital Board, when at least half a dozen people would attend and the Board table would be missing just one or two people.

Recently, we learned that some members of the Health Advisory Committee intend to resign. With vacancies on the Committee still not filled despite repeated advertisements, this will leave the Committee membership decimated. Health Advisory Committees are disappearing like leaves in autumn in community after community. Part of the problem is that members feel powerless and voiceless when dealing with Regional Health Boards. Princeton area is currently voiceless due to having no member on Regional Health Board to represent us, although persons have been nominated. We must wait for the Health Minister to appoint a nominee, but the Minister has chosen to leave the matter unattended.

In our view, nothing would please the Regional Health Board more than the demise of Princeton's Community Health Advisory Committee. We have been a thorn in the side of the Regional Board as we complained about what is happening at our hospital, and what may happen in the future, as we see an increasing move to centralization. We have had no assurances that any money has been saved by a regional system, any more than we have seen any savings by school district amalgamation. However, we still have a school board with trustees to represent us, as frustrating as they find their jobs at times.

What we need now is people willing to protect our interests in health matters on a Health Advisory Committee, but few appear interested. The Americans have a saying, "When the going gets tough, the tough get going." Are there any tough Princeton area people ready to get going?

If you are tough and ready to keep poking a thorn into Regional Hospital Board, your community needs you.

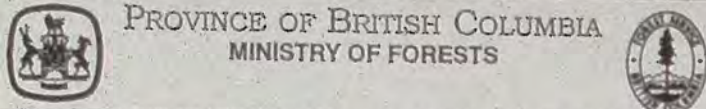

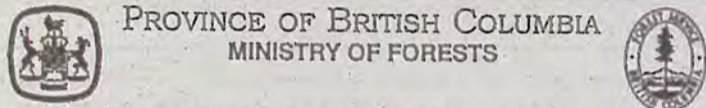

Y2K madness takes many forms

With the year 2000 rapidly approaching, I am utterly amazed at the strange things people are doing.

For example, I heard of a fellow down in the United States who expects Armageddon. He has buried several steel boxcars underground as an alternative place to live when good and evil collide.

A television program I watched about a month ago told the story of hundreds of Americans who have sold everything they own, quit their jobs and moved to Israel, convinced Christ is returning to Jerusalem at the stroke of midnight on December 31, zero hour.

Then there are 40,000 or more Americans who believe they will be "raptured" up to heaven.

I heard one of those televangelists saying, "Dinner will be left cooking on the stove, but nobody will be at home."

As I am of a practical turn of mind, my first thought was, "What home?"

One of the typical causes of house fires is leaving dinner unattended on the stove. The fire departments of the U.S.A. will be

really busy if all those people are raptured to heaven.

Another thing that dumbfounds me about rapturing is how many people want to do it. In my view, there is a close similarity between rapturing and dying. Personally, I am not eager to die. The world



may hold its disappointments, but all in all, I rather like it.

The other side of wanting to leave the world for a better place is probably the idea that being up in heaven (why is it up?) is preferable to being down on earth. That is maybe true, but I am not ready

to test it yet. I guess you could say I am an "earthbound individual, and probably not very "spiritual."

These people waiting to be raptured and those waiting in Jerusalem for Christ may be very disappointed in what happens as the clock ticks into Year 2000. What if nothing happens? What if the world just keeps on turning as usual? What if nobody is raptured and Christ does not appear? What if there is no Armageddon?

Long ago, when I was in Paris, I visited the Eiffel Tower at a time when a man chose to jump from the top. The tower legs spread out at the bottom. He was rescued and lived. I often wonder how he felt when he woke up in hospital and discovered he was an unsuccessful suicide. Maybe the unraptured will know how he felt.

Head saves lost hunter

SIMILKAMEEN - A hunter lost overnight on November 22 was the third in "about the last month and a half," says Eugene Deschamps of Kermeos and District Search and Rescue(SAR).

Nine Kermeos SAR volunteers met Penticton, Oliver and Osoyoos SAR teams at about 2:00 a.m. at Twin Lakes turnoff to Taylor Lake to begin the search. Deschamps says they checked out several roads, broadcast information about the lost hunter on one of the local radiostations and gave Weyerhaeuser truck drivers a description of the lost hunter's vehicle. In the morning, a man who heard the radio broadcast reported to SAR he remembered speaking to the hunter at Taylor Lake before he became lost. SAR teams narrowed the search.

Deschamps says, they "had a vehicle on each trail that came out of the area."

At about 10:30 a.m., within half a hour of receiving the tip, they found the lost man.

Deschamps says, the man had gone into an area, "not for two wheel drives. He got down into a hole he couldn't get out of between Taylor Lake and Willowbrook."

Deschamps says the lost man from Penticton is a bush pilot, was a former resident of the Twin Lakes area, and used to hunt by Taylor Lake and behind Vaseax Lake.

Deschamps says the hunter "used his head," knew the rules, and "did everything right... He left a note about where he was going, and stayed within the vehicle."
