On Thursday morning, December 23, a vehicle heading west, bound for Christmas on the Sunshine Coast, spun out of control and flew off Highway 3 just west of the gravel pit near Princeton. Agricultural Land Commission offers T.L. Timber new deal, lower bond

CAWSTON - The Agricultural Land Commission (ALC) has accepted a mid-December offer by T.L. Timber for 2 year extension on its mill operation in Cawston with the payment of a \$25,000 performance bond. The ALC had originally proposed a 1 year extension with payment of a \$75,000 bond.

Though T.L. Timber proposed the new deal, Dave Lusted of T.L. Timber said, in a December 21 interview, that the agreement will not be final until T.L. Timber signs it. Lusted says his lawyers will look at the consent order, and "If it looks like the best deal at the moment, we'll take it."

He says, "Everything will have

to be settled prior to January 15, 2000. It isn't what I'd hoped for," but "it's quite a bit better" than the original offer.

Despite the deal, Lusted plans to continue researching legal issues related to Agricultural Land Use.

Teen death case goes to Crown

Vermilion gains control of local Trail

PRINCETON - The Vermilion Trails Society will become steward of a section of the Trans Canada Trail between Brookmere and Osprey Lake. This part of the Trans Canada Trail follows the abandoned right-of-way of the historic Kettle Valley Railway.

"I congratulate the Vermilion Trails Society for taking on the responsibility of managing this part of the trail," Lali said. "The Trans Canada Trail is not only a legacy for present and future generations, but it provides recreational and tourism opportunities for local communities. Developing and maintaining the trail will be key to fulfilling that potential."

One goal of the Trans Canada Trail project is for government to work in partnership with local communities. The province, as the primary landowner, has committed to negotiate with local and regional governments, as well as local societies, to allocate stewardship of the trail lands where appropriate. Trail stewardship focuses on providing safe passage for trail users, and includes trail restoration, drainage work, bank and ballast stabilization and provision of facilities. Stewardship may also allow for trestles or other structures to be restored.

"This has been a community effort made possible by the dedication of many volunteers in our area," said John Byatt, president of the Vermilion Trails Society. "We are proud to be involved in a legacy of caring for our multi-use portion of the Trans Canada Trail."

In support of the volunteers of the Vermilion Trails Society, E-Teams from the Ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks have been working on this section of the trail over the past six months. They have built facilities for trail users and improved safety.

Communities along the Trans Canada Trail view it as an important local recreational amenity and as a part of a diversified economy. Many trails, particularly those on railbeds, attract tourism activities. Other portions of the Kettle Valley Railway in B.C. have seen increased use by international tourists.

When complete, the Trans Canada Trail will stretch 15,000 kilometres across the country, linking thousands of communities

in every province and territory. The trail will pass through some of B.C.'s most stunning landscapes, from the Rockies through the Kootenays, the Okanagan, the Fraser Valley and the Lower Mainland to Vancouver Island.

The completion of the B.C. portion of the Trans Canada Trail is the province's first millennium project. In B.C. existing trails will be used wherever possible, adding abandoned railway lines, parks and some private land. It will accommodate a variety of recreational activities.

Women face holiday risks

Women need to be aware of personal safety during this holiday season.

"Unfortunately, the holiday season can bring situations and conditions that can lead to an increased risk of violence for women," stated Nancy Kwan, Minister for Women's Equality.

Three main areas of risk for women:

- * Violence against women, also called domestic violence - holiday stress increases the risk in abusive relationships

- * Sexual harassment - parties, particularly where alcohol is served, inappropriate or illegal behaviour by people in power can occur

- * Drug rape - debilitating drugs can be slipped into a woman's drink to incapacitate her

Precautions:

- Use a buddy system - go out with trusted friends and be aware of one another

- Don't take a drink from anyone you haven't known long enough to trust

- Don't put your drink down or leave it where you can't see it. Drugs can easily be slipped into an unattended drink where they are colourless, odourless and tasteless.

- Trust your instincts - if you or a friend seems unusually drunk, sleepy or sick, get help. Call police, go to an emergency medical centre.

- If a situation does not feel right, you have every right to refuse a ride or an advance, even if you know the person

- If your partner has hurt you physically, has sexually assaulted you or is threatening you, call 911.

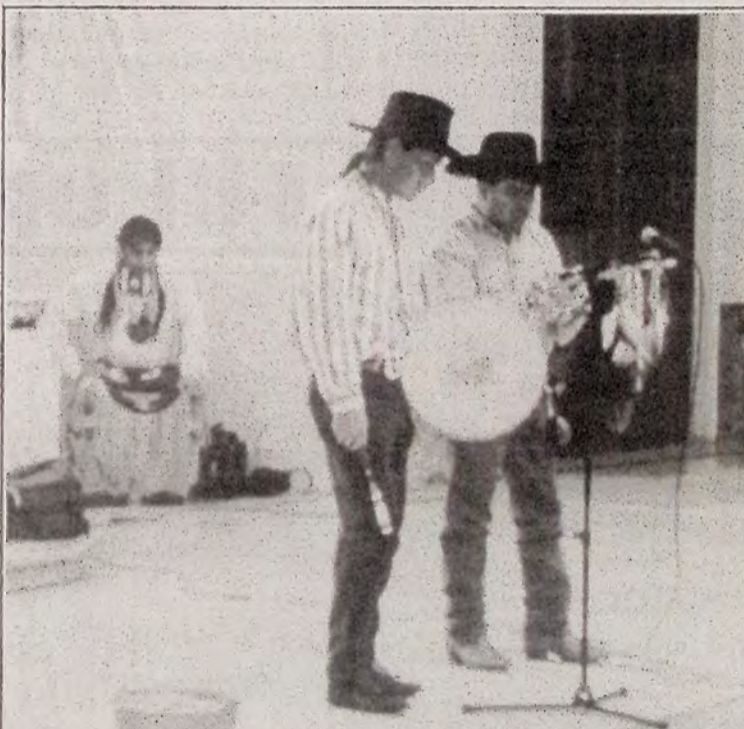

Similkameen native singer performs in gallery opening in Belgium

SIMILKAMEEN - Jay Begaye, a resident of Chopaka Indian Reserve, is a well-known artist and singer beyond the Similkameen Valley, but is most widely known in the valley for his art and his talent as a powwow organizer and rodeo announcer. A man of many talents, Begaye and his friend Duane Howard, had a brand new experience this fall. From September 20 to 26, they travelled in Europe as guest performers at the opening of the new art gallery in Brussels, Belgium.

For Jay, it was his first airplane flight, and his first view of Europe. The troupe who attended was selected from among the best dancers, singers and drummers in Canada. The contact person for arranging the tour was Bob Boyer from the Cree Nation. Begaye performed in both Brussels and London, England. In addition to the art gallery opening, they performed at schools, a museum and a theatre in Brussels.

The group of performers was well-treated, taken on sight-seeing tours and to dinners. Jay rates the tour as "very successful" as he sold all of his 150 recordings. (Begaye has received excellent reviews on his recordings of traditional powwow music.) Begaye plans to go back to Europe in August, 2000.

Weissmann retires

After a twenty-seven year tour of duty serving the public, Mary Weissmann said farewell to her job at Pharmasave on December 22. Nobody was eager to see her leave, and the management set her up with a table to serve coffee and cake to customers who stopped to wish her well in her retirement.

"I feel overwhelmed by the number of people who have come in to say they will miss me and wish me well," she commented, appearing surprised at how people cared.

Weissmann started her job on March 3, 1973, working for Jim Jackson at Scott's Pharmacy. "I've seen a lot of changes in the store during the years," Weissmann recalls. "I've worked with some really great people."

When she first started, pharmacist Len Seto was on staff, and she worked with clerks Pat Graveline and Lil Armstrong. During her years at the drugstore, she worked longest with Lil Dunn, Bernice Cromarty and Dene Ligtenberg.

Weissmann started in the days before counter check-out computers, and had to learn more than one new cash register system during the years. When Scott Jackson and Wen Wong formed a partnership to buy the business from Jim Jackson, an entire new system of computerized check-outs was installed. Mary Weissmann, like all the others on staff, had to learn the system. Weissman worked through downtown revitalization and the construction of the copper tower on the corner of the store, as well as the construction of an upstairs staff room. When Scott's Pharmacy became Pharmasave in 1997, she went through the huge interior renovation of the store, which was a major project.

"What I find interesting," Weissmann says, "is remembering seeing mothers come in here with their babies, and now I'm seeing those babies with their own babies."

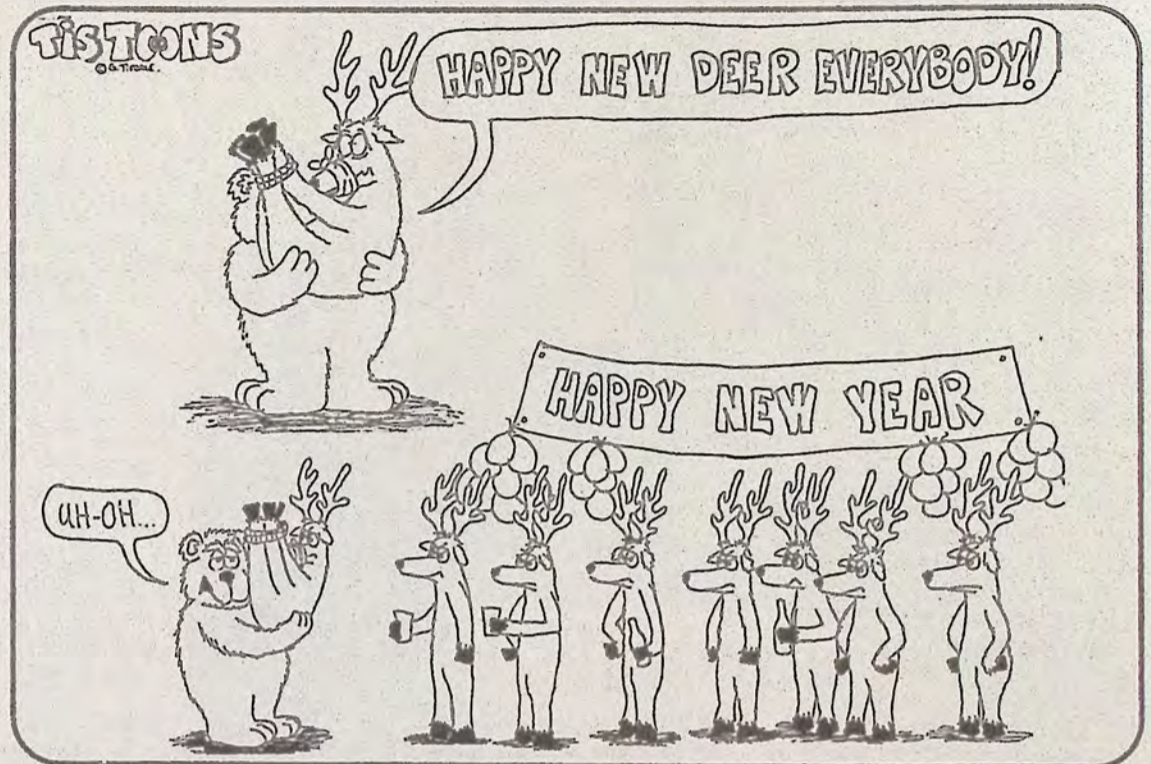

The 1999 mining year review

Dear Editor;

1999 can best be characterized as both a difficult and disappointing year for B.C.'s mining industry. Two mines closed and no new mines were opened. Mineral exploration plummeted dramatically and is now expected to total just \$25 million this year. That compares to exploration spending in 1990 of \$264 million.

British Columbia's mining industry posted a \$157 million loss for the previous year, 1998. It remains unclear in what direction that trend will move as the final industry figures for this year are totalled.

The amount of money being spent to find new mines is perhaps the industry's most troubling statistic. It is the barometer by which the very future of the industry can be measured. If people aren't spending money looking for mines, no mines will be found to replace those that are nearing the end of their productive lives. If that situation lasts for too long, there simply will not be a mining industry in our province in a few more years.

Looking back at the decade of the 1990's, 14 mines have closed and only seven new mines have opened, which is hardly a formula for sustainability. Despite this disturbing trend, things can be turned around if the political will exists to do so.

Last year, mining in this province was responsible for generating a billion dollars in tax revenue for

governments – money that is crucial to the delivery of education, health care and other services we want for ourselves and our children.

Last year, mining generated 56 per cent of all rail freight revenue in the country, and mining products accounted for 69 per cent of total port volume – far greater than grain shipments and all container traffic. Yet, despite these desirable economic attributes, the provincial government continues to turn a blind eye to policies that threaten the future of mining. In doing so, the government threatens its own prosperity and the prosperity of the people of the province.

Balance needs to be restored to the provincial government and to the policies they develop and implement. There needs to be some serious re-thinking of the wisdom behind such initiatives as land use planning, which continues to systematically deny British Columbians access to

their own resources.

Minerals, in sufficient quantity, represent enormous wealth and opportunity to the people who own them, and in B.C., the owners happen to be the people who live here. What we do as an industry is perform a service for the owners of those mineral resources. We dig their minerals out of the ground for them and in doing so we create jobs, we create wealth and we create opportunity. Our work is complicated. It's expensive, and it takes a lot of engineering expertise. But at the end of the day, it's just a service we perform for the owners. If the people of B.C. and Canada are to continue to benefit from the mineral wealth they own, then access to the land that contains those minerals must be assured. If we limit that access then we limit the benefits any of us can enjoy.

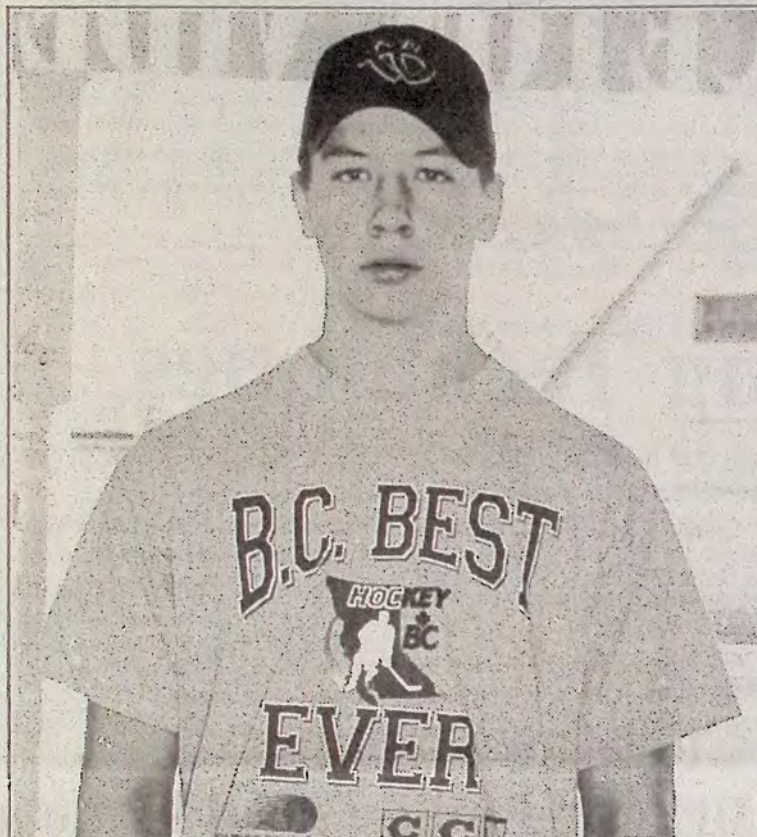

Trout Talk

Ice Fishing Techniques

by John Sandness, Similkameen Valley outdoorsman

I don't want to give the impression that I have it all figured out! Far from it, but there are some basic strategies which might help, and don't be afraid to try something different, especially when the fish aren't biting.

I am reminded of the time when I saw a fellow put on of those tiny marshmallows, the kind used to decorate cakes, on his hook. Dropped through the ice for only a few minutes, that chewy morsel was grabbed by a rainbow trout, which I am sure was surprised to find itself airborne, and held up by a happy angler for all to admire.

Caught "hook line and sinker" is a common phrase to which I will add, "bobber". You are limited to a very small area under the ice, so no fancy fly rod or spinning outfit is needed. Just have plenty of line on whatever you have it wrapped around. You never know when the four- or five-pound Kamloops will show up.

For years, I used a monofilament line of six- to eight-pound test. Then a fishing pal suggested an old fly line, as it had worked well for him. I wrapped an old sinking line, with the finish all chewed up from years of use and abuse, on an old level wind casting reel. Putting this on a 3 1/2 foot long rod, which I made from a glass fly rod tip section, I was set to try out this new technique. It worked great!

You have a number of advantages. First, the line doesn't stretch. In 30 feet of water, a monofilament line may stretch two feet. This does not help set the hook. Next, you can handle the line better. Ever try first finding, and then pulling up, a six-pound test line while wearing mittens or gloves? This, all the while watching your bobber disappear beneath the water. It can be frustrating, and I am sure that many a trout has made off with the bait at this time!

On the terminal end of the fly

line, put six feet of eight-pound test leader. Why six feet? When you have snapped off lures and hooks for an hour or two, trying to tie on the perfect lure, you will soon have about four feet of line left.

Now, for the hook. I prefer big bend hooks. Some call them wide gap hooks. They are much better for hooking fish on the vertical pull. It makes sense to use a size six, or even larger size four hook. (Another of the interesting peculiarities of fishing tackle is the smaller the number, the larger the hook.) Anyway, back to the hook - buy good ones! If there are two packets of hooks on the store shelf, one \$.89 for ten, and the other packet costs \$1.50 for ten, by all means, buy the more expensive. They will catch more fish and not break on the big one.

Use a strong knot, such as the jam knot. It will not weaken your leader.

To get a thick fly line down, you need a fairly good weight, so your sinker will be bigger than the one you use in the summer on your spinning line. So experiment with sinkers. Start with about 1/8 ounce and work up to heavier weights as needed. I like the sinkers with rubber cores, one brand is Gremlin, for my ice fishing. These do not weaken the leader, either, as do those you clinch directly on the monofilament leader.

I have discussed the hook, line and sinker. Why did I say that I

would add "bobber"? If you have read my column before, you know that I am adamant, at least for myself, about not using those great, big bobbers, anything over one-and-one half inch diameter for ice fishing. A tapered, rather than round bobber is another must. Why? because of resistance when the fish tries to pull it down. Actually, the fish is taking the bait, and the bobber just follows. If the pull (resistance) is great, they let go, as something is wrong when they can't easily swim away with a worm (or marshmallow)! At least, that is the way I have it figured. Ever noticed how lightly they bite on some days? If I keep my bobber small enough to just barely float, I seem to have better success. Another plus: the smaller bobber doesn't freeze in the hole as easily, when two-thirds submerged. I like to fish them that way.

It is fun to use a little bell - yes, a tiny jingle bell - on your rod tip. Attach one to a clamp-type wooden clothes pin, then clamp this about six inches below the rod tip. Carefully avoid clamping your line - just the rod! When you are walking over to check how your fishing buddy is doing, you will hear the bell ring as a fish bites. Then you will find out how fast you can make it back to your own fishing hole. Good fishing in 2000!

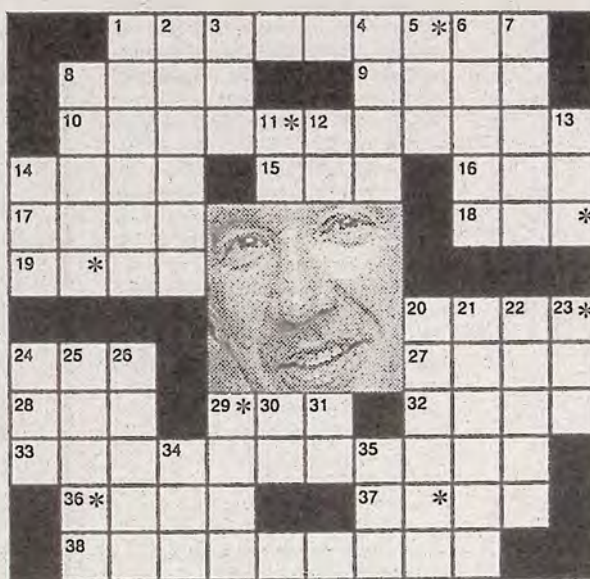

Local Water Wheel expert is internationally known

SIMILKAMEEN - In October 1999, local water wheel expert, Wally Liddicoat of Keremeos, travelled to Hickory, North Carolina for a conference of the Society for the Preservation of Old Water Powered Grist Mills, where he conducted a book signing for "Waterwheels in the Service of British Columbia Pioneers," an internationally known book he wrote three years ago.

Liddicoat, who in the past won an award for writing excellence from the above Grist Mill Society for his article about the Dog Creek Mill in the Chilcotin, is looking forward to presenting a paper at the International Molinology Society gathering next September in the States. Moulin is the French word for

mill.

In a December 8 interview, Liddicoat said waterwheels are a "fascinating subject, going back to the beginning of the use of water power." He says the first water powered grist mill in Canada was at Annapolis Royal in New Brunswick, built by French settlers in the 1600's. He says, at one time in Canada and the U.S., there were hundreds of water powered Grist Mills, but in B.C. "there weren't many." He found records of about 20 between the border and Quesnel.

Hudson's Bay built the first waterwheel powered saw mill in B.C. in 1848 at Millstream on Vancouver Island. A year later, a grist mill was added to the sawmill. The Grist Mill in Keremeos was a Provincial Mill,

one of the last to be built in the province. By 1930, only a few water powered mills were in operation in British Columbia. According to Liddicoat, waterwheels were eventually supplanted by the modern steam engine and the more efficient hydraulic turbine.

Liddicoat was born and raised in the Similkameen Valley. His father, who came to Hedley in 1908, worked at the nearby Nickle Plate Mine. Liddicoat says the main reason the mine was so attractive to investors was that there was a supply of water to run water wheels, and water turbines. Mine workers dammed 20 mile creek and brought water down to the mine's reduction plant where, at one time, seven waterwheels operated. One ran a compressor to supply air to the miners. Liddicoat says more waterwheels were used in early mining in B.C. than were used in mills.

Liddicoat says songs and poetry have been written about the "attractive, rustic" grist mills. He calls the waterwheel "an idea as old as yesterday--but as new as tomorrow" and says the waterwheel, "when working in harmony with the environment, does not produce chemical changes in the water used to turn it."

Minister warns students 'millennium letters confuse'

VICTORIA - A letter sent to B.C. students by the Canada Millennium Scholarship Foundation is creating confusion about the value of their student grants and students should refer to notification of award letters provided by the Ministry of Advanced Education to determine exactly how much they will receive.

On December 21, Minister Andrew Petter stated the letter from the foundation's Montreal headquarters does not make it clear that the millennium scholarship award is a part of the total amount of financial assistance students will receive from the B.C. student assistance program in January.

"The foundation's letter may have led some students to think they will receive more money

than they originally thought," Petter said. "I want to make sure everyone understands what is going to happen. In B.C., money from the Canada Millennium Scholarship Foundation has been combined with funding for our provincial grant program and is being distributed by the B.C. student services branch."

Students are informed of the exact value of their total grant when they receive a notification of award letter. The ministry is distributing final notification letters showing students how much loan and/or grant they are receiving, as well as what portion of their total award is from the Canada Millennium Scholarship Foundation. Students should have received their revised notification of award letters this week.

B.C. commits to action on Aboriginal Youth Strategy

VICTORIA - Aboriginal Affairs Minister Dale Lovick states B.C. will follow a national plan to improve the lives of aboriginal youth. About 53 per cent of the 800,000 aboriginal people in Canada are under age 25. Increasing the participation of young aboriginal people in education, employment and skills development and sports and recreation is among the goals identified in a report by National Aboriginal Youth Strategy, and has been endorsed by federal, provincial and territorial ministers responsible for aboriginal affairs.

Lovick stated, "Suicide, poverty, abuse and unemployment rates for aboriginal youth across Canada are consistently much higher than those for other Canadian youth. This strategy, in which British Columbia played a key role, identifies ways to

improve quality of life for aboriginal youth through a series of goals and suggested approaches."

WATER

Drinking water: at least four litres per person per day - two for drinking and two for food preparation, hygiene and dishwashing.

EATING EQUIPMENT

- Disposable cups, plates and utensils
- Manual can opener, bottle opener
- Fuel stove & fuel. (Follow manufacturer's instructions).
• DON'T USE A BARBECUE OR PROPANE STOVE INDOORS.

GENERAL SUPPLIES

• Flashlight and batteries
• Spare batteries
• Battery powered radio
• Cash in bills and coins **NOT EXCESSIVE AMOUNTS** for at least 72 hours.
• Be prepared for winter clothing conditions
• Toilet paper and other personal supplies (eg. toothbrush, toothpaste, soap, comb & brush, feminine hygiene supplies and diapers).
• Candles, matches/lighter
• Spare set of glasses
• Food and water for pets
• Ensure fuel tank in car is kept half-filled or more.

MEDICAL SUPPLIES

• Basic first aid kit
• Essential medications for all members of the family. Keep at least a one-week supply in the emergency kit.
• Special home medical requirements such as oxygen should be filled to ensure adequate supply is available.

Keremeos prepares for Y2K

KEREMEOS - Keremeos Council hosted a Y2K meeting on December 10 where representatives from police, fire department, Emergency Social Services, schools, Irrigation District, Health services, senior citizens, and public works attended to coordinate plans for any problems or emergencies that might occur January 1.

One topic discussed was the need to remind the public that problems will show up in other places like Australia, Europe and eastern Canada before they show up here, so our area will have some lead time to address problems. Everyone can turn on a radio or television to become informed. Walter Despot mentioned that people should not get excited if there are problems in the Eastern Europe, Africa and Asia, as they are likely not as well prepared to the as Canada.

Village Chief Administrative Officer Eileen Oliver-Bauer said people should use one phone number for utility emergencies, 499-2712, and let it ring 6 to 8 times so it can be properly transferred. People with general Y2K questions should call the Village office at 499-2711 long before December 31. A list is being prepared of disabled persons and others requiring assistance in a power outage. Call 499-5518 or 499-2352 to be placed on the list.

Keremeos Village released a statement saying it "is pleased to report that all utility companies and public services are prepared" for possible Y2K bug emergencies, and "do not anticipate major problems." The statement asks people not to "panic," if power outages occur, but to turn on battery-powered radios for information. People must not call emer-

gency numbers unless they have a real emergency, because too many calls could deplete emergency battery powered communication systems. By tuning in to local radio stations, people will give power companies a chance to respond.

During the meeting, Walter Despot reported that Y2K preparedness handouts can be picked up at the D & T Centre, Home Support, Village Office, Pharmasave and IGA Plus. He said people don't need everything on the list. They "should give it some thought" and "work with their neighbours, especially regarding heat." Those who have to leave their homes should report to Emergency Social Services at 499-2200.

Sergeant Bauhuis reported police have been assured 911 will work but should be used for legitimate 911 calls only. RCMP will have two officers on duty and all

others will be on call.

Bob Stanley, Public Works foreman said that to prepare for the "unlikely" event that the sewer plant doesn't have enough power, people should make sure that any open ends on their sewer pipes have been sealed properly to prevent damage if sewerage backs up through the lines.

Stanley, who is also involved in the Municipal Emergency Program (MEP) that has taken over most of the duties that used to be handled by Provincial Emergency Program (PEP) said ham radio operators will be set up "province wide" so "we are going to have communication of one sort or another." Search and Rescue (SAR) members will be on hand to assist where needed.

He said, "We've pretty well got everything covered."

Fire Chief Jordy Bosscha said all firemen have "been warned they are on call."

Leave vehicles locked

SIMILKAMEN - A parked vehicle left unlocked can result in the owner being ticketed. Under section 191 of the B.C. Motor Vehicle Act, a motor vehicle must be equipped with a lock or other device to prevent the unauthorized use of the motor vehicle. A driver must not permit a motor vehicle to stand unattended or

parked unless the driver has locked it or made it secure in a manner that prevents its unauthorized use.

"The worst is when people leave the vehicle with the motor running," says Cst. Giles Gosselin, of South Okanagan Highway Patrol. The ticket will bring a \$58 fine with it, and any police officer in

British Columbia has the right to issue a ticket to a driver who has left a parked vehicle with the motor running, or with doors not locked.

Sleep required

"Twas the night before Christmas and all through the house not a creature was stirring... 'THEY WERE ALL SLEEPING!' Sleep is the body's way of restoring itself. Sleep needs vary between person to person and within a person at different age, stages, and situations.

Just after birth an infant sleeps as much as 16 hours per day. As any new parent will tell you this isn't 16 hours at one go. A newborn is very busy eating and filling diapers at least every few hours. As an infant matures, the total time spent in sleep gradually decreases and they remain awake for longer periods and sleep longer at night. Close to the end of the first year of life, most children sleep through the night with 1 or 2 naps during the day. By 18 months most children have given up regular napping all together.

Between the ages of 4 and 10 sleep time continues to decline from approximately 12 to 10 hours per night. During puberty and growth spurts sleep needs usually increase. By the end of the teen years, the average time spent in sleep is 8 hours and this generally remains the same throughout adulthood. During times of illness or when our bodies are stressed we need extra sleep time to recoup and repair. Many of us don't often get the required number of hours that we need as activities of our busy lives encroach on the precious sleep time.

There are 2 different sleep cycles; active sleep and quiet

sleep. Active sleep is also known as REM (rapid eye movement) sleep. This is where our heart rate and breathing are irregular and we have many body (i.e. eye) movements. More oxygen is used, our temperature is increased and the blood flow to our brain is increased. This is where the visions of sugarplums may dance in our heads (dream imagery). Quiet sleep is where our heart rate and breathing are regular and we are still. This is the cycle believed to restore our body. There are 4 stages of quiet sleep where sleep becomes increasingly deep. Stage 4 is the deepest sleep. This is the opportunity for parents to move their children without waking them. Stage 4 is also where it is quite normal to partially wake for a brief period with no recollection. A child may briefly cry out or an adult may adjust the covers and roll over. This is also where the more obvious sleepwalking or bed-wetting occurs. Normally a rapid return to sleep follows.
