Business closes

Ron Stevens shut down his business on December 31. Rustler's Hideaway, a Princeton restaurant, no longer exists. Local restaurants struggle through the winter months, and rely on tourism to bring reasonable revenue.

"If I lost twenty per cent of my customers because they couldn't smoke, then I couldn't keep the place open," Stevens told the News Leader.

Stevens is referring to the Workers Compensation ruling stating employees must be protected from secondhand smoke. To ensure the protection of employees, smoking is disallowed in all bars, pubs and restaurants.

Prospects look good for Sean Penn movie

The Sean Penn movie "The Pledge" will be filmed in B.C. and prospects look good for part of the film to be shot in the Similkameen Valley. Reports from B.C. Film Commission indicate the service station to be used will be in the Lytton area, but recent inquiries to a local business about available accommodation for film crews gives the impression some of the filming will be done locally.

No announcements have been made officially regarding the cast for the film, but Jack Nicholson was Penn's top choice for the lead.

No production dates have been announced, but the major production people have been selected and the production office established, indicating the film will go ahead in the near future. The production office is in Burnaby.

"The Pledge" is a murder mystery revolving around the attempt of a retired man to find the murderer of a friend's child.

Lali throws weight to Wilson

Harry Lali has come out publicly in support of Gordon Wilson for leader of the New Democratic Party of B.C.

Topping Lali's list of reasons is his view that Wilson "has the best chance of beating Gordon Campbell, the Liberal leader."

"Wilson knows Gordon Campbell's weaknesses," Lali remarked.

Lali believes Wilson will do the best job of representing small resource-based communities, which constitute all of Lali's Yale-Lillooet riding. Lali believes people in his riding feel comfortable with Wilson for leader.

Lali sees Wilson as an intelligent man who has a vision for the province. In giving Wilson his support, Lali was reassured by longtime NDP member Dave Barrett coming out in support of Gordon Wilson. Lali has observed Wilson in Cabinet, and has found Wilson's policies in the past were always left of center, sometimes more than the NDP policy.

Sewer, water and mill rates will not increase in 2000

Town of Princeton water, sewer and mill rate (property tax rate) will not increase this year. Water and sewer bills will be sent out to property owners at the end of January and will be the same amount as last year.

The municipal tax rate will remain the same, but this does not mean property taxes will not increase. It means the municipal rate will remain the same, but property tax bills depend on level of assessment which is determined by the provincial assessor. The property tax bill will be determined by the school mill rate and the hospital tax rate plus the municipal tax rate and will be based on what the provincial assessor believes a property is worth based on current real estate sales of similar properties.. Assessment notices were sent out last week.

Pubs defy smoking ban ...from front page

Station Pub for the past five years, is ignoring the regulation, and even reported himself on the 1-800- "rat" line for non-compliance.

"All of my employees and I are smokers," Johnson points out, "We don't need protection."

Bromley Station Pub has tried to comply with the anti-smoking regulation for customers. The building has two floors, with two separate ventilation systems. Smoking is not allowed on the top floor. However, the regulation does not allow compromise because of employees.

"If I comply with their rule, it spells bankruptcy in 90 days," Johnson states. "I won't be around here on April 1 if this is a non-smoking pub."

To back up his statement, mid-afternoon customers, most of whom were eating lunch, or having coffee, were smoking. He was not about to turn them away.

No way to comply

Steve and Carol Brodie, owners of the Gold Nugget Pub for the past 20 years, were not turning away smoking customers. Steve and Carol are non-smokers, and they are willing to build a separate space for smokers, but they discovered that if they put in the kind of ventilation system required by the regulation, they could never heat the place because the exhaust fans would draw in cold air faster than they could heat it.

There were people having coffee and smoking in the pub while the Brodies were being interviewed by Doug Kerr of CBC-TV Vancouver.

"This is a community living-room," Steve told Kerr, "People come here for a quiet drink and a smoke and some social life. I'm not going to tell them to butt out."

The Brodie business employs up to 20 people whose jobs may be in jeopardy. Brodies have already seen handwriting on the wall since the regulation came into force on January 1.

Drop in business

"We've already seen a drop in our regular customers," Steve pointed out. "We're not going to be here if we lose all our regular customers."

Brodie says Princeton cannot afford to lose any more businesses or jobs. He and Carol do not want the next business lost to be theirs.

In regard to the objective of improving health through improving air quality, Steve said, "This is not the proper way to do it."

John Schneider, at Similkameen Vending, is a non-smoker and no longer allows smoking in the pool hall area of the business. At the same time, he resents the position in which the government has placed him.

Unwilling "bad guy"

"I'm the bad guy," Schneider says. "It's just like the GST - they make the rules and I have to do

the work for them. Now I have to be the policeman. I'm the one who has to tell people they can't smoke in here."

Lali: "find common ground"

MLA Harry Lali commented on the regulation. He noted WCB is an independent body and the regulation is meant to protect the health of employees and customers who are non-smokers.

"Forty per cent of our tax dollars go to health care. We are at war with tobacco companies over health problems caused by their products," Lali said.

At the same time, when asked about businesses having difficulties, Lali said, "I understand the concerns of these businesses. These things should be worked out. I don't think anything should be written in stone. Businesses should continue to work with WCB to find a common ground and compromise."

Property tax spending this year

PRINCETON - Out of a total budget of \$2,980,000, Princeton's Town Hall will send \$1,050,000 in property taxes to other governments: Regional District, hospital district, and school district.

Fire protection services will receive \$120,000 this year. There are no salaried firemen in Princeton. Other protective services will receive \$50,000.

Transportation services have a \$360,000 budget for 2000. These services include street repairs, snow removal costs, sidewalks, and street signage.

Environmental health services will receive \$150,000 and public health and welfare services will cost an estimated \$70,000. A total of \$160,000 is in the budget for recreation facilities and services.

This includes the parks, arena and swimming pool contributions, and the summer recreation program.

Cultural buildings and facilities, the library and museum, have \$60,000 in the budget, with \$66,000 set aside for transfer to Regional Library.

Administrative costs total \$260,000, and general government legislative services have \$54,000 in the budget. Insurance costs are estimated at \$50,000.

Local organizations receiving grants have \$50,000 set aside in the budget this year (Pollard Wing?).

Other items include transfers of funds to and from capital reserves.

SnoCross moves to new race location due to shortage of snow

PRINCETON - The Snocross snowmobile races scheduled for January 22 and 23 will not take place at Princeton fair grounds as planned, due to lack of adequate snow cover.

According to Timberline Cruisers Secretary Vickie Marr, the fair grounds are a great location, but when there is not enough snow, a large number of volunteer workers are required, and there is always a problem with rocks. Timberline Cruisers decided last week to move the races to the tailings south of town and have

secured the permission of the Town of Princeton.

"With so little snow, we don't have to worry about hitting rocks at the tailings site," Marr explained. "It's all sand up there."

Races start at 10:00 a.m. Saturday and Sunday and continue until the day's slate of races is run. Out of town spectators should look for signage to direct them to the race site, but briefly, the site is located on Copper Mountain Road, which joins Highway 3 by the RCMP station east of Princeton. The turn-off

road is approximately 1.5 km. from the highway.

Princeton 4-H members will operate a concession at the site, supplying hot drinks and food. For the comfort of spectators, burn barrels will provide a good place to warm hands and faces.

As the tailings site is quite expansive, there is room to allow many spectators to sit in their vehicles and watch the races.

For those people who want to see the races but do not wish to take their own vehicles, or do not have private transportation, Lynch Bus Lines is offering a FREE shuttle service from downtown Princeton (at the Cenotaph) starting at 10:00 a.m. and continuing every two hours.

Persons planning to attend this exciting event should dress in real winter gear, as staying out in the cold can soon chill the person who is not dressed for the cold.

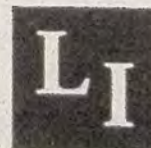

Pot bust nets Surrey pair

SIMILKAMEEN - Andris Lawson of Surrey B.C. was charged January 4 in Penticton Court with "possession of marijuana for the purpose of trafficking." Police took the subject into custody and removed a small marijuana grow operation, worth an estimated value of \$20,000 in

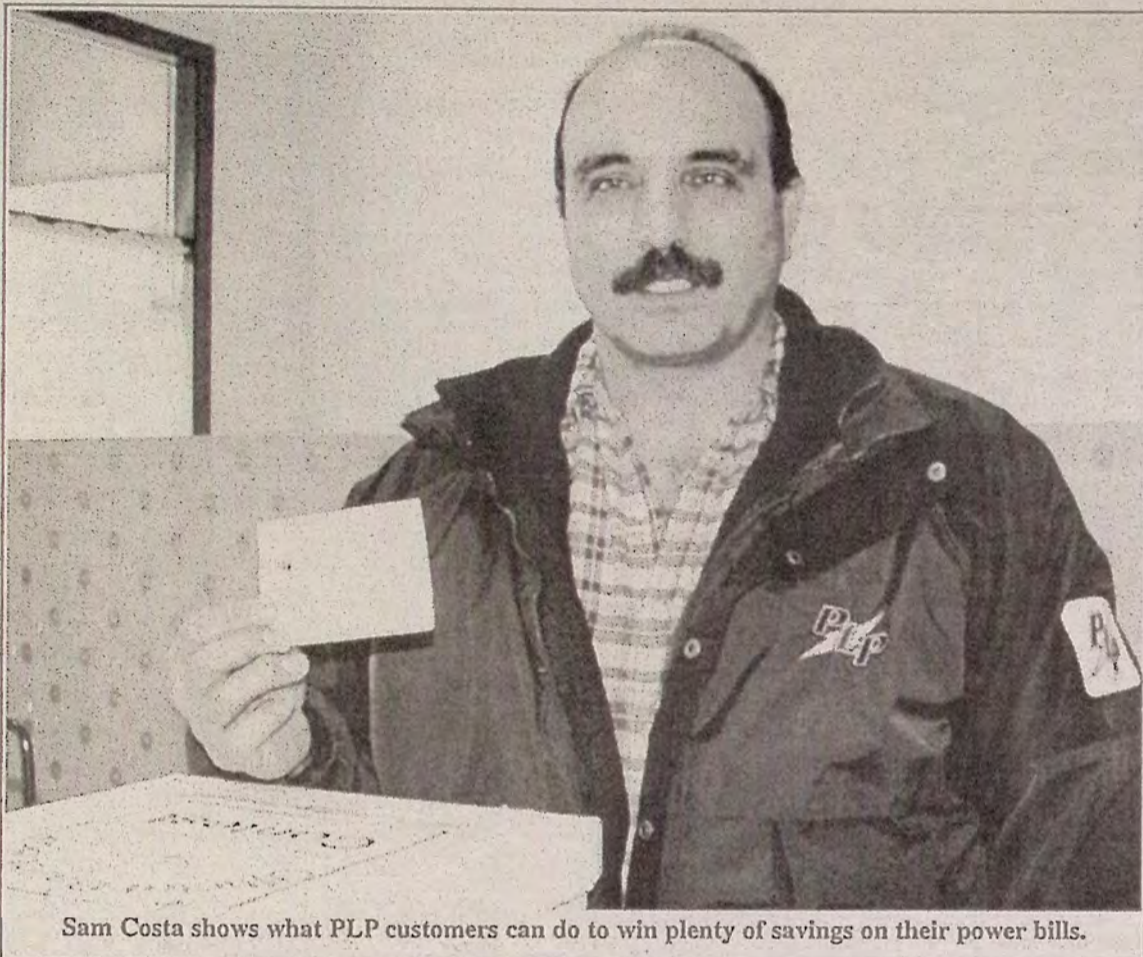

Chromium is an important aid to growth. In a world of refined cereals and food loaded with sugar, parents should try to ensure their children are eating enough chromium-source foods.

Chromium is found in whole grains, Brewer's yeast, broccoli, and thyme, barbecue sauce, meat, shellfish, corn oil and clams.

Chromium controls blood sugar, so should not be taken by a diabetic unless carefully monitored by a doctor. On the other hand, adequate chromium can prevent the onset of adult diabetes.

There is nothing dangerous about taking chromium for the non-diabetic person. Anti-aging literature recommends a daily vitamin and mineral supplement containing chromium.

Chromium prevents build-up of dangerous cholesterol and protects against heart disease and stroke. Further, chromium helps the body digest and utilize pro-

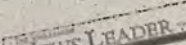

OBITUARIES

RICHARD HENRY GIBSON

Dick was born on February 26, 1918 at Syringa Creek, B.C. to Harry and Edith Gibson and passed away at the Princeton General Hospital on December 25, 1999 at 81 years of age. He is predeceased by his parents and his brother George Gibson.

In 1939 at the age of 21 Dick volunteered to serve in the Canadian Army and was assigned to the Canadian Scottish Regiment which toured the United Kingdom, continental Europe, and the Mediterranean. After completing his service with the army in 1945, Dick secured employment at the Cominco smelter in Trail, B. C. He worked at Cominco for three years before moving to Princeton to open Tulameen Motors with his brothers George and John. In 1984, after 37 successful years at Tulameen Motors, the business was sold and Dick retired to enjoy more relaxing pursuits.

Throughout his life Dick enjoyed outdoor activities and was an avid fly fisherman and longstanding member of the Fish & Game Club in Princeton. He liked gardening and in his retirement devoted much time and energy to his large and thriving vegetable garden. 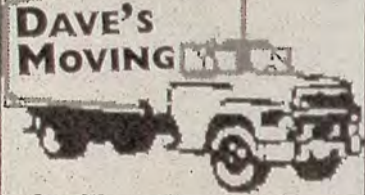

Trout Talk

How to make them bite or, which bait now?

Did you find the fish choosy last time out? Were they reluctant to bite, or nibblers who would just steal your bait?

For the fun of it, I made a list of the baits I could think of for ice fishing. There are 20 on the list and probably you could add at least two or three more! With 20 possibilities, you would think the fish wouldn't have a chance, but no one has figured out, and I hope they never do, how to make a fish bite every time.

Around Princeton, the favourite baits seem to be worms, corn or shrimp. I am fond of the last two! If the fish don't bite, I can always treat myself to something other than sandwiches for a cold lunch. Hey, don't laugh - cold shrimp are delicious.

Here are some others on the list: Artificial - Rapala jig, Russian spoon, Swedish pimple (yes, there is such a bait, and a good one, too), ice flies, spinners. Natural baits - earthworms, night crawlers, shrimp, salmon eggs, mealy worms, grubs. Unnatural baits - hot dogs (another goody you can eat, if the fish aren't biting), corn, marshmallows, bacon, cheese (especially Limburger), garlic cheese, sardines and sardine oil (try dunking

your worm in the oil - it works), Berkley's Power Bait (do not eat this one - save it for the trout! You might be lying on the ice with the fish if you eat this bait. I have had reports that Power Bait was working very well at Link lake.)

Also, speaking of Link Lake, a three-pound seven-ounce trout was recently pulled from Link. Fish 12" to 14" long are frequently being taken there.

As for answering the question, "How to Make Them Bite?"

I'd say to start with a nice, red earthworm, hooked lightly, and see what happens. Then, if after an hour you have had no bites, try shrimp, corn, or any of the other baits I have mentioned.
