

## RCMP issue prowler alert

Princeton - Following a second incident of a person wandering through yards, Princeton RCMP have issued a prowler alert.

On Sunday night, January 23, a watchful resident of Waterfront Avenue called police to a suspicious occurrence. Officers found footprints in the snow indicating a person had been walking through yards, down various streets and alleys. Several times the footprints led to parked vehicles. No thefts were reported.

RCMP Cst. Chris Newel states, "It is this type of neighbourhood watch that prevents or apprehends subjects involved in this type of action and the caller is to be commended for her action. Several other area residents assisted the police in patrolling the neighbourhood in an attempt to deter the trespasser."

## Movie shoot appears more certain

Similkameen - Princeton and Hedley businesses have been approached by locations scouts for the movie "The Pledge" to be filmed in a variety of B.C. locations. The Town of Princeton has given consent to use the wooden bridge at the end of Bridge Street for a day of filming. Tulameen Avenue and the bridge will be blocked for short periods during the shooting of the film.

Bob Anderson has talked to scouts, including director Sean Penn, for use of The Hitching Post in Hedley for part of the action.

Anderson says no formal agreement has been reached but he was willing to have his restaurant used.

Upper Similkameen Indian Band manager Phillippe Batini has talked with locations scouts regarding the possible use of St. Ann's Church on the Chuchwaya Reserve. No formal agreement has been reached.

Another local business has been looked at as a site to accommodate the film crew while on location.

The Board of School Trustees has given approval for the use of a school in Merritt for shooting some scenes from the film.

## 911 changes

Similkameen - On January 20, Regional District approved a resolution that will alter the method of collection of data and networking costs from Telus for the 911 Emergency System. The data and networking costs will be collected by Telus directly from each individual phone line. The cost per line is 23 cents per month.

As a result of this change, the 911 costs will be removed from the property tax notice. This program will be phased in during 2000, with full implementation occurring in 2001.

## Sno-X: spills, thrills

Princeton - Collisions, snowmobiles off the track, racers falling off their machines - it was all part of Sno-X at the tailings site. Racers agreed the course was challenging but good. Four local businesses co-operated to build the track. K&M Trucking and Princeton Redi-Mix contributed equipment, Weyerhaeuser donated chips and FireMaster donated hog

fuel. Leduc logging assisted with repairs during the races.

More than 30 volunteers worked the races, and 4-H ran the concession, running out of goodies before the end of the races, thanks to around 300 spectators per day.

## Lali brings grant to Tulameen

Tulameen will have a museum. On Monday morning, January 24, Yale-Lillooet MLA Harry Lali announced a \$10,000 grant for Tulameen Community Club to renovate the old Tulameen schoolhouse for use as a museum.

The grant, issued through the British Columbia 2000 Community Spirit program, has made it possible for Tulameen Community Club to utilize the small log structure built around 1860 which served as the local schoolhouse from 1921 to 1958. The schoolhouse will be moved to the corner of Third Street and Otter, behind Tulameen Library, where it will become part of the Tulameen community complex.

"The community of Tulameen has been collecting local historic memorabilia for some time," Lali stated. "The items are presently stored in the library, which is not suited to showing the articles to their best advantage. The museum will leave a lasting legacy for future generations."

"As a community, we need to know where we've come from before we'll ever know where we're going," said Wayne Passey, Tulameen Community Club Vice

President. "Being able to save a piece of Tulameen's history and use it as a museum will give future generations a window to look back into the past."

## Town Council wants reliable cheap electricity

Princeton - Town Council considered a letter from the B.C. Utilities Commission regarding a request from Princeton Light and Power to construct a new substation and switch to B.C. Hydro for power until October, 2005.

The Utilities Commission letter stated that, following the application by PLP, West Kootenay Power tabled an alternative proposal that would see PLP remain a

W&P customer but receive its power year-round from BC Hydro until 2004.

A public hearing will be held on February 8 in Princeton to consider the relative merits of both proposals. Town Council was asked for input.

Town Council's reply is to state it would like "the best uninterrupted power at the most economical rate."

He stated that the local operation does not, in his view, comply with requirements for landfill operations, as described in a report by Sperling Hansen.

"There are a number of landfill issues that have to be addressed," Olsen told Council at the January 17 meeting.

Olsen said these issues must be addressed before a new landfill contract is negotiated.

# New factory finds markets

Princeton - Blue Mountain Pine is working on a \$106,000 patio furniture order from Totem Building Supply of Alberta. To owner Al Knowlton, it is a sign of success to come for him, his seven employees and the company.

Knowlton worked for Mego for two years, then became a partner in a log furniture company in Merritt for a year and a half. When his partner went elsewhere, heard Knowlton learned Aspen Planers had purchased Mego, and Knowlton contacted Aspen management and asked them what they planned to do with Mego's furniture division.

"They told me they aren't in the furniture business," Knowlton recalls.

After some discussion with Aspen, Knowlton purchased the furniture division, with Aspen

financing the deal. Other business people in Princeton were behind him, and he put the package together. Aspen supplies the raw materials for Blue Mountain Pine.

"This was always my dream," Knowlton says, gesturing at the shop filled with furniture parts. "I couldn't have done it without the kind of help I've had from local business people."

Blue Mountain Pine makes patio furniture, bunk beds, regular beds in three sizes, and dressers from sanded pine. Next month, he will install a spray booth and produce finished furniture. Locally, Irlly Bird is the only retail outlet carrying Blue Mountain products.

Blue Mountain's main market is B.C. but is now expanding into Alberta. Knowlton believes in establishing a personal relationship with

his retailers, and assists them by setting up the displays for him when he personally delivers the product.

## Schoolmarm teaches the old way

Princeton - In Mrs. MacPherson's classroom, children started the day with God Save the Queen, and Victoria was Queen. It was Tuesday, January 18, Year 1871, and the children stepped back in time to a country school-room over a century ago. The rest of the year it is Year 2000 and they attend Mrs. Gabriel's class at John Allison Elementary School.

Mrs. MacPherson insisted on something called "deportment", which means sitting up straight, no fidgeting, and ending sentences with "ma'am" when given permission to speak.

Believe it or not, the children loved it. The girls dressed in bonnets and pinafores for school in Victorian times, and these modern little girls wore their bonnets and pinafores willingly.

The children wrote on slates, and

recited the five times table aloud. They were told to stand at the left side of their desks, so as not to "joggle" the inkwells.

Mrs. MacPherson taught them several ways to stop fidgeting, taught them to use a straight pen, and told them many things about children's lives and schools back in Victorian times. The children learned about the 'outhouse' located a good distance from the school, and the wood-burning stove in the center of the classroom. They learned to wash their hands for "16 seconds five times a day" to prevent disease.

Recess time involved stilts, and how to make them, as well as other toys children had. Mrs. MacPherson encouraged the children to make spinning toys, bean bags, cup and ball game, stick and hoop toss, pick up sticks using

wheat straw, and "basketball", tossing a bean bag into a basket.

Mrs. MacPherson is really Christine Pilgrim, who taught school at Barkerville for several years, and now teaches school at the Grist Mill in Keremeos during summer months. Recently, Pilgrim was part of a show put together by Kamloops Symphony, Kamloops Museum and Kamloops School District. They played to audiences of 500 children per show.

Pilgrim now resides in the Similkameen Valley and is a great added attraction at the Grist Mill. Children respond to her well, and older adults love to share stories of how things used to be in classrooms. Pilgrim is not a "real" teacher, she is an actress who has perfected the role of Victorian schoolmarm.

## Soup Kitchen opens in Keremeos

KEREMEOS - Judy Mathes and Bob Rumble of Angel Services and Drop-in Centre have been running a soup kitchen on Main Street Keremeos most days since the beginning of December. Mathes says originally they opened an appliance service business in the same location, but it was not doing well, and "a lot of people were coming in for coffee" and asking about food hampers.

Mathes says, since the soup kitchen opened, an average of a dozen people stop in each day between 9:30 a.m. to about 1:30 p.m. to enjoy coffee, food and conversation.

"A lot of seniors come in because they are really lonely," she says. They sometimes "send a little soup home" with those who need it. Mathes says the soup kitchen is "by the people, for the people." It runs on community donations of food, coffee, money and clothes. The tiny kitchen has no storage space, so Angel Services only accepts seasonal clothing. They rely on donations to pay the \$250.00 per month rent.

"It's all done by faith," she says.

A nearby store, Zacks, donated the large, much used coffee urn. Mabel Beaulieu is a regular helper, and the Seventh Day Adventist group volunteers in the soup kitchen on Sundays.

Mathes and Rumble do not belong to a Keremeos Church and they do not "push" Christianity on people who drop-in, but if people ask, they will answer. She says "The Lord put it in our hearts" to open the centre.

## Citizens want improved phone service

Similkameen - In response to citizen requests, Keremeos Council decided at its January 17 meeting to send Telus a letter expressing Council's concerns about the community's need for an updated phone service.

Councillor Jeff McMurray reported he had "fielded over 100 phone calls at home" from people who wanted an updated service. He said "more than half" of the calls were from senior citizens who were interested in services like Caller ID "for security reasons."

## Land Commission "being patient" with T.L. Timber

Cawston - On January 20, Dave Lusted of T.L. Timber in Cawston said, when he talked to Agricultural Land Commission (ALC) representative Brian Underhill, it was "not a problem" that T.L. Timber had not yet been able to complete all the requirements for the recently negotiated two year extension of the mill operation.

According to Lusted, everything was to be done and in place by January 15, but T.L. Timber was not willing to sign the agreement until they had clarified what the ALC meant by saying the mill could operate under its present format, but not expand. Both parties have recently agreed that building a small roof, or hiring more people, would not be expansion, but putting a roof over the whole mill would.

Posting a \$25,000 performance bond required by the agreement is taking longer than expected. Lusted is waiting to hear from the insurance company posting the bond for them. Lusted says, "It doesn't really happen with great expediency. I'm doing the best I can."

He says T.L. Timber is a new business and "barely breaking even at best. I think the Commission is being pretty fair about it," and "so far, they've been very patient."

McMurray said, "We do have the fibre optics, but we have a very old switching station. The school is already having a problem."

It is "only getting 30 per cent" of the computer time it requires. McMurray expressed concern about how the new Health Centre will function using the current service.

A letter to Council from Jim Bagley of Cawston states, "Small home based businesses are probably keeping the economy of Keremeos just above the water line and whilst it is important to encourage new business it is even more critical to nurture the fledgling businesses that already exist here. My boss phoned me this morning and said the phone service locally was like trying to call Gilligan's Island."

Bagley said he hoped Council could do some "tough negotiating..."

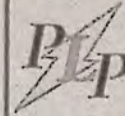

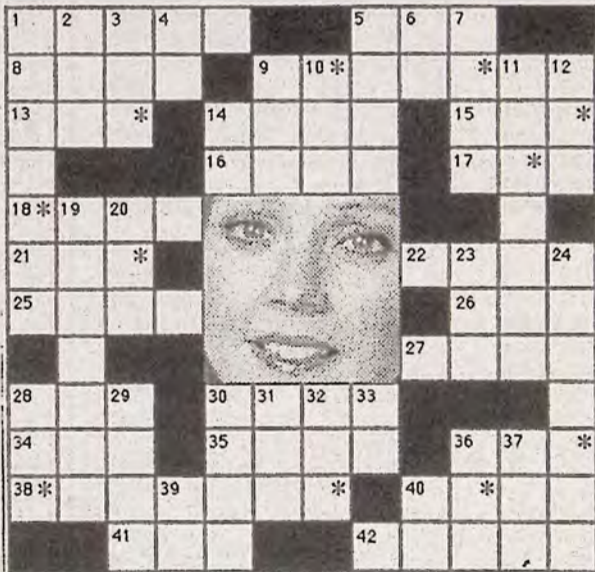

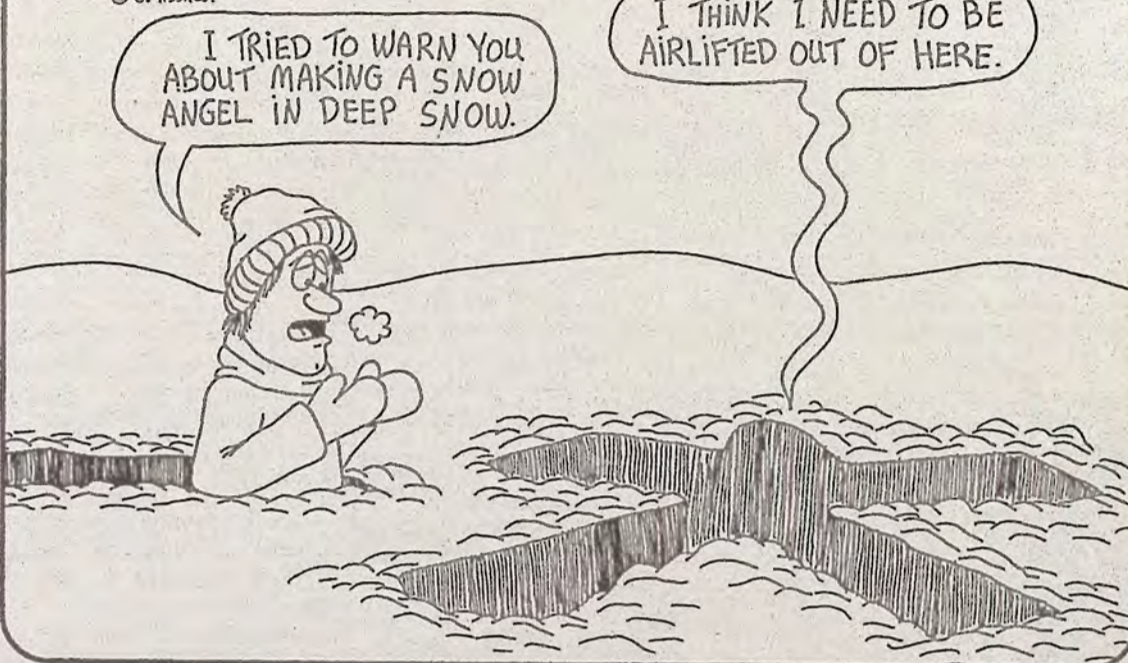

# Let's holler for "citizen nobody"

The now defunct idea by the federal government to subsidize, by \$20 million, the six Canadian NHL teams, riled up Canadians to the extent it created so much heat in one Inuit family, it severely damaged their igloo.

One side of the debate states "NHL hockey produces \$200 million in tax revenue and provides 8,000 jobs. Hockey has its roots in Canada and is part of our heritage. It is one of the few places our national anthem is sung and is an example for our young people to follow, and a goal to dream for.

Money makes money, and \$20 million put out to earn \$200 million is good business sense. The earned revenue would go toward health and other social programs. This would all be lost if the

Canadian teams move to the U.S.A. because of our 60 cent dollar and high player salaries."

The other side of the debate states "the NHL should support itself and subsidies tend to erode this incentive. Tax dollars should not be used to support million-dollar players and owners (the average NHL player salary is \$1.3 million. The Canuck's Mark Messier alone receives \$8.6 million)."

A lot of us don't have a spare 8.6 loonies.

Tax dollars have higher priorities like health care. Once we subsidize hockey, then the CFL, the Whitecaps, the Blue Jays and perhaps even Bill Gates' grandmother would request a subsidy.

The game tickets are too high to purchase. A couple travelling from Sooke to watch the Canucks at GM Place stated it cost them \$400 total for game tickets, ferry, hotel and food.

We now have hockey globalization where team players may be from anywhere in the world. We are losing our national focus and identity. Players should give back some of what they earn. The booming U.S. economy and easy availability of money has ruined hockey.

If we have to bow out of the NHL, we should do it gracefully and put our resources and energy toward a clean, highly competitive national amateur hockey, which is entertaining and affordable. We see that right here in Princeton with our young people.

This is some of the debate but something very critical has been overlooked and unfortunately has not generated the heated debate it should and that is "tax refund." Estimates of a federal tax surplus are approximately \$96 billion over the next five years and the Ontario government, which cut its own provincial income tax by 30 per cent, estimates the federal government could easily cut our income tax by 20 per cent. How would you like a 20 per cent rebate? (Personally, I wouldn't send it back!)

If the citizens would have their money back, they could support the NHL their own way. The big difference is this, we are not hockey stars but "citizen nobody". Let's get a little Listerine gargle and really holler loud for our money. Together, we'd be "citizen somebody".

## RDOS extends fire protection

Princeton - Town Council has been advised that on December 16, 1999, Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen passed a resolution stating "that the Board extend the Electoral Area 'H' Fire Protection Agreement with the Town of Princeton to December 31, 2000."

The provisional budget for Coalmont/Tulameen is \$23,541 (bylaw limit is \$23,000) and for the rest of Area H, \$30,525.

At the January 17 meeting, Council passed a motion to receive and file. There was no other discussion.

## Council turns down School

Princeton - Little Folks Nursery School asked Town Council for money to make repairs to the school building, which is owned by the Town. C. Earle had done an inspection and presented a list of needed repairs along with a contract for \$802.50 to do the repairs.

At the January 17 meeting, Town Council said it would not enter into a contract until the building inspector had seen the school, and further would not enter a contract without more than one bid.

## Council Tables Mosquitoes

Princeton - Regional District sent a letter to Town Council asking if Princeton would like to participate in a mosquito control program for \$6,000. At the January 17 meeting, Councillors admitted there is a mosquito problem at the golf course, probably coming from the effluent pond, but questioned why the cost to Princeton would be higher than for other locations.

Further, there was some consideration of the mosquito problem east of town near the Allison property, and Council wondered whether Area H should pay part of the cost. The matter was tabled for further investigation.

## Friends share shock

Princeton - Friends of Ray and Rose Dobson shared their shock when they learned the Dobson's son was the subject of a sea search for two White Rock men. The men had gone out to do some crabbing when a sudden storm arose. Their boat was found, but the bodies were missing. A massive search took place at low tide on Wednesday last week, but the

remains were not discovered.

The Dobsons live on Osprey Lake road and are famous for their outstanding Christmas lights display, for which they have won first prize in the annual local contest. Ray played Santa Claus for the Princeton light-up, for Kevin Acres shop, and for Senior Citizens Christmas celebration in 1999.
