Legion award
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RCMP help border police at Nighthawk

Similkameen -- Sergeant Dennis Bauhuis says Keremeos RCMP assisted Canada Customs in the January 21 arrest of two individuals involved in an attempt to evade immigration regulations at the Nighthawk Border crossing.

"As a result of the investigation, we have seized a significant amount of cash, and we are trying to determine its origin."

Sgt. Bauhuis said that, after the initial border check, closer inspection of a motor home revealed an individual concealed in the back of the vehicle. According to Bauhuis, this individual was trying to get into Canada illegally. He is required by the Immigration Act to present himself. He was reportedly concerned about getting into the country, so he tried to sneak in.

The 41 year old Vernon B.C. resident concealed in the motor home was charged with "failing to properly report to an immigration official at the point of entry."

A 74 year old Kelowna resident was charged with "knowingly making a false or misleading statement at examination," and "knowingly aiding or abetting a person to contravene the Immigration Act." Both persons will appear in Penticton Court on March 13.

Princeton - The local search and rescue organization needs volunteers. This group is responsible for assisting the RCMP in searching for and locating persons who are lost, injured or overdue in returning from a hunting, fishing or other recreational activity. This situation may not occur frequently, but when it does, a pool of trained personnel is necessary and will be called out at a moment's notice.

Anyone who wishes to become involved is asked to attend an

organizational information meeting at the fire hall at 7:00 p.m. Tuesday, February 1. Meetings and training sessions will be held first and third Tuesdays every month.

There are no specific requirements for volunteers to meet, and there are a variety of positions that do not require good physical condition.

Rural tax change cuts red tape for farmers

Victoria - A new government policy will save B.C. farmers time and the government money. Farmers in B.C. have the option to delay paying rural property taxes from the July deadline to October 31, allowing those who harvest later in the year to pay their taxes after selling their crops. A change under the Taxation (Rural Area) Act has eliminated the requirement to reapply for the payment extension each year.

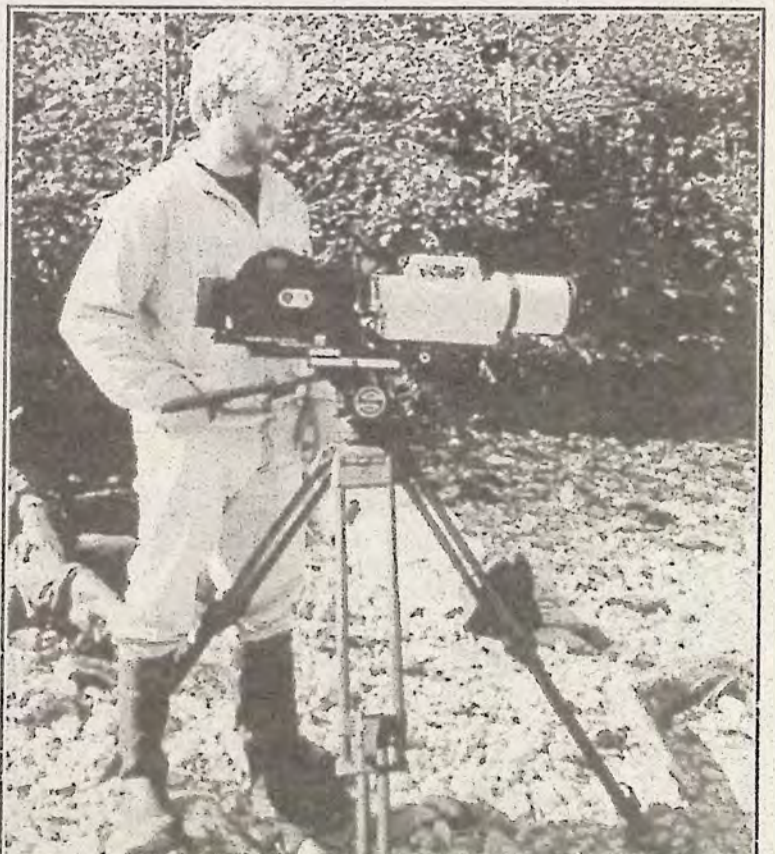
Paul Ramsey, Finance Minister, explained, "The previous requirement that farmers apply year after year amounted to needless paperwork. Ministry staff were spending two full weeks each year pro-

cessing these applications. By eliminating the need for reapplication, we're saving rural property owners and the ministry time and money that is better used elsewhere."

Farm owners will now be required to apply only in the first year."

Agriculture Minister Corky Evans agreed, "Farmers work long hours to make a living, and the last thing they need is more paperwork."

This positive change was supported by the business task force on regulatory impact, a group who advise government on streamlining.

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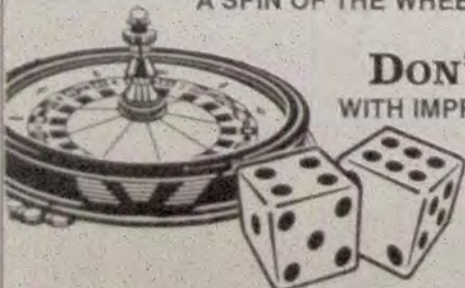
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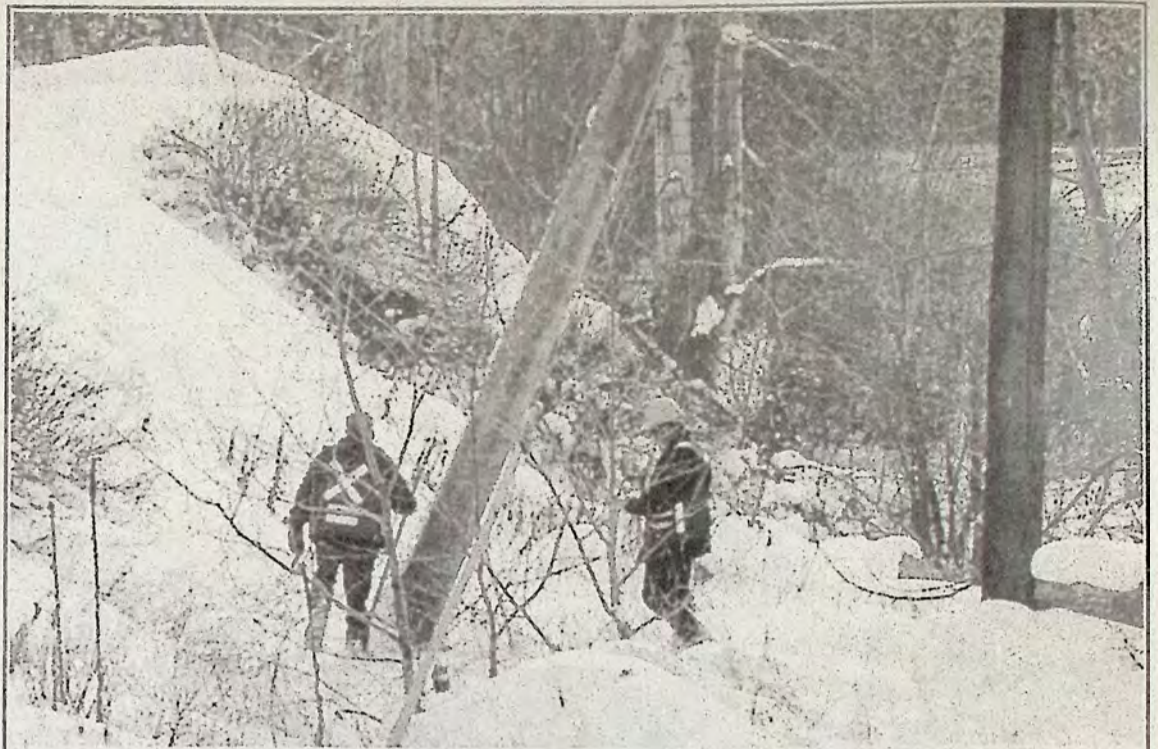

Movie will be here twice

Similkameen - The Sean Penn movie "The Pledge" will be in the Similkameen Valley on two separate shoots. The first will be in Princeton in late February and will block off the wooden bridge on Bridge Street for short periods.

The second shoot will be in Hedley in April. This part of the film will feature a parade with 400 extras. The parade will go down the main street.

"The Pledge" will utilize several locations in the Interior, and will give good exposure to the high, dry country, but the production portion of the filming will be done in studios in Vancouver.

Peacock is new Superintendent

Princeton - At a meeting held on January 26, 2000, the Board of School Trustees of School District #58 (Nicola-Similkameen) appointed Robert Peacock as Superintendent of Schools for the district, effective July 1, 2000.

Peacock has served in the position of Assistant Superintendent for the district since November 16, 1998. During that time, Peacock has become involved in the educational communities of both Princeton and Merritt. He has become one of the educational leaders in the district since his arrival, and has also been actively involved in social, cultural and athletic activities in the schools.

The new superintendent worked as a Director of Instruction for Student Support Services in the Coast Mountains School District. During that time, he was involved in developing leadership skills, consensus building, education initiatives involving French, Punjabi and First Nations communities, developing and implementing regional plans, as well as provid-

ing professional development opportunities for administrators and teachers. He worked in conjunction with the Ministry of Education, Skills and Learning, as regional co-ordinator for the northwest.

Peacock has worked in elementary, junior secondary and secondary environments, as well as in various district positions throughout his career.

He said, "I believe a leader must challenge a process, inspire a shared vision, enable others to act, model the way, and encourage the heart."

Such an approach allows all stakeholders to plan together and develop a nurturing environment for the success of all students. He believes that to provide quality service, an educational and visionary leader must first identify those who are being served, and then meet and exceed their needs and expectations. In the education system, those being served include the students and parents, as well as professional

and support staff throughout the education community.

It is expected that Peacock will be completing his doctorate of education sometime this spring. The completion of his doctorate is further evidence of his commitment to and enjoyment of public education and lifelong learning. Peacock succeeds Superintendent of Schools, Richie Gage, who will be retiring after a long and successful career in School District #58.

Similkameen - Depots will be set up in Keremeos Village and Hedley, as well as Keremeos landfill site, for the purpose of recycling cardboard and boxboard.

Regional District made the announcement on January 21, following the awarding of a contract to supply, operate and maintain three recycling depots for Keremeos and residents of Electoral Areas B and G.

What teachers did on Pro-D day

Princeton - Local children had a day off school while teachers attended classes. These "days off" are Professional Development Days, usually called Pro-D days by teachers.

Parents often wonder what teachers do on Pro-D days. The News Leader went to one of the Pro-D sessions to find out.

Primary and intermediate teachers went to Riverside Intermediate School to learn a new technique for teaching reading, called Reading 44.

Cathy Molinski, of North Vancouver, was instructor for the day. She began by telling teachers 20 per cent of B.C. students at Grade 5 are not reading at their grade level, and these students do not ever achieve good reading skills. Reading 44 was developed to overcome this deficiency.

Teachers learned about 12 reading strategies. Problem situations were presented to teachers and they were asked to find solutions using the strategies.

Manuals for the Reading 44 program were part of the package. The goal was to develop good reading skills to the point where the reader performs the skills automatically. Molinski emphasized there must be direct instruction on how to read, and it must be done repeatedly throughout the students' school experience (through Grade 12).

Teachers were involved in a great deal of group discussion. In the afternoon, they received in-depth instruction aimed at the grade level they teach. Primary and intermediate level teachers were separated for these intensive workshops.

Parents may be hearing more about Reading 44 as the emphasis shifts to more reading training at school.

B.C. exports show continued growth

Victoria - Employment and Investment Minister Mike Farnworth announced a 6.1 per cent increase in exports for November 1999 over November 1998.

"The continued increase in our exports is a strong indication of B.C.'s returning economic strength," Farnworth said.

"Exports for January to November 1999 show an increase of 10.2 per cent over the same period in 1998. That growth was a key factor in helping to create more than 42,000 new jobs for British Columbians in 1999."

Goods valued at more than \$26.2

billion were shipped from B.C. during the first 11 months of last year, compared with \$23.8 billion for the same period in 1998. Forest product exports continue to grow, with an increase of 15 per cent from January to November. Exports of machinery and equipment products increased 11.5 per cent and agricultural and fishing products increased 6.2 per cent during the same period.

Finance Minister Paul Ramsey noted B.C.'s retail sales are improving and housing starts have begun to pick up. The help-wanted index, a measure of demand for workers, has been rising since May, 1999.

Tulameen museum preserves unique history

Tulameen - The restoration of an old schoolhouse for use as a museum will keep members of Tulameen Community Club busy this year. The \$10,000 Community Spirit grant has made possible an early start on moving the schoolhouse building.

Wayne Passey, who chairs the committee for restoring the old schoolhouse, would like to start on the project as soon as weather permits. The building cannot be moved while school is in session, so it must be done on a weekend or during summer break. A concrete pad foundation must be in place before the building is moved. Passey will be calling a meeting for volunteers as spring begins. He hopes to develop a "plan of attack" for the big move.

Anyone interested in helping should contact Wayne Passey. The old Fripp house was torn down last fall and owner Trudy Parolin presented the museum with some usable items from the old house, including some logs from the structure, two "six over six" windows and a door. Parolin also donated the mail slot from Mrs. Sootheran's old post office, along with Mrs. Schubert's old pump organ, an old bookcase from the turn of the century and a box of very old books of interest.

Regional District talks to World Dam Commission

Similkameen - Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen has made a submission to the World Commission on Dams Secretariat to express its concerns about the Grand Coulee Dam and Columbia Basin Project USA and the Columbia River Treaty.

Regional District sent reports produced by W. Holm, P. Ag. regarding the Evaluation of the Effect of Downstream Benefits to Washington State Agriculture under the Columbia Treaty on the Competitive Positioning of British Columbia Producers (1994) and Down Stream Benefits - Enhancing Competitiveness (1995).

The submission reflected RDOS concerns that

1. the provincial government of the day negotiated benefits based only on the value of the power generation and flood mitigation measures;
2. the government did not consider the economic benefit an increased water supply would have on agricultural productivity and other industrial uses;
3. the government did not take into account the negative impact to existing agricultural sectors on

both sides of the border; and 4. did not recognized the storage benefits that the Okanagan Lake System provides to the Columbia Basin Dam system, in the same manner as they have to the Kootenay Region in Canada. The provincial government has provided the Kootenay Region with a substantial trust fund to help mitigate damage in that area, with no similar program for the Okanagan.

Big families add to Alzheimer risk

Researchers at the University of Washington claim children from large families and/or low socio-economic childhood environments may have a higher risk of developing Alzheimer's disease. People growing up with five or more siblings had a 39 per cent greater risk of developing Alzheimer's compared with those people with fewer than five siblings. Researchers say a poor quality childhood environment could prevent the brain from maturing completely, and Alzheimer's starts in that area of the brain which is last to reach maturation.

Anchorage welcomes Jane McKay

Princeton - Jane McKay is the new Co-ordinator at The Anchorage. She began her duties on January 4, 2000, at the mental health drop-in centre, where she serves approximately 18 members. She is there to assist persons who feel lonely and isolated due to experiencing emotional or mental difficulties. The Anchorage improves their quality of life and helps them develop friendships and become involved in activities. Referrals to The Anchorage are made through mental health services available in Princeton at the Public Health Unit.

McKay worked with the New Beginnings program for two and a half years, and spent many years as a volunteer worker with mental health events and programs. She felt many of the skills she had honed during that time would serve well in her new position. She is still assessing resources of The Anchorage, and will be developing a newsletter and activities.

Okanagan Regional Library is eligible for funding for a computer training laboratory.

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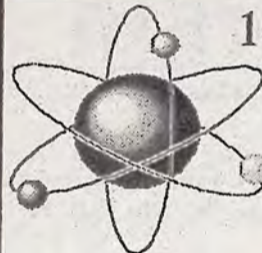
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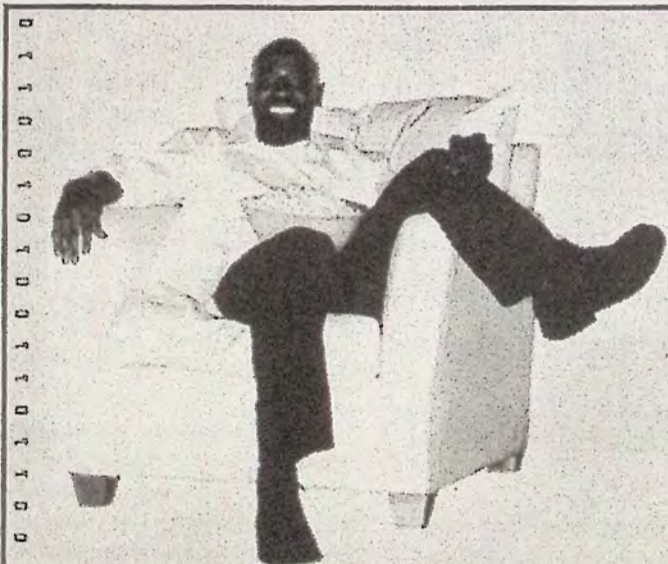

Similkameen School introduces DARE program

Keremeos - Constable Bryce Peterson, a member of the South Okanagan Highway Patrol based in Keremeos, said, at a January 18, SESS Parent Advisory Committee meeting, that the RCMP was getting "more into the preventative aspect" of problems like drinking and driving through their involvement in the Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) program. Cst. Peterson and Cst. Rick Ekel have been trained in the program and, February 1, will begin presenting it to the grade fives and sixes. Peterson says this is the "best time to catch the children, before they start experimenting with drugs."

Begun in 1983, in Los Angeles School District, DARE to Resist Drugs and Violence Program has spread to 44 countries, and most

Canadian provinces. There are 144 trained DARE officers in B.C.

Peterson says all contributions from this community will be returned to this community's local DARE program. Peterson said the program teaches children to think before they act, and offers them positive alternatives.

He says, "If we can save one kid, why not?"

He reported that, in the United States, where 26 million children have been exposed to the program, "they are starting to find a reduction in violence and drug problems." He said a Prince George school saw a "70 per cent reduction in vandalism to the school" after the program was presented.

SESS Principal Lawrason says, "I haven't been able to find anything as good or better. Our staff is 100 per cent behind the program."

Centre funds increase

KEREMEOS - Though more fund raising is required to reach the minimum goal of \$650,000, and the maximum goal of \$1,000,000, for the new South Similkameen Health Centre under construction in Keremeos, the donation total has risen to \$510,000. Bruce Pearce, Co-ordinator of A Time to Build Campaign, said there were still many donor-naming opportunities available. He said, "We're expecting the campaign to pick up, once the construction picks up." He said though ground frost "has slowed things down, ...they've fenced the site and done some excavating."

A Time to Build Awareness Day for the South Similkameen Health Centre will be February 7 at the Diagnostic and Treatment Centre. People can drop in from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., watch a video, and have their questions

Council buys 'no ice' equipment

Keremeos - To improve winter road conditions, Keremeos Village has ordered anti-icing, pre-wetting equipment valued at \$11,095.52, of which \$8,857.20 will be reimbursed by ICBC. The order, approved at Council's January 17 meeting, includes a tank, pump and spray system, that, when placed on a truck, will allow workers either to spray the roads with magnesium chloride prior to a snowfall, thereby making the roads easier to plow, or to spray magnesium chloride on sand and gravel that is being spread on the road surface. Public Works reported to Council that, as a melting agent compared to salt, magnesium chloride works at lower temperatures, and is considered to be more environmentally friendly.

At its January 17 meeting, Council adopted snow clearing by-law No. 605, 2000, specifying that commercial and residential property owners or occupiers "shall remove and clear away snow and ice from sidewalks bordering their property or premises" before 10:00 a.m. each day for commercial property, and 6:00 p.m. each day for residential. For anyone failing to follow the by-law, the Village may remove the ice and snow, and invoice the cost to the person in default.

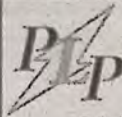

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Trout Talk

Peter, Frank, Bob, Father Reidy and a Ford truck

The Ford truck held three adults. That meant that the four, Big Frank Antonick Peter Antonick, Bob Johnston and Father Reidy had to take turns going on trips - fishing trips, to be more exact. They went during the 50's and '60's when many local lakes were still capable of producing a six-pound rainbow fairly regularly. I talked with Peter today about his trips, and how much they meant to him. Peter and I have both lost our fathers in the past few years, and those fishing trip memories mean a lot to us.

Murphy Lakes, on Lawless Creek Road west of Tulameen, was the destination of one such trip. The year was 1958. Peter, Big Frank and Bob Johnston were the trio in the truck this time. After an evening of watching TV, the three drove out to Coalmont and met four friends from Vancouver. The seven then continued on to Tulameen, and from there, up River Road (Lawless Creek Road had not been built to Murphy Lakes in 1958). The two vehicles were traveling in the dark now, and had a treacherous road ahead. In places, only one vehicle could travel at a time. Peter describes it

as "having slides of gravel on the road which required the truck to have a steep and risky passage across that section." As the driver looked out his window, he could look 1200 feet straight down! Not a place for faint-hearted driver.

On finally reaching the lake, after walking through the woods, they launched their boat. On some mornings, the mosquitoes were so thick that it was a relief to get out on the water, away from shore.

Murphy Lakes, sometimes called Bear Lakes, was loaded with rainbow trout in the '50's. Peter, who was only 12 years old then, remembers that they could catch their limits of trout before noon.

Peter says, "If I remember correctly, the limits were 12 apiece. The 12-foot boat was filled!"

The Grizzly King and Red Carey were the favourite flies. Fish to three pounds were often caught by the trio. (An honest fisherman nowadays will have to admit to getting a three-pound trout once a year, if he is lucky.)

Note: after this trip, Big Frank drove his backhoe all the way out to Murphy Lakes and repaired the unimproved road. Frank Antonick was one of that early group of fishermen who, by their volunteer effort, improved our local fishing tremendously.

The 1950's and '60's were years when the local Fish and Game

Clubs planted fish, improved access and landings, picnic areas and much more. When you travel the road to Merritt, about two blocks below McCaffrey Lake, look left. On the creek is a small concrete dam. This was installed to prevent coarse fish (suckers, squawfish and shiners) from migrating upstream into the chain of lakes above. The club had aided the Wildlife Branch in rehabilitating the five Merritt Highway Lakes, and this dam helped keep them free of coarse fish for many years. This is only one of the club's efforts. Bud DeWolfe has to be mentioned for his strong efforts to set aside access to lakes as more and more private ownership of lake property threatened public access.

Some lakes in our area are named after these volunteers. Examples are Garrison, McCaffrey, Alaric, DeWolfe. A good number of our lakes did not, and would not, have fish in them if it were not for club members packing in and planting the trout. I have heard that these men carried cream cans on their backs to transport the trout. Walking with such a load in the heat of summer really was a chore! We owe a lot to them for their efforts. Because of these men, we now have some of the finest rainbow trout fishing in North America, if not the world.

Door to door sales law changes

VICTORIA - On March 1, 2000, the "cooling off" period for door-to-door sales contracts will be 10 days. Anyone who agrees to a purchase from a door-to-door salesperson may cancel the agreement within 10 days. The change in the B.C. law will make the cooling off period the same across Canada. The new legislation will apply to all direct sales and all contracts for future services and personal property time-shares. If a direct sale does not comply with the new amendments to the Consumer Protection Act, consumers can have up to one year to cancel their contract with a direct seller if the seller is not licensed, or if the contract does not contain the information required by the legislation, or if the goods or services are not provided within a timely period.

Consumers must have proof they have cancelled a contract, and the direct seller must return all money to the consumer within 15 days of cancellation.

LIVING PAST 100

Cells remember youth

Anyone serious about feeling young again should consider a study done in Massachusetts over a decade ago. The study proved body cells retain some kind of memory of youth that can be triggered by environment. At this point, nobody knows the details of why and how the environment triggers the "youthing" process, but the experiment proved something happened at the cellular level. For the ordinary person, the why and how are not important, just the results count.

Scientists insulated residents of a retirement center from the outside world. The researchers literally turned back the clock 20 years for the residents. The shows on television and radio were tapes made 20 years earlier. Newspapers and magazines were from 20 years before the study. Music was 20 or more years old. In other words, these elderly residents shifted to an environment similar to their daily lives 20 years earlier.

Prior to the study, residents underwent a complete physical examination, and all health problems and vital signs readings were recorded.

The readings changed dramatically after two weeks of "20 years ago." Blood pressure dropped, vitality increased, appetites improved, sleep pat-

terns improved. To all intents and purposes, these elderly people, became younger.

The theory is this: cells have a memory independent of the memory cells we commonly refer to as "memory" and the cells can be stimulated to remember how to function as younger cells.

Doing this at home may be a little more difficult, but all of us can enjoy the movies and music of our youth, thanks to modern technology. Those who cannot afford to buy many videos and music recordings may want to start a group purchasing plan to accumulate a library of videos and music recordings of a particular era. What a good project for Senior Citizens or Old Age Pensioners!

If you doubt this "youthing" technique, just try watching an old favourite movie, such as April in Paris starring Doris Day, and play some of the music from your favourite artists when you were in your teens. You will feel your spirits lift, your toes start tapping, and your circulation improve. Music is especially good to bring back all kinds of memories of times past.

There are those people who might pooch-pooch this project as "living in the past", but if living in the past means living younger, go for it!

Is sales tax the problem?

Everybody hates taxes, especially at this time of year. Income tax forms and property tax assessments arrive in the mail, and everybody complains. Yet we scarcely utter a sigh about the most unfair tax of all - sales tax.

Daily, we are hit with a provincial sales tax and a federal goods and services tax, better known as PST and GST. We pay fourteen per cent tax on everything we buy. We cannot escape GST even by death, as our estate will pay GST on our funeral, burial or cremation.

We live in a country where we believe we care for the poor. Ask a poor person how much difference that fourteen cents on the dollar makes to them! If a person lives on social assistance, and it costs more for them to buy essentials because of sales taxes, guess where the additional social assistance will come from: more taxes. It is a vicious circle!

Sales taxes are a hidden tax on businesses because businesses must collect those taxes, send them to government and the time required to do this constitutes a tax on business.

Income tax is a fairer tax than sales tax because it is based on income. If you have a very low income, you pay no taxes.

There is a lot of comparing B.C. to Alberta because Alberta is doing so well. Take note: Alberta has no provincial sales tax. Does this contribute to their lower unemployment rate?

What do you suppose would happen if all Canadian taxpayers rebelled and said "No tax but income tax!" Would that give all levels of government a strong motive to see that everyone has a job?

If everyone has a job, would there be such a big need for high taxes?

These are questions we, as taxpayers, need to think about and talk about.

Vancouver committee forms to overhaul B.C. government

Dear Editor:

A new committee has been formed to suggest ideas on how to make government in British Columbia more democratic, responsive, and accountable. Named the Adhoc Committee on the Provincial Constitution, the committee members will make recommendations aimed at a fundamental overhaul of the provincial government.

Convinced that British Columbia desperately needs a better system of government, the committee hopes to stimulate broad-based public debate and discussion on a long list of topics from fixed election dates to electoral reform.

The committee has considerable political experience. It consists of Gordon Gibson, Garry Lauk, Rafe Mair, Mel Smith, Bud Smith and myself, Nick Loenen.

Gordon Gibson, columnist and former Leader of the BC Liberals, said, "We represent no one, speak for no one, and want nothing, except to suggest solutions that will empower people and make government more effective."

Rafe Mair, popular radio talk host, said, "After nearly ten years of political turmoil, the forced resignation of three premiers, and massive mismanagement of the economy, people trust no one, and feel disconnected from the political system. We

must mobilize citizens and demand that significant improvements be made."

The committee's self-imposed agenda covers topics such as the size and appointments to cabinet, appointments to Crown corporations, the judiciary, an independent Crown counsel, balanced budget legislation, direct democracy measures, definition of confidence motions, a fixed legislative calendar, separation of the executive and legislative branches, electoral reform, and more.

Garry Lauk, former NDP cabinet minister, said, "Trust in government must be restored. It is

imperative that over the next two years British Columbians discuss the fundamentals of good government.

The committee expects to publish a report, probably next June. We hope our example will stimulate others to put forward constructive ideas on how to empower people and make government accountable.

Why is a child a political pawn?

When the well-being of a child is in jeopardy, it touches everyone. This is the case of beautiful six year old Cuban boy Elian Gonzales, caught in a custody battle between his relatives in Florida and his father in Cuba. He was found floating in the ocean after the refugee boat carrying him and his mother floundered. She drowned. The boy, now in Florida with relatives, is wanted back in Cuba by his father, a Cuban tourist industry worker. The Florida relatives refuse. This now has flared into a major political battle between the two groups because Cuba is a Communist dictatorship. It's a tragedy for the father and son. Those moments of the young son are fleeting and brief, and will be forever lost between son and father, who has a job, can provide food, shelter, clothing and, above all, love for his son.

The real problems are the U.S. sanctions and the Helms-Burton law against Cuba for over 30 years, isolating Cuba. Instead of bringing the Cuban Castro regime down, it has only made the living conditions of Cubans more miserable. This policy is not used against Communist China or Communist Viet Nam, whose conditions are gradually improving. Had this outdated policy been done away with years ago with Cuba the situation could well be considerably different. In the meantime, the father and son have to suffer. In Cuba and the U.S., it depends who is in power - something we should keep in mind here. It's time for that policy to go.

Talking about time, the visit by Pope John II to Cuba some time back had a prominent news magazine feature on its cover, a tow-

ering Fidel Castro in a business suit beside John Paul. Both were concentrating on Fidel's wrist-watch, with Fidel poking his finger at it. What was said between them, I don't know. Maybe Fidel was telling John Paul he had only so many minutes to take off, or John Paul was telling Fidel the time to change his ways was short.

Considering the economic climate of Cuba, I think it went something like this: "Look, John Paul, this is a good watch, my buddy Kruschev gave it to me during the missile crisis with the U.S. I could use some U.S. cash. How about giving me \$15? You could probably flog it abroad on one of your trips for triple the money - what do you say?" We've never heard.

problem - the river not frozen over or crossing the train bridge which was icy and slippery). At one point, a low swinging bridge was attempted. I don't recall it being successful. It was at the bottom of Billiter Avenue.

The next skating rink was on the school grounds, right beside the high school. It was not a school effort and I do not recall the promoters or caretakers. It was during my high school years (1936-39). The Macaulays lived across the road, so my wife, Dorothy, and her sister and brother used it considerably. This effort lasted until the school referendum and the auditorium was built on the

site. Another move, and back to square two - the Riverside playground area. This effort was quite extensive, having bleachers, etc.

With the advent of the arena referendum and construction, the rink stood dormant. This area, Riverside playground, was, I understood, owned by a local organization "The Princeton Recreation Society" of which I have no knowledge whatsoever. However, with the advent of Riverside School, the area which by then was owned by the Town, was granted to School District 17 to be used as a playground. It was not sold to them and was to remain open to the public at large.

And history goes on! E. Jacobson P.S. Another memory cell just came on! Somewhere along the line, the Allison Playground Society had a rink on Allison Flats.

B.C. opens wood office in Shanghai

On January 26, 2000, Forest Minister David Zirnelt officially opened an office in Shanghai to sell B.C. forest products. BC Wood Specialties Group will operate the office with the Quebec Wood Export Bureau, both seeking to expand sales to the Chinese market.

China's market for wood building materials has grown by 10 per cent per year. China is interested in wood used indoors for floors, wall panelling, kitchen cabinets and mouldings. Two years ago, total output value of China's construction and interior decoration industry was estimated to be between \$17 billion and \$19 billion U.S.

Forest Renewal B.C. is investing \$2.79 million in marketing and \$3.45 million in value-added training this year in partnership with BC Wood, providing marketing and training services to value-added wood manufacturers in B.C.

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

Judge orders \$45,000 fine

A 100 Mile House businessman received a \$10,000 fine and was ordered to pay \$35,000 to the Habitat Conservation Trust Fund for falsifying CORE test results. Jochem Neuman pled guilty at his preliminary hearing in Williams Lake Provincial Court January 13 to one count of knowingly falsifying information on a record. He was sentenced to the

maximum fine on January 19. Neuman was an associate of Frank Schroeder, a former hunting education instructor who was convicted on criminal charges relating to the same case in October, 1999. Schroeder received a one year conditional sentence and was ordered to pay \$5,000 to the B.C. Wildlife Foundation.

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
