

Penn and crew look at valley

Similkameen - Sean Penn, director of the movie "The Pledge", arrived in Princeton on January 31 with the film's location crew. They stayed at Sandman Inn, where they left an "excellent" impression.

"They're just like ordinary people," commented a waitress who served them.

Portions of "The Pledge" will be filmed in Keremeos and Princeton in late February. In late March or early April, a portion of the film will be shot in Hedley.

She noted Sean Penn was good-looking, and well-mannered.

Penn and crew spent the evening at Bromley Station Pub, where they sat around a table by the fireplace enjoying non-celebrity privacy.

Sean Penn is tall, lean and clean-shaven. His dark hair is neatly trimmed and short, with sideburns. As he left to enter the tour bus, he wore a tailored dark grey overcoat, giving the impression of being well-dressed and well-groomed without being "fussy".

The plans for the next day were altered slightly due to the snowstorm. They had planned to leave early on Tuesday, February 1, but did not leave until the afternoon. Mark Flett, Okanagan Film Commissioner, spent most of the day with Penn and the technical survey crew working out details at various locations.

"Sean was very impressed with the area and its physical diversity," states Flett. "The film needs a variety of small towns and high-

way scenes and the Similkameen Valley fit those locations very well."

The film centers on Jack Nicholson, who plays a recently retired policeman who has pledged to the mother of a murdered daughter that he will find who is responsible. "The Pledge" is Penn's third time at directing and second time directing Nicholson.

"We're very excited that a director and actor of their calibre are going to be coming into our region," Flett says. "I have been working closely with the B.C. Film Commission and the film's location manager on convincing

them to come into the area. Having this film shoot here is a big step forward in our efforts in bringing our region to the attention of the international film industry."

The producers of the film ask the media and public to respect the privacy of Penn and Nicholson while they are shooting here and not attempt to come to the closed set. Extras for a parade scene are being recruited from local service groups as a fundraiser for the organizations.

Many people saw the tour bus around town as the locations crew

Area H taxpayers prepare to organize

Princeton - Residents of Area H intend to form their own "watchdog" organization to keep an eye on property taxes.

Only 18 people turned out to the February 4 meeting chaired by Ed Muckle, an Area H resident who lives along Highway 3 east. Others at the meeting came from Osprey, Link and Chain Lakes areas, Old Hedley Road, and Highway 5A. Nobody attended from Eastgate or Tulameen Valley. The few who attended were disappointed that more people were not there, but the initial group made plans for the future.

The lack of communication with the Area H Director was one of the concerns voiced by several people. They wanted to know who represented their area on the Director's advisory committee and complained they did not have

phone calls returned. Their was a great deal of anxiety about the landfill and what it might cost if management was not improved to comply with provincial regulations. Muckle told them it could cost up to \$250,000 to close the existing landfill, and that did not include any costs of opening a new one.

One person expressed his fears this way: "If we don't do it ourselves and soon, in a couple of years the province will come in and do it, and hand us the bill."

Joanne Roberts of the Osprey Lake Ratepayers Association was asked to explain how a ratepayers' association is set up. She explained the structure and the annual dues, which cover minor costs of the association.

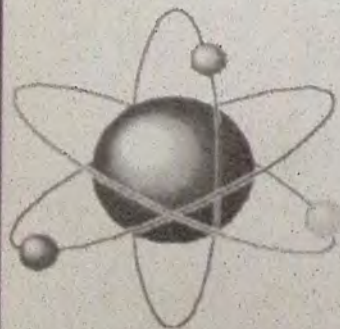

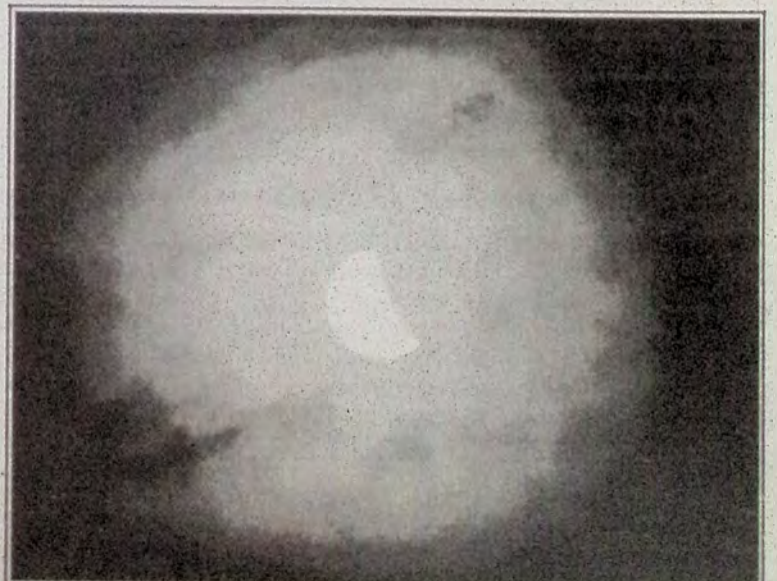

Vermilion Trails President talks about future of TransCanada Trail

Princeton - John Byatt, President of Vermilion Trails Society, is concerned about local participation in this year's grand opening of the TransCanada Trail.

Vermilion Trails Society is gearing up for the most important year of the TransCanada Trail, which will have an important impact on the Princeton area.

"Less than three months away, we will have national press coverage as Relay 2000 visits Princeton as it winds its way across Canada," Byatt points out. "We are anxious to get plans in place to proceed with development as soon as weather permits."

The area of stewardship covered by Vermilion Trails Society is from Brookmere in the west to Osprey Lake in the east.

"We are looking for interested persons within our area to work with in developing plans," says Byatt.

The "showplace" area for Princeton is the section from Highway 3 to the tunnel.

"Imagine the smiles on tourist's faces as they glide into Princeton and see a lush, park-like trail with a grand parking facility," Byatt says, promoting a concept he would like to see developed within the town.

"It would be a place to get out and stretch one's legs after a long drive and maybe find something worth staying for," John Byatt states.

The entire John Allison Elementary School has committed to adopt this section of the trail. Last year, for "Earth Day", they made a project of

cleaning this area, and picked up three truckloads of litter and debris. This year, their commitment is to once again clean the area, but to go much further with the project, including planting trees and wildflowers, landscaping and decorating.

"We would like to see this commitment recognized with signage of a plaque," Byatt says.

Byatt has questions for local merchants.

"Do you belong to the trail society? Do you contribute?"

Byatt urges, "Putting a plan in place quickly is good for Princeton, good for tourists, good for our students and good for business."

Judge orders one year conditional sentence

Princeton - Judge B. Grannary was ready to render a sentence on February 3 in the matter of Debra Willis, a former loans officer with Valley First Credit Union in Princeton. Judge Grannary had listened to both Crown Counsel and defense in a sentencing hearing on January 27, but delayed sentencing for a week to consider all aspects of the case.

There was no trial, as Willis pled guilty on October 21 to one count of fraud over \$5,000. The sentencing hearing focused on the circumstances that led to charges.

Briefly, the circumstances were that in 1997, Willis had been kiting cheques between accounts of two companies, Red Bluff Logging and Willis Hay Sales, owned by her and her husband. In March 1998, she was warned by letter by her manager to cease, and was advised to move all accounts to Valley First Credit Union, where she had worked for nearly 20 years.

Willis complied, and moved the Willis Hay Sales account to the credit union but the overdrafts continued, on occasion, for many months until she left the Credit Union in September 1998. The total of overdrafts between the two companies was just over \$79,000 at the time Willis left her job.

Within six days, Willis' father, mother and sister had mortgaged property they owned and presented the money to the credit union to be applied against the outstanding amounts in the two company accounts. The credit union accepted the money, but months later, Willis was shocked and alarmed that it had not been applied to the accounts. In fact, her father received two interest cheques shortly after she inquired where his money had gone.

On July 22, 1999, Willis was formally charged.

Crown Counsel said Willis used her "senior" position to continue the kiting, but defense made it clear she did not have any supervisory status and did not approve her own overdrafts. Crown said the credit union had lost \$3,800 in "soft costs". Willis' father, who had been seated next to her during the hearing and the sentencing, said he would pay that immediately. Crown asked for a jail term, while

defense asked for a conditional discharge, listing circumstances in her favour, including immediate restitution, no prior record, no drug and alcohol problems, and involvement in the community. Defense added that Willis had been under extreme pressure from Revenue Canada over a matter of \$200,000 (now paid). Willis, her husband and a third person had been involved in a property deal and expected all debts to be covered when the property sold, but the deal fell through.

Defense said Willis "had no complex scheme to cover her tracks" and did not authorize her own overdrawn account. He reviewed many cases and sentences, and pointed out that Willis had an excellent pre-sentence report.

Crown Counsel told Judge Grannary, "The eyes of the community are on this case to see whether that person is going to be treated the same as others."

Judge Grannary gave the customary summary of matters he had considered. He acknowledged Willis had no supervisory authority over tellers

at the credit union but said others looked up to her and did not question what she did. He noted she had continued for 11 months. He said she went undetected because she had "moral authority." She had put the credit union at risk of losing over \$79,000.

Judge Grannary commented that the crime was out of character "for someone like you" and said he believed it was motivated by panic and fear. At the same time, he told Willis he must consider a sentence that would be an appropriate deterrent to others.

"I don't have any concerns that you will commit another offense of this sort," he said.

He noted Willis lives in Princeton and is not likely to move.

The aggravating feature of Willis' action, in the judge's view, was the breach of trust, and he said he felt that a jail sentence was appropriate. He sentenced her to a one year conditional sentence to be served in the community, 50 hours community work service, pay the credit union \$3,800, and attend such counselling as her supervising corrections officer deemed necessary.

RCMP warn of telephone scam scheme

Olalla - On January 31, Keremeos RCMP received a report from an elderly Olalla resident who gave details of a potential telephone fraud. The resident had received a telephone call from an individual who claimed association with Canada Customs in Ottawa, Ontario, and claimed to possess a cheque for 50,000 that the resident had won through a mail marketing scheme. The caller stated he would forward the cheque to the resident, after the resident paid the caller \$3,200 taxes on the winnings. The resident did not send the requested money. The resident received another call from the same individual who said he would accept a partial payment in excess of \$800, if the initial sum was too much of a burden.

Police remind area residents that this type of fraud is becoming quite common. "If the deal sounds too good to be true," police say, "it usually is."

Details of the incident have been forwarded to the Ontario Provincial Police Anti-Rackets group.

Researchers find secrets of successful teenagers

There is something different about successful teenagers. They have assets that help them achieve success. Researchers have identified 40 assets that characterize the successful teenager, beginning with family love and support.

The successful teen is willing to seek advice from parents and relates well to at least three non-parent adults. The teen experiences a caring neighbourhood, and attends a caring, encouraging school. The successful teen lives in a community that shows it values young people, and where young people are given useful roles in the community. This is a community where the teen feels safe at home, school and in the neighbourhood.

The successful teen serves in the community at least one hour per week.

Teens may often rebel against parental rules, but the successful teen belongs to a family with clear rules and the family monitors the young person's whereabouts. Breaking the rules has consequences.

Rebellion about school rules may be typical, but a successful teen attends a school that provides clear rules and clear consequences for breaking the rules. In fact, the successful teen lives in a neighbourhood and community where everyone monitors the teen's behaviour and everyone encourages the teen to do well. The most successful teens have adults around them who model positive responsible behaviour, and these teens choose friends who behave responsibly.

Teens who use their time constructively outside school hours are likely to be more successful than teens who just "hang out". Successful teens are involved in sports and/or arts three or more hours a week, and no more than two nights a week are spend away from home just hanging out with friends.

Reading books and doing one hour per day of homework are characteristics of successful teens. These teens are involved in their school activities and makes an effort to do well in school.

A teen who places a high value on helping others is likely to be more successful. The most successful teen has high regard for equality and social jus-

tics, stands up for his or her beliefs, and is an honest person. The successful teen accepts and takes personal responsibility, and believes it is important to refrain from sexual activity and the use of alcohol and drugs.

The successful teen is socially competent. This teen knows how to plan ahead and make choices, knows how to be a friend, can resist negative peer pressure and dangerous situations, and is comfortable with people who have different cultural/racial/ethnic backgrounds. The successful teen knows how to resolve conflict without resorting to violence.

The successful teen is optimistic about the future and believes "my life has a purpose."

Chamber of Commerce and EDC complete merger

 KEREMEOS - The Keremeos and District Chamber of Commerce and the Keremeos and South Similkameen Economic Development Commission (EDC) have decided to amalgamate. At the January 27, regular Chamber meeting, with representatives from the Chamber, the EDC and Village Council, including Mayor Lee, the new group agreed on a budget that Chamber Manager Ken Randle says they have submitted to both the Village and Regional District Areas "B" and "G." He says he is also arranging meetings with the Upper and Lower Similkameen Indian Bands.

Lower Similkameen Band wants 'sustainable' land use

 Similkameen - February 1, under legal and Okanagan Native Nation advice, the Lower Similkameen Indian Band (LSIB) announced to stakeholders at the local Coordinated Resource Management Plan (CRMP) meeting that it has left the table, but will continue to participate as an observer. The LSIB will develop a local stewardship plan for sustainable land and resource management in the area of interest, and will hold ongoing bi-lateral consultations with each CRMP stakeholder group.

In a February 3 interview, Band Manager Dixon Terbasket said, "We might be looking at a cooperative agreement with the CRMP."

According to Terbasket, the LSIB area of interest covers 150,000 hectares from the U.S. border at Kapula to the height of land along Kōbau Mountain, over to Fairview and the White Lake Observatory, to the height

Randle says the new group will for now use the name Chamber of Commerce, and has three divisions, Chamber, EDC and Tourism. He says in the past "we haven't been able to access funding programs, because everyone on the Chamber is a volunteer. We have decided the Chamber is a business, but we need a permanent person to run it. There's just too much going on."

"One of the main objectives is to bring sustainable employment to the area," Randle said, allowing people who are not involved in agriculture to live and work here. He is concerned that, after graduation, most young people have to leave the area to find employment.

of land at Apex, down to the borders between Chuchuwayha Indian Reserve #2 and LSIB Reserve #10, west to the height of land between Pasayten and Ashnola headwaters.

Terbasket says the CRMP has been meeting for 15 to 20 years, and each stakeholder group like ranching, forestry etc... has its own agenda. The LSIB stewardship plan will identify the resources in the area of interest, and study how to use them in a socially, economically and environmentally sustainable manner, taking into account traditional knowledge.

Terbasket commented, "It is the Band's desire to work with the community regarding these land resource management issues."

Cawston man charged in assault

Cawston - Dennis James Colbeck of Cawston was charged January 31 with causing a disturbance, resisting arrest, assaulting a police officer, and uttering threats during a January 30 incident in the Main Street area of Cawston. Keremeos RCMP had responded to a report of a disturbance. While the attending officer was arresting Colbeck, a physical altercation took place between him and Colbeck. Colbeck is currently in custody, pending his securing bail or making his court appearance February 7.

As part of their "peace officer" role, Keremeos RCMP sometimes mediate disputes instead of making arrests. In two separate incidents in the Ashnola road area, they mediated a dispute with a youth in a residence on January 24, and between residents of a home on January 25. In the Olalla area on January 25, police located, spoke with, and warned a male whose actions were causing an ex-girlfriend concern.

Dietitian says kids have their own tastes

Similkameen - "Make vegetables available but don't force kids to eat them," says Registered Dietitian Nutritionist (RDN) Susi Wilkinson. "It takes time to familiarize them with new food."

When Wilkinson spoke informally with parents about toddler nutrition at the Family Centre in Keremeos on January 13, she said, "It just seems to work better" to respect the individual tastes of children. "Kids don't grow the same amount every day."

A "picky" child "could be drinking too much milk or juice." Children aged 14 to 18 months, refuse food as part of "developing their own sense of who they are." She said children have small appetites "and should have five or six really small meals throughout the day."

Some parents expressed concern about childhood constipation. Penticton Health Unit RDN Kristi Leggate says to prevent constipation parents should offer their children high fibre foods like whole grains, fruits and vegetables at every meal, and not "skip meals," because regular meals help exercise digestive tract muscles.

She says, "increase fluids when you increase fibre," offer water first when your child is thirsty, and make sure your child "gets lots of activity and play."

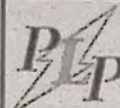

TROUT TALK

"I never saw so many fish on my fish finder. The symbols on its screen showed many of them were over three pounds. Over three pounds can mean a four, five or six pound Kamloops trout!"

George and Olga Judd were fishing Horn Lake, a crystal clear body of water with a weedy bottom. It was loaded with insects and shrimp. Horn Lake is located 10 miles south of Tatla Lake in the Chilcotin country west of Williams Lake, B.C.

Olga said they caught 10 bright silver trout and ate some more on their seven day stay at Horn Lake. The trout ranged in size from 2 1/4 to three pounds.

One remark George made stands out: "It took all my fly line out plus 20 feet of backing. It was a mighty fish and jumped once before shaking my Black O'Lindsay fly. I've never had such a strike before."

If you know George as I do, you know he is not prone to exaggeration. Perhaps you remember George's seven pound Kamloops from Alleyne Lake's pothole. Well, George was more excited about this Horn Lake trout than that one! It will remain one of those fish he will always wonder about - how big was it?

When the fish jumped, George said, "It had 90 feet of fly line and 20 of backing out, and at that distance it still looked huge!"

A fond memory for Olga was that there were no bugs! There were no mosquitoes, gnats or no-see-ums, not a single biting insect during their nine-day Chilcotin trip. This was said with the emphasis of one who knows what being mobbed by mosquitoes means.

The two photos they loaned me say a lot, too. Olga with her nice Kamloops trout seems pleased, to say the least, and George watching his fish locator as he trolls along beautiful Horn Lake looks like he is enjoying himself.

If I were to make a winning bet with someone, I'd say we could find George and Olga Judd on Horn Lake in the autumn of 2000. There is a Kamloops trout there that George would like to have bite either his or Olga's Black O'Lindsay again.

LIVING PAST 100

Good hearts live long

If you want to live more than 100 years, you need to keep your heart healthy.

February is Heart Month, and the heart is the symbol of Valentine's Day, a time for love and romance. There is a connection. One of the best medicines for heart health is happiness, and nothing brings more happiness than loving and being loved.

There are many other things we can do to keep our hearts healthy. We can avoid smoking, keep the excess weight off, exercise regularly, and eat plenty of fruits and vegetables.

If we want to do a little extra for the heart, we must remember that heart tissue and blood vessels are made up of muscle tissue. Selenium, the great virus-fighting mineral, is a lacking in our area, but essential for strong muscles. In areas where selenium is plentiful, heart disease is rare when compared with places where there is a deficiency of selenium. This mineral is a trace element but essential to heart health. A province in China is deficient in selenium, and public health issues

selenium tablets to all residents to prevent early death from heart disease.

One of the recent supplements proven beneficial to heart health is Co-enzyme Q-10. It is expensive compared with selenium supplements, but not as expensive as heart disease.

Vitamin C is good for keeping blood vessels clear, and so is pectin, a substance found in apples (and jelly and jam!) A half an aspirin a day, and a small glass of red wine are beneficial to the heart.

This month, volunteers will canvass for donations to the Heart and Stroke Foundation. The donations go to heart research and public education about heart health. Many of the advances in treatment of heart problems, such as bypass surgery, pacemakers, and heart transplants are the result of research.

These volunteers are doing something for their own hearts as they canvass. They are walking, and they are giving their time and effort to a worthwhile cause, both good for the heart. People who help others tend to have healthier hearts. Good-hearted people do live longer!

Civil servant wage hikes are inappropriate

The announcement of major salary increases for upper echelon civil servants was completely inappropriate if one considers the salary levels on which the hikes were based. When a salary of more than \$100,000 a year receives an increase of seventeen per cent, then we are looking at a big expenditure of tax dollars. It would behoove the New Democratic government to remember who is paying the bills and what those taxpayers are earning these days!

The majority of British Columbians can only dream of earning over \$100,000 a year. A very large percentage of the taxpayers would be pleased to earn one-quarter of that amount. Times have been tough for wage earners in B.C. and the level of unemployment has been too high for too long. To make matters worse, many of the policies of the current government have driven investment, jobs and people to other locations. Policies affecting the forest industry and mining were geared to pleasing and appeasing a small but militant minority of professional environmentalists, and the cost to British Columbians has been horrendous.

If more of the MLAs lived in the Interior small towns, they would know first hand the kind of hardships we have faced, and would understand the relationship between government policy and economic hardship. To sit in Victoria and decide to give top civil servants a big salary hike shows us that many of the people we elected are not in touch with the reality of our lives.

As for the excuse that these salaries are required to stop the "brain drain", might we suggest that the first down the drain should be those responsible for the fast ferry fiasco or the mess our health care system is in.

Princeton Light and Power Utility Commission hearing postponed

Dear Editor;

Re: Postponement of BC Utility Commission (BCUC) hearings in Princeton, February 8.

I would appreciate having the opportunity to explain the reasons behind the sudden cancellation of the scheduled BCUC Hearings regarding the construction of a new substation facility for Princeton by Princeton Light and Power (PLP).

Most PLP customers know that PLP has for many years been trying to establish a permanent power supply for this area that is not adversely affected by voltage surges and bumps. The frustration has always been that a very solid power supply is available to Princeton from the BC Hydro power line that runs directly through Princeton to service the now 'moth-balled' Similco Mine. For many years, West Kootenay Power (WKP) has had to supply Princeton from the BC Hydro power line, as they do not have adequate resources of their own to carry the load when the demands are high in winter. PLP has negotiated seriously with WKP to obtain service on a year round basis to avoid all the problems experienced during the other months of the year, particularly during the lightning storm season. After many years of frustration, PLP set out on its own and negotiated with BC Hydro for full service which will cut WKP completely out of the picture. To do this, PLP is required to apply to the BCUC for a "Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity" (CPCN). WKP opposed this application and forced it to go to public hearings as were scheduled for February 8, 9, and 10 in Princeton.

Once the application went to public hearing, it became a political football. Everyone with an interest, or axe to grind, registered as an intervenor to the proceedings and mountains of evidence was filed in preparation. Most of the issues had nothing to do with the customers of PLP but at the end of the day, it would be the PLP customer who would be required to pay most of the costs involved for these hearings - conservatively \$30,000 per day. For a small utility, these levels of cost are completely absurd. On January 30, PLP made a desperate 'common sense' offer to bring a conciliated resolve to this matter. The BCUC liked PLP's proposal and on February 2 at a meeting in Vancouver, WKP and PLP came to

an agreement, before the BCUC, to supply Princeton on a full-time, year round basis from the BC Hydro power line routed through the existing WKP substation. This is the best possible conclusion from a cost point of view and PLP accepts that it, and far more important, PLP's customers, can live with these terms.

The application at this point has been ordered postponed, not cancelled, but PLP is optimistic that it and WKP have better things to do than quibble over the Princeton supply and the matter will be closed with a happy ending for the PLP customer.

B.C. hears good news on economy

Statistics Canada released good news about B.C.'s economy last week. In January, 8,000 new jobs were created. Growth was concentrated in full-time jobs in the goods-producing sector.

This increase in jobs follows the solid 1.9 per cent increase in employment in 1999. The unemployment rate dropped to 7.3 per cent, its lowest rate since August 1981.

Other economic indicators are positive. Housing starts, auto sales and retail sales were up in the fourth quarter of 1999, and labour income rose. The help-wanted index, a measure of demand for workers, has risen steadily since May 1999 and registered its strongest growth in January 2000 with a 4.4 per cent increase.

Economic forecasters are optimistic about the world economy, and the outlook for commodity prices is good. The BC Economic Forecast Council, an expert group of economic forecasters who met January 27 in Vancouver, predicts growth picking up in B.C. to 2.2 per cent in 2000 and 2.5 per cent in 2001.
